Sierra Blanca Ski Resort shows rapid development

(Editor's Note:

Expansion of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort is a subject that has been talked about for more than a dozen years and has been on the drawing board for a decade. But though numerous improvements have been made to the area within its boundaries, it has not expanded into new territory.

Numerous factors enter into the delay—including desire of the Mescalero Apache Tribe to obtain title to all of the ski area land, opposition of environmentalists to expansion, and desire of the United States Forest Service to retain jurisdiction over the land.

The Sierra Blanca Ski Resort expansion issue will be examined in a series of articles beginning today).

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort (SBSR) began its 21st season of operation December 3. This marks the 19th ski season since the area was purchased by the Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) in 1963.

The ski area was developed by Roswell oilman Robert O. Anderson and operated by the Sierra Blanca Company during its first two seasons (1961-62 and 1962-63). In September of 1963, the sale of the area to the Mescalero Tribe was announced.

Construction of the ski area was a giant step in making Ruidoso a year-round resort community. Since every business in town is directly or indirectly tied to the tourist trade, the village eagerly awaited

the yearly influx of skiers upon which its winter economy depends.

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort has been very successful. The area achieved an increase in use of 180 percent from 1964 to 1975 and was judged one of the 16 most profitable ski areas in the nation in the latter year, according to a MAT commissioned environmental analysis report completed in 1978.

The report notes that SBSR is "the largest ski area in New Mexico, Arizona and the entire Southwest in terms of income and attendance."

In succeeding years, growth in use of the area has been even more dramatic. In the 1979-80 season, 200,300 visitations were recorded, compared with 31,847 for the 1964-65 season.

The average daily attendance climbed from 303 in 1964-65 to 1,669 in 1979-80. Poor snow conditions last year caused a drop in total visitations to 130,000, though the area was open 120 days, its average season length.

The area has been greatly improved and expanded since it first opened. One new chairlift has been added for each of the four seasons prior to the current one, and a fifth new chairlift will become operational next season.

When the area opened for skiing in 1961, it was served by three T-bar lifts and had 13 miles of ski trails. A gondola lift was opened the following year.

Today, five chairlifts plus the four-passenger gondola cars and a small surface tow lift are available to skiers. There are now more than 25 miles of trails.

The MAT and the SBSR management would like to expand further, constructing new lifts for new trails outside the present area. Thus the crowded conditions which

sometimes exist at SBSR would be relieved, and the area could accommodate more skiers.

The latter effect would certainly be welcomed by local motel operators, restaurateurs and merchants.

Expansion is not as easily done as said, however.

Only the "physical plant"—the ski lifts, buildings, equipment, etc.—was included in the sale of the ski area to the MAT. The land upon which the ski area is located belongs to the United States government.

Since it lies within the Lincoln National Forest, the ski area land is administered by the United States Forest Service, Department of Agriculture.

A 30-year term special use permit from the Forest Service allows the MAT to operate Sierra Blanca Ski Resort on national forest land. The permit also allows the Forest Service to oversee operation of the ski area.

Roy Parker, who is starting his 18th year as manager of SBSR, began planning for expansion 13 years ago. Parker noted that the need for expansion did not really exist then, but that it has for the past several years.

"We were looking to the future," said Parker. "As for the present, we need expansion very much."

"We're developing a market for skiing," Parker said. "People are moving into this area who are already skiers."

He pointed out that an increase in very good skiers at Sierra Blanca has been noted in recent years. Expansion plans include development of trails suited to better skiers.

Local Forest Service personnel agree that there is a need for expansion of SBSR. As District Ranger Paul Gordon said,

Sierra Blanca has a "monopoly on people who want to use one tank of gas to get here."

Indeed, an estimated 80 percent of the people who ski at SBSR are from Texas, with the majority of those being from West Texas. Population growth throughout the so-called Sunbelt has increased the potential market for the ski area.

"Sierra Blanca Ski Resort enjoys the enviable position of being the only major ski area in southern New Mexico, approximately 200 miles from any other area of significance. As such, it is in a position of not only local but regional importance, frequently drawing skiers from as far away as east Texas and Louisiana," reads a 1971 Forest Service study.

And, as was pointed out in a 1980 Forest Service study on the land proposed for expansion of the ski area, there is not much land in this part of the country that can be feasibly developed for skiing.

The report reads: "This great demand for downhill skiing in the southwest is in part related to such small areas suitable for this winter sport. Areas like the South Fork of the Rio Bonito (the area into which SBSR hopes to expand) are extremely limited."

The same study cites another 1980 Forest Service report projecting an increase in skiing demand between 1980 and 2000 of from 146 percent to 227 percent nationally. For the year 2030, the increase is projected as high as 538 percent over the present.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe submitted a Master Plan for expansion of SBSR to the Forest Service in 1977. This document superseded the previous 1971 plan.

The proposed expansion will be examined in detail in the next article of this series

DECA students are conducting civic project

Two Ruidoso High School seniors are doing their part in contributing to the community by conducting a Civic Consciousness Project through the local chapter of the Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA).

Eva Johnson and Cristi Mount have decided to use part of the funds raised in the DECA-sponsored Mule Race concession stand last fall for helping fund the Ruidoso Care Center Auxiliary van project. Members of the auxiliary are raising money to purchase a van suitable for transporting residents.

With a donation of \$500, the two girls hope they can help the Care Center while trying to earn prizes for their project.

The DECA-based project requires that the two girls type a 40-page manual describing their project; goals, objectives and procedures for carrying out those goals.

"There are certain questions we have to answer and requirements we have to meet," said Johnson, local president of DECA. The girls will have to complete this manual by February 1 to turn it into regional headquarters so they may com-

pete on a state level in March.

The Civic Consciousness Project is one which each chapter may enter, although Ruidoso's chapter has not competed in it for four years, according to Mount, DECA vice-president. "Usually more than two people work on such a project, but we decided to take it on ourselves," Mount said.

The project is co-sponsored by DECA, the Muscular Dystrophy Association and 7-Up company. If the girls win on a state level, each will earn \$100.

"The first thing we had to do was to find a worthy cause," Johnson said. They both decided the Care Center's need for a van was worthwhile so they proceeded with their plans.

"We hope it helps. We really want to help out the Care Center," Mount said.

"The purpose of the project is to develop better understanding of civic consciousness. It's also to learn and apply principals of marketing and management," Johnson said.

Although the girls said they have put a lot of time into the project, they feel the outcome is worth it.

Lodger's group seeking promotional suggestions

The sole matter brought before the Lodger's Tax Committee at their noon meeting at K-Bob's Restaurant last Wednesday was an appeal by chairman Ed Hyman for ideas, either by "organizations or individuals, beginning as early as next spring—April or May," for ways to "get a running start on our summer season."

Hyman said the committee is "wide open to suggestions" on how best to go about promoting Ruidoso as a resort community with respect to its summer activities. Hyman said the committee is willing to "give Ed (Ed Jungbluth, Chamber of Commerce executive director) some help in funding advertising" for promotions contributing to local prosperity.

A monthly report by Al Junge, treasurer, showed the committee collected almost \$6,000 in lodger's taxes for the month of October, presumably because of Aspenade activities. Almost three times

the amount collected this time last year, the tax represents two percent of the lodger's profits, or a whopping \$280,000 for the Ruidoso lodging industry for the one month's business.

Today on December the eleventh, after several days of summer-like weather, the sky is full of light very thin clouds from one mountain horizon to the other. The air is still and warm, and there is a feeling of moisture on the light breeze.

The sun is shining through, casting the hills and meadows into a glowing silvery half light. And all around the sun, at the outer edge of a round blaze of cloud-and-sun light, there is a faint circle of rainbow colors — a sure sign of light mist in the sky. It is like a giant Christmas decoration in the heavens.

A new band of snow birds has just flown in, and are resting on fence wires, cedar limbs, and REA wires, catching their breath. Now they are lighting and feeding on the gramma grass, and on the mistletoe and cedar berries. Now, mingled with the chirping of the snow birds, comes a clear bird note from the hill side that I have not yet heard this year. Clearly it echoes down through the cedars, pinons and oak brush. It is half whistle and half like a tiny human voice calling. I call this singer "The Winter Bird" because he always comes here just before the snow, and stays through the winter.

And now the wind has moved in bright out of the north, with a band of blue birds flying in advance, singing and dancing through the air as they fly.

The "Birds of Happiness" have arrived in the vale ready to celebrate the glad season of the birth of Our Lord and Saviour. And there are many good signs that there will be snow in time for a "White Christmas."

Emblems of The Season

To match the Christmas season decorations on the land — the pinon cones,

cedar berries, juniper berries, and the oak brush all turned a soft and velvet light crimson, and the evergreens touched with gold — the air itself, and especially the sky, brings us many a little message of the sacred season.

One thing wonderful about the full moon is that it appears over the mountain so early; scarcely have the last tints of the sunset faded from the sky, than here comes the round golden glory of the night sky with a path of golden light extending from itself all through the evening air right up to you. It bathes the world in its mellow light, cheering the early nightfall, and guiding your foot steps with its giant candlelight.

On the night of the tenth, the moon, just one step this side of full, arose over the hill just on the rim of a long clearly outlined cloud. The cloud seemed to move upward keeping the moon just on its rim, and together the cloud and moon made one decoration after the other in the sky. Here would be two or three little fragments of rainbow colors, called "moon dogs" and then the rim of the cloud would be touched with purple and rose and gold, and the cloud itself would be turned from pearl to purple; and then borrow some of the moon's light so that you would almost think you were beholding the Northern Lights.

Birds Of Gold Over the Mountain

This time of year the sun rises late over "Sunrise Mountain." And if birds happen to be flying over just before the sun rises, they will catch the full strong rays of the sun shining upwards on its way up back of the mountains. The birds have a way of circling on top of the mountain, surely to welcome the arrival of the sun. And they are turned into birds of pure silver and gold.

The other morning there was a great number of several kinds of birds flying over the mountain just before the sun appeared — pinon jays, robins, and others — and they made the most wonderful display of birds of gold and silver light you ever saw. I remember how our mother first pointed out these birds of the heavens to me years ago, and her spirit in Heaven rejoiced with me as I watched these sunrise birds welcome in another blessed day.

Imagine a job where you get to teach your favorite outdoors activities.

Mixing pleasure with work is something almost everyone dreams of doing.

Well, that's something Fred Besancon and the other ski instructors at Eagle Creek Ski and Recreation Area do every day.

"Yea, I like it," Besancon said. "Skiing is my favorite sport and I can do it here all the time."

Besancon, the ski school director, has been skiing since he was five years old starting back in Otis Massachusetts.

"My family didn't ski but there was a ski resort in the town area so I got to ski often enough," Besancon said. "Otis is a lot colder in the wintertime than it usually is here in Ruidoso, so there was always plenty of snow."

Besancon became involved in amateur skiing races when he was 10 years old and continued competing until he was 16. While he was in college in Massachusetts he became a ski instructor and continued in that job until he came to Ruidoso in 1973.

"I won some and I lost some," Besancon said of his ski racing.

"I never tried out for the Olympics or anything like that."

The 30-year-old Besancon first worked at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort before moving to Eagle Creek when it first opened in the winter of 1978-79. He has been the ski school director since then.

There are currently four other instructors besides Besancon. They include Phillip and Grover Gerondale, Carl Dawson and Carl Mori.

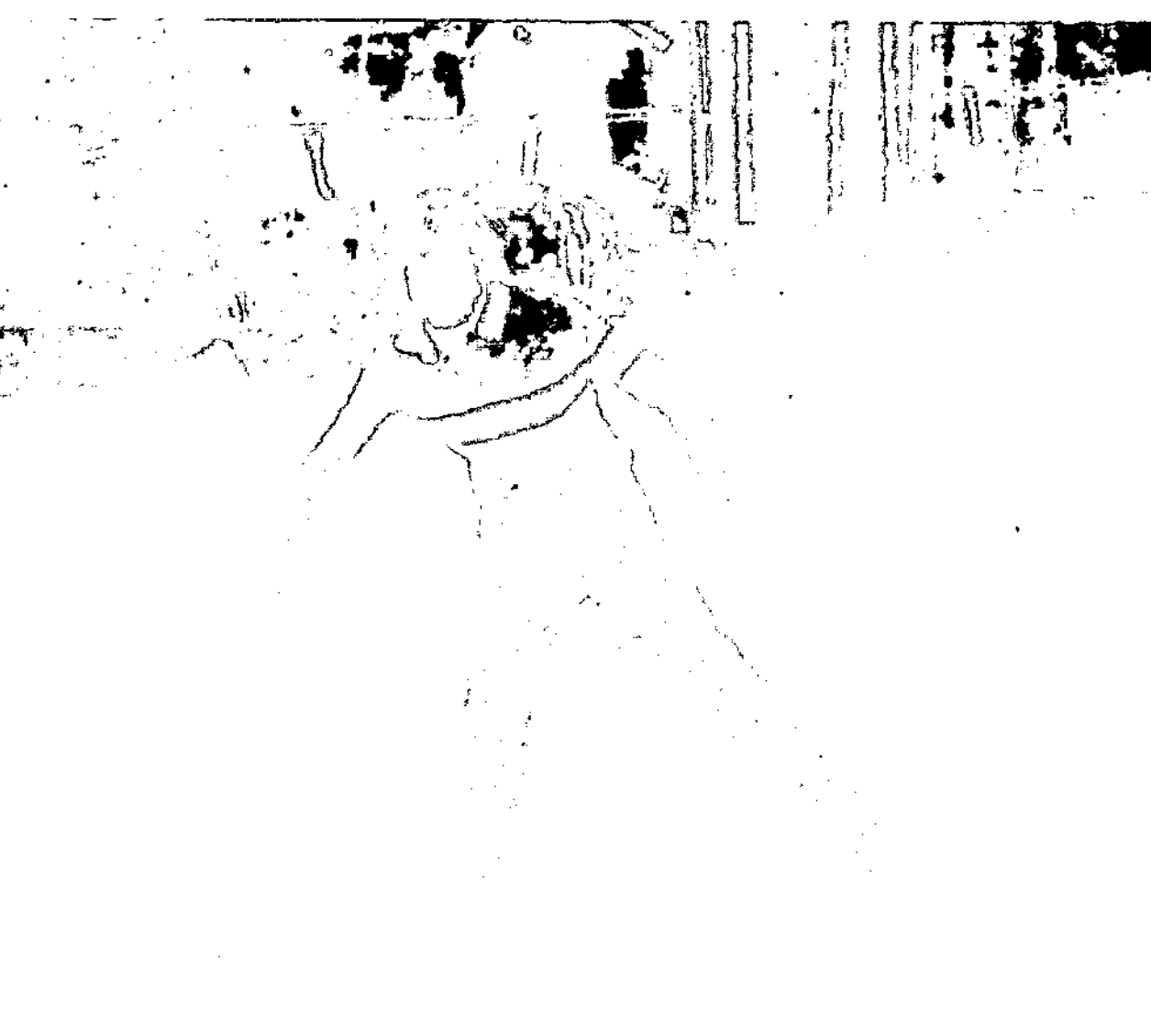
"We're going to add several more full time and part time instructors, around the time the skiing here picks up," Besancon said. "Right now we don't have that much snow, but when it gets colder we can make some more until it starts to snow in this area."

The ski instructor hopefuls go through a ski clinic before they take to the slopes to teach beginning skiers. At this time just the beginners' area is open at Eagle Creek.

"We didn't have very many people come out when we first opened at Thanksgiving," said Besancon. "However, this weekend we're getting more people, particularly in the afternoons."

The ski instructors show the beginning skiers, which include both youths and adults, the basic beginning steps to skiing. The skiers are shown how to walk in the snow with their skis, how to keep their balance and how to use their legs.

With the expected colder weather and more snow coming by the Christmas holidays, Besancon and the other ski instructors are expecting to be very busy soon. Busy teaching their favorite outdoors activity to would-be skiers.

Follow up meeting held on youth-related problems

In a follow up of the September 30 meeting of a group of professionals interested in working with youths, reports were given by several individuals attending the initial session, regarding possible solutions to youth-related problems brought out at the first conference.

Counseling professionals, clergyman, law and school officials, representatives from the state Social Services Division and private citizens last Wednesday morning met at the Ruidoso Schools' Central Office, in the second of what promises to become an ongoing exchange of information, with meetings scheduled on a regular basis, Tillman said. Tillman, group coordinator, said Thursday.

Abraham DeLeon, Alamogordo representative for the New Mexico Social Services Division, spoke to the group about foster homes — which are practically non-

existent in Ruidoso, Tillman said. "We are forced to send our children in need of foster parenting to Alamogordo," she said.

Sandy Gladden reported on the pledged support of civic organizations for a transportation system for junior high and high school students participating in after-school activities. Lack of transportation need no longer be an inhibiting factor "for kids involved in sports, club meetings or drama groups," Tillman said.

Students will have the use of church vans, with the cost for a driver and the gasoline to be paid by local service club donations, she said. A time schedule and stop locations for the van service will be well publicized ahead of time, Tillman added.

The PALS program, described by Sandy Taylor as a "one-on-one" concept patterned along the lines of Big Brother and Big Sister organizations, will be initiated out of the Lincoln County Counseling

Center, Tillman said.

Jane Parnell of the Children's Probation Office, gave an account of a peer jury system for first offenders, now being used in Clovis and Las Vegas. An attorney acting as judge decides the penalty from a specified list of punishments for the offense. Parents and the minor offender sign a contract to abide by the penalty, with the court process being the alternative, Tillman said.

A question asked by one of those attending the meeting was "whether we are serving the right population," Tillman said. "Ours is more of a preventative intervention program," she said, aimed at first offenders or likely candidates for that category, rather than hard-core, street-wise adolescents.

The topic for discussion at the next meeting will be "The communication factor," Tillman said.

Precautions to prevent Yule season fires listed

The proper use of Christmas trees and decorations is crucial to a safe holiday season.

Decorative lights and materials serve to brighten homes and hearts at Christmas time. But improperly used, they can darken your celebration with the tragedy of accidental fire and injury.

Damaged or worn light strings, a dry tree and overloaded circuits add up to serious fire risk for you and your loved ones.

The following safety tips are offered along with our best wishes for a happy holiday season.

—Place your Christmas tree away from your fireplace or any heat source. Be sure your tree is out of your home traffic pattern and does not block doorway.

—Fill the tree base holder with water and keep it full while the tree is indoors. Remember, heated rooms cause trees to dry rapidly; a dry tree is a fire risk.

—If buying an artificial tree, choose one that has been tested for flammability.

—Use lights that have been tested for safety. Identify these lights by the Underwriters Laboratory mark.

—Check each light for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections. Discard any equipment that is worn or broken.

—Never use indoor lights outside.

—Avoid overloading circuits with too many lights as this can cause a fire.

—Always turn off tree lights and other decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

—Never use electric lights on a metallic tree.

—Never use unlighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens.

—Avoid smoking near flammable decorations.

—Do not burn evergreens in a fireplace. Flames from evergreens can flare out and send sparks flying about the room.

—Always dispose of Christmas gift wrappings as soon as possible. Place them in a metal container, as they can ignite suddenly and cause a flash fire. Do not burn wrappings in a fireplace.

—Use care with "Fire Salts" which produce colored flames when thrown on wood fire. They contain heavy metals and can cause intense irritation if eaten by children.

—Most important of all, PLAN FOR SAFETY. Remember, there is no substitute for common sense. Look for and eliminate potential danger spots near candles, fireplaces, trees and electrical connections.

The current winter baseball meetings in Hollywood, Florida, don't seem to offer much hope of eventual parity among the major-league ball clubs.

While players and teams are going through negotiations and possible trades, very few of the have-not clubs will benefit from the meetings.

The lesser clubs don't have much bargaining power because of their lack of talent and they don't have the money to pick up a lot of the more worthy free agents.

Teams like the New York Yankees and the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers have the cash and "glamor" appeal to attract the best free agents or to keep their own players who want a new contract.

On the other hand clubs like San Diego and Seattle have traditionally been losers and draw no more than a third of the attendance that teams like the Yankees and Los Angeles usually draw. As a result some of these clubs are operating in the red and will have trouble keeping even their own free agents let alone picking up players from other teams.

Compare the major league baseball situation with the National Football League and you can easily see why the NFL is finally achieving parity.

The NFL has a more effective draft than major league baseball and there isn't the complete free agent policy in that league which would give the wealthier clubs a big advantage in getting the top players. A lucrative television contract gives all the NFL clubs money to spare.

In the NFL the mediocre clubs have picked up some outstanding players in recent years via the free agent route or by trades. John Bay picked up all-pro wide receiver John Jefferson from San Diego via a trade when the player was a holdout from the Chargers' camp. San Francisco made itself a title contender when it got Jack Reynolds from Los Angeles as a free agent and defensive end Fred Dean from San Diego on a trade.

Both the 49ers and Packers have been made into contenders because of these deals. Other NFL clubs who have traditionally been doormats are gradually improving because of trades, free agents and the draft.

Thus parity is rapidly becoming a part of the NFL scene while it's become virtually a fantasy in baseball. Unless there are some changes in the baseball structure a large percentage of the clubs are doomed to mediocrity.

It looks like Ruidoso High School's wrestling team could be in for a banner season.

The Warriors won the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped (NMSVH) Invitational last week and were impressive in a tournament the week before.

Coach Gerald Ames has several wrestlers returning who went all the way to the state meet last season. Ruidoso competed against powerful Burgess of El Paso, Texas, in the first tournament of the season and gave a respectable showing.

Burgess finished second in the Texas state meet last year and last week scored three impressive victories over Las Cruces, Mayfield and Anthony Gadsden, scoring at least 48 points in each meet.

Ames felt the Warriors gained valuable experience competing against Burgess and that should help the Warriors when they compete in the district tournament and other important tournaments later on in the season.

Silver City won the district championship last season but lost a lot of its wrestlers to graduation. Deming, which has generally been considered a contender in district 3-AAA, was beaten soundly by the Warriors in the NMSVH tournament.

Look for Ruidoso to finish no lower than second and quite possibly first in this season's district tournament.

Warrior hoopsters drop a pair

Ruidoso High School's varsity basketball team found the going rough over the weekend, losing to Goddard of Roswell and Lovington.

Saturday night, the Warriors traveled to Lovington and lost to the hot shooting hosts 100-72. The night before Ruidoso had its first home game of the season but fell to Goddard 79-56.

Against Lovington the Warriors stayed close with the hosts for the first quarter but then the roof caved in.

Lovington scored eight straight points near the end of the second quarter and took a commanding 36-16 advantage into the lockerroom at halftime.

The hosts kept the pressure on with their hot shooting and quickness and took control of the game in the second half.

The Warriors, now 0-4 on the season, were without the services of guards Scott Neal and Pete Garcia, who were in a school play, and Grady Williamson, who was ill.

"They were awfully quick and very good

shooters," said Warrior head coach Barry Nelson of the Lovington squad. "We played pretty well until the middle of the second quarter then we sort of lost our composure when they got hot."

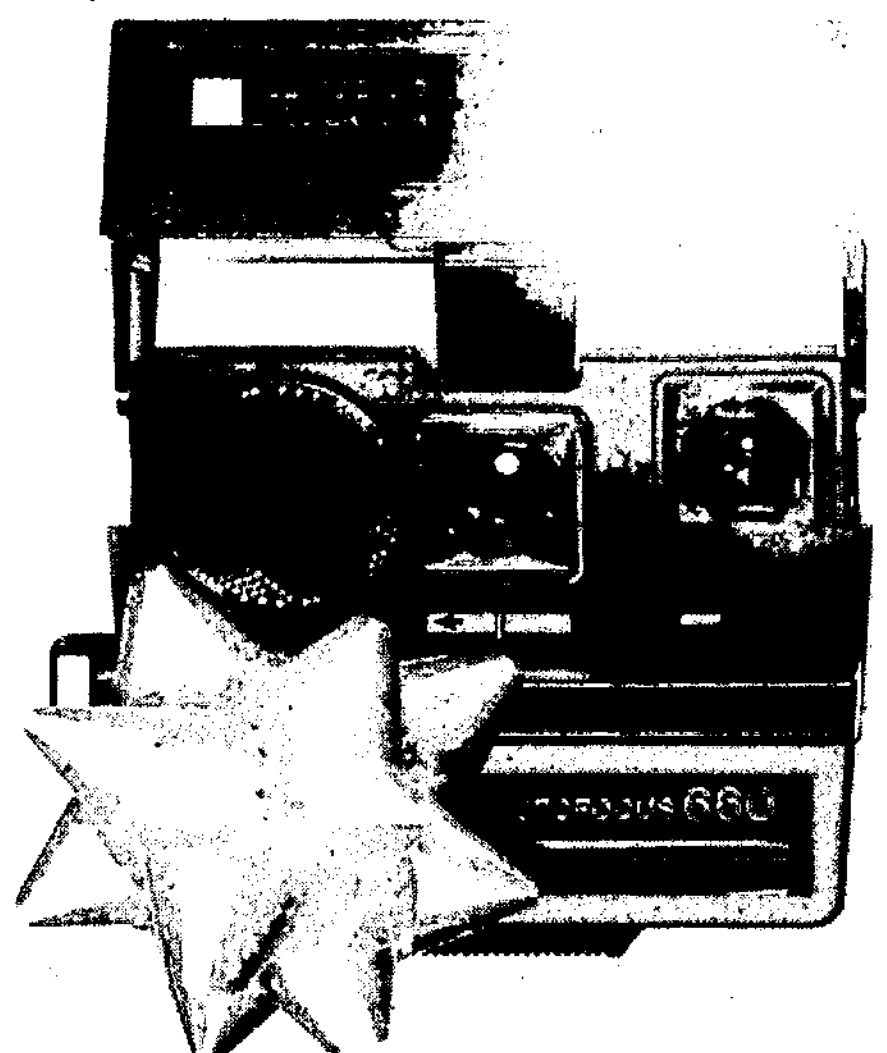

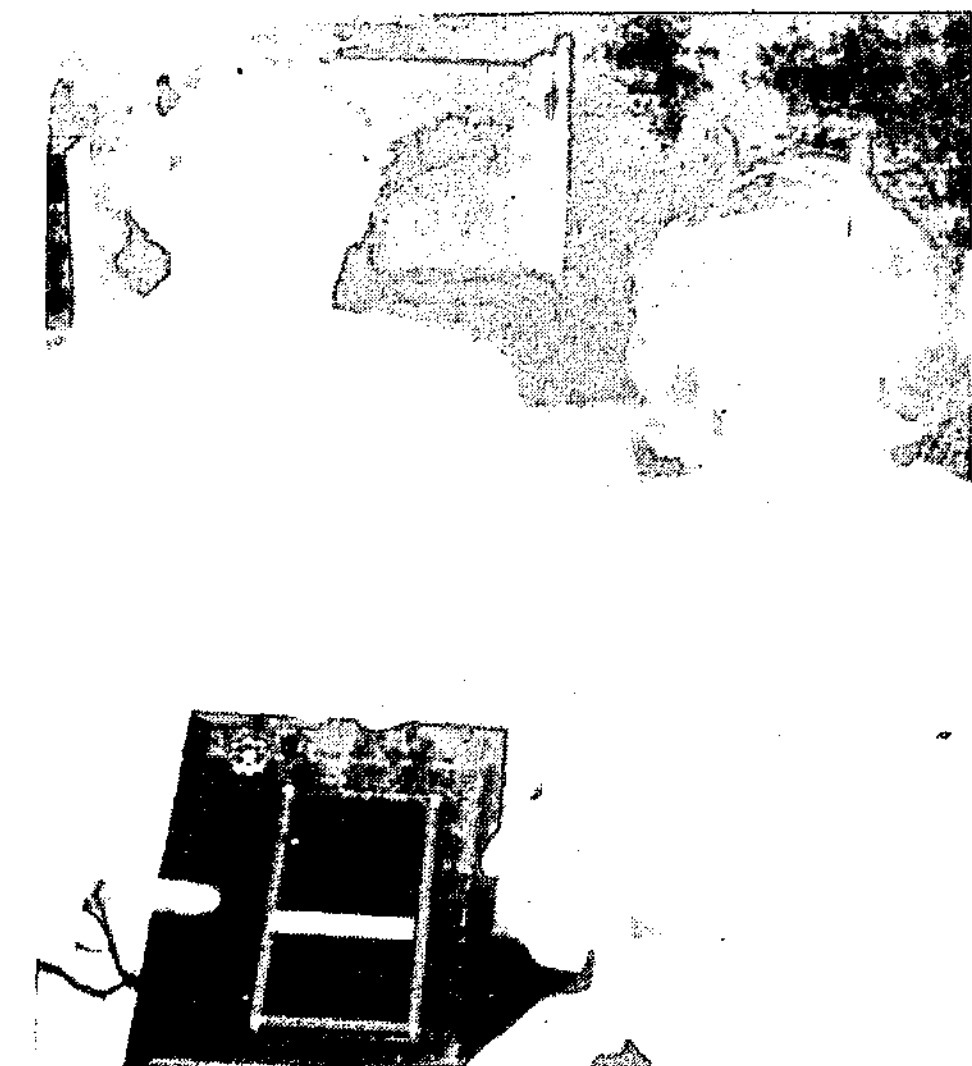

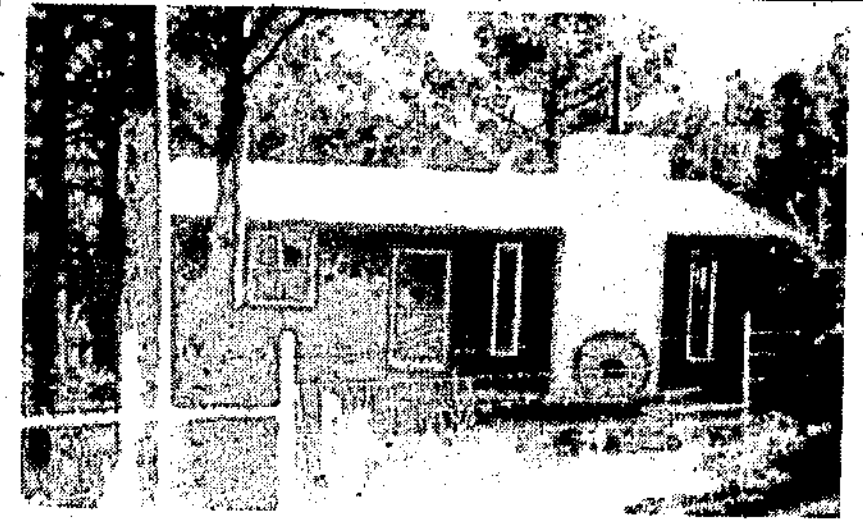

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—You think you've got problems?

You should be Bud Davis. That particular gentleman, now president of the University of New Mexico, was caught three times within nine minutes giving evidence which could be—what would we say?

Lies? Exaggerations? Hyperbole? Ignorance of things he might well be expected to know about?

Let's simplify the whole thing. Let's just put it this way: "failures of his words to correspond to objective reality."

He performed those acts, not before Harry Reasoner or Morely Safer of "Sixty Minutes," which would be bad enough, but before the Legislative Finance Committee.

The reason that's bad is that this group is made up of lawmakers. ("Legislative" Finance Committee. Get it?)

They are the people who fund President Davis and his job and his house and his family and his campus and his whole career.

To give them the impression of a person who wishes to be something other than honest is pretty stupid.

To believe you can con these folks is even more stupid.

They're old-fashioned.

What they want is the truth and the whole truth, so help you God.

Blow a single answer, and you are in trouble.

Blow three within less than ten minutes, and you may spend the rest of your life regretting it.

Davis did that—stumbled over his own

feet, failed to understand the import of the question, and—smiling all the while—appeared not to appreciate what had happened to him.

The budget of the University of New Mexico during the coming fiscal year will give evidence of that fact—the things Davis blew on a quiet December afternoon.

As the chairman of a Board of Educational Finance, Ed Ortiz, a teacher himself in the Santa Fe school system, said earlier that day: "Most of the members of the public have doubts and worries about education."

That's true. The doubts aren't limited to elementary and high school education. They apply as well to what the professionals call "post-secondary education."

The University of New Mexico may want to believe that none of these doubts are caused by a strong aroma from its athletic department (where, despite Judge Phil Balamonte, most people still believe we saw only the tip of the iceberg). They may wish to think that the citizens out here who put up 100 percent of the funds on which they operate are not swift enough to notice their failures and their inadequacies.

They may, in short, think we are dumb.

We aren't.

We can tell when we are being dumb—and that's about what most people think the universities of New Mexico are doing: having us.

We are not likely to welcome that with smiles.

We may—either directly or through our representatives in the Legislature—ask questions.

They will be embarrassing questions to the Dr. Davises of this world.

Dear editor:

I wish to correct some of the statements attributed to me in an article about Rey's syndrome in the December 10th edition of the "News", as well as add to it.

The mortality rate in this disease is about 20% when treatment is early and vigorous and much higher when treatment is delayed. When the disease entity was first discerned, the mortality rate was much higher, approaching 80%. Antecedent illnesses include type B influenza (about 80% of the cases) and chicken pox (not small small pox) (about 7% of the cases).

The younger the child the higher the mortality rate. To date, caucasioners are much more likely to develop the disease. There is no correlation between Rey's syndrome and the use of aspirin or other

drugs. Illnesses that can mimic (confusing the picture) Rey's Syndrome include gastroenteritis ("stomach flu"), drug intoxication, septic shock, head injury, severe high blood pressure, encephalitis/meningitis, and certain hereditary diseases.

Lastly, Dr. Rey pronounces his name to rhyme with rye or wry.

Needlepoint for men Yule gift suggestion

If needlepoint and other needle crafts conjure up the image of your great Aunt Sally working demurely by the fire, look again.

Many men who enjoy contact sports and mechanics have added needle crafts to their repertory. They find it a relaxing creative, enjoyable change of pace, said Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Schools, at both the elementary and secondary level, often teach needle crafts to males as well as females.

One of the biggest — in every way — supporters of needlepoint for men is Roosevelt Grier, the former pro football star. He's even written a book, "Needlepoint for Men."

Obviously, not every man, or every woman for that matter, is going to be interested in needlepoint.

But if a man in your life is at all interested in artistic expression, there are a number of reasons he may enjoy needle crafts.

Needlepoint is simply painting a picture with yarn, Wright said. Needlepoint materials are easily portable and there's none of the messy cleanup associated with other media such as oil paints.

Wright suggests choosing needlepoint canvas with more openings per square inch and a simple single stitch design for the beginner. That way, the design works up faster and the first effort is more rewarding.

Crime Stoppers stressing safeguards against burglars

'Tis the season to be jolly ... especially for burglars.

Traditionally, the Christmas season always has been a boom time for criminals. In addition to increases in armed robberies and crimes against persons, December also is a high water mark for residential and auto burglaries.

Sadly, many of these burglaries could have been prevented by simply making sure that all doors and windows are secured. Statistics show that one out of every four residential burglaries is the direct result of an unlocked door or window.

Many auto burglaries, especially during the holiday season, could be prevented if car owners stored their Christmas packages in the trunks of their vehicles—the eliminating any temptation for criminals.

A quick check with local Crime Stoppers programs around New Mexico shows that they also are concerned with burglaries this week.

Otero County Crime Stoppers will pay from \$500 to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of a residential burglar who walked into an unlocked home in Alamogordo November 19. A variety of items were taken by the thief, including several lady's rings, two pistols, and a set of 1968 Mexican Olympic coins. Total loss was estimated at \$1,500. Anyone with information can call 437-2090.

A pair of commercial burglaries are being highlighted this week by Las Vegas Crime Stoppers at 425-8884. A Texaco gas station was broken into last week and a small safe containing \$700 worth of cash was forced open. Then on November 29, burglars broke a window at the Hays Plumbing Company to gain entrance and left with an estimated \$500 worth of leather goods. Rewards are being offered in the cases.

Burglars took \$7,000 worth of musical equipment from a Hobbs residence during the early evening of November 17. The stolen entertainment equipment included a Pioneer locked stereo receiver, a Pioneer turntable and cassette deck, equalizer, reverberation amplifier and a pair of speakers. Anyone with information about the thieves, who apparently are planning to start up their own band, is asked to call Hobbs Crime Stoppers at 393-8005.

Espanola Crime Stoppers, at 753-6664, is offering a reward of up to \$500 for information leading to the solution of a burglary to the home of Tony Martinez in Ranchitos on November 13. A variety of items were taken during the break-in.

And guns were the object of burglars who broke into a residence on James Street in Carlsbad. During the evening hours of November 12, thieves pried open a window screen to enter the home, then took five rifles, including a 1909 7.65 Mauser with a custom mounted Tasco scope and a 12 gauge Remington pump action shotgun. Anyone with information is asked to call Carlsbad Crime Stoppers at 887-1888.

Lastly Rio Rancho Crime Stoppers is offering a \$50 reward for information leading to the solution of a residential burglary at 3507 St. Andrews Drive. The October 29-31 break-in netted thieves a silver and blue 10 speed Nishiki bicycle. Anyone with information is asked to call 842-3916.

Burglars are thieves of opportunity. To make your Christmas even merrier this year, why not follow these simple precautions:

1. Make sure your doors and windows are securely locked before leaving your home.
 2. If you plan to leave on vacation during the holidays, have a neighbor watch your home. The neighbor should be instructed to pick up all the mail and newspaper deliveries.
 3. As a stocking stuffer, why not buy some dead bolt locks for your doors. Dead bolt locks slow burglars down and even discourage most. They'll just go down the street where someone doesn't have good locks on their doors.
 4. Keep an inventory of your valuables in a safety deposit box. This should include color photographs of any expensive jewelry.
 5. If you get home from work after dark during the winter, have several lights or a radio attached to a timer so the home will give the appearance that it is lived in.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: The man who's filling the boots of the late **Jim Davis** in "Dallas," TV's top nighttime soap opera, says he's every bit as tough as J.R. and can't wait to prove it. He's musical comedy star **Howard Keel** and he plays Dusty's father, Clayton Farlow. As a good-guy, fatherly type, he takes over where Jock Ewing left off—as the only man in Texas with some control over the wicked J.R. 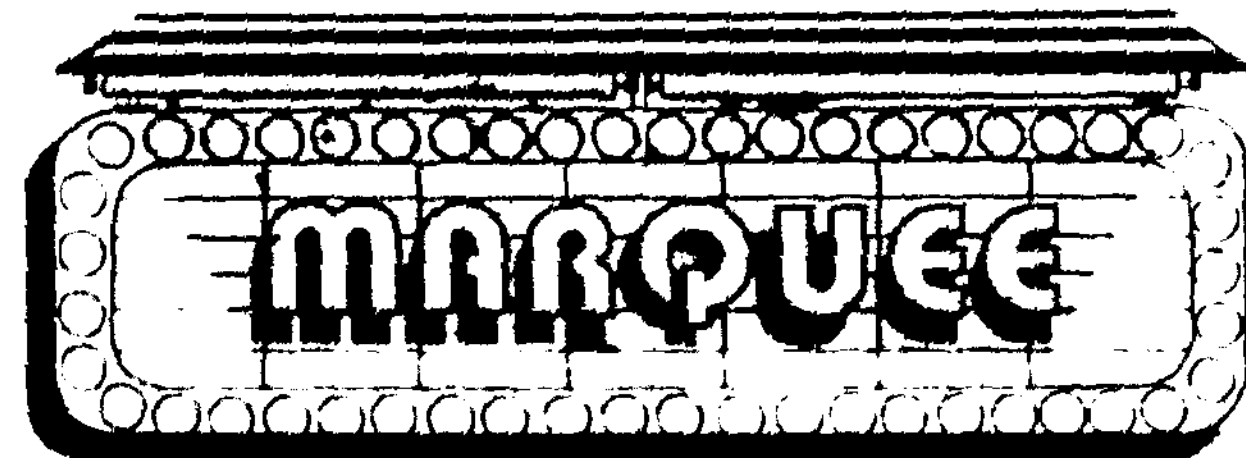

"ON GOLDEN POND"

Certainly "On Golden Pond" is one of the most eagerly awaited films of the year. Insiders who managed to attend early screenings of the film came out with nothing but raves for Henry Fonda's performance, saying he was practically a shoe-in for an Academy Award.

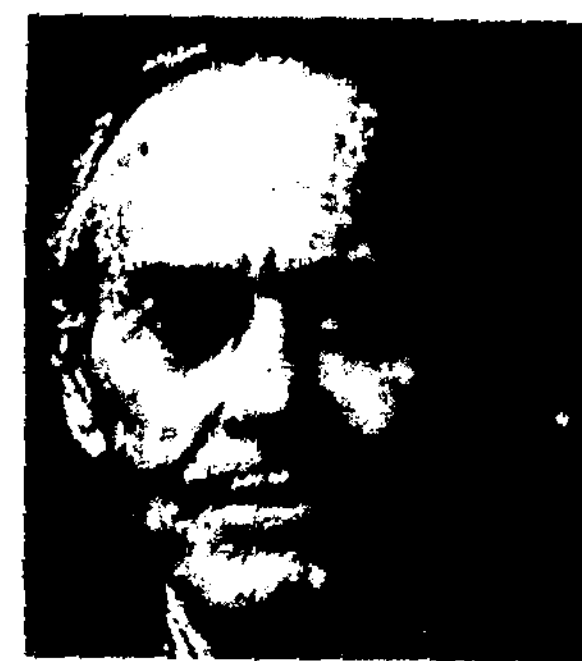

On this point I have no argument. Henry Fonda's portrayal of a witty but cantankerous old man knowing that death is just around the corner is one of the best performances of his career, and when you've had a career like Henry Fonda's, that's saying a lot. But the film itself leaves much to be desired. For Henry Fonda's as well as Kate Hepburn's performances, this film should be seen, but expect little more than that.

Notice that I've taken care to say Henry Fonda's performance, as Jane Fonda also has a key role in the film, that of Henry Fonda's daughter—definitely a role she was... er... born to play.

Her character is part of what's wrong with the film, and in truth, it's not really her fault. The script by Ernest Thompson, based on his own play, calls for Jane and Henry to be at odds. She was a fine daughter, but never really a friend to her father. Perhaps he wanted a son. Perhaps he was just too overbearing. Perhaps. We never find out.

To be sure, Henry Fonda has

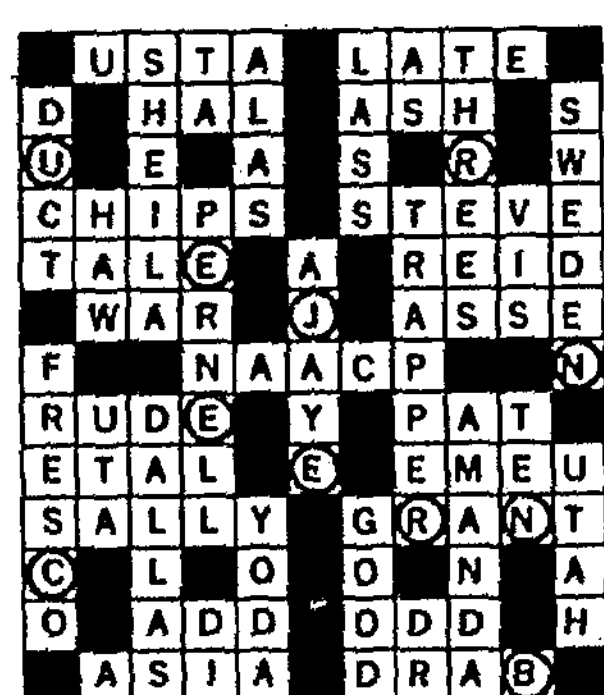


some of the funniest one-liners and comebacks seen in many a moon—lines Neil Simon would give his Smith-Corona for. Yet even that is at odds with the film's plot. Here's Jane Fonda, come to visit this wonderfully, witty, delightful old man who keeps the audience in stitches, but for some reason Jane is in tears. We never know the reason why she slips into a twitching neuroses at the very sight of her father when the film has so marvelously depicted him as a crafty old codger.

The other part of the story, that of Hank Fonda and a typical California 12-year-old and their relationship, is far more convincing and much more enjoyable. Director Mark Rydell makes the most of a wordy but witty script, and Thompson's script in the hand of Fonda and Hepburn is a joy from minute to minute, but in overall perspective it loses its gloss to fuzzy motivations.

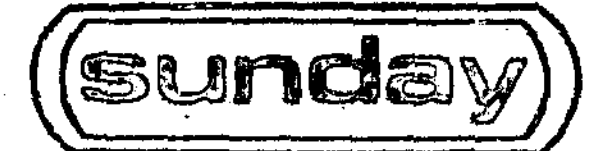
