Skiers thronged the slopes

Nineteen inches of new snow falling on Sierra Blanca the first weekend in February attracted, over the weekend, the droves of skiers that had been awaiting word that the skiing on the mountain was excellent.

By 9:30 a.m., Saturday, the main parking lot at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort was full and the overflow parking area was rapidly filling.

Though the lines for lift tickets and the lifts were long, the new facilities reduced time waiting to a minimum.

The grooming of all runs was completed in time for Friday's first assault wave of skiers and the huge crowds following Saturday and through today's Washington's Birthday holiday.

Lodging operators contacted over the weekend by The News indicated that most were booked to capacity, with cancellations being virtually nonexistent.

The number of skiers at Sierra Blanca over the weekend is currently running a little less than estimated last week by manager Roy Parker.

Parker was anticipating selling between 15,000 and 20,000 tickets by the end of today, but so far only about 9,000 have been sold.

Parker said the resort sold 3,515 on Sunday and 3,237 on Saturday. Friday's total was around 3,000.


"I imagine we'll sell between 1,500 and 2,000 today," he said. That's still a big improvement over what we've been doing."

Parker said he couldn't estimate how long the current snow base would last.

That's testing the unknown," he said. "I couldn't make a projection on how long it will last. We still have pretty good coverage, and we've been machining everything except the expert trails."

We should have the slopes in good shape in the next three or four days."

Conditions are rated good on the mountain, with all lifts operating and all trails open.

Ruidoso's classic car buffs proud of their machines


Finding things that "last" or have some long term wear capabilities may be a little hard in these days of "fast food" and "throwaway" bottles.

However, one phenomenon of the Twentieth Century has found its way into the hearts and pocketbooks of many Americans — but mostly the invention has managed to fill a lot of garages.

The automobile of 1961 is somewhat streamlined, to meet the needs of an energy crisis that isn't expected to go away; consequently the cars of the 1960's aren't expected to become "classics" ... but some of the cars built in the 1920's through the 1960's have become collector's items.

Some people wonder what constitutes a "classic" car. That can possibly be determined by browsing through a list of so designated automobiles, voted into the "classic car club" by members of the Milestone Car Society, an American organization that has deemed itself worthy to determine "a classic," according to one of its local members, Mike Mulholland.

Mulholland said the group selects a "classic" depending on their unique design, mechanical features, and generally the aesthetics. That's right, cars do have aesthetics, even if they're a matter of personal preference.

The Milestone Car Society has voted about 80 models as "classics," which has made the owners of those cars potentially wealthy people, in some cases, Mulholland said.

Mulholland owns and drives a classic — a 1966 3.8 S Jaguar, which sports a 3.8 liter engine. Built and distributed by Jaguar Cars Ltd., England, the car was chosen for its style.

Mulholland is now refurbishing a 1954 Studebaker Commander Starlight, and also owns a 1950 GMC pickup, a two-door Model T Ford and a Crosley station wagon, circa 1951. Why collect old cars? "I've just been a car nut since I was a kid. I had my first Model T when I was in high school," Mulholland said. His hobby was picked up by his son Mark, who also has owned his share of "classics."

"You have to think of it as an investment, I guess, but I got the car just for

the heck of fixing it up," Mark sold one he had refurbished, because, he said, "I was afraid somebody was going to smash in the fender or something. Once it's done, the car's just not the same."

No one's sure if the Volkswagen Karmann Ghia is a classic yet, but it may be destined to join the ranks of the greats. The Karmann Ghia went out of production in the early 1970's and according to Marty Yoder, a local owner of the only sports car Volkswagen has ever made, the car is "a honey."

Yoder has a 1971 model which she claims is "sleek. It goes down the highway and every time I stop for gas (which, by the way, isn't often) somebody offers to buy it."

Yoder said the car has a regular VW motor and repairs are not hard to find.


Another apparent mark of value is a car that is no longer in production. Vernon Miller, a Nogal resident, claims two

Studebakers for his family vehicles. Miller said he is a direct descendant of the Studebaker family, and so fell heir to two of the vehicles when the plant closed down in 1966.


Miller said it was a good car. "It's only three feet longer than the new cars and weighs 3,600 pounds." His 1947 (the new one, he said) gets 18-25 miles per gallon. Miller is working on his old car — a 1929 version of the Studebaker, "because I'm retired — got to have something to do," he said.

Doris Langford's pride and joy is a 1951 Chevrolet — not considered to be a classic but "I thought it would be fun to drive," she said, so when she found the car on a visit to Minnesota, she bought it.

"I guess it is an investment, but I thought it'd be fun to have a functional old car — good grief, it gets 21 miles to the gallon. Not bad for a car built in the days of 15 cent gas," she said.

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

Stake claim on district lead

Warriors pummel Cobre Indians

Grapplers go one for three over weekend

Warrior wrestlers went one for three in district competition over the weekend, defeating Cobre and losing to Deming and Silver City.

The Warriors triumphed over Cobre 48-18, but fell to Silver, 53-10. Coach Gerald Ames was figuring that would happen.

But he was a little surprised by the outcome of the Deming meet — the Warriors lost that one, 33-27.

"We did fairly well, we just couldn't pull it out," he said. "Deming was tougher than I thought they would be. We each won the same number of matches, but we didn't win by enough pins."

The Silver City match "wasn't any fun at all," Ames said of the Saturday morning meet, but the Warriors salvaged the weekend with the shellacking of Cobre.

Only two Warriors were able to sweep their weight brackets — Doug Schmidt at 119 pounds and Robert Langston at 167

each won three matches.

Two wrestlers won two and lost one, Ezell Clarke at heavyweight and Scott Ciraulo at 185.

Chuck Schmidt at 98, Ray Montes at 101, Keith Sullivan at 132, David Swalander at 145 and Von Rue at 155 all won one match and lost two.

Henry Rue, 112 pounder, 126 pounder Dirky Bustamante and Don Gwyn, 138 pounder, went zero for three in their weekend competition.

"It's pretty hard to lose sometimes, but we got a lot of experience," Ames said.

The Warriors have another district match Wednesday, facing New Mexico Military Institute of Roswell there in the final regular season meet for the 5-4 Warriors.

Last competition of the season will be this weekend in the district tournament, to be held at Cobre.

It took a furious fourth quarter surge to do it, but the Ruidoso Warrior round-ballers claimed their fifth district win of the year Saturday with a 60-51 win over the Cobre Indians there.

The Warriors shot 75 percent (nine of 12 shots) in the final stanza to erase a four point Indian lead. In so doing, they scored 26 points, half a dozen more than they scored in the entire first half.

Coach Barry Nelson was afraid Cobre would get a lead and go into a stall, but it didn't work that way. The Indians apparently felt they didn't need to hold the ball the way the Warriors were shooting it.

"We didn't take many outside shots," Nelson said. "We didn't take many inside ones, either. I thought we'd get the ball inside better than we did."

The Warriors scored but eight points in the first period, connecting on only three of 16 tries (a dismal 19 percent), and hit only four of 11 in the second period (36 percent).

The Warriors were down by 10, 30-20, at the half, but pulled to within four before the third period was over on a seven of 12 performance (58 percent).

"I thought we'd play better than we did," Nelson said. "It's hard to play on the road like we did. I'm just glad our road

trips are over."

The Cobre contest was the final away game of the regular season for the Warriors, now 5-1 in district and 13-5 overall.

Nelson was obviously pleased with the win, but he thought it was a little sloppy. "Cobre was tough, about what I expected them to be," he said. "They didn't press us like I figured they would, which kinda made it easier for us."

Glenn Ryan was high scorer for the Warriors with 19, followed by Rodney Thomason with 17, Gary Jones with 15, Gene Reeves with seven and Bill Richardson with two.

The win more firmly established the Warriors' hold on the number one spot in District 3AAA, with four regular season games left on the slate, all set for Warrior Gymnasium.

Next Friday the Warriors face Truth or Consequences here, followed by Deming on Saturday. The following weekend will feature games against Tularosa and Cobre.

"We came through when we had to," Nelson said. "We knew we would get there sometime, we just had to do it. From here on in we just have to keep improving."

Deming is currently in second place in the district, followed by Truth or Consequences and Tularosa.

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What's It Like To Have A Chimney Fire?

It's no fun. If it doesn't burn the house down, it will probably wreck your chimney and scare you half to death. Here's how it happens.

Begin with one dirty chimney — let's say a fireplace not cleaned for a couple of years. The soot lining the chimney flue is saturated with flammable stuff called creosote. [More detail on creosote is available in any dictionary.] It doesn't take much to ignite creosote — a newspaper fire sending flames up to the damper is enough.

Once kindled, creosote burns with joyous abandon. In a matter of seconds the fire spreads up through the flue creating a draft that only helps things along. At this point your average chimney fire begins to roar and howl, sending the occupants of the house running for cover.


If you run, you'll be treated to a real fireworks show. As the creosote fire builds and intensifies the heat melts the mortar between the brick. The red-hot mortar actually drips into the flue, only to be caught up in the tremendous updraft, and these little fire balls shoot out the chimney and onto the roof. If you're lucky, the chimney will fall apart destroying one end of the building — if you're not, this miniature volcano can bring the whole house down.

However, if you stand your ground, a chimney fire can be controlled. Put out the fire in the fireplace with an extinguisher or sand. Cover the opening with a wet blanket, call the fire department, and hope for the best. But it should be pointed out that having your chimney cleaned is a lot easier on the nerves than the sand and wet blanket method.



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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — The winds of change blow strong. They have even reached the halls of our state's Capitol.

But they blow here, as is typical of our state, in a different swirl from the one in Washington.

Back on the Potomac, almost all talk is of tightening the purse strings, while here there is an embarrassment of wealth.

Maybe we could lend the nation Fred Munz, our chief tax-collector, and Fred O'Cheskey and Franklin Jones, two of his more outstanding predecessors.

Over the years men such as these have managed to teach New Mexicans what few other Americans have learned: how to hold still while being over-taxed to an unbelievable degree.

And if you don't think it's fun watching O'Cheskey and Jones, now lobbyists for private industry, singing a tune 180 degrees away from the one they used to sing, you don't know the enjoyment of political change.

"Cut, cut, cut!" has replaced "Tax, Tax, Tax!" — oh, happy day!

In fact, people like O'Cheskey and Jones, who really understand how the state's money-producing machine actually works, are more than just a tad embarrassed at the piles of money New Mexico has over-collected in the past.

They're looking down the road and seeing a glut of revenue such as this small state has never amassed. That, they suggest, is going to make the surpluses of the last few years look like the earnings from a teen-ager's paper route.

Suddenly these people believe — or profess to believe — that we'd better start cutting taxes of all kinds, right, left, upside-down and backwards.

And it's at that point of "taxes of all kinds" that they meet some resistance

head-on. That resistance comes from the Governor of the State of New Mexico, among many others.

Bruce King is talking this year like a true populist. "Cut the taxes on the private citizen," he says, "but do no favors for big business."

That is not a view with which lobbyists agree; because lobbyists, as you may have heard, seldom are paid to come up here and speak for the private citizen. (Nobody speaks much for that almost outmoded species.)

Watch the sparks when these two opposing opinions clash in the state Senate. No. Don't just look for sparks. Listen for the crash of rock meeting rock.

The members of the House of Representatives got snookered on this one. They wanted to demonstrate, above all else, that they could come to grips with a problem like tax reduction early in the session.

They did. And when they did, they gave away all the power they might have if their hold card hadn't already been seen.

Put simply, they got took, in their desire to demonstrate that the old Aubrey Dunn system no longer prevails in the Legislature. (Fact is, the old Aubrey Dunn system works better than the naive one they want to substitute for it.)

The House is out of the fight. Now there is nobody left but Governor King and the Senate.

You can be sure that out of that combination the results will not be what the House wants. ("The House? Who cares?") So now it's the Governor, defender of the poor citizen, against the lobbyists for the big folks.

Anybody want to bet on who will win that instance?

ECONOMIC RECOVERY — A NEW BEGINNING

There is a line in a song popularized some years ago by Frank Sinatra that I think is applicable to our number one domestic problem today, our seriously but not terminally ill economy.

"Old Blue Eyes" belted out ... "I'm gonna pick myself up, dust myself off and start all over again." We have seen a new beginning in the Senate Appropriations Committee where I chair the Subcommittee on Labor-Health & Human Services and Education. The full Committee has completed a historic series of hearings on the economy and its impact on the Committee's ability to control federal spending and increase service in programs under its jurisdiction.

This overall fiscal view by the Committee has been absent in recent years. Its absence has contributed in a major way to the lack of workable fiscal policy in the Congress. A general fiscal strategy toward a new beginning, a "picking up and dusting off," should have four basic elements:

1. Enact significant tax incentives, retroactive to January 1, 1981, to encourage new capital formation and thus creating increased productivity, lower costs of production and new jobs.
2. Enact a general income tax cut of about \$30 billion for calendar year 1981, \$20 billion for 1982 and \$50 billion for 1983 with indexing of tax rates to inflation in following years.
3. Enact cuts in federal spending that reduce the growth of federal spending that

reduce the growth of federal spending to zero by the end of FY 1982 and reduce the annual amount of federal borrowing (deficit plus present off-budget borrowing) from \$138 billion in FY 1980 to \$130 billion in FY 1981, \$90 billion in FY 1982, \$50 billion in FY 1983 and zero in FY 1984.

4. Stop the growth of regulatory costs by the end of FY 1981 and build a 10 percent annual rate of decrease in these costs by the end of FY 1982.

The nitty-gritty of controlling spending comes down to applying common sense and experience to individual programs. Obviously, most major long-term adjustments will require changes in the basic entitlements. Changes that tighten up the eligibility criteria for benefits so that only those who have no alternatives but federal assistance get that assistance, but get it more efficiently than in the past. We must eliminate waste, fraud and abuse everywhere; social programs, research and development and defense, alike.

The synthesis of economic and budgetary ideas the Appropriations Committee received in our recent hearing showed a remarkable consensus. The Congress would ignore that consensus not only at its political peril but at the peril of the nation.

The Appropriations Committee has made a good start toward playing its pivotal role in restoring tax, spending and regulatory common sense to the federal government. Now it is up to the Congress to listen.

To paraphrase "Old Blue Eyes," "We're gonna pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off and start all over again."

Dear editor:

A reply to Mr. Jim Tully's Letter to the Editor in the Monday, February 9 edition of The Ruidoso News.

First of all we do not have a year round population of 8,000 but one of 4,284 as per 1980 census. Also the water produced by the City amounted to 438 million gallons for period 7/79 thru 6/80, and not 730 million as stated.

Since the house unit figure of 5,418 is probably a more representative figure than population, we can arrive at a yearly house unit use of water to be 80,500 gallons or 220 gallons per day.

The City's present average yearly water right available is 1,795 acre feet. This is based upon water from the Cherokee Well (12 million gallons per year), the Rio Ruidoso (eight year history of use) and Eagle Creek (27 year history of run off). Using this 1,795 acre feet of water rights available the total gallonage is 584 million gallons, which at a 80,500 gallon per year house unit usage results in a maximum of 7,265 housing units. Therefore, the growth rate the city can justifiably experience to where our water system utilizes the present maximum allowable amounts to an increase in house units of only 35 percent (7,265 vs. 5,418) and not the 300 percent suggested population increase of 8,000 to 24,000.

The City's water rights under present flow rates calculate in the neighborhood of 2,960 acre feet. The difference between yearly average available water and annual water rights gives the city the right to collect and store any above average water flow up to a present total of some 2,960 acre feet when available. It is therefore evident that one of the long term solutions to our problem is to provide sufficient raw storage facilities whereby the City can impound all of their total allowable water rights whenever the supply is present.

I can say unofficially that to these ends the Water Board is diligently working. Their report to the City Council is forthcoming and will be submitted after the soon to be completed Boyle Engineering report is received and digested.

As interesting as first thoughts about the possibility that the Ruidoso Downs Baptist Church may open a non-denominational Christian school are, it is not a panacea to solving the problems of increasing enrollment in the Ruidoso Public Schools.

A parochial school is not eligible for public funding, therefore it would have to be supported by subscription and, more than likely, stiff tuition fees which would tend to limit enrollment.

Therefore, to handle the projected increase in students in the public school in the years ahead, the Board of Education must continue with their plans to expand the present facilities.

Based on a five percent annual population growth, the public school must be able to educate 1,900 students by the beginning of the 1985-86 school year and possibly 2,300 or more in another five years.

If the voters approve bonding the school district to the legal limit, then the school can apply to the State Capital Outlay Committee for substantial funding that need not be repaid, to complete the building program.

Sure, the bond issue will increase taxes, but, if Ruidoso is to continue offering students outstanding educational opportunities, school district patrons must foot their share of the cost. There is, it seems, no alternative. —CD

For out of this life came all the qualities which stood him in good stead during the trying times during which he was the leader of our nation.

From his birthplace of Kentucky the family moved to Indiana; and there Lincoln remembers "our home in the unbroken forest" and that at the age of seven or eight "an axe was put into my hands" and he pitched in to the work of clearing the land. From this beginning he became surely the champion axe swinger of all time. In those days fences were made with rails. A rail was a one-quarter section of a log about a foot and a half in diameter. The logs were hickory or some other hard wood. Lincoln became famous as a "rail splitter" needing only three blows with the axe to make the four rails.

I remember when I was five years old, our elder brother, John, read to me about Abraham Lincoln. I had been chopping wood since I was two years old, and after John's reading we both took renewed interest in wood chopping in honor of Lincoln. I tried to keep up with John in wood chopping, but could never touch him with a ten-foot pole. He was the second best wood chopper I ever saw.

This is being sent to you on Thursday, February twelve, the one hundred and seventy-second anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, of whom President Reagan recently said,

"To know the meaning of America, we can look to the life of Abraham Lincoln."

Lincoln, The Wrestler
When the family moved to New Salem, Illinois, a bunch of young fellows called Clary Grove Boys wanted to test Lincoln's mettle, so they sent their best man to have a contest with him in wrestling.

Lincoln defeated this champion so easily and with such lack of violence and such good nature, that the group became his friends and supporters, giving him great help when he later ran for office.

Lincoln, a Dreamer
The hard realities of frontier life left little room for idle dreaming; and yet Lincoln was a dreamer, being greatly fond of the poems of Robert Burns, and Aesop's Fables, and the story of Robinson Crusoe.

He had only about one year of schooling, and yet taught himself to read. He and another fellow put up a store that failed, and Lincoln was left with the debts which he paid over fifteen years.

Hard pressed in knowing which way to turn to make a living he borrowed a book on surveying and became an accomplished surveyor practically overnight.

A lawyer friend, John T. Stuart, noticed his amazing quickness of mind and encouraged him to study law, and soon took him as a partner. This launched Lincoln on his career.

His Honesty
Lincoln's honesty and moral purity drew men to him; and the saying grew, "You can trust Honest Abe."

And so let us take new inspiration from the spirit of "Honest Abe" after whom our beloved county is named.

Keep smiling, and God bless you till we meet again.






