## Festival signs famed guitarist, okays food pact

Members of the Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated (RSFI) board of directors Monday accepted the contract of Pepe Romero, classical guitarist, to appear with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra June 9 in Ruidoso.

The board also accepted a proposal submitted by Melinda Hall, Nottingham's Deli and Catering, to provide foods at all performances of the orchestra.

The orchestra will perform a series of concerts between June 4 and June 10 in Ruidoso, including three night concerts at the All American Sales Barn in Ruidoso Downs, a special family concert, and three outdoor concerts.

Hall submitted a proposal for the three evening programs which would feature unusual foods, that could be eaten while standing or sitting, in a varying price range. All foods will be served on durable plastic plates and in maximum portions. Food enough for two people will constitute a portion. "The only decision the buyer has to make is what he wants to eat," Hall said.

The eight food items to be offered and the prices for each are:

- Fruit and cheese plate, \$3.
- Marinated water chestnuts wrapped in bacon, \$2.
- Stuffed mushroom caps, \$2.
- Fillet of salmon with cream cheese and bread rounds, \$5.
- Sautéed chicken bits with two sauces (choice), \$3.
- Sausage balls, \$2.
- Shrimp and crab (choice) with sauce and lemons, \$3.
- Caviar and trimmings, \$5.

The main buffet table will feature the above items, and three satellite stations will offer the following:

- Desserts of all kinds, and coffee, \$2 per dessert.
- Miniature meat and cheese tray which serves four, \$4.

Hall said the prices may change before the concerts, but said they will still be reasonable.

Hall also presented a "continual busing" system to keep trash cleared away, and said the main buffet will switch to desserts for the intermission, and will be divided into six identical lines, so everyone can be served quickly.

All waiters will be dressed in waiters' coats and bow ties. The Halls will be dressed in tuxedos, and will have a large staff to keep lines moving quickly.

The open air concerts will feature a smaller menu, because, Hall said, "a lot of people will be brown bagging it." The menu items offered at these events will be two kinds of soft drinks, fresh lemonade, hot dogs with trimmings and giant cookies.

Hall said pizza pups may be added to the menu for the special family concert, and stated all prices will be under \$2.

Tables at the Sales Arena will be simply covered and decorated, with Jackie Spencer responsible.

The board also decided to have publicity posters printed, which will be available within two weeks. The prints of Gordon Snidow's painting, "Eyin' the Catch Hand," are completed and will be available for public sale after May 15. Linda Swalander heads the committee in charge of selling prints of the Snidow painting.

RSFI's board directed Ken Green to place regional advertising in travel sections of newspapers in west Texas, New Mexico and Arizona. He was given \$2,000 to purchase ad space. All ads will contain a clip-out coupon for requesting tickets and all ticket sales will be handled through The Office.

The board also:

- Heard a report on the visit of nine travel writers who spent several days touring Ruidoso last week. Green thanked JoAnn Butler, Jerry Bigham, Mike Waldon and Benny Coulston for helping entertain writers and La Junta Guest Ranch, Holiday Inn, and the Inn of the Mountain Gods for their hospitality.

- Discussed hosting 16 more travel writers during the concert series, at a price tag of up to \$4,000.

- Directed Green to pursue obtaining adequate sound equipment and power lines for outdoor concerts.

Lodgers questioned who was on the Lodger's Tax committee and were told the five members must be: two from the lodging industry, two representing tourism interests and one at-large candidate. On the committee are Silver Cane (A-Frame Cabins), Al Junge (Storybook

# Trustees table ordinances

The Ruidoso trustees, Tuesday evening, tabled four ordinances, adopted one and approved one resolution.

Three of the four ordinances tabled, pending clarification of classifications in final versions to be prepared by village attorney Ron Harris, were:

- 80-4, changing the definition of subdivision;

- 80-5, deleting approval of signs from jurisdiction of the Architectural Plans Review Committee; and

- 80-6, amending the Ruidoso Code to create Commercial 1-2, Planned Development and Manufacturing-1 districts for zoning purposes; including minor changes in other sections of the code, making the wording more specific. Final revisions will be made in this ordinance prior to public hearings or further action by the trustees.

Ordinances 80-4, 80-5, and 80-6 will be reviewed by the trustees, Planning and Zoning Commission and Harris, with the final hearing on 80-4 and final consideration of 80-5 and 80-6, to be advertised in the prescribed manner.

Also tabled was Ordinance 80-2, annexation of the Driver Tract, pending publication of public notices setting the final hearing date.

The trustees adopted Resolution 80-4, a cooperative agreement regarding municipal mortgage financing of housing for low and moderate income families. This resolution makes loan money available from a \$50 million bond issue, dispersed out of Roswell, under agreement by the three participating municipalities, Ruidoso, Artesia and Roswell. Loans under this agreement, trustee Frank Sawyer said, are subject to approval by savings and loan institutions or banks.

Ordinance 80-3, changing the terms of Library Board members from six to three years, was adopted.

FRED HECKMAN, upon recommendation of Mayor Lloyd Davis, was named to represent the Village of Ruidoso on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC). Heckman served as chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Planning Commission from its inception until it was disbanded to form SBAC. During Heckman's tenure with the planning commission, aspects of the proposal, from site to economic impact, were prepared in

three volumes. From the planning reports, SBAC prepared the design of the proposed airport that was rejected by the Department of Interior.

In other action, the trustees: - Accepted the bid of Border Machinery, El Paso, Texas in the amount of \$39,500 for a used Cedar Rapids laydown machine to blacktop village streets. Acceptance was based on including the expenditure in the 1980-81 fiscal year budget, with funds to be allocated from Revenue Sharing monies.

- Postponed action on bids received on a

pickup truck, with utility boom, for the Fire Department, in the amounts of \$16,500, for a new unit, from Stuart Equipment, El Paso, Texas and \$15,400, for a used unit, from Skyland Garage, Ruidoso, pending recommendations from Fire Marshal Derald Waltrip after he examines the units. The department has \$13,935.93 in state fire funds available for the truck purchase.

- Were advised by village clerk Jim Hine that no oral or written comments on use of Revenue Sharing Funds were

## Ruidoso Downs budget pegged at \$232,778

A tentative budget for fiscal 1980-81 was presented to Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday by village clerk Virginia Spall.

With only two council members and the mayor present, no official action was taken on the proposed figures, which include general fund expenditures of \$232,778, with expected revenues of \$228,661.

At the request of street commissioner Lois Beavers, the expenditures were increased by \$500, to provide for the purchase of tires for a street blader, if necessary.

That request pushed expenditures over the amount of estimated revenues, but the

difference will be absorbed by cash balances which will be added to the general fund amount at the end of the current fiscal year Spall said.

Spall advised the council that two checks will be forthcoming from the federal revenue sharing program, for a total of \$16,048, all of which has been tentatively budgeted. Continuation of the revenue sharing program has not yet been approved by the United States Congress, Spall said.

The budget also includes expected utility revenues of \$96,424, with planned expenditures of \$84,683; and expected sanitation revenues of \$42,300 with expenditures of \$42,209. The final budget

hearing will be held at a later date, with a working budget to be submitted to the state Department of Finance and Administration by June 1.

The absence of two council members also caused postponement of consideration of a proposed sign ordinance and the traffic code ordinance.

In other business, the trustees granted occupational licenses to the following: El Paso Sawdust Inc., Mitchell Motel, Sierra Blanca Discount Carpets, Ponca Wholesale Merchandise Co., G. M. Gest, Inc., Chaparral Motor Hotel, Palo Verde Trailer Court, The Tack Emporium, Jerry's Janitorial, Milton Sanchez Hauling and Holt's Trailer Park.

Cabins), Olle Cuddy, Pinky Jones (High Country Agency) and Ed Hyman (KRRR). Hyman is the at-large member and chairman.

Junge said the committee is strictly advisory and said that "because the Chamber of Commerce is the focal point for advertising in the village... they generally come to the Lodger's Tax Committee for money." He said the Chamber has no control over how funds are spent.

Junge told the group that he has a record of expenditures for the past year, which he obtained from village hall "which is public - but we just don't make it public," Junge said.

After lengthy discussion of lodger's tax monies, Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber, told the group to "stop kicking a dead horse" and that because lodgers had "haggled" over the fund many times and never accomplished anything, more discussion was futile.

Jungbluth added that changes would never be made unless a mass of people decided to "march on Santa Fe."

Lodgers within the village limit must collect and remit to the village a two percent occupancy tax, with the village holding out a portion for administrative costs.

Lodgers were told those administrative costs were \$12,000 and village ad-

ministrator Jim Hine told The News that figure was correct, if estimates are right.

"Printing of forms; supplies; postage and labor, as well as some legal fees, are all charged against that fund for administering it," Hine said the village "does not make it a practice" to agree to administer funds which are not, in themselves, self-sustaining. He said that so far this fiscal year, \$57,610.40 has been remitted in Lodger's Tax monies, and of that, \$3,000 was carryover from the previous fiscal year.

"Last year is the first year we've had extra money in lodger's tax funds to

## Makowski given special forest fire assignment

Steve Makowski, Fire Management Officer on Smokey Bear Ranger District, Lincoln National Forest, has been assigned to assist in a Land Management Planning program to take place on the forest.

"They wanted a person who really has

the abilities to do this job; a person who's completely familiar with fire," Paul Gordon, district ranger, said. "Steve (Makowski) was the logical choice."

Makowski, who was assigned to Smokey Bear district two years ago, has, according to Gordon, had more experience with regard to fire than nearly everyone in the forest.

Makowski will be assigned to a forest fire staff officer for the 60-day detail and, under his supervision, Makowski will coordinate and consolidate fire management inventories, write tentative fire prescription statements and assist the interdisciplinary team during the analysis phase of planning.

Makowski must complete the first phase of the assignment by June, according to Gordon. This work will include:


- Developing a tentative list of fire prescription statements that addresses the whole forest, and develop an inventory of information based upon the list.
- Make recommendations on what information is still needed and how to obtain it.
- Provide for coordination and consolidation of information so the end result can become a part of the Land Management Planning data bank.

The second phase of Makowski's assignment will not begin until September 15, and will be a continuation of the first stage of work.

carryover," Hine said. "In fact, in fiscal year, 1977, they had to ask for an increase because they overspent the budget."

Lodgers were told that any leftover funds, prior to last year, were automatically reverted into the general fund for multiple uses.

Hine added that \$700 per month is paid from the fund to the Chamber "for administrative use." He said this probably included costs of mailing brochures, for example.

By law, 25 percent of the tax must be used for advertising. Hine said the local ordinance sets aside 75 percent for advertising.

In addressing the repeal of Lodger's Tax, Hine said the state statute gives all authority to the local governing body. "The Council (trustees) has the authority to change, repeal, amend — whatever they want to do — because they instituted that tax with an ordinance," Hine said. "It's a state law, but the municipalities have the choice to impose it." He said any law applicable to the village must be in ordinance form.

Lodgers were also disgruntled because people outside the municipality who own motels are getting benefit from lodger's tax advertising and not helping pay for it. They also noted that Ruidoso Downs trustees recently defeated a proposal to institute a lodger's tax. One lodger asked, "Tell me why a guy would stay at Nob Hill Lodge or the Holiday Inn when he can drive just a little ways, say to the American Motel, and not have to pay the tax?"

The board of county commissioners has the right to impose such a tax on all

lodging facilities outside municipal limits, Hine said, and would have complete control over them. He said less than ten motels in the county lie outside municipalities.

Jungbluth suggested the lodgers form a committee to approach all lodgers outside the village limits and ask them to collect the tax since they benefit from it. He said that, judging from the turnout at the meeting, "There is no reason that lodgers in this town can't do whatever you damn well please... stay in touch after today."

Lodgers were also dissatisfied with the way lodger's tax money was spent. Joe Reinhart asked why nothing is promoted during the off-season. "Like the Mule-O-Rama," Reinhart said. "That could be something big but... it was taken away from (last year) because the Motorcycle Convention was the same weekend." Lodger's Tax money helped promote the weekend activities. "The town was

already full," he said.

Chamber president-elect Sheila Harris, said it may be possible for lodgers collecting the tax to retain a portion of it as a personal administrative cost. She quoted a figure of one percent of the total remittance.

Hine said he knows of no way this could be a legal procedure, adding that "there is very little cost to the lodger anyway," since the village provides the forms and since "they have to file the gross receipts tax anyway... and they don't get to keep a portion of that."

Lodgers appointed Mike Radziewicz as temporary chairman of the group and appointed four other lodgers, Bob Finley, Bud Nickels, Lowell McIntyre and Clark Carpenter, to a temporary board of directors.

Lodgers will meet again May 20 at 9:30 a.m., at a place to be announced.

## Two cited for tree removal

United States Forest Service (USFS) officers recently charged two men in separate incidents with illegal tree removal from the Lincoln National Forest.

Officers seized 60 live trees valued at approximately \$1,700 April 18 from Ernest Trujillo of Capitan in the Jicarilla Mountains. Trujillo "was removing trees with void 1978 Christmas tree tags instead of the required Forest Service tags," said G. W. Werther of the local USFS office.

Trujillo has been cited twice previously for timber violations, Werther said, and USFS is seeking a felony complaint in United States District Court. If the complaint is successful, Trujillo faces a

maximum fine of \$10,000 or 10 years imprisonment, or both.

In another case, officers seized five untagged trees at 11:20 p.m., April 25 from Dan Trujillo (no relation) of Roswell.

He was cited on a misdemeanor charge, which carries a maximum fine of \$500 or six months. The trees were valued at approximately \$100.

"To legally remove trees," Werther said, "you must purchase a commercial timber permit from the Forest Service, and trees must be immediately tagged upon removal from the ground with Forest Service tags."

Permits and tags are available from the local USFS office, he said.

received last fiscal year.

— Took no action on animal control proposals submitted by Ron Kowalski, at \$3,200 monthly, and D&S Services, at \$4,405 monthly. Kowalski and Jim Woodbridge were advised to discuss their proposals with the Humane Society of Lincoln County (HSLC), to determine if the animal control program could be operated in connection with HSLC's proposed animal shelter.

— Took no action on a proposed lease of village land to HSLC, with the land made available at the trustees' April 8 meeting, pending examination of the lease by HSLC members and the trustees.

— Received copies of new laws affecting municipalities, passed by the 1980 state legislature, and a revised model criminal code contained 14 ordinances on criminal acts, 13 on property, two on public morals, nine on minors, a section on nuisances and a comprehensive animal control ordinance. Ruidoso does not have. No action was taken, pending a study of the material by Harris.

— Set 1:30 p.m., May 1, to meet at village hall to discuss budget requests for the 1980-81 fiscal year.

— Approved Loan Resolution 80-5, accepting a \$500,000 loan from Farmers Home Administration to provide the village with a new administration building. The trustees then set a special meeting at 5 p.m., May 8, in the Ruidoso Library to act on a revenue bond ordinance that would provide funds to repay the \$500,000 loan.

This weekend Ruidosans may see members of the Fourth Air Cavalry, Ninth Squadron, Fort Hood Air Force Base, performing maneuvers in this area.

The cavalry is in this area for a logistics camp located south of the old village of Jicarilla. Helicopters will be stationed near Benado Gap and will perform flying exercises to learn how to locate vehicles on the ground, according to Paul Gordon, district ranger for Lincoln National

Forest, Smokey Bear district.

"They need training in mountainous terrain and in areas of moderate to heavy timber cover," Gordon said. He said jeeps will be used as simulated tanks and will be placed in various areas throughout the forest.

Gordon said the "search and identify" exercise prepares pilots for actual incidents, adding that this group would be called as a back-up in an actual situation.

She said her husband was interviewed along with 3,500 others for a chance to become a contestant. "He had on his best western suit and cowboy hat," she said. "That interviewer has been there 17 years... he asks you your name, where you're from and what you do for a living. When he asked A. B., he said he was a horse trader... that interviewer got everybody's attention and said, 'I've never met a horse trader before.' We had a good idea he would get called onto the stage then."

Chitwood was the fourth person called onto "Contestant's Row," and was on stage in the first half of the program. He guessed the closest price on a bathroom set and played a game where he had to select the highest priced item of three. He did, and won all three items, which included an oak rolltop desk and chair, a projection television and a bar set.

Chitwood then became a contender to try for the showcase by spinning the "wheel of fortune," but was quickly eliminated at this point, he said.

"All the helpers were really nice... they had lots of lights and cameras," Irene said. Although it was busy "and confusing," she said it was a fun time. The building "looks like a big work barn."

The Chitwoods don't watch the program regularly, and Chitwood doesn't claim to be an expert at pricing games. "I just picked right," he said.

"We just felt lucky to get to go, since the studio only holds 300 people," Irene said.

None of the Chitwood's relatives can be on the program for a year and he can never be a contestant on the show again, and, he can't be on any other game shows for at least a year, according to game show regulations.

The show will air May 23, but the Chitwoods aren't sure of the time. Locally, the program is shown on KGGM-Channel 13 and on KBIM-Channel 10 in the mornings. It airs again at 3 p.m., every afternoon.

The merchandise will be delivered to the Chitwood home within sixty days. "The tickets and the opportunity didn't cost us a penny. We don't even have to pay for shipping charges," Irene said.

### "The Last Full Measure Of Devotion"

For the last several days we have been thinking of the eight young men who fell in a distant land trying to rescue their fellow Americans from captivity.

And today, April twenty-nine, on a cloudy day I see the Stars and Stripes floating and waving in the breeze against the green mountain: and the words of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address keep running through my mind.

Our prayers to God go up for the souls of these men, now in Heaven, and for their loved ones. And we thank God for men of their kind today in our land, and in the days past during the trials, struggles, and troubles — and the triumphs, victories and rejoicing of our beloved country.

We remember that our county is named after Abraham Lincoln; and we realize that our way of life, so dearly bought by our forefathers, needs constantly to be given new life by our constant devotion.

Therefore, in honor of these eight American men, and in remembrance of "Honest Abe" — and also to re-awaken in us the sacred traditions of our land, let us go over the words of one of our great American treasures: Lincoln's Gettysburg Address:

### Lincoln's Gettysburg Address

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate — we cannot consecrate — we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they

did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion — that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that the government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

### Our Father's Birthday

Before we have another visit through the magic of the printed page, we will be over into May, the month of flowers, the season of the full tide of glorious Spring. The birthday of our father, Lynn Whippo Storm, is May the third.

Lynn graduated from the Colorado School of Mines in the Class of 1902 with high honors, as president of his class and also class poet. His career as mining engineer and petroleum geologist took him to Alaska, Mexico, Canada, and Europe.

From his father, Francis David Storm, a pioneer photographer in Denver, Colorado, our father learned photography. He took hundreds of pictures around the region of Valdez, and Kodiak Island, and also wrote sketches of that land.

Among his writings is a collection of folk tales of the Dine Indians of Alaska.

All the family were with our father in Alaska and Mexico, and there are many happy memories of these places.


Our father remained active as a geologist ten years past the retirement age, and retired at age seventy five. He wrote several papers for the Colorado School of Mines which were used in the classes. And his school presented him the medal of honor for outstanding work in his field.

## It's football time again — Spring practice underway

Ah, spring, that marvelous season of changing weather, blooming flowers and tossed footballs.

Every team has spring workouts, and the Ruidoso Warriors are no exception. Head coach Darrel Stierwalt's squad has been working out in the mornings the past two weeks.

That's right — in the morning, around 7:30. "It's 6:30 as far as I'm concerned," offensive coordinator Barry Nelson said after Wednesday's practice. "This time change is crazy."

But, members of the Warrior football team show up every morning for practice, and though the faces are familiar, the offense is only vaguely recognizable.

It's still the Wishbone-T the Warriors were running at the end of the 1979 season, but it has changed — substantially. The Warrior coaches have been to clinics and watched films, tried this and tried that, looking for the winning combination that spells victory.

They think they've found it. "Spring ball is going as well as it's ever gone," Stierwalt said. "Last year we spent all our time teaching fundamentals, because we had such a young team — freshmen, sophomores.

"This year they already know the offense pretty well, and we can start learning plays, concentrating on that. We're not on square one now."

The state sets the rules for practicing —

no more than five hours a week, and no pads, no contact. That's something of a hindrance, but anything's better than nothing, Stierwalt said.

"When the summer rolls around, we won't go crazy trying to teach the offense then," he said. "We'll just review everything and can worry about getting into shape."

The team currently works on offense two days a week, defense two days a week and the kicking game one day.

"The only real problem we've had," Stierwalt said, "has been the weather."

"Yeah," Nelson said. "The weather is unpredictable this time of year. You never know just exactly what it's going to do. But rain or shine, we've got to get out there and get with it."

The Warriors, Nelson said, have picked up the Wishbone very fast and very well.

"We're doing exceptionally well already," he said. "We're doing a good job, the backs are hitting the holes, and we've got two quarterbacks (Scott Neal and Billy Woodul) who can run the offense."

"It looks like a complex offense, but it's not if you have the quarterback to run it." And the Warriors do.

The backfield is progressing nicely, Nelson said. Although starting halfback Joe Almager will graduate in May the Warriors have exceptional depth. With Neal and Woodul at quarterback, defenses will have something to worry about.

Neal is the more experienced of the two and seems a bit quicker off the ball. Woodul is bigger and has the stronger arm. Both are very good, and each is an offensive threat.

At fullback, workhorse Russ Pior is displaying the form which placed him in all-district selections last fall, and backup Lon Nunley is running well.

At halfback, the Warriors are strong

with returnees Ricky Dennis, Steve Pietsch and Steve Benway, all three quick and strong.

The line will be hardest hit by graduation, losing all district picks Jay Raulerson and Rusty Hamilton, and tough lineman Godfrey Enjady. And the line is the key to the Wishbone's success, Nelson said.

"Like any offense," he said, "the success depends on how well the line blocks. The line is the key — and how well they develop to where they can move the defense back to where the quarterback can make a read of the defense."

Stierwalt cited linemen Curt Temple, Mike Dale and Bill Huey as doing excellent jobs. But it's hard to tell just how well the offense is doing at this point, Nelson said.

"We're working on execution and learning what to do," Nelson said. "But we won't be able to tell just how good we are until we get into pads. We drill 'em and drill 'em and drill 'em, but if we can't move anybody, then execution won't do us any good."

The passing attack has undergone some revamping, with a new emphasis on short, quick patterns off the Wishbone option. Currently, Peter Batton and H. R. Lueras are doing good jobs, Stierwalt said.

"Batton is doing better than anybody else, but old H. R., it don't matter where the ball is, he'll catch it," he said.

Possibly the biggest problem the Warriors have is school size. Since Ruidoso High School is one of the smallest AAA schools in the state, many of the football athletes also participate in track, which practices in the afternoon. That's why football practice is in the morning.

"And it's pretty hard to get motivated at that hour of the morning," Nelson said. "But we're looking good."

On Monday: a look at the defense.

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

# Church of the Nazarene established here 64 years

For 64 years, the Church of the Nazarene has been established in this area, according to a charter member of that church, Chloe Peters.

The church was founded in 1916 with 14 charter members who met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Smith. Elections were held at the first meeting for church positions, including delegates who would represent the local congregation at the District Assembly. Many church activities got underway after the first meeting.

Among them were Sunday School classes, prayer meetings and revivals. Peters said a couple from Tularosa attended the early camp meetings and cooked for revivals, never accepting money for their work.

The first Nazarene church built in this area was erected between Nogal and Capitan, built entirely by the church membership. The land for this building was donated by Peters' father, A. B. Zumwalt, the church was named "Providence."

Until 1921, the Providence Church hosted many services. Peters said it was not unusual for the church "to be overflowing with people" attending a revival or just a regular prayer meeting.

When attendance dropped off, in 1921, the members moved services to the Baptist Church in Capitan, where they joined

services there for two years. Sunday School attendance jumped to 50, and another move was made, to the "hall on the corner where Mr. Lane's store is now." This arrangement lasted only a few months, and another move, into the Payne building, was made.

In 1924, following a tent meeting, the local Nazarenes decided to build their own church, with the first load of lumber hauled by E. C. Pflingsten.

As years passed, church school enrollment rose to 88 and by 1933, it was 98 with eight classes. From this period on, for several years, the church's history lies in its members, Peters said.

"We have had a lot of young people leave this church and truly become an asset to the country," she said. "We have young people all over the United States who came from our little church. They have made some fine contributions."

Peters said the 41 pastors who have served the church since its beginnings have also "been a blessing." Peters said her family is represented in the church family by the sixth generation. Her husband, Gilbert, has fifth generation family in the church.

The Nazarenes built the district campgrounds at Angus in 1939, which now includes more than 100 cabins equipped to house about 650 people. A district tabernacle which seats 1,000 fills every August when the district meeting is held in Angus. The district-owned convention center, also at

Angus, is equipped to host 400 people. It features meeting rooms and a cafeteria.

The camp is managed by Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Freeman, caretakers, and is booked up year-round with many church groups of all faiths when not in use by the Nazarenes.

In August, 1966, the chapel presently used by the Nazarenes was dedicated. Built in Angus, it was named the Gunstream Memorial Chapel, for R. C. Gunstream, a district superintendent for the Nazarenes for many years.

The Nazarenes continued to worship in Capitan until 1976, when services were moved to the Gunstream Memorial Chapel. Now, average attendance hovers around 15, but "it goes up and down with the seasons," Peters said.

Presently, The Reverend Carroll Sanders is serving as local minister. He said he plans to retire by the end of May, but will continue to live in Angus.

A member of the Ruidoso Ministerial Alliance, Sanders has been a minister since 1935, working in Texas, Arizona, Arkansas and New Mexico. He moved to New Mexico with his wife and family in 1944 and has ministered all over the state during his career.

The church board consists of Forrest Freeman, Sunday School superintendent, Peters, director; and LaMoyné Peters, treasurer.

Services are held every Sunday in Angus at 11 a.m., and 6 p.m. Church School begins at 9:45 a.m., with mid-week services at 7 p.m.

## Easily Smashed wins futurity

Easily Smashed, a 7-2 shot ridden by Jackie Martin, blasted his way to a nose victory in Sunday's finale of the \$250,388 Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park.

The colt, a son of Easy Jet out of the thoroughbred Smash II, got the nod in an extremely tight finish. The top four finishers in the rich 350 yard battle were separated by noses.

The stewards took a close look at the photo finish picture before issuing their verdict.

Easily Smashed earned \$87,635 in the second win of his career. The mutual returns were \$9.20, \$5.40, \$3.40. The colt is owned by the partnership of Sue May, William Leach and Carol Childs of Ft. Stockton, Texas. Leach is also the trainer.

The \$250,388 gross purse connected to the Sun Country made the race the richest quarter horse event in Sunland history. The amount disbursed in the finale alone was \$206,359.

Rebel Fever, a 34-1 outsider, nearly upset the apple cart with a tremendous run on the far outside. Rebel Fever, ridden by Bruce Plikenton, snared the lead about a half dozen strides from the wire. But the colt was unable to fight off Easily Smashed's desperate lunge on the final jump. The latter barely got his nose in front as he swept under the wire.

Rebel Fever earned \$40,062 and returned tote prices of \$23.60 and \$7.20. The colt is owned by Walter Hall and Keith Liston of Corona, California.

My Kids Trouble, who'd set the top qualifying time at 17.97 seconds a week earlier, broke alertly and was never far off the lead. But he gathered himself up courageously at the midway point and closed for all he was worth. In fact, when he hit the wire he was moving the fastest of all. But he ran out of ground, and had to settle for third, only two noses away from victory.

My Kids Trouble is owned by William Gahlberg, a land developer and television executive, and Joe Marconi, an 11 year veteran of the National Football League. (He was a running back for the Los Angeles Rams and Chicago Bears.)

My Kids Trouble paid \$4.60 to show. He collected \$20,531.

Here's the remaining order of finish, with purse-money earned: 4—Jettabelle Boone, \$10,766; 5th—Easy Joni Jet, \$9,765; 6th—Moses Lad, \$9,514; 7th—Hempen Special, \$9,274; 8th—Flaming Supreme, \$9,013; 9th—Sooner Velocity, \$8,763; 10th—Tiny Smooch, \$8,513.

A headwind was blowing during the race.

After crossing the finish line, Flaming Supreme tumbled to the turf. The roan colt later got back on his feet, but not until after striking his fallen jockey, Richard Vaughn, with flailing hooves. Vaughn was taken to Providence Memorial Hospital in El Paso, Texas where he was listed in stable condition, and was undergoing X-ray examination.

Easily Smashed, except for being involved in some slight bumping at the start, pretty well had things go his way. He stayed close to the lead in the early going. Rebel Fever established an early stranglehold, but a number of other contenders were in the thick of things. Easy Joni Jet, a 6-1 shot running on the rail, also had a lot of early luck.

Rebel Fever carried his lead until just a few precious yards from the wire, then began to tire. Jettabelle Boone also appeared to weaken a bit at the end, fading to fourth.


The wagering was pretty well spread out. No horse was anything approaching a mutual standout. Jettabelle Boone wound up as the choice at just under 7-2.

Tiny Smooch, the second choice at exactly 7-2, broke in 10th place and was never able to improve his status.

Fans who hooked up Easily Smashed and Rebel Fever in the quinella got back \$97.20.

With the Sun Country Futurity, Sunland

Park wrapped up another big weekend. In fact, it was the biggest weekend in the track's history. The total handle for the three days amounted to \$1,055,636. The second best weekend in Sunland history occurred March 29-30, 1980, when the total hit \$1,013,023.

# Traffic Safety Bureau lists dangerous roads

The State Transportation Department, Motor Vehicle Division Traffic Safety Bureau, released statistics on those sections of New Mexico roads with the worst accident records during the period October 1, 1978-September 30, 1979.

According to John Fenner, Bureau Chief, the worst record was compiled by State Road 76 (Española North to Truchas) in Santa Fe County from milepost one through milepost 10, experiencing a total of 144 accidents in the one year period. Sixty of the accidents, or about 42 percent, occurred on a two mile stretch of this road. One of the accidents

resulted in a fatality and 52 were injury accidents. Sixteen of the accidents were attributed to alcohol and speeding. Twenty of the drivers involved in the accidents on Highway 76 had been involved in two accidents over a two year period. Nine of the drivers had been involved in three accidents over a two year period. The economic loss from the accidents is estimated at \$776,000.

The worst record for Interstate and United States Highways in the state was compiled by I-25 in Sandoval County between milepost 229 and milepost 246 (in the vicinity of San Felipe Pueblo) in the southbound lane. A total of 37 accidents occurred on this stretch of road with two fatality accidents and 17 injury accidents.

Alcohol was listed as a contributing factor in eight of the accidents and speeding was listed as a contributing factor in seven of the accidents. The economic loss from these accidents is estimated at \$491,000.

The overall accident picture showed a reduction from the 1978 total of 55,716 accidents to a 1979 total of 52,912 or a decrease of about 5 percent. The combined fatal and injury accidents total in 1978 of 16,201 was down to 16,055 in 1979 or a reduction of about 1 percent. Alcohol and speeding continue to be the most significant contributing factors in accidents on rural roadways while failure to yield, driver inattention and following too close are the most significant contributing factors in accidents on urban roadways.

## Building bird houses isn't too difficult

Looking for something to do this spring? Why not build a house? Or two? Or maybe even a dozen?

Impossible, you say? Not if you're talking about birdhouses. Building a birdhouse is a good spring activity. It requires a little investment, can be done with scraps, and doesn't require much skill. "When all else fails — improvise," said Phil Zwank, Extension wildlife specialist at New Mexico State University.

Build the house with sturdy, durable wood, such as rough cedar or exterior plywood. Rough wood should be used so young birds can climb out. Make the roof of the house waterproof.

Screw or hinge the roof on so you can easily remove it to clean the house. Use brass screws since they won't rust.

Drill one-quarter inch holes at the top of front, back and sides for ventilation. Do not make the holes lower than the entrance-exit hole or the young birds may suffer from drafts. Put three or four holes in the floor for drainage.

If you use plywood, paint or stain the house dark brown or green to make it look more natural. Natural bark houses won't need paint, of course!

If you put the house on a pole, use a metal guard to keep cats and squirrels from feasting on the young birds.


If you put out more than one birdhouse, do not place them too close together. Nesting birds tend to be intolerant of others of their own species.

## Youths should take time to choose career

Despite the emphasis on the worth of a college education, experts now feel that three out of four jobs will still be open to people who have not completed four years of college, said Leo Yates, Extension family life specialist at New Mexico State University. More and more training is being required of young people, but it is not necessarily the traditional four year college degree program.

When young people are not college bound but are beginning their career search, parents should allow them to make their own choices, while supplying guidance and support. Youths should be given time to make their career choices. Yet they should still be encouraged to consider their attitude toward work and life, their values and their emotional and social maturity.

Remember that a person's career choice doesn't have to last a lifetime. Many people change careers several times during their working life. Parents should encourage young people to look at all alternatives. Then let them decide for themselves what their career choice will be. "Children who don't have the required intellectual ability or the motivation to become a professional shouldn't be urged to do so," Yates said.

## Give Him That Old Soft Shoe



Once a song-and-dance man, always a song-and-dance man. That's what 76-year-old Jack Corlies says of himself after coming out of retirement and playing a number of engagements in Washington, D.C.

Born in Gloversville, New York, a small town just north of Albany, Corlies is the son of a song-and-dance man.

"My father was in vaudeville," Corlies told a writer from The National Council on the Aging. "He toured with his own quartet."

While his father was on the road, Corlies lived with his grandmother. He started playing the piano when he was 7 and took lessons until he was 14.

"My grandmother got me started," Corlies said. "She sold her organ and got a piano in its place so I could take lessons."

By the time he was 14, Corlies had already formed a small band to play at school functions. In high

"When we were playing New York City, someone from a large talent agency saw us and booked us on a European tour," Corlies said. "We ended up playing England, Belgium, Holland, and France."

When Corlies and his wife split up in 1940, he continued as an entertainer working alone. For the next 20 years he played clubs all over the country. In 1961 he went to England with his second wife, a British woman, for what was to have been a three month stay.

"We ended up staying five years," Corlies said. "I worked as an entertainer but I also opened my own talent agency and booked acts on the Continent."

In 1966 he got homesick and returned to this country where he went back on the road again. Then, in 1974, when his wife died, Corlies decided to retire and live with his brother in Syracuse, N.Y.

"At first I sat on the front porch in a rocking chair," he said. "But then I got antsy and went to New York to see some shows.

When I saw 'Chorus Line' I cried. I just had to get back in harness."

Several months ago, Corlies satisfied his urge by filling an engagement in a Washington, D.C. lounge. Currently "between engagements," a show biz term for unemployment, Corlies is considering several job opportunities.

"I tried retirement and it's not for me," Corlies said. "I guess I'm just a ham at heart. If I'm not entertaining people, I'm not happy."

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# I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

Last November our department was engaged in a unique rescue operation to save a historic herd of desert bighorn sheep living in the San Andres Mountains near Las Cruces.

Infested severely with scabies mites, the existence of the last large herd of desert bighorns in New Mexico was being threatened. In just a one year period, the scabies outbreak had reduced the San Andres herd from over 200 animals to only about 60 sheep.

A massive capture and airlift operation brought 49 sheep off the mountain. Fifteen of these animals died. Thirty of the survivors were treated in a dipping vat containing an insecticide to kill scabies mites, and these sheep are now at the Department's Red Rock Experimental Wildlife Station.

The other four captured sheep were not dipped for scabies, but were instead taken to New Mexico State University to be treated with a new experimental drug. Joanna Lackey, the Northeast Area Public Affairs Officer, has written an excellent article concerning these four sheep, and the sheep that remained within the San Andres Mountains. Here is her article:

In spite of efforts to capture as many sheep as possible during the San Andres airlift, 20 or more sheep were not caught. Hence, they were not treated and remained heavily infested with mites. Research was thus initiated to find a way to treat sheep in the wild for scabies.

The first tests of a new drug offer hope this has been accomplished. The Department and numerous supporting agencies and corporations treated 19 desert sheep in the San Andres Mountains early in March with a newly developed drug called Avermectin.

Four sheep from the capture operation were not dipped and were taken to New Mexico State University (NMSU) for treatment with the new experimental drug, which was developed by Merck Pharmaceuticals of West Point, Pennsylvania. When Avermectin is injected into the animal it dissolves in the blood stream. Mites, feeding on the blood plasma and lymphatic fluids under the skin, also take in the drug and die.

The four captive sheep treated during the NMSU experiments were free of mites six days after treatment. After two

months, they were still free of mites. Investigators do not know how long the drug remains active in the animal's system, but evidently, it lasts long enough to kill mites hatched from eggs laid prior to treatment. This effect is vital to the success of the treatment for wild animals.

A new delivery system was used to solve the problem of administering the drug to the sheep remaining in the mountains. A rifle with a two-piece bullet developed by the 3-M Corporation of Minnesota was used with the drug to accomplish the job. One part of the bullet contained a paint capsule that marked the animal as it was treated. The other half was a cellulose bullet that penetrated the skin and dissolved to release the drug. The rifle was fired from a helicopter.

Both 3-M and Merck donated their equipment, materials, and services to the experiments in both the laboratory and field. They also sent representatives to aid in the treatment operation.

It's hoped the treated animals will be free of mites and again feed normally, gain weight and generally return to normal health. Administering the drug from a rifle and helicopter is a good start, but is only a means of controlling the mite infestation. Total eradication of the mites will hinge on finding and successfully treating every sheep in the San Andres.

Use of the drug has major advantages over capturing and dipping the wild sheep. Dipping requires large crews of people, capture of the animals with accompanying stress, considerable time and expense.

In addition to the cooperation of several agencies, the donation of equipment, materials and services of several companies, and the assistance of several universities, numerous conservation organizations and individuals, contributed to the success of the desert bighorn rescue operation. These organizations and individuals contributed over \$21,500 to the emergency project which had not been anticipated by or budgeted for by the Game Department. The total cost of the operation exceeded \$81,500.

A lot of combined effort went in to the desert bighorn rescue attempt. Hopefully, that effort and the use of a new drug have put us firmly on the road to recovery of a unique part of New Mexico's wildlife heritage.

# Real estate licensing procedures will change

The New Mexico Real Estate Commission has announced that effective July 1, 1980 there will be substantial changes in the application procedure for real estate licenses.

Real Estate licensing examinations in New Mexico will be conducted under new arrangements between the New Mexico Real Estate Commission and Educational Testing Service (ETS) of Princeton, New Jersey.

The July 28, 1980 real estate examinations, to be given in four cities, mark the beginning of improved testing arrangements for the estimated 2,500 New Mexico real estate salespersons and brokers who are licensed via the state sponsored tests every year.

As a convenience to candidates, the exams will be given at schools and colleges monthly in Albuquerque, bi-monthly in Las Cruces and Roswell and quarterly in Farmington during the upcoming year.

Under the new contract with ETS, which also conducts real estate licensing tests in 33 other states, the exams will be given on Saturday, instead of on weekdays as in the past.

Robert P. ("Pat") Harrelson, executive secretary of the New Mexico Real Estate Commission, which supervises the licensing of real estate salespersons and brokers in the state, said the Commission decided on the new arrangements after careful consideration.

"We agreed it would be in the best interest of both the public and the Commission to contract out the multiple operations of the state's real estate licensing program," he said.

These include the development of exam questions, grading, score reporting to the state and to individual candidates,

establishing and operating test centers and providing exam information to candidates.

The EST program is expected to provide better service in all these areas without straining State staff resources.

Registration will begin on June 1, 1980 for the July 28, 1980 exams. Candidates wanting to take the test may obtain a "Bulletin of Information" from either the Commission office or ETS (Real Estate Licensing Examination, Princeton, New Jersey 08541). The bulletin provides instructions for registering, information about test administration and score reporting procedures, discussion of test content and sample questions.

The exams will also be given August 23, September 27, October 25, November 22 and December 20.

ETS has been operating the Real Estate Licensing Examination program since 1970. More than 750,000 real estate practitioners across the nation have taken the test, which is regularly revised and updated to keep it current with changing and individual practices and laws in the real estate field.

The exams are in two parts — a uniform test applying to real estate practices and principles throughout the nation, and a state test tailored to the laws and regulations unique to each state. There are separate tests for salespersons and brokers.

The tests are composed of objective multiple-choice questions and are developed in a cooperative effort between ETS test specialists and real estate experts from the states using the exams.
