The Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet at 4 p.m., Friday at the municipal building.

The only agenda item will be the question of providing water to the residence of Tim and Carlene Wadley and a Christian fine arts camp complex, to be located on the same property, just outside the village limits.

Rotary members expressed thanks to White Mountain Search and Rescue for providing parking lot control.

Commission tables EMT request

Lincoln County Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's) again met with county commissioners Tuesday, requesting a position be created for a parttime county ambulance coordinator.

Presenting the request, a job description and a recommended candidate for the position was Michael Carbuto, Alto, president of the Lincoln County EMT Association. He asked that a qualified person be hired as of July 1, 1981, the beginning of the fiscal year, on a pay scale of \$15 per hour.

The EMT's hope that hiring of a coordinator will help alleviate past problems in the association, as outlined to the commissioners at an earlier meeting.

At that time, the EMT's asked for a coordinator with a medical background who could review and critique runs made by the ambulance personnel, to take disciplinary action when necessary and to set protocols for EMT's.

As presented at the Tuesday meeting, the EMT's suggested that the coordinator should meet with the approval of the commissioners, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital staff as well as the board of directors of the county EMT Association.

The coordinator would assist the EMT's in advancing their skills, provide liaison among the communities, medical staff, EMT's, law enforcement and the commissioners.

The coordinator would also provide advice to EMT's in the field by means of a county radio, make spot checks on ambulance runs and keep the EMT's updated on current qualifications.

Carbuto said the coordinator would sit as a member protem of the EMT board, review runs and have the authority to intervene and manage inter-community conflicts to assure professional management of emergency patients.

Ron Beike, a registered nurse currently employed by Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, was recommended for the position. He is to be certified as an EMT in May, Carbuto said.

Although he is working fulltime at the hospital, Beike said his employers would support his appointment to the other position. Beike works a night shift and his "days are fairly free," he said.

Carbuto said the position would probably involve about 30 to 40 hours the first month, to establish the program, and 16 to 20 hours per month after the first month.

The commissioners tabled the matter and agreed to reconsider the request in upcoming budget hearings.

The commissioners also held a public hearing on subdivision regulation changes, and approved all changes with one exception.

A proposal that a county employed

engineer be required to physically verify the location (outer boundaries) of any newly submitted subdivision was deleted from the list of changes.

Under the new regulations, subdivision plat filing fees were raised from \$100 plus \$2 per lot to \$1,000 and \$20 per lot. In addition, paving of subdivision roads with "plant mixed bituminous pavement" will be required for Types One, Two and Three subdivisions.

The regulations will also require soil surveys and community water systems for some subdivisions, and computer printouts detailing the mathematical boundaries of each lot in proposed subdivisions.

In other business, the commissioners: — Approved the state's annual distribution of fire department funds, including \$24,413 for the Fort Stanton

Downs tables out-of-village water service

Without taking any official action, the Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday continued a discussion of a request for water service to a residence and planned Christian fine arts camp to be located just outside the village limits.

The trustees later called a special meeting for 4 p.m., Friday at the municipal building, with the aim of making a decision at that time.

Tim and Carlene Wadley, members of the board of directors of Inspiration Corporation, which will conduct the summer camp, were present at the meeting to specify the type of water connections needed.

They also asked the trustees to grant them water service, and offered to deed or lease land to the village on which to locate a water storage tank.

Village attorney Richard Parsons advised the trustees of his research into the matter. An original ordinance passed in 1963 forbade the village from providing water service outside the village limits "without exception," Parsons said.

The ordinance, however, was not placed in the original codification of ordinances, he added. An ordinance amending the 1963 ordinance was later lost, Parsons said.

Further complicating the issue is the fact that the village entered into an agreement with the previous owners of the corporation's property. That agreement stated the village would provide water to

EASTER EGG HUNT BEGINS AT 1 P.M.

Saturday's fun set

An Easter bonnet contest and the annual Easter egg hunt are activities planned for Saturday's "Afternoon in the Park," to begin at 1 p.m., at Cedar Creek Picnic Area just off Mechem at Smokey Bear Ranger Station.

The events are sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's Retail Merchants Committee and will kick off with the egg hunt at exactly 1 p.m., followed at 2 p.m., with judging of the bonnet contest.

Children will be divided into three age groups for the hunt: 0-3, 4-7 and 8-11.

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said more than 200 dozen hard boiled eggs, plastic eggs and candy eggs will be hidden by various groups, including the Distributive Education Clubs of America and members of the Chamber. "We would like to encourage everyone to be there ready to go at 1 p.m., because once the egg hunt starts, it takes about five minutes to find all those eggs," Jungbluth said. "The hunt has grown in popularity every year we've had it, and we don't expect that to change this year."

Immediately following the egg hunt, families are invited to stick around for the best bargain in town. "We'll again be serving hot dogs and all the trimmings for a quarter each," Jungbluth said. "We provide the hot dog, mustard and ketchup, potato chips and attire to cook the hog dog on, all for one low, low price."

The Ruidoso High School band boosters will sell soft drinks and Jungbluth said there is "no limit to how many of anything

you can buy."

Jungbluth said a variety of games for all ages, with the reward being "a heck of a good time," are planned to take place throughout the afternoon. These will be highlighted by the egg toss, popular among "the older kids that always come," Jungbluth said.

At 2 p.m., the Easter bonnet contest will be judged. "We started this contest last Easter for the women since we have the beard growing contest in the fall for the men," Jungbluth said.

To encourage participation in this event, prizes have been donated by local merchants to be given to top two winners in three categories: most original, funniest and ugliest.

Those donating awards include: Smith Limited Gallery, \$25 gift certificate, Gambles, \$20 gift certificate, Village Hardware, ironstone china set, Gibson's, set of flatware, Brunell's, \$25 gift certificate and Ginger's Fashions, \$15 gift certificate.

Judging the bonnet entries will be Ed Hyman, owner of KRRR Radio, Ken Green, publisher of The Ruidoso News and Norman Wheeler, mayor of Ruidoso Downs.

While expenses have been kept to a minimum for the Easter celebration,

Jungbluth said costs of purchasing eggs for the Easter egg hunt, and other minor expenses which are never anticipated, have not been budgeted this year.

"We are fortunate in that we have received a break on most of our supplies from various food outlets, and of course, all our prizes are donated; we have also received a \$25 cash donation from Pritchett Construction and would appreciate any other donations we can get to cover these expenses," Jungbluth said.

Music usually provided at the Fun Day activities will be absent this year, primarily because the event is on Saturday. "Because we have relied on these fine musicians to come up and play for fun instead of profit, we were unable to get anyone to come up on a Saturday; most of the musicians we've had here on past fun days, usually moonlight at a night paid engagement, and just didn't want to make the trip to Ruidoso for a Saturday afternoon," Jungbluth said.

However, those attending will be rewarded with live entertainment from local musicians, including Shawna and Lynn Holly, who accompany themselves on guitar. "We may get others so be sure to come listen to them and show your appreciation for their efforts," Jungbluth said.

Pilot Club will host Mink Party

Three arrested in drug cases

Three persons were charged with drug offenses Thursday following two separate arrests by Ruidoso Downs Police.

David Lawrence Fryer, 31, and his wife, Diane Fryer, 28, were charged with possession of a controlled substance, to wit, marijuana over eight ounces and possession of hashish.

Downs officers obtained search warrants for the Fryer home at Cherokee Mobile Village and arrested Fryer about 11:30 p.m., Wednesday.

Assisting the Downs officers were Ruidoso Police, New Mexico State Police, and Fred Volquardsen's Security Service. A trained narcotics "sniffer dog" was used in the search, according to Downs police chief Ray Garner.

Garner said just under two pounds of suspected marijuana was confiscated, along with just under one half pound of suspected hashish. Fryer was being held Monday in lieu of \$2,500 bond, no ten percent allowed.

His wife was not taken into custody because of infant children, Garner said.

George Lore home burned

A fire, suspected to have been caused by arson, destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Lore, located near Fox Cave in the Hondo Valley, early Thursday morning. A home and barn incurred "thousands of dollars worth of damage" in the blaze according to Ruidoso Downs Police chief Ray Garner.

A nearby home was also damaged in the fire. Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso and United States Forest Service fire fighters responded to the call.

Social Security information

Are you missing out on social security checks that should be coming to you? Many people are and don't even know it. Many people believe that no benefits are payable until they reach age 65, or until they retire completely, even if they are past age 65. This is not true. Under certain circumstances, people under age 65 can be entitled to social security. Some of these people can even continue working and still draw social security checks. The prime reasons social security is available to more people are higher benefit amounts and high allowable earnings.

Retirement benefits paid under social security are higher than they have ever been. A 65-year-old worker who has had maximum earnings under social security from 1937 to 1980 would be eligible for a maximum retirement insurance benefit of \$677 per month in 1981. This individual worker would receive back his full share of FICA taxes (i.e., everything he has paid into social security) within 19 months of retirement. If this worker had at least two dependents who were eligible on his social security record, maximum family benefits would apply and we would be able to pay the family \$1,184.70 per month. If the maximum family benefit applied, the worker would recover his full employee's FICA taxes share within 11 months.

Of course, a worker doesn't have to wait until he reaches age 65. A worker can draw retirement benefits on his own record as early as age 62. A 62-year-old worker who has had maximum earnings under social security from 1937 to 1980 can draw reduced retirement insurance benefits of \$432 per month in 1981. If he has at least two dependents eligible on his record, the maximum family benefit would apply and the family could be paid \$837.80 per month.

It is apparent from these figures that more people can afford to retire. But what about the individual who wants to continue working past retirement age? Even that enterprising individual may have some social security benefits due him. Although social security was originally designed to replace earnings lost due to death, disability, or retirement, retired workers are now permitted to work, earn up to certain limits and still draw social security.

The limit for a worker attaining age 65 is \$5,500 (or \$459 per month) for the calendar year of 1981. For retired workers under age 65, the limit is \$4,080 (or \$340 per month) for the calendar year of 1981. If a worker earns less than his limit, he is due full social security benefits for the year. If he earns more than his limit, social security must hold back \$1 for every \$2 by which the worker exceeds the limit. For example: a 65-year-old worker expects to earn \$5,800 between January 1, 1981 and December 31, 1981. Since he will exceed the limit by \$100 (\$5,600-\$5,500), \$50 (\$100 divided by 2) must be held back from his aggregate total of social security benefits due between January 1, 1981 and December 31, 1981.

Using this single formula it is easy to see that a worker may continue to work, have fairly high earnings, and still draw some social security benefits.

For example, our 65-year-old worker who had maximum earnings from 1937 to 1980 is due \$677 per month in social security benefits. If he wanted to continue working, he would have to earn at least \$91,750 between January 1, 1981 and December 31, 1981 before no benefits at all would be payable. Our 62-year-old worker who is due \$432 per month from social security would have to earn at least \$14,450 between January 1, 1981 and December 31, 1981 before no benefits would be payable. If either of these workers earned less than those amounts, some benefits would be due.

Don't assume that no benefits are due you. It may pay to check with your local social security office. Back benefits are now almost entirely a thing of the past. Many benefits can only begin with the first month you file a claim for them. If you don't check with your local social security office as soon as possible, you could lose out on benefits due you. The higher benefit amounts and the higher allowable earnings, along with the restrictions on retroactivity make it very important that everyone become aware of his benefit entitlement rights. Be sure to inquire about them early and file promptly at your nearest social security office.

Many people receiving social security payments will have their cases re-examined in the near future to make sure they continue to be eligible for benefits, Don Austin, social security district manager in Roswell said recently.

Social security is required to review most disability cases at least once every 3 years starting in 1982 because of the 1980 disability amendments. The reviews are conducted to determine if a person is still disabled, Austin said.

As an important first step in making the required reviews, social security is significantly increasing the number of continuing disability investigations it makes. About 350,000 cases will be reviewed during the remainder of this fiscal year. Next year, over 500,000 cases will be reviewed.

The initial cases to be reviewed will be selected based on studies which show those cases most likely to result in recovery, Austin said. These first investigations will provide more data which should indicate other types of cases that should be reviewed soon.

Social security disability benefits can only be made to people who have a severe physical or mental impairment expected to prevent them from working for at least 12 months or more or to result in death.

Bicycle riders set 100 mile trip

The "Ruidoso Roundabout," a 100-mile bicycle tour scheduled for April 25, has been well received in the state, with 52 pre-registrations already returned, according to sponsors of the event.

The Friends of the Ruidoso Public Library, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Alpine Shifters, are co-sponsoring the event, and expect about 100 participants for the first of what they hope will be many rides.

The tour will start at the library at approximately 8 a.m., with a course which includes Carrizozo, Capitan, Lincoln, the Hondo Valley, and Ruidoso Downs.

Galen Farrington, president of the Alpine Shifters, has mapped out the 100 mile course, which was designed to include an 86 mile ride for the less fit bikers who may wish to attend the event.

Farrington said four rest stops are planned, with three for the 86-mile ride. The first is at Carrizozo, the second at Lincoln, then at Glencoe and finally at the library where the tour ends.

Each bicyclist will receive a can of fruit juice at each rest stop, Farrington said. He added the juice will be handed out by local groups in the various communities who have also volunteered to operate "sag wagons," to follow bikers to the next rest stop "in case someone has to drop out or they have trouble with their bicycle," he said.

The tour is the first of its kind in the Ruidoso area, and will hopefully be expanded to a two-day event next year.

Farrington said some bicyclists have expressed interest in riding up ski run road, but because it would be a timed event with some kind of contest, it will probably be considered for future tours.

The entry fee charged to each participant will entitle them to a custom made patch, which features the Zia sign and a bicyclist on a mountainside. The patch, designed by Sam Pilgreen, high school art instructor, will be a four-colored embroidery circular design, Farrington said.

The tour received free national publicity in the April issue of "American Wheelman," a publication subscribed to by many bicyclists. Co-sponsors also mailed flyers to nearly every New Mexico member of bicycle clubs. Many bicycle shops and clubs in surrounding states received the mailing, he added.

Entries have been received from many New Mexicans, as well as some from Arizona, California, Colorado and Texas.

Entries will be accepted through the date of the tour, and the fee is \$3.50 for the tour, or \$5 for those wishing to earn a patch sanctioned by the national bicycle organization. Entries should be mailed to: Friends of the Library, Post Office Box 2956, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

Police powers granted conservation officers

The Game and Fish Department requested legislation granting full police powers to its conservation officers to protect its officers and the public both, according to department director Harold Olson, who said a strict policy will govern officers' uses of the authority.

The legislation, passed by the 1981 Legislature and signed by Governor Bruce King, becomes effective June 19 and gives conservation officers the authority to enforce the state's criminal and traffic codes during emergency situations.

"The policy is in addition to the legislation and will further assure that our officers do not divert their attention from wildlife law enforcement and related duties into what are police functions," Olson said. "At the same time, they will be able to respond appropriately during emergencies."

He said legal and liability insurance analysts had agreed that laws limiting conservation officers' authority to enforcement of wildlife laws and a few related statutes "left the officer and the public between a rock and a hard spot. It's conceivable that the officer could be sued by a defendant for taking action in a felony or drunk driving case, or sued by the victim for not taking action."

Increased public use of the back country that conservation officers regularly patrol brings to the back country an increase in general crime, including larcenies, assaults and narcotics use. Rural areas are also popular with some wanted felons and drug smugglers, Olson said.

"The public has the right to expect a

conservation officer, if he or she is present, to take authoritative action in these cases. Officer safety is also involved; fleeing felons observe the uniformed officer only as a police obstacle. They will not take time to read the fine print on the badge," Olson said.

Game officers will use their police authority only when "confronted with an unforeseen occurrence or condition involving a threat to life, property, or public peace," according to the draft policy.

Olson said that would not include routine traffic violations but would include obviously drunk or drugged drivers, traffic accidents, or other traffic hazards. It typically would not include misdemeanors outside the wildlife laws and regulations, but would include violent crimes in progress and felony larceny or drug violations.

Signing of the bill makes New Mexico the 30th state, and ninth western state, to grant its conservation officers full police authority, Olson said. At least six other states were also petitioning their legislatures for the authority this year, for much the same reasons New Mexico did.

Conservation officers are required to complete the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy's basic recruit school — the same course given most municipal and county officers — and many also take advanced academy courses as well. All are also given an intensive, specialized course in wildlife law enforcement and are periodically brought in for in-service training to refresh and update them in law enforcement procedures and techniques.

National energy pilot program being launched

Two University of New Mexico (UNM) organizations are involved in a unique federal-state Energy Management Information System (EMIS) project that is to serve as a pilot for similar programs across the nation.

The New Mexico EMIS, being developed by the State Energy and Minerals Department (EMD), "will provide an official focal point for access to reliable and available data on New Mexico's energy resources," according to Dr. Gedi Cibas, EMD spokesman.

"The principal function of the system," he continued, "is to provide users with accurate, relevant and timely data to optimize the development and use of New Mexico's energy resources. Those resources include oil, natural gas, coal, electricity, uranium, solar, wind, geothermal and synfuels."

UNM's role in the project has involved two organizations. Both under the structure of the Institute for Applied Research Services, First, the Bureau of Business and Economic Research (BBER) has provided production, conversion, demand and economic-demographic computer models to be applied to energy information. Second, the National Energy Information Center Affiliate (NEICA) is assisting in the development and documentation of the EMIS information base.

The modeling project was recently completed under the direction of Dr. Lee Brown and Dr. Shaul Ben-David from the UNM economics department, Dr. Rodrigo Llevano from the Anderson School of Management, and Dr. Jeff Baxter from the BBER.

"New Mexico is unique in that it has so many different kinds of energy resources," said Llevano. "The EMIS system, if it works well here, will work well in virtually any other state."

One way in which the EMD is already using UNM's computer models involves a

current legislative study of the state's natural gas regulation. In 1978 the federal government extended its control of natural gas prices to intrastate trade. But New Mexico already had its own system of control under the New Mexico Pricing Act. The question arose: Should the state now drop its price controls?

There were other questions that had to be answered first: What would happen to consumer prices? State revenues? Production revenues? "Given the prior conditions — that is the conditions prior to federal control — and projecting the potential future impacts on consumer prices, state and production revenues, our models were used to predict the outcomes of all relevant options," Llevano said.

After analysis of the data, the EMD recommended to the legislature that New Mexico continue its pricing act. The state's lawmakers are presently considering that issue, but they're doing so with information that might otherwise not have been available.

"It's important to point out," Lee Brown said, "that UNM does not make any decisions based upon these models. We give our models to the EMD, which analyzes the data and then, as an executive branch of the state government, makes recommendations to the legislature."

In the future, UNM's computer models may help government organizations arrive at decisions concerning issues arising from proposals to expand energy production or generation facilities, Cibas said. Some of these proposals are contested by parties within the state who express worries about the environment, water resources, fuel costs, and the impact on employment.

The entire EMIS system is expected to be totally operational within one to three years, Cibas said. "However," he added, "significant benefits from the EMIS will be realized even during its developmental phases."

Therapist joins counseling centers

Bill Grimes, 37, has joined the staff of the Counseling Centers, Ruidoso and Carrizozo, as a therapist. He replaces Veronica Davalos, who resigned recently.

Grimes holds a bachelor's degree in English from the University of Texas at El Paso, and most recently was employed as an English teacher with a Thousand Oaks, California high school.

However, he also earned a masters degree in counseling at California State University at Northridge, and has completed an internship with a mental health clinic in the San Fernando Valley.

"This is a rather late career change for me," Grimes said, "but I've had the training and experience, and I'm looking forward to working in the mental health field."

"I find it fascinating and rewarding — I'm really excited about it," he added.

Grimes will be counseling adolescents and younger children, handling referrals from schools, the hospital and juvenile probation department. Other duties will include assisting in establishing a 24-hour helpline in the area, and coordinating the rape-crisis team.

Grimes and his wife, a medical secretary, have one son.

First aid for house plants

If your house plant is looking sick, you may need to change the way you care for them, said James R. Sals, Extension urban horticulturist for New Mexico State University.

Brown leaf tips or burned leaf margins may be caused by too much fertilizer or letting the soil get too dry. When both of these conditions are present, the damage is more severe.

Yellowing and drooping of the leaves can be caused by over-watering or tight, poorly-drained soils. Air pollution, low light intensity, and root decay due to soil-borne disease or insect pests can also cause yellowing and drooping leaves.

Too much light, lack of fertilizer, root rot or poor root systems can cause your plants to grow slowly and produce light green or yellow foliage. Sals said that when house plants don't get enough light, the leaves become smaller and smaller and the internodes, the stem between the leaves, become longer and longer.

If the leaves are small and the internodes are short, the problem is probably too little fertilizer. Too much light may cause the new leaves to curl under and be smaller in size.

To avoid these problems, Sals said to use a well-drained, loose soil mixture, allow the soil to become moderately dry between waterings, give proper light and fertilizer only once or twice each month.

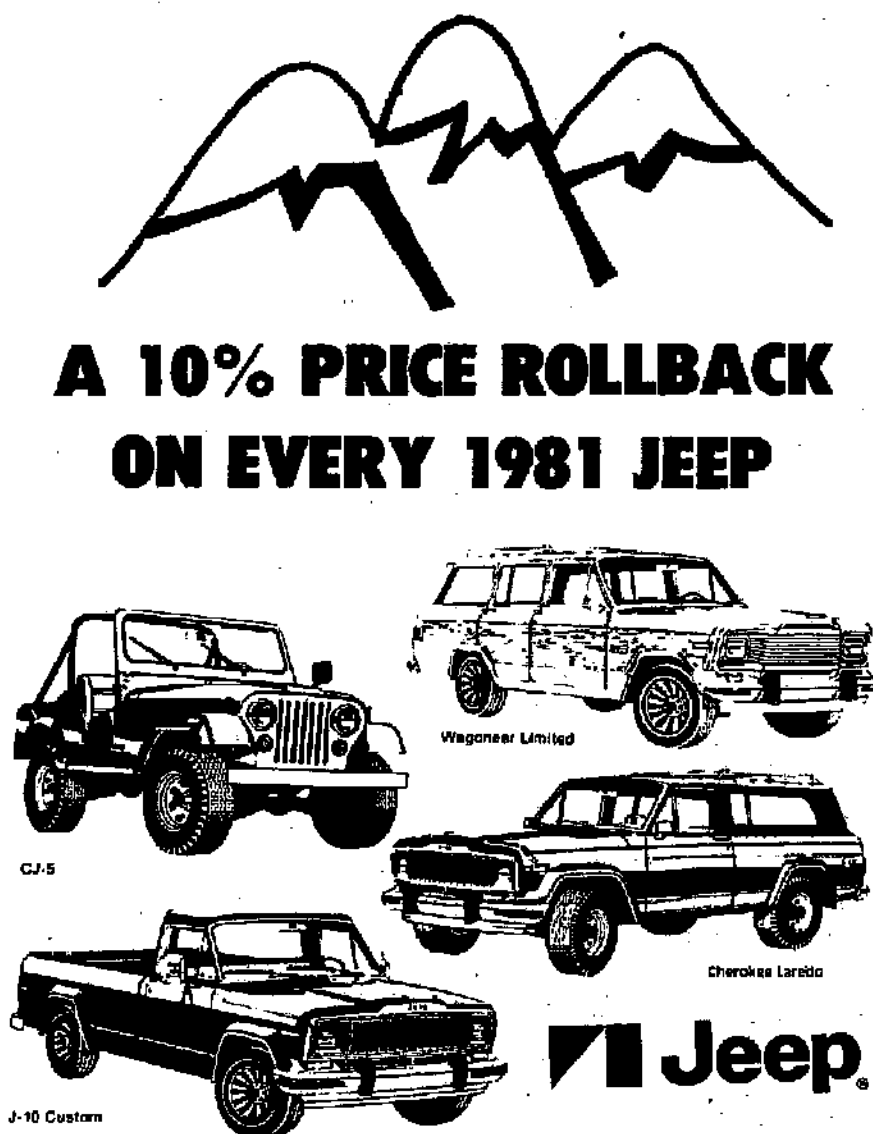
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Shane Watts wins gold medal in giant slalom

Shane Watts, a member of the Ruidoso Handicapped Ski Team, captured a gold medal in the giant slalom and a silver in the downhill and slalom, at the national Handicapped Skiers Competition in Winter Park, Colorado, which ended Saturday.

Watts, an amputee, has competed nationally four years and this year, for the first time, in downhill racing. He is the son of Judy Watts of Ruidoso.

Also competing from the Ruidoso ski team was Robert Stroschne of Alamogordo, a cerebral palsy patient and son of Ruth Stroschne.

He has also competed at the national contest four years and earned a silver medal in downhill racing and giant slalom. Stroschne also competed in downhill racing for the first time this year.

"We are very proud of both these skiers," Jeanie Culbertson, one of two coaches attending the contest, said. "These boys have been with the program ever since it started here, and we feel they did extremely well, especially in downhill racing," she said.

Culbertson and Hilde Stroebel coached the boys in Colorado. They were coached locally by Diana Person, who heads the handicapped ski program.

National competition is held each year at Winter Park, with skiers from all over the world attending. This year, Culbertson said, delegations from Japan, France, Canada and Australia attended.

"We were sorry we couldn't take the blind students from here like we usually do, but we were still very proud of the two we did have competing," she said.

Heavy fines assessed against game violators

Wildlife law violations in opposite corners of the state have brought heavy fines for two men, and a third still faces charges in one of the cases, according to the Department of Game and Fish.

One case involved allegations of trespass and illegal killing of elk near Raton. The other involved a former New Mexico resident's purchasing a hunting license legally available only to current residents.

A magistrate court jury in Raton, after debating until 2 a.m., April 3, found John J. Wyrick, 56, Albuquerque, guilty of four criminal counts and innocent of a fifth. Magistrate Glada Sanderson fined him \$100 on each of two counts of criminal trespass, \$1,000 for illegal killing of an elk and \$50 for failure to tag, plus \$10 court costs — a total of \$1,250. He was found innocent of exceeding the bag limit on elk.

An alleged companion in the case, Lynn E. Caraway, Lufkin, Texas, also faces five charges in the case — two counts of criminal trespass and one each of illegal possession of elk, illegal killing of elk and

hunting without a license. He failed to answer a summons to court, according to Investigating Game and Fish Officer Jim Yarbrough, and a bench warrant has been issued for his arrest.

The two allegedly trespassed across Kaiser Coal Co. land near Raton, illegally entered Vermejo Park Corp. property and killed one cow and one bull elk on October 4, 1980.

In Lordsburg, Magistrate Rosa Linda Salinas fined Charley Arvizo, 24, the statutory \$400 for illegally purchasing a resident New Mexico hunting license during last fall's deer season. Arvizo, a former Lordsburg resident, now resides in Benson, Arizona. He appeared in court last week.

Investigating Game and Fish Officer Ed Sanchez said he received considerable inter-agency assistance from Arizona wildlife officer John Holcomb, of Wilcox, Arizona, who helped locate Arvizo's current address.

An Operation Game Thief caller earned a \$100 reward for information that got the investigation started.

Antelope population surveys scheduled

Game management biologists with the Department of Game and Fish will begin annual antelope population surveys next week to help determine the number of hunters allowed for this season.

The aerial surveys will begin in the northeast area of the state, then move to the southeast and southwest. Each quadrant requires about a week for its surveys, depending on weather conditions, according to Jack Herring of the Game Management Division.

Each antelope management unit is surveyed at three year intervals, Herring said. Surveys are 33 percent or 100 percent surveys, always flown in the morning hours when sun from the east facilitates visibility and always by counting one-half mile to the west of the flight pattern.

A 33 percent survey is flown at approximately 200 feet, generally in flat terrain units, counting antelope in strips one and a half miles apart. "You can easily see antelope at a half-mile distance on a good day," Herring said, "and theoretically, by multiplying by three, you have a very good estimate of the antelope in that area."

One hundred percent surveys are flown

every one-half mile, counting all antelope within a half mile to the west. Those surveys are flown at about 100 feet in rougher areas, such as rolling sand hills and brush.

Annual fawn survival surveys, by which hunter numbers are determined, will be flown in July when fawns are a couple of months old, Herring said. "By that time, the fawns are old enough to run well, and most will probably survive to adulthood," he said.

Walleye spawn readied for stocking

Department of Game and Fish biologists completed the annual walleye spawn — taking operation early this week and expect an 80 percent hatch from the approximately 25 million eggs collected, according to Bob Patterson, biologist in charge of the operation.

Patterson said the spawn-taking operation ended at Clayton Lake, where about 1.5 million eggs were taken. The remainder of the eggs were collected at Caballo in southern New Mexico and Ute Lake in the northeast, where walleye populations are heaviest.

About 150,000 eggs can be contained in one quart jar, the measurement used to estimate number of eggs collected, Patterson said. Eggs, fertilized with milk taken from male walleye at the site, are taken to Rock Lake Hearing Station at

Santa Rosa. They usually hatch about 10 days after fertilization.

The parent walleye are released back into the waters.

Patterson said one million eggs will be transported this week to a United States Fish and Wildlife Service hatchery at Lake Mills, Wisconsin. Two million fry are being traded to Colorado and another million to Nevada this week.

The remainder of the fry hatched from the walleye operation are being stocked in New Mexico waters — at Cochiti, Elephant Butte, Caballo, Sumner and Ute lakes. Some may also be stocked in the lower Pecos River, according to Patterson.

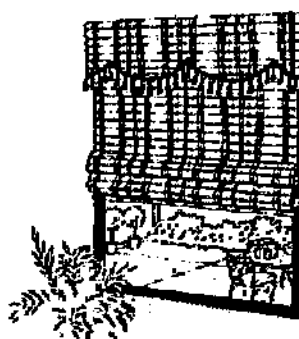
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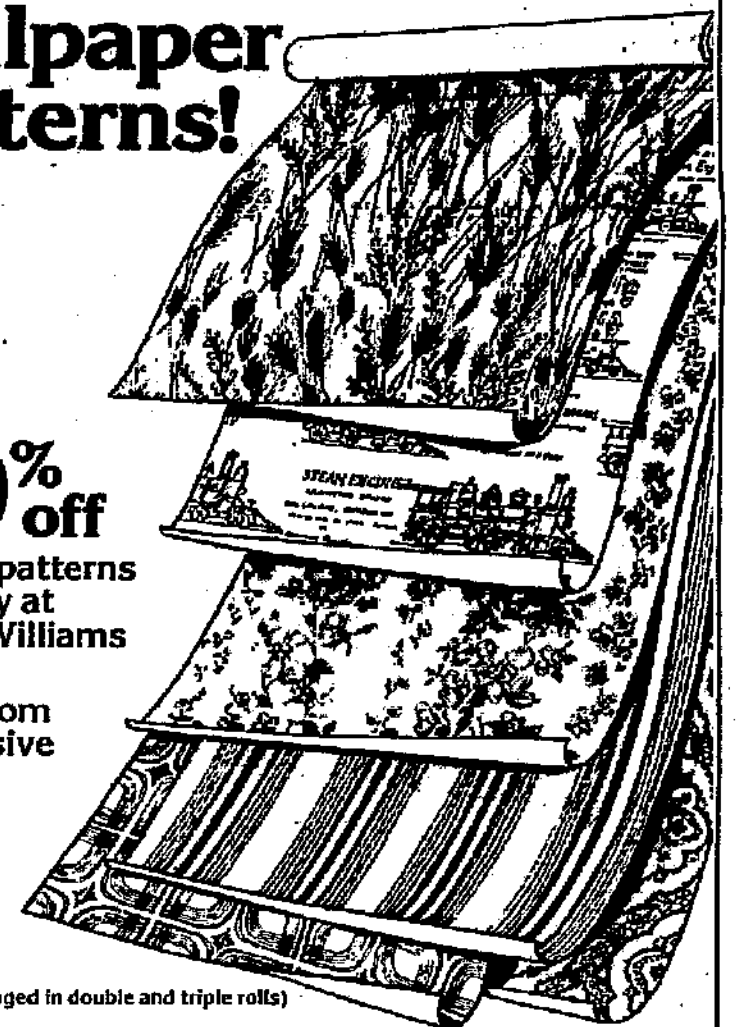

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

Trainers divided over racing yearling horses

How much is experience worth? How valuable is another race for young quarter horses?

Worth ruining him for life? Or is it really a threat at all?

If you're puzzled by those questions so are numerous horsemen and racing officials when yearling futurities are mentioned. There's really no valid answer when it comes to racing quarter horses before they have their second birthday.

"We don't recognize yearling futurities. We regard them like match races," said Tom Mercer, director of racing for the American Quarter Horse Association.

If we did recognize them if would put more pressure on them (horsemen) to run."

He added that running horses that early compounds the risk of knee or leg injuries and the risk of crippling youngsters for life increases.

Agreeing wholeheartedly with Mercer's analysis is Sunland Park Track Veterinarian Dr. William Pitt.

"I'm very much against it (racing yearlings)," he said. "I don't believe in it at all. I don't believe you should run two-year-olds until August let alone as yearlings."

Think of how many babies are ruined before they can even find out if they're any good," he said. "Their knees aren't closed. The bones aren't developed. They aren't ready to run and they'll hurt themselves."

Yearling races, however, are really no problem for Sunland Park-Ruidoso Downs Racing Secretary Donald Rausch. New Mexico regulations forbid yearlings races at recognized land of Enchantment tracks.

"Still I think it's a terrible idea," Rausch said. "There's enough races through September when they're two-years-old. I don't think their bones are strong enough. "I don't believe you can start running a horse in November and still be able to run him in the All-American Futurity on Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs."

Bobby Harmon, meanwhile, has seen racing from many angles. After spending more than a quarter-century as a stand-out jockey, he trained horses briefly before assuming a steward's position at Sunland Park.

As a rider, he didn't mind competing in yearling races.

"I rode in them two or three times in Stroud, Oklahoma, home of Midway Downs. They weren't unsafe. I didn't feel it was dangerous to ride in them," Harmon said. "Most of them were colts and the

mares were just before Christmas time. Most broke well and they didn't have any trouble."

As a trainer, he said he wouldn't have entered horses himself and probably wouldn't have run them if his owners asked his advice.

Sunland trainers ranged from completely favoring yearling races to those in between.

There's no question where Jack Brooks of Edmond, Oklahoma, is on the issue.

The past five years his horses have either won or run second in the rich Stroud Futurities. His My Paper Chase captured the \$54,948 Yearling Poor Boy Futurity last December 13. Counting added bonuses for fastest running times, the Brooks-trained earned around \$30,000.

"If it's done right, I don't think it hurts them at all," Brooks said. "The horse will tell you how he's doing. If there's any sign of trouble at all, we stop on him and have his knees x-rayed."

Brooks said his strategy is to run his yearlings in a trial and, if successful, in the futurities and then lay them off until March for some of the more lucrative races at Sunland Park.

He said with the added experience in the early winter, the horses can rest in January and February while the Oklahoma weather probably wouldn't permit training anyway.

"Since the entry fees are low, you can give them an out (as yearlings) and might pick up some money as well. You've got to have so much training in a baby. If you do it right early, it's no harder on them than if you did it later," Brooks said.

Brooks said in 10 years of following this pattern, he has incurred no problems with younger horses. "I've been real lucky," he said.

Brooks said x-rays will reveal 2-year-olds still have open knees as late as July.

But, for horses able to stand the strain of early races, the financial rewards are considerable.

Perhaps the three most prominent non-part-mutual operations with rich yearling futurities are Midway Downs, Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Oklahoma, and Val Verde Downs in Weatherford, Texas.

"The pots usually are \$50,000-\$65,000," Brooks said. "In fact, my check this year (the approximately \$30,000 for My Paper Chase) was a little smaller than in past years."

Clifford Lambert, Sunland Park's leading trainer, has mixed opinions.

"It really depends on how mature they

are, how well-developed they are. Maybe if one was born in January, — might run him," he said. "But usually it's a disadvantage. When they run real well as a yearling they don't run very long."

Is the gate and race experience important?

"Not necessarily — you can get that later," he said. "I'd advise against it." Nevertheless, Lambert trained The Walkin Boss about a decade ago, who competed in five yearling races and then competed that fall during his two-year-old campaign.

"It didn't hurt him. But how many horses are you going to find that can do that?" he asked.

New Mexico's perennial leading trainer Bob Arnett said much depends on the youngster's condition.

"Owners are in a hurry to find out if their colt can run. Some are developed enough so you can find out as a yearling. That way they're already racewise and gatewise by the time they're two. But usually a yearling's knees aren't grown together yet. Very few can come up to expectations and pass the test for running."

A two-year-old's bones aren't strong enough, but at one if they're really developed, he's got all that experience and has an advantage over all others at two," Arnett said. "But not many have their knees closed that early."

So what's the final verdict?

Perhaps Arnett summed it up best: "I wouldn't race my horse as a yearling, but everybody has their own feelings," he said.

Social Security information

A 23-year-old Plainview, Texas, man has been sentenced in the United States District Court in Lubbock, Texas, for defrauding the Social Security Administration.

According to Don Austin, manager of the Roswell Social Security office, David A. Brown pled guilty to two counts of giving false information to the Social Security Administration and concealing that he was no longer a full-time student in order to continue receiving Social Security benefits on the record of his deceased father.

Brown was sentenced to five years supervised probation and \$1,000 fine on each of the two counts.

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GOING Strong

A Series Of Firsts For A Late Bloomer.

"I shook, I was so excited," Naomi Maddox said of her acceptance as a graduate student in gerontology at age 55.

Today, a decade and a half later, Maddox, at 70 is a highly polished professional and a formidable activist for the aging.

Her activism and her work in metropolitan Atlanta, GA caught the attention of her Congressman, Elliott H. Levitas (D-GA) who selected her as his 1980 Senior Intern. Thrilled by her "reward," Maddox spent 10 days in the Nation's Capital in May being briefed by some of the nation's leading policy makers in the field of aging.

The Senior Intern program, which began eight years ago with nine interns, was designed to bring senior citizens to Washington for an intensive look at the legislation and policies which impact on older Americans.

This year 230 interns representing 45 states, including Alaska and Hawaii, attended

workshops on legislation, consumer issues, transportation, housing, long term care and medicare.

"It was exciting, stimulating and oh, I learned so much," Maddox says - vowing to use her knowledge in her never-ending quest to provide more and better services for older people.

One of Maddox's chief concerns is the need to use community resources as alternatives to nursing and retirement homes. She has, in fact, as director of the Ebenezer Adult Day Rehabilitation Center, been in charge of a demonstration project which does just that.

Funded under the program of the Medicaid Study Program, Ebenezer, one of 10 such projects in Georgia, offers a comprehensive range of services designed to assist older people remain independent.

The center provides transportation, occupational and speech therapy, medical monitoring, recreation and hot

meals. The program has so effectively demonstrated the value of such community-based services that funding will be continued indefinitely.

Even though she got into aging somewhat late in life (she had been a practicing social worker) Maddox got "hooked" when asked to direct a nursing home in Columbus, Ohio. "I didn't know nothing about old people, but I found they needed help and I was determined to do what I could."

Determination turned to advocacy, a position from which she has not retreated. "I read all the books I could find and did all that legislative jazz to make things better."

Her interest was natural then, when she heard that the University of Michigan was offering a graduate course in gerontology. She made application, never dreaming she would make it. She was one of five women and the only black.

Once she graduated, Maddox had no job. She asked a fellow graduate "to case Atlanta for me and I ended up as the first person hired for the Senior Citizens Service of Metropolitan Atlanta."

In 1976, however, Maddox was to be challenged by another "first". The executive director of the National Council on the Aging offered her a position as the first field representative for the southeastern region.

She accepted and directed the Council's Operation FIND. Funded by the Office of Equal Opportunity, this project was an effort to find, health, economic and social needs of the nation's elderly poor.

So while a late bloomer in the field of aging, Naomi Maddox has been in the forefront of the movement and her wake leaves the world better for older Americans.

Project DEEP programs open to all school districts in state

During the 1960s federal funds helped to establish a large number of school curriculum projects ranging from adult education to basic skills which are now available at little cost to school districts throughout the nation thanks to the National Diffusion Network (NDN).

In New Mexico the network is facilitated by a program in the University of New Mexico (UNM) College of Education called Diffusing Exemplary Educational Practices, or Project DEEP.

Ann Lange Atkins, director of Project DEEP, said NDN validates 200 programs nationally and exports them around the country so other schools can use them.

"The program is very well received here in New Mexico," she said. "Schools can adopt a half million dollar program for as little as \$500 to \$1000. This is especially good for rural school districts. It is one federal project that is really cost effective and we provide quality in-service training for local educators."

Funded by the United States Department of Education, NDN identifies successful school projects for inclusion in its catalog called "Educational Programs That Work."

To be validated as "exemplary," projects developed with federal funds are judged by a panel of evaluation and education experts. If approved, the programs can receive funds to help other school districts, colleges, universities and adult education programs adopt the program.

"State facilitators like Project DEEP get local educators together to help them get programs," Atkins said. "We set up the in-service training and we assist local educators in implementing the programs."

She said there have been some 150 adoptions of 30 different NDN programs by New Mexico schools.

"A program called 'Early Prevention of School Failure' is very popular here in New Mexico," Atkins said. "There are also numerous reading programs that are popular in Albuquerque such as the 'Intensive Reading Instruction Teams' and the 'Individualized Language Arts' program."

Project DEEP is working to establish a large scale program in Albuquerque called "Learning to Read Through the Arts" which would involve UNM, the Albuquerque Public Schools and city

museums and libraries. "We may have a pilot of this program this summer," she said. "It is a wonderful program that integrates the study of art with the study of reading."

Major fields which are covered by NDN projects include adult education, alternative schools, bilingual and migrant education, career and vocational education, early childhood, environmental and social science, management, preservice and in-service, basic skills, special education and special interests.

"Already NDN has improved the education of millions of students and

improved the teaching of thousands of teachers," Atkins said. "Each year more than 35,000 teachers, principals, administrators and other staff members are trained to understand and use one or more NDN projects."

She said Project DEEP identifies local programs to be evaluated for inclusion in the national network. Currently there are not any New Mexico programs in the network.

Project DEEP is located in Room 117 of the Educational Administration Building of the UNM College of Education complex.

I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

The difference between looking out the window and having looked out that same window a month ago is about the same difference as going from a black and white television set to a color one.

Despite the absence of any early spring moisture, the countryside is coming to life with a colorful variety of vegetative forms. Spring is indeed a beautiful time of the year.

Yet, spring means more than just pretty flowers and green grass; spring means life. In fact, this time of year is an extremely critical period of life for most species of plants and animals, particularly for the newborn.

The newborn of the wildlife world, so weak and so small at birth, must meet each day as a challenge for survival. Nature has a way of taking lives just as quickly as it may give them. Weather, disease, and predators all take their toll among the young of the year.

Unfortunately though, nature alone is not the only detrimental factor on spring babies. As always, man enters the picture, and usually as a villain.

It is not that man has wicked or malicious intent concerning new lives in the wild. In fact, it is often man's good heart that often leads to the downfall of

wild young animals.

As we venture forth into the wildlife world during the spring months, we will often encounter the young while it is still developing its strength and acquiring its characteristics and habits for survival.

Often, a young animal appears to be alone and helpless and our first thoughts are cuddling the poor little creature and providing it with a warm, friendly home. Yet in reality, the animal's mother watches helplessly from her spot of concealment as we steal her baby away.

The end of the story is usually a tragic one as we suddenly discover that we don't know how to care and feed for the "adopted" child. The difficult one to play a wildlife species is a mother's role.

More often than not, the young "rescued" animal will die. Or, if the animal is raised successfully, it cannot be returned to its wild state and be expected to survive.

Therefore, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish would like to remind everyone to think twice before taking young of the wild from the home, whether the "rescue" be that from abandonment or because you think the critter would make a cute little pet.

If the biological factors and moral factors are not enough to discourage the kidnapping of wildlife young, maybe the legal aspects are.

Most of the species of New Mexico wildlife are protected by law against private ownership, and violators are subject to fines and/or jail time.

Should you observe one of these spring babies that appears to be abandoned, use your better judgement and let it be.

If you are certain the young one is abandoned, leave it alone, but report it at once to a Game and Fish Officer.

Meanwhile, enjoy New Mexico's wildlife and their young, but do it at a distance. Remember, you can look, but don't touch or disturb.

SANTA FE — There are two things most people in America hate. One is change. The other is being forced to change.

That probably accounts for the bad temper shown at the annual meetings of the state's restaurant owners and hotel-motel proprietors about Les Houston, author of the much-praised plan to "reform" the state's mixed-up liquor laws. If these folks are to be believed, Houston will not only never be governor of the state of New Mexico, he shouldn't be allowed to see the light of day tomorrow morning.

He is not loved. He came along, after all, and for his purposes, not theirs, forced change on a lot of people who did not see the reason for that.

What's more, they don't see the reason now.

As time goes on, they will come to love him even less.

If his great bill, almost 100 pages in length, ever goes into effect, the wounds to these people will be even deeper than those they now bear.

If other gubernatorial candidates are not passing among the populace with their hand out, simply reminding people like these what Houston has done to them, they are simpler than this writer's observation leads him to think these folks are.

Generally speaking, this group of anti-Houston folks is divided into two groups. There are those who want to sit around and curse him (occasionally throwing Jimmy Baca's name into the mix as well), and who are plotting legal assault on the Houston liquor-control bill. They want to prove it unconstitutional, which many

attorneys insist it is. Meanwhile, they want an injunction to keep it from taking effect on July 1.

Others go another way. These are the shrewdies, who ask themselves when faced with problems in life, how they can turn this situation to their own account.

Some of them are rushing off to sell their liquor licenses before July 1.

The smart ones are buying. Let's say you can find a license that's for sale at \$300,000, which maybe will throw off \$20,000 a year in tax rebates during each of the coming ten years.

Under the Houston plan, the state will pay you \$200,000 for that license over the next decade. Meanwhile, you get whatever profit you make each year during that time, and at the end of it the State of New Mexico will be offering you a first chance at whatever kind of license they are in the mood to create then.

Not too bad for \$100,000. Houston the Hated has helped to enrich you — which is not exactly what he and his innocent supporters had in mind.

If those innocent supporters are the people he is counting on to sweep him into the governor's chair, he may find out what many have already known: A bartender can influence more votes than a minister any day.

Ah, well, it's all a part of the turmoil of living in New Mexico, one of the youngest of the nation's states and by all odds one of the most interesting.

Never a day goes by that something stimulating isn't happening.

Stick around. No matter what today was like, there'll be more tomorrow.

TO SAVE LIVES

Out of South Hadley, Massachusetts, comes the remarkable story of Clayton Smelcer. From his experience flows a series of questions along these lines:

What do you do if you see a girl fall from a horse and crack her head on a rock? What do you do if you're at a meeting and a man in the hall chokes on a piece of candy and is in danger of asphyxiation? What do you do if you see someone drowning? What do you do if you witness an accident and find a victim with a severed artery?

Smelcer says that, starting with a time in World War II when he freed a live bomb stuck in the bomb bay doors after a bombing run, he has saved the lives of 19 persons. He modestly attributes this to "being in the wrong place at the right time." Others would point out that, had he not known what to do, and done it promptly, lives might have been lost instead of saved.

This brings us to a point which for Smelcer has become a preoccupation: that everyone ought to have training in first aid and lifesaving. He elaborates thus: "First aid should be as important as reading, writing and arithmetic. The federal government makes the 'three R's' mandatory, but your most important possession is life, and next is having the education to maintain and preserve that life."

We endorse Clayton Smelcer's hard-won conviction that our educational system should provide universal training in at least the basics of first aid. His multiple chances to save lives in emergencies illustrate the wisdom of this: in each case, had he not responded effectively the victim might have died instead of being granted an extension of life. — Alamogordo Daily News

One-upmanship is the name of the game in the heavens; and with the success of space shuttle Columbia, the United States has surged ahead of the Soviet Union in the race for space supremacy.

We must now await news of the eventual use to which the Columbia will be put, with that use, assuredly to be a thorn in the side of the Soviets — and you can wager that's what they'll so proclaim.

Should the Columbia be employed in strictly peaceable pursuits, then the Russians will have no complaints coming. Should it be employed to better determine what underhanded schemes the Russians might be up to, then we'll have no complaints coming.

If the Columbia is pressed into service as a scheduled space shuttle, to man and maintain an orbiting space craft, scientists may gain greater insight into the mysteries of the universe. Just how this knowledge, if gained, will benefit our relations with the Russians remains to be seen, but if our gamesmanship is superior to theirs we'll gain stature in the eyes of the non-Communist nations in the world — which can't help but bolster President Reagan's administration.

It's for certain that the Russians won't take this standing on the ground, and ere long they'll try and duplicate this latest United States feat in space.

Playing catch up, however, won't be as face saving as the launching of Sputnik was to the Russians some 25 years ago. However, Sputnik is of no importance now, what's important is how the Columbia fares in the future and what problems might arise in dealing with the Russians as we establish the United States as the dominate force in space.

And if the end result is that Brezhnev burshes up on his diplomacy, Columbia will be worth much more to the United States than its cost. — CD

Rushing Silver wins handicap

Rushing Silver made an explosive move late in the stretch and outlasted a futile attack by Captain Double in Sunday's 22nd running of the Sunland Park Handicap.

The crowd of 3,670 launched Captain Double as an odds-on favorite in the mile-and-a-half classic which carried a total purse of \$8,675. Rushing Silver, handled by Larry Byers, got away at just over 6-1.

Rushing Silver swooped across the finish a length in front, collected \$5,205 and handed out mutual prices of \$15, \$4.80 and \$3.40. The gelding toils for W. L. And Florence Gilliam of Lamesa, Texas.

Captain Double, who was probably as much as 20 lengths off the pace during much of the race, had to be content with the runnerup purse of \$1,908. He's owned by Sam Stevens, also of Lamesa. Louie Gomez was up in a 120-pound load (three

more than the impost carried by Rushing Silver).

The mutual returns on Captain Double were \$2.60 and \$2.40. Gid's Girl, a 3-1 shot directed by Carlos Rivas, hung onto the early pace before drifting back into third place. But Gid's Girl turned in a sharp performance, hitting the tape only a neck behind Captain Double. The show payoff on Gid's Girl was \$2.80. The third-place purse was \$1,041.

Rushing Silver broke in ninth place and lagged well off the lead during the backstretch run. Gid's Girl, Queens Challenge (a 61-1 shot) and Vinton Scout (53-1) dueled for the early lead. Rushing Silver took over eighth place, while Captain Double, the people's choice, trailed the pack.

Captain Double shifted into high gear at the turn for home and began making up

considerable real estate on the rail. But just when it seemed he would slip through and take command, Rushing Silver unleashed a salvo in the middle of the track. Rushing Silver appeared to have plenty in reserve when he reached the wire.

The win was Rushing Silver's second of the year. His scorecard for 1981 now stands at 2-1-1 from five starts, good for winnings of \$8,185.

The winning time of 1:46 3/5 seconds was well off Winham Lad's track record of 1:42 flat.

The co-featured ninth race attracted attention by dint of Self Sparkling's attempt to notch his seventh straight win. But the competition was too much this time, and the gelding ran fifth. Bet On Me (\$5.40) won handily.

NO ONE CAN EVER accuse Livemup of not taking advantage of his last year of racing in New Mexico. The 11-year-old gelding scored his seventh straight triumph when he roared to a 4 1/4 length victory in Saturday's sixth race. According to New Mexico racing laws, 12-year-old horses cannot race at recognized New Mexico tracks. Livemup, who races in the \$2,500-\$4,000 claiming ranges, won his last five starts in 1980. He tallied in his 1981 debut on April 4 by 4 1/4 lengths. He's a sprinter who likes to be in front throughout. Owned by Jack Marsh of Ruidoso and trained by Melvin Paul, he was ridden by Jack Wallace in Saturday's races. His other wins were guided by Danny Summerow (three), Don Howard (two) and Pedro Benitez (one). Last year, he tallied seven wins in 13 separate appearances for earnings of \$12,322. Surprisingly, Saturday's win was only the second time in seven wins he was not favored by the wagering public. He was a strong second choice and returned \$7.60 for his second straight 1981 victory.

SELF SPARKLING, meanwhile, failed in his attempt for a seventh straight win. The five-year-old gelding finished fifth in Sunday's ninth race as Bet On Me won by 2 1/4 lengths in the 5 1/2 furlong dash for allowance runners. Self Sparkling, owned by Wood Craig of Sunray, Texas, and Johnnie Jamison of El Paso, Texas, and trained by Jamison was ridden by Harla Webb, who was seeking her fourth straight triumph on the Sparkling Native gelding.

HARRY HENSON, who completed his 20th year as the public address announcer over the weekend at Sunland Park, has left for Los Angeles, California. The veteran race-caller will begin his 23rd season as track announcer for Hollywood Park. The Inglewood, California, plant will begin its summer meet on April 24. When Hollywood closes in late July, Henson will return to Del Mar where he also calls the races. Henson, one of the country's best race callers, has called races involving such thoroughbred greats as Spectacular Bid, Affirmed, Riva Ridge, Quack, Ancient Title, Crystal Water and Seattle Slew.

APPRENTICE JOCKEY John Baca was excused from his five mounts on Saturday to have his hand checked by a local physician. Baca injured it earlier in the week, but rode on Friday's Sunland program. It began hurting him so he asked and received permission from the Sunland stewards to take off his Saturday mounts to have it examined.

THREE HORSES won their career debuts on Friday's program. Truckle Wine (\$13.60), owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, won the third race by a nose; New Billy Two (\$9.40), owned by John Clemmons of Kenna, took the sixth by a nose and Bara Lass (\$14.20) with lessee Cleber Massey and lessor Sam E. Stevens of Abilene, Texas, prevailed in the eighth by 3 1/4 lengths.

JACKIE KEVIN SCHOLL was thrown from his mount, Shawnees Best, soon after the start of the third race on Saturday. Scholl escaped injury and walked back to weigh out. The 2-year-old colt, making his lifetime debut, was also apparently unharmed by the shaky start. The colt is owned by Alice D. Lowrance of Ada, Oklahoma. **SUNLAND PARK PATRONS** let out a huge roar when it was announced Bold Ego won the \$225,000 Arkansas Derby Saturday at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas. "It seemed like half of New Mexico was in the winner's circle after the race," said Oaklawn track announcer Terry Wallace. Bold Ego, owned by the Double B

Ranch of Anthony, and El Paso surgeon Dr. Joe Kidd, is a local product who captured the 1980 Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park as well as the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. In leading throughout Saturday to score a 1 1/4 length verdict in the mile and 1/8th chase, his early fractions were 23.2 for the quarter, 47.1 for the half, 1:11.2 for the 3/4th and 1:37.1 for the mile before getting a 1:50 2/5 final reading. He earned \$137,160 for the win to boost his 1981 earnings to \$205,590 on three wins in five outs. A year ago, he won seven with one third in eight runs for \$176,586. Overall, his record is 10 wins and one third in 13 outs for winnings of \$342,676. It's probably on to Louisville, Kentucky, and a May 2 date in the Kentucky Derby.

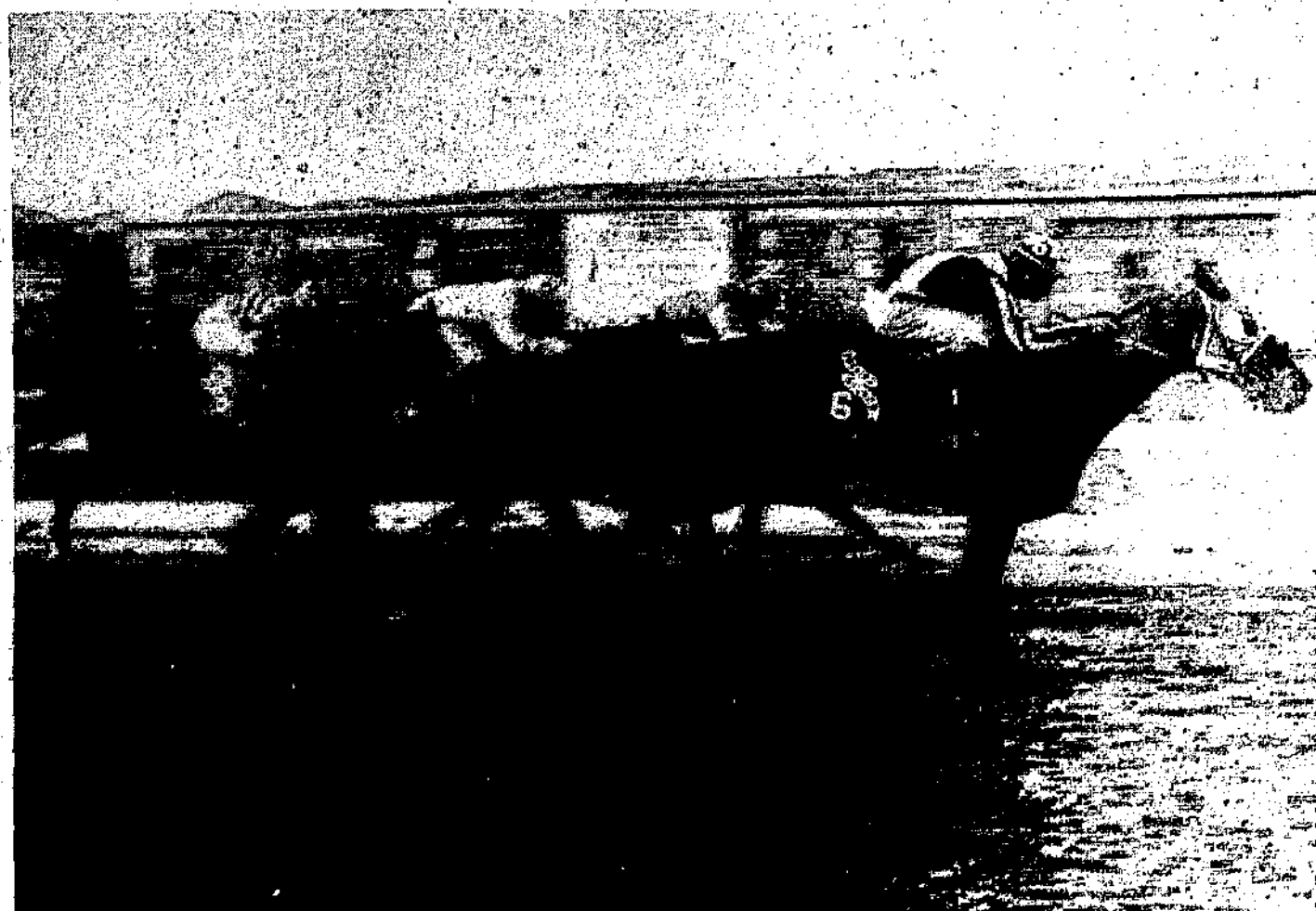

John Chisum Trail Ride offers unparalleled mountain scenery

Lingering in the mind long afterward was the spectacular sight of the black lava flow in the Tularosa Basin of southern New Mexico, stretching 44 miles south to the shimmering gypsum of White Sands National Monument.

There were rival moments, too. Like the overpowering silence of the wind, endlessly caressing the emerald grasses that carpeted the White Mountain Wilderness northwest of Ruidoso.

And the sudden surprise of a mule deer thundering down the mountain. Crashing into the thicket and reacting to our presence too quickly to become terrified, it exploded through the file of equally shocked riders and horses.

But the sheer grandeur of the wilderness in Lincoln National Forest from a lofty 10,000 feet, its environs unchanged and seemingly unruffled by whatever minuscule wounds mankind might inflict upon them, is what really made the first John Chisum Trail Ride last summer a moment to remember.

For the first 25 outdoor lovers who register for the second annual trail ride this July 28-August 2, or for the shorter Blue Mountain Weekend Getaway Trail Ride on September 11-13, those glorious days in the saddle, high in the mountain meadows of south New Mexico await.

Highlighting both trail rides this time will be tours of a working ranch in the foothills of the Capitan Mountains north of Ruidoso, and strolls through Lincoln, the former Old West town where the Lincoln County War flared in 1878 and where the young outlaw Billy the Kid made his gunsmoking jailbreak in 1881.

The longer Chisum trail ride offers something extra: a first evening barbecue at the late cattle baron's South Springs Ranch near Roswell. From that sprawling ranch a little over a century ago, Chisum and his 100 ranch hands rode herd over a staggering 80,000 head of cattle.

For a brief time, one of his hired hands was the Kid.

But both trail rides will center on the horseback treks into the blissful simplicity of the outdoors. They're perfectly geared for those who yearn for hourless days in the sunshine astride a horse, in the sylvan solitude of the New Mexico mountains,

knee deep in countless meadows of wildflowers ablaze in color.

Each ride will average about 15 miles on horseback, long enough for varied gaits and terrain for expert equestrians, and short enough to mollify anyone unfamiliar with horses.

Base camp will be located in secluded Argentina Canyon, five miles west of Bonito Lake in Lincoln National Forest. The lake, a mecca among trout fishermen, is 11 miles northwest of Ruidoso.

The wilderness, named after majestic Sierra Blanca, the 12,000-foot high white mountain sacred among the nearby Mescalero Apache Indians, is one of the smallest in the entire United States Forest Service system, but undoubtedly one of the prettiest.

Its boundaries straddle the spine of the northern Sierra Blancas and encompass a scenic crest trail that towers above the yellow basins and green ponderosa forests of south New Mexico.

Its high mountain meadows seem to roll onward, spotlessly clean in all directions. There is something invigorating in the lushness of their emerald hues. The views from the crest trail are unparalleled and the pervasive, natural beauty is cathartic.

The sharp, stirring smell of bacon frying in a crackling fire at dawn. The tethered horses whinnying impatiently for someone to saddle and ride them into the growing morning. The nervous laughter at the jarring chill of a mountain stream while bathing. The most enormous pot of beans this side of Mel Brook's Blazing Saddles. The warm conversations among the riders at dusk. The campfire singalongs. The smiles, the tender behinds and the kidding.

The six day Chisum trail ride is \$275 per rider, including a nonrefundable \$50 deposit. The shorter weekend trail ride is \$150 per rider (\$35 nonrefundable deposit).

Costs are in line with 18 New Mexico horseback pack trip outfitters, who charged \$45-\$65 a day for similar excursions into the mountains last summer.

Local Realtors noting Private Property Week

Rights to own private property are eroding at an accelerating pace, according to the Ruidoso Board of Realtors. Government bodies and quasi-government organizations often take away some of these rights from private property owners without just compensation or due process of law.

Basically, real property rights are the right to use, sell, lease, enter, and give property, as well as the right to refuse to exercise any of these rights. The Ruidoso board says that while these rights are guaranteed by law, our private property rights and privileges are limited by some powers of government: taxation, police, and eminent domain.

The power of taxation, if not properly exercised, can lead to a distorted real estate market. For example, property assessed at too high a value causes economic loss and can limit home ownership and property investment.

Police power permits government to regulate property for the protection of the public's health, safety, morals, and general welfare. Building codes, housing codes, zoning restrictions, and subdivision controls are some of the regulations based on the police power of government. Naturally some regulation of this type is necessary. However it is important that such regulation does not go beyond serving the public good, because it usually doesn't provide compensation or payment to

property owners.

The power of eminent domain allows the government to condemn and seize private property and in the public interest the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution requires the government to pay "just compensation." Affected property owners need to participate in the legal processes to insure that the compensation is just.

To call attention to the erosion of private property rights, the National Association of Realtors is calling on all Americans to celebrate Private Property Week, April 19

through 25. This year's theme is "Your Private Property Rights . . . Know and Protect Them."

Ruidoso Realtors suggest that you get involved by informing yourself about your local government and its regulation affecting private property. Find out what is happening on such issues as zoning actions, taxation, and enforcement of regulations that affect property owners. Attend village trustee's meetings, and speak out on issues that affect your property rights.

The honorary title was conferred upon David at a public convocation of faculty and students by Enrique Villarreal

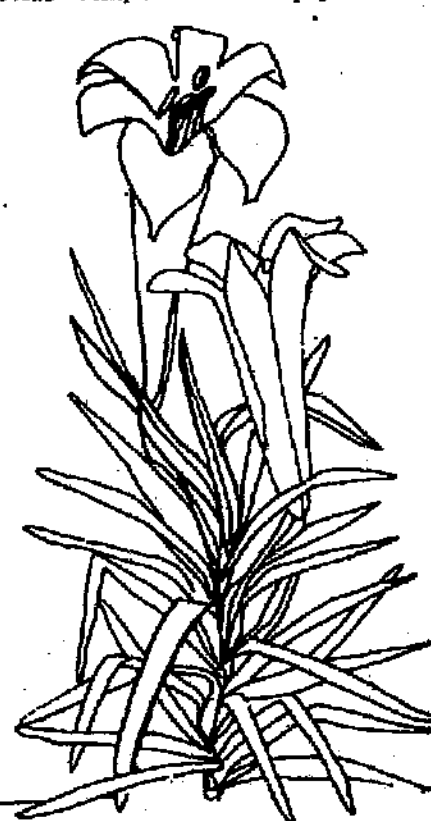
Mascias, rector and president of Universidad de Ciudad Juarez.
