## Sanders resuming 'business as usual'

The recent decision by the New Mexico Supreme Court which will allow certification of Steve Sanders as the 12th Judicial District Attorney (DA) will provide "a real opportunity to get back to business as usual," Sanders said Wednesday.

The high court quashed a writ of mandamus filed by Sanders' write-in opponent James J. Weldon, which had asked that he be declared winner of the race and named Sanders and the state canvassing board as respondents.

"Obviously, I'm very, very happy about the decision," Sanders said. "The matter has now been reviewed by the State Canvassing Board and the Supreme Court and both felt my position was correct."

"I think the outcome shows the people elected the right person and I'm going to make an extra effort to provide the people of Lincoln and Otero County with the

service they deserve," he added. Since the November 4 election, Sanders said he and his staff have been primarily concerned with "catching up" on paperwork and files at the Otero County office.

"People may not realize we have had a lot of catch-up work to do down here, bringing the files up to date and updating old cases, including a murder case which is ten years old," Sanders said.

The new DA said he would arrange a meeting soon with Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez to discuss a number of cases.

He added that office hours in Ruidoso and Carrizozo would probably resume this week. Office hours may also be scheduled in Capitan and Tularosa, he said.

Weldon has indicated he will probably continue to contest Sanders' election, possibly with a suit in district court. If that happens, Sanders said, "I don't see how he can expect it to change the decision of the Supreme Court."

One of the first Lincoln County cases to be prosecuted by the DA's office this year will be that of Frank Barela, a Camp Sierra Blanca inmate charged in the stabbing death of an Alamogordo man Christmas Eve.

Murder charges are still pending completion of the investigation, Sanders said.

He added, "I feel we have to take very harsh and strong measures against these people... another inmate has committed a violent crime to protect his freedom."

Sanders said he would ask the District Court to order that prisoners with a record of violent criminal behavior "not be allowed in Lincoln County."

He said he had also discussed the matter of furloughs with camp superintendent E. B. Gutierrez. The two reached an agreement, Sanders said, that inmates who were an hour late in returning, without an explanatory telephone call, would be considered to have walked away.

"In people with a violent criminal background," Sanders said, "the potential is always there (for repeated violence). Give them an inch and they'll take a mile."

## Full year of improved services, expansion set at RHV Hospital

Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) will continue to expand and improve services in 1981, according to administrator Ken Moore.

Moore said major equipment purchases planned this year will add new radiology equipment, improve the physical therapy department and update the critical care system at RHVH.

Moore said he will campaign for acquisition of a gamma camera, giving the local facility nuclear scanning capability, and ultrasound equipment, used to monitor pregnant women and to determine the need for surgery.

A mill levy was passed for RHVH in the November election, which will result in funds to expand and upgrade the building, Moore said. "We are so happy the community has chosen to be supportive of the hospital. Without their help, there is no reason for our existence," Moore said.

Because mill levy funds will not be available for a year, Moore said the hospital's department heads, medical staff and the central staff for the Presbyterian Hospital System (PHS), will do studies to determine areas of greatest need throughout 1981.

"We'll also be choosing and enlisting the help of an architect this year, so we'll be ready to move right into building expansion and upgrading as soon as the mill levy money becomes available," Moore

said. The medical staff "hopefully" will be expanded in 1981. Moore said, to include an obstetrics/gynecology doctor and more staff in the area of internal medicine "which will be a good complement to the present staff." Moore noted that an orthopedic surgeon will be added to the staff, and the biggest problem the hospital faces now "is a place to house all these things."

The budget is up for review this week by the PHS, with Moore including several new program proposals. The budget also reflects a three-year projected building plan and includes an 11 percent inflation factor.

"Once we get the budget approved, we'll have a better idea of what to expect in the coming months," Moore said.

A recent donation by Ruidoso State Bank will allow the hospital to purchase additional telemetry units for the intensive care unit. "We've been running past capacity because we had so many people in who needed monitoring."

"Without the telemetry equipment, the patient is very restricted in the amount of freedom he or she has. This small piece of equipment allows them total freedom," Moore said.

Another advantage of the equipment is that the effect of exercise on the patient can be monitored, allowing doctors to determine if more or less exercise is

needed for recuperation, Moore said. "This is something we've needed to add for a long time and we really appreciate the bank's consideration," Moore said.

## Ruidoso's civic/service clubs will continue 'good works' in '81

For nearly 500 members of Ruidoso civic clubs, 1981 will be another year of continued service to the community and to individuals, according to presidents of some organizations.

Continuing past years' traditions, the NOON LIONS and EVENING LIONS CLUBS will give considerable attention to

preserving eyesight for individuals.

Both have ongoing projects of funding eye examinations and glasses for children and adults that cannot afford that expense, and the Noon Lions will continue to collect old eyeglasses which will be repaired and donated to help another person.

Other projects the Ruidoso Valley Noon Lions will continue to sponsor, according to president Bill Budens, are the Little League programs, maintenance and upgrading of the three baseball fields in the area, the Major League park, All American Park in Ruidoso Downs and the

Little League park.

"We will have one afternoon a month of entertainment at Ruidoso Care Center as a continuing service project," Budens said.

The Noon Lions sponsor continuous and one-time scholarships for graduating high school students. They gave two in 1980 and expect to continue that tradition in 1981.

This year, the club hopes to charter a Lions Club in Capitan and a Lioness Club for members' wives. In Ruidoso, the 32-member organization is, Budens said, "the number one club in our district. It means you're working hard when you're number

one."

EVENING LIONS sponsor three scholarships a year for Ruidoso High School (RHS) graduates. President Don Parsons said the club also "contributes to people who are in need" and occasionally, "we fund meals to shut-ins or take them dinners — we did that on Christmas Day," Parsons said.

Both clubs sponsor fund raisers throughout the year, with the Evening Lions' responsible for placing flags in business sections on holidays. Those holidays are "self-determined to a point," Parsons said. Traditional presidents' birthdays, traditional Veteran's Day, and one holiday important to Ruidoso — opening day at Ruidoso Downs Race Track — are also observed.

Noon Lions will visit other clubs in the district in 1981 to campaign for Bill Fugate, who plans to run for the district governor's position this year.

RUIDOSO WOMAN'S CLUB is planning several ongoing projects for this year, including the continuing effort to establish a Girl's Ranch near Lamy, New Mexico, a statewide project of New Mexico Woman's Clubs. President of the local Woman's Club, Nellie Vickers, said property has been acquired and the organization hopes to have girls placed by 1985.

"We will host the District Four Fall Convention here in late October," Vickers said. "This will bring some 50-65 ladies to our village for a two-day convention."

# 1980 was a most eventful year

The following brief excerpts from major stories carried in The Ruidoso News during 1980, highlight Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and area activities during the year.

Additional pictures of activities during 1980 appear on other pages throughout this issue.

July 3-All outside watering in the Village of Ruidoso was banned early Wednesday morning, with fines imposed on those who don't comply with the restriction, according to Water Superintendent Jim Goodman.

Fireworks will not be allowed in the Lincoln National Forest, or any national forest for that matter, said local fire prevention officer Guntram Werther.

The Lincoln County Democratic Party Central Committee Monday evening unanimously endorsed Wilton Howell, Ruidoso and Tularosa, as a candidate to fill the unexpired term of District 39 Senator John Conway, who is resigning effective September 1.

July 7 - Rocket Jet Bug, pretty well ignored by the betting public, raced to a brilliant half length win in Sunday's 18th staging of the Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The Ruidoso Lodgers Association's board of directors decided this week not to become an arm of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, according to Linda Flack, the organization's secretary.

The ninth annual Ruidoso Art Festival will be held in Ruidoso July 25-27.

July 10-Ruidoso trustees continued the outside watering ban.

The Ruidoso board of education may sell a piece of property donated to the district by Don Driver, if details can be completed through the Department of Public School Finance.

July 14 - A helicopter on an archeological survey flight near Sierra Blanca Ski Area crashed in an aspen grove Thursday morning, injuring the three persons aboard.

Certified personnel for the Ruidoso Independent School district have been given the seventh highest salary scale in the state, according to figures released by the Department of Public School Finance.

Program plans for the Mule Skinner's Festival in Ruidoso September 28-29, have been announced by Mule Skinners president Ed Hyman.

July 17 - Within the month, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce may be well on the way to publishing a revised city

map, which was promised more than a year ago. No targeted completion date was given.

A campaign to get more "overnighters" to stop in Ruidoso will be one of the first tasks of the newly organized Lodgers Committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Residents of Ruidoso Care Center will host a fund raiser for the American Heart Association, with a hot air balloon ride going for \$10.

July 21-Fire resistant foliage which has successfully been used in California and Colorado for landscaping around homes may eventually be developed for use in Ruidoso, under the sponsorship of the Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment.

The Ruidoso area's tree populations are continuing to suffer with insect infestation, according to Mike Funston, timber specialist for Smokey Bear Ranger District.

July 24-Gates will open for the Ninth Annual Ruidoso Art Festival Friday at 5 p.m., at the high school parking lot with more than 100 artists from the Southwest showing their original arts and crafts under five large circus tents.

A six hour fund drive held Saturday at

Ruidoso care Center for the American Heart Association, netted more than \$1,100 in donations from individuals and businesses in Ruidoso, according to Ivan Westergaard, administrator.

July 23-For the second year in a row, Edward Barker, a potter from Wellington, Kansas, was named "Best of Show" artist at the Ruidoso Art Festival, a three day event which closed Sunday evening.

Billy the Kid will ride the hills of Lincoln County again this week — but most of his stops will be at the pageant grounds in Lincoln, where his ghost will be resurrected for the annual Billy the Kid pageant Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

July 31-Water Superintendent Jim Goodman Tuesday evening submitted his written resignation to the village Trustees, effective August 15. Goodman has accepted the position of Water Production Superintendent at Flagstaff, Arizona.

The village trustees Tuesday evening asked Boyle Engineering representative Ted Hogsett, Albuquerque, to submit a cost estimate to conduct an analysis of present water rates.

A water service fee increase of 50 cents per month for regular and standby water customers was proposed Monday night by Ruidoso Downs trustees.

August 4-Hondo Valley parents and students have filed a lawsuit in Federal District Court in Albuquerque alleging the Hondo Valley Public School System has not maintained adequate bilingual education facilities.

Ruidoso's water is presently being treated for taste and odor with potassium permanganate and activated carbon, according to water superintendent Jim August 7-R. A. "Bud" Crenshaw of White Oaks is a step closer to establishing a store and bar in the "ghost town" of White Oaks, following a public hearing in Carrizozo Tuesday.

Tuesday. The Retail Merchants Committee met here Monday with Ralph Smith, traffic supervisor for the New Mexico Highway Department relative to proposed plans to improve traffic safety conditions on Sudderth and Mechem Drives.

A Ruidoso sanitation truck was extensively damaged in a fire which occurred as the truck was en route to the Fort Stanton landfill Monday.

August 11-The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission decided to postpone the submission of a new application for acreage on Fort Stanton mesa, largely as a result of the death of one of their staunch

supporters, New Mexico Congressman Harold Runnels.

The New Mexico Highway Department and the Village of Ruidoso have consented to consider purchasing rumble strips which would be placed at both approaches to the crosswalk area in midtown. Cost of the project was pegged at \$3,000 to \$4,000 and the strips would be installed by the highway department.

August 14-Village trustees unanimously approved the formation of a water commission to be charged with the responsibility of averting future water crises.

Use of the two Ruidoso school gymnasiums may become more limited than before because some school officials claim the newly resurfaced middle school gym was scratched beyond repair by a group using it this summer.

The Lodgers Committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce learned that they may be able to erect advertisement billboards in other parts of the state in order to bring more traffic into Ruidoso.

August 18-The Lincoln County Fair will open in Capitan this week with the first entries being accepted Wednesday.

Other continuing projects include maintenance of mini-parks in the village, collection of aluminum for recycling, an annual donation to the New Mexico Boy's Ranch as a memorial to members, weekly game nights at the club building to help sponsor civic projects, and regular programs during monthly meetings.

"We will also continue having a recipe in the Ruidoso News each issue. We hope you are enjoying these recipes," Vickers said.

The Woman's Club also provides a \$400 scholarship to an RHS graduate each year, and will continue to place a plant or flower at Ruidoso Care Center each month.

The Woman's Club now has 63 members and are entering their 49th year of membership of the club as a goal of the year, "especially trying to get more younger women to join," she said. women to join," she said.

THE JAYCEES have started the tradition of giving a cord of wood per month to a needy family, during winter months. "We will continue to do this in 1981," Albert Richardson, club president said.

The club plans to launch a new project in mid-January, a shooters education program for people who use small firearms, such as "B-B guns." Richardson said this project will teach children proper use of the guns and those participating will be invited to compete in shooting contests.

"The winners will make up a five to ten member team to compete at the state level," Richardson said.

In February, the club will host a "Boss Appreciation Night," to "honor all our bosses for keeping us around for a year."

The annual Jaycees Legislative Action Workshop, held in Santa Fe during the regular legislative session, will be attended by local Jaycees who will introduce a "Sagebrush Rebellion" bill.

A state meeting of Jaycees will be held February 27-March 1 in Carlsbad,

featuring speaking contests for members. Richardson said Ruidoso will be represented at that meeting.

Another state convention will be held in Albuquerque in May, and the national Jaycees meeting will be in San Antonio in June, with local members planning to attend both gatherings, Richardson said.

The 30-member club is currently ranked ninth in the state, primarily for the number of service projects they sponsor and local community involvement. "We will continue to sponsor fund raisers for Muscular Dystrophy, a national Jaycee

project, and we hope to do a benefit for the American Cancer Society in September sometime."

THE JAYCEETES, a sister organization to the Jaycees, will be concentrating on "more personal growth in 1981," Thea Hassell, president, said. "We're going to get started on preparing for competition in

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Aspendade Committee began making preliminary plans Thursday for that event, scheduled for the first weekend in October.

A benefit dance held Wednesday night for the Muscular Dystrophy Association garnered that charity organization \$2,500 from individuals and businesses in Ruidoso.

Ruidoso police detectives are continuing the investigation into the alleged beating death of Richard "Pat" Malooly, operator of The Carpet Tree. Malooly died about midnight Friday at Eastern New Mexico Medical Center, Roswell, following surgery earlier in the day.

August 21—Members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce decided not to get into the village map publishing business — instead they will endorse a map published by Barron Publications, Lubbock, Texas, provided it is accurate and available soon.

Final entries are being accepted today, and Lincoln County Fair action will get underway Friday morning. The richest purse in the history of either quarter horse or thoroughbred racing, \$1,431,650, will be split up in Sunday's seventh running of the All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

August 25—Volunteers for the Humane Society of Lincoln County will be visible in Ruidoso this week seeking donations to be used to build an animal shelter for county wide use.

Although Wilton Howell of Ruidoso has already received the nod from the state Democratic party to replace resigning Republican Senator John Conway, and is campaigning for election to the seat, it looks as though he'll be facing another challenger, Otero County Democratic

chairman Johnny Herrera, Alamogordo, prior to the general election in November.

Native Gambler, a gelding who was purchased in the All-American Sale at Ruidoso Downs two years ago for only \$8,500, won \$501,147 in Sunday's All-American Derby.

August 28—Based on the success of the 1980 venture, the board of directors of Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated has announced a tentative 1981 festival schedule, which may include guest artists Steve Allen and Sheri Lewis.

Otero County Democratic Chairman Johnny Herrera Monday filed a suit in District Court against Brad L. Hay, chairman of the state Democratic Party, and the state Democratic Central Committee, seeking to issue an injunction to prevent the party from filing the name of Wilton Howell of Ruidoso as the nominee for state Senate, District 39.

September 1—The quarter horse industry has long been accustomed to big money races but trainer Johnny Goodman and jockey W. R. Hunt pulled in \$94,114 apiece after the pair raced Hiestertey, the winner of the 1980 Labor Day All-American Futurity, and Native Gambler, the All-American Derby winner, at a track ago.

Kevin Mellon, 22, of Ruidoso Tuesday pleaded no contest to a charge of voluntary manslaughter in connection with the August 15 beating death of Pat Malooly. He appeared before Judge George Zimmerman in Alamogordo after voluntarily turning himself in to an investigator Tuesday. He is being held in Lincoln County jail, Carrizozo, on \$50,000 bond.

In District court Friday in Alamogordo, Judge George Zimmerman dismissed a case aimed at keeping the name of Wilton Howell off the November ballot as a candidate for the state senate seat in

District 39.

September 4—The mule races at Ruidoso Downs Race Track this year, during the Mule Skimmers' Festival, September 28-29, will feature purses of \$8,000 for the Long Ears Derby and \$4,000 for the Four Year Olds Classic, possibly more.

A hunter-jumper class horse show to benefit the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital will be held at Ruidoso Downs September 25-28.

Aspendade 10, the 10th anniversary of Ruidoso's Aspendade Motorcyclist Convention, will highlight the action here October 1-4.

A fire reported at 12:01 a.m., Thursday at Ruidoso Downs race track destroyed Shed Row Seven and claimed the life of one race horse, a three-year-old named Efficiency.

Ruidoso Independent Schools opened Tuesday with an unofficial enrollment of 1,436 students.

September 8—Ruidoso Municipal Airport has ended the 1980 racing season with record figures for operations, car rentals, tie down usage, ground transportation and safety, according to airport manager Tim Morris.

The state Supreme Court Friday issued a writ directing the Secretary of State, the state Democratic Central Committee and Wilton Howell of Ruidoso to "show cause why the name of Johnny Herrera should not be placed on the general election ballot for senator, District 39." Briefs and arguments are to be heard on the case September 17.

A short course in the handling of hazardous materials emergencies begins tonight under the sponsorship of the Ruidoso Fire Department, with sessions set for September and October.

September 11—The village trustees Tuesday evening took action to increase

the water tap fee from \$250 to \$1,000. A public meeting establishing the new charge will be held at 7:30 p.m., September 30, in the Ruidoso Public Library.

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday expressed support of the upcoming Arabian Horse Show, to be held at Western Highlands, Ruidoso Downs, September 20-21.

The Ruidoso Lodger's Tax committee approved, for the second time, a proposal to provide funds for advertising and promotion of the Aspendade Motorcycle Convention, organized and promoted by Til Thompson.

Republican Charlie T. Lee, Alamogordo area rancher and businessman, officially announced his candidacy for state senator in District 39 Monday.

September 15—Interest in float entries for the Aspendade parade October 4 has not been overwhelming, but Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth is certain that will change. Presently, no businesses, private individuals or service clubs have submitted float entries. Jungbluth said five bands, a drill team/color guard, two Shrine clubs and four miscellaneous entries have been returned.

Alto Lake, the village's water reservoir, is receiving water from the estimated five inch rainfall on the watershed early last week.

Equipment costing more than \$13,000 was recently added to the inventory at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

September 18—Following a New Mexico Supreme Court ruling Wednesday in Santa Fe, it appears almost certain that the name of Wilton H. Howell, Ruidoso will appear on the general election ballot as the Democratic candidate for state senate, District 39.

Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday

took the first step towards enacting an ordinance to restrict the placement of mobile homes in the townsite of Nogal.

The area's first All Arabian Horse Show will be presented Saturday and Sunday at Western Highlands, Ruidoso Downs, under the sponsorship of Ruidoso All Arabian Horse Show.

Local Communication Workers' Association union members, who work for Continental Telephone Company, voted Wednesday to strike, should negotiations in Phoenix, Arizona, break down.

September 22—With thousands of dollars already spent to continually upgrade State Road 532, plans call for nearly \$1 million more to go into the next resurfacing project, slated for summer, 1981. The most recent project was completed in July of this year and according to Highway Department district engineer Worth Smelser, resurfacing work included stabilization of the existing road base, adding of base material and application of a double penetration seal. Some local businessmen say the work was not completed as promised and may not last through the 1980-81 ski season.

Purses to be paid at the 1980 mule meeting September 25-28 at Ruidoso Downs could be as much as \$35,000, Ed Hyman, president of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers, said today.

September 25—Final preparations are being made for the first Hunter-Jumper class horse show ever to be held in Ruidoso. The event kicked off at noon today with registration at the show site, a meadow just inside the gates at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Mule racing, for the largest purses paid in the world, begin Friday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and continue through Sunday.

After making a personal inspection of the State Road 532, known locally as Ski Run Road, Worth Smelser, Highway Department district engineer, said Wednesday, "As far as I'm concerned, the road is in better shape now than it ever has been."

Miss Aspendade 1980, Charlene Hickson, was crowned Wednesday night at the Holiday Inn. Selected as alternate was Susan Hirschfeld. Both girls will ride the Beta Sigma Phi float in the October 4 Aspendade Parade.

September 29 - Local Continental Telephone Company of the West employees will strike at midnight tonight, sources inside the company said today. Approximately 30 employees are exercising their right to a work stoppage, company officials said.

Martinez said a registration and information desk will be located in the north ballroom of the New Mexico Union Building on the UNM campus. The desk will be maintained throughout the duration of the symposium and conference.

## State income tax forms were mailed Wednesday

The New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department announced last week that mailing of the 1980 New Mexico Personal Income Tax returns has begun.

Returns will be mailed to all persons who filed 1979 returns. Processing of returns normally takes about 10 weeks. In many cases, however, this time can be decreased if taxpayers take the following steps:

— File early. Those returns received by the Department during the first six weeks of the year are processed faster. As the season progresses and more returns are received, processing time increases.

— Use the preprinted label. Use of this label can significantly shorten processing time.

Errors and omissions on the return

frequently cause a delay in processing. When filing, the Department reminds all taxpayers to check their returns before mailing to make sure that all questions have been answered, that social security numbers have been included and that the return has been signed.

Area persons needing assistance in filling out their returns can receive it at the Murray Morgan State Office Building, Box 158, Alamogordo, 88310, telephone 437-4950 or the Taxation and Revenue Department, 325 South Main Street, Box 1557, Roswell, 88201, telephone 622-1750.

Taxpayers not receiving forms through the mail should check at Department offices, or post offices and banks where forms will be available.

## Bidding records set by BLM

Records were set in both competitive and simultaneous oil and gas programs in December according to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

Over \$15 million in high bids was received by the Bureau on 63 parcels of public land in both New Mexico and Oklahoma offered in a competitive oil and gas sale December 16. Over 400 bids were received with a total bid of \$40,743,492. Andarko Production Company had the highest bids of over one million on each of two parcels in Lea County. Monsanto Company had the highest, single bid of \$1,996,800 on a 640 acre tract. All of these were in New Mexico.

The highest bid on an Oklahoma parcel was by Amarex, Incorporated, on 149.33 acres in Roger Mills County of \$406,222.

Competitive sales are held on tracts in known producing geologic formations. In addition to the bonus bid, companies also pay an annual rental plus royalties to the United States government. These vary from 12 1/2 to 25 percent on oil with the percent increasing as production goes up. On natural gas the royalty varies from 12 1/2 percent on natural gas under five million cubic feet of production to 16 2/3 percent for all gas over five million cubic feet. Fifty percent of the royalties are returned to the state government.

BLM's simultaneous oil and gas drawing had a record 144,400 entries in December on 197 parcels. The drawing is on tracts not located in known geologic fields and is extremely speculative in nature. The old record of 90,000 entries was set in October 1980.



# Warriors defeat Demons, but lose to Goddard

The Ruidoso Warriors picked up the 1981 half of the cage season just the way they ended 1980, with a 62-50 win over Dexter there Friday.

But the new year took a bad turn Saturday night, as the Warriors dropped an 85-60 decision to Roswell Goddard there.

Coach Barry Nelson described the loss as "frustrating."

"They didn't put it to us," Nelson said Sunday. "We didn't play that bad, but I don't think they missed a shot. It was frustrating."

There were several reasons for the loss. Chief among them was the Warriors' inability to deal with Goddard's tough pressing defense.

"I was real surprised their press hurt us the way it did," Nelson said. "We kept making turnovers or they'd steal the ball from us. We just kept giving them too

many easy baskets. I didn't think we could get beat as bad as we did."

One of Nelson's best players, star forward Glenn Ryan, got into foul trouble early in the first quarter. With three fouls called on Ryan early, Nelson felt he had to pull him out of the game.

"I thought we could afford to save him for later," he said. "The score at that point was 15-13 in Goddard's favor. That's when the kids fell apart on the press break. I kept calling timeouts to get the kids to settle down, but they got tired and couldn't keep up with Goddard."

The AAAA school's bench strength showed itself in the game, as all 11 of its varisty players played in each quarter of the game.

While it's doubtful Ryan's early reappearance would have made much difference, his foul trouble showed just how tight the officials were calling the game — at first.

Goddard was whistled for 29 fouls in the

contest, and Nelson said he thought the referees stopped calling many fouls just to keep the game moving.

"Sometimes the game was more like a football game," he said. "It was a madhouse. They were all over us, coming over our backs, fouling everybody. I think the refs started letting 'em go just so they could get the game over."

Obviously, it was a very physical ballgame.

"Yeah, but we needed it," Nelson said. "It kinda hurt our morale to get beat that bad, but we really did need it. Maybe it'll get us going."

Despite missing much of the game, Ryan led the scoring with 18, followed by

Gary Jones and Rodney Thomason with 15 points each, Scott Neal and Bill Richardson with five each and Gene Reeves with three.

Nelson was pleased with Thomason's play, he said, especially considering Thomason's recent bouts with illness.

"Rodney played some good ball. I was real pleased with the way he played," he said.

Although the Warriors beat Dexter in their 1981 opener, Nelson felt it was a sloppy win.

"We didn't play very well, but I sort of expected it," he said. "You could tell we hadn't played in a while. We were real sloppy."

The Warriors held a 16 point lead at halftime, which they maintained through the third quarter.

But Dexter came back in the fourth, and even pulled to within four points.

"That's when I called timeout and we talked things over," he said. "The kids told me not to worry about it. Then they went out and hooked it up toward the end."

"Our biggest problem was being out of shape. We looked bad, like we got real tired."

For the first time this season, four players were in double figures. Ryan again led the scoring with 20, followed by Neal, Thomason and Wade Wilson with 10 each, Jones with six, Richardson with three, and

Reeves and Matt Roberts with two apiece.

The win and the loss give the 80-81 Warriors a 7-3 record.

The Warriors are idle until Friday, when they host Artesia, and then they hit the road Saturday to tangle with the district foe Silver City.

"We need this week to get ready," Nelson said. "Everybody we'll play from here on out will press us, and press us hard. We'll have to work on our press break."

"We'll work a lot on defense. We'll work a little bit with our offense. I was fairly pleased with the way our offense worked. We've got a lot of work to do, but we'll be ready."

Castanon really had few gripes about his team, including a man to man defense the ladies have been running.



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
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

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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — It looks like we're going to get a third Congressman.

If Congress accepts the 1980 census (which they'll likely do, after grumbling), it goes to the White House to be made official. After that, the application of a complicated formula will almost certainly show that some Eastern state gives up a member of the House and we get a new one.

Since the House will grow no larger (everybody knows it's too large already), we've got a zero-sum situation; someone else must lose for us to gain.

That will make hearts beat faster in the 40 or more New Mexicans who are secretly planning to run for that office when it's created. (Secretly? Half of them we know already. There's Bob Mondragon and Art Trujillo and probably Bill Richardson ... and on and on and on.)

But how will the Legislature divide the state into three districts?

The answer to that question makes all the difference.

We could revive McCaffrey's Simple Solution (give the seat to Bernalillo county, which has a third of the state's voters), but you guys in the outlands who hate the Big Burg will never buy that one. For one thing, it's too logical.

So what we'll get is some unlikely and damn-fool idea which splits the state into three ungainly areas, at least two of which will guarantee "safe" seats like we have now. (One for conservatives, another for the Spanish-speaking; how neat!)

Albuquerque will almost certainly find itself represented by two House members, one for the Valley and one for the Heights, or one for the north side of town and one for the south, or some other such clumsy

arrangement. What we ought to be doing is trying to find three equal areas which will give the Congressperson from there a good cross-section of New Mexico's voters. That would be the fairest and most helpful way to have these people chosen. But it won't happen.

Instead, you'll see more scheming, conniving and trading-off among our legislators when these lines are drawn than at almost any other point in the next two sessions. Most of that will go on backstage, of course.

The only thing which will lead to more giving-and-taking in smoke-filled rooms is that other redistricting the census figures will make obligatory — the one where lawmakers redraw the lines which enclose their very own legislative districts.

That's the big action over the next two years.

We commit ourselves to bring you a blow-by-blow account of that one when it gets geared up — though we may have to bug some private rooms and offices to get the real skinny on it. That one shows our legislators at their horsetrading best.

Meanwhile, if you've got a plan for creating that third Congressional district, draw us a map of it. Every one we've seen so far has been designed by somebody whose eyes are on personally running and getting elected from the district. That, we find, leads to some loss of objectivity.

Once again, when oil must be poured on troubled waters (this time in the Mortgage Finance Authority), Bruce King names Ray Powell to do the job. What the Governor plainly needs is an expansion in the group of people in whom he can put his trust.

As everyone knows, astronomers these days don't peer at the stars the way Galileo, Copernicus et al did; they spend their time poring over photographs or speculating about vast stellar events outside the ken of even the largest telescopes. how astronomers perform their duties is accurate. Many, though, still retain their early fascination with the spectacle of the heavens. For example, Dr. Bradford A. So much for stereotypes about astronomers. — Alamogordo Daily News

### REGULATIONS COSTLY

The federal Office of Management and Budget has estimated it would cost the United States auto industry \$10.9 billion to implement all the federal regulations proposed to take effect in the next four years. We can add this to the list of hidden "taxes" which are imposed on the American economy by government regulations.

Fortunately, the transition teams of the incoming Reagan administration are looking at this aspect of our economic problems as well as at the opportunities for direct tax cuts. In the long run, reducing overregulation could have as much or more effect on improved productivity as reducing tax rates.

A study has disclosed that government-mandated equipment added \$666 to the price of the typical passenger car manufactured in 1978 — or a regulatory cost of \$8.7 billion for the 10 million cars sold that year. The figure would be even higher today.

The regulatory "tax" on housing may run as high as 20 to 30 percent of the price, reflecting not only the cost of complying with regulations but costs resulting from long delays in obtaining required inspections and permits.

The Center for the Study of American Business at Washington University in St. Louis has calculated there is a ratio of one-to-20 between what the government spends on its regulatory agencies and what business must spend to comply with their regulations. In other words, for every \$1 billion spent on regulatory activities the cost to businesses being regulated is \$20 billion — a cost eventually paid by consumers. By this formula the combined price of federal regulatory programs alone is now \$121 billion, or almost \$500 for every man, woman and child in America.

Not all regulatory programs are bad, of course. We rely on government to police health and safety in the marketplace and we have given government agencies new responsibility for environmental protection. But in the last decade regulations have piled up with little consideration for their effect on economic growth, prices and productivity. How many of these regulations are really necessary?

If the new administration and Congress demand honest answers to that question from the myriad regulatory agencies in the federal government, we can hope for "tax cuts" quite beyond the kind that show up only on our payroll stub. — News-Bulletin, Belen

### A QUIET PRESIDENCY?

Many Americans are hoping for a quiet presidency from Ronald Reagan. Among other things, they don't want to see special TV speeches on every major problem.

They recall President Carter's great concern, and special TV speech on the "brigade" in Cuba, about which nothing effective was done, and which was soon forgotten. They recall Carter's special "moral equivalent of war" speech about the energy crisis, which produced no immediate action.

They recall naive speeches about domestic policies in foreign countries, which helped bring about the Shah's fall in Iran, among other things.

They recall carefully prepared TV image-making, the walk down Pennsylvania Avenue, the speech from the White House in a casual sweater, etc., all contrived TV imagery.

The outlook now is for a presidency of quiet style and dignity. Reagan, it's said, is likely to continue periodically to get away from it all — no aides, no photographers, camera crews, "working" vacation staff, etc.

There reportedly will be less effort to constantly exploit television and image-making. A pollster won't be constantly following Reagan around, as a major advisor. All of which is something of a relief. — Santa Rosa News

It appears, so far as allegations against Frankie Barela, 32, Camp Sierra Blanca inmate is concerned that:

— Lincoln County was sold a bill of goods, by the Department of Corrections, concerning the caliber of inmate assigned to this minimum security facility; and,

— The door to freedom is always open at Camp Sierra Blanca.

As of December 31 Barela was a suspect in the stabbing death of a 68-year-old Alamogordo man. A suspect to the point that his bond was set at \$10,000.

As of last Wednesday the District Attorney, Steve Sanders, Alamogordo, though Barela was obviously not being detained in Camp Sierra Blanca, hadn't determined if Barela was a camp escapee or if he'd merely been on furlough, or overstayed his furlough, presumably granted for exemplary conduct while being incarcerated.

The News checked with the Lincoln County sheriff's office, upon learning of the Barela incident, relative to the sheriff being provided with rap sheets on the convicts assigned to Camp Sierra Blanca. Though the rap sheets were promised the sheriff months ago, as of last week they'd not received rap sheet one.

Barela, according to camp records, was serving a 30-year term as a habitual criminal. Ostensibly, according to Department of Corrections officials several months ago, Camp Sierra Blanca was to house inmates who weren't considered a menace to society, that were on the verge of being released, that were assigned to the camp so they could gradually adapt to a life of freedom.

We submit that the death of this Alamogordo man, allegedly a crime committed by Barela, isn't consistent with the policies we were advised would be observed in judging a felon's candidacy to become a camp inmate.

Governor Bruce King has indicated that the prison system is under control. To us, considering Barela's alleged crime, we can only say that the governor's statements are balderdash . . . pure and simple. — CD







### Violence down in gridiron wars?

Few athletes have made the transition from the playing field to the broadcast booth as smoothly and successfully as Merlin Olsen, former standout defensive tackle for the Los Angeles Rams now in his fourth year as an NBC Sports football analyst.

Merlin had a helmet-to-helmet view of the rugged trench warfare that is so much a part of professional football during his 15 years with the Rams, and now that experience translates into broadcasting credibility.

Says his broadcast partner, Dick Enberg, "When Merlin talks about interior-line play—something that many fans ignore in favor of following the wide-open action involving the quarterback, receivers or running backs—they not only listen but they believe him. Merlin is a knowledgeable and articulate observer, and he has a knack for knowing when to talk and when not to."

On the subject of violence in today's game of professional football, Olsen is firm in his opinions. "There is definitely much less violence today than there was, for instance, during my playing days some 10 years ago," he says.

#### Less rough stuff

"There is an impression of there being more violence today simply because much more attention is drawn to action that is couched under the label of 'violence.' It doesn't mean that the frequency or severity of such incidents is greater. It's all just blown up more."

What about injuries today as compared to when he was playing?

"It does seem that we're seeing more serious injuries today," says Merlin, "but that is another misleading factor regarding this violence business. The greater number of injuries and the greater degree of severity is really due to the fact that today's players are faster, stronger and more ruggedly conditioned than in years past. As a result, physical confrontations—tackles, blocks, falls—take a measurably higher toll in the form of injuries."

"And too, there is no question in my mind but that artificial turf has prompted an increase in injuries, particularly to the knees. It all boils down to the fact that professional football is a much more wide-open, slam-bang, fast-paced contest. That more players tend to get hurt should not be attributed to unsavory meanness on the part of the players."
