RUIDOSO CONSTRUCTION UP 31 PERCENT OVER 1980

November's building exceeds \$3.5 million

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The actual total of \$3,506,720, based on a valuation of \$20 per square foot, broke the previous record (September of this year) by \$1 million.

So far this year, building permits have been issued for \$21,999,285 worth of new

construction. Through November of 1980, the total stood at \$16,787,960, meaning that construction activity is up by approximately 31 percent this year over last.

In November of 1980, permits were issued on \$1,184,100 worth of construction.

Fire damages condominiums

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The blaze began in an end unit owned by Magcobar Mud Company of Odessa, Texas. The condo was being used by two Odessa couples, Paul and Belinda Fisher and Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Nethery. The group had arrived Wednesday.

According to Nethery, the foursome had gone to Sierra Blanca Ski Area for the day. As they returned to town, he said, they saw the smoke and returned to find the condo they had been staying in was on fire.

Nethery said that his group lost many personal belongings in the blaze,

especially clothes. No one was injured in the fire, and a small dog owned by Belinda Fisher was rescued by firemen.

The Magcobar unit was badly burned. An adjoining unit, owned by Charles Martin of Roswell, was partially burned. The third unit from the end received slight smoke damage, according to insurance representative Rich Seeley.

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The Forest Service fire fighters assisted the Ruidoso Fire Department in battling the blaze. "The Forest Service bunch was a lot of help on that one," Waltrip said. He and fireman Danny Garcia credited the foresters with preventing a spread of the fire beyond the two units.

Study slated on proposed mesa airport



New Mexico State University conducts agricultural experiments on Fort Stanton mesa under a land lease arrangement with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

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

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
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

Social Security information

If you change your name, through marriage, for example, it is very important that this change be reported to your local Social Security office promptly. After submitting proof of identity, you will, in about four weeks, receive a duplicate card. This Social Security card will show your new name, but the same number.

Reporting a name change is especially important if you have a job or if you are seeking work, but, it can also avoid needless delay when not working. Earnings might not be properly credited to your Social Security record when the employer reports a new name, but Social Security Administration records still show the prior name. An income tax refund, otherwise due you, might be delayed if the name on the report does not correspond with that shown on the Social Security record.

A name change may be to a new name in the case of marriage or a return to a maiden name in the case of a divorce or annulment. You may also want to correct your record if your Social Security card is under a "nickname" or abbreviated or shortened form of your full name such as "Dick" instead of "Richard." The name on the Social Security card should be completed exactly as you intend to use it in employment, business, school and other official or legal circumstances. In doing this, when your employer records your name directly from the Social Security card, it will agree with the records established under Social Security.

For more information about applying for a new or duplicate Social Security card, ask for a copy of the leaflet "Applying for a Social Security Number" at your nearest Social Security Office. The Roswell Social Security office is located in the Federal Building at 5th and Richardson and the telephone number is 622-7780.

A Department of Justice study shows that Vietnam-era veterans are less likely than non-veterans to be in state prisons, said Joe Cordova, director of the Albuquerque Veterans Administration (VA) Regional Office.

The study by Bureau of Justice Statistics revealed that Vietnam-era veterans represented less than five percent of all state prison inmates as of late 1979.

"The study debunks* still another derogatory myth about our youngest group of veterans," Cordova said.

On the whole, veterans were less likely to be in prison than non-veterans, Cordova said, and that was true for pre- as well as post-Vietnam-era veterans more than 25 years old. He stressed that the study was set up to generate national, rather than individual state, statistics.

The November 1979 study noted that at that time 39,500 Vietnam-era veterans were serving sentences in state prisons but only 13,000 of them had actually seen duty in Southeast Asia — a smaller proportion than in the general population. "This is surprising since it had been assumed that this group would have felt most acutely the difficulties of transition to civilian life," the study added.

Cordova said that the random national sample of prisoners in state correctional institutions was ordered by a presidential directive in 1978. Such state statistics weren't collected prior to that.

On the federal prison side, he added, the Justice Department's Bureau of Prisons estimated in 1974 that, at that time, only 11 percent of the federal-prison population was made up of Vietnam-era veterans. And they represented only one-third of all of the veterans confined in federal prison facilities.

Referring to the debunking quality of the recent study of state-prison populations, Cordova said, "I'm also dismayed at the attention given to unfounded suicide, divorce and unemployment statistics about our Vietnam veterans. None are supported by credible studies."

The VA regional office director noted that Vietnam-era veterans are the best educated in the history of the nation and the vast majority are working full time, with many earning above average incomes in high level occupations.

"I realize there are Vietnam veterans who may still suffer some physical and emotional trauma, and we won't short-change them," Cordova said. "We're dedicated to reaching each and every one of these people — either through our Vietnam Vet centers in Albuquerque and Window Rock, Arizona, or the VA medical center in Albuquerque."

Village Jeweler loss pegged at \$100,539

The value of merchandise stolen in the November 29 burglary of Village Jeweler has been set at more than \$100,000.

The store at 390 Sudderth Drive was broken into through a roof of the building and its burglar alarm system was dismantled.

Frank Pope, owner of the business, originally estimated that \$40,000 to \$50,000 in jewelry had been taken. Ruidoso Police are continuing an investigation of the theft.

George Is Home Recovering

I dropped by George's home in Ruidoso Downs, December three, and found him in great spirits, evidently delighted to be at home again with his wife, Ruth, and also with his feelings lifted by having played the violin to greatly appreciative listeners.

George was telling me that early in his career his lessons were costing him quite a bit. So he thought of being a teacher while he was being taught.

"So I put out my shingle saying: 'Teacher of Violin, beginners a specialty.'"

I think he said around a dozen young people applied, the oldest twelve and the youngest six. They did so well that George put on a recital. The house was filled and George's career as teacher and violinist was begun.

He has had a string ensemble of his own and has played solo and in other orchestras through the years.

After leaving Chicago he came to Clovis where he was a teacher of Hawaiian guitar and violin for many years.

One of his pupils was Walterine Hughes of Ruidoso, age fifteen at the time.

The Charm of The Violin

George's violin, a great instrument handed down in his family was a little out of fix. However George tuned it up and played a number, one by the great Fritz Kreisler.

The notes from the violin were like something alive, reaching your very heart. I know now that the violin is in a class by itself because in some magic way the instrument allows something of the player's own nature to be blended into the music.

So now we know that George Fredin is a great musician because he has a great soul.

And may the healing notes of his violin echo on and on forever and a day.

George Fredin Cheers The Folks At Care Center

After having begun playing the violin at the age of ten, and having brought great happiness to countless people over a career as musician and teacher spanning almost sixty-eight years, George Fredin was coasting a while at his home in Ruidoso Downs.

Then on October seven, when he was out at Alto Lake looking over the water to see how he might do at a little fishing, he slipped and fell breaking his leg. For quite a while he lay helpless until finally a sharp-eyed modern Good Samaritan came by.

George ended up in the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital where he stayed with a cast on his leg until October fifteen. Then he transferred to the Ruidoso Care Center.

Just around Thanksgiving I received a call from Fritz Burgess, an assistant nurse at the center, asking if I could lend my violin to a violinist so he could play for the folks at the center. He told me that the violinist was George Fredin.

The Violin Made By Joe Graham

Years ago, that great violin maker Joe Graham made a beautiful violin and presented it to me. This was stolen. And Joe turned right around and made me another.

I have been slow in learning to play, and from time to time was thinking of George Fredin, and how I might ask him to give me some pointers.

Anyhow I took up the violin Joe had made me and here was George, cheery and friendly as ever in spite of the cast.

During the post-Thanksgiving season George played several times in different locations at the center, a wandering minstrel of modern times, walking on his walker encumbered by his heavy cast — going from room to room.

Mid school students jumping rope for heart association

White Mountain Middle School students will be jumping rope for three hours December 16, to raise money for the American Heart Association. Beginning December 10, students will be asking for pledges and donations for the benefit event.

This activity is part of a nation-wide effort to raise money for the association through school students. Jumping rope was chosen for demonstrating the benefits it provides to cardiovascular health while raising money at the same time.

The local event was organized by the mid-school's student council, under the direction of Jane Tully. According to Tully, there will be approximately 18 groups of 20 students each competing for prizes, with a total of about 130 students participating.

"Individual and school prizes may be awarded depending on how much money is raised," Tully said. Such prizes include T-shirts, caps and windbreakers on an individual basis and cash awards for the school.

"Pledges are accepted on a per minute calculation, meaning if a person sponsors a student for two cents per minute and his team jumps for the entire 180 minutes (three hours), the sponsor will pay \$3.60. Each of the 18 teams will have an adult supervisor who will make sure a student does not jump continuously for more than two minutes, according to Tully.

Part of the reason for a jump-a-thon theme for raising money is to focus attention on the need to incorporate physical fitness into one's life at an early age, according to Bill Blen, New Mexico Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation president, sponsoring organization of the event, nationally.

"People are encouraged to make pledges or donations; both will be accepted," Tully said. "But we're not concerned so much with the money, it's more that the kids are doing a worthwhile project for someone else."



A lot of people in Albuquerque are upset with Indiana University basketball coach Bobby Knight and for good reason.

Knight recently said he thought the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association basketball championship finals for 1983 should be moved from Albuquerque.

His reason? Well, Knight is upset over the violations the University of New Mexico was charged with when Norm Ellenberger was head basketball coach.

However, those violations are in the past and UNM has a new coach and some tough academic standings for the players on the team.

Knight's outburst has already drawn criticism from a couple of newspaper columnists in Albuquerque and he's likely to get a lot of critical letters from irate New Mexico basketball fans.

Knight really has no room to talk. The Indiana coach is renowned for his temperamental outbursts and harassment of players. He was even arrested and convicted once in Puerto Rico.

But the real injustice of Knight's remarks is the fact that a lot of colleges and universities have been involved in rule and recruiting violations. That doesn't make a violation right but it does show the intense pressure college coaches are under from alumni and fans to produce a winning team.

In fact, UNM stood up and took its punishment without complaint. A lot of other schools didn't do that.

So Bobby Knight should stick to coaching basketball, something he does very well as Indiana has won several NCAA titles and is always a contender for the championship. When he gets off the basketball court and into NCAA political decisions he's not in his field.

Staying on the subject of basketball but on a slightly lower level of competition,

White Mountain Middle School's boys' A basketball team is showing this season it may be building the foundation of another powerhouse at Ruidoso High School.

The Braves are currently 4-0 in season action, including a convincing 68-37 victory over rival Tularosa Wednesday night. Braves coach Dean Hood has around 12 players he can shuffle in and out without any real loss of playing ability. Depth is an important part of any basketball team, particularly at the middle school level since not many kids that age have developed their skills to a high degree.

White Mountain has its first home game tomorrow when it hosts Capitan at 2 p.m. A and B games will be played in both girls' and boys' divisions.

Staying on basketball, San Antonio may always be in the shadows of its larger Texas neighbors Houston and Dallas in everything from population to sports.

However, this year the southern Texas city is leaving its more famous counterparts behind in the National Basketball Association race. The San Antonio Spurs are leading the Midwest Division of the Western conference while the Dallas Mavericks bring up the rear. The Houston Rockets are currently in fourth place in the same division.

While pro basketball hasn't reached the popularity of baseball or football, any kind of a championship means something to the city the team represents. If the Spurs win even their division title this season it will give the city of San Antonio a badly needed boost in morale.

San Antonio has a population of over 800,000 and will probably pass Dallas in the next 10 years. The city of the Alamo is probably due for a National Football League franchise when the powers of that league decide on expansion.

Ruidoso girl cagers win consolation title

Rebounding from an opening night defeat, the Ruidoso High School girls' basketball team took the consolation title at the Weed Tournament over the weekend.

The Warriors fell to host Weed 63-19 Thursday night but came back to defeat Anthony 52-30 Friday night and Cloudercroft 49-30 Saturday.

Claudia Branum, a 5-7 forward, was named to the all-tournament team. Tammy Valdez, a 5-6 guard, was declared best free throw shooter in the tournament. Ruidoso travels to Cloudercroft Friday for its next contest.

Portales nips Silver City

Portales High School rallied to take a 20-16 victory over visiting Silver City and thus won the State AAA football championship Saturday afternoon.

Silver City took a 10-0 lead in the second

quarter but the hosts came back with two touchdowns near the end of the half to take a 14-10 advantage. Silver City came back with a long touchdown run by Joe Vasquez lead but it didn't last for long.

Warriors edged by Roswell, 75-68

It was close but not quite enough for Ruidoso High School's varsity basketball team as the Warriors fell to a strong Roswell High School squad 75-68 Saturday night on the Roswell court.

The loss was Ruidoso's second of the season against no victories but the Warriors were in the game all of the way. Getting their fast break into high gear the Warriors jumped off to a 22-17 first quarter advantage as guard Wade Wilson scored six points to lead the way.

However the hosts slowed things down a bit in the second quarter and took the lead.

After Wilson hit a lay up for a 27-23 Ruidoso lead with 6:10 left in the quarter the Coyotes rolled up 19 points while holding the Warriors to just seven the rest of the quarter. Roswell took a 42-34 advantage into the locker room at halftime.

The Coyotes an AAAA school opened up their margin in the third quarter to as much as 17 points (55-38) before the Warriors began to peck back into contention.

Ruidoso closed the gap to 57-47 at the end of the quarter but were't through yet. Marc Dehotal made a lay up with 6:56

left and Pete Garcia scored on a jumper 30 seconds later to move the Warriors to within six points at 57-51. Ruidoso finally got the margin down to five points when center Pete Richardson hit a short jump shot to make the score 67-62 with 1:55 remaining in the game.

But the Warriors couldn't get any closer and Roswell had its first victory of the season against no losses.

Richardson led the losers with 15 points while Scott Neal and Garcia each scored 14. Wilson added 12 as the Warriors got excellent scoring form their guards.

Paul Dracila had 17 points and Tommy Bird 16 for the Coyotes.

Ruidoso head coach Barry Nelson was pleased with his team's effort despite the defeat.

"We played much better this time than (a 52-36 loss to New Mexico Military Academy) in our first game," Nelson said. "We were able to get our fast break going and we got some fine efforts from our guards. It was much better than last time."

"In the second quarter perhaps we didn't push hard enough to go to the fast break like we did in the opening period. We had several opportunities to do so and we didn't. Their pressing defense hurt us a bit."

Ruidoso will have its first home game of the season Friday when it hosts Goddard of Roswell. The junior varsity contest will begin at 5:30 p.m., with the varsity game following.

Bighorns go separate ways

Meriwether is a wanderer, but fortunately his no-name companion is not — and in the spring there'll be new lambs among a herd of desert bighorn sheep in the Peloncillo Mountains of southwestern New Mexico.

Meriwether is the larger of two young desert bighorn rams released September 27 in the Peloncillos to supplement a herd in the range. He was affectionately named after Meriwether Lewis, the 18th century explorer, by Game and Fish bighorn research specialist Andrew Sandoval because the ram has wandered nearly to Mexico and has yet to make contact with the ewes in the Peloncillos herd.

The smaller ram released with Meriwether is, on the other hand, a more stable fellow, too busy with the ewes to wander far, and probably enjoying his role as the only male among the herd. Observation by New Mexico State University (NMSU) graduate student Amy Elenowitz, who has been monitoring the radio-collared herd since release in late June, confirms mating between the ram and some of the ewes, and Sandoval says he's encouraged about propagation of the species in the suitable habitat in the extreme southwestern corner of the state.

The two young rams are strangers to the area, having been reared at the department's Red Rock Experimental Wildlife Station and taken to NMSU more than a year ago for mite studies. They were released in the Peloncillos in a second attempt to supplement the herd after 10 Red Rock rams — released with the ewes and lambs — died of pneumonia over a month-long period between July and August.

Ten ewes and eight lambs were the basis for the new herd. The ewes were transported from the Kofa Game Refuge in Arizona to a paddock in the Peloncillos for acclimatization a year ago. The lambs were born in the paddock. One lamb is known dead and one unaccounted for.

Two ewes and a lamb — like Meriwether — are wanderers, split from the primary herd since their release and probably desperate in their search for male counterparts, Sandoval said. Breeding season started in mid-summer soon after the release, but the poor health of the 10 rams released with the ewes had prevented any courtship, Sandoval said. The two ewes traveled more than 30 miles south into the Animas Mountains and later returned to the site, weak from the 60 mile trek across fences, highways and desert terrain, but healthy.

On November 1, the ewes and lamb were 21 miles south of the release site in the Coronado National Forest. On November 8 they were seen crossing Highway 80 17 miles north of the release site, and less than a week later were located six miles southeast of Highway 10 near Arizona and north of the Peloncillos.

Had he moved a little faster, Meriwether would have met up with the two renegade ewes and lamb. Sandoval said Meriwether traveled within three miles of a spot where the ewes had been seen — but he was too late and they had left.

Meriwether has also covered a lot of territory. Two weeks after his release he was located about 40 miles northeast of the site in the Gillespie Mountains. A week ago he was located 15 miles northwest of the site in the Animas Mountains.

"He is now in visual contact of the Peloncillos," Sandoval said. "It's suitable habitat, but he actually has no roots in the Peloncillos. We're hoping, though, that the visual contact with the release area will draw him back."

In the meantime, the smaller ram is learning the courtship behavior.

The Warriors scored 175 points to 148 for runner up Deming. New Mexico Military Institute had 84 points for third place, Ruidoso's B team was fourth with 58 and New Mexico Military Institute's B team was fifth with eight points.

"We did better than I thought we would," said Warrior coach Gerald Ames. "We beat two of the teams that are in our district in Deming and New Mexico Military, and that is good as far as district is concerned."

Ruidoso individual winners were Ray Montez (105 pounds); Chuck Schmidt (112 pounds); Dirty Bustamonte (128 pounds); Doug Schmidt (132 pounds); Gary Burgess (185 pounds) and Ronald Bell (heavyweight).

Doug Schmidt was named Most Outstanding Wrestler and took his championship match with a tight 11-10 decision.

Dear editor:

THE TIME IS NOW!

In my letter to you dated 11-16-81 I covered the fire dangers we face in the Village due to the unusual high percentage use of wood shingle roofs in our building construction.

Since writing my letter to you I have received additional facts regarding the abnormal fire danger when wood shingle roofs are used in construction. This information comes from recognized fire prevention agencies as well as from studies made on the subject of wood shingle roofs.

To those who wish to avoid a major catastrophe in the Village I pass this information on to you.

The prevention and control of fires has many aspects but let me direct your attention to one of the worst culprits of all — WOOD SHINGLE ROOFS!

The National Fire Prevention Association International (NFPA) was established in 1896 and has been the prime moving force in the United States in attaining action in relation to fire safety since that date.

HERE, IN PART, IS WHAT THE NFPA HAS TO SAY:

1. Untreated wood shingles may be readily ignited by small sparks from chimneys or exposure fires, by radiated heat, or by burning brands. Burning shingles themselves also produce brands which may be carried by the wind to start other fires. Age and low humidity increase the susceptibility of wood shingles to ignition.

2. NFPA goes on to say this about fire retardant shingles — Treatment of wood shingle roofs with fire retardant coatings has been proposed at various times but has not, to date, PROVED PRACTICAL as flame retardant treatments lose their effectiveness with continued exposure to the weather.

3. Untreated wood shingles are prohibited by law in congested sections of practically all large cities and a very large number of cities and towns prohibit their use within the municipal limits.

4. The position of the NFPA is that untreated wood shingles SHOULD NOT BE USED TO COVER ANY ROOF OF ANY TYPE IN ANY LOCALITY.

In 1977 the city of Dallas, Texas, undertook an in depth study of the use of untreated wood shingles to determine how this related to the high dollar loss being experienced by that city.

THIS STUDY DEVELOPED THE FOLLOWING FACTS:

1. Dallas was experiencing the results of the city's past allowing of the use of combustible wood shingle/shake roofs. Three near conflagrations were seen as the direct use of wood shingle roofs — 16 homes were lost in one fire as the result of wood shingle roofs.

2. A wood shingle roof can be totally involved in a fire within a 3 to 5 minute period. The Dallas fire department average response time was 5:06 minutes.

3. No fire department is sufficiently mobile to effectively control an air-borne fire fueled block after block by wood shingle roof structures.

4. When a conflagration has developed and is spreading from one combustible roof top to the next, the process usually continues unless a natural barrier such as a river or a large open area is reached. In other words — the fire of this nature cannot be controlled.

5. Wood shingles lose their natural moisture content as they age and then begin to split, making them more vulnerable as time passes. Conversely weather has little effect on composition or higher rated roof covers.

6. Fire losses involving wood shingle roofs are 129 percent higher than losses for higher rated roofs. A loss of \$100,000 where a composition roof is involved will result in a loss of \$229,000 where the construction is wood shingle. The higher net loss for a wood shingle roof is always higher than that for a higher rated roof.

The city of Dallas completed a position paper on wood shingle/shake roofs on 10-7-79. An analysis on the same subject was completed on 11-14-79 and on 11-21-79 (7 days later) ORDINANCE #18420 was passed and became the law. Dallas determined the problem — then took action.

As I write this letter a 20 to 40 miles per hour wind is howling overhead. Should a fire occur this day this letter will never appear in print as there will be no newspaper where it can be printed. In fact, little will be left of the Village — just ashes — and questions of WHY?

Lip service and little else has been done to protect our lives and properties from fire. No one has really cared enough to take a stand on fire prevention standards which have long been in place in other localities.

Will the Trustees now face up to the fact of the dangers of wood shingle roofs and take action to eliminate this type of construction? We can't over come past delays but we can set some guide lines to improve the future.

As stated there are other problems relating to fire prevention which must be considered. It is up to the Village trustees to take the first step.

Immediately following the crash in which Howard died, Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., telephones Governor King to explain the circumstances, and to urge King to support locating a new airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

King's response, as relayed to The News by Davis, was: "I'll get on it immediately."

We don't recall the governor advising Davis, or The News, or anyone, relative to any action he'd undertaken "immediately," or at any time since, to actively support the proposed regional airport on the mesa.

Though it's conjecture on our part, we submit, as a possibility, that neither crash might have occurred if the airport had been located on the mesa, instead of nestled in a valley surrounded by mountains.

We believe Governor King is in a position to exert considerable influence to solve the problems that are holding up development of the regional airport on the mesa. We are urging the Governor to take action "immediately," before we have another fatality that might be due to the fact that it's dangerous to fly into, or out of, the Ruidoso Airport. — CD

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Arsonist razes summer home

It used to be that owning a summer home in New Mexico's mountains was a status symbol.

Now it is becoming a symbol of a rapidly growing crime problem in this state. From the Sangre de Cristo and San Pedro mountain ranges of northern New Mexico to the Capitan and Sacramento ranges to the south, summer homes and cabins have become a favorite target of arsonists, burglars and vandals.

Nowhere is this problem more prevalent than the Maricao Mountains east of Albuquerque.

For the past several years, a large number of cabins have been burglarized and vandalized and in the last 11 months at least three cabins have been burned to the ground.

As an example, a cabin owned by Jim Wade of Tijeras, was completely destroyed by fire on September 18, less than a month after a burglary and attempted arson to the same structure.

The State Fire Marshal's Office said in its report that the two nearby residents saw smoke coming from the general area of the cabin around 7:15 p.m., on September 18. By the time firefighters arrived at the remote cabin, the only thing left standing was a rock fireplace and the cement block foundation. Investigators say arson was to blame for the fire.

Ironically, the cabin apparently had survived another arson attempt on August 23. At that time the Torrance County Sheriff's Department received a report that someone had broken into the cabin and that several items were missing. In addition, investigators found a broken lamp and part of a charred wool rug in a 55 gallon trash barrel near the cabin.

Last week the State Crime Stoppers Commission carried a release seeking information on Eugene Dale Gonzalez, a federal fugitive wanted for the October 1, 1981, murder of California Highway Patrolman John Martinez and wounding of Officer James Sabe. Gonzalez is believed to be in the El Paso, Texas, or southern New Mexico area. Gonzalez is also wanted in Denver, Colorado, for the May 15, 1981, robbery of a bank. He is 5-7, 165 pounds and should be considered armed and extremely dangerous. A reward of up to \$20,000 is being offered by authorities in this case.

Meanwhile, Curry County Crime Stoppers is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of the shooting death of Emilio Chavez on November 13. Chavez was gunned down as he was leaving a Clovis bar. Anyone with information can call 763-7090.

Uranium County Crime Stoppers, at 287-8400, is offering a reward for information concerning the October 31 vandalism to 13 vehicles parked at the Holiday Inn and

Motel 6 in Grants. Some \$2,700 worth of damage was reported.

Hidalgo Crime Stoppers is offering a reward of up to \$500 for information leading to the solution of the November 1 auto burglary of a pickup truck parked in downtown Lordsburg. Taken was a .22 caliber pump action rifle and a blue sports jacket.

Santa Fe Crime Stoppers, at 988-5555, is looking for George L. Cervantes, 23, in connection with the September 13 shooting death of Jose Luis Ramirez. Cervantes, who is about 5-5, with a medium build, has not been seen since the fatal shooting.

Roswell Crime Stoppers, at 823-9000, is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the solution of the October 21 burglary to a residence in that southeast New Mexico city. More than \$3,500 worth of property was taken by the offenders, including a camera, crystal ball, stereo speakers and a variety of jewelry.

And San Juan County Crime Stoppers is offering a reward in connection with the November 7-8 burglary of an Asted doctor's office. A number of syringes were taken in the break-in. Anyone with information can call 334-2023.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 32 local Crime Stoppers programs in New Mexico pay cash rewards for information leading to the solution of major unsolved crimes and the capture of wanted felons. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

There currently are more than 180 Crime Stoppers programs in operation throughout the nation. Combined, these programs have assisted in the solution of 11,187 major crimes and the recovery of \$37.3 million worth of stolen property and narcotics. More than 3,000 defendants have been tried in court, with convictions resulting in 98 percent of the cases.

Since the campfire smoke from deer season is still fresh in our minds and that blaze orange vest and cap haven't been pushed too far back into the closet, let's talk about this year's deer seasons.

The first season went pretty smoothly with some very hefty deer coming out of the Sacramento and Guadalupe Mountains. The spring moisture and mild summer showed up in the form of good antler growth and good body condition in most of the deer taken.

The second season arrived with a rainstorm and a fog cover so thick that you almost had to row through it. The temperatures dropped and visibility was poor. That's when the people problem began. Most folk do just fine working the hills and canyons near camp. If they get a little turned around they will find a high spot and pick out the road they came in on and the little dot down yonder — that's their mobile home or their faithful pickup. However, when the fog rolls in and it's hard to pick out the next tree, much less camp, then hunters start to get lost, — in a hurry.

This year, as every year, we had lost hunters. What amazes me is how many did not know from where they started out. One game warden, this season was

waved down by a lost hunter. The hunter explained that he was turned around and needed some help finding his camp. When the game warden obligingly unfolded his map, he was rewarded by a totally blank look on the hunter's face. Seems that a friend of the hunter's had driven in, and, as a passenger, this hunter had not paid much attention to the roads or directions taken.

While that man had a problem he at least had the sense to know when he needed help. Unfortunately there are others that leave camp without matches, without a jacket and without a map. People that are so careful with their money, their homes, and their families are for some reason so careless with their lives in the out-of-doors.

This year everyone was found eventually. Game wardens on the state line also found a large number of violations. Roadblocks at Lovington, Hobbs, and Jal produced 25 citations several illegal deer and one illegal turkey. Most of the citations were to non-residents hunting with resident licenses. Game Department thanks goes to the State Police, the Mounted Patrol, the Lea County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Department of Public Safety for their help in making it a smooth operation.

Veterans exposed to radiation may qualify for VA health care

Proposed guidelines have been announced by Veterans Administration (VA) medical centers in the Rocky Mountain area and elsewhere to provide health care for certain veterans exposed to ionizing radiation from a nuclear device explosion.

The guidelines are from legislation signed into law last November 3. That law, the Veterans Health Care, Training, and Small Business Act of 1981, authorizes VA to provide specified health care to veterans who — while serving on active military duty — were exposed to ionizing radiation from the detonation of a nuclear device. Included were those who participated in either the testing of such a device or the American occupation of Hiroshima or Nagasaki, Japan, between September 11, 1945, and July 1, 1946.

The health care is available at the Denver, Fort Lyon and Grand Junction, Colorado, Cheyenne and Sheridan, Wyoming, Salt Lake City, Utah, and Albuquerque VA medical centers. Radiation related claims are handled by the VA regional offices in Denver, Cheyenne, Salt Lake City and

Albuquerque. The guidelines, which VA has furnished to its field facilities on an interim basis, will be published in the Federal Register and public comment will be invited, said VA chief Robert Nimmo.

VA directs its field facilities that: "Each veteran who participated in the testing of a nuclear device or who participated in the occupation of Hiroshima or Nagasaki, Japan, between September 11, 1945, and July 1, 1946, and who requests VA medical care, will be provided a complete medical history, physical examination and appropriate diagnostic studies... where the findings reveal a condition requiring treatment, the responsible staff physician shall make a determination as to whether that condition resulted from a cause other than the veteran's exposure to ionizing radiation. Conditions other than cancer are usually considered to be due to causes other than exposure to ionizing radiation."

If, upon examination, a veteran is found to require care under this authority, verification of his exposure must be made, but this should not delay initiation of appropriate care.

Health-care services may not be provided under this law for the care of conditions which are found to have resulted from a cause other than the specified exposure, the guidelines specify.

Health care is limited to hospital and nursing home care in VA facilities and to outpatient care in VA facilities or a pre- or post-hospitalization basis or to services, a need for hospitalization. The services will be provided without regard to the veteran's age, service-connected status or the inability of the veteran to satisfy the expenses of such care. VA facilities are instructed to provide medical services care under this authority will be considered priority cases of emergency connected veterans and equal to former prisoners of war who are receiving care for non-service connected conditions.

Congress made it clear, the guidelines point out, that this law provides for health care only, and that a determination that the veteran is eligible for such care does not constitute a claim for service connection or in any way affect determinations regarding service connection.



Farming is big business in California; it is also a threatened one. The nine San Francisco Bay Area counties—roughly the size of Connecticut—yield more agriculture than 13 other states combined, but also comprise the nation's fifth largest metropolitan area. As the cities continue to grow, they consume not only the products of the surrounding farmlands, they consume the farmlands themselves.

A hard look at the head-to-head confrontation between growers and developers, and the possible consequences for America's food supply is examined in "The Last Crop," produced by public television station KQED/San Francisco for "U.S. Chronicle," the second series of 30-minute reports with Jim Lehrer, airing Thursday, December 10 on PBS. (Check listings for time in your area.)

Encroachment of farmland begins with outward migration from the cities and suburbs. "The Last Crop" reports on the conflicts which develop as more people move into farming areas. Farmers complain about trespassers, vandalism, and dogs attacking their livestock. Homeowners complain of tractor noise, pesticide and manure odors. Nuisance suits are often filed.

STRIKE FORCE

ABC has big, big problems with its Friday night lineup. Then again, any network would, if it had to compete against the likes of CBS' juggernaut of "Dukes of Hazzard," "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest." The latter series, which will undoubtedly achieve high ratings because of "Dallas's" strength, could spell disaster for ABC's offering of the S.W.A.T.-like police series, "Strike Force," starring Robert Stack.

Right off the bat, this series from Aaron Spelling Productions lets you know that it is violent and laden with stereotypical slurs, fomented by the appearances of an up-scale black detective, Paul Strobber (played by Dorian Harewood), a Jewish deputy police commissioner named Herb Klein (Herb Edelman), and Stack's character—a tough Irish veteran, Capt. Frank Murphy. There's also the proverbial female decoy, Rosie Jacobs, played by voluptuous Trisha Noble.

On the positive side (if you can call it that), "Strike Force" caters to America's right-wing conservative law enforcement posture. This is one series that shoots first and asks questions later. "Strike Force" also shows signs of developing stories on how this specialized police unit's high-risk workload wreaks havoc on their personal lives. But the writing is uneven and, at times, gets as risky as the action, especially when the ethnic ribbing comes into play.

Stack commands respect as the veteran cop who is so driven by his work that he's ruined his marriage and has let his household literally go to the dogs.

If "Strike Force" is to succeed, it will have to have better writing, a little less graphic violence and, quite possibly, a better timeslot.



STRIKE FORCE

ABC has big, big problems with its Friday night lineup. Then again, any network would, if it had to compete against the likes of CBS' juggernaut of "Dukes of Hazzard," "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest." The latter series, which will undoubtedly achieve high ratings because of "Dallas's" strength, could spell disaster for ABC's offering of the S.W.A.T.-like police series, "Strike Force," starring Robert Stack.

Right off the bat, this series from Aaron Spelling Productions lets you know that it is violent and laden with stereotypical slurs, fomented by the appearances of an up-scale black detective, Paul Strobber (played by Dorian Harewood), a Jewish deputy police commissioner named Herb Klein (Herb Edelman), and Stack's character—a tough Irish veteran, Capt. Frank Murphy. There's also the proverbial female decoy, Rosie Jacobs, played by voluptuous Trisha Noble.

On the positive side (if you can call it that), "Strike Force" caters to America's right-wing conservative law enforcement posture. This is one series that shoots first and asks questions later. "Strike Force" also shows signs of developing stories on how this specialized police unit's high-risk workload wreaks havoc on their personal lives. But the writing is uneven and, at times, gets as risky as the action, especially when the ethnic ribbing comes into play.

Stack commands respect as the veteran cop who is so driven by his work that he's ruined his marriage and has let his household literally go to the dogs.

If "Strike Force" is to succeed, it will have to have better writing, a little less graphic violence and, quite possibly, a better timeslot.


