Cocaine seized in raid



The street value of the seized cocaine was estimated to be \$10,000.

Trio died of gunshots

Ruidoso Police are today awaiting autopsy results of a shooting incident Tuesday which left three persons dead in a local residence.

The bodies of Doris Jean Johnson, 44. James "Hoot" Johnson, 51, and Millard Deck. 58, were transported to Albuquerque Wednesday. Autopsies were scheduled to be performed Thursday morning by the state medical examiner.

Police had announced early Wednesday that the incident was an apparent double murder and suicide, based on preliminary investigation. Gunshot wounds to the head were determined to be the cause of death

in all three victims. A .22 caliber handgun was found at the scene, police said. James Johnson's wound appeared to be self-inflicted, according to a department spokesman.

A vacation home at 354 Country Club Drive owned by Deck, an oliman from Eunice, was the site of the shootings.

Police went to the house around 7 p.m., Tuesday after an acquaintance of one of the victims asked for assistance in locating the person. Finding the Deck home locked, and hearing the small dog that was the oilman's constant companion inside, police entered the home through a window and discovered the bodies.

Investigators determined the incident took place sometime early Tuesday. The Johnsons had lived in Ruidoso about

eight years, according to a family friend. Their 26 year marriage ended in divorce this past summer. Mr. Johnson left his job with the Ruidoso

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



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Application deadline October 2 for big game hunting permits

Deadline for applying for deer entry permits is October 2. Six additional hunts have been approved by the State Game Commission since the 1981-82 big game proclamation was printed, according to Walt Snyder, Game Management Division chief for the Department of Game and Fish. October 2 is also deadline for applying for javelina, oryx, Siberian and Persian ibex, and trophy Barbary sheep.

The additional entry permit hunts include two on the Philmont Scout Ranch (C-5 and C-6) to alleviate deer depredation problems there, one on the Armstrong Ranch in the Capitan Mountains (C-7) and three on the San Juan State Game Refuge (C-8, C-9 and C-10). The San Juan Refuge hunts were approved by the commission at its last meeting August 28.

Application procedures for the additional entry permit hunts are the same as those outlined in the big game proclamation for previously established entry permit hunts.

The San Juan Refuge hunts - for muzzleloader hunters only — are January 9-10 (C-8), January 16-17 (C-9), and January 23-24 (C-10). Up to 100 permits will be available for each hunt; bag limit is one deer of either sex.

The hunt on the Armstrong Ranch (C-7) will be December 5-6, with up to 500 permits available; bag limit, one deer of either sex. Hunters may use rifle, muzzleloader or bow,

Up to 75 permits are available for each of the bow-only hunts (C-5, November 21-22 and C-5, November 28-29) on the Philmont Scout Ranch. Bag limit will be two deer of either sex.

Entry permit hunts outlined in the proclamation are:

-C-1, November 7-8 in the Oscuro Mountains, for rifle, muzzleloader or how hunters, up to 500 permits available; hag limit, one deer of either sex;

C-2, November 14-15 in the San Andres Mountains and the Organ Mountain State Game Refuge, for rille, muzzleloader or bow hunters, up to 200 permits available; bag limit, one deer of either sex; C-3, November 28-29 in the Texas Canyon

portion of the Organ Mountains, for bow or muzzleloader hunters only, up to 100 permits available; bag limit, one deer of either sex.

C-4, November 21-22 and November 28-29 on McGregor Missile Range east of Las Cruces, for rifle, muzzleloader or bow hunters, up to 700 permits available; bag limit, one antlered buck.

Each hunter in an entry permit area must have a valid deer hunting license with deer tag altached, plus the pertinent entry permit. For the C-3 hunts, the deer license must be validated for bow or muzzleloader. Hunters in the C-1, C-2 and C-3 hunts must also have special season deer tags (\$2.25).

The javelina hunt is December 5-14 in the southwest. Up to 400 licenses are available. Anyone may apply except those who held javelina licenses for the December 1980 season.

Oryx hunts (O-1 and O-2) are December 19-22 in the White Sands area. Up to 30 licenses are available for O-1, up to 10 for

may apply who never held a license or an authorization to buy a license to hunt oryx in New Mexico. Bag limit for the O-2 hunt includes only oryx with broken or nontypical horns.

Persian ibex hunts in the southwest are Jamary 16-24 (I-1), up to 30 licenses available; and January 30-Pebruary 7 (I-2), up to 100 licenses available. Up to four licenses will be available for the Siberian ibex hunt February 13-21 (I-3).

Only those residents and nonresidents may apply for I-1 and I-3 licenses who never held a license or authorization to buy a license to hunt ibex. Anyone, resident or nonresident, may apply for the I-2 hunt, including those previously licensed to mint lbex in New Mexico.


Barbary sheep hunts are January 9-17 (B-1) in the northeast, up to 100 licenses available; and in the northwest during the same dates (B-2). Anyone, resident or nonresident, may apply for B-1 or B-2 licenses, except those who held New Mexico Barbary sheep licenses of any kind from April 1, 1980, through March 31, 1981.

Correct fees must accompany javelina, oryx, ibex and Barbary sheep applications: javelina, \$16 resident, \$51 nonresident; oryx, ibex and Barbary sheep, \$26 resident, \$301 nonresident.

Application for entry permit, oryx, ibex, javelina and Barbary sheep hunts should be made on Form U, using hunt code. Up to two persons may apply under the same application number. Applications may be submitted by mail to the Special Hunt section of the Game and Fish Department's Santa Fe office or in person at a game department office in Santa Fe, Raton, Albuquerque, Roswell or Las Cruces. No one may apply for an entry permit hunt who held an entry permit for 1980-81 entry permit hunts.

Application fee is \$1, nonrefundable. Payment must be by cashier's check or money order. Cash will be accepted with applications submitted in person at game department offices.

Entry permits and licenses for javelina and exotic big game will be allotted by public drawing in the game department's Santa Fe office on October 21.


Busy week for local sports

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


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

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Patents Pending

He holds 147 patents in the U.S. and more than 100 abroad. And, at 85, Horace L. Smith, Jr., a professional inventor, is still at it.

Believing that the blend of physical and mental agility is important to keep "the old machine going," Smith keeps his mind active by his inventing and his body in shape by strenuous stair walking.

Distaining weather-dependent jogging, Smith walks up seven flights of stairs every afternoon. "You use the same. muscles you do in jogging," he told a writer from the National Council on the Aging. "and besides, the stairway is just outside my door,"he chuckles.

Smith, who received two degrees in civil engineering from the Virginia Military Institute 65 years ago, has had 76 patents issued since he was 60 years of age.

Maintaining an office in the city, he begins work at 7:45 am.

works several hours every day and always takes paperwork home with him. He shows no signs of slowing down.

One of his most significant inventions was the thermovactor, a device which provides moisture vital to tobacco leaves and shortens curing time - of particular interest to the tobacco industry surrounding Richmond, VA, Smith's home.

"It was," he says, "an overnight success and we went from a staff of one and a half persons to holding companies in several foreign countries."

In addition to his formalized training, Smith has a natural engineering bent and can be considered, perhaps, a "multipurpose"engineer. He believes he may hold the record for the number of patents in radiant heat, for example.

As an engineer, he has built everything from bridges to baseball diamonds and football fields. His work in this field was recognized years ago when the American Society of Mechanical Engineers named him a "Life Fellow."

Smith lives in a churchsponsored retirement home with his wife of 60 years. Two grown children, five grandchildren and three great grandchildren live nearby and add zest to an already full and use-

His prowness in engineering and his many patents have won Smith numerous awards and honors, but the recognition which has meant the most to him came as a result of disobeying a commanding officer in World War I.,

In Argonne, France, a group of soldiers was holed up near an ammunition depot - an open invitation to German shelling. When the Germans did begin to shell the dump. Smith was ordered by a colonel to form a sentinel around the long stack of ammunition. He did "some quick engineering thinking, and some guessing too" and countermanded the orders. Instead he took 300 men to the front of the stack where they cut an alley through to keep the fire from jumping to the remainder of

the pile. They saved the ammunition and Smith explained there would have been a lot of dead Americans "had we lost our firepower."

The inventive, if brash, act earned him the Distinguished Service Cross which was presented to him by General John Pershing in 1918.

It was an honor and a memory he cherishes the most

A Penchant for Pensions

Four post-retirement jobs were in the offering when Earl Helsel was forced in 1973, by company policy, to retire at age 65.

For one reason or another, Helsel, a resident of Morristown, New Jersey, did not take any of the four, but feared nonetheless that he would have to "stay home and tend the garden", a prospect he did not relish.

Now, however, the 72-yearold insurance man applies his experience to retirement planning for others.

It is not surprising that there were demands for Helsel's talents. He had, after all, been a senior vice president for Equitable Life Assurance Society.

'But", he told a writer from the National Council on the Aging, "I turned down those jobs," (including a bid to become Commissioner of Social Security), "because I did not want to leave the farm", his term for the wooded acreage he loves.

In 1974, however, Heisel, as Treasurer of the Morris Area Girl Scouts Council, was investigating a possible pension plan former colleague from Equitable to Helsel, "a valuable one."

plan and Helsel got a job. 'At first", he says enthusiastically of his part time position, "we had so many projects that I

The company has grown and changed with the times. Born in 1945 as "the stepchild of the United Way," the now-named National Health and Welfare Mutual Life Insurance Association was the first and only organization offering retirement pensions to employees of nonprofit and charitable health and welfare organizations.

"It wasn't practical for the large insurance companies to offer plans to voluntary agencies which, by their nature, had small staffs," Helsel explains, "as it costs almost as much to administer a small group as it does a large corporation and there is little profit margin."

"However, after the war," Helsel continued, "non-profit organizations realized that if they were to make long term employment attractive they would have to offer this type of protection."

The National Health and Welfare Retirement Association came into being to meet that need. It was chartered as a nonprofit organization itself and thus enjoyed tax advantages. That fact made it financially possible for the company to design and offer plans to non-profit agencies. Today they account for about 3,800 such group plans.

"Pension plans have been a

boom to non-profits", Helsel says. "without them they would not have been able to attract and hold professionals of high caliber." And", muses Helsel, "where would this country be without the voluntary sector which has

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Apples are plentiful

A huge apple crop has been moving to market and into storage again this year in New Mexico. Earlier, there were no storage costs, and prices were the lowest of the year, said Esteban Herrera, Extension horticulturist at New Mexico State University.

Quality is tops at this peak supply time. Red Delicious is still the most popular. It is sweet, firm, fragrant and is best raw.

Golden Delicious is sweet, firm, crisp and tender. It is good raw and cooked. It's a completely different variety from the Red Delicious, resembling it only in name and general shape. The Golden Delicious is preferred as a salad apple. It turns brown more slowly after cutting than most varieties, Herrera said.

Rome Beauty is a large apple especially good for baking. It also is used for general cooking purposes.

Jonathans are juicy, moderately tart, tender and crisp. They are eaten raw and are good for all cooking purposes. Their season is much shorter than most of the other fall apples.

Winesaps are a later apple. They are deep red with an indistinct stripe. The creamy-tinged flesh is juicy, firm and moderately crisp. This all-purpose variety is a good keeper for home storage.

Apples are also perishable. They are bruised easily and should be handled carefully. They keep best in a cool, moist place. Small quantities can be kept in the refrigerator. Larger quantities may be stored in a cool, moist, well-vertifated room. It is best to buy only the amount that can be stored properly. There is no savings in buying apples in quantity if some must be thrown away.

Apples are valuable in the diet for several reasons.

"They are the calorie counter's friend," Herrera said. "An average apple has only about 90 calories. Apples contain small amounts of important vitamins and minerals, and they provide dietary fiber. Eaten raw, apples help remove food particles from the teeth.

"There are so many ways to use apples that we never need tire of them. They fit well into every course of the meal," he

With the main course, serve apples in stuffing, fritters, relish, sauted with red cabbage or baked with sausage. Stuff butternut or acorn squash with chopped apples seasoned with brown sugar, butter and nutmeg.

Add apples to jellied Waldorf salad or

other moded salads. Combine them with shredded cabbage and sour cream dressing, or add them to tuna or chicken salad or add to mixed fresh fruit saladous.

For desserts select from applesauce cookies, fresh apple cake, baked apples stuffed with raisins, apple crisp, apple pie, cobbler or serve apple wedges with

Don't forget to serve crisp chilled apples with hot buttered popcorn as a snack.

Couple's slayers being sought

Located in the southwest corner of New Mexico, Hidalgo County long has been a major thoroughfare for illegal aliens entering the United States from Mexico.

Most of the time these aliens quietly pass through the area, sometimes pausing to work at odd jobs before moving on to the more populous areas northward, leaving little trace of their presence.

But occasionally, some of these aliens take advantage of the freedom inherent in American society and turn to crime as a means of support.

Tragically, on a hot August night in tiny Rodeo, this apparently cost the lives of an American rancher and his school teacher

Hidalgo County Sheriff's Deputy Jack Ellis said Weldon C. Grabe, 53, and Betty Jean Grabe, 51, were found shot to death in their ranch house near Rodeo on August

Ellis said investigators are looking for two illegal aliens in connection with the murders.

Apparently the Mexican Nationals had drifted into Rodeo on August 17, searching for work. The Grabes hired them to clean out some irrigation ditches and cut some weeds, but after a couple of days had been dissatisfied with their work and told them

On August 20, Weldon Grabe went to Wilcox, Arizona, to inquire about buying a tractor. While he was gone, investigators say they believe the two aliens broke into the Grabe house through a rear window and got into a gun cabinet.

Armed with a .30-30 caliber rifle and a .22 caliber rifle, the two offenders drank some beer and ate some food while waiting for the Grabes to return.

When Weldon Grabe returned from his trip, the offenders surprised him in his bedroom and shot him several times. Around 7 p.m., Mrs. Grabe arrived home

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Nickel's Building & Hardware Carrizozo 648-2572 from a full day of teaching an elementary school class for the Animas School System. Investigators say Mrs. Grabe was shot as she walked down the hallway of her residence.

Deputy Ellis said both victims had execution wounds behind their left ears. Their bodies were not discovered until the next day, when school officials visited the Grabe home to see why Mrs. Grabe had not shown up to teach class.

The offenders, still armed with their muder weapons, had taken the victims' pickup truck. It was found abandoned some 33 miles south of Rodeo.

Hidalgo County Sheriff's Deputy Billy Darnell and other law enforcement officials tracked the suspects on foot toward

the Mexican border.

Mexican police have been alerted to the possibility that the two offenders might be hiding in the Casas Grandes area of Mexico.

The two unidentified suspects were described as males, about 5-5, with slender builds and medium length dark hair.

Family members and ranchers in Hidalgo County have posted a \$3,000 reward for information leading to the solution of the twin homicides. This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is adding a \$1,000 reward to that fund.

Anyone having any information about this case and the possible whereabouts of the two suspects is asked to call State Crime Stoppers at its toll-free number, 1800-432-6933, or Lordsburg Crime Stoppers at 542-8200. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 32 local Crime Stoppers programs in New Mexico also pay cash rewards for information leading to the solution of other major felony crimes and the capture of wanted persons.

To date, calls to Crime Stoppers programs throughout New Mexico have assisted law enforcement officials in the solution of 3,772 crimes and the recovery of \$5,278,996 worth of stolen property and narcotics. A total of 1,511 persons have been prosecuted in court on Crime Stoppers-related cases and 1,493 have been convicted.



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Police 'Take Home Car Program' working well

The Ruidoso Police Department's "Take Home Car Program" has proven very successful in its first three months, according to Police chief Dick Swener.

Under the program, which went into effect June 1, off duty police officers are allowed to keep their vehicles at all times instead of driving them only while on duty. "it's like their own car," said Swenor.

He explained that the 12 men in the

He explained that the 12 men in the program are allowed the personal use of police vehicles while off duty. Officers do not carry family members in their cars, however, unless given permission to do so in exceptional circumstances.

Swenor pointed out many advantages to the take home program, including increased visibility of the police force on the streets and in residential areas. Nine of the 12 cars are marked, and he noted that neighbors of officers in the program have made comments like, "We sure like to see that car over there."

The chief listed improved response time as another important benefit of the program. Off duty officers check in by radio when using their cars, he explained. "If I want just about my entire force, I can have them mobilized in 10 minutes," said

Since each officer carries from 200 up to 600 or 700 pounds of equipment — such as foul weather gear, personal weapon, rescue equipment and accident investigation tools — the time and effort of moving it in and out of the car is saved.

Swenor cited a dramatic 43 percent drop in maintenance costs for vehicles used in the take home program. He attributed the decrease to reduced use of the cars to eight hours per day instead of 16 or 24. Having just one driver also tends to lessen wear and tear on a car, said Swenor.


Increased morale has been another plus for the program, the chief noted. "The officer takes pride in using and main-

taining his own unit," he said.
"It comes in handy," said Skip Hazel, one of the policemen taking part in the program. "I don't have to keep moving my equipment back and forth, in and out."

Swenor explained that the department pays for all of the gas used by police vehicles, but that any extra expense is justified by the benefits of the take home program. Besides those mentioned, he cited increased longevity of vehicles, higher trade-in value, better mileage, and less overtime costs with off duty officers more readily available for backup.

The chief also predicts a drop in the rate of accidents involving police vehicles. "the officers tend to be more defensive drivers," he said. He added that the program has no effect on insurance rates.

All in all, Swenor is pleased with the take home car program in its three months of operation. And, he said, "The more we get into it, I think the better it will be."

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
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Inside The Capitol

on . . . and probably by next year. "Yup, way I figure it, if'n we ain't taking





The New Mexico State Fair, the seventh largest exposition in the United States, has come a long way in a century, and this year's Centennial Fair will pay homage to the first New Mexico Territorial Fair back

The two-hour parade, set for Saturday morning, September 19, will have a cen-tennial theme with old time floats, not unlike ones folks watched when Old Town was just a cluster of adobe buildings, general stores and saloons.

Other activitires and displays pointing to that historical background will include museum exhibits and an original street car that shuffled people from new Albuquerque to Old Town where the fair was held. In 1938, the location was moved to its current site.

Last year's figures were all-time records, with a gate of 1,145,534 and a racetrack handle of \$14,277,792.



Lost airline tickets an expensive hassle

What happens when an airline ticket gets lost? Lots of things, most of them bad. Anyone who picks up a lost airline ticket can treat it like a negotiable financial instrument. If can easily be used to buy another ticket on another airline, on a

different flight, to a different destination. Professional criminals who are adopt at creating false identification can even turn a lost ticket in for a cash refund, according to Jackle Martin, Extension family finance specialist at New Mexico State University.

Even the Civil Aeronautics Board admits that replacing or refunding a lost ticket can be a time consuming nulsance,

As a precaution, travelers should jot down the ticket number on a separate piece of paper and put in where it isn't likely to be lost. If the ticket goes astray, airlines can process refund applications quicker with this number. The number is also the quickest way to get an on-the-spot

Lost tickets should be reported to the issuing airline immediately. If the ticket was bought through a travel agent, the issuing airline is the one whose name was imprinted on the ticket.

Once the airline is convinced that the person claiming the refund is the one who bought the ticket, they will begin processing the refund application. Some airlines do this right away, but some can take up to

If the original ticket is used, or cashed in, by someone else, the airline may refuse to give the money back to the original purchaser. Finally, there is almost always a handling fee, \$5 or \$10, the airline will deduct from the refund.

Getting a refund or replacement for a lost airilne ticket is seldom easy, and there's no guarantee the person who paid for the original ticket will get either a refund or replacement.

The best advice is — don't lose the ticket in the first place.
