# Sanders resuming 'business as usual'

The recent decision by the New Mexico Supreme Court which will allow certification of Steve Sanders as the 12th Judicial District Attorney (DA) will provide "a real opportunity to get back to business as usual." Sanders said Wednesday.

The high court quashed a writ of mandamus filed by Sanders' write-in opponent James J. Weldon, which had asked that he be declared winner of the race and named Senders and the state canvassing board as respondents.

"Obviously, I'm very, very happy about the decision," Sanders said. "The matter has now been reviewed by the State Canvassing Board and the Supreme Court and both felt my position was correct.

"I think the outcome shows the people elected the right person and I'm going to make an extra effort to provide the people of Lincoln and Otero County with the

service, iney deserve." ne added.

Since the November 4 election, Sanders said he and his staff have been primarily concerned with "catching up" on paperwork and files at the Otero County

"People may not realize we have had a lot of catch-up work to do down here, bringing the files up to date and updating old cases, including a murder case which is ten years old," Sanders said.
The new DA said he would arrange a

meeting soon with Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez to discuss a number of

He added that office hours in Ruidoso and Carrizozo would probably resume this week. Office hours may also be scheduled in Capitan and Tularosa, he said.

Weldon has indicated he will probably continue to contest Sanders' election, possibly with a suit in distric t court.

If that happens, Sanders said, "I don't see how he can expect it to change the decision of the Supreme Court."

One of the first Lincoln County cases to be prosecuted by the DA's office this year will be that of Frank Barela, a Camp Sierra Blanca inmate charged in the stabbing death of an Alamogordo man

Christmas Eve. Murder charges are still pending completion of the investigation. Sanders

He added, "I feel we have to take very harsh and strong measures against these people . . . another inmate has committed a violent crime to protect his freedom." Sanders said he would ask the District Court to order that prisoners with a record of violent criminal behavior "not be

allowed in Lincoln County." He said he had also discussed the matter of furloughs with camp superintendent E. B. Gutlerrez. The two reached an agreement, Sanders said, that inmates who were an hour late in returning. without an explanatory telephone call,

would be considered to have walked away. "In people with a violent criminal background," Sanders said, "the potential is always there (for repeated violence). Give them an inch and they'll take a mile."

# Bidding records set by BLM

Records were set in both competitive and simultaneous oil and gas programs in December according to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

Over \$15 million in high bids was received by the Bureau on 63 parcels of public land in both New Mexico and Oklahoma offered in a competitive oil and gas sale December 16. Over 400 bids were recieved with a total bid of \$40,743,492. Andarko Production Company had the highest bids of over one million on each of two parcels in Lea County. Monsanto Company had the highest single bid of \$1,996,800 on a 640 acre tract. All of these were in New Mexico.

The highest bid on an Oklahoma parcel was by Amarex, Incorporated, on 149.33 acres in Roger Mills County of \$806,232. Competitive sales are held on tracts in known producing geologic formations. In addition to the bonus bid, companies also pay an annual rental plus royalties to the United States government. These vary from 12 1/2 to 25 percent on oil with the percent increasing as production goes up. On natural gas the royalty varies from 121/2 percent on natural gas under five million cubic feet of production to 16% percent for all gas over five million cubic feet. Fifty percent of the royalties are returned to the state government.


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


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


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# 'Expanding Your Horizons' conference for women

If Congress accepts the 1980 census (which they'll likely do, after grumbling), : it goes to the White House to be made official. After that, the application of a complicated formula will almost certainly show that some Eastern state gives up a member of the House and we get a new

Since the House will grow no larger (everybody knows it's too large already), we've got a zero-sum situation; someone else must lose for us to gain.

That will make hearts beat faster in the 40 or more New Mexicans who are secretly planning to run for that office when it's created, (Secretly? Half of them we know already. There's Bob Mondragon and Art Truillo and probably Bill Richardson . . . and on and on and on.)

But how will the Legislature divide the state into three districts?

The answer to that question makes all

the difference.

We could revive McCaffrey's Simple Solution (give the seat to Bernalillo county, which has a third of the state's voters), but you guys in the outlands who hate the Big Burg will never buy that one. For one thing, it's too logical.

So what we'll get is some unlikely and damn-fool idea which splits the state into three ungainly areas, at least two of which will guarantee "safe" seats like we have now. (One for conservatives, another for

the Spanish-speaking; how neat!)
Albuquerque will almost certainly find itself represented by two House members, one for the Valley and one for the Heights, or one for the north side of town and one for the south, or some other such clumsy \*

arrangement.

What we ought to be doing is trying to find three equal areas which will give the Congressperson from there a good cross-section of New Mexico's voters. That would be the fairest and most helpful way to have these people chosen. But it won't happen.

Instead, you'll see more scheming, conniving and trading-off among our legislators when these lines are drawn than at almost any other point in the next two sessions. Most of that will go on backstage, of course.

The only thing which will lead to more giving-and-taking in smoke-filled rooms is that other redistricting the census figures wili make obligatory - the one where lawmakers redraw the lines which enclose their very own legislative districts.

That's the big action over the next two

We commit ourselves to bring you a blow-by-blow account of that one when it gets geared up - though we may have to bug some private rooms and offices to get the real skinny on it. That one shows our legislators at their horsetrading best.

Meanwhile, if you've got a plan for creating that third Congressional district, draw us a map of it. Every one we've seen so far has been designed by somebody whose eyes are on personally running and getting elected from the district. That, we find, leads to some loss of objectivity.

Once again, when oil must be poured on troubled waters (this time in the Mortgage Finance Authority), Bruce King names Ray Powell to do the job. What the Governor plainly needs is an expansion in the group of people in whom he can put his

## REGULATIONS COSTLY

The federal Office of Management and Budget has estimated it would cost the United States auto industry \$10.9 billion to implement all the federal regulations proposed to take effect in the next four years. We can add this to the list of hidden "taxes" which are imposed on the American economy by government regulations.

Fortunately, the transition teams of the ncoming Reagan administration are looking at this aspect of our economic problems as well as at the opportunities for direct tax cuts. In the long run, reducing overregulation could have as much or more effect on improved productivity as reducing tax rates.

A study has disclosed that governmentmandated equipment added \$666 to the price of the typical passenger car manufactured in 1978 — or a regulatory of \$6.7 billion for the 10 million cars sold that year. The figure would be even higher today.

The regulatory "tax" on housing may run as high as 20 to 30 percent of the price, reflecting not only the cost of complying with regulations but costs resulting from long delays in obtaining required inspections and permits.

The Center for the Study of American Business at Washington University in St. Louis has calculated there is a ratio of oneto-20 between what the government spends on its regulatory agencies and what business must spend to comply with their regulations. In other words, for every \$1 billion spent on regulatory activities the cost to businesses being regulated is \$20 billion - a cost eventually paid by consumers. By this formula the combined price of federal regulatory programs alone is now \$121 billion, or almost \$500 for every

man, woman and child in America. Not all regulatory programs are bad, of course. We rely on government to police health and safety in the marketplace and we have given government agencies new responsibility for environmental protection. But in the last decade regulations have piled up with little con-sideration for their effect on economic growth, prices and productivity. How many of these regulations are really necessary?

If the new administration and Congress demand honest answers to that question from the myriad regulatory agencies in the federal government, we can hope for "tax cuts" quite beyond the kind that show up only on our payroll stub. — News-Bulletin, Beien

Many Americans are hoping for a quiet presidency from Ronald Reagan. Among other things, they don't want to see special TV speeches on every major problem. They recall President Carter's great

concern, and special TV speech on the "brigade" in Cuba, about which nothing have put in only four . . . if that. effective was done, and which was soon forgotten. They recall Carter's special "moral equivalent of war" speech about the energy crisis, which produced noimmediate action.

They recall naive speeches about domestic policies in foreign countries, which helped bring about the Shah's fall in Iran, among other things. They recall carefully prepared TV

It appears, so far as allegations against Frankie Barela, 32, Camp Sierra Blanca inmate is concerned that:

- Lincoln County was sold a bill of goods, by the Department of Corrections, concerning the caliber of inmate assigned to this minimum security facility; and,

 The door to freedom is always open at Camp Sierra Blanca.

As of December 31 Barela was a suspect in the stabbing death of a 68-year-old Alamogordo man. A suspect to the point that his bond was set at \$10,000.

As of last Wednesday the District Attorney, Steve Sanders, Alamogordo, though Barela was obviously not being detained in Camp Sierra Blanca, hadn't determined if Barela was a camp escapee or if he'd merely been on furlough, or overstayed his furlough, presumably granted for exemplary conduct while being incarcerated.

The News checked with the Lincoln County sheriff's office, upon learning of the Barela incident, relative to the sheriff being provided with rap sheets on the convicts assigned to Camp Sierra Blanca. Though the rap sheets were promised the sheriff months ago, as of last week they'd not received rap sheet one.

Barela, according to camp records, was serving a 30year term as a habitual criminal. Ostensibly, according to Department of Corrections officials several months ago, Camp Sierra Blanca was to house inmates who weren't considered a menace to society, that were on the verge of being released, that were assigned to the camp so they could gradually adapt to a life of freedom.

We submit that the death of this Alamogordo man, allegedly a crime committed by Barela, isn't consistent with the policies we were advised would be observed in judging a felon's candidacy to become a camp inmate.

Governor Bruce King has Indicated that the prison a system is under control. To us, considering Barela's alleged crime, we can only say that the governor's statements are balderdash . . . pure and simple. — CD

# Violence down in gridiron wars?

Few athletes have made the transition from the playing field to the broadcast booth as smoothly and successfully as Merlin Olsen, former standout defensive tackle for the Los Angeles Rams now in his fourth year as an NBC Sports football analyst.

Merlin had a helmet-to-helmet view of the rugged trench warfare that is so much a part of professional football during his 15 years with the Rams, and now that experience translates into broadcasting credibility.

Says his broadcast partner, Dick Enberg, "When Merlin talks about interiorline play—something that many fans ignore in favor of following the wide-open action involving the quarterback, receivers or running backs—they not only listen but they believe him. Merlin is a knowledgeable and articulate observer, and he has a knack for knowing when to talk and when not

On the subject of violence in today's game of professional football, Olsen is firm in his opinions. "There is definitely much less violence today than there was, for instance, during my playing days some 10 years ago,' he says.

# Less rough stuff

"There is an impression of there being more violence today simply because much more attention is drawn to action that is couched under the label of 'violence.' It doesn't mean that the frequency or severity of such incidents is greater. It's all just blown up more."

What about injuries today as compared to when he

was playing?

"It does seem that we're seeing more serious injuries today," says Merlin, "but that is another misleading factor regarding this violence business. The greater number of injuries and the greater degree of severity is really due to the fact that today's players are faster, stronger and more ruggedly conditioned than in years past. As a result, physical confrontations—tackles, blocks, falls—take a measurably higher toll in the form of injuries.

"And too, there is no question in my mind but that artificial turf has prompted an increase in injuries, particularly to the knees. It all boils down to the fact that professional football is a much more wide-open, slambang, fast-paced contest. That more players tend to get hurt should not be attributed to unsavory meanness on the part of the players."


