## School does not accept bond bid

In a special meeting on Wednesday, the Ruidoso Board of Education (BOE) rejected the one bid it had received for the sale of \$2.25 million in bonds. The bonds had been approved in an election May 12 to finance new school construction and improvements.

The bid of Kirchner, Moore and Company, Denver, Colorado, was turned down because it was conditional. The bid called for the Ruidoso School District to pay a \$23,000 premium for the insuring bond—a condition which was not permitted in the notice of sale of bonds as originally

published.

After rejecting the conditional bid, the BOE moved to reopen bids for the sale of bonds on August 24, at 11 a.m.

There will be two minor changes in the terms of the bids. Bidders will be notified that they will be responsible for payment of the insurance premiums, and they will be allowed to charge up to percent interest. Interest rates above 10 percent will require approval by the State Board of Finance.

In other business, the BOE also approved the 1980-81 school inventory.

## Local schools to open September 1

Ruidoso Municipal Schools will open September 1 for the 1981-82 term, Superintendent Pat Valliant has announced.

School will be in session September 1 and 2, then close for the Labor Day weekend and reopen September 8.

Schools will begin classes on this schedule:

- Nob Hill Elementary, grades K through second, 8:30 a.m.
- White Mountain Elementary, grades three through five, 8:30 a.m.
- White Mountain Middle, grades six

through eight, 9:10 a.m.

— High School, grades nine through 12, 9 a.m.

Orientation for parents and children to attend Nob Hill Kindergarten will be September 1, 10-11 a.m. and 1-2 p.m., for morning classes; September 2, 10-11 a.m. and 1-2 p.m., for afternoon classes.

Kindergarten registration will continue through August, with a birth certificate and immunization record required for each student registering at Nob Hill.

The busing schedule, Valliant said, will be published prior to the beginning of the school term.

## Fort Sumner man heading ASC

Ben F. Hall, Fort Sumner, was named chairman of the New Mexico Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee by Secretary of Agriculture John Block.

Named as committee members by Block were Roberta E. Morrow of Hatch and Antonio A. Sanchez of Las Vegas. The committee administers federal farm programs in New Mexico.

Hall, 61, has a 34,000 acre cattle ranch in DeBaca County, where he began ranching in 1939. He has belonged to the New Mexico Cattle Growers and the New Mexico Farm Bureau for 20 years, and the Texas Longhorn Breeders Association of America for 5 years. He has been an ASC county committeeman.

Morrow, 43, has farmed with her husband in Dona Ana County for 16 years. The farm produces cotton, alfalfa, grain, onions and cattle, with a 2,600 head capacity feedlot. She has been a member of the Farm Bureau and the National Cattle Growers Association for 16 years, and has a Bachelor's in Education from Arizona State University.

Sanchez, 69, has a ranching operation in San Miguel County and has raised cattle all his life. He is a member of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association and the Farm Bureau, and has served as an ASC county committeeman.

Serving Lincoln County as ASC committeemen are Larry D. Bond of Carrizozo, John W. Cooper of Tinnie, and Fred W. Pfingsten of Lincoln.

## C-C committee seeking numbers on buildings

The Ruidoso Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) formulated a plan Monday at their monthly meeting to put addresses on all Ruidoso buildings.

The project, which is slated to begin sometime this fall, will initially focus on Ruidoso businesses.

Cupp was present at the meeting to offer the support of the village to the Chamber of Commerce, which will coordinate the address project. He presented C of C executive director Ed Jungbluth with a set of maps which will be used in determining the address of each building.

It was suggested by Larry Langford that a campaign be held during a specific time period, during which the addresses would be sold at a discount.

## Rio Grande Futurity Sunday

Can an outstanding filly defeat a stand-out colt?

That's the major question surrounding Sunday's \$40,120 Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso Downs as the 10 qualifiers from last Thursday's three trial races collide at six furlongs. The winner will collect \$20,060 in this major test for two-year-olds.

The filly is Shesgottobeadandy, who won her trial race by almost four lengths while the colt is Spanish Spade, who captured his trial heat by two lengths.

Shesgottobeadandy, a Draconic Filly, has only started three times, but she has shown considerable ability.

She ran third in her lifetime debut in a Petticoat Stakes trial race at the Downs at Santa Fe and then ran second to the superb filly Envoy's Daughter in the five furlong Petticoat, an \$80,000 race on July 4.

She led throughout in her Rio Grande trial race at Ruidoso Downs under fine handling by jockey Larry Byers.

Overall, she's scored one victory, one second and one third. She's earned \$17,416 for owner Virgil J. Callaway of Hobbs. Her toughest foe appears to be Spanish Spade, a Draconic colt, who has captured half his lifetime starts.

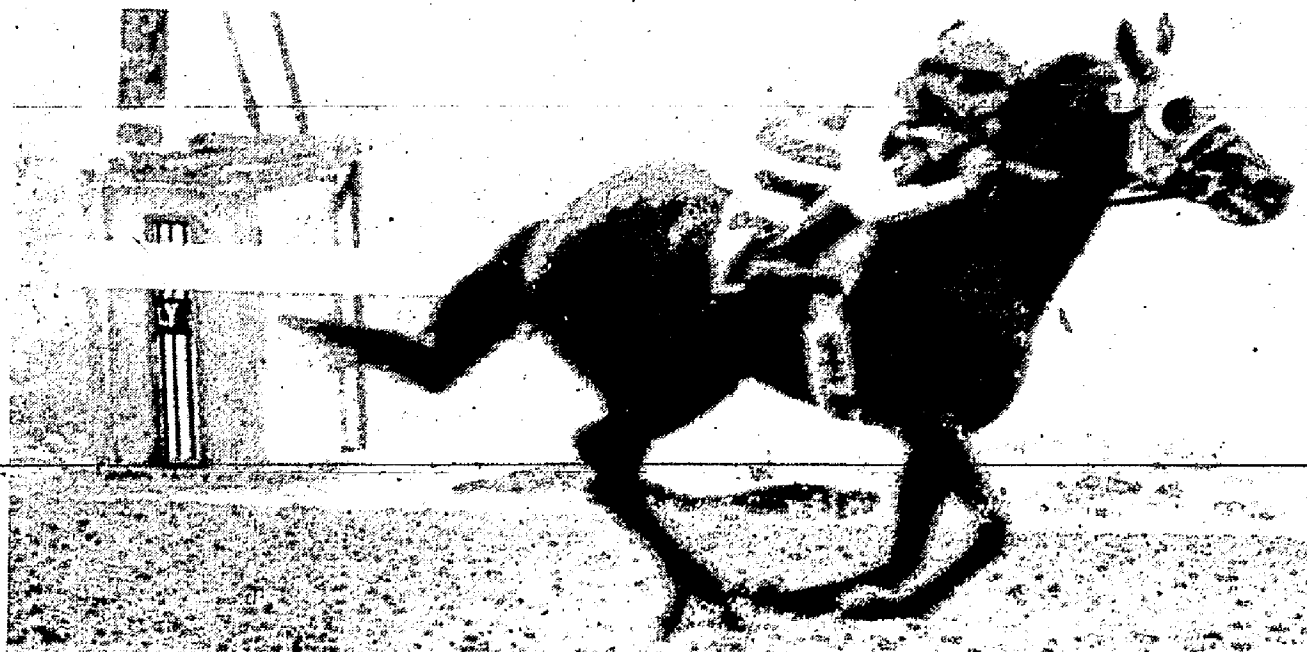
He opened his career with two victories at Sunland Park before finishing seventh in the prestigious Riley Allison Futurity on May 3.

At Ruidoso Downs, he has a win, second and fifth in three outings.

Overall, he has three wins and one second in six outings. He's earned \$6,447.

Callaway and Hitt again have this runner while Billy Byers is the jockey.

Another Draconic colt, Draconic Runner, had the biggest win margin of the three

winner as he tallied by a widening eight lengths under Billy Byers.

Following two fourth place efforts to open his career, he has two consecutive triumphs at Ruidoso Downs. Each win was in easy fashion.

He's collected \$2,804 for owner Lonnie O. Bates of Kaufman, Texas. He's trained by Callaway and ridden by Hitt.

Ironically, Hitt is trying for his second

consecutive Rio Grande Futurity triumph. He saddled Lynn W. Dubose's Draconic's Lady to a three length victory in last August's renewal of the Rio Grande. Larry Byers was the jockey.

The complete field with their finish in last week's trial heats: Shesgottobeadandy (first in first division); Kacy Dawn (second in first division); Mr. Zips Bunny (third in first division); Funny

Phantom (fourth in first division); Draconic Runner (first in second division); Bionic Lil (second in second division); Coya's Prize (third in second division); Spanish Spade (first in third division); Tammy Bond (second in third division) and Mr. Golden Zipper (third in third division).

The Rio Grande will be the tenth race on a 12 race program. Post time will be 1 p.m.

## Two charged in murder of camp inmate

After an extensive investigation in which the Lincoln County Sheriff's department was assisted by State Police and prison officials, criminal complaints were filed Tuesday against two Camp Sierra Blanca inmates in the Sunday beating death of Scott Wayne Thompson, 20.

The two prisoners, Felix Martinez, 20, and David Sedillo, 34, were charged with first degree capital murder — a charge required by state law when a victim is imprisoned or on the premises of a penal institution.

Martinez was serving two to ten years for escape from another institution on January 4, 1979, where he had been serving time on a stolen property charge. Sedillo was serving eight to ten years for armed robbery and aggravated assault against a police officer.

Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez said that other inmates may later be charged as accessories to the crime.

Martinez and Sedillo are being detained without bond in the Lincoln County Jail. An arraignment was held before County Judge S. M. Ortiz Wednesday afternoon. Assistant District Attorney Jay Rosenthal said that a preliminary hearing would be set within 10 days.

Thompson was found slain early Sunday morning after he had been reported missing in an hourly head count. He had been at Camp Sierra Blanca only two days after having been transferred from the medium-security prison at Los Lunas.

Thompson had been serving a four year term for robbery with a firearms enhancement.

Rosenthal said that Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Jay McSwane had received eye witness accounts of the murder. According to the state medical examiner, Thompson died as the result of multiple stab wounds to the neck and chest as well as being beaten on the head with a heavy object.

## Mobile home ordinance revision eyed by P&Z

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) took tentative steps towards revising the village ordinance defining "mobile homes" at its Monday morning meeting.

The troublesome ordinance has forced P&Z to make several spot zoning changes recently, because or requests to install high-quality modular homes in residential areas.

On Monday P&Z Enforcement Officer John Cupp asked for discussion on required action relative to the land use survey being conducted at Carter's Park and Ponderosa Heights. The area combines residential and mobile home zoning. P&Z had previously discussed the possibility of rezoning all or most of the area to R-3 (mobile home).

But at Cupp's urging, P&Z moved instead to set up a workshop for the purpose of rewriting the definition of mobile homes. This would give P&Z more long-

range flexibility, Cupp indicated, and eliminate the need for continued spot zoning.

P&Z chairman Mike Waldron requested that a decision as to the date of the workshop be held up until commission members could obtain more materials for use in it. Cupp said that he would be in contact with several major manufacturers of modular homes, so that their specifications would be available when P&Z undertakes a redefinition of "mobile homes".

According to Cupp, the workshop will probably not meet until after August.

P&Z also:

— Read correspondence from W. Anderson of Alamogordo, encouraging the village to move ahead with street signs and house numbers.

— Heard a request by Tom Battey for information on splitting Lot 8, Block 9, Cree Meadows subdivision. Battey was advised to proceed with a formal replat.

— Head a request by R. D. Johnson for information relative to a zone change from R-1 to R-2 on Lots 2 and 3, Block 14, Palmer Gateway. Johnson was advised to check restrictive covenants, then check with Cupp before proceeding.

— Approved final plats of: Racquet Court Condominiums, Phase 3, C. C. Collier; Lakeview Estates, Phase 2, Salvador Vela Jr.; Development Plan and Phase I of Pepper Tree Place Condominiums, W. T. Parker; Granite Heights Condominiums, Lon Cartwright; Las Vistas Subdivisions, subject to County approval.

— Approved a replat presented by Al Stubbs for W. D. Sterett, Lot 6, Block 4, Country Club Heights.

— Heard a request by Mannie Badillo for approval of a 30 foot right-of-way vacation at Lot 18A, Block 8, Cree Meadows Country Club, for Arturo Casarin. P&Z advised Badillo to have a plat drawn up and petition the village trustees.

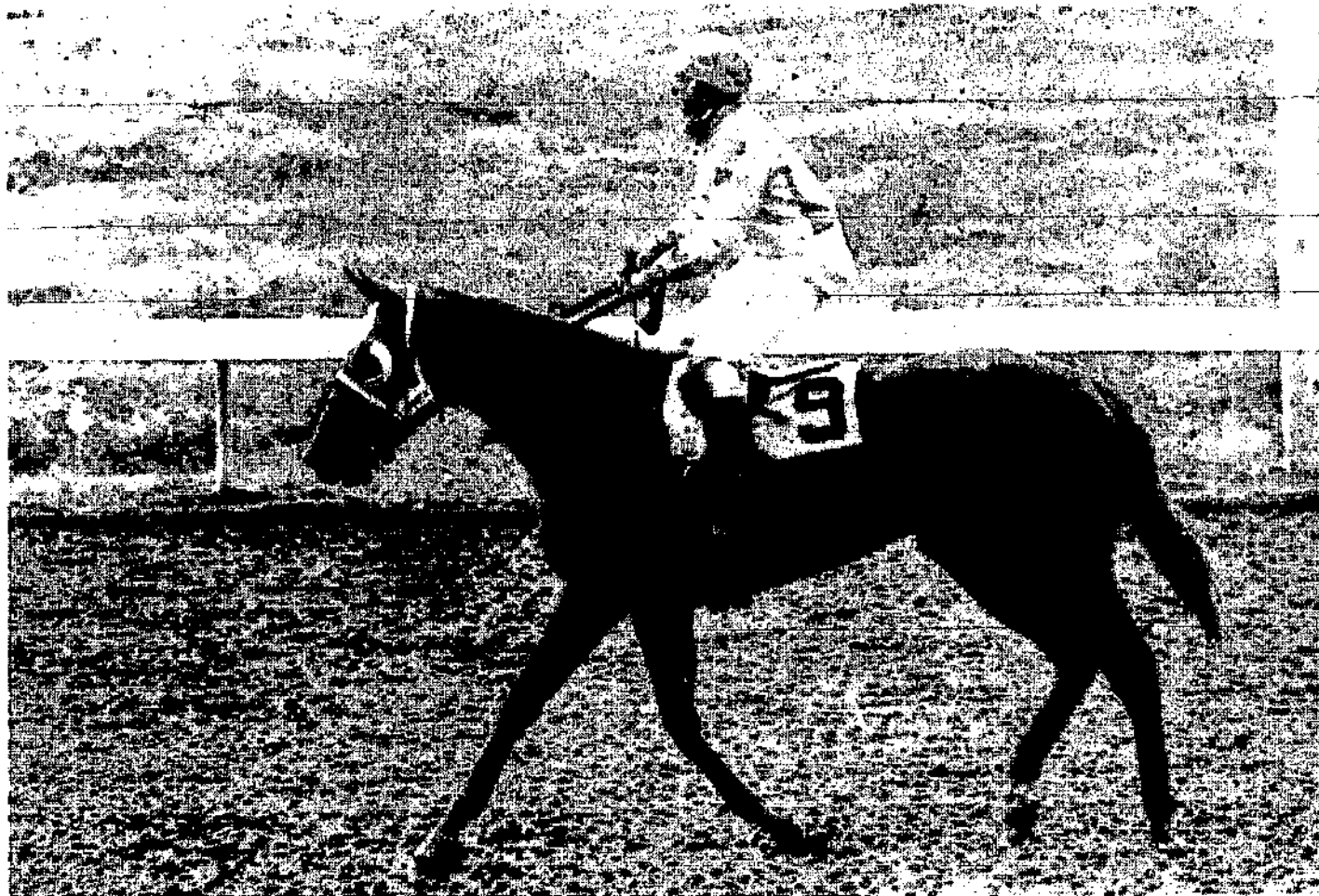

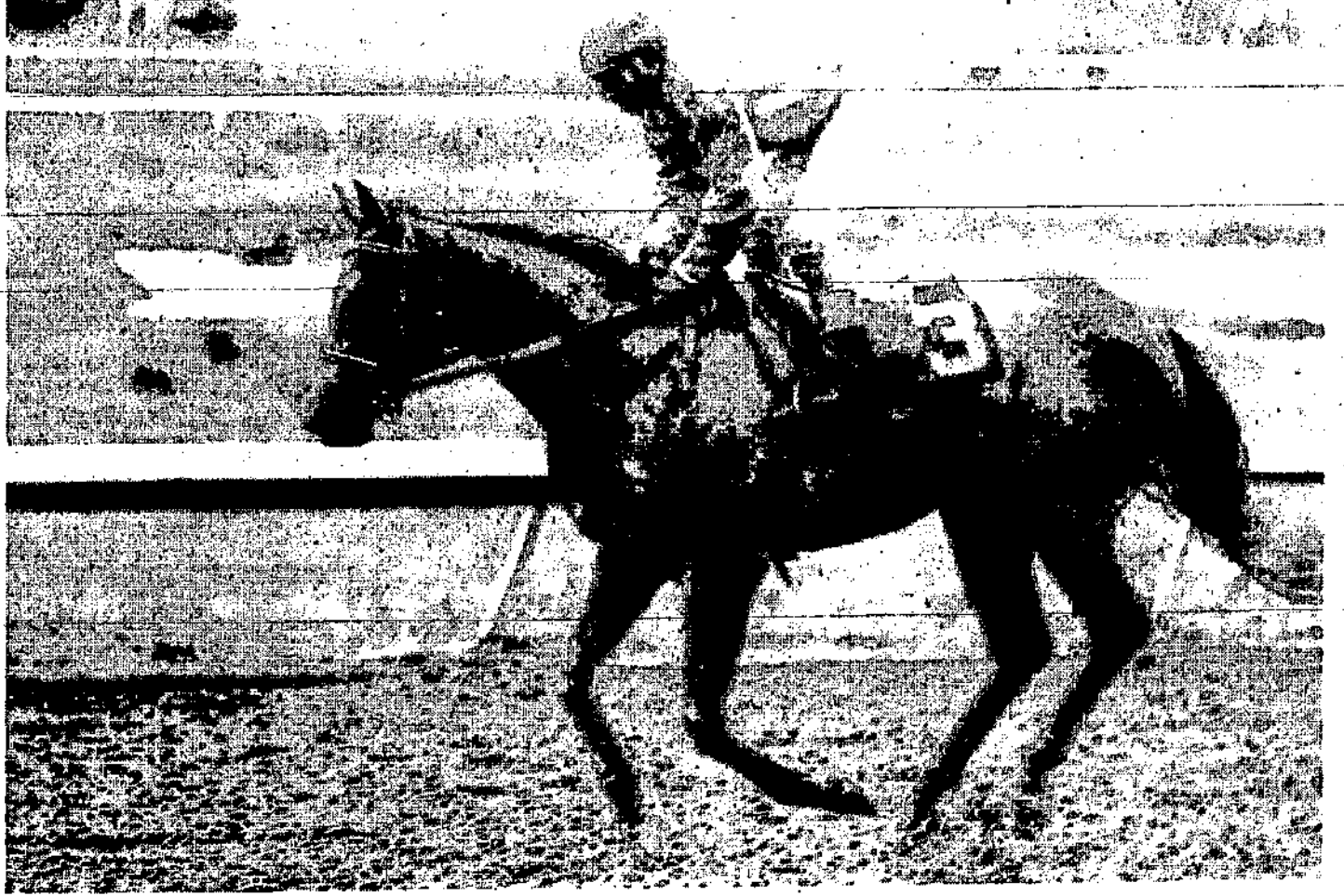

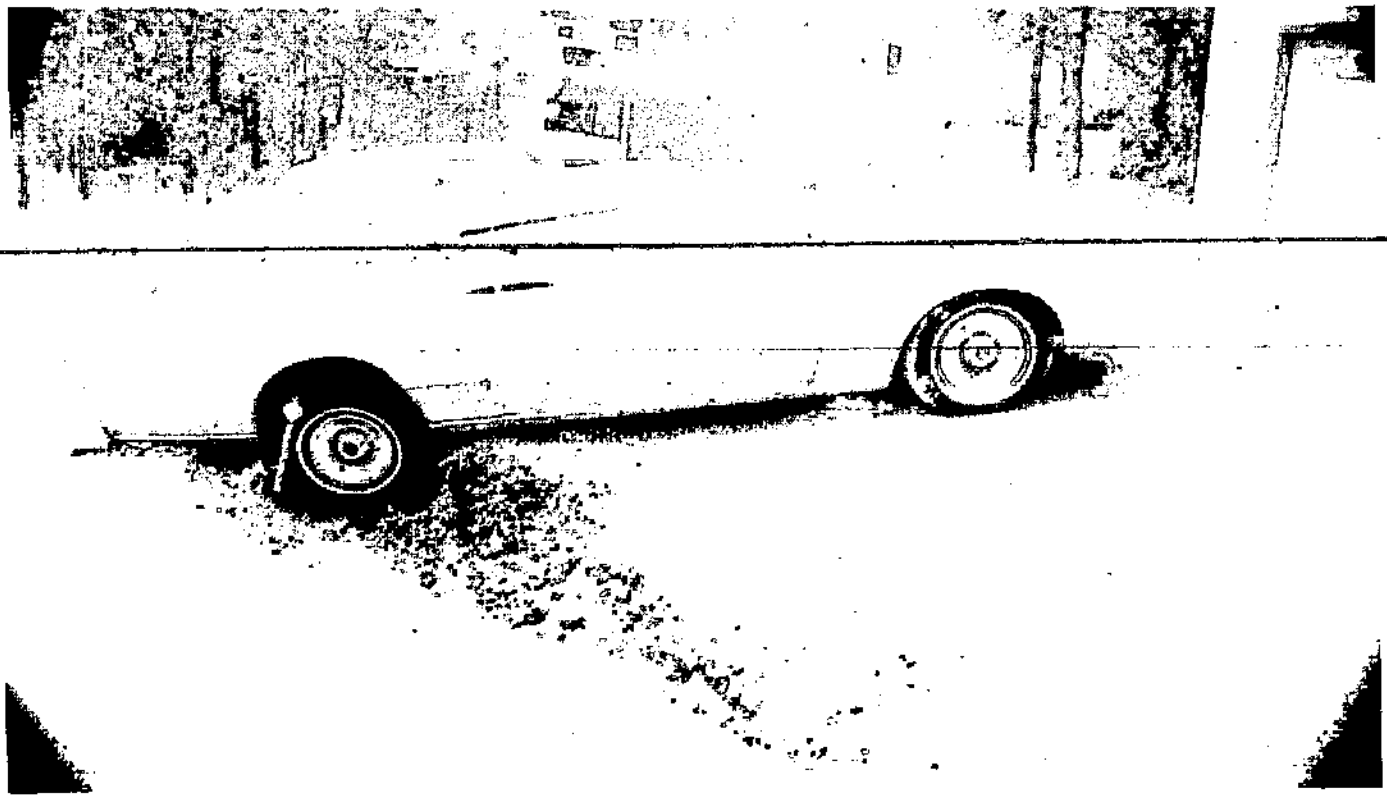

## VA sets new policy on lost documents

The Veterans Administration (VA) is reminding New Mexico veterans and their dependents that they shouldn't let lost documents prevent them from applying for VA benefits.

"Some veterans who can't locate birth or marriage certificates don't apply for benefits because they believe those documents are essential," said Joe

Cordova, director, Albuquerque VA Regional Office.

But, he pointed out, VA accepts certified statements from applicants in instances where documents needed to establish eligibility for benefits are lost.

In the case of a marriage, Cordova said, this policy applies only to the first marriage for each partner, and there must

be no contradictory information on file with the agency.

In years past, VA required formal documentation to support claims for compensation and education benefits for veterans, widows and orphaned children.

More recently, however, the agency has accepted a certified statement regarding the birth of a child or as proof of age and relationship in disability cases.

Veterans or dependents with questions about eligibility for benefits are urged to telephone the Albuquerque VA Regional Office toll free 474-3361 in the Albuquerque area and 1-800-432-6853 elsewhere in New Mexico.

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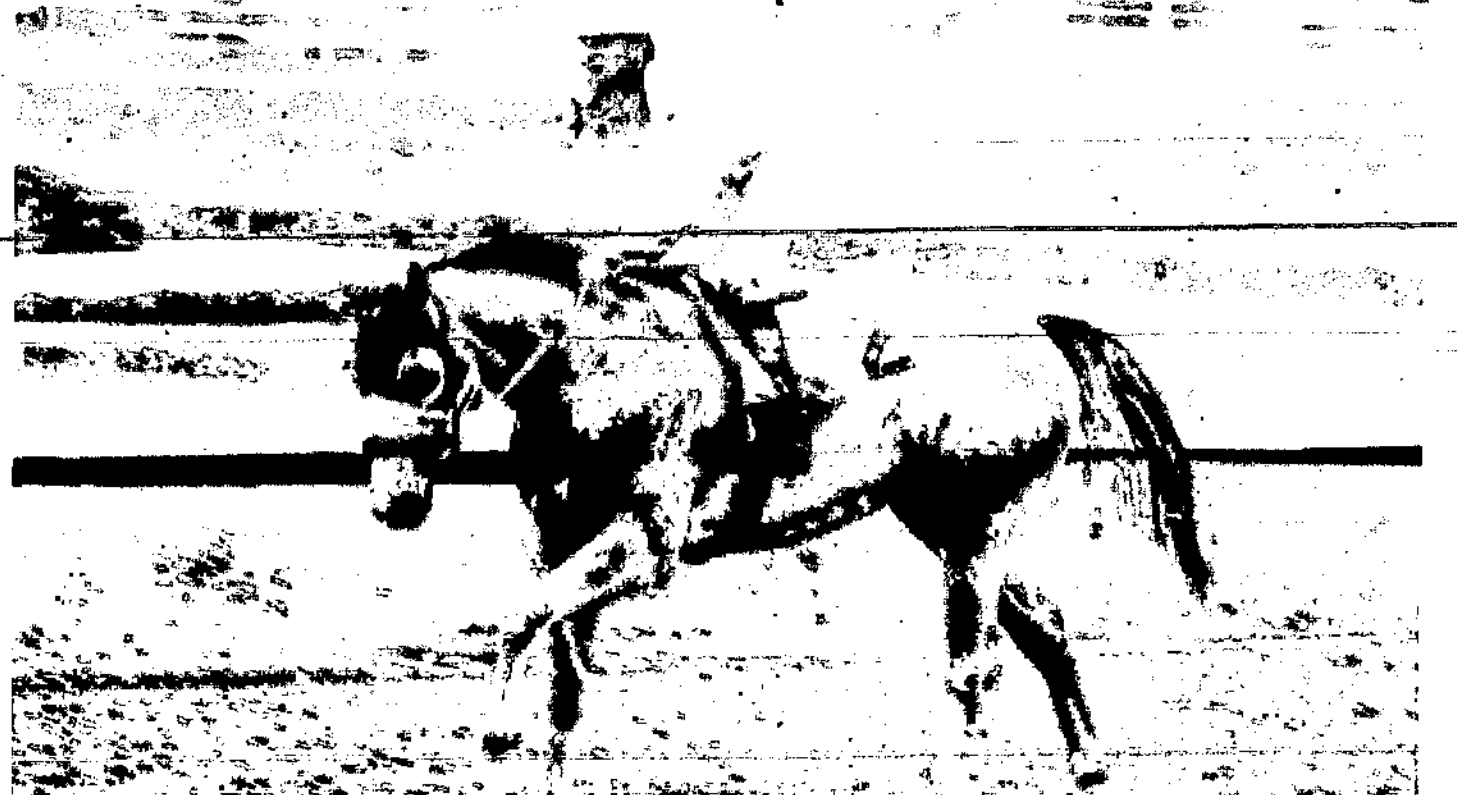


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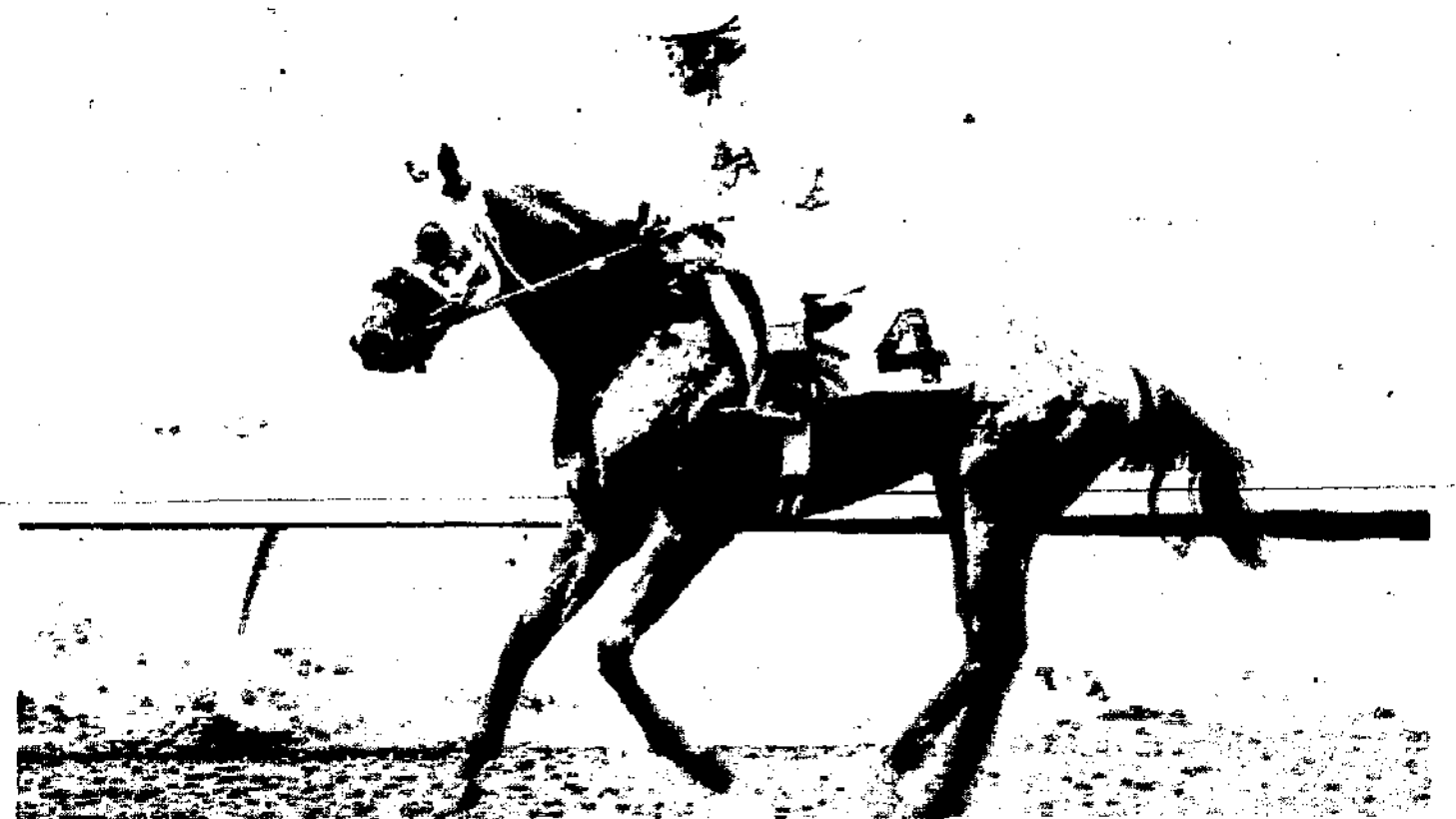

owned by James Males of Hobbs. Mr. Golden Zipper has yet to taste victory. John Arteaga does the riding.

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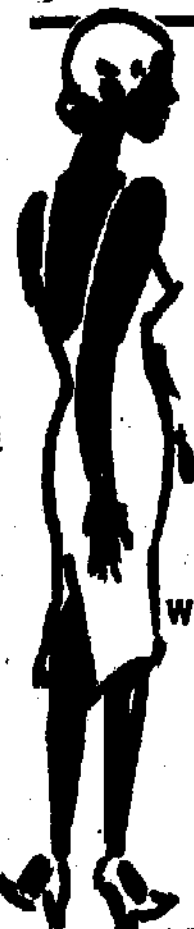
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## Host families sought for Youth for Understanding

When Mari Nakamichi steps off the plane in Des Moines, Iowa, next week, she will be more than 6,000 miles from home. But her family will be at the airport to welcome her. Mari is one of 4,000 exchange students arriving during August to spend a year in the United States. The exchange program is sponsored by Youth for Understanding (YFU), a non-profit organization based in Washington, D. C. Mari's new parents volunteered to participate in YFU's unique homestay program as a host family. They will share their home and family life with Mari while she attends the local high school and experiences American life firsthand.

But some of the new arrivals don't have a family waiting for them yet. "Right now, YFU needs additional families to host our students," said Susan Greene, YFU's Director of United States Programs. "These youngsters are bright, eager, and ready to share their culture with American families," Greene said. "It's a superb opportunity for anyone interested in international family living." Information about hosting one of these students is available by calling YFU's regional office collect at (202) 936-0808.

YFU selects students through a careful screening process, then matches them with host families according to mutual interests, activities, and backgrounds.

Host families provide a home, meals, and loving care for their overseas son or daughter, but the students bring their own money for incidental expenses. Many earn extra spending money during their stay by baby-sitting and doing odd jobs. Each student is covered by YFU's health insurance plan and each host family is entitled to a tax deduction of up to \$50 a month, according to current Internal Revenue Service rules.

Host families and students receive continual support from YFU before, during, and even after the visit. "Thorough orientation and staff support are two of the reasons why our programs are so successful," Greene said. "YFU's trained staff, both volunteer and professional, are dedicated people who furnish support, services, and guidance throughout the exchange process."

Since it was founded 30 years ago, YFU has helped more than 80,000 youngsters experience life in other lands. Students come to the United States from Asia, Europe, Latin America, and Australia. United States students also take part. YFU's goal is better world understanding through family living. Located in Washington, D. C., Youth for Understanding is the world's largest high school student exchange organization.

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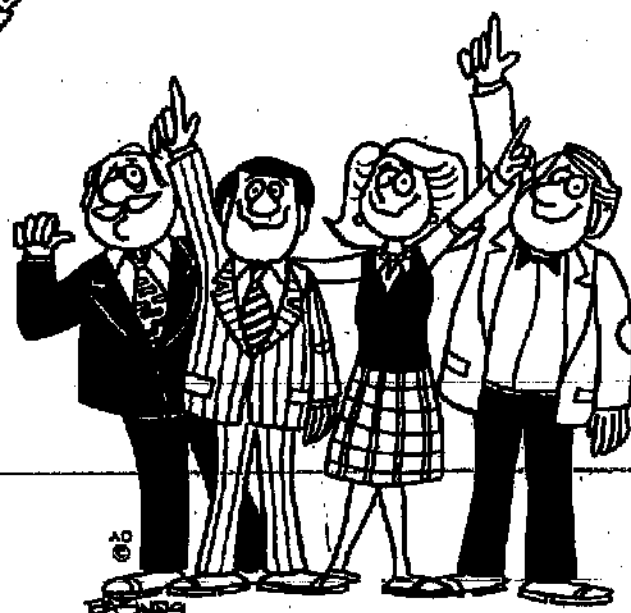
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# Baker favored in championship flight

A 19-year-old youth from Fort Worth was rated as the favorite in the championship flight going into this morning's competition on the final day of the 33rd Cree Meadows Golf Invitational.

Angus Baker, who shot a 70 in the championship flight qualifying Monday,

defeated two-time champion Tommy Hornbuckle and defending champion John Field in action yesterday. As a result Baker tangled with Don Koesters of Alamogordo in one semi-final match this morning. Ron Becker played Mark Jarrett in the other semi-final match.

The winners of the semi-finals will meet this afternoon for the championship.

Baker and Hornbuckle had to extend their first-round match from Tuesday until yesterday morning after it was called due to darkness after the 17th hole.

Baker, playing a mistake-free match, finally won the sudden-death playoff on the 21st hole. He then stunned Field, winning on the 17th hole. Baker was three-up at the finish.

Koesters, a tall, wiry golfer, took an easy six and five decision over Dan Wimberly in one quarter-final match. Ron Becker upset Tony St. John (who had the best qualifying score with a 68) by a five and four decision and Mark Jarrett beat Howard Hassell, four and two.

In qualifying Monday Koesters had the second best score with a 67, one stroke behind St. John. Jarrett, who looked impressive in defeating Hassell, fired a 69 for the third best qualifying score.

In championship consolation competition this morning Hornbuckle tangled

with Stormy Edwards in one semi-final match while Ted Martinez played Don Wilson in the other.

Hornbuckle came back after his loss to Baker to topple Pat Pritchett five and three. Edwards topped Mark Saxton two and one to advance to the semi-finals. Martinez beat Jeff Seager seven and six, while Wilson defeated Robert Upham two and one in other quarter-final competition.

Baker led most of the way in his quarter-final match with Field, a native of Las Cruces. He was two up after five holes and held on to win after the defending champion made a brief comeback, closing to within one stroke before Baker finished strong.

There was competition in 10 other flights this morning. In all 176 golfers started tournament competition Monday. Rain delayed some golfers Tuesday and Wednesday, causing some matches to end after dark.

## Commission adds deer hunts

The State Game Commission July 24 established an either-sex deer entry permit hunt north of the Capitan Mountains and opened part of the San Juan Refuge for deer hunting.

Up to 500 permits will be available for the additional entry permit hunt (C-7) December 6-6 in a portion of Game Management Unit 37 comprising the Armstrong Ranch on State Road 42 north of the Capitan Mountains and adjacent ranches in the immediate vicinity that agree to the hunt. Rules and deadline for application are the same as for previously established entry permit hunts.

The San Juan Refuge — south of the San Juan River only — will be open during bow, muzzleloader and rifle seasons. Bag limit is one deer of either sex for bowhunters; one antlered buck for muzzleloader and rifle hunters.

The commission also amended the Fort Bayard Refuge boundary to exclude 51 acres of land designated as a shooting range; authorized sale of 21 acres of commission-owned property at Bernardo along United States 60 to the Highway Department for bridge construction; lifted the restriction requiring houndmen to muzzle their dogs during the pursuit

season on furbearers; postponed the closing of the Rio Chiquito to anglers to July 31, 1982; added Bataan and Carlsbad Municipal lakes to the list of waters where use of trotlines is prohibited; and approved \$5,000 for Grant County's shooting range.

A tentative lease of the Alamosa mine tailings near Pecos by Cowles Associates was approved by the commission, subject to amendments to Cowles' proposed contract — including the lessee's guarantee of right-of-way access to a property owner through the area. Signing of the lease is scheduled for the commission's next regular meeting in late August.

## Commission sets seasons, increases dove limit

The State Game Commission July 24 set squirrel, grouse, falconry and early migratory bird seasons, and increased the bag and possession limit on mourning and white-winged doves. Seasons on grouse, band-tailed pigeon and squirrel will begin five days earlier than last year.

Seasons for mourning and white-winged dove are September 1-30 and November 21-December 20 statewide. Dove shooting will be permitted September 1-30 on a portion of Jackson Lake State Game Refuge lying east of New Mexico 17 in San Juan County and on the Artesia State Game Refuge in Eddy County. Bag and possession limits have been raised to 12 doves per day and 24 in possession — singly or in the aggregate of both species.

Season on blue-winged, green-winged and cinnamon teal in the Central Flyway portion of the state only (east of the Continental Divide, excluding the Jicarilla Apache Indian Reservation) will be September 12-20. Teal hunting will also be open during that time on the La Joya State Game Refuge and a portion of the Bernardo State Game Refuge south of United States 60. Shooting hours are sunrise to sunset; bag limit is four per day, eight in possession, singly or in the aggregate of the three species.

By regulation, teal hunters are restricted to use of shot shells loaded only with steel shot while hunting in La Joya and Bernardo refuges and the area bet-

ween the refuges.

Band-tailed pigeon season is October 3-23 south of United States 60 from the Arizona state line to Socorro and west of 1-25 from Socorro to the Texas state line. In the remainder of the state, the season will be September 1-20. Bag limit is five per day, 10 in possession.

Band-tailed pigeon hunters must have in possession both a valid game bird license and a special band-tailed pigeon hunting permit, issued free at Department of Game and Fish offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Roswell, Raton and Las Cruces. Written requests for permits should be mailed to the Santa Fe office with name, address and current bird-hunting license number.

Season on sora and Virginia rails is September 12-November 20 statewide. Bag and possession limits are 25 rails, singly or in the aggregate of both species.

Hunting for common (Wilson's) snipe will be open statewide from September 12-December 13. Bag and possession limits are eight per day, with 16 in possession.

One fully feathered wing or the head of any rail, snipe or teal must remain attached to the bird until the bird has arrived at the personal abode of the possessor or at a commercial preservation facility.

The commission set the season on grouse and squirrel in northern units, GS-1, for September 1-October 4, with no grouse hunting permitted in Unit 9

Judging from the results of the North-South football and basketball All-Star games last week it seems that the North has a built-in advantage when the teams meet nowadays.

Besides the obvious factor that the games are played in Albuquerque where a lot of the North players are from, sheer numbers also enter into it.

The bulk of the state's population resides in the northern half of the state. Bernalillo County alone has over 400,000 residents. As a result the North has more players to draw from and should be at an advantage in any all-star game.

True, the series in both basketball and football show the South leading (22-12 in both sports) but the North has won seven straight in football and stunned the South by five points in last week's AAA-AAAA cage encounter.

The 40-0 North win in football was the most lopsided score in the 38 year history of the classic. The South scored 41 points in both 1968 and 1970 but the North prevented shutouts in both games.

Actually the South has done remarkably well in both sports considering the advantage the North supposedly has. The North's James Sweeney was pretty much the story of the game. 6-7 Robert Amelunxen of Santa Fe and 15 Jim Roberts of AAA-champion Academy of Albuquerque weren't that mobile under the basket and had problems before Taylor and Tularosa's Bill Turner fouled out of the contest.

The game was just a case of Sweeney getting the hot hand at the right time. Or the wrong time as far as the South was concerned.

But the results of the game aside, the University of New Mexico arena and, in fact, the whole UNM and Albuquerque sports complex must rank among the most modern in the country. Albuquerque's sports facilities rank with any city of comparable size in the country.

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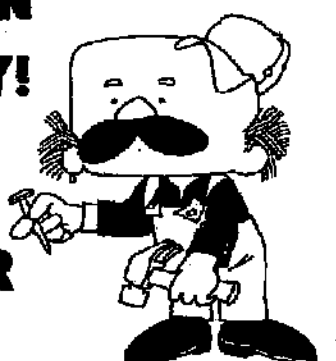

# 1680 Pueblo Revolt initiated by Po-pay

Very few New Mexicans have been recognized as great communicators, but one generally overlooked New Mexican must have been a masterful communicator.

Although his work must necessarily be based upon sketchy, fragmented, difficult to validate evidence, the San Juan Pueblo leader of the 1680 Pueblo Revolt, Po-pay (Pope), may not only have been a brilliant military strategist but also must surely have been a great communicator.

To historians, Po-pay is something of a mystery man. Although 1615 is no more than a consensus of birth date guesses, it is known that the period from 1635 to 1665 not only saw Po-pay gaining considerable renown and respect as a medicine man and leader in San Juan and neighboring pueblos, but also saw turmoil intensifying across the province. Indian-Spanish antagonisms steadily worsened and intra-Spanish rivalries between government officials, friars, and colonists seemed endless.

Central to this bickering was the question of treatment of and the extracting of material and labor wealth from the Indians. Urged on by the Inquisition, church leaders became increasingly diligent in efforts to destroy what they considered to be heathen religious objects and practices. Despite orders from Spain's king and his council that his Indian subjects were to be protected, land grant and labor use systems — bearing labels such as *encomienda* and *repartimiento* — spawned an economic system which to the Pueblos constituted slavery.

By 1650 the Pueblos were sufficiently disturbed that at least six of the peace-loving villages attempted to join a group of Apaches in open revolt, only to see nine of their leaders hanged and many other enslaved.

When these conditions were exacerbated by natural misfortune, Po-pay and many other Pueblo representatives began to suggest that it was the presence and actions of the Spanish invaders which were upsetting nature's balance. When the years 1665 to 1668 were nearly rainless, leading to starvation, pestilence, and intensified Apache raids, Po-pay began to urge unity and to whisper of armed revolt. In 1675, Governor Juan de Trevino

determined to end the longstanding feud between government and church. To demonstrate the new spirit of cooperation, Trevino proclaimed total prohibition of all native rituals and ultimately ordered the arrest of 47 Pueblo secret society leaders and medicine men. Four were hanged and the rest were publicly whipped, then imprisoned. Only the threat by some 70 other Tewa leaders to lead either an armed revolt or a mass exodus of Indians from the Rio Grande Valley induced the governor to release his religious captives.

One of those released prisoners was Po-pay, who now felt the time had come to lead his people against their oppressors. From this point in his life Po-pay's skills as a communicator became critical.

If he was to recruit supporters, the Pueblo leader's first problem was that of multiple languages. The 60 to 70 villages spoke as many as seven distinct languages plus many dialects. People of any village were likely to remark of residents of neighboring pueblos, even though they shared a common language base, that they "spoke a little to one side."

Po-pay's initial communicative strategem was, therefore, to depend upon multi-lingual traders, as they appeared to go about their normal nomadic routine, to spread the word that revolt plans were brewing. Concurrently, he launched a concerted campaign of persuasion at San Juan and then throughout the pueblos, assisted by key pueblo leaders who were won over by his rhetorical skills. Finally, Po-pay worked to overcome language barriers by using universally understood non-verbal communication techniques — painted deerskins, knotted cords, vari-colored cloths, and even smoke signals.

Besides having to bridge language gaps, Po-pay knew he was dealing with Pueblo traditions of strict tribal autonomy, with each village perceiving itself as separate, independent, and non-aligned. He also knew the Pueblo history of being peace loving and fighting only defensively. Po-pay knew he had to appeal to the strong religious beliefs of his followers, plus making optimal use of his own carefully nurtured ethical appeal, if he was to move them toward a united front.

With each new Spanish act of repression and each new natural disaster, Po-pay spread the word throughout the pueblos

that yet further evidence existed of how the invader was disturbing the universe's natural order and of how limited was the assistance coming from the invader's new god.

San Juan native and historian Alfonso Ortiz reports that by this time Po-pay had become "an extremely respected, revered religious leader." He also was able to wrap himself in a mantle of divine guidance, claiming to be receiving directions from the war god Montezuma or Pose-yemu, channeled through representatives of the god who remained permanently secluded in the underground Taos kiva which had become Po-pay's headquarters. These channels of advice from the war god were variously reported to have been three underworld spirits or a yellow-eyed black giant, but more important than names or identities was the fact that the Indian leader invoked inspiration from spirits to whom most Pueblos could relate, regardless of language.

Another tactic of the master communicator was a ruthless commitment to strictest secrecy as revolt plans developed. He was careful to confide only in those who had sworn a commitment to his cause. In no case did this ever include a female.

One historian called the revolt plans "New Mexico's best kept secret until the making of the atomic bomb." When it appeared that Po-pay's son-in-law, Nicolas Bua, was using his position as governor of San Juan to leak information to the Spanish in Santa Fe, the young governor was killed under mysterious circumstances, and the fiery medicine man moved his headquarters to the more remote village of Taos.

Maintenance of secrecy also explains the training given the runners who served as links in the revolutionary communication network sometimes called the moccasin telegraph. They were taught either to give false information, when captured, or else carried only non-verbal deer skin or knotted yucca cord messages which obviated the need for them even to know sensitive information.

Timing was critical to the revolt's success and, again, communication skill played a key role. The moccasin telegraph informed Po-pay that the long awaited supply train headed north toward Santa Fe

was being delayed by unusually heavy summer rains, meaning that August was a safe month for carrying out his plans.

While there is debate whether Po-pay altered the uprising date when he feared Governor Otermun knew too much, or if the cords by which he was communicating the critical date to all villages were intentionally so knotted as to mislead the Spanish, coordinated fury broke out all across the province simultaneously on August 10, 1680.

Even as hostilities began, Po-pay proved himself an effective user of communication strategy. His plan called for attacking smaller settlements first, thereby securing horses and weapons as well as a psychological boost for the ultimate attack on Santa Fe.

He also arranged to send Pueblos supposedly loyal to the Spanish to confide to the governor the widespread nature of the death and destruction. By thus spreading false intelligence and at the same time systematically cutting all other channels of communication, the rebel leader was able to convince both the refugee groups at Santa Fe and at Isleta that all their countrymen elsewhere in the valley had been exterminated.

Only a few of New Mexico's twentieth century historical writers have acknowledged that a key to Po-pay's success as a revolutionary leader was his skill as a communicator. Erna Fergusson said Po-pay "proved himself a great leader, astute, farseeing . . . Paul Horgan called him 'a leader who inspired them all . . . a whirlwind . . .'" Robert Silverberg stated, "Rarely among the victims of the world's great empires has a leader, like Po-pay, appeared who could manage so amazingly to unite so many different and proudly independent peoples who spoke so many diverse languages." L. Bradford Prince, one of our state's pioneer and most respected historians, summed up this picture of Po-pay the communicator most effectively: " . . . he traveled from town to town, urging a forgetfulness of old jealousies, and using his wonderful eloquence to great effect."

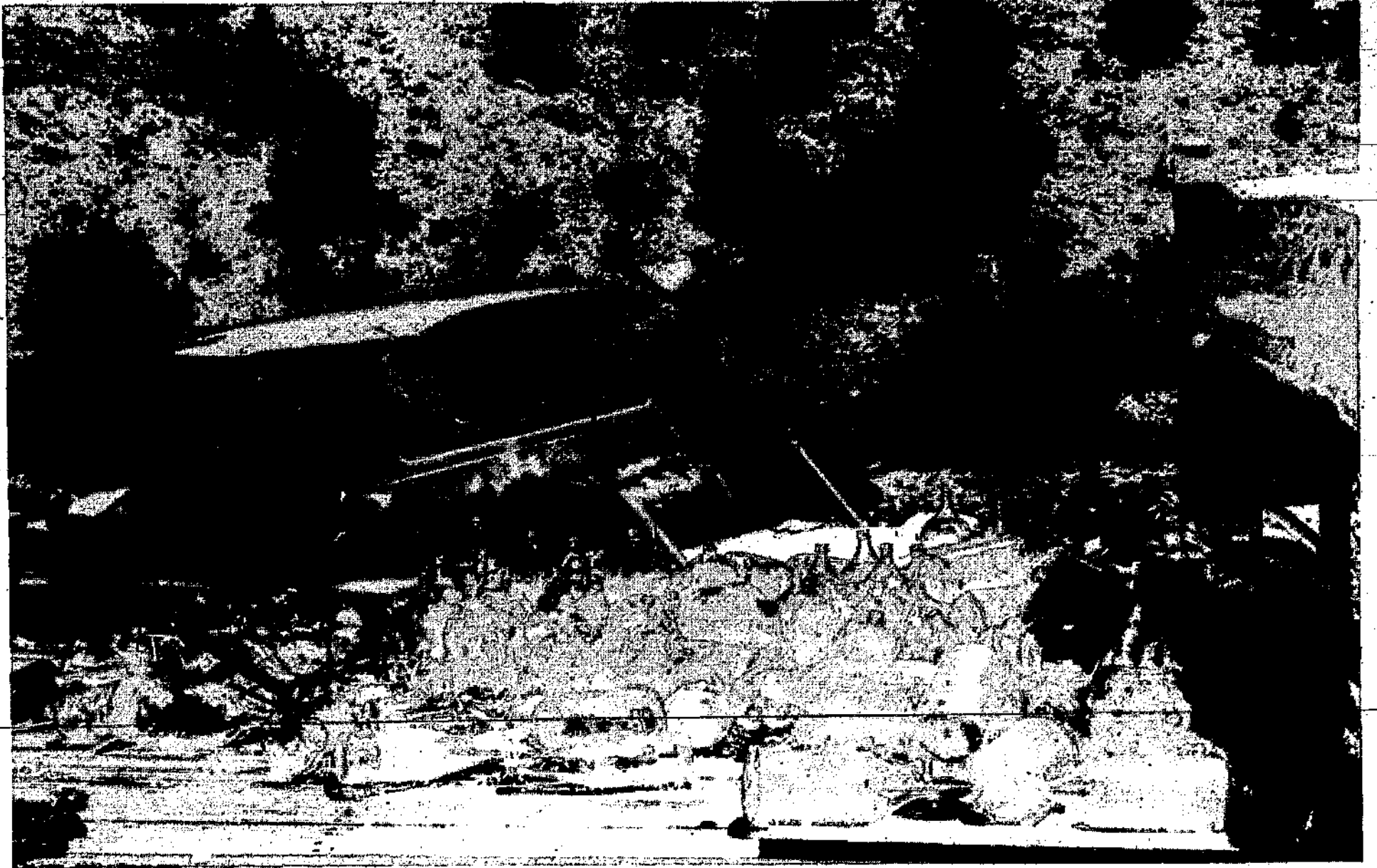

# Group asks 1982 as 'Year of the Eagle'

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) called upon the nation to observe 1982 as the "Year of the Eagle" to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the selection of the bald eagle as its national symbol.

The bald eagle, now an endangered species throughout most of the country, was adopted as the central figure of the great seal of the United States by the second Continental Congress on June 20, 1782, six years after a committee consisting of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, and Thomas Jefferson was named to recommend an official seal for the newly-independent country.

"By next June, the bald eagle will have served as our national bird and symbol for 200 years," said Dr. Jay D. Hair, executive vice president of the NWF. "An eagle bicentennial will remind all Americans of our wildlife heritage — a priceless natural resource that we must manage wisely if it is to survive — and it will also remind us of the virtues — the strength and courage — that the eagle symbolizes."

On the national seal and also the Presidential seal the eagle carries an olive branch, signifying the country's desire for peace, in one talon. In the other it holds a bundle of 13 arrows, symbolizing the willingness of the 13 colonies to fight for freedom.

NWF has asked President Reagan to declare the "Year of the Eagle" in a Presidential proclamation. Hair said, and is now awaiting word from the White House on the President's response.

The high-powered committee appointed to develop a national seal, which included two future Presidents, was created on July 4, 1776, the same day that the colonies declared their independence from England. Benjamin Franklin later said he opposed the choice of the eagle on grounds that it was a cowardly creature of "bad moral character" that stole its food from other birds.

In a letter he wrote in 1784, Franklin said he had favored the turkey gobbler as the national bird despite the fact that turkeys were sometimes "vain and silly."

Zoologists dispute Franklin's contention that the bald eagle, a bird found only in North America, is a "rank coward." After years of study by three committees, William Barton, a Philadelphia expert on heraldry (and brother of Benjamin Barton, a well-known naturalist), submitted a design to Charles Thomson, secretary of the Continental Congress, and Thomson presented his drawing, with

some changes, to the Congress.

The United States was by no means the first country to use an eagle — there are more than 50 species of the bird worldwide — as its symbol. Eagles appeared in the heraldry of Mesopotamia more than 3,000 years before Christ and served as emblems for Roman emperors, Charlemagne, Napoleon, and Peter the Great.

Ornithologists believe the bald eagle soared over all of the present "lower 48" states when the first Europeans arrived on this continent. Their numbers declined steadily as settlers pushed back the frontier and destroyed their wilderness habitat, then fell sharply in the 1950s and 60s as DDT, dieldrin, and other man-made pesticides contaminated their food supplies. The indiscriminate use of these deadly pesticides was outlawed in the

early 1970s.

Shooting has also taken its toll of the "bird of freedom." Until 1940, when Congress passed the Bald Eagle Protection Act, some states actually paid bounties for carcasses of the predatory "varmint" bird. The federal protection law was reinforced by the Endangered Species Act of 1966 and 1973 and by a campaign by the National Wildlife Federation to stamp out illegal shooting of the bird.

Since 1973 the NWF has paid 13 \$500 rewards for information leading to the conviction of eagle killers — a program that the United States Fish and Wildlife Service now duplicates as a deterrent to eagle poaching. Since the national Bicentennial of 1976, when it established the NWF Raptor Information Center to serve as a clearing-house for data on

eagles and other birds of prey, the Federation has also acquired and placed under the protection of wildlife agencies eagle roosting sites in five states.

Each January the NWF conducts a bald eagle census in the "lower 48" states which is considered to be the most thorough count conducted in the United States. The Federation has also lobbied and been involved in several lawsuits in efforts to safeguard habitat for the nation's symbol.

The bald eagle is now listed as "endangered" in all but five of the lower 48 states. In Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Washington, and Oregon it is listed as "threatened." In the 49th state, Alaska, bald eagles are plentiful and in the 50th, Hawaii, they are non-existent.

## Man can't match aquatic antics of animals born with diving gear

Flippers, snorkels, goggles, wet suits: Humans will don some strange looking equipment in order to feel more at home in the water. But according to Ranger Rick's Nature Magazine, no matter what we wear, we simply can't match the aquatic abilities of those animals who are born with special diving gear. These super swimmers include:

**DOLPHINS** — Found in most of the world's oceans, these marine mammals are equipped with a sophisticated sonar system for locating food, obstacles, and each other in the dark water. The dolphin's eyes are covered with thick outer layers and a gland secretes an oily liquid which bathes the outside of the eyes. "The layers and the liquid protect the dolphin's eyes so the salty sea water won't make them sting," explains the National Wildlife Federation's monthly publication for children.

Although it must come to the surface to breathe, the dolphin can store much more air in its lungs than a human can. When hunting for fish or squid, it can dive to depths of up to 800 feet.

**SEA LIONS** — Like dolphins, sea lions have streamlined bodies and built-in

flippers. "With powerful strokes of those big front flippers, a sea lion can swim as fast as 20 miles per hour," reports Ranger Rick. The sea-lion's hind flippers act as a rudder, to keep it on course or help it change direction.

When pursued by an enemy, sea lions "porpoise," or leap, through the crest of waves offshore. This method of "body-surfing" also performed by dolphins, uses less energy than swimming below the water's surface. Sea lions can stay underwater for up to 20 minutes and can descend to at least 450 feet, although a trained California sea lion once set a diving record of 820 feet.

**HIPPOTAMUS** — How can the heavy, clumsy-looking hippo be classified as a super swimmer? "By holding in just the right amount of air, hippos become nearly 'weightless' underwater," explains Ranger Rick. Then they rather gracefully half swim and half tiptoe along river bottoms.

The hippopotamus — the word means "river horse" in Greek — must spend most of the day in the water. Its skin dries out so fast that the big animal would die if it

couldn't soak in water or mud. At night hippos emerge and graze on land.

**RIVER OTTERS** — With its sleek, streamlined body and tail, a river otter can swim fast and turn quickly, and it can dive in a flash, leaving scarcely a ripple. Special flaps close automatically underwater, like hatches on a submarine.

**PENGUINS** — These highly specialized birds do fly, in a sense, underwater. Their wings are powerful flippers which propel them through the water swiftly. A gentoo penguin can swim as fast as 22 miles per hour. Penguin feathers make fantastic "wetsuits." Thick, short, rigid, and overlapping, the feathers and a layer of fat beneath the skin keep the birds from freezing to death in the icy water.

Some varieties of penguins spend months at sea, straying onshore only to breed, lay eggs, or molt. While diving for food — shrimp, squid, or krill — they usually surface every two or three minutes to breathe, although the Emperor penguin has been clocked at 18 minutes underwater. This large penguin is also a deep diver; a vertical plunge of 835 feet has been recorded.

Notes Ranger Rick, "That's almost twice as deep as the record for a human diver with scuba gear — and the penguin was just holding its breath!"

The Ruidoso Board of Realtors answers questions regarding the real estate industry and related concerns.

Question: How does the new adjustable rate mortgage (ARM) work?

Answer: The interest rate on the principal balance due can be changed as often as every month depending upon which federal index is used. The choice of index is agreed upon by the borrower and lender when the mortgage is written.

Question: Does that mean my monthly payment will fluctuate every month?

Answer: It could, but that isn't likely. Depending on how your lender sets up the loan, the monthly payment can rise or fall, the term of the loan can be reduced or lengthened to a 40-year maximum, or the loan principal can be increased or decreased. Most banking officials agree that monthly payments will not be adjusted more frequently than every six months, as the paper work involved is too complicated for more frequent increases.

Question: How does the real estate industry view the ARM?

Answer: With apprehension. The individual homebuyer's ability to meet monthly payments with the potential for increased rates as often as twice a year is met with considerable skepticism. Most people cannot handle such wide fluctuations in their budget.

Question: Are interest rates expected to fall any time soon?

Answer: The housing recovery is expected to begin within the near future according to the National Association of Realtors. Interest rates have fallen during

May, only to move back up to their previous levels. However, it is just a matter of time before mortgage rates begin to decline from their current national level of 16 to 17 percent.

Question: How can you possibly be so optimistic? Aren't you taking a big risk in predicting a lowering of rates any time soon?

Answer: Absolutely not. Rate reductions are directly tied to inflation. In recent months, both the Consumer Price Index and the Wholesale Price Index have been rising at less than a double-digit rate.

Question: To what level do you see interest rates falling?

Answer: With core inflation still around 10 percent, it is unlikely that mortgage rates will decline below a national rate of 14 percent anytime this year.

Question: Should I wait a few years to buy a home? Surely interest rates will fall by then.

Answer: Interest rates may or may not drop below 14 percent in the next few years, but what you may gain in lower rates will more than likely be lost in higher home prices.

Question: How do you recommend the first-time homebuyer finance a home in these difficult times?

Answer: There are many new mortgage plans coming on the market, in addition to creative financing which is being used widely today. 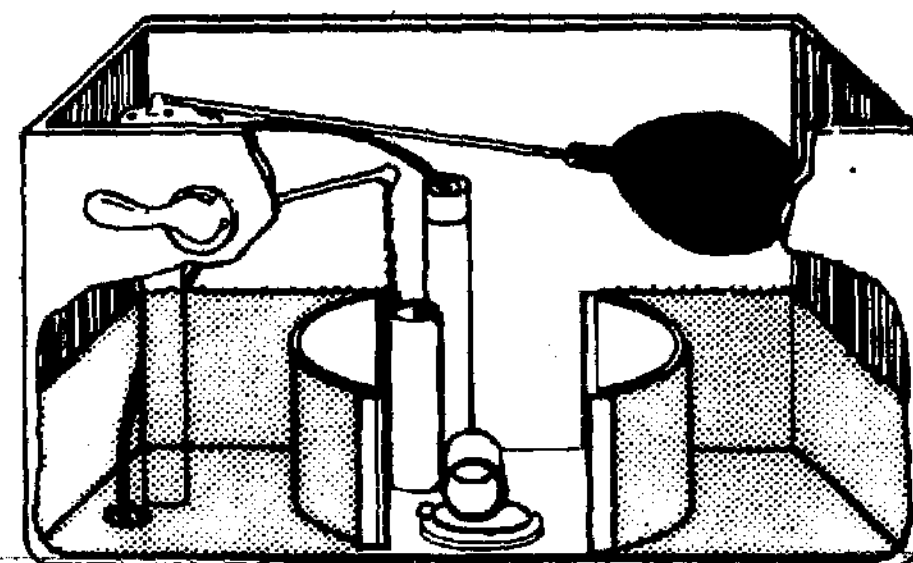

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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Someday someone will have the guts to say, "This is how the thing ought to be done."

"The thing," in this instance, is redistricting Senate and House seats in the New Mexico Legislature.

But the Legislative Council Service apparently won't be the ones with that courage.

What they produced for consideration by legislators last Friday is not a plan. It is a hodge-podge, mish-mash of potential plans which might someday, by the goodness of God, congeal into something. It is so tentative as to be almost without real content.

Instead of drawing up a statewide proposal for the Senate and a statewide proposal for the House, what the Council did was draw up a variety of plans for each.

Even so, none of the plans can strictly be called such. What it does is divide the state into a variety of groupings, in the hope that legislators will then go to work and split up the groupings, fairly between themselves.

All this appears to be an effort of people who say, "Well, we are only employees of the Legislature. It surely isn't our place to tell them how to set up their own districts. All we can do is hint, nudge and suggest."

How humble!

Those who know the Council Service know that is not always so gently in its assistance to the legislators. There have been those who thought it often exerts more power than either House or Senate.

It's just that on this point — this delicate point about whose district shall be where — it becomes as shy as a maiden lady and throws up its hands in despair.

The dispatch from Bill Feather of the Associated Press which ran in papers on the day after this presentation said there

were seven plans presented — four for the House and three for the Senate.

This reporter has 18 plans — seven for the Senate and nine for the House, though four House plans and three Senate plans are singled out as being superior.

The fact is, however, that all 18 plans will go to legislators for their consideration.

But we haven't yet clearly explained what these "plans" consist of.

Instead of dividing the state up into 42 Senate districts and 70 House districts, the number required by law, each of these "plans" groups a number of Senator House seats together.

It suggests that, let's say, these five House seats, taken as a group, will have the correct number of voters to impress any court of law to which the state's districting plan will be appealed.

Within that area, however, the five House members will have to grapple among themselves about who gets what. The Council will watch them wrestle that out for themselves.

Needless to say, that leaves room for trade-offs and backscratching and you-gimme-this-and-I-give-you-that like you wouldn't believe.

We have always said this exercise, in which men and women presently occupying posts with certain geographical limits are asked to redesign the very districts they occupy, is almost beyond human capacities in what it requires.

The Council Service, creature of the Legislature that it is, has done little to relieve any of that super-human pressure.

All it has so far offered is a method by which a major war can be averted and be broken down into a large number of separate battles.

Is that any real solution?

#### WOMEN AND DRAFT

The Supreme Court decision which in effect exempts women from military conscription has gotten a highly polarized reaction. Some view the ruling as the very essence of common sense, a practical recognition that Americans just don't want women to serve in combat. Others see it as

a disastrous setback for important constitutional guarantees and for women's rights in particular.

Many Americans, we think, will feel a certain ambivalence about the court's resolution of this troubling issue. They may perceive it as a bulwark against the abhorrent prospect of having women killed or wounded in battle. At the same time, they may find disturbing the court's apparent rejection of the principle of sexual equality.

The decision must be considered in light of an earlier ruling. In 1976 the high court held that laws treating men and women differently are constitutional only if they serve "important governmental objectives" and are "substantially related" to achieving such objectives. The court now says that the Military Selective Service Act, which excludes women from the conscription process, meets that test. It thus overturns a three-judge federal court's ruling in Philadelphia last year that the Selective Service Act unconstitutionally discriminates against men.

In his dissent Justice Thurgood Marshall argued that the court turned its back on precepts deeply embedded in the Constitution: equal protection, and due process of law. It is hard to subdue an uneasy feeling that he may be right — that in upholding the Selective Service Act the court acted more out of expediency than out of concern for firm application of constitutional principles. — Alamogordo Daily News

#### COMMON SENSE

It's refreshing to hear words from an Attorney General who isn't politically catering to the various segments of the population, but speaking to all Americans on an equal basis.

That is the case with William French Smith, and his recent appeals for less emphasis on forced busing in the schools and rigid hiring quotas. School busing, Smith says, is opposed by a majority of both blacks and whites — because it hasn't achieved what it was intended to achieve.

The Reagan Administration offers a different approach — financial incentives to those who would bus their children but not legal coercion and force in establishing quotas in schools.

As to hiring quotas, Smith says they sometimes themselves discriminate. They sometimes force employers to hire unqualified employees, because of race.

The goal of the present Justice Department is the same as it has been, Smith says. The difference is that instead of punitive laws other incentives will be used to get a higher quality of education in the schools and more jobs for minorities. The new approach is, at least, worth a try. — The News, Santa Rosa

#### editorial

As of Tuesday morning striking air traffic controllers were blithely ignoring President Reagan's ultimatum to go back to work or be fired.

Tuesday's news accounts of the controllers' reaction to the ultimatum was, "Who's going to work the airplanes?" thus putting forth the assumption that they are indispensable.

The controllers' question is a good one. Controllers can't be turned out in sufficient number to return air traffic to normal for many months. They know this. Reagan knows this.

However, there remains the aspect of this strike that the American people just might suffer through its effects, and back the President's ultimatum.

We feel that 15,000 government employees should not be permitted to dictate to our nation.

If the strikers are fired, as Reagan has said they will be, this nation will not be crippled. There'll be economic slowdown, but we have survived worse.

We can suppose, in view of this strike, with the thought being if it succeeds, and all striking controllers retain their jobs, that other government employees will pick up their cudgel.

Possibly, now, the Congress will act to draft anti-strike legislation, especially in so far as government employees are concerned, that will have the teeth to prevent such workers from literally thumbing their noses at the President and the nation. We feel such legislation is long overdue. — CD

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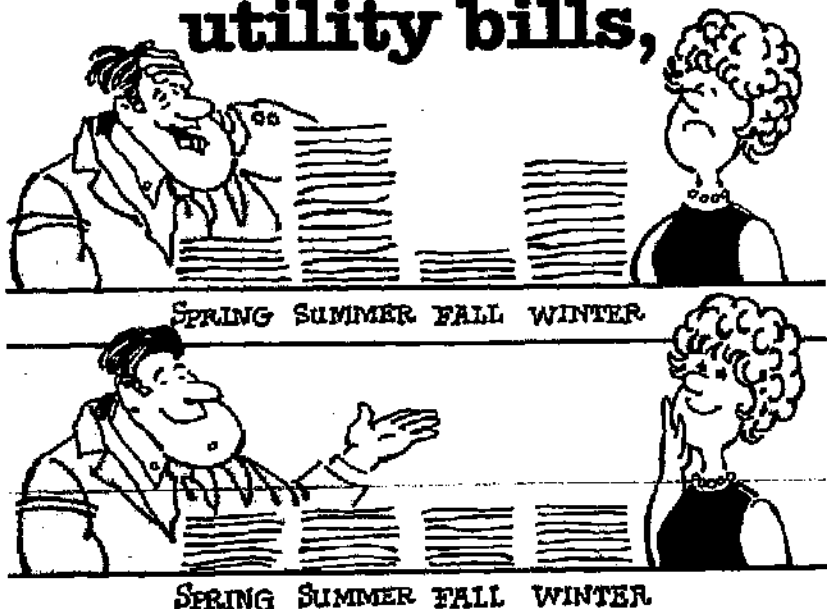

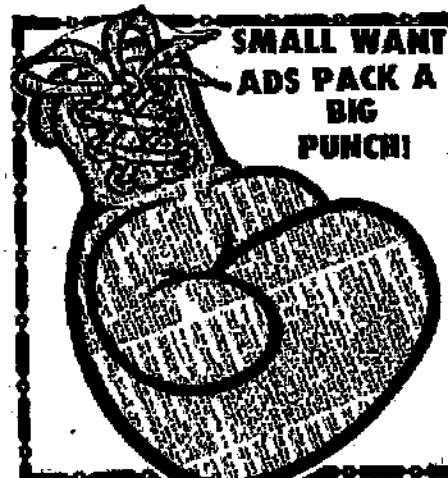

## Vickie Smallwood likes challenge of riding thoroughbred race horses

July 12 was a special day for Vickie Smallwood.

"That was the first time my parents had ever seen me ride," said the 20-year-old blonde jockey. "It was also the biggest race I'd ever won."

When Richard and Lynn Smallwood started the long drive from New Boston, Texas, to Ruidoso Downs, little did they know their daughter was about to make Ruidoso Downs racing history. She became the first woman jockey to win a major Ruidoso Downs' stakes race when she guided Pride Of Loom to a nearly four length win in the \$88,928 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity.

"They said it was worth the drive when I won that race," said Vickie. "I was so happy I did so well when they were here." Winning races, however, is really nothing new for the popular rider.

The first 13 weeks of the Ruidoso Downs' season, she ranked tenth in the jockey standings. She's ridden 18 winners with 20 seconds and 12 thirds from 129 mounts. That's a winning percentage of 139.

She captured 28 races at the recent Sunland Park meeting, riding mainly for New Mexico's perennial leading trainer Bob Arnett.

"Bob's a real nice guy. I ride about 80 percent of his horses. He's given me lots of chances to ride. I've got a lot to learn about riding and I can't do it, if I don't ride," she said.

"I've messed up, but he's real understanding about it. He sees that things

happen you can't control. I can't say enough good things about him."

In her three-year career which started at Evangeline Downs in Lafayette, Louisiana, Vickie has ridden both quarter horses and thoroughbreds. She vastly prefers thoroughbreds.

"There's more strategy in thoroughbred races," she said. "There's more time to think. If you get bumped or stumble, there's still time to maybe get back in the race. I ride 870 (yard) races. I really love those. It's fun. You go fast enough."

Although Vickie has undoubtedly gained the attention of local trainers with her winning ways, she admitted it wasn't so easy starting out as a rider.

"It's pretty tough for lady riders, but as time goes on, it gets easier," she said. "When I started out, you could hardly even gallop a horse. They (horsemen) didn't want girls on a horse. You've got to have good horses if you want to do good."

Riding horses is really nothing new for the 106 pound rider.

When she was nine years old, Vickie rode jumping horses in Hawaii and Virginia. Her father was serving in the military enabling her to live in several locations.

When she was 13, she saved \$70 and bought a 16-month-old filly. "I made a barrel and playday horse out of her," she said.

"My girlfriend was going with a jockey when I was living in New Boston and we watched a match race," she said. "After the race (in De Kalb, Texas), my girlfriend and I galloped the horses. I loved it."

"I got a job breaking colts on a ranch near De Kalb for the winter. I spent about six months there. Then I started riding at Lafayette. I broke my maiden on a horse called Dance Funny Face," she said.

Besides Sunland Park, Ruidoso Downs and Evangeline Downs, Vickie has also ridden at the Downs at Santa Fe and Fillito Downs in Tucson, Arizona.

Still, she is more than happy riding on the Sunland-Ruidoso circuit.

"I get along with everybody. They all treat me pretty good. I'm happy here," she said.

He captured a four-furlong allowance race at Ruidoso Downs on June 27 in the rapid time of :46 4/5 after competing earlier this year at Turf Paradise in Phoenix, Arizona. Trained by Brooks Claridge, he was ridden by Ramon Apodaca. Western Series, who broke his maiden by winning a four-furlong allowance race on June 26 at Ruidoso Downs, was third. He earned \$19,518 for owner Dell J. Akin of Versailles, Kentucky. He's trained by Carl Wooten and was ridden by Darrell Hale. ## Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — I'm just getting into bowhunting and have some questions involving equipment. Late last fall I bought a 42 pound recurve bow, but have not yet bought arrows. Whitetailed deer will be the only game I expect to hunt. Is a 42 pound pull weight heavy enough for this game?

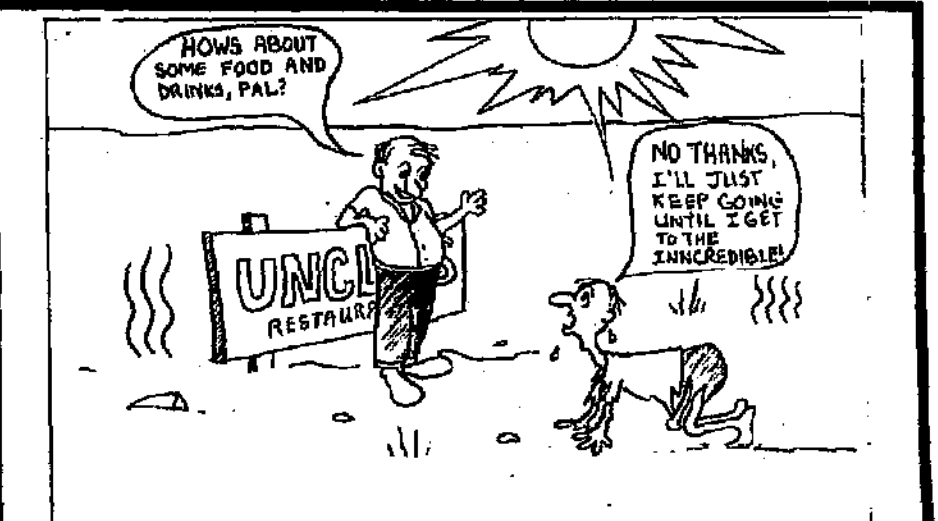
I also have some questions about arrows. What material should the arrow shaft be made of and what is the best brand of broadhead to use? Tony D., South Carolina

Dear Tony — You should check your state's hunting regulations to see if the 42 pound pull weight is above the minimum required. If so, it is adequate for whitetailed deer, but you shouldn't consider using anything with much less pull weight, even if your state allows it. Your bow is just above the minimum experts recommend for such game. Although you didn't mention it, I would recommend installing a bowsight and learn to use it. Since you are apparently a new archer you won't have to break old habits in learning to use the sight. You will find you shoot more consistently with a sight. Along these lines, I suggest you get a good book on the basics of archery. It'll help you start off on the right foot and save

you the anguish of later trying to break bad habits.

On the subject of arrows; there are almost as many opinions as there are arrows. Aluminum and fiberglass shafts have become very popular, and aluminum seems to be used a little more. Whichever you choose, select a shaft that is splined to match your bow. If you cannot find the exact match use one with a lighter spline. Incidentally, spline weight is the degree of flexibility of the shaft, and it is keyed to match the bow's pull weight. If you choose a spline weight that is too light the arrow will whip excessively upon release and make consistent shooting difficult. And penetration will not be as great as with the heavier arrows.

I can't tell you which brand of broadhead is best. I don't think there is a unanimous decision available. There are several top quality ones that will serve you well. For more than 16 years I used Bear Razorheads with good results. A couple of years ago I switched to a fairly new multi-bladed head of another manufacturer, not because I was displeased with Bear, but because I was testing the new head. The choice is yours, but remember, good broadheads aren't really inexpensive.

Pedro Benitez and Joe Martin deadlocked for jockey-of-the-week honors for the 13th week of horse racing at Ruidoso Downs.

Each tallied five victories. The wins moved Benitez into the standings for the first time this season while Martinez moved from seventh into fifth place.

Benitez has 19 wins with 24 seconds and 35 thirds from 189 mounts. That's a winning percentage of .100.

Despite missing much of the early portion of the Ruidoso Downs' meet, Martinez has 23 triumphs with 16 seconds and 17 thirds from 139 mounts. That's a winning percentage of .165.

Jacky Martin remains the jockey leader with a comfortable 24 win margin over runnerup Richard Bickel. Martin has 52 victories with 47 seconds and 32 thirds from 215 mounts.

Bickel is followed in the jockey standings by Leroy Coombs, Stuart Dolphus, Martinez, Willie Lovell, W. R. Hunt, Steve Harris, Benitez and Vickie Smallwood.

There was only one minor change in the trainer standings. C. Dwayne Gilbreath regained a top ten spot by moving into tenth position.

William F. Leach remains the season-long leader. He has 27 triumphs with 15 seconds and 12 thirds from 143 mounts for a winning percentage of .188.

Johnie Goodman remains in second place with 23 victories, three seconds and six thirds from 74 mounts. He has the highest winning percentage of any trainer in the top ten with a .310.

Following Goodman are Bob Arnett, Jack Brooks, Gerald Marr, J. Doyal Roberts, Clifford Lambert, Harold E. Nolen, Marilyn Asmussen and C. Dwayne Gilbreath.

Only five weeks remain in this summer's 70 day Ruidoso Downs season.

The 14th week begins on Thursday with a 12 race card, highlighted by an allowance chase for three-year-olds at six furlongs.

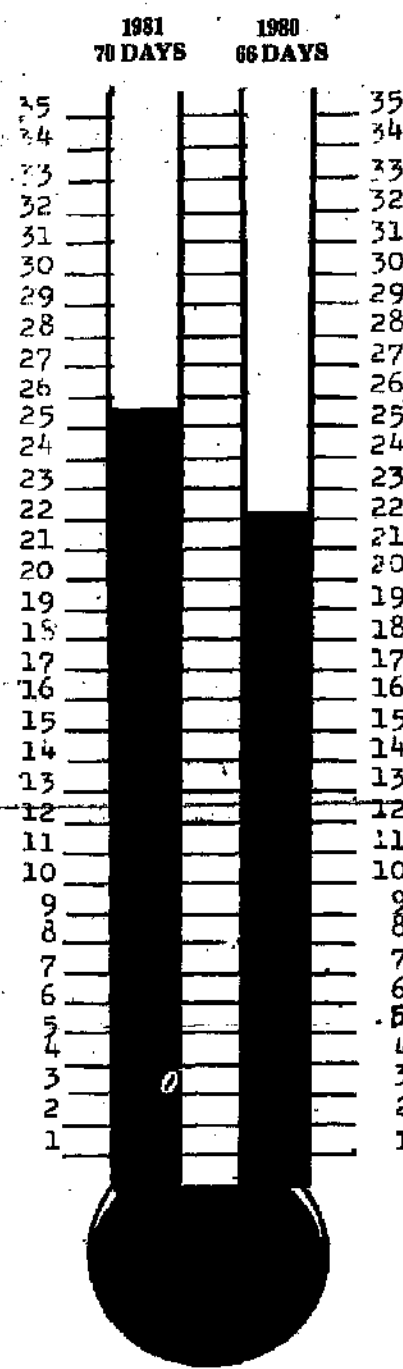

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# Crime Stoppers seek portly confidence man

You might say that James B. Christesson has an identity problem.

In the past, while pursuing his career as a con man, Christesson has used at least four aliases — Buddy Miller, J. Miller, Merle Johnson and Jim B. Christesson.

Now, in addition to his identity problem, Christesson is about to face another headache — he's wanted by law enforcement agencies in two states and this week the State Crime Stoppers Commission and Curry County Crime Stoppers are combining to offer a \$1,500 reward for information leading to his capture.

Christesson is wanted by Clovis police for fraud over \$2,500 and by Texas law enforcement authorities on charges of "Swindle by Worthless Check." And to complete the triangle, the FBI has entered the picture with a warrant charging Christesson with "Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution."

The 52-year-old portly con man is considered a high escape risk. Previously, he has fled from authorities through bathroom windows and even has feigned illness to escape.

He is described as a white male, 6-0, 220 pounds, with blue eyes and graying brown hair. The index finger is missing on his left hand.

Christesson is believed to be hiding out in either west Texas or eastern New Mexico. But if you frequent race tracks, you might want to take a look around ... Christesson likes to play the ponies.

Opening day (Monday) will be an invitation only show and sale, and Tuesday will be open to the general public.

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
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# Tiny's Gay's 'almost' triple crown win reviewed

In 1974, the Ruidoso Downs management prepared itself for the first Triple Crown winner in history.

A giant, four-tiered trophy was assembled, and the large nameplate was inscribed: "Tiny's Gay, First Winner Of The Quarter Horse Triple Crown."

On the day of the All-American Futurity, the trophy was taken out from its hiding place and stashed behind the totalisator board. The idea was to present the trophy on national television, during the victory ceremony for the All-American.

The Ruidoso bigwigs — like everyone else — had every right to feel a Triple Crown champ was in the making. Tiny's Gay was the sensation of 1974. He's gone into the All-American with a perfect record of 13 wins from 13 starts. Along the way, he'd set top qualifying times left and right, and notched the \$358,705 Kansas Futurity and the \$310,310 Rainbow Futurity.

All he needed was the All-American Futurity to make a clean sweep on the Triple Crown. But the historic occasion was ruined when Easy Date lunged ahead on the outside and nipped Tiny's Gay by a nose.

Tiny's Gay, who suffered a leg injury at the start of the All-American, was soon retired to stud, and dreams of Triple Crown glory were left to die peacefully. The four-tiered Triple Crown trophy was returned to the backrooms at the racetrack, becoming an impressive dusty collector. But even that quiet dignity was finally denied this ornament. It was soon dismantled, to provide spare parts for other trophies. At last, there was nothing left, save the gold-tinted nameplate, and even that was to disappear, lost in Ruidoso's recent history.

Until this season's emergence of Special Effort, no horse — other than Tiny's Gay

— has won both the Kansas Futurity and Rainbow Futurity and put himself only one notch short of the Triple Crown. Like Tiny's Gay at that juncture, Special Effort is undefeated. Like Tiny's Gay, he's managed to keep a solid upper hand over his peers.

It's only natural that Tiny's Gay and Special Effort have become mirror images, with the exploits of one recalling the other. So we rang up John Colville, the man who owns Tiny's Gay, and intruded on his busy schedule (he's owner of Paragon Plastics Products of Paramount, California), a 22-man outfit which produces component parts for the plastics industry.

When you invite Colville to talk about Tiny's Gay and the Triple Crown, that's like inviting a diet-plagued fat man to sit down to steak and French fries. After instructing his switchboard operator to hold all calls, Colville and this reporter reviewed that glorious summer of 1974.

Surprisingly, Colville has no protectionist attitude toward that near-miss in the Triple Crown. "As an enthusiastic participant in the industry, I recognize that future goals and achievements will overshadow previous accomplishments," he said. "Let the records fall where they may."

When you break that corporate lingo down to every day English, Colville means he bears no resentment toward a possible Triple Crown champ. In fact, he welcomes it — especially since it could mean so much to the industry.

"In 1974, when Tiny's Gay was running, it was impossible to reflect on his accomplishments," John said. "Later, after he was retired, I could look back on the 1974 season, and it seemed impossible that he could accomplish what he did. The

colt ran eight times in the Triple Crown series, set the fastest qualifying times for the two Rainbow Trials and his two Kansas Trials, won the finals of both, set the third fastest time for the All-American, and lost the All-American by a nose."

When Colville had a chance to think all this over, it seemed too much to believe. The Triple Crown schedule is a hard, back-breaking road, with trials and finals so compacted. "There's a great element of luck involved, and I don't mean the luck you need in the starting gate," John said. "If a horse is good, he'll break well, and win his race. The 'luck factor' I'm referring to is in the soundness and health of your horse."

But a lot of water has passed under the bridge since 1974, John said, and there's been great progress in three important areas: breeding, training and riding. These factors, he feels, will help produce the kind of horse you need to successfully travel the Triple Crown road. "The industry is now prepared to produce a superhorse," he said.

Does Special Effort fill the bill? Colville says he hasn't formed a real opinion on the colt, since he saw him run only once, and that was on the TV replay of the Kansas

Futurity. "I was able to see his running style, but I haven't yet gauged his competition, so I'm reserving judgment — at least until I see this weekend's delayed telecast of the Rainbow Futurity here in California," he said.

Special Effort will be getting his supreme test in the All-American (if he survives the qualifying trials). When Tiny's Gay raced in the All-American, he had to engage the best from around the country, including Easy Date, who'd been a standout in California. Special Effort's competition in the All-American may include the likes of Dashing, who earned nearly \$400,000 with her win in the Dash For Cash Futurity on the West Coast.

Although destiny short changed Tiny's Gay in the Triple Crown, the colt has gone a long way toward making up for it. He's produced only three crops of offspring so far, but his sons and daughters have already earned nearly \$1 million. John tells us only 20 stallions (more or less) have achieved this distinction, and only five or so have done it so early in their breeding careers.

Still, you can't blame Colville if he yearns, now and then, for that Triple Crown trophy he almost got to take home.

## Schmitt offers lottery plan on radio, television licensing

A Senate-House conference committee has approved legislation sponsored by Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt to extend licensing periods for radio and television stations and to permit the Federal Communications Commission, FCC, to use lotteries to award new licenses.

The proposal, a part of the budget reconciliation bill, extends the terms of radio licenses from three to seven years and the terms of television licenses from three to five years.

It also will allow the FCC to use a lottery system to award licenses, replacing the present practice of competitive hearings before the FCC.

Currently, the application process often turns into a lengthy one when an applicant is challenged, simply for the sake of being challenged, and faces costly hearings.

Senator Schmitt said: "This action shows Congress recognizes the need to treat broadcasters differently and this is a good beginning."

The bill also would discourage "pirating" of broadcasting license applications with the purpose of selling their interest to the existing licensee.

The committee also approved \$130 million a year, from 1984 through 1986, for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB).

In addition, the committee accepted a formula for the distribution of federal money to local CPB radio and television stations, approved a plan allowing a public TV station to share institutional accounting, and to allow bi-annual, instead of annual, audits.

## Track nurse at Ruidoso Downs faces busy race day schedule

Take a dash of Florence Nightingale, a pinch of Dear Abby, a sprinkling of Erma Bombeck. Mix well and add salt and pepper to taste. When well set, break the mold and call the creation Marianne.

For five years, Marianne Atcheson, Ruidoso Downs' track nurse, has been dispensing aspirin, advice and care to the racers with humor, tenderness and skill. To a fainting young lady, she offers a bed to lie on; a glass of water and all the time needed to rest. To the elderly regulars, a blood pressure check and friendly questions about their families, their chronic illnesses, or an offer of a folding chair (of which she keeps dozens under the bed).

To this reporter, advice about preventative medicine, track tales, anecdotes and a continuing smile.

"The most unusual case I've had here was a young man who had strep throat," she said. "He was from Killam, Texas, and had come down with the strep on Wednesday. His doctor had given him a penicillin shot that night, and then the man drove here to Ruidoso. On Thursday, he got to the races, managed to sit out several, then the penicillin reaction set in. 'I didn't know anything about it until I saw two people carrying him out. I asked what was wrong, and they said he couldn't walk. So I brought him here. He was aching all over and his throat was almost closed up,' she said.

"We didn't wait for an ambulance, but took him directly to the hospital. They put him in ICU (Intensive Care Unit) and gave some antihistamines. Three days later he was all right.

"We've only had two cases of cardiac arrest here. Mostly, it's just pulmonary syndrome sickness, which happens when people come from the flatlands and get into this mountain air. They get excited,

and then before they know it, they're in here."

She seems to know all about the track and its people — from a medical standpoint. From trainers who are trying to lose weight, to racers who come to get their daily vitamins. Sometimes, it's just to give a gift of food, or in one particular case, a pink, hand-embroidered apron.

"Look at this," she said. "I took this lady's blood pressure for four years. Isn't it lovely? I cried when she gave it to me."

"Her heart is bigger than this room," said a visitor to the cramped but cheerful office, located under the stairs to Ruidoso Downs' prestigious Jockey Club.

The children especially seem to capture her love.

"Oh, I just love the kids," she said. "Look at that one. Isn't she adorable?" She shows her stock of Tootsie Rolls. "I give them to the kids when they come to get a cut cleaned, so it'll take their minds off the Merthiolate when it stings." Her theory was quickly put to the test when a young boy was brought in by his mother with a scrape on his forehead.

Sure enough, the Tootsie Roll treatment worked.

For a brief moment, the small office is quiet. A patient on the bed is resting, Marianne's "little helper" Cash Claridge, a curly haired five-or-six-year-old, is quietly sweeping with a pint-sized broom.

Marianne relaxing for the first time all day, said, "It's always like this. Last weekend I had seven in here at a time, two on the bed, one on that chair, another on that other chair and the rest in folding chairs just outside." She looks around the tiny room, which barely can hold two people.

"They always offer to pay," she said of her patients. "But I just can't accept money. I always tell them that the best thing for them to do is to get well."

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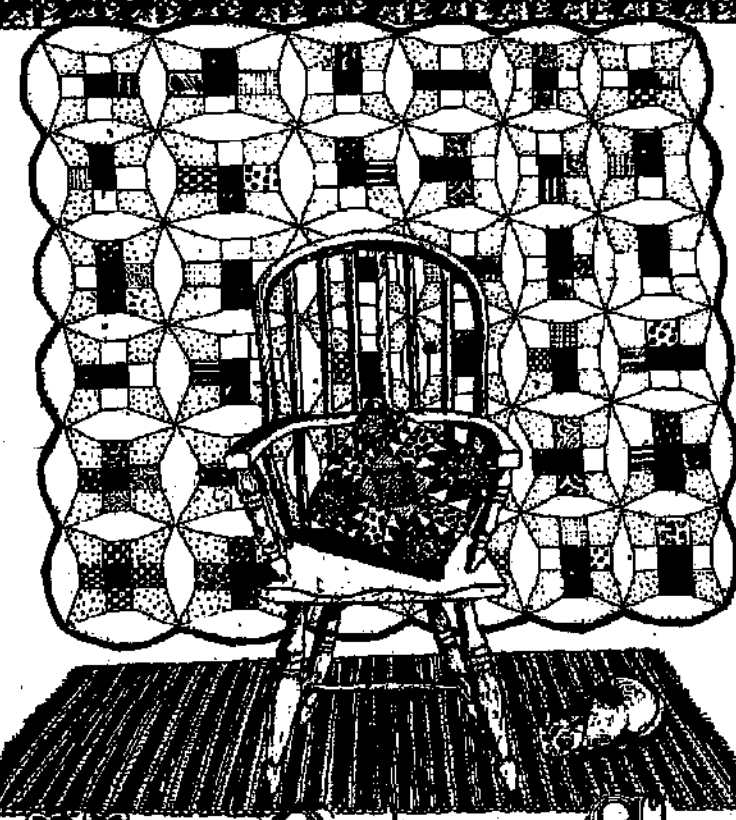
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
