Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners president Ed Hyman said, "That \$35,560 is a lot of money — in fact, the most paid anywhere — for mule race purses. Our purses also attracted the nation's top racing mules — that's why the races were so exciting — that's why mule racing will become a major attraction here in the

"And don't forget — as an estimate the people here for the races, the auction, and other events dropped about a quarter of a million dollars into the local economy. That makes that \$35,560 seem like

Hyman said, "in spite of the bad weather," that 2,396 fans paid admission for a total gate of \$4,792. Stall rentals added \$2,030 to the income, with \$1,545 realized from program sales. "The Ruidoso High School athletic department made \$154.50 from the program sales," Hyman said, "which wasn't as much as

we'd hoped for, but it's that much they didn't have, so it'll help."

As soon as all of the bills are paid, Hyman said, "we'll issue a full accounting and it looks like considering the weather, that'll we'll break about even — which really isn't all that bad,"

Plans are being made for the 1981 mule races at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Hyman said, "and, if everything works out, we expect to have some races for \$5,000 purses. It's this way, the Mule Skinners are being mule-headed about making Ruidoso Downs the mule racing capitol of the world - and we will."

paying their tax)" but to keep the committee informed.

If funds are requested from a group such as the lodger's association, chairman Ed Hyman said, it would be helpful to know how many lodgers are contributing to the tax fund as compared with the number of lodgers participating in the promotion for which funds are requested.

With regard to the village's administration of the funds, Junge said, he thought the "\$800 to \$700 a month (collected by the village for administration) is a little high for the posting they have to do."

The committee will also request that the village provide more extensive records of lodger's tax spending, noting expenditures, purpose of expenditures, dates the funding requests were approved by the

LTC and village trustees, cumulative totals of expenditures and remaining funds.

The committee also voted to recommend reimbursement in the amount of \$947.22 to organizers of the Arabian Horse Show, and \$2,543.34 to the Chamber of Commerce for quarterly expenses.

Committee members questioned whether the advertising would represent a duplication of effort, because the Chamber of Commerce Itself distributed about onethird of the total circulation, which amounted to about 6,000 to 8,000 during this Those who obtained the magazine from the Chamber office could also obtain the information carried in the ads from

Chamber brochures, Hyman said. Jungbluth said that the magazine is also circulated widely in West Texas and that many tourists take the publication home as a souvenir, increasing its value as an advertising medium.

Funds for advertising in Best Bet would be in addition to the total of about \$8,500 which has been approved for the yearly operation of the Chamber.

Trustee George White, who attended the LTC meeting said that the trustees had been under the impression that except for special events and promotions, the \$8,500 would be the only Chamber funding request for the year.

The matter was tabled to allow more time to consider whether the return on the advertising was significant enough to warrant its continuation.

# County to maintain cattleguards

Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday accepted a bid of \$9,940 from Border Machinery, El Paso, Texas, on a used backhoe, to be used by the county road

At the same time, the county officials agreed to change a previously established policy on cleaning of cattle guards on county roads.

One of the advantages of owning the new backhoe will be the increased ease with which the road department employees will be able to clean the cattleguards. Road Department Superintendent Guy Henley said that the new equipment will allow one man to do the work that three men, equipped with picks and shovels, have been doing in the past.

Although the commissioners had recently agreed that landowners would be responsible for cleaning of the guards, they agreed Tuesday that the results of that policy had been unfavorable.

Commissioner John Allen Hightower advised that several vehicles had been damaged by being driven over cattleguards which had been cleaned and

replaced improperly. Under the new policy, the county road crews will begin cleaning the cattleguards on the more heavily traveled roads first.

The commissioners also discussed the operation of the county owned landfill, located on Fort Stanton road. The landfill

currently is managed by the village of townbouses, Alto Village. Ruidoso in exchange for its use.

Because the landfill is not open on Sundays, Henley told the commissioners, the road department employees frequently must spend time on Mondays cleaning up refuse which has been dumped outside the fenced facility.

Jim Wooldridge, Ruidoso, who was attending the meeting, suggested that the county work with Ruidoso to split the cost of hiring a worker to operate the landfill on Sundays. No official action was taken on the auggestion.

-Reviewed a new policy for acceptance of roads into the state system and agreed to resubmit Gavilan Canyon Road and Carrizo Canyon Road as possibilities for inclusion in the state system.

-Tabled a requested variance for a liquid waste disposal system in Deer Park

Woods subdivision. Approved replats for Site C and Site A,

-Directed county manager Bill Billingsley to pursue reenactment of the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission and to report to the commissioners at the next meeting.

-Agreed to send a letter of support on behalf of the Carrizozo state Employment Securities Division, asking that it remain open five days per week.

# Medical services in Carrizozo

After a period of four months, Carrizozo is again being served by a doctor and a full time nurse practitioner. The town had been without such medical services since June, when a doctor provided by the National Health Service Corps fulfilled his one-year committment

Rosemary Zink, originally of Pennsylvania, will be the full time nurse practitioner. She has been employed by Project Hope for more than 10 years, so her background is "mainly rural health," she said.

Zink hold a bachelor's degree in nursing from Gwynedd-Mercy College, Gwynedd Pennsylvania, and a master's in public bealth from Tulane University, New Orleans, Louisiana.

She has been employed in community health and education with Project Hope in Nicaragua, Colombia, Ceylon, Brazil, Guatemala, Jamaica and Arizona. For three years, she was head nurse in the pecuatric department of the S/S Hope, working in several South American

Dr. Michael O. Stone of Ruidoso will be the physician supervising Zink and holding office hours at the Carrizozo Health Center on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8:30 a.m., to 12 noon. Office hours may be expanded in the future depending on demand, Stone said.

Stone has been a practicing physician in Ruidoso for the past three years. He moved to the area after completing a three-year residency in family practice in Virginia.

He attended the University of New Mexico Medical School just prior to his residency, after completing a two-year post doctoral research fellowship for the American Cancer Society. He holds a Ph.-D. in biochemistry from Tulane University, where he also taught physical and organic chemistry for several years. Stone is certified by the American Board of Family Practice.

"Preventative medicine," Stone and Zink agreed, will be a primary concern of the Health Center.

"One of our chief goals," Zink said, "will be to work with the people to prevent illnesses and their complications working with the community to help keep people healthy."

Prevention of disease is the foundation of medical care," Stone added. "We hope to introduce the idea of prevention rather

than crisis orientation. We believe in patient education, because an informed patient is a healthier patient."

Stone added he was "very disturbed" when the physician left Carrizozo, since the move left the northern part of the county with no medical facilities.

Although county emergency medical technicians are "well-trained," Stone said there was no referring physician and no continuity of care, which he regards as

The Kidney Foundation of New Mexico (KFNM) is unusual in the respect that only 14.5 percent of funds of the monles collected is used for fund raising and administration, Hug said. Over one third of last year's funds — 36.5 percent — went to direct patient services. The remainder of the money was divided among the National Kidney Foundation, educational efforts and research.

Hug, who is a kidney transplant recipient herself, is handling the local fund drive almost single handedly. Among the foundation's programs are:

-A drug bank plan which enables kidney patients needing medications to buy them at reduced prices.

-The direct patient services program, which makes non-medical fund grants to patients, as resources permit, when other monies are unavailable.

-Gift of Life Organ Donor Program, that distributes thousands of cards to increase the number of kidney donors in the state. More than 25 kidney transplant operations are performed in New Mexico each year. The KFNM spearheaded passage of a state law providing for organ donor cards on drivers licenses.

—Annual nephrology seminar, which increases knowledge of kidney problems for medical personnel.

-Project GAIN, (Gatherings for Advanced Information in Nephrology), which offers continuing education credit to nurses and medical staffs.

-A quarterly newsletter which provides information on patient activities, fund raising events, volunteer involvement and regional and national developments related to kidney disease.

In the future, the KFNM hopes to establish a better state-wide organ procurement system and to organize more local chapters of the foundation. The foundation also hopes to increase awareness of the disease end its warning



The greatest heat loss relative to the size of an opening is the space under your outside doors. All exterior doors should be weather stripped on three sides and have a tight fitting threshold at the bottom. Windows should also be tight and weather stripped.

Check around windows and doors for caulking. Air may infiltrate where your sidings meet window and door frames. Also, look to see that you have a good seal where the strom windows meet the frame of the prime window. Use good caulking compound, since this is a time consuming job and you should not have to do it more than once every 5 to 18 years if you use the right material. Buy

an acrylic latex caulk and it will give you the best possible combination of longevity, paintability and elasticity.

A good method of locating bidden cracks is to move a lit candle around your door and window frames on a windy day and look for a flicker of the flame. It will indicate those areas where are in need of weather stripping.

SANTA FE-If we could only tell in advance which of those dewy-eyed young hopefuls are going to get elected to the Legislature this fall, we'd deliver each of them a personal message.

"Cool it with trying to get too many laws passed" is what we'd say,

We're willing to bet today that as many as 850 proposed pieces of legislation get thrown into the hopper in the 1981 session. There could easily be 150 on liquor alone, since we've got a crusading young Liquor Director, an interim legislative committee considering nothing but that topic, and almost every candidate for office out there in the fleld telling the voters we've got to have better liquor laws.

(What "better" means in that sentence they're not quite sure, but whatever it is they're vowed to fight the good fight.) Why is it that, to every present or

potential legislator, "improvement" always means more laws?

Government in the United States is drunk on laws.

If you don't believe it, look at this: The legislative bodies in this country, in Washington, at the state capitals and inlocal jurisdictions, are expected to pass something over 170,000 new laws next

Mind you, that's new laws only-and they get beaped on top of the excess baggage of legislation already on the books.

-What's worse, it is estimated that for each new law which is enacted, 10 new regulations must be issued by the agencies who will oversee the new law.

That means 1,700,000 of those constraints raining down on poor citizens who are already regulated up to their very

We'll bet you even the vast bureaucracy of the United Soviet Socialist Republics. where they have a completely "con-trolled" economy, doesn't match that kind of production.

Is it any wonder that the number of American lawyers has grown twice as fast as the population as a whole during the 80 years of this century? Can you see why enrollment in law schools is twice the size today it was a bare 16 years ago?

Do you understand why we have three times as many lawyers per capita as England and 20 times as many as Japan? How long must we go on acting as though the solution to every problem is to pass a

As Laurence H. Tribe, himself an attorney and a professor at Harvard Law School, said recently: "An excess of law inescapably weakens the rule of law. Frustrated citizens naturally distrust an expensive, inefficient, frequently incomprehensible nonsystem that often seems contrived to serve lawyers rather than law.

Amen, brother! Tell it like it is! If you have a friend running for the Legislature for the first time, grab him or her and read him every one of these irate words—a cry from the heart from one of many citizens awash in a sea of poorly conceived, amateurishly drafted and, above all, overly abundant laws.

As for the incumbent members who are coming back to the legislature, it would be a waste of time to talk to them. They are probably too far gone, like old dopers, and will continue putting in bills till our eyes glaze over.

All we can do is face the future bravely, shouting our battle cry, "Fewer laws!

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### Letters to the Editor

Dear editor:

On October 2, 1980, you have published that nitrates are not bad guys. Mr. Larry Foster's opinion in this context is misleading. Let me explain some of the important actions of nitrites and nitrates in our body.

Nitrites and nitrates are used as drugs to selectively dilate coronary, cerebral and peripheral vascular beds. Therapeutic use of these drugs is not free from adverse side effects. The occurrence of headache and hypotension with dizziness are common. lowever, this should not pose any problem when the patient is under medical supervison.

Drinking water may also become contaminated with nitrates. One common source of this type of pollution originates from improper disposal of sewage. These nitrites, in turn, are able to convert hemoglobin to methemoglobin. The methemoglobin with the iron in the ferric (oxidized) form rather than ferrrous form loses its oxygen carrying capacity. Children under six months of age are highly susceptible to develop methemoblobin in their blood causing a disease known as methemoglobinemia or blue baby syndrome. Waters with nitrate concentrations greater than 10 mg/1 hould not be used for feeding infants below six months of age. Even consumption of such water for a single day can result in the occurrence of methemoglobinemia. Water containing a high level of nitrate should not be boiled as this concentrates the nitrite content. It can

only be removed by demineralizing water or by distilling it.

These chemicals also react readily, under appropriate conditions, with secondary amines and similar nitrogeous

compounds to form N-nitroso compounds as a class which are potent carcinogens. The use of nitrites as a preservative is a double-edged sword. Its bactericial property does not necessarily make it free

from exerting its aforesaid bad effects. Hari Mukhoty







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# Civilian Safety Fly-in scheduled at Holloman

The Tactical Training Holloman Office of Safety is sponsoring a Civilian Safety Fly-In and Orientation Seminar in conjunction with the annual Holloman Air Force Base Open House Saturday, November 1. The purpose of the seminar is to acquaint the general aviation community with the military operations conducted by F-15 and T-38 aircraft and to enhance flying safety for all concerned.

The Fly-In will begin at 8 a.m. Due to the hazards involved with light aircraft intermixed with planned airshow activities at the Open House, no civilian aircraft will be accepted at Holloman after 10 a.m., November 1. The base will be open for automobile traffic at 10 a.m., if Fly-In participants prefer to drive to Holloman rather than fly. If they choose to fly-in, one copy of an Air Force Form 180, Hold-Harmless Agreement, must be turned in upon arrival at Holloman and a second copy of the form carried aboard the participating aircraft.

After participants have arrived and parked their aircraft, they will be met by officers of the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing and 479th Tactical Training Wing and transported to the 465th Tactical Training Squadron. Movies will be shown there, and tours of the T-38, F-16, and F-4 simulators held from 8 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. Attendees

The Tactical Training Holloman Office of Safety is sponsoring a Civilian Safety Officers' Open Meas for the Orientation Fly-In and Orientation Seminar in conjunction with the annual Holloman Air a.m. until 1 p.m.

The seminar will open with greetings from Brigadier General Thomas S. Swalm, Tactical Training Holloman Commander. Briefings will be given by the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing, 479th Tactical Training Wing, Radar Approach Control, and 6585th Test Group, and will be followed by a question and answer session. At 1 p.m., participants will be transported to the flight line for Open House activities, including static displays of aircraft and performances by the United States Air Force "Thunderbirds" and United States Army "Golden Knights." Radio-equipped aircraft should contact Holloman Approach Control on frequency 120.6 MHZ for radar advisories, and the Holloman Tower on 128.2 MHZ for landing

Non-radio equippped aircraft will follow normal VFR traffic procedures and monitor the tower for appropriate light gun signals. Determination of the active/landing runway can be made by observing the landing traffic or illumination of the Visual Approach Slop Indicator lights on either side of the approach end of the active runway. Non-radio equipped aircraft are requested to arrive at Holloman between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. A VOR approach is available, if needed, and participants are reminded that restricted and special use airspace must be avoided while en route to Holloman Air Force

### Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne: I have frequently heard of hunters being affected by buck fever, but I don't really understand. Could you ex-plain? George S., Michigan. Dear George: Buck fever is the

aggravating calamity which strikes many hunters at exactly the time when they should be calmest. It is non-fatal; short in duration, unpredictable and wery exasperating.

A typical characterization is the hunter who has waited patiently in his blind for bours, attended to his currentedings, with all

hours, attuned to his surroundings, with all senses straining to pick up a telltale sound or sight. At the instant he sights his quarry, he seems to fall apart from the release of accumulated tension. His hands may shake violently, making it impossible to shoot, or he may hurrledly and carelessly fire a poorly aimed shot during

Shortly after the episode, the disgusted hunter regains his composure. No one is immune to the fever, not even the veteran hunter, but he is less susceptible than the novice.

Dear Wayne: Dove hunting is not legal in my home state. There are efforts to establish an open season, but they don't seem to be getting anywhere. There seems to be a good population of doves in the state and I don't really know the reason for not opening a season.

Is Wisconsin unique in this stand? What might be the reason for no season? John G., Wisconsin.

Dear John: Wisconsin is not unique in its stand. There are a dozen or more northern states that do not have an open season for doves. There seems to be various reasons why this is true. I'm not certain why there is no season in

your state, but the fact that the dove is the state bird may have established a resistance toward hunting them. Other states are closed by the efforts of bird watchers, anti-hunting groups, political maneuvers, and in some cases, simply by the lack of interest in the sport. Some people will tell you that doves are

declining and may soon be threatened, but this story hardly holds water when one considers that biologists estimate the country's annual population at nearly twice that of our human population. This is four to five times greater than our total duck population. Another interesting note is that the hunter harvest is less than 60 million annually, or little more than ten percent. Studies indicate, however, that as many as 75 percent of the total population will die annually. So, if only ten percent are harvested, another 65 percent succumb to natural death. Similar mortality rates are shown for quail. I don't expect these figures will do much

to convince most people who are dead-set against hunting doves, for whatever reason. But they do present a good case to anyone willing to listen with an open mind.

TIP FROM READER — Ordinary baking soda is one of the most inexpensive and versatile household items around. Many campers are aware of its virtues and pack a box or two before an outing.

What can it do? Well, it's an excellent toothpaste substitute and a pretty fair deodorant. The dry powder is also a very effective extinguisher of grease fires. Made into a paste, it will clean pots and pans, as well as ease the irritation of insect bites, poison ivy and sunburn. At home it does a great job of removing

# UNM research team now studying how to extract methane from coal

For years huge ventilation systems have been installed in cost mines to rid them of a highly flammable by-product methene, or natural gas. But researchers at the University of New Mexico (UNM) are currently studying ways to extract the gas from the coal before it is mined, thus reducing the hazards of mining while increasing the amount of methane available for home and industrial use.

Frank Williams, assistant professor of chemical and nuclear engineering at UNM, leads a research team in extensive studies of northern New Mexico's San Juan Basin. The team is looking specifically at the extent and potential recovery of methene gas in the basin's underground coal seams.

"The San Juan Basin looks very good to us right now," said Williams. "There is as much methane gas in the coal there as in conventional methane sources in the same area. Right now our main concern is how to measure the amount of methane in the

coal and how to produce it economically."
Williams and two UNM graduate students are conducting three types of tests on the coal: a basic science study to look at the surface chemistry which determines the ability of coal to trap methane; an engineering study to determine the rate of evolution of methane into the gas phase; and a technology study consisting of production modeling to determine methane production at well heads.

The San Juan Basin holds an estimated 5,000 quads — or 5,600,000,000,000,000,000 British thermal units — of energy in coal, according to Williams. That coal could yield 50 quads of methane gas, enough to supply the entire United States with its methane needs for two and a half years at the current rate of use, Residents of New Mexico alone could use these potential reserves for more than 100 years, Williams

Williams' method of collecting coal samples for his research has proven very economical. Originally, researchers had to drill core samples from the coal buried deep beneath the earth. This was not only expensive — costing \$29,000 to \$30,000 per sample — but risky as well because sometimes the samples were not recovered. But now he and his assistants simply gather up coal chips produced during commercial drilling operations.

A significant advantage of methane recovery, Williams said, is that it utilizes two percent of the coal's potential energy that would otherwise be lost to the atmosphere, while at the same time leaving the coal intact for other uses.

Who knows how long coal will last? This will depend on conservation techniques, the price of other fossil fuels, energy imports, the development of other un-conventional energy methods and unforseen developments."





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# Search on for perfect alfalfa

Try and find him - especially in summer. A month passes. Then a voice over the phone proves he does exist. Then another month, and finally he is in his office. The search for Bill Melton is over.

"You can't grow alfalfa in an office," he said in explanation. Melton, an agronomist with New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Agricultural Experiment Station, spent this summer much the way he has the past 23 — trying to breed the perfect alfalfa.

"What we are looking for," he said, "is an alfalfa that will grow in spite of man and mother nature." The variety they want is one that is disease and pest resistant, high yielding and grows without irrigation.

The search for an ideal alfalfa goes back to 1947 when NMSU began its alfalfa breeding program. Today, it is one of the few public alfalfa breeding programs in the country which attempts complete varietal development. This early emphasis on alfalfa breeding reflects its impact on the state economy. Alfalfa hay now ranks third in cash receipts for New Mexico, just behind beef cattle. "And," Melton said, "cows have to eat." Because of this, alfalfa is grown on large and small farms in every county in the state.

The breeding program is also crucial to New Mexico because varieties from other states adapt poorly to New Mexico's climate and altitude. Even within the state, there are three distinct areas of adaptation based mainly on winter temperature.

The researchers take this variation into account in selecting varieties. For example, they are now testing several alfalfa genetic cells and alfalfa varieties to develop a drought resistant strain. According to Melton, alfalfa's apparent genetic flexibility will allow it to respond to moisture, and at the same time, persist and grow under dryland conditions. This could be a valuable trait in northern and eastern New Mexico where dryland farming is necessary.

Drought resistance is one of about 12 factors the researchers test for in their breeding, the outcome of these test must rank the new variety in all traits as good or better than the varieties already on the market. It is a tough sequence that takes 10 years, Melton said.

The theory behind alfalfa breeding is the age-old survival of the fittest. In the decade it takes for testing, each variety is subjected to four diseases and five types of

manufacture their own nitrogen fertilizer.

Not surprising, very few plants survive
the ordeal. "Sometimes out of 1,500 plants we are lucky to end up with two or three," Melton said. Four to 10 plants are necessary to produce a new variety.


breeder seed production. This also has its perils, Melton said. He cites the "unfortunate life" of Rincon, a new variety released in 1978, that is a high seed producer. The only problem was that the jack rabbits loved it. For three years in a row the rabbits ate the plants before they had a chance to produce seed. This year, however. Melton optimistically predicts a

good seed crop. Even after a variety is released, the researchers continue to linker with its genetic make-up. Mesilla, a popular variety, is being studied for its nitrogen fixing potential. Nitrogen fixation is the plant's ability to take nitregen from the air and convert it, inside plant root nodules, into nitrogen fertilizer for its own use.

Melton said potential breakthroughs like these keep the researchers enthusiastic through the long years of testing. "We have 10 new varieties completing a test cycle each year and out of every 50 or 60, we will get one variety that is good enough to release," but, he said, that one variety is encouragement for more genetic tinkering.

Melton, who is now confined to his office, by of all things, hay fever, counts his graduate students as another accomplishment of the breeding program. "They magnify your efforts," he said proudly pointing out that a large percentage of the alfalfa breeders in the country are NMSU alumni.

The alfalfa breeding program has been designated an "Agri-Search '80s" project by NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station. Such projects are designed to help increase agricultural productivity in New Mexico during the next 10 years.
