Proposed well for snowmaking receiving widespread support

A proposal to increase snowmaking capacity at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort (SBSR) unveiled Wednesday night by Forest Service and area officials, met with unanimous support around the village.

Paul Gordon, district ranger for Smokey Bear Ranger District, said the Mescalero Apache Tribe, lease holders for SBSR, "wish to drill a well above the main lodge at the area to provide water to make snow."

The well would be drilled on an unclassified sub-surface water basin; so no water rights are needed, Gordon said. Area manager Roy Parker said he expects the well to be 200 feet deep and "we hope to pump 400 gallons per minute." Parker said a storage pit would be located in a nearby side canyon.

Parker said projections are to produce enough snow to cover 23 acres of the mountain with a foot of snow. "Man made snow is six to seven times as dense as natural snow, but for skiing purposes, it works fine," he said.

He added that to make a cubic foot of snow requires 2.7 gallons of water.

Lifts which would operate early would include:

- Chair Number Three, main slope.
- Chair Number Three, "Easy Street."
- Chair Number Five, main slope.
- Captain, west side.
- Deep Freeze Canyon trail (from the top terminal of the Captain chair).

The area currently operates three snow-making machines and will replace two of those with new machines this year. By next fall, Parker said, the area will have 15 new machines to produce snow and will be capable of offering skiing for beginner, novice, intermediate and expert skiers, beginning October 15.

"We will cover all levels of skiers with this equipment and we'll be able to accommodate 2,500 skiers per day," Parker said.

Gordon was unsure if new water would be brought into circulation. He said the water could be "showing up as surface water downstream," but if that was the

case, it would be replaced later anyway, with spring runoff from the mountain.

He added that water loss to sublimation would be less than water loss to evaporation. Gordon said sublimation is when water goes directly from a solid state to a gaseous state. "This is the only water loss we think would occur, but we feel it would be negligible," Gordon said.

Gordon and Parker said the well would not be used unless no snow was available, and then it would be used for only a short period of time. Parker said the well would be in use in early fall to allow the area to open earlier in the year, and when Mother Nature cooperated to provide ample natural snow, the well would not be in use.

He added that 18.4 acre feet of water would be used in the worst years. Gordon said that in the last 18 years, "that much water would have been used only twice."

Parker said the quality of the water will be tested, a factor village officials plan to watch closely, since the village will soon drill wells on Eagle Creek.

Village trustee George White attended the meeting and said "I would be most in favor of having this well drilled. I pledge my full support, both as a trustee and as chairman of the Eagle Creek Water Users Association."

White told The News Thursday that "it's a wonderful proposal because one of the things a ski resort cannot depend on is Mother Nature." White said the well water content "will give us an insight into what the water supply for our wells will be like."

White said that "any way you can add to the economy of the community, for sure, like man made snow, is a good idea." White said that because preliminary studies indicate the watershed will not be affected "it makes it an even better proposal."

Village administrator Jim Hine said the move was a good one. "I would have to give the area high marks for getting into this venture, especially as it applies to skiing. This is a way to supplement ideal weather conditions," Hine said.

Because the area can open sooner, officials estimate that business will receive a shot in the arm. "Naturally, municipal sales tax bears a direct relationship to the

influx of people. When business is good, whether it's ski shops or any type of business, our (village) income is increased," Hine said.

Sheila Harris, president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said the proposal "has tremendous potential because it takes something that always in the past, was unpredictable, and puts it into something we can plan for, something we can advertise."

"Obviously it isn't a substitute but it means we aren't totally at the mercy of the elements," Harris said.

Harris expects the Chamber's advertising of the ski season will be altered somewhat, "but we don't want to oversell what we have here. Since we'll be covering a longer period of time (with advertising), it will probably be changed."

Harris said no apparent drawbacks exist "as long as we are very careful about how we advertise it. We have to make sure skiers aren't misled by our advertising."

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth echoed most other endorsements of the plan. "For Sierra Blanca to continue its position as one of the top ski areas in the Southwest, what Roy (Parker) has done will give us an edge in the skiing industry."

Jungbluth said the snowmaking equipment will also "enhance the ski school capabilities by getting people off the beginner chairs sooner and onto the intermediate runs: it could ensure fresh snow all the time, also."

The ability to open early, Jungbluth said, "will give the area an edge, in that most other ski areas in the Southwest do not open that early, and we'll be able to get those skiers up here a lot earlier."

Jungbluth also believes advertising tone will change for the 1981-82 ski season. "The advertising committee would have to take a look at it, but before the horse racing season is over, I would anticipate some preliminary advertising," Jungbluth said.

He said Ruidoso/SBSR would "actually be setting a precedent in ski advertising that has never before been done."

Jungbluth said ski season inquiries begin arriving at the Chamber in mid-July and August. "If we have ski brochures ready we could begin sending out ski in-

formation by late summer."

SKI PACKAGES will probably be developed, Jungbluth said, with emphasis on selling quality and promoting such early skiing. "Possibly a gimmick-type of advertising is what will be developed - promoting that, yes folks, there is a place where you can ski in mid-October."

Harris said the Chamber will continue to arrange a meeting with MAT tribal president Wendell Chino, the New Mexico Highway Department, village trustees and Chamber members, to discuss realignment of the route to the ski area.

"We are trying everything now to do exactly that, and we will continue to do what we can to get a new road developed," Harris said.

Others attending the meeting also pledged support. Mike Radziewicz, a local lodging establishment owner, said "lodgers in the village will be very happy," Morgan Clough, a ski shop owner, also attended the meeting, as well as several employees of SBSR.

"I think we'd be lying to you if we said we didn't think this would be useful to the community," Gordon said. "There are many pluses and few minuses to this proposal."

Gordon said forest officials will "prepare a short environmental analysis that will reflect the tone of this meeting tonight." Drilling is expected to begin within one month, Parker said, if the analysis is positive and equipment can be in place by then.

Chamber board noon meeting Wednesday

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors will meet Wednesday at noon at the Chamber office. Agenda items will include appointment of the H'n'zhu'ne Award Committee, nominating committee report, scheduling of the annual board retreat, a report from the cultural committee and discussion of a spring clean-up campaign.

ComFIRE plans underway for coming season

The Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE) will soon begin contacting cooperators to prepare for the fire season and the possibility of a Red Flag Fire Alert.

Steve Makowski, fire prevention officer at Smokey Bear Ranger District, Lincoln National Forest, said Thursday that because moisture content in some grasses is low for this time of year, a fire alert could be called earlier than usual.

"The first season could start much sooner this year, and could be much more severe. Luckily, we haven't had winds so far this year," Makowski said.

ComFIRE members also voted Thursday to arrange a meeting with village officials to finish writing a job description

for the Fire Prevention Officer ComFIRE has recommended the village hire.

ComFIRE plans an education program to make the public more aware of impending fire danger. "We need to get people thinking about fire prevention now, before the fire season arrives," ComFIRE chairman Herb Brunell, said.

The committee also: - Accepted John and Gary Ennis as new members of ComFIRE, and listened to their plans to open a shop offering fire extinguishers for sale in Ruidoso.

- Agreed to ask the Volunteer Fire Department to select a representative to become a permanent member of ComFIRE.

Schwarz dismissed from EMS position

Ross Schwarz, head of Ruidoso's Emergency Medical Services, was dismissed from that position on December 31, effective January 14. Schwarz submitted a resignation to village manager Jim Hine on January 13, but is appealing the dismissal.

A meeting of the newly-formed village Personnel Board confirmed Hine's

decision to terminate Schwarz on January 12. No reason was given for the dismissal.

At the January 13 meeting of the village trustees, Schwarz requested a closed meeting to discuss the matter, and to request an appeal.

According to Hine, the trustees have "taken the matter under consideration" and said they "would advise him of their decision."

Schwarz said Friday he has not "met officially with the city council concerning it," but expects such a meeting to take place sometime this week.

The personnel board consists of local citizens Jerry Bigham, Jim Carpenter, Marilyn Bloodworth and Cece Sudderth.

Ski Report

Sierra Blanca: The resort received 16 inches of new snow over the weekend, bringing the undisturbed depth midway up the mountain to 19 inches. Conditions are rated excellent on the lower slopes, but only fair on the upper slopes. Chairlifts One, Two, Three, Five and the Gondola are operating.

Eagle Creek: Base averages 17 to 22 inches, with five inches of new snow recorded over the weekend. Conditions are excellent, but only four slopes are open and operating.

Cultural Committee seeks historic status for Carrizo Lodge

The cultural committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is progressing with plans to obtain historical building status for Carrizo Lodge.

At a meeting Friday, the group was advised that an application for the designation has been prepared, and will be submitted this week to state officials.

The application is aimed at discovering whether any state monies would be available for renovation and preservation of the building as a historical site. The committee is also investigating the possibility of incorporating the lodge into a plan to obtain a civic and convention center for Ruidoso.

But even if another site is found for the center, committee member Donna Willard said, "I'm really excited about it just from the standpoint of having it preserved."

The lodge, she added, "is one of the oldest if not the oldest building here that has had an exciting and glamorous history."

The committee also heard a presentation from Ruidoso High School Principal Tom Hansen, regarding the expected growth of the schools and the need for expansion of facilities.

He asked the committee for support in promotion of the proposed two mill levy and a future bond issue, which will bring the district to its bonding capacity.

Once that bonding capacity is reached, the district would be eligible to receive additional funds from the state for capital outlay.

Hansen said he felt the schools needed an "extra four to five million above our bonding capacity," to provide for both classrooms and additional facilities, including a new high school with performing arts auditorium.

He also called upon committee members to discuss the district's need with state legislators, who might be able to "sweeten" the state funds, which are channeled through the state Board of Education.

Discount rabies shots clinics set Saturday

Reduced-fee rabies vaccination clinics will be held in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs January 24, under the cooperative sponsorship of Lincoln County veterinarians and the Health and Environment Department.

County health nurse Hazel English said clinics will be held in the following locations. A fee of \$4 will be charged for each rabies vaccination:

- Tennis court fire station, 1-3:30 p.m., Dr. Donna Harper.
- Ruidoso Downs fire station, 3:15-4:15 p.m., Dr. Willard.

English said that state laws require rabies vaccinations be given to all dogs and cats over three months old. Distemper and parvo vaccinations will be available upon request, she added.

All dogs and cats must be on a leash, and adults, no children, should bring pets to the clinics.

Lites joins staff at Sac Peak observatory

Dr. Bruce W. Lites has joined the staff of Sacramento Peak Observatory as an Associate Astronomer. Dr. Lites received his B.S. from the University of New Mexico in 1967, and his M.S. and Ph.D. from the University of Colorado, the latter in 1972.

He has had a varied research career, most recently serving as a Special Project Scientist at the High Altitude Observatory of the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colorado. Previous to that he was a post-doctoral research assistant at the Observatory of Geneva in Switzerland, and worked several years as a research associate in the Laboratory for Atmospheric and Space Physics of the University of Colorado, where he was a co-investigator on the Orbiting Solar Observatory (OSO-8) and a lecturer in the Department of Astrophysics.

Dr. Lites is interested in a variety of research topics in solar astronomy, and will make extensive use of the observing facilities at Sac Peak Observatory, which is operated by the Association of Universities for Research in Astronomy under contract with the National Science Foundation.

He is working on problems of the causes of heating of the sun's chromosphere and corona (the high-temperature layers outside the sun's visible surface), and on the energy balance in active regions including sunspots and flares. Dr. Lites makes use of a combination of observational and theoretical techniques to infer the physical structure (temperature, pressure, etc.), velocity fields, and magnetic fields in a wide variety of structures observed on the solar surface, and brings additional expertise in these areas to the observatory.

New Mexicans to attend inauguration

New Mexico will be well represented during the inauguration ceremonies and festivities in our nation's capitol.

More than 300 New Mexicans will be on hand when President-elect Ronald Reagan is sworn in as the nation's 40th President on January 20, according to U. S. Sen. Pete Domenici.

Representatives from all over the state are scheduled to be in attendance, representing a wide range of backgrounds, opinions, and party affiliations. Approximately 230 of them will be coming to Washington on a special charter flight which will be arriving on Saturday, January 17, while the rest will be making their own arrangements for transportation.

Some 50 of the charter flight members are young people, led by such notables as Theresa Anderson, Miss New Mexico for 1980. Seven high schools in the state will also be sending a representative to the inauguration. These include Roswell and Goddard High Schools, Texico, Lovington, Logan, Tucumcari, and Las Cruces High Schools.

Republican leaders in New Mexico will make up a large part of the charter. They

will be led by Frank Bird, state chairman for the Bush campaign in New Mexico.

Native Americans will also be well represented at the inauguration, with the largest group, 20 in all, coming from the All Indian Pueblo Council, led by chairman Del Lovato. Chairman Peter McDonald will be among the ten representatives from the Navajo Nation and Chairman Leonard Atole will be among six members of the Jicarilla Apache Tribe scheduled to attend.

Receptions will also make up a major portion of the festivities. Two are open to all New Mexicans in the Washington area. The first is being sponsored by the New Mexico State Society and will be held Saturday, January 17, at 8 P.M., in the Cannon House Office Building. A live Mariachi band is expected to be on hand to perform. The second is being sponsored by the New Mexico Congressional Delegation, Senators Pete Domenici and Harrison Schmitt, and Congressmen Manuel Lujan and Joe Skeen, and will be held on Monday, January 19.

But the icing on the cake for the visiting New Mexicans will be the inauguration

day activities. Starting first with coffee in the office of the New Mexico Senator or Congressman of their choice at 9:00 a.m., New Mexicans will then head over to the West Front of the Capitol for the swearing-in ceremonies which are scheduled to get underway at 11:30 a.m. A parade will follow the ceremony and at 5:15 p.m., there will be an inaugural day fireworks salute in front of the Lincoln Memorial. Rounding out the day's activities are a number of inaugural balls scheduled to be held at various locations throughout Washington.

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
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

Father Delbert Achuff retiring from ministry

The Reverend Dr. Delbert Achuff, rector at the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount, retired this week, after 34 years of active service in the parochial ministry. Achuff said Friday he feels the church is "at a crossroads in growth, and I feel they need some long term leadership I won't be able to give." Achuff said the church will need to consider expansion of buildings and said "new leadership will be more apt

to accept these challenges if he can be part of the process, than to come into it after the process has begun." Achuff will remain in Ruidoso with his wife Louise, and serve as vicar of Saint Matthias Episcopal Church in Carrizozo and the Preaching Station in Lincoln. "This will also be of help to the new leadership here; it will lighten their work load considerably," he said.

Achuff's last Mass at the Ruidoso pulpit will be February 22. Achuff also ministers to Saint Anne's Chapel in the Hondo Valley.

Achuff entered the ministry in 1952, when he became ordained in the Congregational Church. He became a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1963 and served parishes in New York, Washington, D. C., Montana and California before moving to Ruidoso in 1976.

Achuff holds an undergraduate degree from Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa, and studied at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina. He holds a Bachelor of Divinity and Master of Arts degrees from the University of Chicago, where he studied ethics in society.

Achuff's doctor of Ministry degree is from San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, California.

Achuff will be employed as an account executive for Management Recruiters in Ruidoso following his retirement.

"We broke their press pretty easy," he said, "but then we couldn't hit our shots. I remember one time there where Ryan missed eight field goals in a row."

Poor shooting has been a season long problem for the 9-4 Warriors. Ruidoso has been hitting anywhere from 30 to 40 percent of their shots from the field, and Nelson feels 50 percent is the bare minimum for consistent success.

One area that has improved, however, is free throw shooting. Thomason, for example, went 13 for 13 at the charity stripe against the Tigers.

Thomason drew quite a lot of praise from the Warrior mentor.

"Rodney is getting stronger with every game," he said. "He played a good game against T or C."

"Everyone else is starting to play up to their potential. We're starting to come on strong now."

After Thomason and Ryan, Gary Jones

was the next high scorer with six, followed by Bill Richardson with four, Wade Wilson with three and Scott Neal and Gene Reeves had one point each.

"I was pretty well pleased with the game and the way we've been doing," Nelson said. "Things are going about the way I wanted them to."

It had been a full week since the Warriors last played, and they spent their time practicing. It was time well spent, Nelson said.

"It really helped us a lot," he said. "We can spend a whole week without the pressure of a game. We can put in one

whole day on offense, one whole day of defense. We don't have to hurry."

Not that there's anything that new to learn.

"Shoot, we pretty much know everything we can do," Nelson said. "We've pretty well got it down. Now it's just a matter of refining it, and trying to find the best combination of players."

Nelson has been plagued with a lack of bench strength and he wants to start using what bench he has.

"We have a week until our next game," he said. "We'll be experimenting with different combinations of players, looking

for the best group of players.

"I'd like to use Wilson and (Matt) Roberts more, especially Matt. He's got such a great attitude, but the way the games have been going, I just haven't been able to play him as much as I want to."

Nelson is generally satisfied with his squad.

"The only gripe I have is the way we've been shooting," he said. "But that's really it. The only thing I'm going to do is shift personnel around, looking for the best five. Everything else looks good."

And with district coming up, it'll have to.

The Warriors stand 2-0 in district play after the win over T or C. The other victory came at Silver City's expense.

That's who the Warriors face next, by the way, in a Homecoming game here January 31. Ruidoso beat the Colts 55-39 in their first encounter.

"We'll spend this next week getting ready for them," he said. "We're not going to work too hard, because I don't want them to peak too soon."

"We've got to be ready when the time comes. I imagine Silver City will be ready for us."

Ames had praise for several of his wrestlers, even though they didn't place.


"David Swalander is coming along well, and he's going to start winning some matches soon," he said. "Billy Baldonado is doing well, especially for his first time out."

Adult admission is \$3.50 per person, with children under 12 admitted for \$1.50. Desserts will be available for a separate donation, with a minimum donation of 50 cents.

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

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — New Mexico, the humble state.

Here we are, all smiles, because the Census Bureau told us we are likely to get a new seat in Congress.

Oh, joy! We have been good children, and our parents in Washington are going to reward us!

But how much did New Mexico actually grow between 1970 and 1980?

A damn sight more than the Census Bureau said.

Just take Alamogordo.

Did you happen to see those figures developed by Ruthie Ford, staff writer for the Alamogordo News?

Here's what she found:

—The Census Bureau figures for Otero county show a growth of 4.3 percent for Alamogordo during the last decade.

Contrasted with that, local records prove that during that same period (1970-1980):

—building permits rose 172.11 percent;

—the number of water meters in the city rose 33.73 percent;

—total gas meters in operation rose 23.4 percent;

—number of telephone connections rose 42.79 percent; and

—postal receipts went up by 79.67 percent.

Do the increases in all those latter figures sound like they would have been generated by only 4.3 percent more people?

Okay, so during all this time we had rampant inflation. Would that account for 42 percent more dollar volume in building during the last year than in the first? Would almost nine times as many water meters, five times as many gas meters and almost ten times as many telephones

be necessary in a city which grew only 4.3 percent? Would the cost of mailing things have increased more than 18 times as fast as the population?

This writer isn't a mathematical genius, but he would personally attest, after staring at those figures for a long time, that they do not seem to be the likely product of such a modest increase as the Census Bureau is willing to attribute to Otero county.

And if they're equally wrong for the rest of us . . . ?

Alamogordo is one town in one of 32 counties in New Mexico.

If things are so distorted there, to what extent are the totals for the state asked?

How neat to see the news photos of that counter in the lobby of the Department of Commerce which constantly updates the putative total number of citizens of the United States.

If Commerce is as far off in all other towns as it appears to be in one humble county of one humble county of this humble state, those numbers in Washington are not fact; they are pure fiction.

Maybe by the time you read this there will have been some reports in the news on the success of that fund-raiser in Albuquerque Toney Anaya, candidate for governor, held as a way to start the year off right.

We haven't seen any figures on that event.

Being cynical, we naturally tend to suspect when nobody tells us anything on how many dollars were made that the number of dollars was not something the potential candidate wanted to brag about.

We'll eat these words if Toney assures us he cleaned up — and shows us the books to prove it.

ECONOMIC EXPLOITATION

This week's discouraging but hardly surprising tidbit of news on the economic front is that dozens of credit card companies and retail stores took advantage of last year's credit crunch to boost their own profits at the direct expense of millions of their customers. It's getting to be the way the game is played — to seek in every case of general distress an opportunity for self-enrichment.

Specifically, what the credit companies did was to pounce on the Federal Reserve Board's temporary anti-inflation measures last spring, and squeeze them until an estimated 88 million Americans bled. Not content with increasing minimum monthly payments by as much as 150 percent, not satisfied with increasing interest rates by as much as one-third, the credit companies soared to new creative heights to gouge their customers, according to a just-released congressional report.

"Although it was unnecessary, unethical and perhaps a breach of contract, 88 percent of the creditors who could do so chose to apply drastic new credit terms retroactively to their customers' past purchases," the report disclosed. And when the Federal Reserve's emergency program was phased out four months later, the credit companies hung tightly

onto all their costly new terms, which "will, over time, have a major impact on the lives of most Americans," the report concluded.

How familiar it all sounds. What the exploiters behind the credit card companies did was no different than what fellow manipulators have been doing in various other businesses.

When OPEC started raising the rates on its oil and tightening supplies, the big oil companies saw it as a golden opportunity. Hiding behind the fuel-shortage scare, Big Oil shot its own prices skyrocketing past any increase caused by the Arabs. It didn't matter that the price hikes caused hardship for people around the world — what mattered were the billions and billions of dollars in new profits for the oil companies.

When runaway malpractice insurance rates for doctors became a national concern a few years ago, the canny medical profession quickly saw the way to make a buck on the deal. While complaining loudly and bitterly about the "outrageous" cost of the insurance, and while apologizing profusely to their patients about the higher fees that the malpractice coverage would cause, the doctors proceeded to raise their rates far beyond the insurance increase. It was a classic example of the rich wasting no opportunity to get richer — at the expense of you-know-who.

When the fabulously wealthy Hunt family of Texas tried to corner the worldwide silver market last year, the price of products using silver in their composition doubled and tripled, along with the price of the metal itself. Then when the Hunts' scheme collapsed, the bottom fell out of the silver market in one of the most spectacular economic nosedives in history. But have the prices of photographic supplies, chemicals or other items also come back down, now that the silver used in them is cheap once again? Don't hold your breath.

The list of such abuses is long, but space grows short — and besides, that's just the way the game is played. Whenever an economic situation afflicts enough people, somebody will prove slick enough to get rich or richer from it. So the credit card companies are merely keeping in step with the times. But we can't help feeling that this the-hell-with-everybody-else-as-long-as-I-get-mine-guiding-principle is going to explode in big trouble for us all somewhere down the road. — Santa Fe Reporter

EARLY RETURNS

Congress is beginning to get legislative proposals to deal with the "early returns" problem that afflicts presidential elections in this era of instantaneous communication. That is good; Congress should tackle the matter. Little that is persuasive can be said for preserving the status quo.

The trouble springs from the above mentioned speed of communication, coupled with the time lag between the nation's eastern and western extremities. To reduce it to essentials, a substantial portion of the East Coast vote is counted and announced before voting ends on the West Coast.

A University of California-Berkeley political science professor has tried to pin down the effect of this in the last election. The professor, Raymond Wolfinger, notes that as early as 5:15 p.m., nearly three hours before the polls closed in California, NBC had projected Ronald Reagan as the winner. The impact was compounded when President Carter made his concession speech more than an hour before the cutoff of voting on the West Coast.

Extrapolating from 1972 presidential election data, Wolfinger estimates that some 200,000 Californians stayed away from the polls last November because of early network predictions. That might have been enough to change the outcome of tight non-presidential races.

Numerous remedies have been suggested. We reject those that would rely on keeping the networks silent for a prescribed time after East Coast polls close; they should not be hampered in their constitutionally protected task of reporting the news. There is more appeal in other ideas — for staggered voting hours so that closing time would be the same everywhere, for requiring officials to withhold voting results until all polls are closed, and so on. This is an appropriate time for Congress to weigh all the proposals offered and decide upon sensible reforms in the present system. — Alamogordo Daily News

All meetings of a quorum of members of any board, commission or other policy-making body of any state agency, or any agency or authority of any county, municipality, district or any political subdivision held for the purpose of . . . discussing public business . . . are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, . . . Any such meetings . . . shall be held only after reasonable notice to the public."

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Wanted: visual artists for in-school program

The New Mexico Arts Division has begun recruitment of active exhibiting professional visual artists and craftsmen to work in its popular Artists-in-Schools program in various parts of the state during the 1981-82 school year. The deadline for applications is March 19th.

There are openings for the full school year, for one semester, for special short-term residencies, and for brief guest artist assignments throughout the year.

The Artist-in-Schools is not a teacher, nor is any teaching certificate required for these positions. The artist works with the students and their teachers, and with parents and community groups, giving them an understanding of the artistic experience. During a long-term residency, the professional artist spends half the time working in the school and the community, and half the time on his or her own creative activities. For such a program, the compensation is \$1,200 per month.

Usually a studio in or near the school is provided for the artist, and here the students may watch the progress of the work, ask questions, and learn at first hand about the creative process.

The Artists-in-Schools visual arts program includes working professional painters, sculptors, photographers, potters, weavers, jewelers, furniture makers, and traditional folk artists.

Previous applicants are reminded that they must submit new applications in order to be considered for these positions. Interviews for finalists will be conducted by panels including representatives of the New Mexico Arts Division, the State Department of Education, professional artists in the relevant disciplines, and former resident artists.

For long-term residencies, final selection from the three to five highest-ranked applicants will be made by a committee representing the sponsoring school district. The professional artists for the short-term residencies will be selected by the NMAD staff with input from the school district.

Qualified professional visual artists and craftsmen may obtain further information and application forms from the New Mexico Arts Division, 113 Lincoln Ave., Santa Fe 87501. The Arts Division's telephone number is 827-2061.

White sales stock up time

If you need to replace sheets, pillowcases or towels, white sales offer many good bargains. It's a good practice to replace a pair of sheets and pillowcases now. Try to keep three pairs of sheets per bed - one on the bed, one in the wash and one on the shelf, says Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University.

Plan on four bath towels, hand towels and washcloths for each family member. Coordinate towels with color scheme and decor of your bathroom. Some designer towels make attractive wall hangings, and abstract contemporary designs are especially suited for this. Add washcloth pockets and hang by the tub to hold shampoo, brushes and other needs. Stitch

two large towels together for an after-bath cover-up garment.

Sheets can also be used in unusual ways, such as draperies, tablecloths, shower curtains, hostess gowns or caftans.

Household linens also work outdoors. For patio dinners and picnics use washcloths for napkins. Sew pockets into a sheet and make a wind-proof tablecloth by filling the pockets with stones. Price isn't always an indication of quality of sheets and towels, so shop different stores to compare prices.

Hold sheets and pillowcases up to the light to be sure the weave is even and firm. Rub the fabric between your fingers to be sure that it hasn't been overly starched.

Veterans can avoid education check delays

Students receiving Veterans Administration (VA) education payments can do several things to avoid delays in receiving their monthly checks, according to Joe Cordova, director, VA regional office, Albuquerque.

Veteran-students and eligible dependents in 50 states receive more than \$200 million in monthly payments from the VA, he said.

Cordova suggests veteran students should:

- Allow at least four weeks from the date the enrollment certificate was sent to the VA in order for a check to be mailed.

- Be sure the required written request was signed before an advance-payment check is received. The specific request for advance money should have been submitted to the VA at least a month before the beginning of the semester.

- Consider whether an overpayment is outstanding, if previous benefits have been received. If an overpayment exists, current benefits are withheld until the overpayment is recovered by the VA.

Since Luke was accused of raping Laura Webber Baldwin, 'General Hospital' has bubbled to the top of the soaps with an audience of around 7,000,000. It has also grabbed the most teenage viewers for any soap 1,850,000 as the nation is gripped by the fast developing romance between Luke and his not so-innocent victim, played by 18 year old **Genie Francis**.
