





breeder.

As announced last year, the All-American Futurity has grown to such staggering proportions. This growth has created two spinoff races, the All-American Derby for three-year-olds and the All-American Gold Cup for four-year-olds.

The question which really comes to mind is this: If the All-American purse is to be so greatly expanded, where will all that money come from?

The answer lies in the fact the All-American Futurity has grown to such staggering proportions. This growth has created two spinoff races, the All-American Derby for three-year-olds and the All-American Gold Cup for four-year-olds.

Under the current format, \$1,200,000 is directed into the Futurity, and all funds over that go into the following year's Derby and into the subsequent All-American Gold Cup. Last year, for example, the All-American Futurity generated \$2,347,265. The amount of the carry over fund was \$1,867,265.

There's been such a pile up of funds that, according to current projections, this summer's All-American Derby (August 24) will even surpass the All-American Futurity in purse value. The Derby is expected to gross around \$1,500,000. The Gold Cup, which debuts in 1982, will offer a stunning \$714,375 or so in its inaugural

running.

In 1983, the Gold Cup is projected at around \$730,000.

But getting back to the original question — where will all the money come from for the enriched All-American purse?

According to MacGillivray, much of this new money will be "backed" into the Futurity by virtue of the fact a \$1 million ceiling will be installed on the All-American Derby beginning with the 1981 running.

Other funds will be generated by an increase in the nominating payments to the Futurity, Derby and the Gold Cup. But this increase is fairly modest. Currently, the total for all eight regular payments amounts to \$2,500. Under the new format, the total will be increased to \$3,250.

Here's the new nominating schedule: \$50 due by January 15, 1981; \$100 due by March 15, 1981; \$150 due by June 15, 1981; \$200 (instead of \$250) due by October 15, 1981; \$300 (instead of \$300) due by December 15, 1981; \$500 (instead of \$400) due March 15, 1982; \$750 (instead of \$500) due June 15, 1982; \$1,000 (instead of \$750) due to enter the trials.

The new format also includes a late supplemental possibility at a penalty fee of \$20,000.

Richard Thompson, Ruidoso's Director of Sales, did much of the re-engineering on the new format. Thompson points out that the new format carries little speculation.

By example, he notes that the revised payment format — based on the same number of entries and dropout rate for the 1981 All-American Futurity — will generate a total fund of \$3,411,650, leaving a hefty \$881,650 to be carried over to the following year's All-American Derby.

Contributing to the upbeat forecast for the All-American series is the tremendous recent growth of the All-American Select Yearling Sale. In order to enter the sale, a yearling must be nominated to the following year's All-American Futurity. Thus, the Sale and the Futurity have marched hand-in-hand down the road of progress.

In 1976, a total of 381 head was catalogued for the sale. In 1977, the figure lifted up to 400. In 1978, 588 head were catalogued. Last year, the total was 713. This year, it's estimated some 800 yearlings will be in the All-American catalogue.

Another index of the wildfire growth of the All-American Futurity is the number of original nominations. In 1977, that figure was 1,306. Since then, the story has gone this way: 1978 — 1,380; 1979 — 1,587; 1980 — 1,922; 1981 — 2,276.

That total of 2,276 for the 1981 edition stands as an all time record. Ruidoso officials read these signals, and those emerging from the escalating pari-mutuel trend at Ruidoso — as a clear barometer of continued and very brisk growth in the years ahead.

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Social Services aid offered here

Persons in need of specialized services now may be able to find the help they need in Ruidoso—through the state Social Services Agency, which recently opened offices in Ruidoso.

A wide range of services are provided, primarily to low-income families who must meet eligibility requirements, according to Barbara Estrada, who staffs the local office.

Several services are already being provided to Lincoln County residents, including:

—Critical In-Home Care Services, which involves housekeeping or personal care services for dependent, physically handicapped persons in their homes. This service may involve payments for professional health care at home, Estrada said.

—Early Periodic Diagnosis and Treatment Support Services, involving identification of health problems of Medicaid eligible persons under age 21. Assistance in obtaining treatment, including transportation even to distant health care facilities, is available under this program Estrada said.

—Protective Services, for both adults and children. These are generally provided to "remedy situations which abuse, neglect or exploits" such persons. In addition to services provided directly through the Social Services office, Estrada devotes much of her time to information

and referral services. If needed assistance is not a current program of the office, she will advise on where that help can be found.

Two projects which she is trying to expand in Lincoln County are foster care and day care.

"There are only two foster care homes in the county," she said. "And this is something which is badly needed."

Funding for day care for working mothers who cannot pay child care costs during their working hours is not available at present.

"That funding has been frozen," Estrada said. However, she urges low-income parents in need of day care to contact her, so they may be put on a waiting list.

If enough need can be demonstrated, Estrada said she may be able to acquire the funds for the next fiscal year to provide day care services.

Other services available through the office are counseling for emotional problems, adoptions, substance abuse services, legal services, juvenile delinquency prevention, and homemaker or chore services to the handicapped or elderly. She will also provide help (in Spanish or English) in filling out food stamp and other assistance applications.

The office of Social Services is located at 2930 Sudderth Drive, directly across from the main post office. Estrada is maintaining office hours from 8 a.m. to noon Monday through Wednesday; Thursdays

from 1-5 p.m.; and Fridays from 3-5 p.m. The telephone number is 257-9217, and the mailing address is Box 2413, Ruidoso.

Estrada was recently transferred to Ruidoso after working in the Alamogordo Human Services office for more than 18 years. She is the mother of three children: Lisa, age 10; Stevie, 8, and Eddie, 18 months.

Dear Sally; Wisteria is one of my favorite spring blooming plants. Will it grow in this climate and if so when should it be planted? Thank you!

Dear Nancy; Wisteria is one of my favorite spring blossoms also. The blooms are so eager to burst out they will not wait for the leaves to appear, and what a heavenly fragrance! However, wisteria is an outdoor plant and would only grow in Ruidoso in a very protected area. I would

like for you to experiment just a bit. I see no reason why the wisteria could not be grown inside with proper light. Check back on the column I wrote on bougainvillea. Using the same instructions, substitute wisteria for bougainvillea. Please let our readers know if the plant thrives. Good Luck...

Dear Readers; A doctor friend of mine sent me a article taken from the JAMA, (Journal of American Medical Assn.) The doctor thought it important for those of us interested in plants to read. I am glad to share this information with you.

"Sludge-based fertilizers may cause heart, kidney disease." Backyard gardeners who use organic fertilizer made from sewage sludge may be adding an unsafe amount of cadmium to their families' diets, thus increasing the family members' likelihood of developing heart and kidney disease.

According to Dr. Al Page, soil scientist at the University of California, the danger of excessive cadmium intake is greatest when a gardener uses sewage-sludge fertilizer extracted from industrial areas because industries put the biggest percentage of cadmium into waste water. Once added to the soil, or consumed by eating the food grown in it, the cadmium is retained in both the ground and the body, heightening the long term problem of its presence. Leafy vegetables absorb more cadmium than do other types of produce, but potatoes and wheat also absorb quantities that could be significant if the foods are eaten regularly.

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Mescalero Post Office dedicated Saturday

At the Saturday dedication of the Clinton P. Anderson Building, which houses the new Mescalero Post Office, Congressman Harold Runnels called the late Senator, "a great national statesman."
Runnels delivered the dedicatory remarks to a crowd of over 100 persons in Mescalero. He also traced Anderson's career after he moved to New Mexico as a youngster suffering from tuberculosis.

Beginning work as a newspaper reporter, Anderson entered public life and continued to rise in political ranks, serving in a variety of state and regional posts. He went on to become United States Senator. When he resigned his cabinet post to run for the Senate, Truman reportedly told him that "because of your wise policies, farmers are enjoying the greatest prosperity in their history," Runnels said. Runnels also cited legislation in which

Anderson was instrumental, including the Wilderness Act of 1963, the Medicare Act of 1965, and other bills dealing with water rights and desalinization.

He called Anderson an "unusual man," whose many severe health problems only gave him "more vigor to continue." Anderson's "lifetime of public service," Runnels said, was "proof that a vision can become a reality," through hard work. He would be proud that your vision has become a reality through that principal today."

A number of area postmasters and regional postal officials attended the ceremony, along with tribal president Wendell Chino, tribal council officers and Sherburne P. Anderson, the late Senator's son.

Chino presented Runnels, Anderson, Albuquerque postal manager Richard Pino and Mescalero postmaster Esther Rodriguez with plates bearing the tribal symbol.

Anderson assisted with the unveiling of a


plaque dedicating the building to the memory of his father, and thanked the tribe for what he called "this distinct honor."

Prior to the unveiling, Chino also addressed the crowd, saying he "cherished the memory of Anderson" and that no one had made "so profound an impact," on his life.

During his political career, Anderson helped the Apaches in such areas as housing and the establishment of the hospital and national fish hatchery, Chino said.

"He never allowed the power of his influence or the greatness of his personality to diminish his concern for our people and the other citizens of New Mexico," Chino said. "He was a good and wonderful friend of the Mescalero people."

Entertainment at the ceremony was provided by members of the Mescalero Pow Wow Club. An open house was held at the post office, followed by an Indian dinner at the Community Center.

Few frustrations equal those of the traveler who is left at the gate when his flight departs. Why did the airline "bump" him, and what can he do to reach his destination? Traveler self-defense can prevent 90% of all problems. Common sense is the key.

1. Read your ticket and itinerary carefully, before leaving for the airport. Tape your name and address INSIDE each bag, and affix an airline name tag to the OUTSIDE of each, also.

2. Take only 2 suitcases to check with the airline. Tape your name and address INSIDE each bag, and affix an airline name tag to the OUTSIDE of each, also.

3. Plan to arrive at a major airport at least 1 hour before your departure time (30 minutes in smaller airports) and check in immediately. Airlines will not hold your reservation 20 minutes before departure. You may be bumped if you arrive at the last minute.

4. At your destination, reconfirm your return flights with the airline. This is the only way to know of flight cancellations or changes. Foreign carriers cancel all unconfirmed reservations, leaving you with nothing.

If, in spite of all precautions, you encounter a problem, the airlines will assist you. See next week's TRAVEL TIPS and know your rights.

Bryant wins New Mexico Open

Dave Bryant, tennis pro at Sierra Swim and Racquet Club, won the New Mexico Open Tennis Tournament last week in Albuquerque.

What's remarkable about that? Practically nothing—after all, it's only the eighth time in 10 years he's come away as the number one finisher.

Now Bryant strikes fear in the hearts of his opponents in that tourney, and there is talk—not all of it joking—of erecting a statue of him there and naming the courts after him.

Not bad for a guy who didn't pick up a racket until he was 18.

As tournaments go, Bryant said, this one was "a little lower in quality," but he quickly added, "it was still a tough tourney."

And they aren't getting any easier, either. At 33 Bryant is approaching the age where Father Time takes his toll.

"I'm starting to feel it," he said. "I'm hitting the ball as well as I ever did, but I'm not as quick as I used to be. Injuries bother me a lot—little nagging things, but they never heal. I can't stay out like I used to before a match. At nine o'clock, I'm in the sack."

Injuries almost took their toll in Albuquerque. Bryant beat his first round opponent, but his elbow hurt so badly he seriously considered giving up this year.

But a tennis player from Las Cruces told him about a drug called indocin. Bryant got a prescription and started taking it.

"In 24 hours my elbow felt better than it has in a year," he said, "and my game improved."

He had little difficulty with his opponents until he met the University of New Mexico's top seed David Gaetz in the finals.

Bryant won the first set, 7-5, but Gaetz tied the match by taking the second by the same score. Bryant, however, pulled out to a 5-1 lead in the third, and he knew then, he said, it was only a matter of time.

"Gaetz knew it too," he said with a grin. Bryant finally outlasted him, 6-3.

His career began at age 18 in his hometown of McAlester, Oklahoma, which isn't exactly a tennis hotbed. In fact, Bryant started playing tennis because he was tired of running track.

"I was a basketball player in high school," he said, "and to play basketball, you had to compete in another sport too, which for us was track. A bunch of us got tired of running and a guy named James

Wadley (who is now the tennis coach at Oklahoma State University) got us playing."

More instruction came from a man named Jerry Chaney, and in a year Bryant was crowned Oklahoma high school champion.

"It wasn't real hard at the time to do that in Oklahoma," he said, "but it was still an accomplishment."

But basketball was still his forte. He accepted a scholarship to Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, known in the state for its basketball prowess. After two and a half years—in which he was honorable mention small college All-American—Uncle Sam notified him of his duty to the country.

In the Army, he ran into James Wadley, of all people, who talked him into attending Southeastern Oklahoma State University. There he met coach Clarence Dyer.

"Everything I know about tennis I owe to him," Bryant said.


In his two years at Southeastern, he was highly ranked in small college tennis, eventually working his way to number two nationwide. He had a shot at number one, but lost in the national finals.

After graduation, he entered the professional circuit, touring the midwest. Later, he went to Puerto Rico, Canada, the Pacific Northwest, Nassau, the Bahamas and other points on the pro circuit. In the process, he played the likes of John Newcombe (whom he defeated, by the way).

He did most of that during the summer—his regular job was teaching tennis at Amarillo's Tascosa High School, when his teams won five district titles and half a dozen of his players competed in the state championships.

Finally, in 1977, he made a tour of the Caribbean, then returned to Amarillo. He happened to be playing at a country club there when Gary McDonald, then manager of Sierra Swim and Racquet Club, called the club and asked if there were any professionals there looking for a job.

Bryant decided he was tired of teaching



and travel, interviewed for the position, and has been here ever since.

"I like the mountains, I like to fish," he said. "I came over, looked at the club and had no doubts about it. I like it here."

Bryant said he has every intention of staying in Ruidoso, and also of playing tennis as long as he can.

"I like the competition, and I'm glad I picked a sport I could stay in," Bryant said. "I'm getting older though, and in the New Mexico Open, I'll be entering the 35

age bracket soon. But I'll probably stay in the open bracket to keep my game up, and I'll probably play until I get beat."

He has more tournaments coming up, including the club's June 19 open tourney and a July 4 engagement in Denver, which Bryant is—and isn't—looking forward to.

"It's a real good tourney," he said, "but I'll have to play my best game all the way."

And that's the only way Dave Bryant can play.

TIP FROM READER — Fishing waders make it possible to reach that special spot in your favorite stream, but they can also become a deadly trap if you should fall off them with water. If you are swept off your feet by a swift current or step into a deep hole, the water filled waders become a serious obstruction to survival.

A belt cinched tightly around the waders at the waist will go a long way toward preventing a rapid fillup of water if you should fall. If you are caught without a belt and take a spill, quickly bend your knees to draw your feet tightly under you. This action tends to trap air below the knees and retains some buoyancy.

Some of the newer style waders include an inflatable tube above the waist. When filled with air this tube seals against entry of water into the leg areas, as well as providing extra buoyancy. Gary E., California.

This is being sent to you on May twenty-nine — and by the time it reaches you will be over into the very favorite month of June.



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

I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

The recent thunderstorms that have blessed southeastern New Mexico with much needed precipitation have been a most welcome sight.

And, along with many of those showers, spectacular lightning shows have lit up the sky.

Lightning has always fascinated mankind in one manner or another. At least one man was so intrigued by it he flew a kite during an electrical storm. Yet another man, reportedly a doctor, used lightning to give life to his monster-like creation.

Even though lightning is fascinating and fun to watch, it can create extremely dangerous situations which should not be taken lightly.

The following article should brighten your knowledge on this subject. Hope you get a charge out of it (the story, that is.)

In the blink of an eye, a lightning bolt can discharge billions of watts of power, and with the summer thunderstorms we'll be having, it would be best if you didn't serve as a lightning rod.

Lightning is not as phenomenal as you might think. Except for size and power, it is no different from the spark you create by shuffling your feet on a carpet and touching metal. Both are electrical charges caused by friction.

Friction within a cloud occurs as the whirling air currents cause water droplets, ice crystals and dust particles to rub together or break apart. In simplified terms, this creates a negative electrical charge which bolts downward to meet a positive charge on the ground.

Lightning can travel at speeds up to 23,000 miles per second and may heat the air through which it passes to temperatures between 15,000 and 60,000 degrees Fahrenheit in a millionth of a second. This extreme heat causes the air to expand suddenly and violently, producing the sound called thunder.

Since light and sound travel at different speeds, you can use the sound of thunder to

tell the distance in miles between you and the lightning flash. Lightning can be seen instantly, but the sound of thunder takes five seconds to travel one mile. When you see the flash, count the seconds until you hear the thunder. Divide the number of seconds by five to determine the distance in miles. If you don't have a watch, count the seconds as one thousand one, one thousand two, one thousand three, etc.

Thunder cannot hurt you, but the tremendous force of lightning is not something to be taken lightly. If statistics from past years hold true, lightning will probably kill 500 people in the United States this year and injure three times that many. Ninety percent of these people will be struck while outdoors for recreation or work purposes. Several people have already been killed or injured by lightning in New Mexico this year.

Lightning can strike almost anywhere and may strike more than once in the same spot. Also, as most folks know, lightning is drawn to the highest point on the land beneath it. Trees, tall buildings and communication towers attract lightning. Since outdoor interest could cause you to be exposed to the dangers of a summer electrical storm, here are some safety tips:

Never seek shelter under a tree during a thunderstorm. Trees, especially solitary ones, attract lightning. Current radiating from a tree that has been struck will flash out at anything under or near it. Heat produced by the electrical current flowing through the wood can also turn the sap into steam so quickly the tree explodes, often injuring anyone nearby.

If you are out fishing or boating and a thunderstorm comes up, head for shore as quickly as possible and get away from the water. Water has a flat surface, so any type of boat on the surface becomes a good target.

When a thunderstorm develops while you are swimming, get out of the water immediately. If lightning strikes the water nearby, the electrical current can travel to you through the water. Even if it only stuns you, you could drown.

Avoid beaches, fields, golf courses and other such open areas during a storm. If you get caught in the open, lie down flat on the ground so you will not attract a lightning bolt.

Never hold a metal object such as a gun, golf club or tennis racket while exposed outdoors in a thunderstorm. Such metal objects are good conductors of electricity and could attract lightning to you.

During a storm, don't stand near wire fences or other wires. Electrical current can travel along barbed wire or other metal fences for long distances.

When camping, if an electrical storm comes up, don't stay in a tent near a tall tree. Also, stay away from exposed hill and mountain tops. If a storm catches you hiking on the tundra of a New Mexico mountain top, hike down to below treeline immediately.

There is still plenty of time to be active in the outdoors this summer. Enjoy it, but be aware of summer storms and the hazards of lightning. Should you be caught in a storm, know what to do, and then do it.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: Larry Hagman, a somewhat forgettable nice guy in 'I Dream of Jeannie,' has become one of television's premier bad guys as J.R. Ewing in the series 'Dallas.' Hagman thinks the time is ripe for a bad guy. "I don't know why, but I think maybe people are sick of good guys," he said. "Don't you think people are sick of the Waltons? They're just too nice, that's all. I think life is represented by all factions, the good and the bad, and J.R. is the bad." Hagman said. "J.R. is totally amoral, with plenty of money, and a lot of beautiful women, and I think everybody wants to be that way these days."
