#### Ruling asked in District Attorney race

Third District Judge Garnett Burks, Las Cruces, Friday promised a ruling in the contested election for District Attorney, Twelfth Judicial District, within ten days. The two contenders, Steve Sanders and

James Weldon, each maintain they are the winner of the general election last November, with each charging vote counting irregularities. One election tally gave Weldon the win by 140 votes, another had Sanders winning by 269 votes.

The outcome, apparently, will depend upon Weldon's write-in votes as Weldon, Col. Weldon or J. J. Weldon, which were in conflict with stipulations laid down by Secretary of State Shirley Hooper tor acceptable write-in variations prior to the

# Easily Smashed takes win

Easily Smashed fought off a wilting attacked from Runnin Barre and pulled out a head victory in Sunday's seventh running of the Kansas Derby at Ruidoso

The Kansas Derby, the first stop on the Triple Crown journey for three-year-olds, offered a gross purse of \$224,470. The victory slice amounted to \$76,909.

Easily Smashed, who performed in the 400 yard Derby as a 2-1 favorite, is owned by the partnership of Carol Childs, William Leach and Sue May of Ft. Stockton, Texas. Leach also trains the colt. The pilot is Jackie Martin.

The winning time of 20.09 seconds was a considerable improvement over Easy Joni Jet's top qualifying time of 20.34. The qualifying trials, however, were run under extremely windy conditions. The conditions for Sunday's Derby finale were perfect. It was a clear, sunny afternoon, with only a slight, occasional breeze.

Although Easily Smashed qualified 10th best, Ruidoso patrons figured he was still the one to beat, and made him the choice in the finale. His big selling point was a two length win in the trials, plus the top money line of close to \$160,000.

Fans who centered their mutuel attentions on Easily Smashed in the Kansas Derby collected \$6, \$3.60, \$3. The son of Easy Jet came out of the Derby with a perfect 1981 record of three-for-three. Last year, he compiled outstanding marks of 9-2-0 from 13 outings.

Runnin Barre, ridden by Steve Treasure for Robert and Juanita Ballenger of Paoli, Oklahoma, banked \$35,158 for his runnerun effort. The tote returns were \$3.80 and \$3.40. Easy Joni Jet, owned by Louie Allen of Allen, Texas, mustered a brisk charge in the final stages but had to settle for third, a neck behind Runnin Barre. The show price was \$4. Easy Joni Jet carried odds of better than 9-1. Easy 50m 5th carried paycheck amounted to \$18,018.

Easily Smashed got off to a strong get away from the rail slot and quickly

assumed command. Mighty Pass Em, Easy Joni Jet and Moon Chicks quickly got into some tight quarters from the number 2. 3 and 4 posts. Runnin Barre broke a bit sluggishly and bore in a bit.

Easily Smashed was clearly in charge



# ComFIRE to distribute evacuation route maps

Herb Brunell is looking for volunteers to help clean out his basement.

That's not quite the whole story. The Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE) appealed to the public Thursday for help in distributing emergency evacuation maps, "stacks" of which are now stored in chairman Brunell's basement.

Printing of the mans was a 1979 Com-FIRE project, and designates routes to be used in the event of forest fire or other disaster. Four separate maps are available, depicting different sections of the village-Upper Canyon, Gateway, White Mountain and Alto.

Since they were printed, the maps have been distributed through local business people and a door-to-door campaign conducted largely by Emil Klemm.

The committee agreed that Klemm's campaign was the most effective, but since he has moved away from Ruldoso, distribution has slowed considerably.

Any organization or individual interested in helping to distribute the maps should contact Brunell or other ComFIRE members.

The committee discussed a variety of other items at thier Thursday meeting. Member Rich Seeley volunteered to check

into the status of the Rotary Club's street sign project. He reported Friday that the project is well underway, with some 250 signs already installed.

ComFIRE members are sponsoring a project in conjunction with the signing program, "placing evacuation route markers on appropriate street signs.

Seeley also reported Friday that village manager Jim Hine had advised him that the trustees would be considering: establishment of a "fire prevention officer" in thier upcoming budget deliberations.

In other business, ComFIRE members: -Requested that new member Dave Bervin check into the availability of additional flags for Red Flag Fire Alerts, through the state Forestry Division.

Bervin, 25, is district fire management officer with the state Forestry Division Capitan. A native of North Dakota, Bervin has spent most of his life in the Southwest, and was formerly employed with an Oregon environmental consulting firm. Bervin said he is an avid outdoorsman and his primary career interest is natural resource conservation and development.

The town of Lincoln as a "microcosm of the Western experience," will be the un-derlying principal behind the Museum of New Mexico's plans to make renovations and create new interpretive displays at the Lincoln State Monument.

At a meeting in the old courthouse Thursday, plans for the innovations were outlined by Dr. Michael Warner, who is in the final stages of a year-long planning study for the Museum's Monuments

The state agencies had applied for a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) of \$188,000 to finance the work, but Warner advised the group of citizens that the request had been turned down.

He said the grant request would be resubmitted, but added he is also performing a survey of other possible funding

An advisory group of Lincoln residents, representing the Lincoln Historial Review Board, the Heritage Trust, Pageant Corporation and other interested parties, has been formed to work with Warner in the final planning stage.

Warner's plans call for a three-year three-phase system of implementation and will encompass physical and archaeological aspects, he said.

The old courthouse would become an orientation center, Warner said. The downstairs rooms would be devoted primarily to informing the visitor about the general history of the town and region. Interpretive displays would include more extensive information about history of the town and region.

Those displays would include combinations of artifacts with effective graphic presentations, incorporating newspaper clippings, historic documents and historic photographs, he said.

With the idea of Lincoln as a microcosm, yet with characteristics and history which also make it unique, Warner developed an

describe the area geographically and geologically, in an effort to show "what attracted people to settle here," Warper

. They will also address the types and utilization of resources. Artifacts, photographs and possibly slide shows will be designed to show the importance of water to the area

Another room in the courthouse would be designed to explain the folklore and social history of the peoples who inhabited the area in the past and present, including exhibits on myths, literature and artwork.

Other exhibits would deal with the economic utilization of the land, including mining, farming, ranching and cottage industries.

The exhibits would widen the historical scope of the museum to include "more than just the Billy the Kid era," Warner sald. Displays would trace Lincoln's history from those days through the early 1900's to the present and would attempt to answer such questions as "why Lincoln survived and White Oaks died," and how the town's interesting historical flavor has been preserved, he said.

The old schoolhouse, constructed by the Works Progress Administration and having less historical value than the other buildings, would be used for a community center, small public library, and to

provide public restrooms, Warner said. During the first phase of work, the school building would also be utilized as an area for staff members to fabricate exhibits and store materials.

Other plans included restoration of the Watson House to early 20th century condition, with one room restored as an apothecary; general repairs and maintenance of the Tunstall store; and an archaeological excavation of the McSween home site.

Durable metal signs, incorporating photographs, would be installed at all the

interpretive plan dealing with three major state properties, he added. Written, areas — land, people, and general history. brochures, possibly with the "Lincoln" Independent" newspaper masthead would also be provided to visitors.

> Lynda Sanchez said she felt "modern" exhibits would look out of place in a neat old building like this." She said the use of plexi-glas exhibit cases would "be a desecration," of the courthouse,

Advisory board member Nora Henn also objected to the plan to make the cour-, ouse the orientation center.

"If you turn it totally into interpretive displays, then why bother? You might as well tear if down and build something modern," Henn sald. She suggested that the schoolhouse would be a better choicefor an orientation center.

She added that the building itself was a "museum piece," and that the rooms "could speak for themselves much more

eloquently than the displays."
Walter Henn said he "can't go along with using this building (courthouse) as an orientation center," when the schoolhouse would be the "natural place" for such a facility.

"I really think this building is so unique, and has a feeling that might be lost by having exhibits put in here which are not of

the same type we have now." Henn said. Warner said he too was "concerned with. preserving the integrity of the building," and that changes and compromises in the plans could be worked out later, with the help of the advisory board.

Other citizens suggested that the board could also be helpful in coordinating renovation and restoration efforts by the state and the Heritage Trust.

Museum director Jean Webber alsoattended the meeting, and advised the group that the state is working diligently to facilitate reopening of the Wortley Hotel. Webber said she planned to conduct interviews for prospective lesees during the weekend, and expected the hotel to open by

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



# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE - Sorry if you're tired haring about the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

You have every right to be.

But if you're impatient, don't blame that on the media.

All we do is report what's going on there;

we don't cause it. But have you taken time to study that

report given the federal courts last week by the compliance officer studying how our state keeps its word? Here's how he graded our performance at doing what we promised to do when we

signed a federal consent decree about care we would provide for our prisoners: On ten issues of how we promised to staff and train warders for the penitentiary, we got zero. We did not do a single

That was our biggest failure, though it is probably the most important topic the report covered.

- Out of 67 items we agreed to in the socalled "Duran order" which govern the custody of maximum security prisoners (the very things our penal officals keep implying they are giving their major attention to), we failed on 50, and seven could not be evaluated. That leaves our performance in this regard a plus ten, or a dismal 14 percent.

- In the area of inmate classification, which the leaders in our state government

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on since major escapes at the pen long before the rioting last February, we were not okay on 34 of 46 items. Do you find all that a little too hard on

have been assuring us they were working

our state officials?

If so, you may want to note that the State of New Mexico signed this agreement specifying its future performance without duress. It had months to study and discuss the items it was agreeing to. It wanted full credit for its courage and far-sightedness at the time it told federal Judge Santiago Campos that it intended to do all these

What it neglected, after all that bragging, was to do them.

All this on evidence of a Charles Cron. a monitor who is objective and outside the New Mexico system.

He had nothing to gain or lose by trimming his report to prevailing winds in our state, as have all others who have so far told us what was going on inside the pen (e.g., the Governor, the Attorney General and the staff of the Corrections. Department).

It turns out we can't even comply with our own promises on correspondence to and from prisoners, on how inmates spend their time, or on how and what prisoners

What did our people think they were doing when they signed that consent decree? Did they imagine that by affixing their signatures they were ending questions about our penitentiary and the way it is run?

In truth, all they did was make it possible for such questions to be endlessly asked — by the men who brought the suit the consent decree ended, by those who were also associated with it and by the government of the United States.

Those questions will go on being asked until New Mexico demonstrates, as it clearly has not to date, that it is capable of keeping its word.

That's no small matter.

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A state that will lie in this instance will likely do so in any other — a most discouraging conclusion.

# UNM sponsoring study of Mexico's government

As a United States Senator and as a University of New Mexico (UNM) political science professor, Fred Harris has had a continuing interest in relations between the United States and Mexico.

This summer, with the aid of a Fulbright scholarship he was just awarded, Harris will travel through Mexico in a camper and study the relationship of Mexican states to the nation's central government.

"A lot of times when politicians make public comments about Mexico they always say that the United States and Mexico have a lot in common," Harris said. "But Mexico is very different from America. Ethnically, Mexico has a greater sense of Indianness than the United States; there is more centralized authority in their federal system; their economy is based on more government planning and ownership; and historically Mexico has a very different experience than the United

But despite the differences, he said, it is to the advantage of both the United States and Mexico that each country be

politically stable and economically strong. 'As a senator and as a private citizen, I have been making regular visits to Mexico for a number of years," Harris said. "Most recently, during the summer of 1980, I. spent six weeks in Mexico studying

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Spanish, doing research and conducting interviews with high level Mexican officials including President Jose Lopez Portillo."

Harris began studying Spanish twoyears ago at UNM and attended an intensive language school last summer. He has lectured at the Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico and the Colegio de Mexico in Mexico City. He will also lecture relations which he will teach again in the this summer during his three month spring of 1982. Also at UNM Harris has this summer during his three month Fullbright grant period.

"My wife LaDonna and I will travel in a camper to the states of Morelos, Guererro, Oaxaca, Chiapas, Campeche, Veracruz, Nuevo Leon and Chihuahua," he said. "In each state I'll interview the state governor and other officials along with local news people, professors and ordinary citizens." He plans to write several scholarly papers and a book on Mexico as a result of is summer research.

'Mexico is very important to the United States because it is a large country that shares a 3,000 mile border with us, because it is our third most important trade partner, the fourth largest producer of oil and because a great number of United States citizens are of Mexican ancestry," Harris

Mexican and American relations have been strained over numerous issues such as illegal aliens and oil in recent years, he said, but communication and cooperation between the two nations must improve to help guarantee the future strength of both nations.

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

# Scientists to study Agent Orange's effects

A team of scientists at the University of Health-related Effects of Herbicides. California at Los Angeles (UCLA) will Agent Orange has been a health cond design a study by which the Veterans Administration (VA) will attempt to determine what - if any - medical effects result from human exposure to Agent Orange, a defoliant used during the fighting in South Vietnam.

VA announced the award of a \$114,288 contract under which Drs. Gary Spivey and Roger Detels of UCLA's School of Public Health will direct the design of the epidemiological study.

The work of the UCLA team then will be evaluated by experts from the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Congressional Office of Technological Assessment, the Interagency Work Group to Study the Possible Long-term Health Effects of Phenoxy Herbicides and Contaminants and the VA's Advisory Committee on

Agent Orange has been a health concern among a number of veterans since allegations were raised several years ago that exposure to it had resulted in a variety of maladies ranging from headaches to cancer and birth defects. To date, no definite medical link has been established that would substantlate these claims.

The epidemiological study was mandated by Congress in December 1979 and VA issued a request for proposals to dealgn it in March of 1980. Legal objections raised by an advocacy organization called the National Veterans Law Center delayed award of the design contract for the study until last May 1.

Dr. Spivey, the chief investigator on the study, is associate professor of epidemiology at the UCLA School of Public Health and the other team leader, Dr. Detels, is dean of that school.

# Hearings scheduled on State Park regulations

The New Mexico State Park and Recreation Division will hold two public hearings in Santa Fe on June 2 to discuss proposed changes and additions to New Mexico's state park and boating regulations.

In addition to the hearing already scheduled for Tuesday, June 2, at 1 p.m., in

room 387 of the State Capitol Building, a second meeting has been set for 7 p.m., on June 2 in the City Council Chambers of the Santa Fe Municipal Building, 200 Lincoln Avenue in Santa Fe.

Proposed changes and new regulations to be discussed at the hearing include establishment of watercraft noiseperformance standards; requirements for wind surfers and sail boarders; use of a warning flag when a waterskier has fallen; designation of state park quiet hours; and a new policy governing property abandoned in state

Also under discussion will be the possibility of reevaluating the current "no wake" designation of Heron Lake to allow waterskiing in the northwest quadrant of the lake.

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

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# Mountain trail ride set

The best view in New Mexico, according to historian Marc Simmons, is to be seen from the 10,000 foot high Crest Trail that runs between Nogal and Sierra Blanca peaks and overlooks the Tularosa Basin to the west. The best way to catch that view is from horseback as a member of the Second Annual John Chisum Trailride.

With more than a touch of pride in the tich history of southern New Mexico, the Roswell Chamber of Commerce Convention and Visitors Bureau has recreated the trail experiences of the old west. William Bonney, Pat Garrett, the Murphy-Dolan gang and Chisum, the cattle king, were important parts of the land covered on this venture into the past. Set for July 28—August 2, the trailride

Set for July 28 — August 2, the trailride will kick off with that favorite of western traditions, a get-acquainted barbecue on July 28 at the South Springs Ranch, six miles south of Roswell. A hundred years ago this spread belonged to Chisum, and his jingle-bob-eared cattle grazed nearby.

The next morning, the trailride group will head out to a working ranch to watch cowboys in action and try their hands at roping before lunch and the trip to the campground in the proposed Capitan Wilderness area. The next few days will be spent in the rugged high country out of touch with present day civilization.

To make the ride a true vacation, there will be an outfitter to pack all equipment and horsefeed, a cook for all meals, and a wrangler to help with the animals. Riders will carry only canteens, rain gear and trail snacks. The average day's ride will be fifteen miles — fast enough for the expert horseman, but not too tough for the

Participants may bring a favorite horse, which must be shad. No stallions can be allowed. Hay and oats will be furnished beginning the first night. For the maximum enjoyment and safety of everyone, horses should be well conditioned, gentle and well mannered. If you wish, we will rent a mountain-trained horse for you. Discounts will be given to riders who bring their own horses.

From the first night barbecue until the final breakfast, there will be plenty of good, wholesome chow, including steaks and Mexican food. Participants can expect full breakfasts, lunch on the lower trails, and dinner over an open fire.

Sleeping will be in tents, but since this is a wilderness experience, there will be no cots. It is advised that riders bring air mattresses or small foam mattresses with their bedroils.

Trailboss for the ride is Tommy Fowler, .

a member of the International Trainiders Association Board of Directors. Tommy and his mule "Buck" are a surefooted combination with a lot of miles behind them. Ruswell assistant city manager Raibh Fresquez will arrange first day activities at the ranch and add his ex-

pertise along the trails.

Members of the first John Chisum Ride, held last summer, have written the Chamber their fond memories of the breathtaking trails, warm conversations among the riders at dusk, the chill of the mountain streams while bathing, and the smiles, tender behinds, and great campraderie developed by shared experiences. Several plan to be back this year:

The second Annual John Chisum Trailride will be limited to 25 riders. Families are welcome, but no children under 15 unless accompanied by a parent. Cost of the ride is \$275 per rider, including a nonrefundable \$50 deposit. Reservations are already starting to come in for the ride and will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. # UNM schedules conference on addictive drug behaviors

The addictive behaviors — alcoholism, drug abuse, smoking and obesity — will be the focus of an international conference sponsored by the University of New Mexico (UNM), in the fall.

The Grand Canyon International Conference on the Treatment of Addictive Behaviors to be held at Grand Canyon; Arizona, November 17-20 is a project of UNM's department of psychology, College of Pharmacy and Bureau of Conferences and Institutes.

Dr. William R. Miller, professor of psychology at UNM, is program chairman. He said the conference is intended to be inter-disciplinary in focus with content directly relevant to physicians, psychologists, social workers, nurses, counselors and pharmacologists working in the field of addictive behaviors.

Miller said presentations at the conclave will convey practical knowledge and skills through a variety of formats including invited addresses by prominent researchers in the addictive behaviors who will provide an overview of current research findings and their implications and applications in treatment.

There also will be practitioner workshops designed to teach therapeutic procedures, contributed presentations that describe addictive behaviors and poster sessions which will allow presentation of multiple papers simultaneously and permit participants to engage authors in individual discussion about their work.

Miller, who directs UNM's Alcohol Research and Treatment Project, has developed and evaluated treatment methods for early-stage problem drinkers. He has published four books including a recent work entitled "The Addictive Behaviors."

# Focus on Small Business

Dear Mr. Shafer:

I understand that the United States Small Business Administration, is an effort to cut red tape and speed guaranteed business loan proceeds to businesses, has worked out a better system with some banks. What is this system?

It's called the Lenders Certification Program. Under it, certain financial institutions can make a number of final—and I emphasize the word, final—decisions on the processing, administration and liquidation of small business loans made by banks and then guaranteed by SBA.

This type of action is possible through a 1980 law that enpowers SBA to streamline its guaranteed loan procedures by delegating limited decision authority to selected, qualified financial institutions. SBA had followed such procedures with 250 banks on a pilot basis; the 1980 law officially authorized the program.

To speed up service to small business, SBA is establishing three levels of private sector lending partners:

- Regular participating lenders, either banks or non-bank lenders that have executed a guaranty agreement with SBA but are involved in relatively few loans;

— Certified lenders, relatively active banks or non-bank lenders that have signed the standard guaranty agreements with SBA. These include lenders that participated in SBA's pilot 250-bank certification program.

- Preferred lenders, highly active and reliable lending partners that have performed satisfactorily in the Certified Lenders Program.

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
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
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

#### A Star Still Shines

The show goes on for John Fortna, former New York City actor, opera singer and sometimes stage manager.

The show, however, is no longer the Broadway stage or an opera in the Big Apple, it is a day long radio program specially created by Fortna for oregon.

Sixty-seven year old Fortna has turned his attention and considerable talents to KRVM, a school district radio station where he researches, writes and produces a program called "Time and Changes."

Fortna's involvement in the project came about when he enrolled in the Senior Community Service Project, a program of the National Council on the Aging which seeks to match older people with jobs and meaningful work in their community.

The "match" ignited and Fortna now works 20 hours a week at KRVM. When the station was advised by the Federal Communications Commission that it must broadcast six days a week rather than five. John Fortna was asked to assist with the additional programming.

At his suggestion "Time and Changes" was born. The program, which is a potpourri of entertainment, information important to its audience and a discussion of current issues, airs from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. one day a

week. Opening with "Radio's Golden Past," a syndicated program of radio shows of yesteryear, the program evokes nostalgia and fan mail from both the older and the younger

Guests are interviewed on subjects of special interest to older people after which Fortna hosts a highly popular roundtable discussion of current events and issues.

He is justifiably proud of his final program segsoment, "Remembering," It's actually a series of 25 programs which focuses on the history of the 1925-50 years, one year at a time.

one year at a time.

"Remembering" takes a look at major events of the year and features the lives and works of composers and entertainers of that time. These segments, rich in history, are being maintained by the station and the school district for re-use.

"Remembering" is å fine example of what the programming is all about. Fortna says. "It has been well received by the older audience which enjoys reliving this history as well as by the young who benefit from a look at the evolution of our culture."

Of his radio work, Fortna says "I love the job, it makes me want to get up in the morning,"

But his work at KRVM is only part time. In his other job, which he suys, "allows me to sing for my supper," he is a special envoy for the Pacific Continental Bank. As a repre-

sentative of the company's unique "Seniorities" program. Fortna visits senior centers and nursing homes to advise the people who cannot travel to the bank; of its services and ameni-

His presentations are usually enlivened by a song or two. Since he's bonded, he can and often does handle actual banking transactions for the clients.

Tiring of New York in 1976, Fortna moved to Eugene on the advice of friends. "It is heaven, the greatest thing I have ever done," he says with gusto.

He has made the city a real home and has immersed himself in its civic and cultural life.

When the Eugene opera was founded in 1977, Fortnatelent his baritone voice to its opening performance. "Carmen," and later to the "Barber of Seville," "Rigoletto" and the more obscure "Gianni Schiechi" by Puccini.

He started singing at the age of six, but was really encouraged to pursue a musical career by a high school teacher in Piper City, Illinois, "I sang in everything," he says of those days.

When he enlisted in the Air Force in World War II, it was his musical talent (he also plays piano and organ) which prompted an enjoyable service "gig" as an assistant to a chaplain.

After the war he completed his studies at the American Conservatory in Chicago and Immediately sought his career in New York where he spent 28 artistic years.

In his "spare" time. Fortna narrates commercials for radio and television and teaches voice control to aspiring public speakers and singers.



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


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
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
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



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








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

# George Balanchine revives "The Spellbound Child" for TV

Since its debut at the Theatre de Monte Carlo in 1925, "The Spellbound Child/L'Enfant et les Sortileges" has been inexorably linked to George Balanchine. At the time, he was just 21 years old, collaborating with the formidable talents of composer Maurice Ravel and poet/novelist/librettist Colette. Twenty-one years later, Balanchine brought the production to America, and in 1975, he revived it for the New York City Ballet's Ravel festival. But Balanchine was never completely satisfied with any of the productions; he found the theater was too real for this living feature.

Now, in a landmark undertaking, George Balanchine and collaborator Kermit Love have reconceived "The Spellbound Child," this time for television. It will air on Great Performances' "Dance in America" series on Monday, May 25 over PBS.

"The Spellbound Child" is the story of a young boy's journey into an uncontrollable fantasy world. As played by newcomer Christopher Byars, the child resents his mother's directive to do homework. In defiance, he sticks his tongue out—and is promptly ordered to his room.

Frustrated and enraged, the boy destroys everything within reach. Magically, the spirit of his tantrum infuses the mangled remains of his belongings. The Armchair (Bryant Young) comes to life, threatening to swallow him up; the Teapot and Teacup (Mel Tomlinson and Susan Freedman) rise up and dance their own dance; Fire (Karin von Aroldingen) plays dangerous tricks and his favorite storybook Princess (Karen Hunt) scolds him for learing her from the only world she knew.

A black singing cat leads the boy into an early beautiful garden inhabited by giant insects and outsized frogs, none too happy with their human visitor. The boy encounters many creatures—the dragonly whose mate the Boy has pinned to the wall, the tree suffering wounds the boy has carved in it, the Squirrel the Boy has caged and more. These are quarrelsome animals, eager to fight the boy and each other. Suddenly, a small squirrel, injured in the fray, cries out in pain. The boy bandages the wound (see photo) and his compassion startles the other creatures, who in an effort to make amends, carry the boy back to his 'nest' . . . and to his mother.
