OFFICERS QUESTIONED ON PROCEDURES

Bishop facing drug charges

Donald Ray Bishop, 28, Ruidoso, was bound over to District Court Thursday on all charges brought against him in connection with the March 13 confiscation of drugs whose street value was estimated by police at over \$1 million.

The charges included two counts of controlled substance, possession prohibited, to wit: hashish, LSD and marijuana; aggravated battery on a police officer; battery on a police officer; disorderly conduct; resisting or obstructing an officer; and destruction of property.

During the preliminary hearing, before Carrizozo magistrate S. M. Ortiz, charges against James Lisawyer, 20, also known as David C. Carom, were reduced to a misdemeanor charge of possession of a controlled substance. The original criminal complaint had charged him with possession and intent to distribute.

Since a preliminary hearing is not required in misdemeanor cases, Lisawyer was excused from the courtroom to await disposition on his case.

Because of the absence of her attorney, Bruce Stafford, at the first part of the preliminary hearing, held the week before,

a new hearing will be scheduled for another defendant, Julie Keller, 20.

A separate hearing is also to be scheduled for the fourth defendant, Julie Floreth, 19.

Ruidoso Police patrolman Gordon "Skip" Hazel testified Thursday about his participation in the arrests. He said he and Ruidoso detective Jim McCullough were conducting surveillance work at the Mitchell Motel, when Bishop and the two women left the room. Lisawyer had been arrested earlier in the evening.

Hazel said McCullough advised him to stop the vehicle carrying the trio. At that time, a scuffle broke out, during which Hazel said Bishop "put the heel of his boot in my groin."

Assistant District Attorney Jay Rosenthal questioned Hazel about his injuries, attempting to show that the officer had suffered "painful temporary loss or impairment of any bodily function of any member or organ of the body," the statutory requirement for the aggravated battery charge.

Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell, representing Bishop, questioned Hazel (and the other witnesses) closely about his authority to stop Bishop.

Hazel said he stopped Bishop because McCullough told him to do so, although neither had an arrest or search warrant,

but simply "knew one was being obtained."

Also testifying Thursday was Ruidoso Downs police officer Gene Ridgeway, who is also a medical technologist. Ridgeway performed the analysis of the confiscated drugs.

Rosenthal questioned the officer about the tests performed on the substances taken from the pockets of Lisawyer and from the Bishop vehicle. Over Mitchell's objections, Ortiz allowed a question from Rosenthal about whether eight ounces of hashish could be considered "for personal use."

Ridgeway answered that the amount, in his opinion, would indicate the intent to distribute the drug.

Carrizozo attorney Don Wall, representing Lisawyer prior to the reduction of his charges, questioned Ridgeway about his testing and subsequent report.

He cited a number of spelling errors in the report — "cannibus" for "cannabis" and "dragon" for "drug," and questioned the listing of rubber stamps, ink pads and scotch tape as "drug paraphernalia" on the report.

Wall also pointed out that his client's name did not appear on the report, which apparently mistakenly identified substances taken from Lisawyer's pockets as

having been taken from Bishop.

Wall also read from state statutes to show that hashish and LSD had been mistakenly referred to as "narcotics," by the officers.

Following Ridgeway's testimony, all attorneys were granted a recess to determine what charges were to be dropped or amended, resulting in termination of Lisawyer's hearing.

In closing arguments, Mitchell maintained that Bishop's involvement in the scuffle (and resulting battery charges) "stemmed from the illegal arrest," of his client. He said the officers "at no time had probable cause for arrest."

Mitchell also pointed out that he had asked each of the witnesses whether they had seen Bishop transfer any money or any controlled substances, and all the witnesses replied they had not.

Rosenthal told the judge he felt Mitchell was bringing up points which should be resolved in District Court, rather than the preliminary hearing, which he said was not intended "to determine finite detail."

He cited testimony by the police officers which indicated Bishop had asked the women to lock his vehicle at the time of the arrest, implying that the defendant was attempting to conceal drugs later found in the car.

Airport Commission awaiting developments

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission decided Thursday to maintain a "wait and see" attitude until Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt and Secretary of the Interior James Watt, can agree upon a procedure which will be used to select a site for a proposed jet capable regional airport.

SBAC chairman Fred Heckman said Schmitt and Watt have had several meetings, and are currently in the throes of reorganization of staff, due to the election.

"Once that's completed, they plan to start in on our problem," Heckman said. He said New Mexico State University and the SBAC have agreed to allow an impartial arbitrator to examine the benefits of locating an airport on Fort Stanton mesa as opposed to retaining agricultural experiments on the mesa.

"As long as the impartiality of this

procedure is preserved we are both agreeable," Heckman said.

The SBAC decided to postpone regular monthly meetings until further action is taken by Schmitt and Watt.

Ruidoso man accident victim

James Burleson, 28, Ruidoso, was killed in a one-car accident about 2:50 a.m., Monday on Highway 70 east of Ruidoso Downs.

The accident took place at the 266 mile marker, according to state police officer Kent Waller, who investigated the mishap. No details were available early Monday on the cause of the accident.

March building tops \$2.2 million

Building permits issued by the village of Ruidoso during March hit an all-time monthly high at \$2,228,120 in estimated cost of construction, based on \$20 per square foot.

Village zoning officer Emory Hatcher, who issues the permits, attributed the boom in construction to favorable weather conditions through the winter months, as well as the large percentage of cash buyers.

Dealing in cash "eliminates the worry of financing and high interest rates," Hatcher said. Most of the permits, he added, were for single family dwellings (SFD), rather than condominiums or commercial structures which are generally more costly to build.

The figure compared with \$1,182,040 in permits issued in March 1980. The February 1981 total was \$818,260.

Festivities will begin promptly at 1 p.m., with the Easter egg hunt for children

through age 10. The Chamber has arranged to provide 200 dozen hard cooked eggs, 125 plastic eggs with prizes inside and numerous candy eggs.

Age groups for children hunting eggs are: 0-3, 4-7 and 8-10. "We would like to thank all the local merchants who donated prizes for the plastic eggs. This really makes the egg hunt a fun event for the kids," Sandoval said.

The Easter hat contest will be held later that afternoon, with prizes donated by local merchants. First and second place

hats will be judged in three categories, funniest, ugliest and most original.

At press time, the following prizes had been donated: Smith Limited Gallery, \$25 gift certificate, Gambles, \$20 gift certificate, Village Hardware, ironstone china set, Gibson's, set of flatware and Brunell's, \$25 gift certificate.

Gordon Snidow showing in Gilcrease art institute

Ruidoso artist Gordon Snidow has been singularly honored by the Thomas Gilcrease Institute of American History and Art, Tulsa, Oklahoma, by being privileged to exhibit in retrospect, as a one man show, in the Institute from May 1 through mid-July.

An artist exhibiting in retrospect is being honored for his works, with the show to include examples of his work completed over a number of years.

"This is an honor," Snidow said, "that has been granted to but one other artist by the Institute, Joe Beeler, in 1980."

Snidow's works to be exhibited in Tulsa, include "The Sweet Talking Man," "The Bull Rider," "Sam," "Beans," "Rosebud," "Flea Bitten, but Free, Conchas," "He's No City Slicker," with these paintings to be displayed at Security Bank, Ruidoso, from today through April 17. The paintings may be viewed between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m., Monday through Friday; from 4-6 p.m., Friday from 9-12 a.m., Saturday. These paintings are in watercolors.

Ten of Snidow's paintings, to be displayed in Tulsa, will be auctioned there. A bronze, "Just A Pinch," will also be on display during the retrospect showing, with the bronze, he said, "to be displayed and sold privately, not at auction."

Snidow recently received additional recognition through the issuance of a book, "Hanging On," depicting his portrayal of

the cowboy's heritage, published by Northland Press of Flagstaff, Arizona. Copies of this publication are available in Ruidoso at the Aspen Tree, Artisan Shop and Bear Claw Gallery.

"It was when I was a youngster in Tulsa," Snidow said, "that I first visited the Thomas Gilcrease Institute. After viewing the paintings of Frederic Remington, Charles Russell, George Catlin, John James Audubon and many more, I was inspired to become an artist. It was also their paintings that inspired me to depict the American cowboy in his natural surroundings performing the myriad of mundane and unheralded tasks that was his lot in life."

To look at the art of Gordon Snidow is to look into the faces and the personalities of the modern day cow country.

It is important to this artist that his work be a reflection of his own observations, his own impressions, and his own inspiration. He has learned that you can gain insight into the nature and character of cowboys only if you can be with them in their own natural element. The individuality of the men he paints is as much a part of his work as is their physical likeness. He could grasp this quality of character and individuality in no other way than in knowing the men in their own environment; horseback and around cattle. Gordon has been there plenty of times. His are not superficial impressions.

But it's not just cowboys who can relate to the art of Gordon Snidow. Art show judges, such as those at the annual Cowboy Artists of America exhibition, make their decisions, in regard to awarding medals, on purely artistic considerations. Gordon's record of awards received is ample evidence of his mastery of the elements and technique of fine arts painting.

What he has done is strike that just right balance between fidelity in his subject matter and accomplishment in the aspects of fine art, such as drawing, color, perspective, composition and design. This is a rare combination in contemporary western art. More frequently, and particularly in cowboy paintings, an artist shows much more knowledge of his subjects than he does of the principles involved in fine painting. More pleasant perhaps, but still deficient, are those artists who have a mature control of fine arts methods, but lack understanding and empathy for their subject matter.

Gordon Snidow comes up to the mark in both respects. A drawing, watercolor, or oil which bears the distinctive Snidow signature can satisfy the expectations of a cowboy and, at the same time, appeal to the artistically discerning collector and critic.

Gordon Snidow's work is no casual endeavor in response to the demands of an

Crime Stoppers seeking killer

James A. Hayeland was somewhat of a wanderer.

A self-employed writer and photographer, Hayeland's wanderings led him to the Cristo Rey Seminary in Gallup last December, where he began doing some volunteer photography work. On the night of March 5, Hayeland dropped off some film for processing, but he never came back for the pictures. Hayeland was found beaten to death the next morning.

Hayeland's death came just one week after the body of John Bailey was found about six miles south of Gallup. Bailey had been shot with a small caliber weapon, and while investigators do not believe there is a connection between the two deaths, the possibility has not been ruled out.

Hayeland, 42, was last seen driving his 1974 light blue Ford Galaxy 4 door. The

vehicle was later found abandoned at the Cedar Hills housing project in Gallup. Hayeland's camera, carrying case, telephoto lens, and his wallet were missing. Hayeland's body was found just south of Gallup on a dirt road, about 1/2 mile west of the Continental Divide Electric Co-op substation.

This week, the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the persons responsible for Hayeland's murder. Anyone having information that would help solve the case should immediately call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-8833. Callers do not have to reveal their identities, and no attempt is made to identify the caller.

Meanwhile, Crime Stoppers programs

throughout New Mexico continue their amazing string of successes.

A tip to the Albuquerque Crime Stoppers Program resulted in the arrest of 22-year-old John N. Contreras, who was wanted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation in connection with the February armed robbery of a Bloomfield bank. Contreras, arrested at a motel on Albuquerque's Central Avenue, also was wanted in connection with five armed robberies in Albuquerque. Contreras originally was connected to the Bloomfield bank robbery through several calls to the San Juan County Crime Stoppers Program.

And a tip to the Socorro Crime Stoppers Program led to the arrest of a juvenile, who was charged with vandalism to the local cemetery. The suspect confessed to police.

active market for contemporary western art. It is a meaningful and artistic statement about a western reality; that of the modern cowboy. As such, Snidow's contribution to western art will become even more significant in the years to come, when the big ranches have been broken up, and the cowboys have all gone to work in towns.

western art is complete without a representation on Snidow's work. There is a steady quality in his art, and in fact, it evidences a continuing artistic maturity.

Gordon's subject matter is that of the modern ranching country, and of the men and boys who are as at home in a pickup truck, as they are on horseback, or in the corral.

Snidow was the first artist of this generation to deal exclusively with present day cowboys in his art. In doing so, he departed from the general course of western art, which, to a major extent, utilizes historical subjects such as wild Indians, mountain men, and cowboys of the longhorn trial driving era.

Gordon Snidow is still relatively young to have achieved the degree of acceptance and acclaim he has from both critic and collector. It is a sure bet that he will be an important name in western art for a long time to come.

The annual Cowboy Artists of America (CAA) show in Phoenix, Arizona, is the most constant and dependable indicator of the pulse of contemporary western art. CAA medal winners are among the most prominent names in the entire contemporary art field. Among these, Gordon Snidow has proven to be one of the most consistent award recipients; in not just one, but several mediums. He has, to date, won 19 CAA medals.

The World Smiles

"Smile and the World Smiles With You," the old saying goes. In the month of April, all the world smiles with a smile that grows brighter each day: and we are smiling with the fruit.

All the fruit blossoms come out to celebrate the season of new life in April. Here in the land of the White Mountain, we have a special spring spectacle, because the blossoms begin blooming in the lower country and then move up the valleys. Down at Riverside, the apple blossoms are already out; and it will be a week or so before the apples are in full bloom in the Ruidoso area, and later still on the Bonito River up past the dam.

Right now, the community of San Patricio is a perfect picture of spring — especially this year when the fruit trees are blooming almost at the same time.

The pink and silver blossoms of the apricot have turned to a more subdued color of russet and a touch of red as they protect the tiny new green apricots, rapidly growing in the mellow air. Near and across the way, the crystal white of the plum blossoms are matched off with the new green of the weeping willows; out in full leaf, and the transparent gold-green of the young leaves on the cottonwoods and the giant willows.

The foamy cascades of the pear blossoms stand like tall beacons here and there across the valley, twice the height of the other fruit trees. (All except the sweet cherry, a giant of the fruit trees.)

When you see a tree of snowy white, beautifully spaced blossoms, tall as a cottonwood, that will be the old-time sweet cherry.

The apple blossoms are just beginning to show their pink petals amid the pure crimson of the blossom buds — all matched by the "apple green" of the new leaves.

Here and yonder among all the green and white, your eye is given a sight of pure delight, and your heart gives a little leap of joy as you see the peach trees all out in their own pure shining pink.

There is something about the color of the peach bloom, and its fragrance too, that pulls the final charm to the blossom assembly that makes the whole springtime picture something loaned to us from Heaven.

Birthday Month

Of Brother John

April fifteenth will be the birthday of our brother John, John Whippo Storm, eldest of the Storm brothers. He was born in Denver, Colorado, on this date in 1907, and made the trip up to Valdez, Alaska, with our mother in January of 1909, to be with our father who had gone there the year before. John and mother arrived in the time of deepest snow, (Valdez is said to have a heavy snow fall as is found in the world.)

In October 1909 when I was born, John became my guardian and guide. When I was about two years old I remember him going back to the coal shed and filling his Mackinaw coat pockets with lumps of coal. (The coal shed was adjoined to the house.) I asked him why he was doing this and he said,

"This is to throw at the malamutes (sled dogs) if they do not get off the sidewalk."

When we went down to Hunt's Drug and Candy Store to buy taffy in three colors, chocolate, vanilla and strawberry, sometimes the malamutes would be lying on the snow covered sidewalk in their harness, and John would threaten them with his coal ammunition and shout "Mush!"; and they would get out of the way, and let us pass. I remember the sled dogs looked about the size of a large Hereford bull.

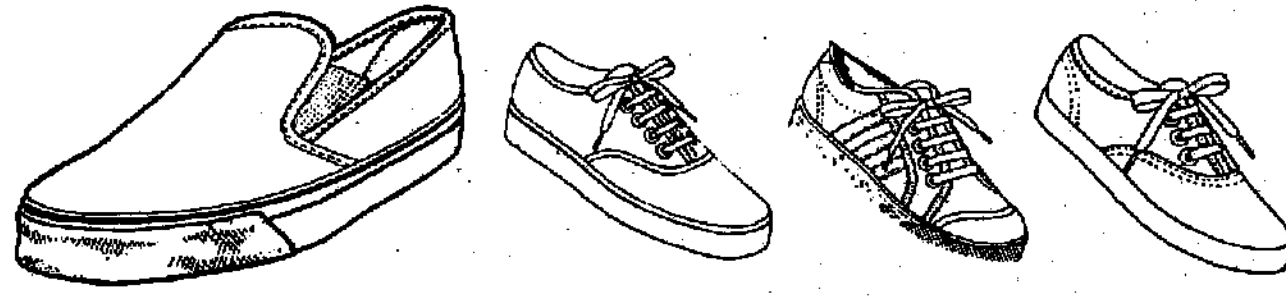

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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — What is the major requirement for greatness in a republic? The ability to collect taxes.

The thought strikes one on perusing a booklet put out by our Taxation and Revenue Department, which list 178 ways the state and local governments have of collecting money from us Simple Citizens.

Herewith, some of the gory details. The first section, called "New Mexico State and Local Taxes Paid by Individuals," contains just 21 entries, though two of these, the gross receipts tax and the state income tax, account for "great lashings of the state's dough in any year."

Others in that personal-tax category include things like property tax, motor vehicle registration fees and driver's license charges, with which we are almost all personally familiar.

There are others which do not impact on everyone.

For instance, the state charges to register aircraft and snowmobiles, taxes the use of hotel and motel rooms, and even follows us beyond the grave with its estate tax.

But that is as nothing compared to what is done to business people in New Mexico. They face a barrage of at least 40 separate forms of taxes, many of which they pass on to the gullible public.

In that category are things like cigarette taxes and liquor taxes and automotive excise taxes, which we actually end up paying.

Some, like a tax on railroad private cars, would not appear to be red hot sources of revenue for government. The parimutuel tax, however, grows greater and more important each year.

If you wonder why the oil and gas industry contributes so much to the welfare

of the state — in most years, it pays 40 percent or more of the cost of government — it's because of the many ways in which the people are forced to pay in: a natural gas processors tax, an oil and gas ad valorem production tax, an oil and gas conservation tax, an oil and gas emergency school tax, an oil and gas production equipment ad valorem tax, and oil and gas severance taxes.

What's more, there are 87 kinds of business and occupational license, permits or other fees charged those who want to do business here.

Most people don't know, for instance, that attorneys pay an annual licensing fee, as do physicians, polygraphers, private investigators and thanatopractitioners (once known as undertakers.)

Finally, there are 30 categories of special agricultural taxes, license, permits and fees to be charged. Did you know you had to pay to keep bees in a commercial apiary, for instance? Did you know every hog in your county is assessed a tax? Did you know you need a license to sell eggs?

Put briefly, almost every time there is a commercial transaction, there stands the State of New Mexico, sometime backed up by the Courthouse, to take a cut of whatever bucks change hands. Seldom in this vale of tears are you far from the last or the next tax payment, which can range from as little as a penny of each thousand dollars worth of assessed valuation to an excise tax which adds 2 percent to the cost of your shiny new car.

Strangely enough, this booklet does not anywhere list the existence of marriage licenses. Are they letting us do that for free these days?

ON COUNTERFEITING

The reason counterfeiting is a crime is that each new counterfeit dollar ever so slightly reduces the value of each "real dollar." Counterfeiting is theft, it steals from us a portion of the purchasing power of every dollar in our possession.

Creation of new money by the federal government, with nothing to back it up, is also theft, and for the same reasons as counterfeiting.

We continue to face runaway inflation, and no wonder. Congress has balanced the federal budget only once in the past 20 years. In fact, since 1975, Congress has spent 30 to 60 billion dollars per year more than it has taken in.

When the federal government has a deficit, it still has to pay its bills. Unlike us, when we run short we borrow, reshuffle or plead for a little more time, the federal government simply "creates new money."

Instead of simply printing more currency, it does what amounts to the same thing in a much more sneaky way.

First the U. S. Government "sells"

government securities to the Federal Reserve. Next the Federal Reserve "pays" for these securities by making a "deposit" in the name of the U. S. Government in a Federal Reserve Bank. Then, as the federal government needs money, it simply writes a check on its Federal Reserve account to cover the deficit.

Thus new dollars are created, literally "out of thin air" and pumped into the already "overburdened" economy. Of course, these new dollars are not backed by gold or silver.

The result, every dollar which existed prior to the creation of the new money is worth proportionately less.

Perhaps a solution to this abominable inflation would be to give some of these elected politicians a taste of medicine they would understand, charge them all with counterfeiting and let them serve an elongated period of penal servitude for the perpetration of this foul deed. — Ray Freedman, The Curry County Times, Clovis

OUR RAILROADS

The Association of American Railroads has been encouraged by the second report of a study being conducted by the Department of Transportation (DOT) to determine a fair allocation of highway building and maintenance costs.

The study is significant because it recommends that those who cause the most wear on our highway system pay a proportionate share of their costs. This recommendation — if implemented — would mean increases in taxes for truckers.

One of the statistics cited in the study is a General Services Administration estimate that a heavy truck does damage to a highway equal to that of 9,600 automobiles. In short, it's the heavy trucks that do so much damage.

The railroads of the nation have long complained that, since they must maintain their own roadbeds and tracks, while the

public was paying most of the cost for highways utilized by truckers, they were up against unfair competition. They have been right but little has been done to alleviate their plight.

Now the second part of the continuing DOT study indicates it's time to ask truckers to pay more of their share of the wear caused on United States highways. This would, presumably, increase trucking costs. It might also lessen the tax load for highway construction and maintenance for the average citizen.

No person can determine just where the line should be drawn in this complex field. But it's probably right to say that with today's need to keep our railroad beds in good condition, and our railroads also, which often offer the most economical form of transportation per mile, cost allocations for our highways should be readjusted. — The News, Santa Rosa

Patrons of the Ruidoso School District will be asked, May 12, to approve a bond issue approximating \$2.5 million.

Based on the district's annual growth, school officials have stated there is a need for a new high school building, plus additional classrooms in the other schools, to maintain present educational levels — levels that have been assessed by state school officials as outstanding.

Unlike the village's \$1.67 million bond issue, the cost of which will be offset by increased valuation, resulting in no tax increase, the cost of the school bond will cause an increase in taxes.

However, if voters approve the school's \$2.5 million bond issue, bonding the district to the maximum allowed by law, then the school is eligible for several million dollars in state funds that do not have to be repaid.

State funding, amounting to free money for the district, is available to aid school districts in need of more educational facilities than the district can finance.

Therefore, if school district patrons will approve the \$2.5 bond issue, and make the district eligible to receive free money, totalling perhaps six or eight million dollars, to provide students with the best education possible. It seems as though it's a fair trade. — CD

Way to plant, ladies ... keep digging ... the more oaks the merrier.

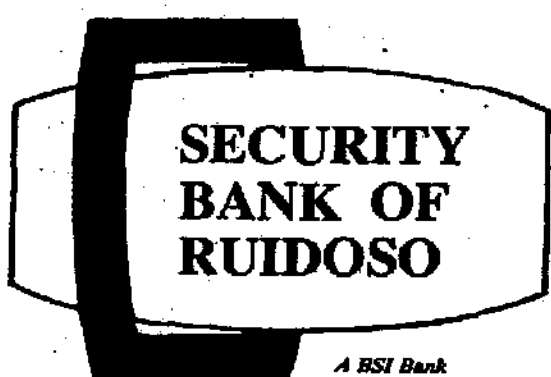
HANG TOUGH, LIVERS

It was Monday afternoon, January 5, 1981; two Idaho Fish and Game Officers, Wilson C. "Conley" Elms (34) and William H. "Bill" Pogue (50), were investigating a report of illegal trapping in the remote mountains of southwestern Idaho on information received from an area rancher.

The two officers were aware of the potentially dangerous situation as they entered the camp in question. Upon contacting the alleged violator — Claude Dallas, the officers removed visible sidearms from both him and a witness, unloaded the weapons, and returned them.

The officers determined Dallas did indeed have a hidden hide in his possession, allegedly taken before the season and informed him they intended to seize the pelts and arrest him for illegal possession. At this point, Dallas drew a concealed .357 handgun from underneath his coat and emptied the revolver at both officers.

Both officers fell to the ground, mortally wounded. Dallas then obtained a small caliber rifle from his camp and shot both officers in the head.

Dallas and the witness then attempted to load both bodies onto a pack mule to transport them to the witness' vehicle. Because of Elms' size they were unable to do so and disposed of his body in the South Fork of the Owyhee River. Pogue's body was then taken by vehicle to a small town about 60 miles south, transferred to

another vehicle, and Dallas disposed of it somewhere near the town of Paradise Junction, Nevada.

Dallas was then taken by a friend into the rugged mountains of northern Nevada and was last seen heading into the mountains on foot.

The killer, Claude Dallas, is still at large. And, according to authorities in that area, Dallas will be extremely difficult to apprehend because he knows that rugged back country of caves, canyons and mine shafts, "like his own living room."

Even though Dallas had been arrested for a draft evasion in the early 1970's, and had jumped bail on a Nevada trapping violation last year some of these locals that knew Dallas said, "He was as fine a man as you'll ever meet," and "He doesn't have an enemy in the valley."

Just as ironic, residents of McDermott, Nevada, who knew Dallas are openly rooting for him to escape.

Two Game and Fish Officers are dead, killed by a man that faced a misdemeanor charge and a possible fine of \$300.00, and people are rooting for the murderer's escape.

Is it any wonder that those who wear the badge and gun sometimes wonder if it is worth it for a frustrating and often thankless job.

My hat is off to ALL law enforcement officers, ... and their families.

The median price of existing homes rose 11.4 percent in January to \$84,500 from \$75,900 a year earlier, according to Dr. Jack Carlson, executive vice president and chief economist of the National Association of Realtors.

"The media price of an existing home increased \$1,500, or 2.4 percent, from \$63,000 in December," Carlson said. "However, this increase may be largely due to seasonal factors."

He noted that the 11.4 percent increase in existing home prices was slightly lower than the 11.7 percent rise in consumer prices in the corresponding period.

The combination of rising prices and high mortgage interest rates," Carlson said, "is causing major affordability problems for American homebuyers, whose income is growing slower than the rate of inflation."

As a result, January existing home sales were down 19 percent to 2,580,000 units on a seasonally adjusted annual basis, compared with a year earlier, he said. January 1980 sales were 3,210,000 units.

"Resales in January were 11 percent

lower than the revised December rate of 2,910,000," he said, "and down 21 percent from the 1980 peak of 3,280,000 units last September."

He added that the January resale figure represents a 32 percent decline from September 1979.


All four regions of the country experienced declines in resale activity in January, with decreases heavily concentrated in the Northeast and the West.

Resale activity fell 22 percent in the Northeast to 320,000 units from the revised figure of 410,000 units in December.

This was closely followed by an 18 percent decline in the West where sales declined to 450,000 units in January from 550,000 units the preceding month, he said.

Carlson pointed out that interest rates should ease slightly by summer, bringing an improvement in existing home sales.

"However," he said, "without tax relief to stimulate savings and investment that is tied to federal spending reductions, inflationary expectations will increase and interest rates will be higher again next year."

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Maya civilization being researched

For almost a century, investigations of the ancient Maya civilization of Central America have intrigued and baffled scientists, but research by a University of New Mexico (UNM) anthropologist is expected to shed new light on the Maya culture and may contribute to enhancement of food production on tropical wetlands.

Dr. Peter Harrison, an adjunct associate professor of anthropology, has received a \$100,000 National Science Foundation (NSF) grant to study ancient agriculture in Central America in an attempt to dispel some of the mystery of ancient Maya economy and population.

Harrison, geographer Bill Turner of Clark University in Massachusetts and three UNM graduate anthropology students are currently working at a site in northern Belize (formerly called British Honduras) on the east coast of the Yucatan Peninsula.

"They are examining an ancient raised agricultural field in a swamp near Kokeal, a large Mayan site. Harrison and Turner did ground investigations of swampland agricultural sites spotted by aerial radar during preliminary research funded by the National Science Foundation in 1979.

"The 1979 pilot project," Harrison said, "had the purpose of determining whether the now controversial lines in the vegetation spotted from the air did in fact relate to an agricultural system. The results of that investigation were positive and enough evidence was retrieved to demonstrate the direct relationship between aerially visible lineations and raised fields surrounded by canals on the ground."

He said the raised fields were clearly agricultural in purpose and seemed to date as early as 150 B.C.

The importance of that information, Harrison said, is that the only previously known system of food production available to the Mayans has been a method called "slash-and-burn."

"This system required little labor on the part of the farmer and in modern times it has served well for a head of a family to produce enough food for his dependents by working only part of the year," he said. "The system is such that it requires the use of a great deal of land for support of a single family, however, and this land is constantly shifting so that the soils do not become depleted and that the crops continue to produce sufficient food. The system is widely practiced throughout Latin America today despite the pressures which are produced between population and land use."

"But the slash-and-burn system cannot be made compatible with the apparent numbers of the ancient Mayan population, judging from the sizes and numbers of living sites," Harrison said.

Traditionally, archaeologists have said the Mayan population was not as big as the architectural remains would suggest and that the large sites were not cities but ceremonial structures inhabited only during special occasions by priests and the royal elite.

"For lack of clear evidence of any other system of food production, this backwards explanation had to suffice," he said. "Ten years ago the first traces of the needed evidence began to be observed by

researchers in the southern portion of the Yucatan Peninsula."

Evidence of agricultural terraces on hill slopes and the discovery of raised fields throughout the Maya lowlands led Harrison and Turner to conclude that the Mayans had an intensive, year-round agricultural system capable of supporting large cities.

"We hope that the new understanding we will gain of the ancient Maya food production system will contribute to the contemporary understanding of agricultural exploitation in tropical wetlands," Harrison said. "This aspect of our research could well make a contribution to food production in similar environments."

He said despite the preliminary investigations done by himself and Turner, many questions remain and new questions have arisen.

"For instance," Harrison said, "when was this agricultural system introduced and what kinds of crops were grown and how large a population could such a highly intensive system support?"

To help answer those questions and others, Harrison and Turner are being aided by an interdisciplinary team of archaeologists, ecologists and geographers as well as graduate students assembled from UNM and six other universities.

Soil experts are examining the sedimentation of the Belize swamp where the field research is underway to look for differences and similarities of surrounding soils in an effort to reconstruct the history of the use of the swamp as well as to study water level changes. Shellbearing life forms will also be studied along with ancient and modern pollen to assist in identifying ancient crops grown there.

"Archaeologists are studying settlement patterns around the swamp area and away from its borders to detect any differences that might indicate specialization of settlement nearby," he said. "Excavation is aiding us in dating the use of the raised fields and the span of such use."

Remains of the ancient Maya civilization sprawl over parts of five countries and are best known to tourists by the elaborate temple and palace structures that rise from the jungle lowlands of Guatemala and the arid flatlands of the Yucatan Peninsula in Mexico.

"However, the ancient Maya were far more prolific than these few well known and popular attractions suggest," Harrison said. "Smaller sites of less spectacular features of art and architecture are scattered almost continuously through the lowland regions of Guatemala, Belize, the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico and parts of northern El Salvador and Honduras."

UNM anthropology department chairperson Jeremy Sabloff said the research is a pioneering effort that will

change very basic and long-held conceptions of Maya civilization.

"It gives UNM an important opportunity for graduate study in the Maya area," Sabloff said. "It reinforces a great program here which has a strong emphasis on Meso-American study. This department has a strong Latin American component in archaeology and anthropology."

thropology."

He said even with the current federal budget tightening, NSF thought the Mayan project was important enough to give it major funding.

Harrison and Turner are the authors of the first major book on new views of Mayan agriculture which was published by the UNM Press in 1978.

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I read a piece you did on hibernation of bears, and since then, I've wondered what happens to turtles, such as snappers, during winter. Some say they burrow in the mud, but where? And how do they breathe?

I suppose these questions aren't worth a great deal of effort, but if you know this answer, I'd be interested in hearing it. Tammy S., Iowa

Dear Tammy — Your question intrigued me. I guess I always assumed they burrowed in the mud, but then, the question of breathing was baffling.

Finally, after some page turning, I found the answer.

It seems that a number of amphibians and turtles bury themselves in the soft mud bottom of their home waters in autumn where they remain until spring. During this hibernation period, they do not breathe air through the lungs. All necessary oxygen is taken in through the skin. Since they do not eat, the body is nourished by stored body fat. The body temperature remains only a little above the medium in which they are buried. Although they can approach temperatures which would freeze them, death will occur if the heart freezes.

On the other side of winter, in warm, near tropical areas many amphibians bury in a moist place to pass the hottest part of the year. This is known as aestivation.

TIP FROM READER — Camping in a snow covered world or following a drenching rain could prove to be an exasperating experience if you don't know where to find dry firewood. The beginning camper might believe dry wood under such conditions would be impossible to come by, but not so.

Standing trees, particularly evergreens, most always have some dead branches and limbs. The lack of green needles on an evergreen branch will pinpoint it as dead. It will be a prime source of seasoned and dry firewood.

To start the campfire, break off small, dead branch tips to use as tinder. Once this is going well, add the larger branches and limbs. Don W., West Virginia

Focus on Small Business

by E. Maine Shafer

Dear Mr. Shafer:

I understand that the U. S. Small Business Administration, in an effort to cut red tape and speed guaranteed business loan proceeds to businesses, has worked out a better system with some banks. What is this system?

It's called the Lenders Certification Program. Under it, certain financial institutions can make a number of final — and I emphasize the word, final — decisions on the processing, administration and liquidation of small business loans made by banks and then guaranteed by SBA.

This type of action is possible through a 1980 law that empowers SBA to streamline its guaranteed loan procedures by delegating limited decision authority to selected, qualified financial institutions. SBA had followed such procedures with 250 banks on a pilot basis; the 1980 law officially authorized the program.

To speed up service to small business, SBA is establishing three levels of private sector lending partners:

— Regular participating lenders, either

banks or non-bank lenders that have executed a guaranty agreement with SBA but are involved in relatively few loans;

— Certified lenders, relatively active banks or non-bank lenders that have signed the standard guaranty agreements with SBA. These include lenders that participated in SBA's pilot 250-bank certification program.

— Preferred lenders, highly active and reliable lending partners that have performed satisfactorily in the Certified Lenders Program.

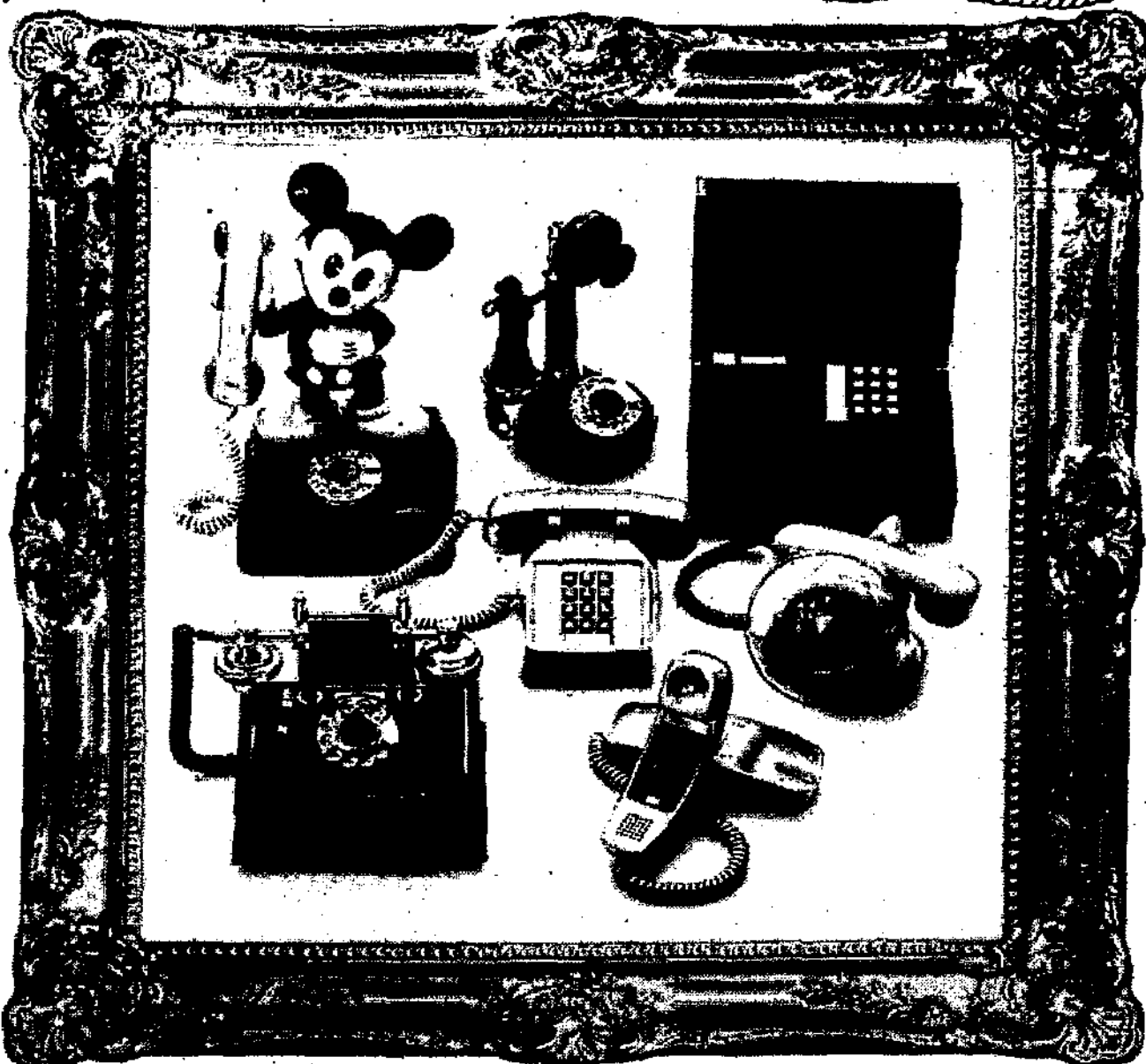

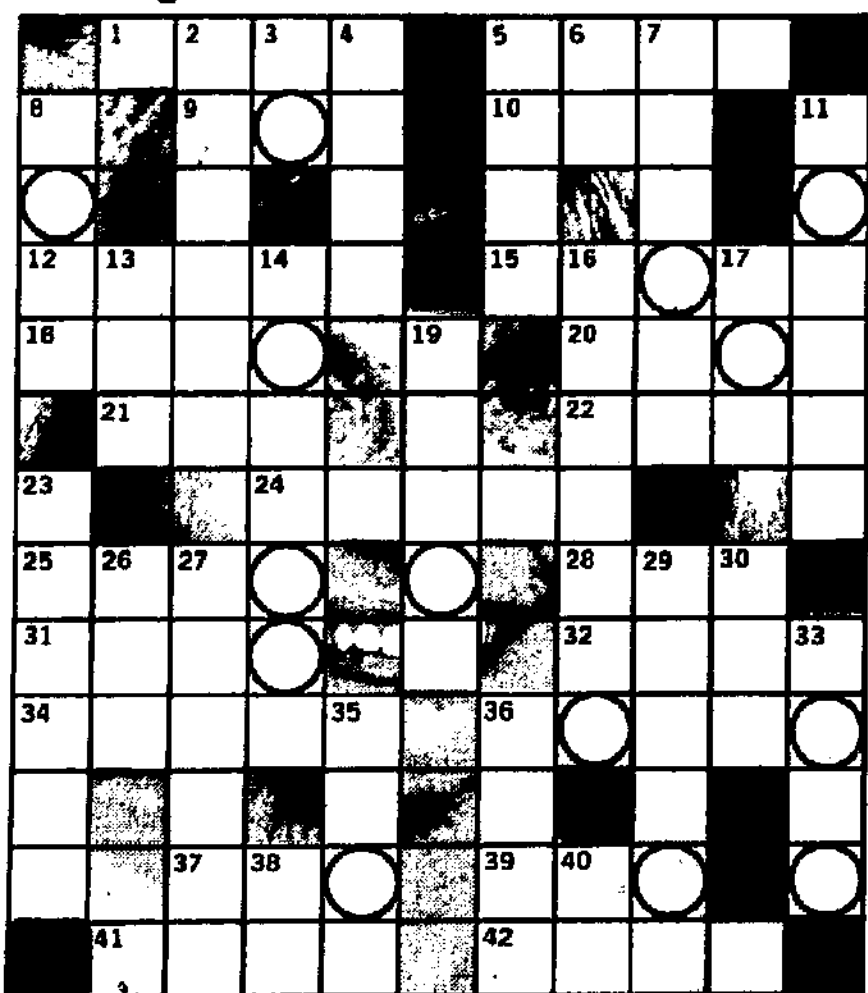

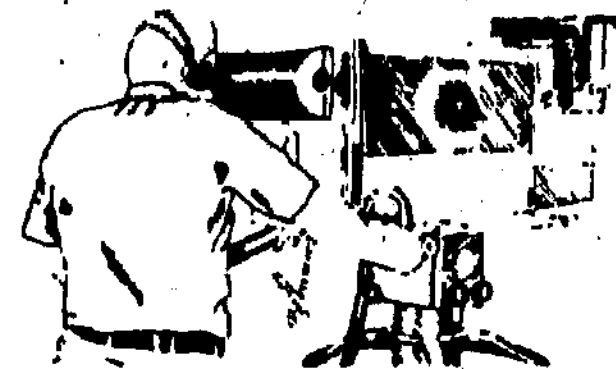

TELE Pulse

Every week this column reviews the merits or demerits of a network series, miniseries, movie or special. More importantly though, we'd like you, the viewer, to get involved with the column by sending in your opinion about a certain show so we can register your tele-pulse. We'll pass on some of the more interesting comments to the network honchos in New York.



MASADA

There were those in the industry who felt that the miniseries as an artform was virtually dead, but those doomsayers were knocked for a loop when NBC's "Shogun" and ABC's "East of Eden" achieved superlative ratings. 'Tis a shame that the networks can't offer us more miniseries during the course of the TV season, for most of these small-screen epics are handled with as much tender loving care as the big-budgeted major motion pictures. Such is the case with this week's telecast of "Masada," which some people have dubbed the real 'Jewish Roots.'

"Masada" is not a biblical story, in that it took place after the Romans had conquered Jerusalem, destroyed the temple and ruled all of Israel except for a small piece of land in the southeast province of Judea (which is still a focal point of contention even today). There, a ragtag band of fiery Jewish Zealots and a flock of ultra-religious Essene Jews meshed to defend and harass their Roman oppressors. The Romans, under the supreme command of General Flavius Silva, marched to Judea to rid themselves of these fanatics only to be stifled by the desert heat and the Zealots' encampment on the fortress-like mountaintop called Masada. It's a compelling tale of treachery and counter-treachery which ultimately asks the question—Does might make right?

"Masada," penned for TV by Joel Oliansky, captures the imagination with its Cecil B. DeMille-like proportions. You have to see it to believe it. And the performances, rendered by the assembled international cast, are probably the best you will ever see on the small screen. Peter O'Toole, who portrays Flavius Silva, gives his best performance since "Lawrence of Arabia." He literally dominates every scene. His antagonist, Eleazar, played by Peter Strauss, is almost every bit as good. Strauss thrives on roles which seem to have an anti-establishment theme, with this particular part adding extra fervor to his repertoire. There are other fine performances by Barbara Carrera, Silva's Jewish mistress, David Warner as Silva's nemesis Falco, and Anthony Quayle as Silva's brilliant siege strategist Rubrius Gallus.

I could go on and on about this visually spellbinding production, but that wouldn't be fair to you. See it; let it affect you. And then, perhaps, try and tie a parallel between the events at "Masada" and contemporary history. You might come away with a better understanding of Middle Eastern politics.
