Mayor Davis gives views on 'state of the village'

Editor's note:
Because the annual state of the village luncheon meeting had to be postponed indefinitely this year due to scheduling conflicts of elected officials, The News met with Ruidoso mayor Lloyd Davis Jr., to seek his views on a number of problems and issues which may demand attention in the near future.

Q. How serious is Ruidoso's water problem and what alternatives is the village going to explore to solve that problem?

A. "This is going to be very dependent on the immediate future. We were late with our rains this summer, but in December we were very near the annual moisture level — but it was very late. Thinking of the immediate past — since records have been kept — we always do have a certain amount of snow and spring rain, and if we have those, as a short-range problem, it's not critical.

"If we have a terribly abnormal spring, there'll be only one way to go, and that's ground water, meaning wells. This might involve drilling more wells, in addition to those recommendations accepted by the council two weeks ago. It was recommended that we deepen the well at Eagle Creek to about 1,500 feet and deepen the Hollywood well by about 300 to 400 feet.

"Another well may be drilled near the joining of the Rio Ruidoso and Carrizo Creek. If it has producible water, quality and quantity wise, then we must transfer water rights we already own to that location, or purchase new rights. This would be after we obtain a drilling permit, which comes from the State Engineer's office.

Q. Would obtaining those rights be expensive?

A. "Water rights have a cost factor, but one nice thing is, if you do have water that's usable, and you purchase the rights or transfer, it may be expensive, but it's also economical because then you have storage as well as a source. You don't have to build a costly impounding structure, like a dam.

"I'm sure there'll be a recommendation forthcoming for a new impoundment structure near Alto Reservoir, for a storage reservoir of like size, or slightly smaller.

"Right now we have a water problem created by a reduced amount of moisture, along with greater usage every year. Right now it's a problem, but as far as the future, it will be an ongoing process to secure additional water rights under New Mexico law. We'll have to do it according to need, because it doesn't pay to stockpile water rights.

Q. Will the water problem limit Ruidoso's growth?

A. "The lack of water could limit Ruidoso's growth, but I think anyone involved in municipal services will be faced with acquiring and securing a source of water — the public will demand it.

"It's a nationwide problem. In California, cities are importing water from long distances. We might have to look further afield, too.

"The Water Commission is working toward determining if the desalination program will be good enough that there could possibly be some joint project (with Holloman Air Force Base or Alamogordo). And I suspect there is good water available north of us.

"I don't think water will be an overwhelming problem for the year coming up. We might have to conserve, but I'm optimistic enough to think we'll find a way (to solve the problem.)

Q. What are some other major problems facing Ruidoso and what are some possible solutions?

A. "I don't think there is any problem facing Ruidoso that any other community which is experiencing growth is facing. One thing may be the decision on what is the quality of growth and the lifestyle we want here.

Q. Does that mean the village will have to enforce more strictly the planning and zoning regulations?

A. "It seems to me that the Planning and Zoning Commission is very young, maybe 22 or 23 years old, and in the beginning, most people were horrified that a regulatory agency could make recommendations to the council which would more highly restrict what they can do. But every year, it seems that more and more have come around to the idea that, 'Hey, this is really good for me — it protects my investment in the community.'

"The regulations are there for a reason. They are there because of years of study by other communities with problems similar to ours. They're not there to cause a burden on an individual but to best serve the greatest number of people.

Q. For example — the regulations requiring new streets to be no more than a certain grade of steepness?

A. "I feel we have to enforce this, because of the cost of collecting garbage alone — the wear and tear on trucks. Steep grades accelerate the wear-out of garbage trucks, graders, street sweepers and snow removal equipment. Nothing really works

on it (a steep grade) and that's above and beyond the fact that it's dangerous to the people living there.

Q. On the subject of planning and zoning regulations, would you recommend putting a halt to large condo/townhouse development if the water situation continues to worsen?

A. "In the older sections of town, in most places, the utilities were designed to provide for exactly what's there — single family lots. The utilities in the older parts won't handle any further rezoning. If any variances are accepted in the future, it will be up to the developer to increase the size of lines. But I feel it will be rare for a [SEE PAGE 2]

Village's 1980 building total tops \$16 million

Building permits issued by the village of Ruidoso during 1980 totalled \$16,956,702 in estimated construction costs, exceeding the previous yearly total by almost \$7 million. Permits are based on an estimated cost of \$20 per square foot.

According to village zoning officer Emory Hatcher, "Building was up, mainly because of the increase in both year around and seasonal population."

The high total also reflects the fact that the village began issuing permits for additions, such as porches and decks in 1980, Hatcher said.

Although interest rates climbed to record highs in 1980, and the building industry nationwide suffered declines, Hatcher said that new Ruidoso residents are continuing "to pay cash for homes, for the most part."

Hatcher added that many people are building additions to existing homes in an effort to sidestep high costs of new construction.

In December, 1980, only \$140,382 in permits were issued, the lowest figure of the year. The drop in the December figure probably indicates that people are "winding up the construction of homes for the winter," Hatcher said. "Others," he added, "are undoubtedly waiting to see what effect the new presidential administration will have on interest rates."

'Lincoln County War' revived in White Oaks

Some White Oaks residents are calling it the Lincoln County War, Chapter Two.

Emotions are running high in that so-called "ghost town" north of Carrizozo, following the latest of several violent incidents, which resulted in the shooting death of 12 goats and sheep owned by local rancher R. A. "Bud" Crenshaw.

The value of the animals was cited at about \$1,500, not including a number of unborn lambs carried by the sheep.

Several residents told the News they are now carrying guns in White Oaks, for their own protection.

A series of sworn statements were given

to the District Attorney, Steve Sanders, last week on the matter, and Paul Wetzel of White Oaks has been charged in connection with the goat shooting.

The previous week, assault charges were filed by Paul's mother, Larue Wetzel, against Crenshaw and Joe Armstrong, also of White Oaks. Armstrong and Crenshaw have also filed assault charges against Mrs. Wetzel.

A hearing on the latest shooting has been scheduled for 10 a.m., Friday, in magistrate S. M. Ortiz's court in Carrizozo.

Smokey's proud of you

1980 was a slow year for firefighters, according to statistics released this week by Smokey Bear Ranger District.

The district had 40 fires on National Forest land during the year, with 32 attributed to lightning and eight classified as "people-caused," according to Tom Guck, fire prevention technician for the district.

"In addition, fire personnel responded to another 20 fires on state and private land and within the village of Ruidoso. Once again, abandoned campfires were the culprits, starting the most person-

caused fires," Guck said.

Total acreage burned on forest land was 15, which Guck said, "reflects in part, an outstanding effort from the public in being careful with fire." Guck said 1980 was "an extremely dry and hot year during a good part of the fire season," but very little acreage was lost because of fire.

He urged everyone to remember Smokey Bear's motto and said, "Smokey thanks all of you, and let's keep our good record going through 1981."

variance (like this) to be granted. "I think we'll have more townhouses and condominiums, but they'll be in the newer areas."

Q. Do you think the census figures for Ruidoso are accurate? If not, can and will anything be done about them? Why are they important to Ruidoso?

A. "I think the census figures are reasonably accurate. It would be difficult to get 100 percent accuracy. I think some people who might qualify as permanent residents did not (show up in the census figures) because of the state income tax."

"They may maintain a permanent residence in another state such as Texas, which doesn't have an income tax, although they may live here most of the time."

"The census showed a population close to 5,000, residences with about 70 percent unoccupied, and the 70 percent figure about tallies with the way we felt the utilities and sewer demands were running."

"I'm not really certain that to a community our size, the census figures may be as important as they are to cities like Farmington or Roswell. Most of the government programs (which use the census figures as qualifying data) are for towns of 50,000 and greater, so it's not as much of a benefit for us."

"Towns that seem to need the least amount of help are those with populations from 5,000 to 25,000. Although we have problems too, they're not as bad as they used to be."

"We now have an assessed valuation of \$40,000. This gives us more bonding

capacity, which means, for the first time, we could have some bond monies — if the voters want it — to fix some of our streets."

Q. But isn't the bond market pretty limited now?

A. "General obligation bonds don't seem to have suffered, although revenue bonds have fared poorly recently."

Q. Do the trustees have any plans to assist the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) in future attempts to obtain a regional airport? What do you think the chances are of obtaining approval and funds to build a jet capable airport?

A. "I would assume the trustees are ready to support the SBAC whenever they (SBAC) feel it's feasible to make a move. "I think even people who in the past, were not convinced of the need are becoming more aware of it because of the traffic coming into the present airport."

"As far as approval chances and funding, I think both are possible. With the change in the national administration and president-elect Reagan having pledged a much more conservative approach to government, I assume there will be a re-evaluation of all priorities for federal monies. That could have a negative effect on funds."

"But, we've been working on the project a long time, and there are vast amounts of money available for airport development. Being able to show justification for it will be the major thing."

Q. Is a new airport a necessity for the continued growth of Ruidoso?

A. "I think we could live without it, but

with public and private air transportation going the direction they're going, it would help. In public transportation, certain commuter lines are coming in which could be beneficial."

"Private air transportation seems to be increasing, and the trend is toward larger, faster, more efficient aircraft. A new airport is needed just because of the increased (private) traffic."

"It goes back to establishing priorities. If you feel Ruidoso is great and doesn't need to continue to grow (in quality and quantity), we could eke by with the airport we have."

"We've never had a really successful commuter line, because of the size (of the present airport) and weather limitations also. In any community, success is based on the total lines of communication, and air transportation is a major means of communication."

Q. What other things will have to happen for Ruidoso to grow and prosper? How important is the development of more activities and attractions between seasons, such as horse shows, mule races, Aspencade and so on?

A. "I think all of those are important. I know many people enjoyed the Arabian horse show, and the (hunter/jumper) show might have brought more new people to town. I think the track will continue to grow, and there are plans to expand Sierra Blanca Ski Area, to give them better facilities and more capacity."

"I also think that one of the major things that could happen to the average business located between the Chamber and the Post

Office is this. Legislation permits merchants and village to get into a joint parking situation. It could be a major factor to stimulate old downtown Ruidoso. "A major problem is the ability to park and circulate. We'd have to have the cooperation of all merchants because we'd have to come up with a permit structure. "To do it, we'd have to have an attendant (who would collect fees per car) or an agreement with the merchants for income (to the village)."

"It would take more than one or two large lots or structures. But if we could put in quite a bit of off-street parking and if we could agree to an equitable way to finance, I think it would help all of the merchants."

"I really think this is a tremendous priority for these people who have valuable (retail) property and far from the recommended number of parking spaces."

Q. Do you think Ruidoso needs a civic/convention center, and if so, what do you think is the best way to achieve this? What seems to be the best location for such a complex, in your opinion? What should it encompass — strictly meeting rooms, or also the capacity to house rodeos, major concerts and major convention activities?

A. "We need a center. In speaking with people associated with various civic center projects, I think we definitely need a very specialized community center which could be designed to grow with our needs. "We don't need something like the El Paso Civic Center, just because we don't have the trade territory. We have witnessed within the last year, that we can have events which attract 1,100 to 1,200 people, as we did when Victor Borge appeared (at the Ruidoso Summer Festival)."

"In talking with people associated with civic complexes, it seems that those who have gone to an 'all-purpose center say it will not work. We should shoot for an auditorium which would seat 700 to 1,500, rather than a much larger one — with the possibilities for enlargement later."

"I also think the present airport site could be totally master planned for shopping, hotels, and possibly a civic complex with adequate parking. The center should be based on our needs, something that wouldn't be grandiose."

"Maybe we could also work hand in hand with the needs of the schools. We might need to build a large auditorium which could be used for their needs."

"The money could come from lodger's tax funds. The law says 25 percent of the money must be spent on advertising. So, 75 percent can be used for a myriad of things, such as meeting halls."

"I think it (a civic center) would benefit the group that collects the lodger's tax funds by attracting events which would fill up even the outlying motels."

"It seems to me we could have that tract very... beautifully master-planned... it's a large tract without a great deal of natural vegetation, and it would have to be re-landscaped."

Q. How can Ruidoso go about attracting clean industry (other than tourism), or is this a desirable source of growth?

A. "I assume you mean electronic or computer industry. I think clean industry would be marvelous, but these are very dependent on a good transportation system, which gets right back to a good airport. We're off the mainstream of traffic."

Math/science work shop slated for high school girls



Warriors win over Colts, but lose to Artesia

Ruidoso's basketball Warriors had what you could call a good and bad weekend. It was good because the Warriors captured their first district victory of the year Saturday night with a 58-45 win over Silver City there.

But it was bad because the Warriors were wasted by the Artesia Bulldogs at home Friday, in a game that was closer than the 82-68 final.

"I really don't know what our problem is," Warrior head man Barry Nelson said. "We seem to be off our game. We haven't played as well as we were before our Christmas break. We're shooting the ball enough and we're playing pretty good defense."

"I'm dumbfounded."

The Artesia-Ruidoso ball game had been billed as a match between two equal

teams, but after the first quarter Friday night, any resemblance was purely coincidental.

Ruidoso trailed the Bulldogs only 18-14 after the first quarter, but the second quarter was, to be polite, a nightmare.

The Warriors were outscored 22-10 before intermission.

"I couldn't believe it," Nelson said. "Between the quarters I told 'em Artesia couldn't beat us from the outside, don't worry about their outside shooting."

"I was wrong."

And how. The Bulldogs' hot shooting Dickey brothers, Frank and Robin, combined for 30 points on the night, and a bunch of them came from 20 feet and beyond.

"Maybe I should have changed defense and started pressing or something," Nelson said. "Anything to get their offensive pattern broken up."

"If we could just have stayed with them, we'd have been in it."

True. The third quarter was dead even as each team scored 20 points. Ruidoso then outshot Artesia in the fourth, 24-22.

So really, for three quarters it was a tight ballgame.

"It's the same thing that happened to us the last time we played Roswell Goddard," he said. "We've got enough offense to score more than 10 points in a quarter, but we just couldn't hit a basket."

One Warrior had no trouble finding the basket — Mr. Consistency, Glenn Ryan, led all scorers with 29 points.

"He had a good game," Nelson understated.

Rodney Thomason was next with 11, Gary Jones added 10, Wade Wilson had eight (before being ejected on a technical foul), Scott Neal and Bill Richardson had four apiece and Gene Reeves had two.

"Artesia was a lot better than I expected," Nelson said.

So was Silver City, he added.

"I'll tell you, Silver could've run away with it if they'd been shooting hot," he

said. The Warriors were down 8-0 in the first period of that game before Ruidoso even got on the board. As it was, they trailed 10-8 at the end of the stanza.

And then it took a 22 point second period to capture the lead, which the Warriors never relinquished.

Ironically enough, the Warriors' usual nemesis — free throw shooting — kept them in the game in the first period. Six of their eight first quarter points came on charity tosses.

"But the point is we're capable of

scoring more points than eight in a quarter," Nelson insisted. "I know we have the talent and I think the players know we have it. It's just a matter of getting it out of them."

Ryan again took scoring honors with a 19 point night, followed by Thomason with 16, Jones and Richardson with eight apiece and Neal had five.

The Warriors now have a week long layoff before they return to competition. Next opponent is Truth or Consequences

there next Saturday.

"We'll take advantage of our week off and work on everything," Nelson said. "I really don't want us to peak too soon. We may lose a couple of games — we'll try to win as many games as we can, of course, but it all comes down to the district tournament anyway."

The Warriors are currently 8-4 on the year.

Ruidoso's junior varsity Warriors fell to 4-6 on the year with a 62-47 loss to Artesia

Friday.

But coach Vince Collins was pleased. "I thought we played pretty well," he said. "We had a bad first quarter, but Artesia was... whew!... pretty good."

Steve Sluder led Warrior scoring with 16, followed by Russ Veronda with 13.

Next opponent for the junior varsity is a game a week from Tuesday with Roswell Goddard's sophomore squad.

The junior varsity did not play at Silver City.

White Mountain victorious, 48-43



Section 1. On the 3rd day of February, 1981, there will be held in Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3, Lincoln County, New Mexico, a regular election for the purpose of electing two (2) members for terms of six (6) years.

Section 2. Declarations of candidacy must be delivered to the Office of the Superintendent of Schools, Ruidoso, New Mexico, no later than 5:00 p.m. on December 30, 1980.

Section 5. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County. 



Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE— We think Governor King is right to start talking about a special legislative session to consider the matter of rezoning the state.

A legislative time when nothing but redistricting can be considered would be a good thing.

So would some acceptance of that idea from Common Cause that a commission of citizens not members of the Legislature be named to do the rezoning.

That one isn't likely to be accepted, of course. Legislators will not be too big on putting that decision into the hands of mere citizens, who, they will claim, "will not understand it."

But the Governor, by making his plans for a special session known now, gave the legislators plenty of warning. They can be considering both the redistricting required for creation of a third Congressional seat and that needed for creating new legislative districts.

Both are important tasks.

In the past, both have certainly led to what the state chairman of Common Cause calls "horse trading" not always in the best interests of the voters.

We've been mulling for some time those words our Governor used in his year-end interview with Bill Feather of the Associated Press.

If you read the story, you may have found them as fascinating as we did.

"I think I'll quit publicly endorsing political candidates," the Governor said. "The type of following I have is a personal following. When you try to transfer that, it just won't transfer."

That notion, the Governor told Feather, had first begun to strike him back in 1974,

when he picked Tibo Chavez to be his successor in office, only to see Democratic voters reject his choice in the primary election.

It evidently became even clearer in his mind last year, when voters once again rejected his nominees, in this case both his nephew David and his brother Don.

Since the votes were counted on November 4, those close to King say, he has hunted a way to view those events which would not turn it into a personal rejection.

He appears to have found that in his new belief that he is as popular as ever, but the popularity is so personal it cannot be shared with others.

A consoling solution to a vexing personal problem, and the Governor seems to have felt more peace of mind since he achieved it.

Two tough appointments still face the Governor as this column is being written — one to the Corporation Commission and one, which will be made to seem the choice of a committee, to the executive director's post at the Human Rights Commission.

How tough that Corporation Commission one is made clear by consideration being given to shift Larry Ingram from his present post as head of Human Services to the Commissioner's post. All that leads to is another problem. Who's going to head Human Services?

As for Human Rights, if former Santa Fe county manager Carlos Martinez gets the job, look for a storm from those who will consider this just another political appointment.

Recent actions have not cured the unrest inside that highly volatile department.

A QUESTION OF LAW

Quite aside from the problem of what now should be done to free the hostages, consider how it might have been. Suppose violations of international law and custom were dealt with as other violations are, that is, by the use of enforcement powers. Out of the question, given the nations' paranoia about any breach of national sovereignty. Still, it is an interesting idea. Think of a situation in which some band of outlaws seized hostages and held them, in defiance of authority, to insure that certain demands would be met. Something of the sort happens every now and again. How are such challenges to authority handled? A shootout is no longer the usual pattern. Instead, a specially trained squad

is brought in to handle the affair with psychological finesse. As often as not, the outlaws give up and the hostages are freed without bloodshed.

There is no exact parallel with the hostage impasse in Tehran, yet there are similar elements in the two cases. Iran has flagrantly violated law and custom. That makes Iran a renegade nation, an outlaw.

Were international law as good as the law of any civilized nation, the problem could have been ended long ago. An international enforcement body would have entered the picture, giving the renegade nation a way out but at the same time making it clear that meanwhile the pressure would be kept on.

Bearing in mind the police-and-hostage situation described above, the odds are that it would have worked, assuming, of course, a multi-national commitment to effectively discipline outlaw nations. The trouble is, no such commitment exists. Nor will it be reached until, taking another step in the long progression toward a decent world order, mankind drops the outmoded notion that national sovereignty must be absolute under all circumstances. — Alamogordo Daily News

BIBLE SEXIST?

Just about everything these days is said to be sexist.

If it touches on the traditionally male role in family or society. The latest target is the Bible, and the National Council of Churches, which has backed some highly controversial efforts in recent decades, has entered the scene. Roman Catholic and Jewish leaders have been more cautious.

The National Council has launched a campaign to alter the wording of the Bible, so that many of the references to God as He will be eliminated. The National Council, of course, has earned the image in recent years of a social reform body. Well-intended, high-minded, it has nevertheless become controversial by what many believe is codifying terrorists and terrorism, what some feel is an overly-permissive view on abnormal sexual patterns, and what's seen as a failure to perceive fully the dangers posed today by aggressor nations.

One suspects that most Americans, including most women (better church goers than men) prefer to leave the Bible as it is. Down deep, the masculine image of strength and protection is especially appealing to most females, and any tampering with descriptions of God in the Bible is opening a can of worms.

Many leading scholars and theologians have long believed Old Testament's handed-down stories contain myth as well as fact, but accepting this, something which to many, can be scientifically proven, is different from altering the image of God in the New Testament. — Santa Rosa News

GOLD CLAUSE RETURNING?

Probably you've read about or perhaps already encountered the new flexible rate mortgages. They're coming.

In this age of virulent inflation, lending institutions have become loathe to put out money at fixed rates of interest for long periods of time. As a result, we are hearing a lot these days about renegotiable-rate mortgages, variable-rate mortgages, graduated payment mortgages, and the newest device to make the borrower flinch — shared appreciation mortgages. In the latter case the lender gets a piece of the action when the value of the house goes up.

None of this may be news to you, but we think that the next step may be. We hadn't heard of it, and perhaps you haven't either. The Foundation for Economic Education reports that we should watch out for the return of the gold clause.

The gold clause, it turns out, was around for a long, long time — maybe as far back as the Middle Ages — which only goes to prove that the problem of untrustworthy money is not a new one.

The gold clause was used widely in U. S. legal instruments from the founding of the Republic until the nation was kicked off the gold standard by the New Deal administration in the 1930's. A U. S. Supreme Court decision in 1935 ruled that, since gold was no longer legal tender and, in fact, its ownership in the form of currency was prohibited, contracts could no longer require its use in settlement.

In actual practice, not much gold was changing hands in 1935. But the gold clause made sure that settlements were made at

a parity related to an established norm. This obviated the "funny money" that governments were then — and still are — in a habit of turning out. Settlements were in the currency of the day, but the amounts were tied to that currency's worth as expressed in the value of gold.

As we say, the gold clause has been out since 1935 but suddenly this device has obtained a new relevance. In 1974 it became legal once again to own gold, and the "relegalization" of gold clauses was established in the courts in 1977.

This has paved the way for a renewal of the gold clause in long-term contracts, and we can expect to be hearing more about it unless Ronnie Reagan really does something miraculous with our money mess in the next four years.

Your correspondent is not a gold bug. He doesn't own a single ounce, except what's in the upper row of his back molars. Also, from a personal standpoint he is more interested in the consumer view of the borrower-lender equation as he has frequent experience with mortgages and bank loans.

But, realistically, we see the real problem in a money market that is made unstable by the ravages of inflation. It's nice to be on the winning side of the deal when inflation is working for you as a borrower, but in the long run, this condition can only dry up the source of lendable capital, so what's the point in enjoying a temporary advantage?

Gold clauses may be part of the answer, so learn to count in troy ounces and get ready for the next result of inflation. — Hop Graham, Lovington Daily Leader







CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: Sexy 'Hot Lips' Houlihan may have tied the knot on TV's 'M*A*S*H,' but in real life, actress **Loretta Swit** vows she'll never say 'I do' to any man. The vivacious 37-year-old star is fiercely independent, and feels marriage would kill her footloose spirit. 





Clean chimney helps prevent chimney fires

With more fireplaces in use because of soaring fuel costs, chimney fires are becoming more common, said Charles Hohn, Extension specialist for New Mexico State University.

Chimney fires start when soot on the chimney wall burns. "Once ignited, soot burns like charcoal," Hohn said. "The easiest way to prevent chimney fires is to stop burning soot-producing materials in the fireplace, and to remove any soot already on the chimney walls."

Soot problems develop when homeowners burn plastic coated cartons, quick-starter resins, leaves, plywood or gift wrapping.

The top soot producer, however, is green wood. It burns with a slow, smoldering fire which releases running sap. This sap causes a glaze to form on the flue.

Green wood is heavier than dry wood. If you split a green log, the exposed wood will feel wet. It's best to gather your wood at least six months before the heating season begins. Remember to store the wood in a shed, or in a covered stack so it can dry out.

"Check your chimney for soot buildup. Because of their rough surfaces, brick and stone fireplaces will almost always have a buildup problem. However, smooth tile liners are not immune," Hohn said.

To inspect the chimney, open the damper as wide as possible and look up the chimney. You may need a mirror to help you see. Soot accumulations will usually be heaviest at the lower end of the chimney. You should also use a flashlight from the roof and look down the chimney.

"If your chimney has a buildup problem, clean it before you build any more fires. You can either do the job yourself or hire a professional chimney sweeper," Hohn said.

Professionals use a varied assortment of brushes and scrapers, and high powered vacuums to remove the soot. Do-it-yourselfers can buy simpler versions of the professional equipment at most hardware stores, but it's wise to remember chimney sweeping is a dirty job at best.

Drop cloths in front of the fireplace, extending several feet all directions, are essential to protect the carpet. The standard home vacuum sweeper should not be used to pick up dislodged soot. The heavy duty shop vacuum is best for this chore, and is easily rented for this once-a-year job.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: Sexy 'Hot Lips' Houlihan may have tied the knot on TV's 'M*A*S*H,' but in real life, actress **Loretta Swit** vows she'll never say 'I do' to any man. The vivacious 37-year-old star is fiercely independent, and feels marriage would kill her footloose spirit. "I simply wouldn't be able to find the time to spend with my husband and children," she revealed. "I am away working so much, it would not be fair for them to be left alone." Loretta Swit says she adores kids but she's petrified at the thought of having any of her own. "I love kids as long as they're someone else's," she said. "I decided years ago that I never want to have children." But the star of TV's number one comedy show kept her decision secret until recently. She was afraid people would try to change her mind by telling her she'd end up a lonely old maid. "It used to be that women who said 'No' to wedding bells were thought to be crazy," she said. "Fortunately, times and attitudes change. People are more understanding these days."

TV BACKSTAGE: How did a skinny radio announcer and comedy writer from Corning, Iowa, become the most popular and richest entertainer in television history? **Johnny Carson** has held the nation's attention into the early morning hours with his particular brand of humor and easy going chit chat for 18 years. He recently signed a \$50 million contract with NBC that includes a four day week and 15 weeks of vacation. And the network can afford to pay the man NBC President **Fred Silverman** calls the "greatest entertainer of our time." "The Tonight Show" earns NBC \$90 million a year in advertising revenues, that's 17 percent of its profits. What is Johnny Carson's formula for success? Carson has revealed it many times in the past in his own words. The show is always lively and funny. "The Tonight Show" is different from other talk shows because it is comedy oriented. The premise is to entertain, not to educate, according to Carson. "We do more for humor than the straight interview thing," Carson said. "We occasionally touch serious subjects too. But the comedy sketches and the monologue set the tone."

TV CLOSEUP: Is Hollywood big enough for both **Suzanne Somers** and **Joyce DeWitt**? The dazzling duo are the stars who work together on the smash show 'Three's Company.' But rumors of fireworks between the two are rattling Tinseltown these days. Joyce plays the more stable Janet, who sets off Suzanne's bubbly, bouncy Chrissy on the top rated ABC show. **John Ritter** plays their roommate. But the differences don't stop when the show is over. "It's fair to say we're different people. Suzanne started in modeling and I'm a dramatic actress," said Joyce diplomatically. "I could easily have played Suzanne's part. But I've kept artistic approval. What I'm trying to use in my whole career is good taste and selectivity. It's a different thing with Suzanne. She knows there is a new blonde in town every year."

Andrea Ross, regularly a wardrobe assistant for 'Search For Tomorrow,' is a woman with many sidelines. Evenings, she can often be found in New York City's theater district, where she has worked as a dresser for stars of Broadway shows as 'The Wiz' and 'They're Playing Our Song.' She's also been writing stories since she was a child, and has just published her first book for children, *Chester, the Little Black Earth Ant*.
