## Trustees study \$1.2 million bond proposal

A proposal for a million dollar general obligation bond election, which would provide for improvements in fire protection, sanitation, streets and law enforcement facilities, was presented to the village board of trustees at their Tuesday night meeting.

However, before the matter was tabled hy the trustees. Derald Waltrip, Fire Chief, and Paul Lukens, Chief of Police, had estimated that the amounts in the proposal for their departments should be

The trustees tabled the matter, after agreeing to obtain more detailed information from the various departments regarding the proposed improvements.

If approved by Ruidoso voters, as the proposal was presented, the bonds would

- Acquisition of land and construction of a fire substation, to be located near the upper traffic light, and two new fire units,

at a cost of \$150,000. Waltrip reported that tax rate, because of the continually ina ten-year plan developed by his department, however, required \$250,000 instead of \$150,000.

- Remodeling of the existing village hall building to bring it into compliance with regulations for jail facilities and addition of a kitchen, a padded cell, communications room and expansion of Emergency Medical Services rooms, at a cost of \$300,000. Lukens, however, reported to the trustees that more than \$600,000 would actually be required to bring the facility to proper standards.

- A new diesel sanitation truck and a minimum of 600 additional dumpsters, at a cost of \$200,000,

- Road materials including base course and hot mix, general road repairs and a new truck for the village street department, at a cost of \$600,000.

Total cost of the proposed improvements would be \$1,250,000. In outlining the program to the trustees, village administrator Jim Hine said the bonds would not result in an increase of the municipal

creasing tax valuation.

The valuation for 1981 "should increase by about \$4 million," Hine said. The bond questions could be presented to the voters in a special election. Hine said, which has already been approved by the trustees. The cost of that election is being underwritten by Ralph Rush, who has requested a lease of the municipal swimming pool. The trustees approved a referendum on that issue at their previous

Trustee Sherman Atwood expressed what seemed to be the consensus of the board, saying, "I have no objection to calling for a referendum on these issues, but I'd like to see the details on how they arrived at these figures."

Following that discussion, during the portion of the meeting devoted to reports from municipal officials, trustee George White submitted a statement and series of 11 questions for the other board members. regarding a meeting held Friday.

White said he was not informed of the

White questioned the other trustees as to why public notice of the meeting was not given, why he was not informed of the meeting until an hour and 40 minutes after it began, and whether action was taken on an ordinance regarding sewer and water

Mayor Lloyd Davis responded that the meeting was "not a formal meeting," and the trustees and others had gathered to "hear a preliminary report from Boyle Engineering" on their recent study of the village water problem.

White questioned the propriety of having Boyle Engineering "write our ordinance, which he said would apprently call for rate increases of 270 percent for water and 300 percent for sewer. He concluded by asking, "When are we going to bring this before the public?"

## Downs police, firemen getting armor, jackets

Ruidoso Downs police and firefighters will be expanding their wardrobes in the near future, as a result of action taken at the Monday night meeting of the village

The village officials agreed to provide funds for the purchase of body armor for the police officers, and jackets and decorative patches for the firefighters.

Police chief Ray Garner requested the armor for his officers, and advised the trustees that the garments, made of a densely woven and layered fabric, will protect the officers against almost any projectile.

In recommending the purchase, mayor Norman Wheeler said if he were an officer, "out stopping people every day, I'd feel a lot better if I had body armor.

"You have no idea what you're going to come up against these days," he added. "I'd hate to lose an officer because of the lack of a \$118 piece of equipment."

Parks said the New Mexico legislature will probably be asked for additional funding because "we don't have the financial capabilities to do this. We've still got that hard reality that we have monetary limits.

Another reality Parks noted was that "if the bond issues don't pass and the mill levy does, we'll just have to go to lots of portable classrooms."

## School to purchase portable classroom

The purchase of a portable building to house Nob Hill Elementary students was approved by the Ruidoso Board of Education Tuesday night.

Bids on the building were received from four companies, with all agreeing to have the structure ready for occupancy within 60 days. The lowest bid meeting specifications was from Universal Building Components, Albuquerque, for \$45,600 and would cover costs of a building

with sheet rock and plywood exteriors. A lower bid was received from Baines Company, Albuquerque, which included an alternate proposal for a similar building, but one which did not meet school

The Baines proposal would have provided a sturdier structure, according to school architect Rembert Alley, Alley-Connell and Associates. However, the structure would have had less insulation and fewer chalkboards, with metal ex-teriors and metal roof. Alley said the building was more easily moved and would probably last longer, but "aesthetically it is not ideal." Baines submitted a low bid of

Other bids were received from Service Contractors, Incorporated, Ruldoso, for \$50,143 and Jim Davis, general contractor, of Ruidoso, for \$59,988.

Bids were opened on fleet insurance for all school owned vehicles, with the account awarded to Goodell. Reed and Glass. apparent low bidders, at \$5,011. Perteet-Parks and Associates submitted a bid of

## Young conservationists gaining valuable experience in program

Conservation measures are continuing to be completed on Smokey Bear Ranger District (SBRD) through the employment of a Young Adult Conservation Corps

(YACC), which now consists of six youths between the ages of 16 and 23.

The program, which lasts one year for each enrollee, trains the youths to go into

the labor force at the completion of the stint, according to YACC coordinator Gary

Since mid-1980, the crew has completed several jobs, and plans for 1981 are approved, Holland said. Currently, the youths are installing a gate on a road which has been mistakenly used by the public as a through road, located directly behind the district office.

Bob Bridges, foreman on the crew, said the YACC will place the gate to block the road from public use and will build a rail fence so people won't cut across a grassy area to gain access to the road.

"This road goes back where our wells, pump house and other administrative offices are located," Bridges said. "We have posted signs, but they have been

ignored, so we are building the gate."

Bridges said the YACC just completed building a wildlife habitat on Eagle Creek, to provide a dam for fish. He sald another recent project involved building a fence in Boone Pastures (between Capitan and Carrizozo) that would allow horses access

Bridges said future projects will include

the clearing of trees and planting grasses for deer "browsing," and an ongoing project of campground maintenance.

Bridges said the YACC has built steps and replaced fireplaces in camping areas and will continue to do remodeling and insulating of administrative offices throughout the year.

Directional signs used by the Forest Service for marking fuelwood cutting areas and forest boundaries are being sanded and remade by the YACC. Another project which is usually a new experience for most YACC enrollees is cutting and peeling posts to use in fence building.

Trail maintenance in wilderness areas, stream improvements to make better fish habitats, clearing of wildlife openings in the heavier stands of pinon/juniper, and construction of national forest boundaries along the south edge of Lincoln National Forest are projects scheduled for future

"I think it's a good program. We get a lot of work accomplished in the district with them; otherwise we'd have to hire

somebody to do it," Holland said. Money to pay the youths comes from a grant established by Public Law 95-93, which also provides additional money for project supplies and salary for the project

Holland calls the YACC program a learn how to work program. One thing I will not telerate in this program is tardiness. I emphasize that they had better not be late because we'll run off and leave them. If they come in tardy more than

three days, they'll be out of a job." Holland said safety is stressed on every project and is practiced so it gives the Corps an opportunity to form good safety

"Some of the kids on this program may even see the fire season this year. We will train them for fire duty, but if we use them in a fire camp, it would be for back-up

services," Holland said. He said good employees have little form for a physical to be filled out by their trouble finding jobs when their year is doctor. over. Some quit before the year is out that's the whole purpose for the program."

Holland said the youths, when they complete the program, have many new skills they could apply to many types of work. Surprisingly, Holland said, very few inquirles about youths available for work ever come through SBRD offices.

"I don't know if it's because people just don't know these kids are available or that the kids just don't bother to go out and apply for jobs around town," Holland said.

He added the youths "are being trained and many of them would be good employees . . . we just can't get enough kids to fill the vacancies we have now," Holland said. SBRD is allowed to have ten youths in the program, but have managed

with as few as six.

Holland said becoming employed is not hard - youths who qualify should pick up an application at SBRD, which includes a

Following an interview, Holland makes because they have already located other the final decision on hiring, "They work a employment. "We are glad to see this; 40 hour week, no overtime, at minimum wage. But it's a job, and they'll learn some new skills," Holland said.


Ties will be broken by a series of five additional shots by each contestant involved in the deadlock until the tie is broken. Each bracket will finish its competition before the next group begins

Next on the slate for White Mountain is a Thursday game with Capitan there, and a Friday matchup with Tularosa there.







## 'Zozo golf course funding discussed

Hopes that the financially strapped set by such action. Carrizozo Recreation area might receive sufficient state assistance to allow it to remain open, dimmed Tuesday after several state officials met with residents

to discuss funding options. Attending the meeting were state-representatives John Mershon and Maurice Hobson, and newly-elected state senator Charlle Lee, along with a group of about 50 citizens from Carrizozo and surrounding areas.

Mershon and Hobson both dismissed the idea that the facility might be taken into the state parks system, because of the "dangerous precedent" which would be

"Every community in the state with a golf course would want the state to run it," Hobson said, and Mershon added, "We (New Mexico) have more parks now than we need."

The officials said they hoped that local governmental entities would be receiving some additional funds from the state; through measures which they said will be introduced in the upcoming legislative

Hobson said the lawmakers may decide to return a one-fourth cent share of the state's sales tax to municipalities. If approved, Carrizozo would receive about \$15,000 from that source.

Another possibility presented by Mershon was the state's return of 25 to 30 percent of property taxes to local governments. Under such a program, Lincoln County would receive about \$232,000 per

The representatives also touched on the possibility of a county takeover of the facility, but county commissioners John Allen Hightower and Ben Hall said that would set a dangerous precedent on the county level, comparable to the problems

of a state takeover. Other options discussed included a statewide increase in sales tax or additional funding for the Small Communitles Assistance program.

Following the presentations by the state officials, Carrizozo town councilwoman Ruth Armstrong said she felt "very bleak" about the prospect of keeping the recreation area open.

Even if the town were to receive an additional \$20,000 to \$40,000 from the sources mentioned, "We need that money for so many other things," she said. "I don't see how either of these proposals will help to keep our golf course open."

## Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE - If there are any people in state government who ought to be careful about ethics they're the ones in the Department of Commerce and Industry.

Working with private business as they do, they have to develop a vivid sense of the difference between the state's Interests and their personal enrichment.

We don't think they always achieve that. We carned the personal enmity of the state's motion picture chief, Larry Hamm, who's part of that department, when we suggested that distinction had gotten a little blurred in his mind. His boss investigated the matter and pretty much said Hamm hadn't done it, but he was going to stop doing it anyway.

Now there is the departure of Ernie Coriz, who headed the Construction Industries Division of Commerce and Industry.

Nothing sinister here. Everything about Coriz's departure was apparently open and above board.

The announcement of it did come the day after the New Mexican, Santa Fe's daily newspaper, published a listing for the new corporation Coriz had founded called Creative Resources, Inc.

Any logician will tell you that you can't argue from the fact that Happening B followed Happening A that B was caused by A. But you are entitled to remark on the

Now this reporter just happens to know that the officials at Commerce and Industry were told weeks and weeks ago that Coriz was operating an outside firm, so reading that publication of information in their Sunday paper can't have shocked them too much.

jecture, was having the matter made public. At that point, everybody evidently thought it best to announce that Coriz was packing it in.

Here's what's wrong with the whole situation, in case you miss the point: For months, Coriz, a public employee in a department designed to be of assistance to commerce and industry, has, through himself or others, been competing with the private businesses his department is designed to aid. If that isn't a conflict,

What's more, Coriz's bosses were notified of that fact by at least one firm which was disturbed by having to fight a state official for business.

Why didn't they act? Well, in the Hamm affair, to which we referred above, his superiors seemed to suggest that an employee must practically be caught in the act in a matter of downright criminality before he or she can be dismissed.

That's hardly true. We'd suggest the bosses at Commerce and Industry need to brush up on their ethics and sensitize themselves a little more to the possibilities of conflict in their own organization.

We used "enmity" in describing Larry Hamm's feelings toward this department. That's an exaggeration, but he did tell that same New Mexican he hoped during 1981 to read the word that Fred Me-Caffrey's typing finger had been broken.

If we get waylaid some night and somebody stomps our knuckles, put Hamm's name on the list of suspects.

There are many in government who agree with him. Larry is just frank enough to come out and say it.

Re: The water situation in Ruidoso, Capitan and Ft. Stanton:

Recently your paper has printed numerous accounts of the problems confronting the village officials. Searches have been made for transferrable water rights, and statements made looking for

new sources of water etc.
First, let us give credit to the village officials for putting into operation numerous distribution systems which has served an area very well, so much so that it is the nucleus for development of an area that now carries about 75 percent of the tax load of Lincoln County. That speaks for itself. You might say the lines in existence now represent the headache confronting a growing recreational area.

When Eagle Creek waters were transferred back here, the village, among others, took possession of a billion gallons of water. Outside of the small storage at Alto actually most of these waters end up in the gulf, or pass on down the country to points unknown. Their waters, by decree. Due to lack of storage facilities a great deal of the waters they have the right to use out of the Rio Ruidoso pass on into the

The only source of waters here in the arid Southwest is in the sky, that vast area of blue stuff over our beads. And the only way to make use of it is to trap it by storage, and usable by gravity flow. The railroad company had the use of two watersheds and still had to haul waters in

June for their engines. After a generation they wised up and built Bonito Dam which solved their problem. Had they not made the false assumptions our streams flow sufficient waters yearlong to furnish all needs, they would have saved hundreds of thousands of dollars, and need never have purchased more than the 850 acres first

We have a bright future, provided we learn to work with Mother Nature by providing adequate storage. We have gotten where we are by little or no storage · what could we do with some? Mother Nature will do her share . . . proof of that is to look at what we have done with little, if any, storage. It isn't the size of the dog, it is the bite that counts. It isn't the size of our storage area that counts, old Mother Nature is notorious for providing the bite on these small areas. A six-up team of mules, with a good skinner and a fresno could do wonders if we put them to work. They would need a plow, too. We've studied this watershed to death. It is high time to throw up some dirt.

### MONDALE FUTURE

Vice President Walter Mondale already is positioning himself for a run at the presidency four years hence. He has not said so; certainly he has not yet amounced that he will be a candidate, but his remarks as set forth in the New York Times by Terence Smith foreshadow his entry into the 1984 race.

In that year Mondale will be 56, that is, 13 years younger than Ronald Reagan was when he won the presidency. He will then have been on the national scene for a couple of decades, first as a senator, then as vice president, and over the next four years presumably in some private occupation that will allow him time to ex-

press himself on major issues. This lends interest to Mondale's ideas about what the Demograts should do in the wake of a stunning defeat. What he had to say on this subject has more than a narrow partisan application; it bears on national concerns: "We, especially those of us who might be thinking about running for president, have a priceless opportunity now, a chance to use this time to really focus on the future, the 80s, the 90s -- the central questions, you know, of productivity, of economic growth, of monetary policy, of United States-Soviet relations (there is something desperately wrong

there), of education; the list is long."

It is the theme of the greatest importance, that public figures of stature who are not now subject to the daily pressures of governance must do some hard, systematic thinking about the state of the nation and its future course. Mon-dale and other Democrats so minded can, If they manage to stay out of the kind of bitter internal debate he seeks to avert, do the nation a service and at the same time strengthen their party for the struggles to come. - Alamogordo Daily News

Here in the land of wide open spaces and rich resources, it's sometimes difficult to remember that the human race is adrift on a relatively tiny "spaceship" called Earth.

And, whether we consciously acknowledge the fact, it is our obligation to see that our methods of sustaining present human life and enterprise do not work at cross purposes with the lives of the future inhabitants of the spaceship.

Either we consider the future, or destroy the human race by default. Or, as the song says, "the way I live determines the way my people survive."

Rational and foresighted use of natural resources is not just a noble-sounding political catch phrase. It's a necessity.

The plans by Sierra Blanca Skl area to drill a well for snowmaking purposes seem to be in accord with these

The well, which is to be drilled above the resort near the North fork of the Rio Ruidoso, would not appear to cause much interference with the water supply to the village, since the moisture would return to the watershed each spring, in the form of melting snow.

The well would increase snowmaking capabilities by more than 400 percent, in acre coverage, and would allow the resort to manufacture snow even for the intermediate and expert slopes located high on the

The cost of the well — about \$300,000 — possibly could be recouped in a single year, in revenues to the resort, if natural snow doesn't fall. The benefits to the village economy are indisputable.

Wells for snowmaking are not a new idea. In other resort communities of the Rockies and the Eastern United States, they've been in use for years, with relative success.

The Forest Service should take a long look at the effects of such a well on the region's water table. Barring any extreme negative effects, as yet unforseen, the well would seem to be a natural - and environmentally sound — solution to the risky business of depending on Mother Nature for our economic well-being during the winter months.

Tourism is perhaps the state's greatest resource, and making wise use of our other natural resources to insure the continued success of the tourist industry is a circular process - and one that is vital to the present and the future of New Mexico. ---GJ







### **Real Estate Facts**

BY THE RUIDOSO BOARD OF REALTORS

Why have condominium conversions become so popular? Why is conversion activity spreading to so many cities? Will this movement continue?

According to the Ruidoso Board of Realtors, the answers to these questions can be found in the Internal Revenue Code, in the effect on housing demand of the two-income household, in the numbers of bables born between 1945 and 1954, and in the fact that rental housing at present is not an attractive investment. In other

words, "the answer is not a simple one."

America likes to think of itself as a nation of homeowners. From a nation of tenants in 1940, we have become a nation of homeowners, according to the National Association of Realtors. In 1940, fewer than 44 percent of all Americans owned their own homes. Today, more than \$5 percent own their own homes.

Despite the enormous production of new single-family homes since World War II, the American home building industry has been unable to meet the demand of the home buying market. The high annual inflation rates of the 1970's have pushed the average price of a new home beyond the means of many Americans, especially younger and first-time home buyers.

While median family income increased by 39 percent between 1970 and 1975, total housing costs for first-time buyers of new homes increased by 82.4 percent over the same period.

Many home buyers unable to afford new and used single-family detached homes have turned to condominiums as an alternative.

The most important single reason is price. Condominiums, both new and converted units, generally cost less to purchase than comparable new singlefamily homes.

A 1980 study by the United States League of Savings Associations found that 11 percent of all home buyers nationwide in 1979 purchased condominium homes. The median purchase price of a condominium unit was \$54,376, or about 6.3 percent less than the median price of \$58,000 for all home buyers in the survey.

Thus, condominiums because of their lower cost are increasingly the only way some households can afford to become homeowners and not spend more than 25 percent of their family income on housing.

Other reasons behind the condominium surge include increasing recognition of the income tax deductions allowed homeowners. A buyer can even afford to purchase a home at a price that results in monthly payments for mortgage (principal and interest) expenses, and property taxes that are higher than his monthly payments would otherwise be. The reason is that the after-tax costs of home ownership can be even less than renting.

More and more familles consider a home to be the best investment they can make in a time of high inflation. Home values, according to the National Association of Realtors, have risen more rapidly than the rate of inflation in recent years.

And as an investment, homes have outperformed stocks, bonds, and almost every other investment vehicle of comparable risk in the last 10 years.

importance of two-income household in stimulating demand for home ownership, including converted condominiums should not be overlooked. A 1977 home mortgage survey by the U. S. League found that in approximately 47.2 percent of all households, a second income accounted for 10 percent or more of the total homebuyer household income. By 1979, a similar survey found home buyers relying on a second wage earner for 10 percent or more of income in about 53.9 percent of the sample.

Another cause of the condominium conversion trend includes the impact of the baby boom generation (that segment of the American population born between the end of World War II and 1954) and is most apparent from the substantial increase in outstanding residential mortgage debt, the number of new household formations and the number of singlefamily homes bought and sold in recent

Baby boom people, the increased longevity of Americans, and changing .lifestyles are significant contributors to the heavy demand for housing. Condo conversions and new construction are attempting to supply that demand.



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## Mortgage payments up 33 percent

Rising housing costs and double-digit mortgage interest rates combined to increase the average monthly mortgage payment made by persons buying homes in 1980 by 33 percent, reports The Family Housing Bureau, a public information service of Chicago Title Insurance

This was the largest single increase in any year since the survey was initiated in 1976, the bureau said.

## Focus on Small Business by E. Maine Shafer

I run a small family-owned business. With close relatives working together, I often find that emotions often interfere with business decisions. What advice can you offer?

Family-owned businesses often face one or more of the following problems:

-A question about who controls daily

operations. -A high turnover rate among nontamily employees.

-Little growth because some of the relatives are unwilling to plow profits back into the business. For the individual who heads such a

company, recognizing emotion as something that must be constantly dealt with a trying and recurring management Take the area of skills and abilities. One relative might say about another relative:

"He was lazy when we were kids, and he's still lazy." Or a disgruntled wife says about an aunt, "What does she know about the business? She's only here because of her father's money."

If such emotional outbursts affected only the family, the manager might "knock a few heads together" and move along. But.

often it's not that easy. The quarrels and ill feelings of relatives have a way of spreading out to include non-family employees. The manager's problem is to try to keep the bickering from Interfering with

Quite often the manager of a small company is not always the person in charge. He or she may be able to make decisions only through other family members and not have full authority to

## 1980 fairground use third highest in history

Almost two-and-a-half-million persons attended events at the New Mexico State Fairgrounds during calendar year 1980,

That was the report this week from Manager and former Ruidosoan Bill Humphries, who said the year's total was 2,482,218. The figure includes the record of 1,145,524 who attended the September exposition, plus 1,336,694 for off-season

The tally is the third highest in the 43year history of the fair. The biggest single year for fairgrounds use was 1976, when the attendance amounted to 2,668,778 (925,273 for the fair and 1,743,505 offseason). Second strongest year for usage of the fairgrounds was 1973, when 2,594,781 total (800,531 at the fair that year and 1,794,250 in the off-season).

Last September's gate was the largest in the fair's history, and only the third time the total attendance has peaked over the million mark.


Total number of events held during 1980 ammounted to 214, covering some 497 days. (The number of days exceeds the total number for the year, because more than one event frequently is staged on the 230-acre grounds at the same time).

The usage of the fairgrounds for a wide variety of activities is popular because of its accessible, central location.

Regular weekly events held year-round in the grounds include art classes and shows, gathering of model railroad enthusiasts and flea markets every Saturday and Sunday.


