School election Tuesday

Ruidoso School District patrons will vote on a proposed two mill levy Tuesday, and elect two members to the Board of Education.

Polls, in the high school gymnasium, will be open from 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Registered voters, living within the school district, may vote.

Candidates for Position One on the board are incumbent Carlton L. (Bones) Wright, Ronald Gene Harris and Richard C. Hall. Donald L. Swalander is unopposed for Position Two.

The two mill levy would provide the school district with \$105,000 per year for three years, to make emergency improvements to all school facilities.

The mill levy, if passed, will add \$20 to a property owner's taxes for every \$10,000 of assessed valuation on the property.

How the money will be spent, if the mill levy passes, depends upon whether a bond issue the school district hopes to float later this year, also passes, according to board president Dave Parks.

Superintendent of Schools Pat Valliant said passage of the mill levy "is the first step in the procedure to obtain Capital Outlay money from the state." Valliant said the mill levy and a bond election must both pass before the district can seek additional revenue from the State Capital Outlay Committee (SCOC).

"If the mill levy doesn't pass, we won't be eligible for SCOC funds," Valliant said. He noted that SCOC funds do not have to be

repaid; but to qualify to receive this type of revenue, the school district must be bonded to capacity.

"We will be bonded to capacity only if we approve both the mill levy and bond issue," Valliant said.

Failure to pass the mill levy could drastically change the local school system as it exists now, Valliant said.

"If it should happen like that, we would not be in line for SCOC money, and that would seriously affect our building program — it would delay it another two years."

Valliant said the initial impact could come in the form of decreased services. "Most likely, within two to three years, we would be forced to go to split sessions — have a morning session for half the students, bus them home, and do the same in the afternoon."

"That is an unwieldy situation. That would affect all our programs, but more so at the high school than elsewhere," he said.

Valliant said class offerings would be reduced "which would shortchange the educational endeavors of our students."

He said an offshoot of this situation could be a much higher high school dropout rate. "It would increase dramatically," he said, as high school age students would be on the streets when they should be in school.

Extracurricular activities, such as athletic events, Divergent Education, band, choir and other extra travel, would be curtailed. Ball games would be played closer to home and Ruidoso probably would not compete in district contests.

County school vote tomorrow

In addition to the Ruidoso school board election and mill levy issue, school elections are scheduled Tuesday in Capitan, Corona and Carrizozo.

In Carrizozo, candidates for a six-year term, position one, include Victor L. Cisneros, Patrick N. Vigil, Jack A. Payne Jr., and Donald J. Wall.

In position two, Wallace H. Ferguson is unopposed for a six-year term.

In Capitan, four positions are to be filled by voters. In position one, a two-year term, candidates are Stan Cox, Jane G. Allred and Hollis O. Cummins.

Position two candidates, seeking a two year term, are James Kirby McDaniel and Claudio Montoya, the incumbent.

Seeking a six year term, position three, are Isidro Frank Peralta and Pat Lockhart Huey, incumbent.

A six year term, position four, is being sought by Mark Andrew Delgado and Curtis L. Payne, incumbent.

Hondo School District candidates for a six year term on the Board of Education are incumbent Jimmy McTeigue, Alfred McTeigue and Cal West.

Patsy James Mulkey and Ralph Mark Bell are unopposed for six year terms on the Corona school board.

Voters in the Carrizozo district will also vote on a \$215,000 bond issue and a two mill levy.

Carrizozo school superintendent Jim Miller said Friday the monies are especially needed for renovation of school buildings which were constructed in 1940 by the Works Progress Administration.

"The schools will be 41 years old this year, and some of the basic systems, like the plumbing, wiring, doors and locks, are in pretty bad shape, because they're all original equipment," Miller said.

An architect inspected the building last year, Miller added, and reported that the building was still "structurally sound." The school board then made the decision to renovate, rather than "start over" with a new building, if funding can be approved, he added.

The proposal calls for a total of \$215,000 in bonds to be sold in two portions in May 1981 and May 1982. The two mill levy would be collected over a three year period — 1982-1984.

"Even though we're essentially asking for an increase in taxes," Miller said, "we're optimistic that the state legislature will provide some property relief this year, so our increase would be offset by their decrease."

He added that the monies will be used to upgrade equipment and systems which are "critical to the safety and comfort of the children. That will be our major emphasis in spending the money."

If voters approve the issue and levy, a staggered construction schedule would begin as early as this summer, concentrating on the items most pressing in terms of safety.

The number one priority, Miller said, is the wiring, since the school has had some "near fires" in the recent past. The front offices at the school also would be remodeled soon, for security purposes, Miller added.

Other priority items would include replacement of all outside and inside doors and door frames, and the installation of a new lock system throughout the school.

As a conservation measure, all exterior windows would be replaced with smaller insulated windows. The school officials also plan to install a passive solar heating system at the high school, if funding is approved.

Whether you're a brand new beginner or a "aided once or twice novice," this is your year at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, according to area manager Roy Parker.

Although the upper expert trails are not open at present, Parker said Friday that skiing is excellent on the beginner and novice slopes.

As of Friday, the Lincoln Chair is operating at midway on the mountain, with fair conditions. However, Chair three for the novice slope and the beginner's Chair Five are open and "the restaurant is serving, the ski school is teaching and everyone is getting more personalized service from the employees," Parker said.

Although Mother Nature hasn't provided the mountain with a surfeit of natural snow this year, she has been kind enough to provide low temperatures which have allowed snowmaking nightly throughout most of the season, Parker said.

With the low temperatures continuing during the daylight hours, mountain manager Denny Grover added, the condition of the manmade snow, combined with the natural snow, has remained good.

"It hasn't been warm enough for the snow to melt during the daytime," Grover said, "so the snow doesn't get soggy or icy and slick."

The base on the lower slopes averages about "two feet," Parker said, with a buildup of three to four feet in some areas. And, "with any new natural snow, we'll be ready to reopen the upper slopes at any time."

Many of those visiting Sierra Blanca this year are taking advantage of the ski school, according to director Rick Vincent. As far as he's concerned, conditions for instruction "couldn't be better."

Those receiving ski lessons are "probably learning better than they would under normal conditions," Parker said. "They seem to be taking the time to learn more thoroughly, he said, rather than making a "rush to the top trails."

A distinct advantage to skiing at Sierra Blanca so far this year is the lack of long lift lines. "Waiting lines are virtually nil," Parker said. "And that goes for the restaurant, too."

"All the employees are trying to make

that extra effort to make everyone feel at home," Grover said.

Contributing to the excellent conditions on the beginner and novice slopes is a new Fanjet snowmaking machine. It's a new model — on the market for just 18 months, Grover said — made in Connecticut. The manufacturer has had about 20 years experience in snowmaking, he added, and the machine is the most cost-efficient model on the market.

By next season, the area will have 15 of the Fanjets operating, which will allow them to produce snow to cover the Capitan and Deep Freeze runs, even without the cooperation of Mother Nature.

Drilling of the well at the resort may begin within two to three weeks, Grover said. The plans for the well include a pond, from which water will be converted to man made snow. The well and pond will be located in the lower Spruce and Swamp areas, Grover added.

The ski area is currently serving 150 to 300 people per day, Parker said, despite the somewhat "negative attitude" regarding skiing at Sierra Blanca this year.

Parker also appealed to locals who have "not utilized the area before," to try out the beginner slopes now. "There are

people here happily skiing," he said, "and there could be more."

Ski Report

Sierra Blanca: The resort received three inches of new snow Saturday, and chairlifts two, three and five are open. Conditions vary from fair to excellent. Beginner and intermediate slopes are in excellent shape, but the upper mountain is not open.

Eagle Creek: Base averages 15 to 20 inches. The resort received one inch of new snow Saturday and has been making snow nightly. Two beginner and two intermediate slopes are open, and the conditions are rated good to excellent.

White Mountain schools need upgrading

Renovation of the White Mountain school complex is slated, if voters approve the two mill levy on the Ruidoso School District ballot in Tuesday's election.

The levy, which would provide \$305,000 over a three year period, would permit some remodeling at White Mountain Elementary and Middle Schools, including the gymnasium/band room. The levy would also fund repairs and remodeling at Nob Hill School and the high school.

Repairs required at White Mountain, where all buildings are less than ten years old, are due to normal wear and tear, or "architectural problems," according to principals Sid Miller and Mike Gladden.

White Mountain Middle School (WMMS) is showing signs of settling in some rooms. The roof needs repairs, and is cited by Miller as the "top priority." However, he added that "Nob Hill Elementary, White Mountain Elementary (WMES), the football stadium, the high school, and then the middle school, are where the priorities are."

Miller said that because WMMS is the newest building in the district, it "is not bad at this point." Miller said growth beyond the present level of 380 students, will cause problems, as the building was designed to hold 350 students.

"The growth is what scares me," Miller said. "But because it's so new, the middle school should not need many repairs."

Both Miller and WMES principal Mike Gladden said the gymnasium at the complex needs some attention. The gym parking lot is not paved, so mud is tracked in during the school year. The roof at the gym also needs repairs, Gladden said.

Gladden said that while the elementary school is also fairly new, some extreme overcrowding problems exist.

Perhaps the most obvious problem is in classrooms, Gladden said. "This year, the teachers' workroom was taken for a third grade classroom. The Title I reading room was originally designated for storage ... two resource room programs are presently housed in one classroom," he said.

Gladden said no letup is in sight and "there is a real possibility that we will add an additional fourth grade class next year."

Another apparent overcrowding problem exists in the White Mountain cafeteria, serving both schools. Designed to accommodate 300 students, it currently handles 550 people daily for lunch. "With the obviously inadequate cold and dry storage, we are required to truck goods in daily," Gladden said.

Restrooms and drinking fountain facilities are inadequate, Gladden said. One boys' and one girls' restroom is housed in each of the buildings. Two drinking fountains designed to serve 150 students each, are used by twice that number, Gladden said.

When the schools were built, plans were to have both WMES and WMMS served by the gymnasium. "That plan is not realistic at this time; with the mid-school enrollment of 360 and our enrollment of 335, there isn't enough room," Gladden said.

More importance is now placed on fitness and other activities which used to be considered "luxuries" in a school system. "These programs should be an integral part of the elementary program," Gladden said.

As in other school buildings, storage of extra books and supplies "is rat holed everywhere," Gladden said, because storage areas have long since been given up for classrooms. "Without paper storage areas, schools begin to look unkempt," Gladden said.

Gladden said another need is for more little rooms to accommodate small group activities, such as reading, math, spelling, counseling, speech, physical therapy and testing.

"Our office is being used this year to provide a small and inadequate teacher lounge/workroom," Gladden said. A nurse's room was no longer available, so a corner of the cafeteria was partitioned off for that purpose, Gladden said.

And finally, the school's elaborate heating system does not work properly. Gladden said that problem has been ongoing for several years and may never be corrected, but "we have so many other needs, it might have to wait."



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
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

SANTA FE - Sometimes you'd think Ma Bell was "in her doties," as Clyde Tingley used to say.

He means "dotage," of course, which implies getting along just a little bit into senility.

Why else would a giant utility choose just this time to propose a \$48.3 million increase in its rates?

Here we are, with the Legislature in town, full as usual with wild-eyed members looking for a handwagon to jump onto, and what you might think would be the smart money plays right into their hands.

Example: The press release put out by bright young freshman Senator John Budagher which correctly says he is "lashing out" at Mountain Bell.

He sure is. He accuses it of usurping the Legislature's taxing power. He wants Mountain Bell to have to come to the Legislature for clearance to be given any rate rise over 20 percent.

And because of Mountain Bell's dumb move, he'll now get a hearing.

Budagher's release also makes the point that a person could place 75 calls a month from pay phones for what the utility would like to charge for in-home service.

And to whom will this thorny problem be referred? To the Corporation Commission, rate-setting body for intrastate operations, which Mountain Bell is.

The Commission has three members, two of whom are as green as grass. Jimmie Glenn was just elected in November, and Eric Serna was just appointed by the Governor.

Now they can look forward to analyzing

the 13 volumes of information Mountain Bell filed with the rate request as one of their up-coming duties.

As usual, the decision will turn on that most important and sometimes ambiguous phrase, "return on investment."

Mountain Bell claims they are now making 7.9 percent return on investment, and they'd like to make 11. Corporation Commission staffers say if this raise is given them, they'll be making something in the neighborhood of 17 percent.

If you're on a fixed income, with no annual increase in your "return on investment," you won't like that.

We'll bet Ma Bell will come out of all this sorry to have stirred up a hornet's nest.

They sound awfully like one of those giant firms which discusses nothing with their public relation advisors until after it's been done, and then tells them to get busy and put out the fires management itself has started.

At least one potential Congressional candidate from the north, Art Trujillo, mayor of Santa Fe, has the good sense not to come out for a districting system that will cut Albuquerque into little pieces.

Bob Mondragon has been drawing up his plan, which would trisect the Duke City, for many a moon, and he rushed right out to share it with everybody.

Governor King, who could have stood mute, also says he wants to subdivide Bernalillo County.

Now Trujillo, who held his peace on the topic till we asked him, has said he thinks such divisions should follow county lines.

Smart move. Mondragon and King made lots of enemies they don't need. By contrast, Trujillo might have gained some Albuquerque friendship.

When you plan to run for public office, you need friends everywhere.

EFFECTS OF STRESS

Up tight about your job or business? Dr. Debora Phillips, who ministers to practitioners of the world's highest pressure vocations on Madison Avenue, has today's lecture on coping:

Stress is so prevalent you can even find people who'll say it's good for you. Oh, they'll grant you that stress causes high blood pressure, early heart attacks, gastroenteritis, backaches, suicide and, of course, ulcers. But, they say, stress makes people perform. No gain without pain, suffer to achieve.

But no. Stress doesn't just corrupt your health. It interferes with your mind - inhibiting concentration, draining energy, blocking your imagination. Stress is an epidemic that kills ideas even faster than it kills people.

If you moved to a beach in Bali, or a Rocky Mountain pond, you might well discover that stress is caused by boredom as well as by the pressures of budgets and deadlines.

In fact, stress has so many causes, from the frustration of working with incompetents to the fear of being bullied, that I expect you can't really escape from stress. But you can learn to deal with it. And deal with it you should. For, as you've no doubt already noticed, the '80s promise an increased dosage of stress.

Stress corrodes your self-confidence. Even if you're brilliantly successful, stress tends to make you feel as if you are a fraud. Stress raises the specter of being unable to cope, of being overwhelmed, of being left behind. People suffering from stress tend to hide from risk. That's not only impossible, but also dangerous in a business based on ideas.

How often have you seen a brand new idea stamped to death by some inexplicably enraged executive? Who would have thought that something so frail and ephemeral as a genuinely new idea could cause such panic?

The question of self-confidence (or "self-image" as we say in my field) is crucial to who you are, how you treat yourself, and how everybody else treats you. And, as in the case of the idea stomper, how you treat everybody else.

There's no shortage of books on improving your self image. It is a big subject. But what I'd like to do here is quickly add two new and simple ways that can help improve the angle of your own self vision. After all, most people do have an unrealistically negative self image. Which leaves them especially vulnerable to stress.

Accept praise. Don't discount a compliment when it comes. Chances are you really do deserve it. Even if you think you don't deserve praise, you may be wrong. At the very least, you're lucky.

So don't say it was nothing or that it was some old idea you found on a shelf. Say thank you. And, by all means, praise yourself. Make a point of it in those interior conversations with yourself. Notice when you do something well or right, however large or small.

Grade yourself. Not on how much you've impressed a client or some other "biggie," but on how much you've enjoyed yourself. It's extraordinary how stress keeps some business people from enjoying anything.

One corporate chairman, wedded to his job, couldn't think of a single thing he really enjoyed. I pressed him for an answer. After a long pause, he said he sometimes found his coin collection satisfying. Small wonder, with the price of antique coins rising rapidly. But small pleasure, too. I encouraged him to do something entirely frivolous, purely for pleasure.

"Why don't you go out for an ice cream sundae?" The idea appalled him - "downright self-indulgent," he said as if that were a crime. But he did it. And it was an important first step towards being human.

My point here has very little to do with hot fudge and vanilla ice cream. Rather, it's that the business environment is under such strict financial and competitive pressure that it's easy to lose track of what it is you really enjoy about the business. But, if and when you note a spark or flame of pleasure in a momento you write, an idea you have, a conversation or a deft executive maneuver, pay attention to that spark. Note it and do more of it.

Still, business is business. And whether you are a farmer or a marketer of soap, your life will be poorer if you look for pleasure only in your work. - Hop Graham, Lovington Daily Leader

NO PRIVILEGED JUDGES

The U. S. Supreme Court decided properly in refusing to shield federal judges, including the nine justices of the nation's highest court, from a financial disclosure law. Judges have no more right to special privileges than others in public life.

The decision, handed down without comment, leaves intact rulings that federal judges are among those high-ranking government officials who must comply with the Ethics in Government Act of 1978. This is as it should be.

The ruling came to the Supreme Court when six federal judges in the South argued that they and other judges should not have to disclose how much money they have and what they own.

The arguments did not win a single vote from the justices on the high court bench, considered a surprising outcome since the judges' appeal had been pending for nearly a year.

The judges arguing for special dispensation apparently see themselves as members of a privileged class, and as such to be above the law. Fortunately, they are a minority among the nation's judiciary. The Supreme Court has put them in their place. - News-Bulletin, Belem

Hydroelectric power may benefit Penasco Valley

There is hope for the Penasco Valley. This southeastern New Mexico region, for years plagued with spring floods, summer drought and high energy costs, may have a brighter future if a hydroelectric power system being studied by University of New Mexico (UNM) researchers proves economically feasible.

The researchers, working under a \$16,000 State Energy and Minerals Department grant, hope their project will result in a constant water source from the Penasco River that will improve agricultural production, stabilize the economy and make a home for more people.

W. Reed Edgel, research engineer for the UNM-based New Mexico Engineering Research Institute (NMERI) and principal investigator in the project, said water shortages and floods in the early 1900s led to the problems faced by Penasco Valley residents today.

Sixty years ago the Hope area boasted 14,000 acres of fruits, vegetables and cotton, as well as cattle and sheep ranching. But a "scouring" of the river channel by flood debris removed the silt, algae, moss and other ingredients that had formed a seal between the water and the porous rock strata and fault zones that

underlie many reaches of the river. That created water seepage and therefore water shortages.

Today the Hope area has only about 2,400 acres of early season grass crops such as alfalfa, plus some cattle and sheep ranching and dairy farming.

Agriculture in the valley is further hindered by the high cost of energy. Power must be brought in by transmission lines from two generating stations in Texas. Much of the power is lost in the lines before it even gets to the users.

The basic approach to correcting these problems, Edgel said, would involve the installation of pipelines along selected reaches of the river to carry the flow past high seepage areas and deliver it to the points of usage. At these release locations, small-scale hydroelectric plants would extract electrical power, which would in turn be fed to the local electrical utility system.

All this hinges on the feasibility of the project, Edgel said. He hopes in the next few months to verify the feasibility of the pipeline approach from technical and legal standpoints, to select sites and equipment that will give optimal exploitation of the irrigation and power potentials of the Rio Penasco, and to develop matching funds

for the possible future design and construction tasks.

Should the project prove viable, several turbines could be erected along the Rio Penasco, Rio Cuevo and Rio Felix in the valley. Together they could provide nearly one megawatt of power.

Successful completion of the project would change a flood-prone, inconsistently flowing river into a power producing river that would displace power presently produced out of state, and it would mitigate the effects of floods on agriculture in the area, Edgel said. With increased agricultural productivity in the area, property values would rise, and farmers and ranchers would have some financial leverage in bringing economic stability to the area.

The area could also attract some industrial development to complement the agriculture, Edgel said, since water and power would be available year-round.

Finally, Edgel said there is great potential for "spinoff" that would benefit other areas of the state. Similar projects might prove advantageous to various other locations that have rivers and streams with unrealized potential for both power production and increased irrigation.

Development arsonists sought

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — When it first opened in the 1960's, the Paradise Hills subdivision located northwest of Albuquerque was considered a development with moderately priced homes in a country club environment.

For retired persons and middle income families, it looked like a dream community.

But recently, typical of many suburban developments around the country, some of that dream has given way to the harsh realities of rising crime.

Youth gangs and arsonists particularly have plagued Paradise Hills during the past year. Thousands of dollars worth of vandalism and more than a half dozen arsons were reported during 1980.

Two costly fires were set in December and this week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of either arson.

On December 16, an early morning blaze gutted part of a residence at 5313 Lehr Court N.W. Bernalillo County arson investigators say the blaze apparently started in the master bedroom and was

accelerated by some type of flammable liquid. Fortunately, the occupants of the home were out of town at the time of the fire.

Investigators say there were signs of forcible entry through the rear door of the house and that someone had gone through dresser drawers in the bedroom, although nothing apparently was taken.

An estimated \$45,000 loss resulted from the arson.

The second fire was set December 19 around 4:45 p.m. This time a vacant house at 5901 Avenida La Barranca NW was the target.

Apparently someone forced their way through a rear door, vandalized the home, then set a fire in the utility room. Again quick response by fire officials limited the blaze to the immediate area where it had been set and the majority of the \$26,000 loss was in heat, smoke and water damage.

Arson investigators say both fires could be gang related.

Anyone having any information about either of these two fires is asked to call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its

toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Meanwhile, local Crime Stoppers programs are turning their attention this week to burglars.

In Hobbs, a thief who broke into the locker of a junior high school student and pilfered two hearing aids valued at \$1,200 is being sought. A \$500 reward is being offered. Hobbs Crime Stoppers can be reached at 393-8005.

Otero County Crime Stoppers is trying to solve the December 30 burglary of a General Tire store in Alamogordo. A total of 26 mag wheels were taken by the offenders. The number of Otero County Crime Stoppers is 437-2000.

The December 7 residential burglary of a residence at 2010 Suttle Court is being highlighted this week by Rio Rancho Crime Stoppers. The offenders gained entry to the house by breaking a rear bedroom window. A \$200 reward is being offered by Rio Rancho Crime Stoppers, which can be reached at 842-3916.

Another burglar is being sought by Carlsbad Crime Stoppers. On December 29, someone broke into Burton Drug on West Pierce Street and took a variety of narcotics kept in a safe. The offenders gained entry through the roof. A large reward is being offered by Carlsbad Crime Stoppers at 887-1888.

And Curry County Crime Stoppers is offering a \$150 reward for information leading to the arrest of a burglar who broke into a storage building at Seventh and Thomas streets in Clovis. Using a portable electric drill to force his way into the building, the offender took about \$880 worth of candy and peanuts. Curry County Crime Stoppers can be reached at 763-7000.

Severe weight imbalance tilts, overworks heart

A nutritionist with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station, using electrocardiogram data of women on a weight control program, found that a severe weight imbalance causes the heart to rotate on its axis and to change its electromotive force.

It was found that in the severely underweight woman, the cushion supporting the heart is not thick enough to keep the heart in place. In the severely overweight person, fatty abdominal tissue crowding the heart from below can cause the heart to tilt to the person's left and may even tip it backward.

The consequence of rotation is that it puts an extra load on the heart's ventricles, the lower compartments of the heart. Prolonged strain on the ventricles can cause heart disease.

The changes in force or rotation should be a "little flag" of warning to physicians who have patients with a weight imbalance.

These two factors can be used as a predictive tool, much the same way blood pressure is used to predict possible health problems.

So, you finally found your dream home. That's good news. Unfortunately, it is located right in the path of a new freeway or public works project, and it is marked for demolition. That's bad news. However, there is more good news. With a little bit of initiative and patience on your part, and some cooperation from public officials, this story can have a happy ending. The solution is: move the house.

The Ruidoso Board of Realtors reports that moving a home from one site to another is not the easiest task in the world, but the benefits to be derived from purchasing a home slated for razing — a movable home — can make it worthwhile.

The primary benefit is financial. Many cities charge only a token fee (usually less than \$100) for movable homes. The buyer assumes the costs of moving the home to another lot and usually has to meet a strict timetable.

Once a person has located a movable home, there are three important steps to be taken immediately in order to save condemned houses. First, let the owner of the condemned home (usually the city, state, or federal government, but sometimes private) know of the desire to purchase it. Second, make arrangements to buy a vacant lot if one isn't already owned. Third, locate and take bids from house moving contractors.

These vital steps, also are interdependent. Unless a prospective buyer immediately lets the owner know that he wishes to purchase the house, the demolition process will be carried out and the home will be gone forever. Owning a vacant lot to place the movable house on is critical for two reasons. Often, cities won't sell about-to-be-demolished homes to buyers unless a vacant lot is owned. If the buyer doesn't own a lot sometimes, the government agency will grant a period of time to locate one. If the buyer can't line up the land and meet the government's timetable, the buyer may become

responsible for demolition costs.

Also, a house moving firm can tell the buyer whether the move is feasible only if it knows the new location. The house mover also must know the new lot location in order to set up a moving route and get clearances from all involved parties — government agencies and utility companies. The mover also will determine structural soundness of the home to see if it can be moved.

Once these hurdles have been cleared, the actual moving process begins. The mover (generally listed in the classified telephone directory under House and Building Movers) takes care of most of the red tape. It's all part of the price.

Moving charges will vary from area to area. Generally, price is determined by distance, weight and size of the home being moved. Expect the charges to fall somewhere between \$3,000 and \$18,000. Don't be afraid to pin the mover down on exact charges and who pays for what permits, etc. Plan on allowing 7 to 10 days for the entire moving process, lot to lot.

The mover will suggest the best moving route and will secure the necessary moving permits and clearances. When the cutting of utility wires is necessary the utility will want prepayment. That comes out of the buyer's pocket. If the city requires a police escort during the move (and many do), the mover arranges it, but the buyer pays for it.

The buyer is required to obtain a building permit if a basement is to be constructed on the new site. Disconnection and reconnection of utilities at the old and new sites as well as sanitary district permits for plumbing and sewer hook up also are the owner's responsibility.

The Ruidoso Board of Realtors also points out that by saving existing homes a city preserves some of its heritage, reinforces established architectural character of the community, and provides a sense of stability to its neighborhoods.

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I'll have to admit that I'm not a great outdoorsperson, but I recently got acquainted with what must be one of nature's peevish critters. They attacked me, bit me, and left their calling card for several days. It was my first, and hopefully last, acquaintance with what my friends say were chiggers. I'm not even sure where I got them.

I was blessed with a myriad of remedies for easing the irritation, but none stopped the itching for long. At times I would have welcomed the appendages of an octopus, complete with fingers on each.

How does one know where chiggers are, and how can they be avoided? Is there really any effective antidote for them? Sara T., North Carolina

Dear Sara — Thousands of people get acquainted, or reacquainted, with chiggers during the summer months, but I

doubt that any are really pleased by it. Prime chigger habitat includes woodland, tall grass, and grassy areas near streams and ponds. Though it's not as likely, your own lawn could harbor these little fugitives.

If you have reason to believe that you have been invaded by them, showering with lots of lather soon after exposure will succeed in killing and washing away most before they have a chance to burrow into the skin.

A couple of years ago, I took a late summer stroll through a woods that included a lot of waist-high brush, without benefit of repellent on my trousers or socks. Upon returning to the car, a slight sensation of crawling things caused me to look closely around my legs. There were hundreds, or maybe thousands, of nearly microscopic chiggers hitching a ride on my trousers, legs, and lower arms. Within a half hour, I returned home and showered. I escaped with few more than half a dozen that had dug in. My clothes were removed in the utility room, secured inside a plastic bag and placed in the freezer for two or three days. They were then taken outside to be shaken, then placed in the washer.

After a chigger has dug into the skin, there is nothing I know of that will completely stop the itching. Local applications of alcohol or a drug store concoction applied periodically is about the best you can do. It will take three to five days for the itching to subside. Your nerves should also improve at about that time.

Grape hybrids

tough survivors

There is good news for New Mexico commercial flower producers. Researchers at New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station report that static, a cut flower widely used in fresh and dried floral arrangements, can be grown successfully in northern New Mexico.

The area's arid, moderate climate helps produce high-quality flowers free from disease and insect damage. Initial studies indicate that commercial producers may be able to gross as much as \$12,000 to \$16,000 per acre with the flower.

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Windmill slated for energy production

The windmill, on the verge of extinction half a century ago, now stands at the threshold of a new energy era. And no city in New Mexico may feel the winds of change more immediately than Tucumcari, where University of New Mexico (UNM) researchers are working to harness wind power for commercial use.

Dr. Gerald Leigh, senior technical advisor for the UNM-based New Mexico

Engineering Research Institute (NMERI), said the state has vast untapped wind resources, especially in the east where they are rated among the most plentiful in the nation.

The Tucumcari wind research and development project, sponsored by a \$53,000 grant from the State Energy and Minerals Department, aims to verify the wind energy availability, set up a

demonstration wind turbine and ultimately construct a wind farm, with 30 to 50 huge turbines producing electrical energy.

The city of Tucumcari was recently selected by the Department of Energy (DOE) as one of the nation's 17 wind power test locations. The DOE has erected a 150-foot anemometry tower there, with test equipment placed at three different

elevations.

For the second step in the project, the Aluminum Company of America (ALCOA) has donated a 82-foot, 60-kilowatt vertical axis wind turbine. Vertical axis turbines, developed by Albuquerque's Sandia Laboratories, may reach heights of over 400 feet and look rather like enormous spinning Jew's harps. They can provide 2.5 to 4 megawatts of power each — enough to supply the electric needs of 23 to 40 average homes.

Tucumcari is providing the materials and labor for construction of the turbine site, is furnishing the foundation, guy cable anchors and other equipment, and will operate the turbine and gather data for a period of two years.

The demonstration turbine will be connected to the electric utility grid which is operated by Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo (SPS).

Leigh and other NMERI engineers will study how much power can be generated by the demonstration turbine, what it will cost, whether a wind farm is economically feasible and, if so, who will use it and who

will pay for it.

Today's wind machines have little in common with the windmills of the 1920s and 1930s, said Leigh. When fossil fuels had become cheap and plentiful, the people who used windmills to produce electricity either dismantled the devices or left them to stand like white elephants.

But it is the energy economy that is now providing a forum for the wind power revival, Leigh said. And technology advancements have made wind machines bigger, lighter, more durable and more efficient. The largest wind turbine in operation in the United States is located in Washington state and utilizes a 300-foot propeller — like an airplane propeller — that rotates on a horizontal axis.

Should the Tucumcari wind farm concept prove economically feasible, some 30 to 50 vertical axis turbines could be erected on a site near the city. Tucumcari residents could pass a bond issue to pay for the turbines and then use the generated power to reduce the cost of their electricity. The city could sell the excess

power to SPS. Another possibility involves "wind wildcaters" — a new breed of independent energy producers who could buy and install the turbines and then sell the power to the utility company.

The DOE has for the past 10 years been trying to improve wind turbines, and though significant advancements have been made, there is still a long way to go. But Leigh said that shouldn't stop the construction of turbines and wind farms right now.

"Henry Ford didn't wait for the Mustang, he started with the Model T," Leigh said. "We shouldn't wait for all the improvements in wind power to be realized before we start using it as an energy source."

It takes about five years to get a wind farm in full operation, Leigh said. "Let's not wait. Let's get started now. Our role as researchers is to facilitate, promote and provide technical guidance to make wind power happen for the good of the people of New Mexico."

Computers help design state irrigation systems

Researchers with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station have created the perfect onion field — on computer paper.

Although they will never harvest their crop of numbers, they will be able to use the information to help producers design a better irrigation system for growing real crops. "We are comparing ideal conditions formulated by the computer with actual conditions in the field," said agricultural engineer Dr. Robert B. Hulsman.

To make the comparison, the researchers had to glean information about crops grown under actual conditions. To begin, they installed flow meters to measure how much water is applied at each irrigation and the yearly total. They also measured

how fast the water "front" moved down the irrigation row and how quickly the "back" water infiltrated into the soil. Hulsman said this measurement is used to calculate how long the water stands at any point along the row. It also pinpoints slope problems and areas with low spots.

Soil characteristics such as soil type and infiltration rate were also measured. Hulsman said if it can be determined how fast the water infiltrates into the soil and the depth it reaches, it also can be determined how much water is stored in the root zone and how much is lost to deep percolation.

The researchers also evaluated the soil moisture profile using a neutron probe. The probe, which is lowered six feet into

the soil, emits fast moving neutrons at one-foot increments. The neutrons collide with hydrogen ions in the soil and are slowed. The number of slowed neutrons reflects the amount of water in the soil. Neutron probe readings are taken weekly at several locations in the field during the life of the crop.

When soil and irrigation data are completed, the information will be fed into a computer. The results will give the producer a comparison between his actual crop production and his potential production. It also will tell him what he can do to improve his irrigation design in terms of slope, length of run, water application and time of irrigation. This, plus other data, will help him improve his irrigation system, water use efficiency, crop yield and energy costs.

"Management efficiency takes on more importance as energy costs increase and water resources become more scarce," Hulsman said. "Until a few years ago, a producer could get by with average management, but today you either practice good management or you go out of business."

He said although information gathering must be done for each farm, each field and each crop, the principles of efficiency remain the same.

The researchers obtained the computer program last fall and began collecting data this growing season. Water application efficiencies already have been determined for onion and barley crops. Hulsman said they expect first results with this year's harvest. As the harvest progresses, data will be available for pecans, cotton, chile and alfalfa. Water resource and pumping energy data will be available for the Mesilla Valley at the end of the three-year study.

Armed robbery is big business

Armed robbery ... the statistics are stunning.

In 1981, it is estimated that one out of every 25 businesses in America will be the victim of a hold-up. For retail business, the rate is even worse — almost one business in 10 will be victimized.

The average robbery will net an offender about \$440, with a total overall loss to American business projected to be very close to \$200 million.

There is one other frightening figure. According to author Charles Silberman in his book "Criminal Violence, Criminal Justice," robbers are more violent today. "Nowadays, one robbery victim in three is injured, compared with the 1967 ratio of one in five ... it would appear that robbery killings have increased four to five-fold since the early 1960's," Silberman wrote.

Three employees of the State Line Restaurant in Sunland Park had a close brush with death last December 13, when two white males of hispanic descent robbed their business shortly after midnight.

The two offenders, approximately 30 years old, forced the three employees to open a safe. The robbers took 15 white money bags with the University State Bank logo printed in black letters on the outside. The bags contained cash of every denomination.

The three employees also were robbed of their tip money and personal property, such as a yellow gold-plated Bulova Acutron watch.

Police say one offender was armed with a stainless-steel snub-nosed revolver, while the other had a semi-automatic rifle with ammo clips. The pair threatened to kill the employees and held their guns to the victims' heads. One bullet was fired, lodging in the wall above one of the employees.

The victims described one of the robbers as being 5-10 with a slender build. He had black hair and a full moustache. The suspect also was armed with a Bowie knife.

The second offender was about 5-8, heavyset and had black hair. He had a heavy Spanish accent. Both men wore winter-style Army fatigue coats.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward and the Dona Ana County Crime Stoppers Program is putting up a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictments of the offenders.

Anyone having any information about the case is asked to call State Crime Stoppers at its toll-free number, 1-900-432-6933, or Dona Ana County Crime Stoppers at its 24-hour telephone, 628-8000. Callers do not have to reveal their identities. At its bi-monthly meeting in

Albuquerque last week, the State Crime Stoppers Commission authorized the payments of more than \$3,400 worth of rewards to the following callers — NM-459, NM-450, NM-49, NM-424, NM-571, NM-860, NM-263. Citizens with those code numbers should call the State Crime Stoppers Commission to make arrangements for payment.

To date, a total of 2,896 major cases have been solved by Crime Stoppers programs throughout New Mexico and \$2,958,094 worth of stolen property and narcotics has been recovered, with 875 out of 882 persons tried in court have been convicted.

Transmitters detect estrus in dairy cows

A transmitter devised by an animal scientist with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station could help improve breeding and milk production efficiencies in dairy cows.

The transmitter, about the size of a roll of quarters, can be safely and easily inserted into the animal's vagina. The main benefit of using the internal transmitter is that it monitors changes in body temperatures — the key for detecting estrus. Another benefit is that a feverish animal can be spotted as early as two days before it becomes visibly ill.

Q. How much State Capital Outlay Money is available?

A. 10 million dollars this year.

Q. Why do we need it?

A. We can bond only for 2 million dollars at this time and we need several million more than that. As an example, say we need a total of 5 million dollars. We can bond for 2 million; that leaves us 3 million short. State Capital Outlay Money will pay for part or all of the remainder needed. WE CANNOT EVEN APPLY FOR STATE CAPITAL OUTLAY MONEY UNLESS THE 2 MILL LEVY PASSES!

Q. Does it have to be paid back?

A. No.

Q. What will 2 mill levy money be used for?

A. It can be used for construction, renovation, landscaping, painting, new furniture, equipment, etc.

Our plans include:

1. Re-roofing all existing buildings.
2. New bleachers, restrooms, concessions at the football field.
3. Painting existing buildings where needed, inside and out.
4. Lighting, carpeting and new furniture.
5. Improvement to the heating system at all schools.

Q. What if the 2 mill levy doesn't pass?

A. Forget about improving existing facilities. Forget about new bleachers and athletic facilities. Forget about building a new school.

Q. Do you have to own property to vote for the 2 mill levy?

A. No — you just have to be a registered voter residing within the school district.

During the early part of December, dozens of segments were taped on the tropical island for use in two of the serial's current story lines. They began airing on January 5, and will continue through early March, as part of the regular episodes of the show. 'Guiding Light,' another of the network's popular daytime dramas, was also involved in the trip to Jamaica—a first for any daytime program. Nature and weather were extremely cooperative throughout the 'Search For Tomorrow' taping week, adding to the atmosphere of romance and mystery in all the right places. Dun River Falls, a popular Jamaican tourist attraction, was the setting for a climactic fight scene which will cap the current intrigue concerning the shady doctor, Winston Kyle. The falls are not a sheer drop, like Niagara, but rather a succession of plateaus, pools and rock outcroppings, where the amazingly clear Jamaica water drops, rushes and splashes, creating a stunning visual treat.

TV CLOSEUP: Nine artisans and performing artists who keep the heartbeat of an ancient culture pulsing through a contemporary society are the subjects of the new National Geographic Special, 'Living Treasures of Japan.' Airing on Public Television February 11, 'Living Treasures' is the National Geographic Society's first documentary devoted to the arts. The special is co-produced by the National Geographic Society and WQED/Pittsburgh with a continuing grant from Gulf Oil Corporation. The special profiles nine of the 'treasures': a potter, doll sculptor, puppeteer, papermaker, koto musician, swordmaker, textile weaver and dyer, Kabuki theater actor, and bell maker **Michele Lee**, who keeps the love plots simmering on CBS-TV's 'Knots Landing' as Karen Fairgate, confesses she hasn't been above a bit of romantic intrigue in real life. In fact, she says, her long, happy marriage to **James Farentino** follows just such a sexy scheme she devised to snare him 15 years ago.
