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UNEXPECTED DEVELOPMENTS PLEASE CROWD AS Mules run photo finishes

The three days of the mule meeting at **Ruidoso Downs produced 26 photo finishes** in 45 races - as proof of how well matched the mules were.

Friday and Saturday the track was a sea of mud - with the wheels of the chariots kicking up rooster tails like speed boats during a fast run. Sunday the track was considered heavy but the mules coped to run 400 yards in a respectable 24.10.

The main casualty in the planned events was the arena action which fell to the mud - mud too deep even for mules to chase calves in.

No figures were available on the mule sale but Ed Hyman, president of Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners, event sponsors, said, "There were a lot of mules sold and a lot of interest shown by both buyers and sellers."

The fans turned out in good numbers Saturday and Sunday. "I don't know what the attendance was," Hyman said Sunday, "but, considering the weather and the weather reports, we are well satisfied with the response."

The large number of photo finishes --with most deciding second and third -- was attributed by Hyman to the grading of mules "and assigning them weights according to their class and the class of their competition in any given race. Outside of the long races, there wasn't any such thing as one mule romping across the finish line with a huge lead, say seven or eight lengths. In most of the races there wasn't more than five tenths of a 'second separating the winner from the one running dead last.'

Some of the predictable unpredictableness of the mules occurred, just often enough to prove that mules will do the unexpected as mule fans expect. The fourteenth race Saturday was an outstanding example of what happens in a race when the mules get tired of running. There were actually three divisions in that six furlong junket. 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



Four Corners launches range research project

that make up the four corners region have recently received a \$275,619 grant from the Four Corners Commission for a regional range research project. Dr. Ellis W. Huddleston, head of New

Mexico State University's entomology and plant pathology department, is project coordinator for New Mexico. Other members of the New Mexico research team are Dr. Kirk McDaniel Dr. David Richman and Walter Smith

Huddleston said New Heritor resear-chers, along with research teams from Arizona, Colorado, Nevada and Utah will focus on major plant and animal pests affecting ranges in the four corners states. The researchers also will study those insects considered beneficial to these ranges.

The economic value of livestock on ranges in the five states was determined by the United States Department of Agriculture at near \$3 billion in 1976. Huddleston noted that those figures reflect only a small part of the economic value of ranges when energy resources, water-sheds, recreation, military and other uses are considered.

He said economic losses due to pests will gain attention in the project and measures will be determined to greatly reduce them. As examples of such losses he cited damage caused by the range caterpillar and black grass bug. New Mexico estimated about a \$40 million loss to range caterpillars over the past 10 years. Black grass bugs caused an estimated \$5.7 million loss in one year just in three Utah countles. Both pests are making inroads in other states.

New Mexico, Colorado, and Nevada researchers will concentrate on gathering necessary economic and biological information. They will use this information to develop control strategies for selected

New Mexico and the four other states pests including range caterpillars, hat make up the four corners region have grasshoppers and black grass bugs that inflict serious losses in range production. New Mexico and Utah researchers will investigate control strategies for range weed pests and the development of resistance in grasses to the range plant

pests. Researchers from the plant, animal, insect and climatological disciplines from the five states will pool their efforts and information. A manual, drawing on this information, will be written about the grass-consuming insects that inhabit the four corners area.

Huddleston said. "The project aims to help improve ranges to meet increasing demands for more food, water, energy, recreation, watersheit and wildlife. The knowledge obtained will help us more economically and effectively imanage range lands that constitute 80 to 90 percent of the land area in these states."

Improved ranges, he said, can make up for some agricultural land being lost to housing and industrial development. Improved ranges would mean more water

and food production from range lands and less pollution and erosion.

"An immediate economic benefit from this project is that the states will exchange information that already is known in the individual states," Huddleston said.

The project proposes to combine known information immediately to protect some of this land from insects, weeds, diseases, nematodes and other pests that cause losses on ranges. It will use problem solving interdisciplinary integrated pest management (IIPM) teams. "These teams will strive to develop other new methods of improving our range which is becoming even more important in providing food, jobs, water, energy materials and recreation to all citizens," Huddleston said.

Project coordinators from the other states are Floyd G. Werner, University of Arizona, Tucson; John L. Capinera, Colorado State University, Fort Collins; Robert W. Landerdale, University of Nevada, Reno. The overall project coordinator is B. Austin Haws of Utah State University.


About 45 program directors are ex-pected, along with officials of the state Department of Education and the United States Department of Education, which is









To produce fuel Ruidoso Downs police busily operating still

Usually, when you hear stories involving police and alcohol stills, it's a matter of the law enforcement officers smashing the apparatus after tracking moonshiners into the backwoods.

But the Ruidoso Downs Police Department has added a new twist to the story. They've erected their own-alcoholproducing still on village property, with the alm of providing the village with a cheap source of fuel to power their motor vehicles.

Starting with a mash mixture of yeast, barley, sugar and water, the police walt for fermentation to begin. The mash is then mixed with more water and sawdust, from which the alcohol is produced.

It's not a complicated procedure, according to Downs police chief Ray Garner. A little basic chemistry, drafting and "horse sense," was applied to the building of the still. (And Incidentally, horses contributed to the project in other ways by adding some "organic material" to the sawdust, which was supplied by the Ruidoso Downs racetrack.)

Garner picked up a water tank which had been abandoned along a roadway, repaired a small hole in the tank, and converted it into the main "cooker," which is currently being heated by a small camping stove.

The first "batch" of alcohol was expected by today, after the liquids are heated and cooled several times during the distillation process. The still consists of the main cooker, and three "cooling towers," Since alcohol will g evaporate at a lower temperature than til water, the alcohol can be separated from g the water through a heating and condensation process which takes place in each of the three towers, Garner said.

The towers also contain a total of 16 screens which trap even more of the water, constantly increasing the concentration of alcohol. Their goal is an alcohol of about 180 proof, which Garner said can be used to fuel motor vehicles alone, or can be mixed with gasoline to make a homemade version of gasohol.

Garner also emphasized that the alcohol is definitely not of the drinking variety. "It's toxic enough to kill a person," he said.

The police may also manufacture diesel fuel with the alcohol, by adding 30 weight motor oil.

Total cost of the still materials will amount to approximately \$100, Garner said, not including the free labor supplied by the police officers. Production costs will probably amount to about 30 cents per gallon, which could save the village a tremendous amount in fuel costs, he said.

The village currently spends an average of \$1.20 per gallon for fuel.

There are several other such stills, owned by government entities, now in operation in New Mexico, Garner said. If the current experiment is successful, he added, the department will seek a grant from the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, to construct a larger and more sophisticated model, which could produce a greater amount of fuel.

Current production is about two to five gallons per hour, Garner estimated, but that should soon be increased to about 20 gallons per hour.

The alcoholic content of the mash will be constantly increased, which will mean a similar rate of increase in the finished product.

The advantages of alcohol fuels, Garner said, include the fact that engines burn cooler, carbon reduction is tremendous and general pollutants are reduced by about 20 percent.

Stills of this sort can be erected by individuals, Garner said. However, they should first contact the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearm Division in Santa Fe, to become famillar with all the applicable rules and regulations.

Garner sees such alcohol production as a way to decrease dependence on fossil fuels. He is appalled by the amount of materials which he sees being wasted - material which could be turned into fuel.


"Look at all the sunflowers we had this year," Garner said. "A sunflower can produce a high grade of alcohol — it contains all the components you need."

Instead of creating huge dumps to bury such materials, Garner said, "it's about time the American people wised up and started putting them to good use."

And the police chief is definitely practicing what he preaches.

"We'll be using the by-products of the still to fertilize the park," he said. "Nothing will be wasted."

A lot of sprucing-up and painting-up has been going on at Sunland Park in recent weeks as track officials prepare for the October 4 start of the new season.

In addition, the running surface has been checked and re-conditioned to make sure the horses have solid and safe footing.

Over the weekend, the racing strip opened for training. Horses are now on the track from 6 a.m. until 10 a.m. Last week, there were only some 200 horses on the grounds. But since the New Mexico State Fair wound up on Sunday, a big flow of horses to Sunland is now underway. Before the week is out, some 1,500 head will be on the grounds.

"In order to get the running surface ready for the new season, the first thing we did was peel off the old cushion," Track Superintendent Connie Madrid sald. "Then we checked the base for low or soft apots, and we used engineers' instruments to make sure there were no high spots." After determining that the surface was level, Madrid ordered his five man crew to bring in 2,864 cubic yards of sand. This was spread over the base to create a new 31/2inch cushion.

"The track is now in perfect condition," Madrid said. "It's fast, but it's also even all the way around."

Bill Thomas, Sunland's administrative assistant, has been keeping his crew busy doing a lot of improvements throughout the barn area, grandstand and clubhouse. Working under the direction of general manager Finlay MacGillivray, Thomas had his crew embark on a fairly comprehensive paint up project.

"All of the barns - 55 in all - have been aplated a clean light beige," Thomas said. The effect, he said, really spruces up the barn area. The trim around the totalisator board has been perked up with a red, white and blue color scheme, and a lot of minor painting throughout the plant was completed last week.

During the summer, three-by-four foot concrete pads were installed (four for each barn). The manure bins are now placed on the concrete pads, making it far easier for the manure removal trucks to service the bins. (During rainy weather, the bins won't get stuck in mud.)

When the season opens, Sunland patrons will quickly notice the new overhead heating system. About 200 units have been installed in the grandstand and clubhouse. after three to six months. "It's a far more efficient system," Thomas said. "There's no pilot light, so there's no natural gas odor. Also, on a cold day, the grandstand and clubhouse can be heated up in a few minutes." With demand for clubhouse seasonal

seating again running at a high peak, Thomas has installed 14 more tables (each accommodating four patrons). Once again, all seating in the clubhouse will be sold on a seasonal basis. Thomas reports some accommodations are still available. but, like last year, he expects to be completely sold out by opening day.

Perhaps the most important new feature, as far as fans are concerned, is

the installation of a computerized totalisator system. The system was in-troduced at Ruidoso Downs last summer, and quickly drew the endorsement of the fans. Since a variety of wagers can now be made at a given window, the result is shorter wagering lines and less time waiting in line.

Pinon nuts well

"This year's statewide pinon nut crop does not look good. However, there should be fair crops in the Cibola National Forest near Magdalena and the Mount Taylor regions," said James Sais, Extension horticulturist for New Mexico State University. "The Carson National Forest predicts a very small crop, while the Santa Fe Forest predicts a very light crop and only in isolated areas."

Pinon nuts are seeds that grow in the cones. After the frost, the mature cones open and the nuts fall out. The oldest and simplest method to harvest nuts is to simply pick them off the ground by hand. A fast picker, with a plentiful crop, can pick 20 pounds of nuts a day, Sais said.

Pinons usually lose 5 to 15 percent of their moisture within 30 days of harvest. Cure the nuts in dry air. Store them in cloth bags and allow ventilation between bags.

Pinons are noted for their excellent keeping qualities. Dry, unshelled nuts have been marketed up to three years after harvest. Shelled nuts become rancid

Unshelied nuts are sometimes roasted. While this improves the flavor, roasted nuts become rancid more quickly so don't store them too long.

To salt the nuts in the shell, cover them with a salt solution made from one-fourth cup salt to two quarts of water. Bring to a boll and then simmer for two hours or soak them overnight, drain and roast.

Pinons can be roasted in the oven at 300 degrees by placing the unshelled nuts in a shallow pan. Stir the pinons frequently and test them for teste. It is very easy to oven roast them. Some people prefer to cook them in a heavy skillet on top of the stove, stirring frequently.

To shell them easily, while they are still warm, place them between two damp cloths. Roll or pound them with a rolling pin, depending on the hardness of the shell. The protein average for pinon nuts in 14.5 percent. It is higher than for pecan (10.4) and about the same as English walnuts and Brazil nuts. The pinon nut kernels average about 60 percent oil or fat. This is lower than pecans, English walnuts and Brazil nuts. The contents of carbohydrates averages 16.8 percent.


