THE NEW HOLLYWOOD WELL produced a steady 701 gallons-per-minute (gpm) during test pumping Thursday and Friday. The static water level is 30 feet in the 185 foot well and the drawdown was 23 feet at 701 gpm production. At this rate the well could deliver just over one million gallons of water in 24 hours. The photographer sampled the water and pronounced it odorless and good tasting.

Wildfire tape available now from ComFIRE

A slide-cassette tape program on "How To Protect Forest Homes From Wildfire" prepared by the United States Forest Service, will be made available to service clubs in the area under the sponsorship of the Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE).

The program outlines safeguards which can be implemented by people living near forested areas to reduce the chances their homes will be damaged or destroyed by fire.

The program lasts about 20 minutes and will be available to any groups asking to view it, Rich Sealey, ComFIRE member, said. The tape may be reserved by contacting ComFIRE Chairman Herb Brunell at 257-2911 or 257-5285.

Bill Hirschfeld said folding signs which would alert travelers that a Red Flag Fire Alert is in effect, are now in the Roswell office of the New Mexico Highway Department.

"They said they may not get around to putting them up for awhile, so we will try to do it ourselves before April 1," Hirschfeld said.

The signs, similar in style to the signs used to warn skiers that chains are required to drive to the ski areas, are red and white and carry the message "Red Flag Fire Alert."

Signs will be placed at all entrances to Ruidoso and at several locations on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Apaches gain approval for bus service

Permanent authority to operate a bus service between the Inn of the Mountain Gods and the Alamogordo Airport was given to the Mescalero Apache Tribe Thursday, following a hearing with the State Corporations Commission (SCC) at the Inn.

The service, which has never been provided, will be managed by William Smith, general manager of the Inn since May, 1980.

Smith said the Inn's current expansion plans include the addition of 116 guest rooms and a convention/conference center that could accommodate 600 people. "We are expanding our convention business and we have many couples who fly as close to Ruidoso as possible." That, he said, usually means they fly into Alamogordo and the Inn provides transportation to the resort.

Because Ruidoso Municipal Airport cannot receive large aircraft, the need for such a service is established, Smith added.

FOUR PROPOSITIONS ON \$1.67 MILLION BOND ISSUE

Special election Tuesday

Four bond propositions, and a proposal to grant the village authority to lease the Municipal Swimming Pool, appear on tomorrow's special election ballot.

The polls, with all precincts voting at the Ruidoso Public Library, will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The bonding issues are:
PROPOSITION 1 — Providing the Volunteer Fire Department with up to \$250,000 for improvements.

The firemen want to purchase two 750 gallon-per-minute pumper trucks, completely equipped, and build two 18x35-foot fire stations to house the pumpers. The trucks are priced at about \$75,000 each and

the fire stations at about \$50,000 each, including building lots.

PROPOSITION 2 — Providing the street department with up to \$600,000 for equipment and the cost of applying basecourse on approximately 40 miles of unsurfaced streets, and to lay down a blacktop mat on about five miles of streets.

The street department would purchase a 15 yard capacity diesel truck for \$50,000 and a seven yard capacity truck for \$20,000 with part of the bond money. The balance would include \$357,000 for basecourse application and \$163,000 for the blacktop project.

PROPOSITION 3 — Providing the solid waste department with up to \$170,000 for equipment.

The department needs to replace a side loading refuse pickup truck that was destroyed by fire; and would also purchase 500 one-and-a-half yard and 100 three yard dumpsters, for residential and commercial use.

PROPOSITION 4 — Providing up to \$650,000 to the police department to renovate the present village hall into a new jail/judicial complex.

The new building, which would meet state code, would provide nine single occupancy cells for males, two single

occupancy cells for females and one padded cell. Also included would be quarters for municipal and magistrate courts, a new radio room, training, meeting and briefing rooms, a room for emergency headquarters operations, plus a new system to contain prisoners through the booking process, to putting them in cells and conducting them to court. The building is designed to serve the village's needs for the next 10 to 15 years.

The building is so designed as to permit adding another cell block on the north, and adding rooms to the south, when necessary without having to acquire additional property.

Ashes cause grass fires; fine levied

A grass fire which broke out about 9:40 a.m., Saturday morning consumed about one-fourth acre, in an area just east of Rainbow Lake on Carrizo Canyon Road, according to Steve Makowski of the Smokey Bear Ranger District.

Cause of the fire appeared to be dumping of fireplace ashes, according to Butch Jacobs of the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department.

Another grass fire caused by dumping of ashes was reported about 8 a.m., Friday on Brady Canyon Drive. Only about a ten-foot square area was burned, Jacobs said. Gladys M. Dendy, Lorenzo, Texas, was cited for dumping the ashes and fined \$100 by Judge Sam Nunnally.

Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet at 7 tonight at the municipal building. Agenda items include Resolution 81-4, dealing with personnel and wages and a number of announcements.

Village seeks authority to lease swimming pool

The fifth measure on Tuesday's special election ballot involves the possibility of the village leasing the swimming pool to private enterprise.

The background of this issue includes: December 30, 1980 — Ralph Rush, Ruidoso, appeared before the village trustees to ask that he be permitted to lease the Municipal Swimming Pool, to operate it as a private business. At this meeting Rush advised the trustees he would underwrite up to \$1,000 of the cost of a special election to decide this question.

January 27 — The village trustees were advised by legal counsel that the voters must grant the village authority to lease the pool to private enterprise.

Should the voters approve this measure, the village would be empowered to lease the swimming pool property should they desire to. Voter approval is necessary before the village can even draw up terms for a lease and advertise the property as being open to leasing.

Figures provided by village clerk Jim

Hine show the cost of operating the pool, paid out of the general fund, the past three seasons:

1978 — \$6,100.

1979 — No cost to the village, but the county provided a \$1,500 grant to help defray operating expenses.

1980 — \$3,400.

Rush's operating proposals include:
— Increasing the water temperature in the pool to promote usage.

— Lower overall rates for swimming, by establishing a monthly charge and through the use of rainchecks.

— Payments to the village for the lease, as opposed to expenditures from the general fund to operate it.

— Adding a water flume and water rapid rides, as a tourist attraction and to add to the village's recreational opportunities.

— Provide the school with swimming pool facilities by a private party.

— Increased safety and operational efficiency.

— Addition of solar heaters for water

heating.

— Increased maintenance and pool upkeep.

— Because of better heating, pool use hours would be extended.

— The village could control the pool's operation through strict leasing terms.

Pfeffer cleared of estray charge

District Judge George Zimmerman Thursday dismissed a charge of "removal of estray" against Ruidoso police detective David Pfeffer, saying "the court finds that there was not a commission of a criminal act," in the case.

Pfeffer told The News Friday he and his attorney Gary Mitchell, also of Ruidoso, are discussing the possibility of civil action as a result of "the abuses" that Pfeffer and his family have suffered since the charges were filed.

Zimmerman granted Mitchell's motion to dismiss the case after hearing only one witness—Lincoln County livestock inspector Carrol Durbin.

The charges stemmed from an incident in March, 1980. Pfeffer alleged that he found a sick calf in the middle of Highway 37 near Bonito Lake. He said he placed the calf, which was unable to stand, in his patrol car and notified area law enforcement personnel of his actions.

Pfeffer took the calf to his home, where it later died. The charges were filed by a special prosecutor for the District Attorney's office at the request of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Mitchell argued that Pfeffer was within his authority as a police officer and deputy for Lincoln, Otero and Chaves Counties in removing the animal.

After finding the animal, Pfeffer contacted Captain police officer Randy Spears and later, magistrate judge Jim Wheeler, who advised the detective to get in touch

with the local cattle inspector, Mitchell said.

Durbin said he was advised of the situation about 9 a.m., on the day following the incident. He said he went to Pfeffer's home and examined the calf, told Pfeffer the animal was "going to die." He said he had "dealt with baby calves before, and I can tell you two weeks before if they're going to die."

He said the calf's "nose was cold," and described it as "unhealthy."

He said he determined the following day that the calf belonged to Harvey Tally, an area rancher. Durbin testified that Tally told him "the calf had been sick . . . that they'd had a lot of problems with it. We visited a little bit, and everything seemed to be fine."

Headed "there was not any violation of livestock law that I could determine."

Durbin also testified that he had met previously with officers of the Ruidoso Police Department and "told them they could pick up estray and then contact me."

Following Zimmerman's ruling, Pfeffer said "I think justice prevailed. There was no reason to bring charges in the first place. I'm glad it's over with and I'm glad the truth was brought to the surface for my family's sake and my sake."

"For the last year, I have suffered mental and verbal abuse in my job and personal life, and my children have suffered abuse over it."

He added he felt the ruling would "take some of the pressure off as far as the (Ruidoso Police) department is concerned."

Blood appeal nets 147 pints

For the first time in three years, Ruidosians gave more than 100 pints of blood in a single drive Wednesday, in a campaign sponsored by the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary and the Ruidoso High School Student Council.

The drive is held in cooperation with United Blood Services (UBS), El Paso, the agency that supplies about 60 pints of blood per month to the local hospital.

Dottie Quaid, Auxiliary spokesperson, said "147 pints were received here Wednesday. We would never have had this kind of response without the help of the high school students," since 72 pints of blood were drawn from them.

"In addition, they did all the preliminary work, including calling all our former donors, publicity, recruiting of new donors and providing refreshments," Quaid added.

"We wish to apologize to those who had such a long wait to give blood. We have figured out a way to alleviate that bug in our next drive in May, so please don't give up on us," she said.

The goal for the drive was 150 pints. "We would have reached that goal except we had 16 rejects, which is very high for the number of donors we had," Quaid said. Quaid attributed the problems to winter flu bugs and colds, which have caused many

people to be taking antibiotics. "We feel sure the May 18 blood drive will have many less people rejected."

Gabe Silva, donor recruitment coordinator for UBS, said Ruidoso has an abundance of Type O positive blood — 44 percent of all blood collected in Ruidoso is of that type. Other blood types and the percentage collected locally include: A positive, 29 percent; A negative and B positive, seven percent each; O negative, six percent; AB positive, four percent; AB negative, two percent; and B negative, one percent.

"This is about how much of each type of blood we provide to the hospital here also," Silva said. "It usually works out that way."

Donations are made by only four percent of the year around population, based upon a head count of 5,000.


"True, there are many people too old to donate, and many who, for one reason or another, can't donate. But, there are a lot more who could donate and don't," Silva said.

"For those who are curious—the seniors won the contest, and will get an extended lunch period one day for recruiting the most donors," Quaid said. "Competition was hot between them and the juniors for awhile, but finally the juniors conceded defeat."

Two CSB walkaways sentenced

Two former Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) inmates were convicted Thursday of "escape from an inmate release program," and sentenced to three-year terms, with one year suspended for one of the men.

Frank Cottone, who walked off his work release program in Ruidoso on March 6, 1980, was sentenced to three years, to be served consecutively with the term he was already serving for fraud. He was apprehended in Florida in August, 1980.

Cottone's attorney, Tim Quigley, Ruidoso, asked that District Judge George Zimmerman "make the punishment fit the crime," in his client's case. He asked the court to suspend all but five months of the sentence to compensate for his five months absence.

He told the court that, as a result of the escape, Cottone had already had all his "good time" erased, which set his possible parole date back three years.

Quigley said Cottone had taken his wife and her child to Florida, where he worked at various food service jobs and contributed to the support of his elderly parents. A letter from Cottone's mother was also submitted to the judge for consideration.

Quigley also cited Cottone's clear conduct record in the penitentiary and at CSB, his participation in the "Concerned Convicts for Youth," and his attendance at Bible study classes and college courses while incarcerated.

Assistant District Attorney Jay Rosenthal argued that it was his understanding that Cottone's wife "did not go to Florida of her own free will," and pointed out that Cottone was apprehended in Florida and charged with grand theft. He said those charges were waived because of pending extradition of Cottone back to New Mexico.

Another inmate, Henry Bob Martin, was sentenced to three years imprisonment, with one year suspended, to be served consecutively with his present term. He was reported missing from the camp in October, 1980.

His attorney, Dan Bryant of Ruidoso, cited Martin's participation in Bible study groups at CSB and his assistance in arranging a Christian seminar for convicts.

He said prison officials refused to let Martin attend the seminar because he wrote a "scathing letter" to them, complaining about the lack of recreational facilities at the camp. Martin was absent from the camp only 24 hours before returning voluntarily, Bryant said.

He argued that Martin's escape "stemmed directly from his disappointment at not being allowed to attend the seminar that he worked so hard to help arrange."

Both Cottone and Martin were to be returned to the state penitentiary to complete their terms.

State's farms increasing in number

The number of New Mexico farms increased by more than one-fourth from 1974 to 1978, said Bob Coppedge, Extension economist at New Mexico State University.

The average size of a farm decreased by about one-fifth in the same four years, despite a slight increase statewide in the total land in farms. These figures are from the 1978 Census of Agriculture, Coppedge said.

Most individual counties in the state reported changes in farm numbers and farm size that matched the state trend. In general, the number of farms increased more than the land in the farm increased, making the average farm size smaller.

Most of the farms in New Mexico, especially the new ones, are less than 50 acres in size; however, there were more farms reported in all size categories in the agricultural census.

The census also showed the number of persons who farm and also have occupations off the farm went up by almost two-third in the four-year period. This is continuing evidence of a trend where people prefer to live on a small farm and work in town, Coppedge said.

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Don't move furniture without try on paper.

Don't make a move with furniture, until you have tried your ideas on paper first. JoAnn Less, Extension housing specialist at New Mexico State University, said professional decorators and designers try all their ideas on paper before working with actual materials.

"Paper plans can save a lot of frustration when moving furniture," said Less who suggests using scaled paper cut-outs and graph paper ruled to one-quarter inch.

The specialist in house furnishings said the aim in furniture arranging is to achieve both beauty and function.

She offers a few furniture arranging tips that might be used in a new home or apartment, or simply to provide a new look in an already furnished dwelling.

Take accurate measurements of the room showing location of doors and windows. Indicate the direction each door opens, and note location of electrical outlets.

Next begin to work with furnishings. Measure each piece and have a paper cut-out representing it. If a piece will be purchased, make note of the location where it must fit.

Arrange paper furniture cut-outs in groups according to the way they will be used. Consider the activities in the room, such as eating, sleeping, studying, reading or listening to music.

Keep in mind the most often used portions of rooms and note the most likely routes to enter, leave and move about a room. These are called traffic patterns.

Place the largest pieces of furniture in the room first. Use the shape of the room to the best advantage for sofas, beds and dining tables. Then add smaller pieces.

Arrange furniture to follow the lines of the shape of the room. Place large pieces parallel to the walls. Furniture angled across corners wastes space.

Try to balance opposite sides of a room. A door, window or tall pieces of furniture may balance a large piece or group against the opposite wall. Wall accessories will also add balance.

Balance refers to the visual effect achieved when furniture groups are fairly evenly distributed around a room.

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Leagues have doubled in size in only second year

Soccer growing by leaps and bounds in Ruidoso

The only thing that's growing faster than the inflation rate is Ruidoso's Sertoma Soccer Association (RSSA).

Now completing its second year of existence, the RSSA is about to begin its fourth season of competition. (There are two seasons each year, one in the spring and one in the fall, if you're wondering how that's possible.)

The first season — fall, 1979 — there were 127 youngsters participating. This spring, Grantham has over 220 players signed up.

And there seems to be no end in sight. Grantham is preparing to organize a league in Capitan. That's expected to attract 75 to 100 more players, and he said there is considerable interest in the Hondo

Valley for a league. Those three leagues could later compete separately, or compete among themselves for an area championship, he said.

"This is incredible," he said. "Having over 100 kids in our first season was phenomenal, but to have over 200 two years later is just unbelievable."

The draft for the upcoming season was held Saturday morning, and the first games will be April 4. RSSA sponsors three separate leagues — under eight, under 12 and under 16 years of age. Last fall, there were 14 teams in the three age brackets.

There will probably be another team or two added this spring, Grantham indicated.

That's reason enough to be proud, but

Grantham is really proud of a yet unnamed team of under 16 year olds.

He formed the squad in response to a request by Frank Edmonds of Las Cruces, Grantham's counterpart there.

Edmonds and several other league directors were putting together a select league of top-notch teams, and would Grantham be interested in forming one?

The answer was a definite yes. The select league consists of six teams — Ruidoso, Alamogordo, El Paso, and three from Las Cruces.

Grantham coaches the squad, with assistance from Bob Gregson and Darin Sanchez. Those three selected the team members from the rosters of the RSSA under 16 league.

"Quite frankly, they were hand picked because we wanted the best team we could get together," Grantham said.

The other teams in the league are vastly more experienced than the Ruidoso squad, but in the long run that might be an aid.

Grantham's prediction on the outcome of the games — the first one, anyway — was pretty accurate. Deep Purple blew away the Ruidosans, 9-0.

"Deep Purple hasn't lost a game in two years," he said. "Those kids are as big as I am. We did okay in the first few minutes, but our starting goalie had to leave the game and they started scoring on us."

But, Grantham added, his squad never quit.

"They didn't even get discouraged," he said. "They went over and shook hands with the other team and said, 'We'll get 'em next time.'"

"You only get better by playing better teams," Grantham said. "I'd like to get some exposure for our kids. By playing other teams, kids they've never seen before, they learn a little something about what the game is all about."

The squad consists of Manuel Montano, Eduardo Gandarilla, Jeff Slatton, Mark Johnston, John Kirchner, Matthew Atwell,

Chuck Leeling, Greg Nunnally, Keith Pipkin, Mitchell Rhodes, Joe Bellinger, David Keaton, Gary Gregson, Marty Rose and 12 year old goalie Carl Lueras.

"I think we'll be underdogs every time we play," Grantham said. "Everyone else has been playing longer than us. I'm not looking at the scores as much as the experience."

"But I'd like to win." Incidentally, the team is all male, but not for chauvinistic reasons. It's a league specification which "we had nothing to do with," Grantham said.

The squad will have six games this spring. The first was Saturday here against Deep Purple of Las Cruces. Next action will be March 28 here against the Rowdies of Las Cruces, followed by away matches with the University Sting of Las Cruces April 4, a rematch with the Rowdies April 11 there, a home contest with the Sting April 25, and a concluding game with Deep Purple May 2 in Las Cruces.

The Ruidoso games are scheduled for 1 p.m. starts; the Las Cruces contests are all set for 12:45.

One of the main reasons Grantham was interested in getting a select team formed is due to the New Mexico Activities Association's (NMAA) new rulings on soccer. Beginning this fall, the NMAA is sponsoring a high school championship in soccer, as it does for football, basketball and other sports.

Grantham is hoping Ruidoso High School picks up the sport in another year or so, and then his select squad will have had a year's experience together.

Then there's the adult soccer leagues, for both men and women. Those are also in their second year of existence, and pre-season planning for the upcoming season has begun, Grantham said.

Well, regardless of what happens to soccer in Ruidoso, it's obvious it's not just a kick in the grass.

Seems the Cardinals didn't want to pay Daffy's (oops, 'scuse me, he didn't like that name) exorbitant salary demand, because he was too young for such monies.

Paul's feeling on the matter was, "I may be too young for the money, but I'm old enough to win games for 'em." So he wouldn't sign his contract until they met his demands.

His high salary demands? \$8,500 a year. Take that, Dave Winfield!

My hero and sports authority, Ira Bogard of Ruidoso Downs, told me Friday morning he knew Paul pretty well. They used to play golf together.

Speaking of golf, Ira won a tourney in Carlsbad last week — was the top man in his age bracket, anyhow.

He said it was pretty windy — so windy, in fact, that if he was teeing off with the wind at his back, he didn't have to swing the club.

If he was shooting into the wind, he said, you had to swing really hard. And then, duck.

Attaboy, Ira.

"To dream, the impossible dream..."

L. Ray Nunley, local football person and father of two Warrior pothead players, called me and told me about "the greatest dream I've ever had," he said.

Ray, for some reason, was playing football with his boys, Lon and Don — this is all in a dream, understand.

Anyway, they were all suited up in Warrior uniforms, and there they were, before a screaming crowd, playing this really tough team.

"But we played such awesome defense," Ray said, (he added he beat out Lon for the middle linebacker spot — definitely a dream) "we pushed them back so far they wound up in the bathroom, and on fourth down when they had to punt, one guy had to hold the bathroom door open."

Ray was so excited at that point he woke up, and he tried to go back to sleep so he could find out how the game turned out.

He was pretty happy about putting the other team into the bathroom — he was flushed with pride, you might say. And I guess the game was the Toilet Bowl, right?

Beginning of the End
Well, I read Friday morning the state of New Mexico has voted to make its universities give 25 percent of their athletic scholarships to in state students.

Governor Bruce King signed the bill into law Thursday. It was tacked onto the General Appropriations' Act.

The bill's sponsor, John Bigbee (who

represents part of Lincoln county, by the way) was disappointed the percentage wasn't higher. His original bill required 50 percent go to the in-staters.

Athletic officials were disappointed the bill passed at all.

"It's just a ridiculous, arbitrary rule put in by people who are really not aware of the problems of operating an athletic program," University of New Mexico (UNM) athletic director John Bridgers said. "They really don't have the welfare of the university at heart."

But, Bigbee countered, "We don't have real amateur athletics anymore in the colleges. If we're going to have pro teams, I don't think the taxpayer should be asked to pay if we don't use some of them for our own boys and girls."

"I don't think it's unreasonable. They (the schools) can still use 90 percent of their scholarship money on out of state athletes. They could use the rest on tiddlywinks here."

The law requires at least 25 percent of the full and partial athletic scholarships must go to New Mexico high school students. A school can meet the quota with partial scholarships to in state athletes and give the full scholarships to out of state students.

At first glance, Bridgers is making a tempest in a teapot, because last year, UNM had 27 percent of their scholarship athletes from New Mexico.

But, "I honestly think it's a bad proposal," Bridgers said. "I don't think it can do anything but hurt. We had 27 percent, but what if suddenly it came a year where there's a scarcity of athletic talent in the state? Then we've got 25 percent who aren't qualified."

"If necessary," Bigbee said, "They can get into less competitive leagues. When we're spending the taxpayers' money on these athletic scholarships, I think New Mexican athletes should have a higher priority. I think the percentage should have been higher."

Bridgers isn't the only one who's upset about it. New Mexico's small colleges were pretty hot too, because many of their athletes are from New Mexico. If UNM and New Mexico State have to "draft" more players from the state, then they have less to choose from.

Bridgers wrote King several times about the bill and spoke to him last week about vetoing the bill.

Fortunately, the bill does not go into effect until June 18, so the effects won't be felt until 1982 or so.

As you've read here — more than once — I agree with Bridgers.

Bigbee's bill means the death of major college athletics in the state of New Mexico. If the schools don't like it, he said, they can drop to "a less competitive league." Sound like a good idea? I don't think so either.

If you're as outraged by this bill as I am, write your legislators in Santa Fe, including Governor King, and let 'em know you don't like the way they handled this affair.

Let's go get 'em, gang.

SANTA FE — Is Joe Skeen dumb or smart?

Should he have come all the way out here from Washington to tell Republican legislators how to vote on that bill to designate Congressional districts?

If success measures the value of his trip, he lost. His fellow party members in the House left their meeting with him and went out to vote for what he is against.

Skeen didn't want that division which, after joining in marriage the unlikely combination of Bernalillo and Torrance counties, draws a line from the Colorado border all the way south to the vicinity of El Paso.

Why should he? The Skeens have lived in the southern part of the state for four generations. They know no more about the problems of Colfax, Union and Harding counties than those counties know about the Skeens.

Put simply, there is little community interest there.

Yet that is what House Republicans voted for.

Why?

That is what Skeen was asking in the caucus before the matter came to the House floor.

Evidently he was not very tactful in the way he handled the matter.

Skeen untactful? What else is new?

Joe didn't have tact when the people from the Second Congressional District sent him to Washington as their Congressman. Did they think he'd learn it on the banks of the Potomac in a matter of a few months?

Nobody who knows Joe expects him to be anything but butt-headed, but he also has a peculiar species of logic which runs through all he does.

That's why he was asking why his supposed friends in the Republican party should be out there running interference for a bill designed to serve the interests of

the Democrats in the southeastern corner of New Mexico.

Essentially he was asking his fellow Republicans what they were doing selling him up the river.

Among those Joe offended was Boyd Scott, Republican House member from Farmington. He hopes the districting plan Skeen opposes will open up a slot for a Republican Congressman from northwestern New Mexico.

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Sense & Nonsense

A reddish-orange glow illuminates the western sky over the semi-arid table of land which was once an ancient lake bed. The light, fast disappearing behind the mountain range, casts mysterious contrasts of shadow and brightness upon the large array of antennas which have been symmetrically arranged in the flat plain below. Large discs, the 27 carefully arranged antennas anxiously gaze heavenward, like eyes on some huge technological creature, scanning the stars and planets still unseen by the human eye. Their signals, sent to regions far beyond the outer reaches of their own galaxy, are echoed back from the unknown and processed through a vast computer network. The antennas shift, more signals are sent out, and more unknown echoes are returned.

No, this isn't a page out of Ray Bradbury's *Martian Chronicles*. In fact, this scene is an everyday occurrence at the VLA (Very Large Array) Radio Telescope Facility on the plains of San Augustin west of Socorro.

The VLA Radio Telescope is the largest radio telescope in the world and it is by far the world's largest astronomical instrument. Using radio waves, which can travel much farther distances than light waves, the antennas, arranged in a "Y" pattern which covers 21 square miles, send out signals deep into space. These signals "see" distant solar systems and galaxies

and relay the images back to earth, where computers process the data and produce radio maps of space. The entire system is operated by 11 computers which control the telescopes and store the information.

The largest of its kind, the VLA facility was also a rarity in federal government projects — it was built within the budget that was appropriated for it and needed no supplemental funding. Now this may not sound like much of a feat, but when you consider that construction began on the site December 4, 1972 and ended with dedication ceremonies on October 10, 1980, a period of eight years of high inflation, it is simply amazing and is a shining example of what can be done when a project director insists on fiscal responsibility as a primary goal.

There may also be another first at the VLA facility if one New Mexico state representative gets his way — cooperation between federal and state authorities to get a Visitors' Center built at the VLA site. State Representative James Lee Martin (R-Socorro) has introduced a bill in the New Mexico State Legislature which would have the state appropriate funds for the initial construction of the Visitors' Center, with the federal government assuming the continuing responsibility for care, updating, and general maintenance of the Center. Martin introduced the bill after he learned that although the federal government was awarding grants for studies and research at the facility, there was no money available for a visitors' center.

This is exactly the kind of legislation we need today in these times when everyone worries about the increasing cost of government and the question of whether the federal or state and local governments should shoulder the burden of funding for many projects. In the case of the VLA facility, it is entirely proper that the state, which wishes to exhibit the site as a source of pride and another symbol of New Mexico's role as scientific research leader in this nation, should put forth the small amount of funds for a Visitors' Center, after the VLA was built at a much larger cost by the federal government at no charge to the state. Getting federal spending under control requires that kind of voluntary cooperation by states to appropriate funds for projects that will benefit and enhance the image of the state.

The VLA Radio Telescope Facility is the largest, newest, most up-to-date technological tool that astronomers have today in probing the secrets of the universe. It is ironic, then, that an old idea — fiscal responsibility — was largely responsible for the completion of the facility, and that another old idea — cooperation — between the state and federal government, could be the key to building a Visitors' Center for the facility.

CRIME HYDRA

Prosecutors are portrayed as jubilant over the sentencing of five Southern California Mafia bosses convicted of such crimes as extortion and murder conspiracy. That is understandable. It was an arduous task to bring these scurvy characters to justice, and a feeling of elation is in order.

Wry experience raises a cautionary flag, however, when the prosecutors maintain that the convictions of these five will (in the words of one wire service account) "virtually wipe out La Cosa Nostra's Los Angeles operation." We do not quarrel with the predicted fact; doubtless the Mafia is badly crippled by having these criminal bosses put out of commission. But the blow may not be permanent, or even of much duration. History shows organized crime to be as tenacious and menacing as the mythical Hydra, which grew two new heads whenever one was lopped off. The Southern California Mafia has been struck a heavy blow. How long it is rendered helpless remains to be seen. — *Alamogordo Daily News*

Vote tomorrow! The polls, for all Ruidoso precincts, are in the Ruidoso Public Library and will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Three of the propositions, fire protection, street improvements and solid waste disposal will provide improved service, and added convenience, to village residents.

The last, Proposition 4, would provide a jail/judicial facility meeting the state code. The proposed building is so designed that it can be built on to, when necessary, without further land acquisition.

Should the voters turn down Proposition 4, state agencies that have condemned the present jail will probably order it closed — and soon.

Should the jail be closed, then the village would be forced to pay thousands of dollars monthly just to transport prisoners back and forth from the county jail at Carrizozo.

The general fund now supports the police, street and fire departments, library, Senior Citizens, parks and recreation, financial and administration, legislative and executive functions and ambulance service.

Should the village be forced to spend thousands of dollars monthly in prisoner transportation costs, that money would have to come from the general fund — meaning all of the services now funded would suffer severe budget cuts and some might be eliminated entirely.

Village officials say, due to the increase in Ruidoso's assessed valuation the past year, passage of these issues will not increase taxes noticeably, if at all. That's one factor worthy of consideration before you cast your ballot tomorrow. — CD

Ere the bugle blows . . . precisely at 1 p.m. . . . exactly 47 days from today . . . the ponies'll be off and running at Ruidoso Downs.



And then Harmony Valley can again hear tales of the big winners . . . few mention being big losers . . . as the long green returns.



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Irrigation taking on a new role

The necessity of irrigation is part of New Mexico's arid heritage. Centuries before the white man arrived, the Indians in New Mexico were using flood irrigation to grow corn. By 700 A.D., they had constructed a series of canals to carry water to their crops.

Today, researchers at New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Agricultural Experiment Station continue the age-old quest for improved irrigation methods.

The historical scarcity of water, now coupled with skyrocketing irrigation pumping costs, have relegated irrigation to the role of supplementing rainfall in crop production, said Dr. Theodore W. Sammis, an NMSU agricultural engineer. He said researchers, including

statisticians, economists, agronomists and agricultural engineers, have been working on a decision model which will help farmers determine the most efficient use of supplemental irrigation.

Part of the decision model is based on a water production function, the relationship between evapotranspiration and crop yield. Evapotranspiration is water evaporated from the soil plus water transpired through the plant's leaves.

The evapotranspiration-to-yield relationship is determined in the field where the crop is watered by a sprinkler-line source. The farther the plants are from the sprinkler source, the less water they receive. This causes the reduction in yield.

Another method for determining evapotranspiration-to-yield is by using a lysimeter. The lysimeter records how

much water is put on the soil, how much is used by the crop, and how much is left unused.

In the past, yield was based on applied water, but because all the water was not used beneficially, it did not cause a proportionate increase in the yield. The yield response of the plants depended on the irrigation amount and timing.

With the water production function, yield is tied directly to the rate of evapotranspiration. What this means for the producer is that he can schedule irrigation based on a target yield. Sammis said while it is understandable to shoot for a maximum yield, it is more realistic to target for a reduced yield. He explained that the cost of irrigation required to produce the maximum yield may be greater than the benefit from the increased yield.

In other words, if the farmer chooses to irrigate, or supply less water than what is required to replace water lost through maximum evapotranspiration, his yield will decrease accordingly. But if he irrigates more than the maximum evapotranspiration rate, the excess water is wasted and costly. In the ideal case, the farmer will irrigate just as the evapotranspiration rate starts to be reduced by moisture stress.

Once the sprinkler line source technique of irrigating was developed, the researchers were able to use it to determine the water production function for alfalfa and cotton. They found that the alfalfa production function is transferable to any area in New Mexico. "This shows that the relationship between alfalfa produced and evapotranspiration is independent of where the alfalfa is grown," he said. This means that an alfalfa producer in

any part of the state can look at the linear water production function and determine from his desired yield the amount of water that will be used in producing that yield. Once he determines this water requirement, and knowing the efficiency of his irrigation system, he can determine his irrigation requirement.

The application of the cotton production function, however, was limited to two areas in southern New Mexico. The cotton yield varies more because it is based on cotton lint produced rather than biomass, or plant bulk. This indicates, Sammis said, that total biomass production may require the same amount of evapotranspiration regardless of site and management, but that seed or lint production per unit of water will vary from place to place.

The researchers believe, based on studies in other states, that corn-grain yield per unit of evapotranspiration will

follow the same varied pattern.

The water production function also gives irrigation planners guidelines for irrigation systems capacity and procedures for scheduling the irrigation. It also serves as a means of comparing relative water use efficiencies. This is especially important in years of less-than-normal water supplies when knowledge of the effects of water shortages on yield and the best way to allocate the scarce resource become important to the state economy, Sammis said.

Previously, the irrigation requirements for a crop have been based on temperature and length. Using this system irrigation was allocated based on a county-wide average. Sammis said this is a good overall method of irrigation allocation but is not an efficient measure of the irrigation needs of individual crops on a farm-by-farm basis.

Communities in outer space likely in future

It's a familiar scenario in science fiction books and movies — people building communities and conducting experiments in outer space.

And, although he is the first to admit that "the mechanics of doing this are purely science fiction at this point," Dr. Klaus Kell's research in this area has helped to earn him a berth as a Distinguished Visiting Scientist at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California, an appointment he will hold throughout the 1981 calendar year.

Kell, professor of geology and director of the Institute of Meteoritics at the University of New Mexico (UNM), is conducting research which focuses on utilizing materials from asteroids and the moon to construct things in outer space. The concepts being developed by Kell may

ultimately help make the movie scenario fact instead of fiction.

"Ten years before it happened, there was talk of people landing on the moon and that sounded like science fiction," said Kell, who has held a number of positions with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), including principal lunar soil sample investigator and chairman of the NASA Lunar Sample Analysis and Planning Team. An authority on extraterrestrial materials, he is also one of 75 scientists directly involved with the Viking Mission to Mars.

"NASA is very interested in using space resources," he said. "It's so expensive to get materials into space from earth because you have to overcome gravity. For example, one pound of iron on earth costs about 50 cents; to take it into space costs about \$5,000."

Resources from space could either be brought back for use on earth, or, more importantly, for building things in space.

"There's two schools of thought on this," Kell said. "Some scientists argue in favor of mining, processing and utilizing resources from the moon, while others favor using resources from asteroids." Asteroids are celestial bodies "which we think meteorites come from," he said. Their orbit is between the planets of Mars

and Jupiter.

Kell maintains that both arguments have one basic fault — asteroids have some vital resources which are not found on the moon and vice versa. "For example, water is lacking on the moon, but some asteroids contain up to 25 percent water in bound form," he said.

Kell's concept is to get asteroids to soft-land on the moon so that resources from both the asteroids and the moon can be combined. For instance, water from the asteroids could be broken down to its basic elements — hydrogen and oxygen. "Oxygen can be used for life support and as a propellant," he said, "hydrogen can be used to reduce titanium oxides (from the moon) into titanium metal for use as a building material."

Kell envisions the benefits to mankind would be vast. "We could grow pure crystals (for use in transistors, for example) in zero gravity, or we could conduct bacterial research or many, many other things," he said.

Collision of Earth and giant asteroid may have caused dinosaurs' extinction

For 150 million years dinosaurs dominated the earth. Then, 65 million years ago, the giant reptiles suddenly disappeared. What happened? Scientists have been trying to solve the mystery for years, and have come up with a variety of explanations, but a new theory reported in the current issue of International Wildlife magazine looks like the most promising.

Two scientists from Berkeley, California — Walter Alvarez, a geologist, and his father Luis, winner of a 1968 Nobel Prize in physics — have discovered evidence suggesting that the dinosaurs were wiped out by an asteroid that collided with the earth. Asteroids are pieces of cosmic debris left over from the formation of the solar system.

According to the Alvarizes, if an asteroid nearly six miles wide hit the earth, the impact would have thrown a giant dust cloud into the atmosphere, and the cloud could have diminished sunlight for several years, turning day into perpetual night. Explains Luis Alvarez in the National Wildlife Federation's bimonthly publication, "Without sunlight plants stopped photosynthesizing. The food chains were disrupted and the animals died out."

Sound unlikely? As International Wildlife points out, other theories have been just as strange-sounding. Here's a few of the possibilities suggested by scientists in the past:

- Dinosaurs were either too stupid or too inflexible to survive. Perhaps they were outsmarted by tiny mammals who stole their eggs.
- Dinosaur eggshells grew so thin that

the eggs broke before the young reptiles could hatch. Or, the shells grew so thick the babies couldn't break out.

• Flowering plants which appeared in the middle of the dinosaurs' reign contained alkaloids which poisoned the dinosaurs. Or, these plants lacked the oily products which acted as laxatives and the dinosaurs died of constipation.

• Butterflies and moths evolved soon after these plants. Today these voracious caterpillars are controlled by birds which didn't exist in earlier times, so perhaps the insects simply ate up all the dinosaurs' food.

The trouble with these theories is that they fail to explain why other plants and animals vanished with the dinosaurs. So some scientists have suggested that a global catastrophe, such as a deadly disease or a sudden change in the spin of the earth, was responsible.

However, the Alvarizes' theory is one of the few that has physical evidence to back it. Walter Alvarez first stumbled across the evidence in 1977 at a limestone gorge research site in Italy. He came across a thin layer of clay that appeared in the rock immediately following the layer representing the dinosaur extinctions. Analysis of the clay layer revealed that it contained huge amounts of the rare, platinum-like metal iridium. The next questions: Where did the iridium come from and what effect, if any, did it have on the extinctions?

In 1979 Luis Alvarez arrived at an explanation. Reports International Wildlife: "He realized that asteroids contain high levels of iridium. If a six-mile-wide

asteroid had crashed into the earth at about 40,000 miles per hour, the impact would have melted or vaporized the asteroid. Together with debris from the crater, this material would have been thrown high into the atmosphere as a gigantic cloud of dust."

The dust cloud would have quickly circled the earth, swept along by the jet stream, and would have diminished sunlight for between three to five years, long enough to totally disrupt plant growth, unbalance the food chain and wipe out the dinosaurs. Then, as the cloud settled gently back to earth, the clay layer would have been formed.

History supports this theory. When Krakatoa, a volcanic island in the East Indies, exploded in 1883, it threw out a cloud of dust and volcanic ash that produced spectacular sunsets all over the world for two-and-a-half years. The Alvarizes' asteroid cloud would have been perhaps 1,000 times greater than Krakatoa's dust cloud.

Two years ago, says International Wildlife, excess iridium was found in several other parts of the world, supporting the Alvarizes' theory, which was first reported last June in a publication of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. A number of scientists have criticized the asteroid theory. If the asteroid so devastated the earth, they ask, how did some of the small land mammals, birds, turtles, sharks, crocodiles, and lizards survive? Walter Alvarez explains that these particular creatures could have survived "by feeding on nuts, seeds, insects, and decaying vegetation."

Certainly it's possible that such an immense asteroid once struck the earth. Planetary scientist Eleanor Heilm told International Wildlife, "We know of at least 30 asteroids of 3,000 feet or more in diameter which are in orbits close to the earth. We estimate that there may be as many as 1,000 more... Most of these objects are in eccentric orbits. Sooner or later one of them is certain to hit the earth, although it may not happen for millions of years."

Scientists at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration are taking the Alvarizes' theory very seriously. They're hoping to set up a computer to keep track of asteroids and meteors. If one seemed on a collision course with the earth, they could send out a spacecraft armed with a hydrogen bomb to nudge the asteroid off course.

Scientists continue to discuss and investigate the Alvarizes' theory. Perhaps the Alvarizes' work raises more questions than it answers, but as International Wildlife concludes, "that's one of the characteristics of good scientific research: It tells you what questions to ask next."

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
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
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
THE TROMBE WALL

One of the most important developments in passive solar heating is the Trombe wall, an indirect-gain heating method developed for a house designed by Felix Trombe and Jacques Michel in Odiello, France, in 1967.

In designing the house, Trombe and Michel decided to use a new approach to storing solar energy and distributing it to the building's interior living area.

Up until this time, the most commonly used passive heating systems incorporated direct-gain methods, which often call for a room with a south-facing glass exterior wall and heat-absorbing masonry for the room's floor and its back wall (i.e. the wall facing the exterior glass).

For the Trombe house, however, the two designers decided to place a 24-inch-thick masonry wall directly behind the double-glazed, south-facing exterior glass. This formed an air space of approximately three inches between the double-paned glass and the thermal storage wall. In addition, vents with movable dampers were placed near the top and bottom of the masonry wall.



To absorb as much of the heat passing through the glass as possible, the wall was painted black on its exterior side. During the day, it was found that the sun often produced temperatures of 150 degrees Fahrenheit on the exterior surface of the masonry wall, and temperatures of 140 degrees Fahrenheit in the air between the glass and the wall. The heat absorbed by the masonry wall was conducted slowly through the wall and released into the adjacent living area by radiation at night when the heat was needed.

The vents at the top and bottom of the thermal wall were used to provide distribution of heat into the living room during the day. This is achieved through means of natural convection. As the air between the exterior glass and the masonry wall is heated, it will rise naturally. As this heated air moves upwards, it flows through the vents at the top of the wall and into the adjacent living area.

At the same time, cooler air in the living area sinks to the floor, where it is drawn through the lower vents back to the air space between the exterior glass and the masonry wall. Once this cooler air is returned, it is heated again, and the cycle repeats itself.

This natural looping motion of heated air is generally effective for heating until two or three hours after sunset. At night, the vents are closed.

Studies of the Trombe house in France show that approximately 70 percent of the home's heating requirements are met with solar energy.

A distinct advantage of this system as compared to direct-gain methods is that except for the southern masonry wall normal light frame construction can be used. Concrete or masonry floors and walls are not needed. Also, sunlight does not have to shine directly into living spaces, so there are no problems of fading of furniture and other interior materials.

Because of the effectiveness of the design, Trombe walls are now found in solar houses around the world, including the United States. To learn more about Trombe walls, send a stamped, self-addressed envelope to:

Focus on Small Business

by E. Maine Shafer

Dear Mr. Shafer:
Is legal expense insurance protection available for the small business person?

Yes, it's becoming more available from private insurers.

"Business Legal Expense" insurance is available from insurance agents. Generally, this type of policy provides a business owner with protection from unforeseen legal expenses.

The policy allows the insured to choose his or her own attorney and reimburses him or her for the cost of defending a suit, or for legal consultations and/or plaintiff-action fees.

This type of policy can cover:

- Debt collection legal expenses.
- Costs incurred by taking on the IRS or other federal or state agencies.
- Those legal expenses not covered under the deductible clause of a liability policy.
- Problems with employees.
- Legal suits by suppliers or distributors.
- Suits for business fraud or libel.
- Preparation of eviction notices.
- Legal actions brought by consumers.

The federal government also has

become aware of the financial burden often suffered by small businesses in government actions. Public Law 96-481, sometimes called the "Equal Access to Justice Act," entitles specified parties who prevail in administrative proceedings or in civil suits brought by or against the federal government to collect attorney fees and related costs unless the government can prove its action was substantially justified. Under this 1980 law, federal judges are given the discretion to award attorney fees and other expenses to prevailing parties. In civil litigation involving the government to the same extent that courts award fees involving private parties.
