

Village halts animal pact with county

The village trustees Friday afternoon, in a special meeting, cancelled the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) with Lincoln County on animal control, on request of Ruidoso's animal control officer Jack Snaidecki.

At the same time the trustees authorized negotiating a new JPA on animal control, with county manager Bill Billingsley to initiate action to draw up a new agreement.

Friday's action by the trustees stemmed from statements from Snaidecki that he was "not authorized to pick up animals in the county," and that the sheriff's office "was not cooperating," in picking up stray animals in the county and that Snaidecki is "not commissioned" to pick animals up in the county.

Snaidecki also said the sheriff's office hasn't "deputized a county animal control officer, which state statutes say must be done."

Under terms of the JPA, approved October 14, 1980, the village is to be reimbursed by the county at the rate of \$2 per day for each animal picked up, from the time of pickup to disposal or adoption;

plus a \$15 fee should a rabies test be performed on an animal picked up in the county. Snaidecki said county payments have ranged from \$52 a month, including two rabies tests, to \$10, as the lowest, in saying the "county is not doing animal control or bite (rabies test) service."

On the problem of housing animals picked up at the Fort Stanton pound, Snaidecki said that Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado had advised him to "accept no county animals in the shelter until a JPA had been made to protect all parties interested."

County Commissioner Ben Hall said, "The sheriff is designated as animal control officer in the county, and it is his responsibility, not Snaidecki's, to pick up animals in the county. The county is more than willing to work out a plan for animal control."

The trustees then approved termination of the existing JPA and agreed to take action to adopt a new, and satisfactory, JPA drawn up by the county, that would coordinate animal control activities between the sheriff's office and Snaidecki, with Snaidecki's area of responsibility to be clearly designated.

Ronald Harris resigns post of village attorney

Village attorney Ronald Harris Tuesday evening, at the conclusion of an executive session of the trustees, tendered his resignation effective February 28.

Harris, who has held the post since 1977, gave no specific reason for his resignation.

From January 1980, through January 1981, Harris received approximately \$27,400 from the village, including a monthly retainer of \$675. The payment above the retainer was for court appearances and trial work, according to village records.

Students back blood drive

Student council members at Ruidoso High School are joining with the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary to sponsor a blood drive March 18 at the high school library.

United Blood Services (UBS), El Paso, will be in Ruidoso to assist in the drive, 10 a.m. - 3 p.m.

Gabe Silva, director of donor recruitment at UBS, spoke to students Friday to explain what happens when blood is given and how the blood is used.

Silva said many New Mexico high schools sponsor blood drives and UBS cooperates "because we feel once you've donated, you'll become a regular donor."

He said anyone 17 or older can donate and is given a "mini physical" prior to giving blood, "to determine if you're healthy and won't pass any viruses on to the blood recipient."

Silva added that students under 18 must have a permission slip signed by their parents or guardians to comply with New Mexico state laws. Those slips will be given to students when they make appointments to donate, he said.

Ruidosians have traditionally supplied about 95 pints of blood but Hospital Auxiliary spokesperson Dottie Quaid, said "With the cooperation from high school students and the usual donors we have now, I hope we can break the 100 mark this time."

Silva said Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital is part of the UBS system, using about 20 pints of blood a month. He added that up to 60 pints are always on hand, in case some types don't always match the recipient.

Scott Neal, publicity chairperson for the drive, said each high school class will compete to attract the most donors and the class that wins will have a long lunch break. "We will probably be calling past donors to generate support," Neal said.

Student Council sponsor Judy Waldron said joint sponsorship of the blood drive "was the kids' idea — it is one of the projects they want to do for the community." She added that students will also furnish support services usually provided

by the Auxiliary and will serve refreshments to everyone.

"If there is someone who hasn't donated before and wants to, we hope they will call for an appointment. Rare blood types, such as O-negative, and those always in

demand, such as O-positive are especially needed, but everyone's blood can and will be used," Quaid added.

Cancer drive goal \$4,000

The Lincoln County Chapter of the American Cancer Society (LCACS) Thursday set a goal of \$4,000 for the 1981 cancer crusade in this area.

Crusade chairman will be Ken Moore, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital administrator, who said advanced typing students at Capitan High School are typing letters now which will be sent to businesses in the county to invite them to build an annual donation into their budgets, and to

seek a 1981 donation.

"Also, by asking the typing students to type the letters, we are getting a different age group from another part of the county active in the crusade," Moore said.

The LCACS will again sponsor a Longest Day of Golf in cooperation with local country clubs, and will add a Longest Day of Tennis to the project. "We hope this will get even more people involved and yet a different segment of the population in-

terested in our cause," Rose Peebles, local chairperson, said.

Plans to host a benefit dance at Ruidoso Downs Sales Arena were tabled until approval to use the facility and a specific date can be arranged.

"For the first time this year, we are going to have a residential campaign," Moore said. "It just isn't that hard to make a door to door appeal and we can use this method to educate people to the signs of

cancer while helping the crusade," he said. "If everyone will accept the initial challenge to reach out to people, we can have a very successful crusade," Moore added.

Crusade volunteers will be invited to attend a training session in May to acquaint them with procedures for running a successful campaign and to educate them about the work of the American Cancer Society.

Downs man charged in shooting fray

Tommy Lee Watson, 65, Ruidoso Downs was being held in the Ruidoso jail Monday morning, in lieu of \$10,000 bond, no ten percent allowed, on assault charges.

Watson was arrested about 7:20 p.m., Sunday at the home of A. C. Alexander, Ruidoso Downs, and charged with aggravated assault and possession of a stolen firearm, in connection with a shooting incident.

Police said Watson allegedly fired at Lillian Padilla, also of the Downs, with the bullet lodging in the wall near where she was standing.

The fire reportedly started in a baseboard heater in the home's master bedroom, before spreading to other rooms. No damage estimate was available Monday morning.

Mule Skinners annual meeting here Saturday

The annual meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners will begin at 7:30 p.m., Saturday in the Ruidoso Public Library.

Agenda items include election of directors, discussion of new mule racing rules, planning for the May 2-3 trail ride and planning for the October 8-11 mule racing at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The local organization which has been working on such projects for more than 10 years is the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council.

Despite its longevity, and its rate of success in completing adopted projects, many people aren't aware of the function and history of RC&D, according to officials of the local (Lincoln and Otero Counties) organization.

RC&D was born in 1962, a federally established program under the auspices of the United States Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

Although some money is available for certain types of projects on a cost-sharing basis with the SCS, RC&D was not intended to be a dispersing agency for federal funds. The program was designed to allow local citizens, many of whom are representatives of federal, state and other government agencies, to work together to solve local problems.

Problems addressed by RC&D include improvement of land, water and other resources for agricultural, municipal,

industrial, recreational, transportation and wildlife uses.

The only paid officials of RC&D are the coordinator, an employee of the SCS, who generally oversees several RC&D area councils, and secretary who assists with the project coordination.

Coordinator for the South Central Mountain RC&D is Richard Ramsey of Roswell, and secretary is Sue Sterns, Carrizozo.


RC&D "doesn't cost the federal government a lot of money," Ramsey said, "and we get a lot of work done on a volunteer basis."

The local RC&D council was formed in 1968, and since that time, about 230 "project measures" have been adopted. About two-thirds of those have been completed successfully.

When efforts on a project prove fruitless or become outdated, the measure is abandoned, which insures that the group is always working toward current and realistic goals.

But they don't give up easily.

RC&D works on various projects concerned with rural development

One project was completed last fall after ten years of work and planning—the Pimon Pipeline, which supplies water to about 35 residents of that community.

The SCS provided some funds for the project, and RC&D was instrumental in obtaining a low interest loan and grant from the Farmer's Home Administration to make the pipeline a reality.

Assistance from RC&D was a factor in obtaining medical services for the village of Cloudercroft, laying out a baseball field and track in Capitan, paving of the road to White Oaks and establishing Valley of Fires as a state park, as well as establishing the informative nature trail within the facility.

The most recent success for RC&D came Friday, when drillers at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School struck water. The project, which also was cost-shared with the SCS, will allow for a 100 percent expansion to the Fort Stanton Farm, through an improved irrigation system.

Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado and farm foreman Jimmy McTeigue said the well produced about 200 gallons per minute during a four-hour period. Both said the supply would be ample for the planned irrigation project.

The mentally retarded clients of Fort Stanton raise corn, milo, a few Christmas trees, and pasture pigs, a cow, chickens and rabbits at the farm, which provides both educational and therapeutic benefits, Delgado said.

Projects such as this may be cost-shared from 50 to 80 percent by the SCS, Ramsey said. But securing of easements and labor are counted toward the individual's (or in this case, the institution's) share.

At Fort Stanton, digging of the trench and installation of the pipeline system will count toward their share of the cost, Ramsey said.

Current ongoing projects include an attempt by the Carrizozo Woman's Club to establish a railroad museum in that town. A Southern Pacific railroad car has been obtained to house the museum, and old railroad artifacts and a site for the museum are being sought.

Another current project is the attempt to have the Wortley Hotel reopened. Ramsey has been meeting with state agencies and local townspeople to determine how the reopening can be accomplished. The board of regents of the Museum of New Mexico, is looking into possible lease agreements or sale of the hotel.

Ramsey is also working on a project to obtain electrical services for residents of the area above Bonito Lake. One possibility is an "appropriate technology" grant, which might be available from the state Energy and Minerals Department. The grant may be used to construct a small hydro-electric plant for the 15 to 20 residents.

The future of RC&D, least at the federal level, is in some doubt. Ramsey said budget cuts may be proposed which would mean no cost sharing monies would be available for 1982. But at this point, no one is certain whether the funding cuts will be approved by Congress.

Meanwhile, on the state level, RC&D's goals and methods have been lauded by Governor Bruce King, who called upon the organization for help in drafting a state Rural Development Plan.

RC&D representative were appointed to the governor's Rural Development Council, from which committees were formed to explore different aspects of

rural development for inclusion in the state plan.

Former president Jimmy Carter had asked the states to initiate a rural development policy, and "RC&D was asked to be the lead organization" to accomplish the task, Ramsey said.

"The idea behind it was to target federal monies and grants to the areas needed—to set statewide priorities and avoid the shotgun approach," Ramsey said.

A statewide plan was accepted by the council at a recent meeting in Santa Fe, he added, and "RC&D will be the mechanism or organization which individuals, or groups will work through for any rural project where state or federal monies are involved."

Thus, RC&D will be an "important entity in initiating the state Rural Development Plan," Ramsey said.

Sponsoring agencies of the South Central Mountain RC&D include the village of Ruidoso, Lincoln and Otero County commissions, City of Alamogordo, as well as the Otero, Carrizozo, Upper Hondo and Claunch-Pinto Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The council meets every six weeks, with the meetings rotated among the communities in the two-county area.

Public attendance of RC&D meetings is encouraged, since "Local people are the key" to the group's success, according to its proponents.


"Local people provide the leadership and set the direction for RC&D activities," Ramsey said. "Teamwork among the people and the public agencies assisting them is what makes an RC&D area a success."



Local RC&D meetings feature friendly "down home" atmosphere

The dry language used by bureaucrats to define the nature of Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) has its limitations.

True, that language mentions the fact that RC&D is a "People program" — a group of local citizens working together to solve local problems. But even that description falls short of the mark.

A picture is said to be worth 1,000 words, and in the case of attempting to understand "What is RC&D?", attending a meeting of the South Central Mountain Council is probably worth 10,000 words about group dynamics and interpersonal relationships.

The "down home" atmosphere of the local council meeting is closer to that of a family reunion than a gathering of government agency representatives.

A recent meeting, held in the combination bar and banquet room of the Four Winds Restaurant in Carrizozo, was typical of others in its friendly informality. As the members began arriving, chairman Clem Weindorf of Hondo began to circulate through the crowd, shaking hands, greeting each person by (first) name with a personalized welcome.

The meeting was called to order as Weindorf rapped on the table, using a handy ashtray as a gavel.

"It's a pleasure — and I really mean it, people — to see so many of you turn out for

this meeting," he began.

An invocation prayer was offered by Howard Shanks of Capitan, who offered thanks for the safe return of the American hostages.

The program for the meeting was a presentation on the operation of Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, by administrator (and RC&D secretary) Mark Delgado.

As the presentation ended, Weindorf thanked Delgado for providing the information and slide show and reminded him that, "Anytime we can help you, you just holler — that's what RC&D is here for."

As the meeting went on, the group was advised that one of the members had recently suffered a heart attack. An address was obtained so that members could send cards of encouragement to the victim.

"I just can't help but think that RC&D is one big family," chairman Weindorf observed. "And when one of us stubs his toe and is hurting, I think we all hurt a little."

The meeting also provided the various agency representatives the opportunity to renew friendships and catch up on each others professional and personal news. Jokes are told, backs are slapped and stories swapped. A recent request for assistance with a project to reopen the

Wortley Hotel was accompanied by the reading of a poem.

The council was formed to conserve and develop the country's natural resources. But the group never loses sight of the one resource which determines the success of any project measure they undertake — the human element.

They tackle such diverse problems as farmland irrigation, mineral development, lumber production, erosion control, housing for the poor, obtaining medical services for small communities, cleanups of cemeteries and highway improvements.

But in all these projects, the essential element of success is the human element — the collective skill, energy and willingness to work toward shared goals which is found in abundance among members of the council.

"When the chips are down, you can always bank on people to take care of things," Weindorf said. "We can't underestimate the tremendous resource we have in the ingenuity of our people in solving problems."

Through their work, and the spirit of unity which pervades that work, the group has demonstrated many times the true nature of their operation.

The South Central Mountain RC&D Council is a group of people who care about the Earth — and each other.


Jeff Anstey State DAR essay winner

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RHS graduate superintendent of one room Washington school

A Ruidoso High School graduate, Sue Weaver White, now a resident of Onion Creek, Washington, is helping to keep alive the concept of the one room schoolhouse, along with the fundamental "three R's" teaching methods normally associated with such schools. White is currently serving as superintendent of the Onion Creek School District, a post to which she was elected in 1979. The 39 elementary students of the district all attend the one-room Onion Creek School, which was established in 1917. Late last year, the district approved a bond issue to build a new school, but the one-room educational concept will be retained as much as possible in the design, according to White. Onion Creek School teacher Dina Walsh, interviewed in the Colville, Washington, Statesman-Examiner, said the traditions of the one-room school are being maintained. "Because of the nature of the one-room concept, there's a lot more involvement," Walsh said. "There's a lot of helping here." "When some of the students finish their assignments, they will help the younger ones. They learn to relate with one another." "To me, this is the way a school system should be — a place where older kids help the younger ones and vice-versa," she added.

Other unusual aspects of the Onion Creek School include publication by the students of their own recipes, in a book entitled "Onion Creek Secrets." Another project is planned which will involve the students in researching the history of the area. Third graders at the school also produce "The Friday News," a monthly publication. The most unique aspect of the school's education program, White wrote recently, is the reading program. Rather than using a standard reading series for each grade, the school has "an individualized reading program centered around the library." "The children are then able to choose reading that reflects their interest and ability," she added. The second of the "three R's" — writing — is also taught in an unusual manner. "The children write a daily journal, and the teachers take many of their spelling words from mistakes they make in their writing," White said. "They don't have a list of words but take sentence tests, which makes spelling instinctive instead of just memory work." A workbook math series allows the children to work at their own speed, and White said the children are naturally competitive, although teachers do not promote the competition. Each child must prove competence in an area before moving on to the next step, she said. Science and social studies courses are "done by the whole school at the same time with projects age-and-interest-oriented. The children do a lot of their own planning," White said. "It takes very dedicated teachers, a very involved community and a lot of volunteer labor to keep a school like ours going, but it is well worth it," she said. Sue and Bill White are 1968 graduates of Ruidoso High School and 1972 graduates of New Mexico State University. 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Warriors beat Cobre, but get tripped by Tularosa

Ruidoso's cage Warriors earned a bye in the upcoming district tournament Saturday night with a 62-57 win over Cobre here, in a game that came down to who could shoot best from the free throw line.

Ruidoso had a chance to win the first seed Friday night against district rival Tularosa, but the shoe was on the other foot and the Warriors were outshot from the charity stripe in a 78-71 upset.

The weekend win and loss gives the Warriors an 8-2 district record, good enough for first place and an all-important bye in the first round of the district tour-

ament.

Even though the Warriors claimed the coveted top spot, head coach Barry Nelson admitted to a bit of disappointment.

"I was kinda disappointed," he said. "We didn't even look like us there a few times."

How true. The Warriors committed numerous turnovers, played poor defense and shot extremely poorly (including a 25 percent night against Tularosa).

But Nelson said the lackluster performances came at the best time.

"If we had to have two bad games, this

was the time to have them," he said. "We're sort of in a slump, but I think we'll pull out of it. I think the team realizes what they have to do, and I think they'll do it."

They didn't do it over the weekend.

The Warriors had their hands full with the pesky Cobre Indians, who pulled to within one point at 58-57 with 47 seconds remaining after the Warriors seemed to have the game in hand.

But a long perfect pass from Glenn Ryan to Rodney Thomason resulted in an easy two points for a 60-57 Warrior advantage, and it seemed the Warriors were in control when Ryan was fouled. But he missed his free throws.

Then Ruidoso's Bill Richardson was called for a foul with 19 seconds left. Cobre's Bobby Parra stepped to the line with hopes of pulling Cobre to within one point but missed the front end of the one and one.

Warrior Rodney Thomason grabbed the rebound and was fouled. He did not miss the charity tosses, and that accounted for the final score.

That culminated a game the Warriors led most of the way, including holding a 10 point edge at halftime.

The difference was a 23 of 34 performance from the foul line by the Warriors, compared to 15 of 22 for Cobre.

Ryan and Thomason were high scorers with 20 each, followed by Gary Jones with 10, Scott Neal and Richardson with four apiece, and Gene Reeves and Wade Wilson with two each.

If the Warriors thought they had their hands full on Saturday, Friday they had a Wildcat by the tail — and Tularosa came out on top.

"We had a mental letdown, and Tulle played the best they can play," Nelson said. "They made adjustments to what we did to them (the first time the two teams played) completely turning their offense around."

"We didn't defense 'em very well."

One of the largest crowds ever to assemble in Warrior Gymnasium watched the Wildcats take it to Ruidoso. Tularosa led the whole way, including a 13 point edge early in the fourth quarter.

But the Warriors battled back with a 32 point fourth quarter, eventually pulling to within three points with 4:19 left. Six straight Tularosa points, however, put the Warriors back to a deficit they never recovered from.

The difference proved to be Tularosa's performance from the free throw line. The Warriors outscored the Wildcats 62-60 from the field, but Tularosa hit an astounding 80 percent from the charity stripe, making 18 of 22 tries. The Warriors hit eight of 16 free throws.

Thomason was high scorer with 21, followed by Ryan with 17, Jones with 16, Wilson with six, Reeves with four and Neal with two.

Tularosa's big man, Bill Turner, was held to a relatively low 18 points, but it was unheralded Wildcat Chris Cerny who wound up with scoring honors, collecting 26 points, including seven critical free throws in the final period.

"We didn't shoot well at all, either game," Nelson said. "I'd have to say we weren't mentally prepared, and we didn't play very smart at all. We played bad and beat Cobre and came close to beating Tularosa. The games went down to free throws, but they shouldn't have."

The Warriors, by virtue of the win over Cobre, now own an 8-2 district mark and a 16-6 overall record. They'll play the winner of the Silver City-T or C game in the second round of the district tourney, to be played in Silver City.

Though the Warriors won't play until Friday (the tourney begins Thursday), Ruidoso is heading for Silver City on Thursday.

"We're going to go down and relax, watch the other teams play," Nelson said. "This week we're going to work on defense, learn how to control the boards again. I think we've been concentrating too much on offense and not enough on defense, so we'll work on that this week. We're going to work on everything, just concentrate more on defense."

Sportin' Life

To be completely frank, I wasn't expecting to write this column.

No, there's nothing wrong with me (though in some quarters there's considerable debate on that statement), I'm referring to what's following.

Last year — about this time even — I wrote a column, lambasting one of our legislators for trying to get a bill passed which would require all state universities to restrict 50 percent of their athletic scholarships to New Mexico residents only.

(The representative — John Bigbee — has in his district, part of Lincoln County, by the way.)

Anyway, Governor Bruce King wisely vetoed the bill, in what was one of his few wise moments of 1980. I figured that would be the end of it.

But never say die in the world of politics. Guess who has re-introduced the bill into this session of the Legislature?

There are many reasons against having such a standard in this state. The main one has to do with population.

Figure, on the average, a state can get about six blue chippers out of every million people in the state. That means New Mexico will produce, with 1.3 million folks, seven or eight top notch football players, tops.

(Six per million is based on the numbers of blue chippers out of Texas, California and other well-populated states, divided into the states' population. Do it from year to year, and who nuff, it's about six per.)

There's now a limit of 30 scholarships per year, per school. Figure five schools in this state — times 30 — equals 150. Half of 150 is 75, not six. So 69 players are not going to be the best you could get.

Now, of course, a school could, quite possibly, spread this limit throughout the rest of the athletic department, offering scholarships to tennis players, swimmers, gymnasts, wrestlers, baseball players, and so on, keeping most of the recruitment in football and basketball.

But there's a problem there. Do you think most New Mexico schools could recruit and attract excellent football players, without the lure of a full scholarship? No way.

Colorado had a law similar to this a few years ago. They got around it by accepting "donations" from alumni to help meet the cost of football players' education — and that's asking for trouble. It's called an NCAA investigation.

I can understand Bigbee's intentions — he doesn't think it's fair to the taxpayers of New Mexico to pay tuition and books for a kid from Ohio. I'll agree with him, sort of.

But I submit it's not fair to the taxpayers of New Mexico to not produce the best athletic teams possible, because better teams mean better attendance, and better attendance means bigger gates, and bigger gates means more money.

Not to mention the fact New Mexico gets a plug from the kids who come here — and, like most of us, they came here. (How many native New Mexicans do you know?)

There's one other little problem here. Does a legislature (not just New Mexico's, but any legislature) have the right to dictate where someone may or may not go to school?

And, even if New Mexico passes such a law, other states haven't. They aren't limiting themselves to such ideas. If they did, only California, Texas, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Florida and New York could make it.

And, when this state loses its best quarterback prospect (Jim Everett of Eldorado) to Purdue, a good center (Bill Turner of Tularosa) to UTEP, and other good players sign elsewhere, what are you going to do? I mean, there's two of the six bluechippers right there.

(Bill Faneill of Raton, possibly the best fullback in the state last year, is going to New Mexico State, but that's only because Notre Dame never called back.)

At this point in time, the state of New Mexico gets the leftovers. The best players in the country are recruited by the top football schools — Notre Dame, USC, Texas, Oklahoma, Ohio State, Penn State, Michigan, Arkansas, etc. Once they decide who they'll play with, New Mexico has to take what it can get.

Not to say New Mexico doesn't have quality athletes — I didn't say that. I said the best, the absolute cream of the crop, usually sign with schools other than New Mexico. Wyoming, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Rhode Island, Connecticut also aren't real high on the list of schools favored by the top players. And then having no scholarships would just make it worse.

So, to Honorable Representative John Bigbee, give it up, man. Your bill would mean the death of major college athletics in New Mexico.

And to our beloved (?) governor, the Honorable Bruce King, kill that bill. Please.





Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — If you owned a building you wanted to lease and an advisor on the matter said, "This is a horrible deal," would you accept it?

That's what has happened with the structure here which was once occupied by St. Vincent Hospital in Santa Fe.

We taxpayers are the owners, and as far back as late February of this year an analyst for the Legislative Finance Committee used the words quoted above about the deal which was being considered for use of this property.

Let's take a moment's pause and go back over the history of this arrangement. Who got took by whom? Why is there so much obscurity about what should be a relatively simple lease?

Are the Presbyterians trying to rip off the State of New Mexico, or is the State of New Mexico trying to put one over on the Presbyterian church?

Those, you see, are the parties to this lease — and we taxpayers had better keep an eye on both of them.

Late in 1978, shortly before the present administration took office, the state, on advice of the Legislative Finance Committee, bought this piece of land and the buildings on it. Evidently there were those who thought it might be of use to the state.

But once the King administration came into power, everything to do with the property ground to a halt. Nobody even wanted to admit we owned it.

It stood idle, month after month, with the only money changing hands that we paid for watchmen to patrol the area.

Came 1981, this year — a long time later. Senator Alex Martinez, who represents a

district which includes a large part of Santa Fe county, kept insisting that the building be put to some use.

Senator Martinez is, in the present Legislature, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, through which all bills which have so much as a dollar in appropriations must pass.

Suddenly, therefore, we get from the Kings on the fourth floor a plan for the use of the old hospital.

We will strike a deal with Presbyterian Medical Services to make the old St. Vincent Hospital into a home for the elderly, they said.

Is the property apt for such a use? Probably not. At least Representative Fred Mondragon, a man with a degree in hospital administration, suggests not.

Is the lease a valid one? It may not be. At least attorneys for those who would like to see the property used for other and more lucrative projects observe that. (The administration, as it turns out, has no power to lease anything for more than 20 years, and it seems the lease they are thinking might hold with Presbyterian Medical Services is really more than two decades in duration.)

And there's always that analysis made for the Legislative Finance Committee, the group which really set this whole play into motion.

Back in February of this year, Curt Porter, after looking over the whole deal, said he would "unequivocally state that this lease is a horrible deal for the state of New Mexico and a great deal for Presbyterian Medical Services."

Is that clear?

Our building — the one we citizens own — is being let out in such fashion that we lose and somebody else gains.

Why?

If that question occurs to you, ask the King administration.

It appears the network would seek another time slot, if indeed the popularity of "60 Minutes" has led to the demise of the "Wonderful World."

It seems a shame the public would lose a program simply because it is wholesome entertainment. — News-Bulletin, Belem

FEMALE DOCTORS

A couple of generations ago, female doctors were very rare. Even a few decades past, there were still not many women in medicine. This though the profession of healing appears to be a natural outlet for certain qualities long associated with women: tenderness, compassion, an exceptional concern for life presumably rooted in the maternal instinct.

It is thus gratifying that the number of female doctors is swiftly on the rise. This is graphically shown in the fact, reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, that during the 1970s the percentage of women among entering medical students more than tripled.

Only 9.2 per cent of new medical students 10 years ago were women. In 1979-80, the Journal reports, the figure was 28 per cent. It is of interest, too, that an increasing percentage of women are taking their residencies in family practice and obstetrics-gynecology. This, as well as the growing general trend toward more women in medicine, is a healthful development. — Alamogordo Daily News

In view of statements made by Carrizozo officials several months ago, indicating strong interest by them in having the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport located near Carrizozo, it is understandable why the Ruidoso trustees last week took no action on Carrizozo's request for membership on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC).

However, at that same meeting Ruth Armstrong, Carrizozo councilman, stated that Carrizozo, as a member of SBAC, would support all phases of SBAC's efforts to locate a new airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Should a reversal of Carrizozo's desire to have this regional airport located at Carrizozo indeed be true, then perhaps their application for SBAC membership should be reviewed by the Ruidoso trustees.

A written statement of total support of SBAC, and a pledge that Carrizozo would actively participate in SBAC's efforts, in addition to payment of back dues since SBAC has been collecting them from the other entities involved, would certainly be in order coming officially from the Town of Carrizozo and signed by the mayor and councilmen.

This pledge of support should be total and without loopholes to enable them to avoid complete cooperation with SBAC.

Though the recent announcement that New Mexico State University has agreed to let the Secretary of the Interior decide if the airport can be built on the mesa is encouraging, this area will still have to be united in efforts to secure this airport.

It's possible that SBAC just might need all the help they can get when the airport situation gets down to the final stages of approval and having the unqualified support of Carrizozo for this airport certainly couldn't be considered a liability. We trust Carrizozo will pursue this course. — CD

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: The Fonz tackled his toughest task on the 'Happy Days' set when he had to talk a desperate teenager out of taking his own life. "He seemed a very desperate young man with no one to talk to but one of his TV heroes," says **Henry Winkler**, who plays the 'Happy Days' character. "It made me feel good to know that I might have saved his life. But I would really like to know what happened to him." Winkler was rehearsing for his hit TV series at the Paramount Studios when he got an urgent phone call from police in Indianapolis. "A police officer told me an 18-year-old man had taken a drug overdose and was threatening to take more pills unless I spoke to him," Winkler says. The star agreed to talk with the desperate youngster and for 40 minutes he kept up a life-or-death conversation as anxious 'Happy Days' colleagues clustered around. "I just told him everything that came into my mind." ... Actress **Linda Kelsey** got knocked "about 10 feet into the air" when a van backed into a barricade that had been placed near her during shooting of the 'Lou Grant' TV series. "Her wrist was broken in two places and she bruised some ribs," said her spokesman **Esme Chandler**.

TV BACKSTAGE Emmy winner **Ed Asner** tells me his TV life as newspaper executive Lou Grant owes quite a bit to the press. "When we started the series, we weren't that good. It was embarrassing. We would probably have failed if we hadn't been supported by helpful comments from the critics." "Price Is Right" host **Bob Barker** reckons he has dished out more than \$40 million as a game show host. But the job has its problems. "I've been kicked, punched and even knocked to the ground by winners," he says. Success has turned sour for lovely **Victoria Principal**. First it cost her husband, and, if he wins his claim for alimony and half her fortune, it will cost her millions. Victoria, who plays Bobby Ewing's wife Pamela in the hit series 'Dallas,' is really a tough lady who clawed her way to fame and the money it brings. But actor husband **Christopher Skinner**, 10 years younger than 32-year-old Victoria, wants half of all her assets, plus alimony, according to friends. And, under California law, he's entitled to it. One source told me, "Victoria is the rich half of the family and the divorce could cost her millions of dollars." That's part of the penalty of big 'Dallas' rewards. "When **Larry Hagman** began demanding more money, Victoria asked for more too," the insider says. "She knows she's essential to the show, so her pay doubled to \$50,000 a show. That's \$650,000 plus a cut of all the spin-off products, which probably gives her around a million bucks a year in all. There will be millions more as the show picks up syndication."

TV CLOSEUP Cheryl Campbell, star of the upcoming 'Seven Days' mystery, bewildered by the sights of New York, let alone the heights, went overboard and bought a three-piece living room suite and other art deco objects during her sightseeing spree. The Mobil Showcase special to be seen March 5 is the first **Agatha Christie** made-for-television program to be seen in the U.S. **Maureen Garrett**, who's captured the hearts of viewers over the last four years as Holly Norris on 'Guiding Light,' has left the show to pursue work in Los Angeles. Her character, Holly, has also left town on the show to make things easier for her ex-hubby Ed.
