## DECA nearing fund goal for national meet

Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) students in Ruidoso have nearly reached their goal of \$4,500 needed to attend the National Career Development Conference in Miami, Florida in June.

Students sponsored three fund drives in the past weeks and raised \$3,124. The most money, \$1,708, was made from the seafood sale, according to DECA sponsor Eddie Parker.

"We learned how important the pre-sale of the seafood is," he said. Students pre-sold 3,878 pounds of seafood and received 40 cents per pound on those orders. They sold an additional 1,393 pounds the two days the truck was parked in Ruidoso, and received 20 cents per pound.

"We will do our best to get in as many pre-sale orders as possible the next time we try this," Parker said. Still, he added that DECA earned \$500 more than ex-

pected. "We met and surpassed our goal of 3,000 pounds," he said.

"Now, we would like to know what the people who purchased the seafood thought of it. We would be willing to sponsor another seafood sale if people are interested," he said.

Parker said several marketing ideas could be implemented such as pairing up buyers who may not want a whole package of both shrimp and salmon, for example. "We could get them together somehow, and have them split the packages," Parker said.

He also plans to inquire about a variety package which could include several kinds of seafood.

"I feel all the publicity we got is one reason our seafood sale was so successful. Cablevision, The Ruidoso News, KRRR

## C-C starts member drive

A drive to increase the membership of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce was launched Friday with the drafting of teams to solicit the most members possible.

Team leaders met at the Chamber Friday to "shake hands and come out fighting," with Chamber president Sheila Harris officiating. Current Chamber members were in a pool of "draft picks" and thirty members for each team were nominated to participate in the drive.

Ralph Bellon and Larry Langford will head up the two teams, the "Good Guys" and "Bad Guys," and each team will compete June 11 to determine which will sign up the most new members for the Chamber.

Bellon said he was "a little unhappy" with Langford, who he claims "is always picking my good guys." Bellon was the underdog in the draft picks, since he chose last each time, Harris said.

Both Bellon and Langford suggested a follow-up meeting, where they will negotiate trades, adds and drops. In any case, Bellon said, "I expect you to be decent and nice about it."

Langford said, "The one thing you can expect from me is nothing. There has been comment that good will triumph, but I've been good and look where it got me."

He said his draft choices are those whom he feels can be the best at obtaining members "as unobtrusively as possible."

Rules for the membership drive/contact have not yet been formalized, and neither team leader would release names of their draft choices until negotiations have ended.

## Smokey Bear started on his long road to fame 30 years ago Friday

Try to imagine yourself seated in front of a television set. The show ends, and a commercial flashes onto the screen. There's an animated version of a familiar looking figure — a large brown bear wearing only a forest ranger's hat and a faintly melancholy expression as he speaks of the dangers of wildfire.

As the camera pulls back to take in a view of a smoldering (former) forest, an authoritative voice booms in with the final message: "Take it from Hotfoot Teddy — Only you can prevent forest fires ..."

Well, it could have happened that way. However, the famous bear's other nickname proved to be more popular with the firefighters who rescued the cub from a fiery fate thirty years ago this Friday.

According to Forest Service personnel, the fire from which Smokey emerged to become a national hero, is believed to have been started by a careless smoker. The blaze destroyed 17,000 acres of forested land on the north side of the Capitan Mountains.

The spring of 1950 had been a particularly dry one, with less than a quarter inch of moisture received between January and May, according to Tom Guck

of the Forest Service.

"The fire cost about \$25,000 to control," Guck said, adding that with advanced firefighting technology, at today's inflated costs, the suppression costs for a fire of that magnitude today would top the \$1 million mark.

According to reports published in The Ruidoso News, May 12, 1950, another fire at a Capitan Gap sawmill was extinguished shortly before the second larger fire began.

The flames had been raging out of control for nine days when the Ruidoso News reported that a drop in winds and a heavy cloud cover had spawned hopes that

the fire might be contained.

The account continued: "Smoke so thick it was almost impossible to distinguish the flames around the fire scene. Only the lengthening scar of the seared mountain told of the fire's progress."

"Extent of the burn probably will not be decided until the smoke has cleared, but an unofficial Forest Service guess said an area nine miles long and two miles wide had been ruined. That would mean some 11,500 acres of 'mixed' timberland has been lost. The fire was about five miles

# Smokey Bear started on his long road to fame 30 years ago Friday

from Pine Lodge on Wednesday (May 10). "A dramatic incident in the fight was reported Wednesday. It was said 25 men, trapped by a rock slide, were cornered for several hours when the flames broke into a 'crown fire' and surrounded them. They survived by burying their faces and keeping moving as the flames veered from place to place, it was reported. None of the men was injured."

Finally declared to be "controlled," eighteen days after its start, the fire continued to smolder until the summer rains began, Guck said.

"Every available man in Lincoln County was on the fire," Guck said, including the Mounted Patrol, Mescalero Apache Red Hata, State Police, State Game Wardens and servicemen from Holloman and Walker Air Force Bases and Fort Bliss.

The rescue of the scorched bear cub was also accorded front page status in the Ruidoso News — on June 2, 1950, when he was reported to be "recovering under the watchful eye of Dr. E. J. Smith, a Santa Fe veterinarian, and the care of his new foster parent, Ray Bell (of Captain), chief of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish field force."

"Smokey" or "Hotfoot Teddy," as he is sometimes called, had all four feet badly burned in the fire which, because of a carelessly thrown cigarette, destroyed approximately 15 million board feet of timber and untold wildlife.

"The cub, three or four months old and weighing about five pounds, has been making a steady recovery on a diet of pabulum and honey mixed with milk. One of Smokey's feet was burned more than the other three and it will be sometime before the cub will be able to walk in comfort."

The area north of the Capitans still bears the scars of the holocaust, Guck said. "The pines and firs are gone and a thick covering of oak brush has taken their place."

He added the mountain range is unique in that 90 percent of it "is rockslide, and probably the worst ground conditions exist for the forest to reseed itself." Foresters estimate it will take several hundred years to return the slopes to their original timbered condition, he said.

As Smokey enjoyed his convalescence at the New Mexico Game and Fish Department office, he received letters and telegrams from across the country, wishing him a speedy recovery. The Department of Agriculture officials, recognizing the appeal of the baby bear, went on to make Smokey their symbol of forest fire prevention.

Smokey's message was clear, even to The Ruidoso News writer of 1950: "The tiny injured bear, playing in a cardboard box in the Department of Game and Fish office in Santa Fe speaks more eloquently than any poster the need to 'PREVENT FOREST FIRES'."

## 1980 meeting starts Saturday

Well over \$7 million is expected to be dished out in purses during the 1980 Ruidoso Downs racing season which gets underway Saturday, May 10.

That \$7 million plateau would establish a new Ruidoso record and would continue the escalating business trend at the mountain course.

According to general manager Finlay MacGillivray, Ruidoso Downs has established new purse distribution records, and new wagering figures, during each of the last eight seasons.

In 1979, the season wrapped up with back-to-back million dollar handouts, and the daily average soared up to \$474,045. The total purse distribution reached \$6,638,714.

An even bigger purse handout is in the offering for the 68 day 1980 season since the All-American Derby, which topped out at \$1,027,200 last year, is expected to zoom up to around \$1.5 million this season. Ruidoso's other super rich event, the All-American Futurity, will split up a total prize of \$1,280,000.

The new season continues each weekend, basically on a Thursday through Sunday pattern, culminating on Labor Day with the nationally televised All-American Futurity.

The Ruidoso barn area is already bustling with activity as horses continue to ship in for the new season. Racing secretary Richard Lidberg has okayed some 2,300 head. Each of Ruidoso's 1,600 stalls is expected to be filled by opening day. Another 400 head or so will be stabled off the grounds. Many trainers will be utilizing their stalls to shuffle horses in and out during the meeting.

The list of trainers who'll be competing at Ruidoso this summer again represents

some of the biggest names in Southwest racing. Heading the list is Hugh Tucker, who campaigned a power packed stable at Ruidoso last summer, won numerous stakes, launched That's Rainey to a third place finish in the All-American Futurity, and won the seasonal crown with 42 victories.

Tucker was okayed for 30 head, and will be back with That's Rainey, plus such other luminaries as Oh Shiney, Seco Mighty Talk and Easy Joni Jet. The latter was a finalist in the recent West Texas and Sun Country futurities at Sunland Park.

Bob Arnett, a longtime kingpin in Southwest racing, plans to ship in with a 35 head group which includes Ghost Light, Sir James, Boca Chica and Scatta Buck.

Gene Tefertiller, usually well stocked with both quarter horses and thoroughbreds (he won the All-American Futurity with Hot Idea in 1977), returns to the mountain course with a 35 head group. His lineup includes Lovely Aire, a thoroughbred who ran in \$25,000 claiming competition at Turf Paradise.

Cecil Crabtree, another front line trainer, will be back to campaign a contingent which includes two standout thoroughbreds — Happy Irishman and One Bold Scout.

Jake Cascio, a longtime standout in the Ruidoso racing wars, got approved for an 18 head group which includes My Kids Trouble, the colt who set the top qualifying time for the Sun Country Futurity, then came in third — about a head short of victory. Cascio also has the likes of Court Time, Star Smash, Touch Shot, Truce Lace and Fast Smash.

Brooks Claridge, the leading trainer at Turf Paradise, will campaign a 26 head group. Johnny Goodman, who took second to Tucker last season with 35 wins, returns with a 35 head lineup.

Other leading trainers who'll be on hand include Jerry Trammel, Frank Thompson, Cliff Lambert, Jody Roberts, Raymond Commer, Bob Hirt, Billy Hitt, R. D. Hayes, Jack Brooks, Bill Buttigan, Monty Brooks, Don Farris, Roger Egan, Bubba Werner, Jolly Driskill and Harold Nolen.

The opening day agenda Saturday will consist of 400 yard elimination trials for the \$225,000 (est.) Kansas Derby, the first leg of the Quarter Horse Triple Crown for three-year-olds.

Two stakes events will be packed into the first Sunday of the meeting. The \$6,500 Inaugural Allowance, luring four-year-olds and up, will be contested at six furlongs. Mr. Clyde, who won that event

last year as a 7-2 shot, is considered a prime candidate. Others who seem likely to answer the call include Double B Express, last year's Thoroughbred-of-the-Meet at Ruidoso, and Royal Minds, the sprint sensation of the Sunland meeting.

Also booked for Sunday is the Top Deck Stakes. Added money of \$5,000 is offered. The distance is 356 yards. Three-year-olds and up are eligible.

The well packed Ruidoso schedule includes numerous other stakes of considerable size and stature. In addition, there are two horse sales — the All-American Select Yearling Sale, August 25, 26, 27, the world's largest and most prestigious sale of quarter horses; and the Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale, August 1-2 for both quarter horses and thoroughbreds.

Post time each race day is 1 p.m.

radio and Gibson's all did a tremendous job.

"The people from Trans Alaska (seafood suppliers) said this was the best place they've ever seen to set up their operation," Parker said.

The other two projects DECA sponsored were a radiothon April 19, which netted \$475, and a garage sale April 26, which brought in \$940.

"Everything has gone pretty well so far.

We are now considering one more fund raiser, but it may not be necessary. We are keeping in mind that if our Pepsi project ranks in the top ten nationwide, we will get about \$400 from the Pepsi Cola Company (cost of one student attending the conference)," Parker said.

He said the school district will defray some fuel and incidental costs, and some money from the DECA store, operated at the high school, will complete the remainder of the budget.

## The Plant Corner by Sally Black



This column is devoted to growing healthy indoor plants. Address questions to: Sally Black, The Ruidoso News, Box 128, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

I want to use fewer botanical names and less scientific terminology to make this column more interesting to more people. I would appreciate your questions and comments.

I was in the home of a friend this week. She was very concerned about her rubber tree plant, *Ficus elastica*, "Decora." The new leaves were large and a healthy, dark green color perched atop long stems with NO lower leaves.

Excessive watering is the main reason for failure, so allow the root system to dry out a little between waterings. Rubber tree plants need a warm temperature to thrive, never below 60° and good light, while remaining protected from direct sunlight.

While the roots are confined to a pot it will take 10 to 15 years to produce a reasonable rubber tree plant. But given better conditions, a good planter with more room for root growth, development would be more rapid. Keep the leaves dust free with a soft cloth, no leaf polish please. Springtails and Spider Mites are the pests to watch out for.

With proper lighting and watering from which foliage plants get their food, frequent fertilizing is unnecessary. And fertilizer, it should be remembered, is not a substitute for either moisture or light. A fertilizer marked 6-10-5 or 10-20-10 on the package is ideal. My suggested strength is: use only half the minimum strength suggested by the manufacturer.

My suggestion for the rubber tree plant causing the concern is to add more light from underneath with a grow-lite. The skylight is the only source of light and taller plants shade smaller ones. If you follow above instructions, in time you will have a lovely plant, if no "Oops, there goes another rubber tree plant."

# Warrior tracksters finish fourth

Both Ruidoso Warrior track squads captured fourth places in Friday's track meet in Truth or Consequences, and almost qualified several competitors for state.

"Almost" because the track meet, which was originally supposed to be a state qualifying meet, turned out to be just another track meet. T or C coach Travis Lee neglected to send in the necessary paperwork for the state qualifications, and thus, competitors have to wait until this Saturday's district meet in Deming to qualify.

"I coulda killed ol' Travis," boys' coach Darrel Stierwalt said. "We picked this meet because it was a qualifying meet, but then it wasn't, so we tried to get into the New Mexico Military Institute meet Saturday (which was a qualifying meet), but it was too late for that."

"I was pretty sore about it."

The Warriors finished fourth out of five teams and were only eight points away from finishing third. The lady Warriors came even closer, finishing only four points out of third place.

"We could've finished third pretty easy," Stierwalt said.

Girls' coach Sergio Castanon seemed fairly relieved his squad finished fourth, after last week's dismal finish at Tucuaosa,

where only one lady Warrior placed.

"We're back into our old form," he said.

"We did pretty good."

He had only one first place winner, discus thrower Tammy McCulley, who set a stadium record with a 97 foot, 10 inch throw.

The ladies captured three second places, on Ruta Bob's 5:42 mile, on Sheri Dennis' 28.3, 200 meter dash finish, and on the mile relay's time of 4:40. Relay team members are Gleda Bob, Teresa Jameson, Lisa Shaw and Jenny Delhotal.

Ruta Bob finished third in the 500 meter sprint with a 2:49. Dennis was third in the long jump with a 15 foot, 10 inch effort, and the 800 meter relay squad was third with a time of 2:05. Members are Shaw, Lynanda Williamson, Gleda Bob and Dennis.

Fourth places were won by the same squad in the 400 meter relay team, with a 59 second finish, and Gleda Bob won a fifth place ribbon in the 400 meter dash.

Total team points was 36, only four points away from third place. Silver City won the meet, with 140 points.

"Now we have to buckle up if we want to go to state," Castanon said. "We have to continue to work hard and really practice. We only have one week to get after it."

"We know our competition. If we want to go farther, we really have to get after it

and use our hearts and heads to qualify for state."

The boys' meet had some pleasant surprises and some disappointing ones.

Discus hurler Robert Green was throwing the disc well over 130 feet before the meet, but scratched on all three attempts and thus didn't place. After competition ended, he threw 132 feet, good enough to win, Stierwalt said.

That was the disappointing surprise. On a more pleasant note, shotputter Jay Raulerson won third in his event with a heave of 40 feet, six inches, the first time in a long time any Warrior shotputters have placed; and Peter Barton pole vaulted 11 feet, six inches for another third place finish, the first Warrior vaulter to place this season.

No surprise at all was the strong showing by Joe Almager in the 1500 meter run and the 800 meter sprint, with first places in both events. Times were 4:23 and 2:06. Almager is the only Warrior who has qualified for state thus far.

Other good finishes were turned in by the 400 meter relay team, with a third place; by Craig Sullivan, who finished third in the 1500 meter; by the 800 meter relay team, with 1:39 for third place; fourth places by Sullivan in the 3,000 meter run, by Scott Neal in the 165 meter low hurdles with a

22.4 time and by the mile relay team of Billy Woodul, Kyle Flack, Mike Douglas and Brian Cargill; and the mile medley relay team finished fifth. Members are David Laturner, Batton, Grady Williamson and Douglas.

Stronger finishes probably would have been turned in by the relay teams, but key runner Ricky Dennis was ill, and substitute Russ Flor just hasn't had enough practice yet.

"Our handoffs were a little sloppy, and that cut a few seconds off our time," he said. "But Russ is doing the best he can."

Now the Warriors train in earnest for district, which is definitely a qualifying meet. The top two finishers in any event automatically qualify for state, and any other competitors who beat an arbitrary standard set by the state athletics association qualify as well.

For example, a shotputter who throws better than 46 feet qualifies, even if he finishes third or lower. Conversely, if the top two throws are less than 46 feet, then only those two qualify.

"There's not a lot of conditioning we can do at this point," Stierwalt said. "If we aren't ready by now, we never will be. We'll just train hard and try to qualify as many people as we can."

The state meet will be in Albuquerque May 16-17.

# Warrior defense 'greatly improved'

Any football coach will tell you a good defense wins more ball games than a good offense — if the other team can't score, your team is hard to beat.

Other teams are going to have a hard time scoring on the Ruidoso Warriors this fall if spring practices are any indication of things to come.

"I'd say we're greatly improved over last season," defensive coordinator Ronny Maskew said in a recent interview. "We'll be running the same basic defense as we did last year, which is an even front, a

seven or eight man front line. Then we do variations on that basic front, depending on what the offense shows us."

The defense has picked up any and all changes well, Maskew said.

"Really, what we're doing now is refining things, since everybody knows it fairly well already," he said.

Head coach Darrel Stierwalt echoed Maskew's opinion.

"We're looking as good on defense as we do on offense," he said. "It's really helping us a lot to know it from last year. About a year ago we were trying to teach fundamentals. Now we can get down to

work."

There are some problems in spring practice, defensively. Since the strength of any defense really depends on how well it can hit, and since real physical contact — that is tackling — is outlawed in spring ball by the state, assessing a defense becomes a difficult proposition.

"Yeah, it's kinda hard," Stierwalt said. "Basically what you have to do is see if the right gap is plugged up, see if the line gets off the ball well and makes a good charge and jams the right offensive players. You check pursuit, and you watch to see if the secondary rotates when and where it's supposed to."

"Then you watch for coverage to make sure they've picked up the right receivers,

and then they're supposed to coverage on the ball.

"But you really can't tell what you've got until we put on the pads."

The Warrior defense, like the offense, will lose some key players to graduation, including all district selections Randy Wynn and Mark Boggs.

But stalwarts Bill Huey and Ronald Bell return, as do Lon Nunley and Steve Fletch.

"Bill and Huey are having good spring practices," Stierwalt said. "I really haven't had a chance to check the secondary individually, but together they're doing a good job."

"All of 'em," Maskew said, "are doing an exceptional job, and especially with having to come in at 7:30 every morning to practice. That kind of dedication means we're going to be better than last fall."

Socorro and Carrizozo also competed in the tourney.



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

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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — So there you sit in your own living room, reading these words and wondering about those who write columns which disturb your peace.

What possible question could there be about the value of "the family," the subject of a day-long gathering here in Santa Fe, in preparation for a White House Conference on the Family?

Is there anybody who is opposed to the "family?"

Well, not so you'd notice it.

But not everybody defines "the family" in exactly the same way.

Had you noticed that? Or did you think that whatever those words meant to you they meant the same thing to everybody else in New Mexico?

Not so. Just ask Mrs. Bruce King, who is heading up this conference, hoping against hope that it will not lead to bloodshed.

"Family" is not an easy word to deal with these days.

There are in real life, as there are at this conference, the "Rights" groups — The Right to Life, on one hand, and the Right to Choose, on the other. It would be hard to find organizations who are more opposed to one another than they are (A mere male, for example, tends to keep his head down, if he has any previous experience, when the representatives of these two groups get into the same room with one another.)

The family. Shouldn't that be a peaceful idea, whether you speak of the Holy Family or the holy family? Maybe so. These people, now present here, tend to go for each other's throat.

That may be why two of the 50 American states have told the President they don't want to take part in a White House Conference on the Family. Their position is that the split in their citizens' on this

particular topic is so wide and so deep that there is not now and is not likely to be in the future any form of agreement on the topic.

There is, in this meeting room, very little evident objectivity. Speak up and you will suddenly find yourself surrounded by those on the other side — and they are not friendly.

So far apart is their point of reference that it is possible for someone to say, after four hours of argumentation, that "we have not yet even defined what we mean by 'the family.'"

Unlike most meetings in the Roundhouse, where members of a legislative gathering who disagree with one another have learned to be civil about their disagreement, these two groups are inclined to go for one another's throat. Evidently there is no quarter given between the "Right to Life" group and the "Right to Choose."

For a simple male, taught to believe one is probably irretrievably chauvinistic, there seems little choice. What does one say when neither side can be denominated the "bad guy?" Who wants to come down firmly on either side, especially when to do so will generate letters to the editor, a medium both groups have learned to use very well?

Maybe, as those two states have suggested to the President, we ought to go away, keep our peace and come back in about one generation. By then, perhaps, we may be able to speak calmly and objectively on such words as "abortion." Certainly we have not achieved such a plateau of peaceful discussion in May of 1980.

With the turmoil in the rest of the world, does the White House need this?

# Mass murder was Bonito City's main claim to fame

Most of the longtime residents of Lincoln County are acquainted with the fact that the construction of Bonito Dam, which was begun in 1930, insured an adequate source of water for the citizens of Alamogordo.

What is less well known, especially among newcomers, is that, as the lake waters began to fill the canyon floor, they also buried forever the site of a brief but tragic chapter of Lincoln County history: Bonito City.

It was in that small mining community where, 95 years ago this week, one of the most brutal mass murders in New Mexico history took place.

Today, Bonito City lives only in the memories of old timers who knew it as a childhood home or whose parents and grandparents passed along their own stories of the old days.

Chloe (Mrs. Gilbert) Peters of Angus, a descendant of the pioneer Zumwalt and Skinner families, is one who has heard the stories of Bonito City and the infamous Mayberry murder, "all my life," she said.

Bonito City was founded in the late 1870's by adventurous souls who had been infected with "gold fever." The buildings of Bonito, made of logs with plaster filled chinks, included a saloon, a church which also served as a schoolhouse, numerous houses and the Mayberry Hotel, a prominent two story structure where boarders and visitors found lodging.

The inn was owned by Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Mayberry, who lived there with their three children, John and Edward, ages nine and 13, and their daughter Nellie, 14.

A boarder at the Mayberry in May of 1885 was Martin Nelson, a 24-year-old laborer of Swedish origin who was regarded as an outstanding citizen of the community.

"Everybody thought well of this boy," according to Peters. "He'd been there quite some time."

But on the morning of May 5, 1885, the Mayberry family was awakened by shots as Nelson took the life of his fellow boarder and first victim, Dr. William Flynn.

As the Mayberry family members rushed upstairs, Nelson opened fire on them, killing the father and both sons. Mrs. Mayberry and her daughter attempted escape down the stairs, but both were wounded, and the mother died moments later after revealing the assailant's identity to a neighbor.

Meanwhile Nellie sought shelter in the cellar of a nearby home. Nelson managed to catch up with her, but the girl's life was spared.

"They think it might have been jealousy over her that caused the whole thing," said Peters. According to the stories of her parents, Nelson, discovering the girl had been hit, said, "Oh Babe, I didn't intend to kill you!"

Harsher statements were attributed to the murderer by Phillip Rasch in an article in "True West," December, 1971. In that account, Nelson is quoted as saying, "I might as well send you to hell with the balance of 'em." And when the girl pleaded for her life, Rasch wrote, Nelson said: "Your father, mother and brothers are dead; wouldn't you rather die and join them in heaven?"

Realizing he had to make good his escape, Nelson fled the scene, stopping briefly to "throw one of the bodies into a ditch," said Peters. "Then he went out and started shooting anyone he met."

"Anyone he met," included local saloon keeper Peter Nelson (no relation), who had heard the shots and come to the assistance of the family.

By this time, the entire village was aroused, and a guard detail was set up around the hotel, where they believed Nelson was hiding. In fact, he had escaped, reportedly to find his horse and "more ammunition."

He appeared at the home of another family at 5 a.m., demanding breakfast. "After eating," wrote Rasch, "he told his hostess that he had killed the whole Mayberry family and was going back to the house to get one or two more."

The murderer's final victim, Herman Beck, was one of those guarding the Mayberry home. The accounts of that last killing differ. According to Peters, "they both shot at once," both fell, and died.

In Rausch's version, Nelson shot his last victim in the back from a distance of about 250 yards. Three other guards immediately retaliated with gunfire, ending the killer's rampage.

As the local minister, it was Peters' grandfather's duty to conduct the funeral services for the nine dead.

The local victims were buried at the Bonito Cemetery, while Nelson was "unceremoniously dumped into a box and buried at the foot of the hill," wrote Rausch.

The last surviving Mayberry was nursed back to health by a neighbor, until an uncle could arrive to take her back to his Iowa home.

The impending construction of the dam, some 45 years later necessitated removal of the bodies from their resting places. Despite the time elapsed, the memory of the murder was fresh enough that Nelson's body was relocated to an area "outside the Angus Cemetery," Peters said. Since that time, the cemetery has expanded, taking Nelson's grave into its boundaries, and the Angus cemetery association "still keeps up his grave," she added.

Superstitions may have contributed to the decline of Bonito City. The hotel, which was believed to be haunted, was abandoned, although the murderer himself was reportedly buried "head down," to keep him from "walking as a ghost."

The mining families began to depart from the town, searching for richer veins or the somewhat more secure life to be found in farming and ranching in nearby communities.

A number of landowners up and down the Bonito Valley sold off their property to allow construction of a water pipeline to supply the El Paso and Northeastern Railroad.

The village was all but abandoned several years before the dam construction began, and the few remaining buildings were torn down.

Today, Bonito Lake is frequented by fishermen and tourists who find it a cool refuge from city life. In its placid waters, they find no indication of the bloody tragedy which is part of its history.

### 'The Tempest' concludes season two

Michael Hordern (pictured) stars in William Shakespeare's magical fantasy, THE TEMPEST, which airs Wednesday, May 7 over the PBS. THE TEMPEST is the sixth presentation in Season Two of THE SHAKESPEARE PLAYS.

THE TEMPEST is traditionally regarded as one of Shakespeare's most personal works and is generally thought to be the Bard's final complete play. Written just prior to the playwright's retirement from London to Stratford, the play details Prospero's plot to return home to Milan from the enchanted island on which he has been shipwrecked. As a powerful magician, Prospero exerts a control over events on the island much like the power of a playwright constructing a plot.

The play's title refers to a storm the magician creates in order to shipwreck his enemies, among them a treacherous brother who usurped Prospero's dukedom and put Prospero and his infant daughter, Miranda, to sea in a leaky, unseaworthy boat. Twelve years later, Prospero's tempest casts his enemies up onto the enchanted isle on which he and Miranda were shipwrecked. Among those marooned is Ferdinand, a prince for whom Prospero intends marriage to Miranda.

Michael Hordern has played Prospero often throughout his career, and it is a role with which he has become identified, to his great satisfaction. "I love Prospero," he said recently. "The role leaves one feeling absolutely exalted, and yet somewhat unsatisfied because one still hasn't got to the bottom. With every performance, there is something new to learn, some rich vein still waiting to be tapped."

Over a six-year span, THE SHAKESPEARE PLAYS will encompass all of William Shakespeare's dramatic works. The series is made possible by grants from Exxon Corporation, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and Morgan Guaranty Trust Company.



**CONFIDENTIAL REPORT:** The last farewell: Better believe there are plenty of hard feelings on both sides accompanying the recent departure of **Mackenzie Phillips** from TV's 'One Day At A Time' hit. Sounds kind of familiar, no? That's just what Paramount toppers think, what with a minimum of \$12 million invested in 'The Urban Cowboy,' which is scheduled to debut in theaters in June.

**TV TICKER:** The search for a new Angel to replace **Shelley Hack** goes on over at the 'Charlie's Angels' offices in Century City, and the current thinking at Spelling-Goldberg Productions seems to be that an ethnic actress would give the show the ratings boost it needs after a so-so season with the Nielsens. **Parsi Khambatta**, the alluring actress from India who starred in 'Star Trek-The Motion Picture,' is under serious consideration, one source at Fox reports. The producers may very well hold out for a black actress to fill the vacant spot on 'Charlie's Angels,' but insiders are devilishly predicting that **Bo Derek's** sister, **Kelly Collins**, will ultimately emerge as the winner in this race.
