## Snidow prints will promote 1981 festival

Ruidoso Summer Festival advertising posters, featuring Alto artist Gordon Snidow's painting, "First Messenger from the Rain God," will soon be ready for distribution and sale.

The painting was loaned to Ruidoso Summer Festival by owners John and Tina Hall, Ruidoso.

A total of 200 limited edition full color 19x24 inch fine art prints, on 100 percent rag paper, will be offered for sale at \$200 each.

The posters, also featuring Snidow's painting in full color, will be priced at \$25 each.

The Festival will feature comedienne Phyllis Diller, an accomplished concert pianist; puppeteer, ventriloquist, comedienne, actress and recording artist Sheri Lewis; classical guitarist, and guest artist at the first festival, Pepe Romero and the winner of the Van Cliburn International piano competition.

Evening concerts at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track Sales Arena will be presented June 2, 3, 6, 8 and 9, with free Dixieland concerts at noon June 4 at Cedar Creek picnic area and early evening June 5 at the Lincoln Heritage Trust's new Interpretive Center in Lincoln; with the final free concert, featuring the Texas Little Symphony, the afternoon of June 7 at Cedar Creek picnic area.

# County hikes road frontage tax

Despite the vociferous objections of two citizens, Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday increased a county subdivision road frontage tax from one to ten cents per foot of frontage, in an effort to provide more funds for subdivision road maintenance.

On hand to object to the measure was Jack Poague, Capitan, who called the 1,000 percent increase "ridiculous" and "confiscatory."

"I want to know what this money is going to be used for," Poague said. "There's never been a piece of county equipment on that road (to do maintenance) and there probably never will be."

Poague's tax bill, for 571 feet of frontage on a county subdivision road, will go from \$8.71 per year to \$87.10. He said he felt the tax measure would "put an unfair burden on the subdivisions," adding that "most of the people living in the subdivisions are retired and living on pensions," or other fixed incomes.

"I say, if you're going to raise our taxes, you should also raise the taxes for the rest of the county," Poague said. "Let's have some democracy here."

County manager Bill Billingsley responded that the county could tax only the subdivisions in such a manner, according to state statutes.

Don Rash of Ruidoso told the commissioners, "I don't care about the statutes," and agreed with Poague that the tax was unfair. "My only statement," Rash said, "is to plead for some contribution by the rest of the county."

Poague asked for some guarantee that roads in his subdivision would be better maintained. "If I'm getting zero (maintenance) now, ten times as much would

still be zero—that's what I'm afraid of."

The commissioners said they could not give such a guarantee, but placed a "tracer" in the resolution so that use of the funds would be easily accountable.

By law, Billingsley said, the county may tax the subdivisions for up to one half the amount spent for subdivision road maintenance, a sum considerably higher than what the ten cent tax will generate. He also pointed out that \$50,000 has been spent in just three subdivisions in the past three months.

The majority of funding for the road department comes from Motor Vehicle Division sales of license plates and registration fees, Billingsley added. Other funds for the road department come from federal "payments in lieu of taxes," state sources and the Farm and Range fund.

The commissioners agreed with Poague that many subdivision roads are in poor condition because previous commissioners accepted the subdivisions without inspecting the roads to see that they were up to county standards.

The tax is expected to raise \$110,000 per year, and "with that \$110,000, we'll be able to maintain them a little better," the commissioners said.

"We're not wanting to put a burden on the subdivisions or anyone else," commissioner Ben Hall said. "We just want to upgrade the quality and without it, (the tax) we can't do it."

Poague asked for a compromise of perhaps four to five cents per foot, but the commission passed the ten cent measure unanimously. In a parting shot, Poague charged that the increase was "legal, but not ethical," and said, "It's a damn shame there's no one here to represent the people."

In other business, the commissioners:

—Agreed to hold a public hearing to discuss proposed changes in subdivision

regulations at the April 14 meeting.

—Agreed to appropriate \$50 for the Soil Conservation Service to be subsequently channeled to the Lincoln County Ranch Tour, scheduled for June 13.

—Turned down a request from Eric Berg of the Bernalillo County Economic Opportunity Board to provide services to Lincoln County, pending the outcome of proposed budget cuts by the Reagan administration.

—Accepted the low bid of \$2,802.50 from Emergency Medical and Safety Supply, Palm Beach, Florida, for five resuscitation training aids for emergency medical personnel.

—Approved submission of a grant application to the Emergency Medical Services Region III Council, for a new ambulance to serve the Carrizozo area.

—Agreed to hire a maintenance person for the Hondo Sanitary Landfill.

—Renewed a lease and agreed to pay seven years back rent (\$70) for the road department yards in Corona.

—Approved an annual equipment rental agreement with the United States Forest Service.

—Turned down a request to change courthouse business hours to 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., which would have shortened employees lunch period to 30 minutes, following objections raised by county clerk Jane McSwane.

## Ruidoso okays bond issues, pool leasing

Ruidoso voters Tuesday approved a \$1.57 million bond issue, for improvements in the village, and also authorized the village trustees to lease the Municipal Swimming Pool to private enterprise.

Voter authorization to empower the trustees to lease the pool was required. The trustees, at their pleasure, may pursue leasing of the swimming facility, but are not bound so to do.

machinery; \$170,000 for solid waste equipment and \$850,000 to renovate the present village hall into a police/judicial facility.

Before the trustees can advertise for bids for any of the propositions, the entire \$1.57 million in bonds must be sold.

To enable the village to take advantage of the 1981 assessed valuation of Ruidoso, the bond sale will not be effective until July 1, or later. Stern Brothers, Albuquerque, the village's fiscal agent, will conduct the bond sale.

## Fire razes new home in Alto Village

A home under construction in Alto Village was completely destroyed by fire Wednesday evening.

The fire was reported to Ruidoso Police about 7 p.m., Wednesday and Bonito, Ruidoso and Forest Service fire fighters responded to the call.

The house was "burned to the ground," according to Ruidoso fire chief Butch Jacobs. Several trees near the structure were also consumed in the fire.

The owner of the home had not been identified by early Thursday.

## RC&D eyeing expanded role in development

Resource Conservation and Development Councils (RC&D) may soon be expanding their role in terms of defining rural development needs as a step toward obtaining project funding.

At a meeting of the South Central Mountain RC&D Council Tuesday in Capitan, Tom McCalmont of the state Planning Division said the RC&D's will join Council of Government (COG) groups and Economic Development Districts to develop a list of priorities at the local level.

Areas of concern will include agriculture, health, housing, transportation, communications, criminal justice, natural resources, commerce, industry, employment, human resources, finance, taxation, revenue, energy and minerals.

The three groups will work together as regional Rural Development Committees to set those priorities, which will then be forwarded for review by the governor's appointed Rural Development Advisory Council.

The advisory council will then develop a

statewide priority list, McCalmont said. Setting of such priorities will become increasingly important, he added, because of expected Reagan administration changes in federal funding.

It is expected, McCalmont said, that once budget cuts are accomplished, most federal funds will filter down to the states in the form of large block grants. Decisions on how the money will be spent will then be made by the individual states.

## Downs board tabled most agenda items

At a brief meeting Monday night, the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees tabled most of the agenda items because of the absence of two council members and the village attorney.

Action on a water ordinance had to be delayed, as did a resolution on wages and personnel practices, a plan to fence an area around the village water tanks and a requisition for an electrical generator.

The trustees accepted a bid from Ray Gann, Dial Electric for \$1,000 to replace lights on the softball field. They also approved a \$900 expenditure for a used vehicle for the police department and a requisition for a new electric typewriter.

At the suggestion of trustee Bob Power, village clerk Virginia Spall will seek additional price quotes on a generator before that item is brought before the trustees again at their next meeting.

The trustees were also advised by Spall of the upcoming District Six Municipal League meeting, to be held at the Ruidoso Holiday Inn, April 8.



# RC&D eyeing expanded role in development

In the past, grants have been made "categorically," McCalmont said, in such areas as environmental improvement, health facilities, economic development and so on.

By establishing this prioritization system now, "New Mexico will probably be ahead of most other states," in decision-making and disbursement of the funds in their new form, McCalmont said.

The RC&D's, COG's and Economic Development Districts will be "seeking the cooperation and input of local governments in order to express their wishes to the Rural Developmental Council," McCalmont said.

The RC&D Council accepted two project measures at the Tuesday meeting. Both proposals were presented by Mary Rich of Carrizozo, the first on behalf of the New Horizons Developmental Center and Group Home.

RC&D agreed to assist with a search for three-fourths acre of land within the city limits of Carrizozo, as New Horizons plans to expand their facility by building a group home to house mentally retarded men. The present facility provides such a home for

eight women.

Rich presented another proposal on behalf of the community of Carrizozo. The group will be seeking a study of the feasibility of coal mining in the area. In addition to the possibility of industrial development, such an operation might help to alleviate the problem of illegal wood cutting on United States Forest and private land, Rich said.

The group also discussed a project to reopen the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln. They were advised that the State Government Division, owners of the building, had not yet made a decision on whether to sell or lease the Wortley. RC&D members are attempting to arrange a local meeting with state officials to discuss the situation.

The RC&D members were also advised of the annual meeting and election of officers, to be held March 28 in Alamogordo. Members Robert Bell, Lewis Merrill and Bud Bagley were appointed to a nominating committee. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor at the annual meeting. Time and location of that meeting will be announced at a later date, according to RC&D coordinator Richard Ramsey.

## Presbyterian Hospital Center name change effective April 1

Effective April 1, the multi-hospital system of which Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital and 10 other hospitals and affiliated health services throughout New Mexico are a part, will have a new name — (SCHS).

"As our system grew from two hospitals in Albuquerque to 11 hospitals across New Mexico, we began to realize that the name Presbyterian Hospital Center was not an accurate representation of what we had become," said SCHS president Richard Barr.

"We have become a system of communities throughout New Mexico which have joined together to provide needed health care to our citizens," Barr said, "so our new name, Southwest Community Health Services, is appropriate."

A new logo will represent SCHS and will be used by affiliated hospitals and health services throughout the state. The hospitals in the multi-hospital system include Artesia General Hospital, Eastern Valencia Hospital in Belen, Clovis High Plains Hospital, Espanola Hospital, McKinley General Hospital in Gallup, Nor-Lea General Hospital in Lovington, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, Socorro General Hospital, and Dr. Dan C. Trigg Memorial Hospital in Tucuman. Presbyterian Hospital Center, comprised of Presbyterian and Anna Kaseman

Hospitals in Albuquerque, is also an affiliate of Southwest Community Health Services.

The name change and new logo are also accompanied by a change in governance. On April 1, a new board of trustees will be formed to oversee the operation of each affiliate of SCHS. These boards will be responsible for:

- Serving as the governing and policy-making body for the individual hospital;
- Insuring its licensure, certification, and/or accreditation;
- Providing for the preparation of an annual operating and a three-year capital budget and reviewing financial budget performance;
- Providing for the development, review, and updating of long-range plans relating to community health care needs;
- Appointing the hospital medical staff; granting, limiting and revoking privileges; disciplining; and monitoring peer review and quality care; and,
- Participating in the selection, performance review, and retention of the hospital administrator.

In addition, a representative from Ruidoso will serve on the board of directors of Southwest Community Health Services, giving Ruidoso a voice in the overall governance of this health care system.

# Columbia might land at WSMR

Northrup Strip on White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) has been designated by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) as the alternate landing site for the space shuttle Columbia on its first orbital test flight planned for April.

The Columbia's primary landing site is at the NASA Dryden Flight Research Center, Edwards Air Force Base, California. At this time, there is still every indication the Columbia will land in California.

In the event the Columbia does land at Northrup Strip, NASA and the United States Army are planning to allow the

general public to visit the landing site on weekends after landing and view the orbiter as it is being prepared for return to Kennedy Space Center, Florida. The public viewing program will be scheduled on one and possibly two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday) following the landing.

The Northrup landing site is located in a remote area of WSMR some 45 miles north of the missile range headquarters.

An estimated 4,500 persons each day, who request and receive tickets in advance, will be permitted to view the shuttle.

Access to the Northrup Strip Viewing

area will be by Army and charter bus only, with departure from the WSMR main post area. No private vehicles will be permitted access to the viewing area.

Tickets for public viewing will be issued free of charge on a first-come, first-served basis. They may be obtained by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to the following address:

Each request must be limited to no more than six tickets. Special instructions will accompany tickets issued.

The tickets will be color and numbered for the day and time of viewing. Weekend departure times from the WSMR main post area will be at 8 a.m., 11:30 a.m., and 3 p.m. The round trip will take about three and one-half hours. Parking for private vehicles will be provided near the bus loading point.

Private chartered buses may, with prior approval, be allowed to join the Army bus convoys, at scheduled departure times from the WSMR main post area, to and from the viewing site. Passengers on these buses will not require special tickets. An Army escort will be provided for each chartered bus.

Arrangements for chartered buses should be coordinated in advance with the Public Affairs Office at White Sands Missile Range, telephone (505) 678-1134 or 678-1135.

It should be noted that, due to NASA schedules, plans could change regarding the public viewing. Specific viewing times will be confirmed after an actual landing occurs, and the public will be advised through local radio, television and newspapers.

The landing, either in California or New Mexico, is expected to be covered by all media, including radio and television.

## Carrizozo seeking grant

The town of Carrizozo seems virtually assured of receiving a \$300,000 Community Development Block Grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, according to local officials.

After submitting "pre-applications" for the funds for the past seven years, the town was invited this week to submit a full application for the grant. The invitation "as a practical matter, means we're going to get it," according to town attorney Bill Payne.

The funding would be used to upgrade housing in the eastern part of the town, Payne said, in order to bring them up to standard, and also to improve street drainage in the same area.

Eligibility for the funding would probably be determined through a committee, Payne said. The town hopes to hire two people to organize and administer the program.

The full description of the town's plan will be compiled with the help of a representative of Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, Payne said.

"Needless to say, we're kind of excited," Payne said, about the prospects of receiving the money after applying for so many years with negative results.

Ideas for improvements included in the pre-application were compiled following a series of public input meetings held in Carrizozo last fall. The full application will be submitted by May 1, Payne said, and they hope to receive the grant monies sometime this year.

### Birthday Celebration For Fred La May

The eightieth birthday celebration was held at the home of Paul and Nellie Ruth Jones, in Glencoe on Sunday, March 22, for a man who certainly does not look his age, our friend of many years, Fred La May.

His parents, Le Roy and Mayme La May and their infant daughter, Fay; and his uncle Bill Fergusson and his wife, came from Kansas in covered wagons and arrived in Lincoln County in 1899. They settled near Loma Grande, between Ruidoso and Nogal; and here Fred was born March 22, 1901, the second of ten children all born in Lincoln County.

Fred's parents kept a diary of the trip across the plains to this country — a family treasure now in the possession of Fred's sister, Cora Dutton.

The Jones home was packed with friends and relatives from all over the mountain neighborhood, including the beloved Edith Coe Rigby, who brought along a historical treasure — an old fashioned lap harp which belonged to Old Man Goss, prominent historical figure in the early days of Lincoln County, who was present at the famous escape of Billy the Kid in 1881.

Fred owns a ranch in the beautiful country off to the left of the road just as you come in sight of Carrizozo.

Asked how he remains so young and active for his years, Fred answered in his slow, half-joking cowboy talk.

"Well, I have eaten beef every day of my life." Then he added,

"Of course it was not always mine."

Fred's brothers and sisters are: Fay, Sylvia, Jeannine, Cora, Ruth, John, Roy, Orna and Tommy.

We all wish Fred all God's blessings and many happy returns of the day.

I have today (March 24) received word from her faithful friend, Jewell Bonnell, that Edna C. Schierenberg, beloved long time resident of Glencoe, was called Home by Our Lord February nine, at Naples, Florida.

Jewell had received word from Edna's

niece, Ruth V. Harig, that services were held February thirteen in Naples with American Legion Post 135 in charge of ceremonies.

Edna was a combat nurse in World War I, and received many decorations for heroism. She was born January 19, 1891, in St. Louis, Missouri. Later she was graduated from Georgetown University, in Washington, D. C., with honors.

After World War I Edna came to New Mexico and was county nurse at Las Cruces. Later for her health, she came to Glencoe, in the early 1930's and established her cherry cider business and her gift shop "La Huerta".

A great favorite with her neighbors and also people from coast to coast, Edna kept up her helpful work among her neighbors. She had a great gift for healing, made greater by study and later training.

She was a charter member of American Legion Post number 79, Ruidoso; a member of the order of the Eastern Star; and a member of the Episcopal Church.

She wrote a very interesting history of Saint Anne Chapel, Glencoe, which was founded by Lincoln County pioneers.

Jewell said in her letter,

"Edna was a really fine person and did more good deeds than we ever realized. Many persons were indebted to her, especially her neighbors."

Edna had been in a rest home in Naples, Florida for the past ten years.

Edna was of an exceedingly cheerful nature and spent much of her time smiling and laughing. In keeping with this was a humorous touch to the newspaper clipping that came in Jewell's letter.

It said that "She had been a resident of Glencoe, Mexico."

(It is true that a lot of folks back in the East think that New Mexico is a foreign country. And the old time Texans called New Mexico, Mexico; and Mexico itself, Old Mexico.)

There will always be a special spot in the hearts of all of us for Edna Schierenberg, and we take comfort in knowing she has been welcomed Home by Our Lord in Heaven.

"We're having a blast doing it," Larry Smith said. "The cast is super. They're all helping and contributing their ideas, so no one person is in charge. We're more like a family."

The Smiths are "very pleased" with the progress of the cast, only one of whom had any post-high school drama experience. "Everybody is good. We don't claim to be professionals," Smith added, "but we've sure had a good time."

Proceeds from the gym production will go to Multiple Sclerosis, Carrizozo High School, the Ancho Community Building and Lincoln County Arriba, the group which is taking over management of the Carrizozo Recreation Facilities.

### Woman Becomes Mechanic At 70

After years of working as a cook and hunting guide, 70-year-old Florence Edgerly of Woodbury, Vermont has embarked on a new career as a mechanic and auto body worker.

"Actually, when I was younger, I wanted to be a nurse," Mrs. Edgerly told a writer from The National Council on the Aging, "but there was no way I could go to school."

As a result, she became a cook at an Adirondack hunting lodge, sometimes trading her apron for a red hunting jacket to guide hunters through the woods.

"Some of the hunters were a little worried about being guided by a woman with a gun," she said, "but my boss told them to worry about themselves."

Men have expressed similar concern about her abilities as a mechanic, but said Mrs. Edgerly, "I just tell them to come over to the garage and they'll see firsthand how I fix cars."

While working on cars might be a new career for her, it's not an unfamiliar one: Mrs. Edgerly's late husband was an auto mechanic.

"When he died, I decided it was time to go back to work," she said.

Aside from working on cars, Mrs. Edgerly's main pursuits are hunting and fishing. She also spends part of each fall hauling three cords of wood home which she uses to heat her house, a cement-block structure that she'll proudly tell you she helped build.

"I lugged most of the cement blocks myself and I did most of the finishing work," she said.

Independent and self-sufficient, Mrs. Edgerly is happy with her new profession, preferring it to cooking.

"It's not too exciting in the kitchen," she said. "In there it's always the same thing over and over again. But working on cars, every job is different. It's good work."

As for retirement plans, Florence Edgerly had this to say: "If you can keep moving, you'll feel better. If you stop moving, all your aches and pains pop up. Does that answer your questions?"

RECENT legislation in New York State provides what is probably the first long-term, home-health care program in the country.

The bill stipulates that in communities where long-term, home-care agencies are established, patients eligible for skilled or interme-

diat care facilities will be offered comparable care at home. The program, using Medicaid and Medicare funds, will pay up to 75 percent of the cost of care in institutions.

Public or non-public hospitals, certified home-health agencies and skilled nursing or intermediate care facilities may furnish services at home, provided they are authorized by the State Department of Health.

PHYLLIS BARNUM, a Ph.D. candidate at the University of Chicago, says that many young readers are exposed to negative images of old people.

Ms. Barnum's research analyzed how old people were portrayed in 100 books written for ages from pre-school to third grade. Among the things she found were that older persons appeared less frequently than their numbers would warrant, had less social activity than other adults, worked at jobs not requiring much aptitude and appeared more sickly, incompetent and less self-reliant than other adults.

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
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

## Track team looking for answers

Darrel Stierwalt's 1981 track team is loaded — with questions.

"I have no idea what kind of team we have," Stierwalt said Tuesday. "We don't have a track, so we don't know what kind of times we'll have, and we don't have a chance to get to a track and do some timing because our first meet is Saturday."

The Warriors open their track season this Saturday at Deming. The Deming meet is usually a pretty good sized meet and attracts quite a few squads. This year is no different.

Most of the district teams will be there, which allows the other coaches a chance to see what they have to beat before the district meet.

But Stierwalt isn't as interested in the other teams as he is in his own.

"We're young, inexperienced," he said of his 38 thinclads. "I don't know where we're weak or strong, and I don't know how we're gonna do."

The team has been working for about four weeks, he said, "and all of a sudden it's time for a meet, even though I really don't think we're ready."

Stierwalt and assistant coach Ronny Maskew have put in quite a few hours of

coaching time, "because of the team's inexperience," Stierwalt said. "We still haven't even worked on a few things yet," he added, mentioning the pole vault and the long jump.

Right now, the Warriors look weakest in the pole vault, the long jump and the high jump. Distance events could also be weak with the graduation of top miler Joe Almager, but senior Keith Sullivan is back and should add some depth there, as will junior Bud Smith.

The Warriors should be strongest in the 400 meter sprint and relay events, shotput and discus.

Last year's 400 and 800 meter relay team of Steve Pietsch, Scott Neal, Russ Flir and Ricky Dennis is back this year, and it will be the last year for Pietsch, Plor and Dennis. Stierwalt is expecting that quartet to make things happen.

"They have improved their times considerably over last year — in practice, anyway," he said. "We didn't have the greatest relay teams in the world last year, but they should be pretty good this year."

Neal will also run low hurdles, as he did last year.

Some other tracksters are showing

promise. Glenn Ryan and Gene Reeves, a pair of basketballers, are out for track right now, and both "show promise," Stierwalt said.

Rayn will probably run the 800, and Reeves will tackle the 400 and the high hurdles.

In the field events, Lon Nunley, Robert Langston and Ronald Bell are "looking good" in the shotput and discus, and Langston and John Montoya are throwing the javelin.

Montoya, despite a cast on one arm, is throwing the javelin well, Stierwalt said. Montoya would be pole vaulting but can't grip the pole due to the cast.

But regardless of how the Warriors look in practice, it all comes down to competition, Stierwalt said.

"We don't know what we have, and we won't know what we need to work on until after this meet is over," he said. It's really a pain to try and work out when you don't have the equipment — we don't have a full set of hurdles, so we don't know how fast we can run a set of hurdles, and of course, trying to figure times without a track is pretty difficult."

Here is the 1981 track schedule: Deming March 28; Fortales, April 4; Dexter, April 10; Artesia, April 24; Tularosa, April 25; Deming, April 28; T or C, May 1; T or C District Meet, May 9; Hobbs State Meet, May 15-18.

(Artesia, Tularosa, Deming and the T or C meets are all qualifying meets for the state meet, as is the district meet.)

After all I've read and heard, I figured they were about to nail Frank Kush's hide to the wall.

But lo and behold, they up and acquitted the man.

I still don't believe it — after all the testimony by about a zillion people, seven weeks in court, they found him not guilty. After I don't know how many people testified, "Yes, I saw Coach Kush punch Kevin Rutledge that day."

A jury found Kush not guilty — not of not hitting Rutledge, that was proven. But they decided he did not hit Rutledge with malice and acquitted him of battery. A sticky wicket, what?

Why did Frank Hayes get off his charge when Woody Hayes was penalized for doing the same thing?

Well, basically, it's this way — for one thing, Woody did his number on a nationally televised game, and everyone in the country saw it. There was no dispute about it.

Kush belted Rutledge during the Arizona State-Washington game, not exactly a barnburner.

But I think, really, the reason Hayes got camed was due to the fact he hit a player from the other team. Kush hit one of his own players.

Woody belted a Clemson player after an interception, which pretty much sealed the fate of the Ohio State Buckeyes that night. He was mad, upset, and Woody's sideline antics were pretty much legend at that point. (I still remember him destroying a yard marker in 1971, and then throwing it like a spear at an official. He missed, fortunately. Now I know why Ohio State always ran the ball.)

Frank hit Rutledge after a rather poor, 27 yard punt. He was frustrated by the 41-7 shellacking they were suffering, and that was, apparently, more than he could stand.

So, when Rutledge came off the field, Frank hit him.

A coach is sort of in a parent-child situation, when you really think about it. And have you ever noticed, it's okay to spank your child, but don't spank anyone else's?

That's just the way it works. Of course, Kush later resigned when the incident became public. Woody, of course, turned in his resignation a couple of days after the Gator Bowl.

(Interestingly, Woody is no longer coaching. Kush is now a pro coach in the Canadian Football League. I have often wondered if anyone would hire Woody after his boo-boo.)

I mean, after all, the lesson of the Kush trial is — hit only your own players. That

may have been Woody's only mistake.

After seven weeks of court testimony, the first part of the trial is over, and Kush was acquitted on that. Now they have to decide whether or not Kush and the school were so nasty to Rutledge that he eventually forfeited his scholarship. (Yes, he forfeited his scholarship, the question is whether or not they were nasty.)

But, apparently since the first part of the trial resulted as it did, Rutledge and his attorney are thinking about pulling out and calling it quits.

Rutledge, you see, was obviously counting on winning, which is why he filed a \$2.2 million suit against Kush.

His attorney's legal fees are currently in excess of \$200,000, and, like most of us, Rutledge doesn't have such resources lying around for the taking.

So long and take care. The city nobody seems to love is Boston, Massachusetts.

The city that claims it's the home of the baked bean pioneered the art of moving sports teams in 1953, when the baseball Braves left to go to Milwaukee (then they moved to Atlanta, but we aren't concerned with why that happened).

Then, in 1970 or so, the Boston Patriots, a football team, built a new stadium in Foxboro, Massachusetts, moved there and became the New England Patriots.

Now the Bruins, the local hockey team, and the Celtics, the basketball team, are talking about taking a hike.

It seems both squads made an agreement with the city of Boston to play in a proposed \$40 million sports complex, rather than in the 53-year-old Boston Garden, which desperately needs renovation. (Actually, it needs to be destroyed and rebuilt.)

But the Massachusetts state legislature has decided it won't help fund said Garden.

So, the Bruins will probably move to Salem, New Hampshire, in an 18,000 seat arena which will also offer greyhound racing.

Revere, the Celtics will probably move to Revere, Massachusetts, though Red Auerbach says Worcester, Hartford (Connecticut) or Providence (Rhode Island) are all possibilities.

With a little luck they won't lose the Boston Marathon, I guess — and they still have the Red Sox, though lately they've lost Carlton Fisk, Fred Lynn and Rick Burleson.

(The team isn't moving, just their best players. That might be about as bad as losing your team.)

The Revere Celtics? The Salem Bruins?

This could get interesting before it's over — stay tuned for details.





# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — There are many things which could be said about the first regular session of the 35th Legislature, which ended last Saturday.

Not many of them are good. On the whole, this was a mean-spirited, mincing, ego-driven session, which left the citizens of New Mexico little better off when it ended than they had been when it convened.

Let's just take one example of that fact. A major motive among lawmakers in New Mexico between January 20 and March 21 of 1981 was to have arranged the law so that our state would not end up next year with the embarrassingly large surpluses of money it has been building up in recent years.

So what was the state of things in that regard when this regular session closed? We will probably accumulate in surplus funds during the next year another embarrassing sum of about \$100 million.

You think these guys this year gave us the tax cuts we deserve? No way.

Their instincts are such — or at least those of the leaders who control such sessions are such — that to turn back to the public any amount of the funds we are now and have been for so long being overcharged by the state we support is almost inconceivable.

Which brings us to the question of leadership.

In the Senate, none.

Could a pretty much self-confessed charlatan like Les Houston have attracted so much attention in that body — indeed, could he have pushed that omnibus liquor bill nobody was for but not many had courage enough to speak out against — if there had been any leadership in the body

to which he belonged to cut his water off? In the House, some leadership — but not of the imaginative and far-seeing kind the State needs at this point in its existence.

In that body, we have traded the presumed arrogance of a leadership group which called itself the Mama Lucys for the evident and demonstrated arrogance and intransigence of the New Coalition.

Whether you judge that trade to be a good thing or a bad one depends on which side — the formerly arrogant liberals or the presently arrogant conservatives — you can reach with your pleas for legislation.

As for real results for the ordinary citizen, nothing much has changed up here.

As the 35th session of early 1981 ended, lobbyists, the pros who know how to manipulate Santa Fe, were calm and content. They weren't overly disturbed by how things had gone, either way. Above everyone else, these people understand the meaning of the sentence which says, "You win some, and you lose some."

But the more or less ordinary citizens who haunt the halls of the Legislature were going around as though their heads were ringing. They got not so much as a reasonable hearing from a major committee whose chairman keeps a meataxe on the desk in front of him as though cutting, cutting, cutting were his only pursuit.

If letting bills, some of them good and some of them bad, drop through the cracks without any serious consideration is a good thing, the regular session of 1981 was a success.

What hurts is that all those self-appointed leaders are now going around congratulating themselves on what a great job they did for us ordinary people.

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## Sense & Nonsense

Suppose you have a friend who happens to be your next door neighbor. You've known this person for a long time and once, a few years ago, you loaned him some money to help him overcome a financial crisis. Since it was a few years ago, you can't remember what it was exactly for. Maybe his child was in college and he couldn't afford to pay the tuition. Maybe it was the time his house collapsed during that windstorm, or maybe it was just to help his business along when it was going through some rough times.

Anyway, the years have passed and your neighbor has made it through the crisis and is doing quite well. He just bought himself a new car and a new boat, and has told you all about the summer home he has built in the country. He has yet to pay off the debt that he owes you and since you are having some rough times making ends meet, what with inflation and all, you could certainly use the extra money from the repayment of that loan. Still, he never mentions it and you, nice person that you are, are too decent to bring it up. You

wouldn't be human, however, if it didn't bother or anger you.

Our federal government today is in much the same situation in the area of defaulted government loans. Loans, given out at interest rates well below the market levels, have almost become outright giveaways, since the federal government has made little effort to collect on these defaulted loans. With a budget deficit nearing one trillion dollars, these facts on what money is actually owed the government are staggering.

According to recent estimates by the Office of Management and Budget, \$175 billion is owed the federal government, of which \$47 billion is currently due, and \$25 billion is long overdue. The losses from defaulted loans would pay all the annual operating costs of the Justice and State Department, the congress, and still leave \$500 million left over.

Even the Internal Revenue Service, long considered to be the ultimate American bill collector, is owed almost \$16 billion and is only actively seeking recovery of less than \$4 billion.

This is why I am going to introduce legislation into the 97th Congress to help rid the federal government of its most glaring sign of fiscal irresponsibility — the collecting and managing of debts.

The bill has a three part plan to deal with this growing national problem. First, it requires various federal agencies who authorize loans to report to the Budget Committee debts outstanding to the United States, including payments 90 days or more in arrears. It will allow Congress to make an accurate accounting of loaned funds, and set up a track record for agencies which will clearly show what percentage of their loans are being defaulted on.

Second, it will require the federal government, just like any other private sector creditor, to disclose to consumer reporting agencies, those individuals who have defaulted on federal loans. Strange as it may sound, a person today can have a strong credit rating yet be in default to the government.

The final portion of this bill would allow the head of a federal agency to collect defaulted federal loans from a federal employee by deduction from his pay of installment payments on the loans. Unfortunately, we do have many people currently working in the federal government who have previously defaulted on federal government loans.

While this legislation may not turn out to be 100 percent successful in recovering debts owed to the federal government, it is imperative we make it clear that the government expects repayment of these loans. When our society perceives that this government isn't concerned with collecting its debts, it only encourages more individuals to default on their loans.

This problem concerns all Americans, even those who have never taken out a loan from the federal government. The federal government's operating expenses, including loans, come from your hard-earned tax dollars. This little-known ripoff of taxpayers has gone on far too long.

Municipal Judge Sam Nunnally can levy a maximum fine of \$300, plus up to 90 days in the county jail, for being guilty of causing a fire in Ruidoso — including starting a fire by dumping hot fire place ashes on the ground.

Granted that the \$300 fine might not cause a hardship on some people, having to serve ninety days in the Lincoln County Jail, in addition to the fine, would get the offender's attention.

Now, \$300 and no jail sentence might not be much of a deterrent to people who don't pay much attention to what's going on in Ruidoso — but \$300 and ninety days could tend to discourage second offenders.

We're not suggesting that your 83-year-old, loveable, friendly, helpful, white haired grandmother spend ninety days in jail — but \$300 would serve to get her attention and would be a reminder not to dump hot ashes outside again.

In the case where a man caused fire, strictly due to carelessness and thoughtlessness, resulted in extensive property loss, then \$300 and ninety days in jail would not only get the attention of the violator, but it's a certainty that other home and weekend cabin owners would hear about it — and, hopefully, get the message.

Such drastic action might not reduce the number of man caused fires in Ruidoso, but \$300 and ninety days in jail seems like a good starting point in a concerted effort by the police, firemen and Forest Service officials to drastically reduce the number of man caused fires in Ruidoso. — CD

### GOOD OLD WATER WELL



## Artists-in-Schools application deadline April 17

April 17 is the deadline for folk artists, architects and environmental designers, filmmakers, and performing artists interested in working in the 1981-82 Artists-in-Schools (AIS) program to submit their applications to the New Mexico Arts Division.

There are openings for the full school year, for one semester, for special short-term residencies, and for brief guest artist assignments throughout the year.

AIS performing artists include working professional dancers (modern, ballet, ethnic), musicians (vocalists, instrumentalists and composers, working in classical, jazz, or folk music), and dramatists (actors, directors, mime artists, puppeteers, and storytellers).

The AIS folk arts category includes indigenous artists such as weavers, woodcarvers, tinsmiths, furniture makers, musicians, dancers, potters, and jewelry-makers, working from their Hispanic or

Native American heritage. In filmmaking, the AIS program offers opportunities for conventional filmmakers, animators, and video artists.

An AIS is not a teacher, nor is any teaching certificate required for these positions. The artist works with students and their teachers, and with parents and community groups, giving them an understanding of the artistic experience. During a long-term residency, the professional artist spends half his time working in the school and the community, and half his time on his own creative activities. The compensation is \$1,200 per month.

Previous applicants must submit new applications in order to be considered for the 1981-82 positions.

Professional performing artists, architects, environmental designers, filmmakers and folk artists may obtain complete information and application

forms from the New Mexico Arts Division, 113 Lincoln Avenue, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501. The Arts Division's telephone number is 827-2061.

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
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## Agronomists to be in demand

The Green Revolution of the 1960s focused attention on world food production problems. This publicity caused college students to look to agronomy, or the plant and soil sciences, for the qualifications to join this ecological revolution.

Student interest in the general field of agronomy has cooled down somewhat since then, according to Charles Glover, Extension agronomist at New Mexico State University.

However, soil erosion, new plant diseases and insects, and restrictions on some pesticides continue to nibble away at the world's food supply.

The world's population is still growing and has already caught up with the scientific advances credited to the Green Revolution. World hunger is as much a problem as it was 20 years ago.

In addition, the growing complexity of agricultural production has increased the need for college graduates trained and educated to handle crop and soils problems. Agribusiness personnel managers predict a shortage of qualified graduates that will run at least 15 percent below industry needs by 1988.

Agricultural opportunities go far beyond traditional on-farm jobs. Private seed, agricultural chemical and fertilizer companies are always looking for new employees with solid technical or scientific training. There are similar positions in governmental agencies, and the colleges and universities that educated these graduates offer agricultural career opportunities.

The universities, and especially the land grant colleges, have the responsibility to develop the technology and expertise needed to maintain a high level of agricultural production.

In the past 20 years, these universities and colleges have taken on another — but parallel — responsibility. The quality of

the environment has to be protected at the same time food production is increased. Crops and cropping systems in the future will be based on entirely new management concepts. Scientists in crops and soil management are already involved in the beginning research to meet these needs, Glover said.

One of New Mexico's most critical areas is water management. Higher energy costs have pushed water pumping costs for irrigation near the breaking point for many of the state's farmers, and energy costs are going to continue going up.

Cost, coupled with declining water supplies, has made efficient water use a high-priority objective for agricultural scientists.

More knowledge about how water moves through soil, and what makes it move, is necessary. Then there is the irrevocable relationship of soil, water and plants. A better understanding of plant physiology and water movement in soil will help plant breeders develop drought tolerant crops.

One agronomy area often overlooked is weed science. There have always been weeds and most people find ways to live with them, but weeds are one of three things that can ruin a farmer's crop.

However, when insects or disease attack a crop, attention is quickly turned to ways to fight these pests. Weeds never get as much attention in the field, but of all the losses in crop production, weeds are responsible for more than either disease or insects.

New Mexico State University's agronomy department provides its

graduates with a sound, basic education in crops and soils, and it also offers preparation in the basic sciences. Students can let their own interests lead them into specialized fields of general agronomy, crop science, soil science, or recreational areas management.

The general agronomy curriculum gives the student a broad look at the entire field of agronomy, and students interested in specific crop or soil sciences can choose more technical options.

Crop science includes plant breeding, genetics, weed physiology, crop production, and some aspects of environmental pollution problems.

Soil science takes the detailed approach to soil classification, physics, microbiology and chemistry. The recreational areas management curriculum provides broad training for state and national park site management, as well as specific training for golf course superintendents.

The career opportunities are there for agronomy graduates, but some preparation has to take place in high school. Basic science and mathematics courses are the basis for successful work at the college level in agronomy.

Although the student with an agricultural background will find it helpful, it is not essential.

The problem of feeding the world won't go away this century, and the problems of blending a more technical approach to agriculture with a clean environment will persist. Agronomists will have a major role to play in this critical situation.

The renegotiable rate mortgage (RRM) has been making its debut in many major markets since the Federal Home Loan Bank Board approved the new mortgage financing plan earlier this year.

The RRM, a somewhat controversial type of mortgage, allows lenders and borrowers to renegotiate interest rates on home loans every three, four or five years. At that time, depending on an index or guide supplied by the Bank Board, the lender could raise or lower the rate a maximum of 1/2 of 1 percent per year.

Many lenders believe the RRM represents a revolution in home financing. The days of the fixed rate, long term mortgage are numbered, they say.

Others — including Jay Janis, Federal Home Loan Bank Board chairman — contend that the fixed rate loan will not die. Heavy competition in the lending business will see to that, Janis said.

But whether the RRM is as momentous as some claim, everyone agrees that home financing is changing.

In the early 1960s, home buyers had four main sources for home loans — bank, savings associations, insurance companies, or wealthy individuals. Since many lending institutions as we know them today were in their formative stages, most of home financing was done by the wealthy. Terms also were different. A typical

loan was for 50 percent of the value of the home, with full repayment due in a lump sum in five years. On the due date, the buyer would either review the loan at a new interest rate or pay off the mortgage by getting a new loan from some other source.

During the Depression of the 1930s, thousands of homeowners were unable to renew their loans or obtain new ones. The result was a flood of foreclosures with many left homeless and helpless.

The Depression generation determined that there had to be a better, safer plan and the fully amortized, long term, fixed rate loan eventually evolved.

In recent months, however, astronomical interest rates have made the fixed rate mortgage unobtainable for many buyers. A surge in creative or other-than-conventional financing has developed. These methods — be they loan assumptions, land contracts, wraparound mortgages, etc. — have acted as temporary bandages to the wounded mortgage market and have allowed buyers to skirt high interest rates.

Though few can accurately predict whether these instruments or the renegotiable rate mortgage will dominate the market in the coming years, one thing's for sure — nowadays shopping for financing is akin to shopping for the home itself.

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# Whooping cranes winning survival fight

America's wild whooping cranes are continuing their slow but steady recovery from near extinction with a record number of birds on their wintering grounds.

The main flock of 78 birds, two more than last year, will soon be migrating from the Texas Gulf Coast to nesting grounds in Canada. Meanwhile, a transplanted

flock of about 17 whooping cranes are now migrating with their "foster" sandhill crane parents from the Rio Grande Valley of New Mexico to the Idaho Rockies.

Prospects for the future growth in the main flock are even more encouraging, with about half of them — 19 pairs — now active breeders. United States and Canadian wildlife officials predict a jump in the flock's population in the next few years as more birds reach breeding age,

"unless something unforeseen happens or unless most are the same sex."

Six young hatched last spring are among the 78 whoopers wintering at the Fish and Wildlife Service's Aransas National Wildlife Refuge and nearby in Texas, after the 2,800 mile fall migration from Canada's Wood Buffalo National Park. Upon arrival at Aransas, families and breeding pairs staked out territories of about 400 acres where they feed on clams, blue crabs, and occasionally acorns. Refuge officials say there is ample space at Aransas for the "hoped-for" expansion of the flock.

Later this month, the breeding pairs will begin their spectacular courtship rituals — dancing and leaping into the air, their satiny black-tipped wings spread in what one observer has called a "joyous celebration of life." Whoopers are known to form pair bonds as early as two to three

years of age, but their exact breeding age is not yet known. They will begin mating before reaching Canada, some at Aransas and others during migration. By mid-April, most of the flock will have left Texas for their hopscotch journey north.

As the main flock approaches courtship ritual time, the young "foster" flock already has departed from Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge in New Mexico for its 750 mile return to the Grays Lake refuge in Idaho. At least 15 have arrived at a favorite midway stopover at two national wildlife refuges in Colorado's San Luis Valley.

Twenty young whoopers, including four Redgings, left the Rockies last fall but three birds could not be found during the winter. A fourth, missing for a time, was found near Willcox, Arizona, with a flock of sandhill cranes. The remaining 16 whoopers wintered at or near the Bosque

refuge, where they do not exhibit the territorial behavior of their Aransas relatives. They seem to recognize their own kind, however, and often stay in groups, aloof from larger numbers of sandhills. The sandhills, in turn, seem to accept their larger, more aggressive cousins and respect their need for extra space, yielding to them in observed confrontations.

The foster flock was started at Grays Lake in 1975 with greater sandhill cranes hatching whooper eggs from wild nests in Canada and from a captive breeding flock at the Service's Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Maryland. The "foster parent" sandhill cranes have successfully reared the whoopers as their own and have taught them the migration route to New Mexico.

By last summer all three surviving whoopers hatched in 1975 had staked out

and defended nesting territories, exhibiting the characteristic behavior of breeding-aged males. But they may have trouble finding a female whooper mate of suitable age.

Dr. Rod Drewien, a research biologist who oversees the foster flock for the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, believes males in the flock far outnumber females, based on their size and behavior. "Females apparently suffer higher mortality rates, especially in the first 30 days and when weather conditions during nesting are poor or predation is high," he said. "This also appears true for whooping cranes reared by sandhills in captivity, but we don't know why yet."

Drewien is hoping that part of the answer may come from a technique to determine the sex of whooping cranes through blood samples. The technique has been successfully tested on 37 species of birds, including the cranes, by researchers at the University of Calgary and the United States and Canadian wildlife agencies. "If we can identify the females soon after hatching, we can watch them more carefully to find out what is causing this early mortality," Drewien said.

Meanwhile, Patuxent scientists are considering a plan to transplant female whoopers, reared by captive parent birds at the center, to the Grays Lake flock. Dr. Scott Derrickson, in charge of Patuxent's crane propagation program, tested the feasibility of such a transplant last summer with the release of a group of

sandhill cranes. Eleven birds, aged one, two, and three years, were transferred from the research center to the Idaho refuge to see which age group would adapt best and also to learn if they would migrate. Seven survived through the summer and began their migration with wild sandhills.

However, biologists observed that only one bird, a one-year-old female, integrated into the wild flock. That bird, which was approached by a wild male and then stayed with him, was the only one to have been found in New Mexico this winter. The other birds did not migrate from Grays Lake until the very last group of sandhills left and they have not been located since.

"We now know, based on this experiment," Derrickson said, "that captive-reared sandhill cranes, transplanted to the wild, must integrate with the other birds to know when and where to migrate. The same will apply to whooping cranes."

Derrickson thinks the most successful technique for transplanting Patuxent-reared whoopers to Grays Lake would be to place a young female onto the territory of a male from the foster flock, keeping her safe until the two formed a strong pair bond.

He may get a chance to try the experiment this summer in yet another of the innovative techniques that have restored the whooping crane from a low of 15 in 1941 to this year's record number of nearly 100 birds in the wild and 24 in captivity.

## Landscape with vegetables when space is restricted

Home gardeners who have limited space for growing things sometimes have to choose between an ornamental garden and a functional one. They have to choose between the color and visual attraction of a flower garden, or functional and healthful fresh vegetables.

This might be a good year to try a new approach to gardening, said Jim Sals, Extension horticulturist for New Mexico State University. There's a big push on now for growing vegetables in regular garden bed plantings, Sals said.

Instead of hiding vegetables in formal rows somewhere in the backyard, gardeners are planting them right in among the flowers, with exciting results.

There are a number of advantages to such gardening. Saving space is probably the biggest advantage.

For instance, in a small lot, what can you grow along the fence? Try trellised vegetables there. A number of vegetables are well suited to trellising, like peas, cucumbers, tomatoes, pole snap and lima beans. Some types of squash and pumpkins, even cantaloupes are a possibility.

Only a couple of tomato plants grown this way would provide enough fruit for the average family's needs. About six cucumber plants would produce enough. It would take a minimum of 10 plants, though, to provide a family with enough pole beans.

Many other vegetables are also suitable for ornamental use in flower borders. Beets, carrots and lettuce have decorative foliage. Types of lettuce that do well as ornamental plantings include various red lettuces, oak leaf and salad bowl. Cabbage, too, does well this way. Try red, or savoy, or perhaps the new flowering cabbage and kale.

Herbs can also serve a decorative and a practical function in home landscape gardening. Creeping thyme makes a good ground cover. There are also lemon and other thymes, with delicate foliage and

small attractive pink or whitish flowers. Chives and onions both do well and have unusual ornamental flowers.

Snip fresh chives and mix with sour cream for baked potatoes this summer. Or, with your own basil plant, have a refreshing salad of sliced tomatoes garnished with fresh chopped parsley and an oil and vinegar dressing. There are several varieties of basil, including a red opal ornamental.

Because some of these herbs are difficult to start, it might be more convenient to use seedlings from a nursery or florist rather than trying to raise them from seed yourself.

Other useful plants to consider for ornamental plantings in flower borders include okras. It has a pale yellow flower like the mallow. Egg plant takes more room but has a handsome glossy purple fruit. Chile and bell pepper varieties have bright red or yellow fruit and New Zealand spinach has an edible, velvety green leaf.

Using vegetables in the flower border may completely revolutionize your garden.

## 'Profit from your taxes'

### Disability income exclusion

A taxpayer who retired because of a total and permanent disability may be able to exclude from his income up to \$5,200 of his disability pension on his tax return.

To qualify for the exclusion a taxpayer must have been under 65 on December 31, 1980, must not have reached mandatory retirement age on January 1, 1980, and must not have chosen to treat his disability income as pension or annuity income.

The amount that can be excluded depends on the weekly disability pay and the adjusted gross income. To compute the exclusion, multiply either your weekly disability pension or \$100, whichever is less, by the number of weeks you were retired on disability. This is the tentative exclusion.

The tentative exclusion must be reduced by the amount that the adjusted gross income, including your total disability pension, exceeds \$15,000. Consequently, if the taxpayer's adjusted gross income including the disability pension is \$20,200

or more, he will not be able to exclude any of his disability income.

To illustrate, a man retired on June 30, 1980 because of a total and permanent disability. He was 48 years old at the end of the year; his mandatory retirement age is 72. He received wages totaling \$13,000 for the first half of the year and a disability pension of \$150 a week (totaling \$3,900) for the last half of the year. He also received \$1,000 of interest income. His tentative disability income exclusion is \$2,600 (26 weeks x \$100). This must be reduced by \$1,900 (adjusted gross income including disability pension of \$16,900 less \$15,000) so his disability income exclusion is \$700.

To claim the disability income exclusion, Form 2440 must be attached to Form 1040. Also, in the first year an individual claims the exclusion a certification from a physician as to the disability must be attached. Form 2440 may be obtained at your local IRS office or by writing to the Forms Distribution Center, Post Office Box 2924, Austin, Texas 78769.

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
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



# Doctor hunts killer carcinogens

The dictionary defines a detective as someone engaged in finding lawbreakers or getting information that is not readily available. By this definition, Dr. Clare Sun, professor of biology at the University of Albuquerque (UA) since 1968, is a true medical detective.

The native of Nanking, China, is deep into two investigations in her laboratory at UA — Tracking down killers all around us and trying to solve a mystery that affects the life of every human being on earth.

The killers she is attempting to identify are carcinogens in the everyday environment, household chemicals that cause or support cancer. The universal mystery she is attempting is that of DNA recombination — an ongoing process in every living creature that determines which characteristics the creature passes on to offspring.

Among Dr. Sun's principal tools in her two investigations have been 1) supporting grants from the National Institutes of Health, 2) knowledge gained while earning BA, MA and Ph.D. degrees and in research ranging from California to England, and 3) zebra manure.

That's right, zebra droppings.

About 15 years ago Dr. Sun's former mentor at Columbia University was

looking for a good testing mold suitable for microbiological research everywhere, and the scientist, Professor Lindsay Olive, discovered that he could isolate a mold from zebra manure which was ideal for observing genetic changes. Dr. Sun's sleuthing work with this mold involves a different approach for each of her two investigations.

In seeking knowledge about the mysterious genetic recombination, she and other microbiologists in the world are seeking to understand the process by which chromosomes recombine. In her research, Dr. Sun works with two kinds of spores from the mold, crossing mutants like seeds. Dr. Sun emphasizes that she and most other scientists are merely studying the recombination of DNA, without trying to clone living cells, and efforts to reproduce an exact replica of a human being is forbidden by federal law.

The spores with which Dr. Sun works each has male and female organs, but within itself each is unable to fertilize the egg it carries. However, when the two are put together in a Petri plate — a covered dish about the size and shape of a woman's round face powder compact — they interbreed sexually and produce hundreds of thousands of offspring spores. It is this interaction and the birth of the offspring that Dr. Sun and many other geneticists are studying.

Dr. Sun, in referring to these offspring spores, said, "I have hundreds of thousands of children to analyze."

In her other investigation projects, Dr. Sun works with four UA students who might also be considered her "children" as she guides them toward maturity in the world of scientific research. The students work as "junior investigators" in trying to detect household chemicals that cause or support cancer.

Government reports call Dr. Sun the "principal investigator" in this carcinogen research, in which Dr. Sun and her students apply a chemical product to the zebra mold and then study ensuing developments. If the "marriage" of the two produces offspring spores that differ from the parent mold, then the applied chemical is classified as a mutagen — a chemical that causes hereditary change. Dr. Sun uses scientific journals to publish notices of such classifications, with recommendations that the product be tested further.

This research project is funded by the National Institutes of Health and is known as the Minority Biomedical Science program (MBS). Designed to make scientific studies and careers attractive to students from racial and ethnic minority groups, the UA program has been in operation for seven full years. During that time it has had an impressive record, producing three minority students who

went on to medical school, five veterinary school students, five who entered graduate-level studies in science at other types of schools, five in other health fields, one who earned a doctorate in biology and one who went into biomedical research.

Dr. Sun's work and that of the MBS program has been praised in a United States government report which cited her "excellent background" (a Ph.D. from Columbia University and a visiting scholar at Cambridge, England) as well as the "relevance" and "originality" of the research project for students.

When Dr. Sun asked the UA last year for a sabbatical leave to allow her another semester of research at Cambridge University, the university's academic dean said in his reply that the leave-authorizing committee "was most impressed with the soundness of your research project and the potential value it has for the advancement of science."

At Cambridge, Dr. Sun has worked on genetic recombination research with Dr. H. L. K. Whitehouse, a noted geneticist whose book "Mechanism of Heredity" is a standard, authoritative text on microbial genetics. In a 17-page treatise summarizing their 1973-74 research together, Dr. Sun's name was the first listed in the bylines of the paper's three authors.

With typical modesty, Dr. Sun smiled and said: "The one who does the least work is always the first listed."

## Hot water isn't free, conserve it

- Hot water in the home is a convenience that is costing more money as utility bills continue to climb.
- "Remember, you save money every time you cut your use of hot water," said Jackie Martin, Extension family finance specialist for New Mexico State University.
- Martin offers this list of reminders on ways to cut down waste of hot water.
- Lower the temperature setting on your heater to the lowest degree acceptable to your needs.
- Every time you can, use cold water instead of hot.
- Never leave hot water running unnecessarily. When shaving, close the drain and fill the basin with water instead. When washing dishes by hand, fill a pan with hot water for rinsing.
- Fix leaky hot water faucets immediately.
- Take showers or baths, whichever way you use the least water. To decide, close the drain to the tub and take a shower. When finished, compare this waterline to the amount of water you use when taking a tub bath.
- Take showers, do laundry and run the dishwasher at off-peak hours. Peak hours are 2 to 8 p.m.
- Wash only full loads of laundry. Use water level or load size devices on your clothes washer.
- Use as low a water temperature as possible for the wash cycle of your clothes washer. Use cold water for all rinse cycles. Presoak heavily soiled clothes before washing.
- Limit dishwasher runs to full loads. Between meals, store soiled dishes in the unit. Scrape dishes and if rinsing is necessary, use cold water.
- Use wrap type insulation to cover the outlet (hot) pipe leaving the water heater.
- Turn down the water heater's thermostat to a minimum setting if you plan to be away from home for an extended period of time.



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

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# I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

The State Game Commission met February 19 - 20, and established the big game hunting seasons for the 1981-82 license year. Since the proclamation pertaining to these seasons will not be available until around April 1, grab your calendar and pencil and I'll go over some of the new dates and regulations for those of you needing to schedule vacations now.

The spring turkey season for most of the state and our area in particular will be April 11 through April 28. Bag limit shall be a turkey with a beard that extends at least two inches beyond the feathers of the breast.

The Commission set a split north-south deer hunting season. The northern season dates are November 6 - 8 and November 23 - 19, the southern dates are November 20 - 22 and November 27 - December 3, 1981. Deer hunters will have a choice of any one of these four hunt periods.

Bow and muzzleloader deer hunters will be required to purchase a common license this year called a Primitive Weapon License. This license will enable the holder to hunt with a bow during the bow seasons, and, if he does not bag a deer in that hunt and so desires, he can hunt with a muzzleloader in the muzzleloader hunt.

Deer bow season has been set generally statewide for September 5 through September 18, and January 2 through January 10. Bag limit is one deer of either sex. In addition, a concurrent bow elk season will be held in Units 6, 8, 15, 17, 44, and 45. Bag limit is one elk of either sex. So, a bowhunter with the proper licenses would be able to hunt both deer and elk in these specified six units.

numbers but primarily toward spreading hunter pressure more equitably around the state.

Public land licenses for elk hunts will be distributed by drawings, and hunters will have a choice of one of six seasons in various hunt units. Season dates will be October 8 - 12, October 16 - 20, October 24 - 28, October 31 - November 4, December 2 - 6, and December 10 - 14.

The Department will issue a given number of licenses for each management unit during a particular elk hunt period. When applying for these, applicants may indicate whether they would accept a license outside their original hunt area or period of choice, thus increasing their chances of drawing an elk license.

Muzzleloader hunts for elk will be October 8 - 12 in Units 9, 15, 17, and 38, and October 16 - 20 in Units 9, 15, and 17. Bag limit is one mature bull.

Antelope seasons have been established as September 5 - 7 for the Northeast, September 28 - 27 for the Southeast, and October 3 - 4 for the Southwest.

The muzzleloader antelope hunt at Alamo Mesa will be October 3 - 4.

The Barbary sheep hunting season will remain as the same system used last year. That is, two areas B-1 (Unit 47) and B-2 (Unit 2) will be open only to a limited number of successful applicants, January 9 - 17, 1982.

The third area, B-3, will be generally statewide. Holders of a B-3 license may hunt Barbary sheep during a deer hunt for which his license is valid, or, during the B-3 season January 9 - 17, 1982. Bag limit for the B-3 hunt is one Barbary sheep of either sex.

The deer muzzleloader season has been set generally statewide for September 19 through September 27. The bag limit is one antlered buck.

The Commission adopted a unit management system for elk, a system aimed at slightly reducing elk hunter
