CONDITIONS PREVAILING FOR FOREST FIRE Red Flag Fire Alerts coming

Ruidoso's spring fire season has been more extreme than expected with three Red Flag Fire Alerts (RFFA) called in the last ten days, according to Fire Management Officer for Smokey Bear Ranger District, Steve Makowski.

Makowski said over a ten year period, the average fire danger for April is "high to very high," with RFFA days finding the area in "extreme" fire danger.

Makowski said RFFA's are called when a combination of weather factors cause grasses and other foliage to be very dry and easily flammable. He said that with only intermittent moisture followed by high and constant winds, Ruidoso is usually in a very vulnerable fire condition.

"People in Ruidoso have been cooperative with regard to the fire alerts," Makowski said. He and other members of the Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE) cooperate to inform the public of a RFFA and assist in safety

measures.

"Our mobile units around town who cooperate in the RFFA, such as the Ruidoso police, have been very cooperative in displaying the magnetic signs and flags," Makowski said.

Makowski said the only problems encountered locally have been with cooperators who forget to remove RFFA signs and flags at the close of each business day.

"I would like to emphasize that cooperators should display their flags and signs only during the regular business day," Makowski said. "If red flag conditions exist the next day, we will call each cooperator again."

Makowski said that "so many people look outside and if it seems really windy, they hang their flag out. High winds aren't the only factor in determining a red flag alert, so that's why they need to wait for a ComFIRE member to call them," he said.

Makowski outlined what conditions must exist for a RFFA. Wind velocity, high

temperatures and low humidity are the main factors which contribute to high fire danger. Makowski works with officials from the New Mexico State Forestry Office to determine when all conditions are extreme enough to call an alert.

Now into its third year, the RFFA program has caught on, and has been adapted to be used successfully in Prescott, Arizona, as well as many other communities in New Mexico, Makowski said.

Developed by ComFIRE members, the program was created to make people more aware when extreme conditions exist, and to encourage them to refrain from building fires of any kind.

"I think it does its job as far as raising the consciousness of fire danger to local residents," Makowski said. The constant reminder of flags through the business sections of town, periodic announcements on KRRR Radio, and folding signs at all entrances to the village provide the awareness needed to prevent fires, he added.

"The past two years we've

had the RFFA program, haven't been nearly as critical as the fire situation we're in right now, so I expect we'll really get the benefit from establishing a fire prevention program when we did," Makowski said.

"I wouldn't be at all surprised to see more RFFA days because over a ten-year period, April is the worst month for fire danger in our forest," Makowski said.

He said educating the public has been an ongoing project for ComFIRE, and is one of the major goals of the United States Forest Service, with Smokey Bear visiting schools in the area each spring.

Another program available free of charge through ComFIRE is a slide/cassette tape program which discusses protection of private property from a wildfire. "This is a very real concern here, with so many homes in densely wooded areas," Makowski said.

More fire prevention information is available at the Ranger Station, 257-4095.

Kill Tussock moths now

Now is the time to start inspecting your trees for possible infestation by insects, according to county extension agent Barry Herd.

Herd is particularly concerned about the presence of Tussock moths, which are infesting and damaging local trees, especially the Douglas fir.

One of the most destructive forest insects in the southwest, it also attacks white fir and spruce, Herd said.

The moth's larvae hatch in the spring, which is the time to begin spraying the trees to eradicate them, he added. Anyone desiring information on chemical pesticides should contact Herd at the Lincoln County Extension office, Carrizozo, 648-2311, your local nursery owner, or licensed commercial applicator.

The larvae feed on the new foliage, causing it to turn brown and shrivel. As they continue to grow, they feed on both

new and older foliage, progressing to the lower parts of the tree's crown, getting closer to the trunk.

When the problem is advanced, severe defoliation may occur, and usually, the top part of the tree shows the first signs of browning, Herd said.

The reddish-brown color moves progressively down the tree, and may even



Arsonist sought

You can't blame the chef if the steaks were a little burned last October at the Manor Steak House in Albuquerque's Northwest Valley.

The reason? Arson. A major portion of the restaurant, located at 7511 4th N.W., was damaged by the late evening blaze on October 18, 1980, despite quick response from the Bernalillo County Fire Department. Fortunately, the restaurant was closed at the time of the fire.

Bernalillo County Fire Investigator Chris Archuleta, who was called to the scene shortly after the blaze was subdued, said he noticed two areas in the restaurant which had sustained abnormal burn patterns. One area was the rear northwest hallway, where the fire apparently originated, and in the kitchen. In his report, Archuleta said he collected a variety of evidence, including a liquid substance containing a petroleum odor.

"In conclusion, it is my opinion that all sources of accidental ignition are eliminated and that an accelerant was used to ignite the fire and that the fire was an act of arson," Archuleta said.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of the arson. Anyone having any information about the case is asked to call the Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 33 local Crime Stoppers programs in New Mexico also pay cash rewards for information which leads to the arrests and indictments of major crime offenders and the capture of fugitives. Meanwhile, in other Crime Stoppers activity across New Mexico:

— Deming Crime Stoppers, at 546-7800, is out to solve a \$5,500 residential burglary. The offenders broke some glass in the rear door of the Sammy Saenz residence to gain entry, then took a variety of jewelry including a gold ring with ruby center and a circle of diamonds around it. A \$250 reward is being offered for anyone with information which leads to the arrest and indictment of the offenders.

— A \$500 reward is being offered by San Juan County Crime Stoppers, at 334-2023, for information leading to the arrest of suspects in an arson to the Blanco Bar, located about 12 miles from Bloomfield. The March 12 blaze totally destroyed the bar.

— Taos County Crime Stoppers, at 758-8118, is offering a \$200 reward for information leading to the solution of the March 14 burglary of the Taos Eagles Club. Taken in the theft were 26 cases each of Miller's, Coors and Budweiser beer. The offenders gained entry by removing the screen and plywood covering a south window.

— Crime Stoppers of Hobbs is interested in any information which might solve the theft of more than \$3,000 worth of copper tubing from a construction site. The theft occurred between January 10-20, while employees were absent from the site. Also taken was a half-inch Milwaukee drill motor valued at \$75. A reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered by Hobbs Crime Stoppers at 393-8005.

— Las Vegas Crime Stoppers, at 425-8884, is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of a burglary to the Chamber of Commerce Building. On February 25, Las Vegas police officers responded to reports of a burglary in progress at the building. Upon arrival, they discovered the intruder had escaped, apparently before he was able to take some records from the Municipal Judge's office. The offender was described as being 6-0, 200 pounds. The break-in was similar to one reported on October 31, 1978, where records from the Municipal Court office were tampered with and some were stolen. No forced entry was found in either case.

tually cause the death of the tree, he added.

Local residents who suspect they may have an infestation should check their trees closely for evidence of larvae and/or cocoons, Herd said.

The larvae are grayish to light brown and about one inch long when fully grown, but they'll probably be in a smaller stage now, Herd said.

The body of the larvae is covered with a variety of short to long hairs arranged in a distinctive pattern of clumps, with the hairs growing from reddish button-like

spots. Handle the pests with care, or not at all, Herd advised, since the hairs of the insect can cause skin irritations, including rashes or blisters.

Cocoons may be attached to the underside of limbs, branches and foliated twigs. After mating, the female insect lays a mass (about the size of a dime) and produces a brownish woolly-looking sac.

Removal and destruction of egg masses, cocoons and larvae will control the insect on small home planted ornamental shrubs, which are also susceptible to infestation, but pesticides are generally recommended for full grown trees.

Continental Telephone rate hearing in May

A proposed rate increase for Continental Telephone Company of the West (CTW) will be considered by the State Corporations Commission (SCC) beginning May 18 in Santa Fe.

CTW is seeking a \$1,517,401 rate increase which would in part, be reflected in a rise of residential rates, from \$7.40 to \$10.60, and in business rates, from \$20.05 per month to \$28.65, according to Eddie Abeyta, director for the SCC.

Abeyta said Thursday that the SCC "has

received testimony about the amount of revenue which should be allotted," and the SCC is considering the recommended increase of \$623,261, Abeyta said.

Abeyta added that "quality of service provided by CTW has not yet been examined," and added that the Commission "is going to take a hard look at this as well."

The CTW rate increase hearings will be held in two phases. On May 18, they will convene at 9:30 a.m., to determine if a revenue deficit exists for CTW. On July 13, also at 9:30 a.m., the Commission will examine what rates will be increased, "if a deficit does exist." If a deficit is not apparent, but "excesses are the case," Abeyta said, CTW users could see a decrease in their monthly bills.

Abeyta said the SCC will accept written testimony about quality of service and other aspects of the proposal, but added that those who can, should try to attend the hearings so they can give oral testimony, as it is "more desirable."

MILLIONAIRE PIE

2 Cups powdered sugar
 1 Stick margarine, softened
 1 large egg
 1/4 Tsp. vanilla
 1 Cup heavy cream whipped
 1/4 Cup chopped nuts
 1 Cup crushed pineapple drained
 Cream together sugar and margarine. Add egg, salt and vanilla. Mix until light and fluffy. Spoon into baked crust. Chill.
 Blend whipped cream and pineapple and nuts. Spoon on top of egg mixture. Chill. Makes 2 pies.

FROZEN LEMON CRUNCH

2 Cups crushed corn flakes, crushed
 3 Tbsp. brown sugar
 2 Tbsp. oleo
 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 Combine, cook in skillet over low heat, stir constantly until sugar is melted. Beat 3 egg yolks with 1/2 cup sugar. Cook over hot water until thick. Remove from heat and cool. 

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Author Eve Zumwaldt states writers must keep busy

"The first and most sure reward of creative life is creation."

That was the message delivered to a small audience at the Ruidoso Public Library Friday, as Nogal author Eva Zumwaldt described the "pains and pleasures" of a writing career. The talk was part of an observance of National Book Week.

Zumwaldt is the author of several novels, including "Sundust," a "horse story" aimed at teenagers; and a number of romantic suspense novels such as "The Yearning Years," "Briarlea," and "Masquerade of Evil." She's also published a western novel under the pen name Lee Hawk.

Just during the past week she received word that another of her books has been accepted by the Doubleday Publishing Company, New York, and still another will be published next year, she said.

The three major obstacles to the "creative life" of a writer are "labor, loneliness and rejection," of which Zumwaldt has had her share.

Writing means "working on speculation," she added, with the writer never knowing whether the labor will bring success and financial gain.

A disciplined writer now, Zumwaldt said she spends three to four hours a day at her desk, and a minimum of six months is necessary to complete a novel.

Loneliness is also a major problem for writers, Zumwaldt said, because the work requires great "unbroken lengths of time."

Consequently, she said, "Your friends forget your name and you don't get called," for social gatherings. Becoming "attuned to solitude" is a necessary part of overcoming the feelings of loneliness, she said.

Dealing with those inevitable letters of

rejection is perhaps the hardest part of the writer's life, she said.

Zumwaldt now has a healthy attitude about rejection, but that wasn't always true. After her first submitted novel was rejected, she gave up writing for ten years.

Her return to the craft was the result of "an offer she couldn't refuse." Her daughters, well aware of her desire and ability, agreed to take care of all the household tasks for a summer, if she pledged to have "a manuscript ready by fall."

She kept her end of the bargain, and success came, slowly but steadily.

Zumwaldt said she doesn't bother to prepare an outline of her books, but sits down and writes, "as fast as I can go, all the way through the first draft."

Although she usually has the plot and possibly the climactic scene in mind throughout the process, she said she lets the day to day work determine the

direction of the story.

"My characters like to tell me where to go," she said.

The thrill of becoming a published author makes up for the long hours of work and anxious waiting, Zumwaldt said.

Upon receiving her first notice of acceptance of a novel, she said, "I let out a shriek that the neighbors probably thought was the fire alarm."

At last, "I had readers," she said. "Maybe they were just two little old ladies in Philadelphia, but somewhere, someone was reading my book."

Zumwaldt advised beginning writers to take courses in the craft, and to read as many books as possible in the area in which he or she is most interested.

"Immerse yourself in them to get an idea of what editors are accepting," she said.

Although prospective writers are continually told to "write what you know," Zumwaldt said the statement "isn't necessarily true."

She has written books set on the Atlantic coastline and in the deep south, without the purported advantage of visiting either location.

Hours of research are what has enabled her to write convincingly about those locales — so convincingly that strangers from those areas have admired her work and questioned her about when she lived there.

In addition to the better known necessities of extensive rewriting and polishing Zumwaldt has another piece of advice for prospective authors.

"Never, ever tell anyone your plot," she said. "After you get it off your chest, you don't want to write it." Keeping the story a secret allows "the pressure to build up inside," and flow from the typewriter, she said.

Once a work finally has been submitted for publication, Zumwaldt said it is important to get busy with other work as soon as possible, and to stop worrying about the quality.

"You never think it's good enough yourself," she said, "but someone else will." And once that fact is recognized through publication, she added, the writer begins to realize that in a literary career, "the pleasures far outweigh the pains."

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
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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — All right kiddies. It's time to get out your maps of the state.

Uncle Freddie is commencing his geography lesson.

This column, after unending research, has solved the problem of how to divide the state into three equal Congressional districts.

(No, no. Hold the applause.)

All we really want to do is share our solution with members of the Legislature, most of whom no longer talk to this columnist because of things we have said about them in the past. (Soreheads!)

Well, we're just going to go ahead and blurt it all right out; and you can decide for yourself later whether we got listened to or whether lawmakers ignored us, mumbling a few curse words under their breath, as they usually do.

It's not an easy thing to accomplish.

The state has to devise three districts from which to elect Congresspersons, instead of the present two.

What's more, thanks to certain Supreme Court decisions, the districts must be of almost exactly equal population. Furthermore, just to complicate the problem, the divisions will be more easily accepted by the people if none of them requires the dividing of any existing county.

First, therefore, the numbers.

The Census Bureau solemnly assures us there are 1,299,988 residents of the state who must be accounted for in such division. Each of the three districts we are striving to create, therefore, should contain something very close to 433,323 citizens, or one-third of the total of the state.

So here's the plan.

District 1 will be composed of Bernalillo and Torrance counties, just as two bills proposed earlier this year suggested. That

accounts for 437,191 people, which puts that district within 1 percent of our one-third norm.

Then we create a District 2 which is L-shaped, as the present district is, but in a reverse configuration.

In this new plan, we start in the northeast corner of the state, come down the east side, and then swing across the south to take in the following counties:

Union, Harding, Quay, Curry, Roosevelt, De Baca, Chaves, Lea, Eddy, Lincoln, Otero, Dona Ana, Sierra, Luna, Grant and Hidalgo.

(Hard to visualize without a map before you? At least you should be able to recognize your own county and know into what district this plan puts it.)

That grouping of counties has 439,446 residents, which is 1.4 percent above our norm. Put Sierra county into the next district, and we're only .5 percent above our aim.

District 3, obviously, is all other counties — Colfax, Mora, San Miguel, Guadalupe, Santa Fe, Taos, Rio Arriba, Los Alamos, Sandoval, San Juan, McKinley, Valencia, Cibola, Catron and Socorro.

How many people? Exactly 433,331, or a mere eight more than the norm allows. (How's that for hitting the bull's eye?)

The ethnic distribution works out like this: In District 1, 36.8 percent of the folks are Hispanic and 2.7 percent are Indian; in District 2, 33.6 percent are Hispanic and 1 percent are Indian; and in District 3, 39.3 percent are Hispanic and 20.5 percent are Indian. To improve on that, you'd have to force some people to relocate, which is against the law.

Okay. Let's see you elected officials divide up the state in a way which beats that.

Gotcha!

BUREAUCRACY'S ROLE

The budget proposals by President Reagan already have stirred controversy in Congress among members committed to the preservation of pet programs.

But administration spokesmen have insisted that it's the "fat" not the "muscle" that is the target of the spending ax.

And separate studies, commissioned by congressional committees, have turned up persuasive evidence that waste and fraud demand a significant share of the aid funds intended to relieve the ills of America's needy.

A report prepared for the Senate Appropriations Committee, for example, concludes that as much as \$1.8 billion, about 20 percent, of the \$9.2 billion food stamp program is vulnerable to abuse. Investigators questioned 300 state and local officials in seven states in reaching their determination.

Food stamp workers are reluctant to challenge applicants they suspect of cheating, according to the study, because of strict rules that limit verification of eligibility information.

Federal procedures, too, result in oversights of stamps. Applicants filing on the last day of the month are provided a full month's allotment of stamps. Eligibility computations are lax.

Stamps reported stolen are replaced without attempt to verify the reports.

The investigators also confirmed, however, that the food stamps are essential to needy members of society, contributing a great deal to their nutritional well-being.

The temptation to simply cut the program back by 20 percent is apparent, but that would cripple the entire effort. Those most in need would share the funding cuts with those who obtain aid fraudulently.

The investigators recommended instead that the Food and Nutrition Service of the Department of Agriculture tighten up its administration of the program. States should be required to report all cases of fraud and the measures taken to fight it. Cases of abuse should be prosecuted. The rules should be changed to give administrators more effective control.

The food stamp study spotlights the president's dilemma. To fulfill his pledge not to cut benefits for the truly needy, he will need the wholehearted co-operation of the bureaucracy at all levels. — News-Bulletin, Belen

FREE-LOADING IRS

It is bad enough that the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) extracts some of the taxes it does from business, but it is really going too far when it demands business do some of the IRS's work, as well.

If a firm uses the services of a free-lance salesman, for instance, it makes no difference to the IRS that the company considers the salesman an independent contractor who is paid only commission.

Oh, no, says the IRS. If he uses a desk in a company building and devotes more than half his working time to company-related matters, he is an employee. Since he is an employee, the company must withhold his taxes from his paycheck. The IRS apparently does not believe it can trust free-lancers to declare their actual earnings. On the other hand, the IRS is unwilling or unable to police such workers itself, so it makes the companies who pay such salesmen do it. Why should they have to enforce the honesty of such persons? The payment of one's taxes is a question between the individual and the government. Civic concern or even self-interest might lead other citizens to get involved, but no company should be required to do the IRS's enforcement for workers who are really self-employed.

What does the company get out of this deal? It gets to do a lot more paperwork at its own expense without even a form letter of thanks from the IRS. — DeBaca County News, Fort Sumner

Detectives on police departments across the nation usually come in contact with a small segment of the population.

The detectives assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division of the Ruidoso Police Department likewise receive a minimum of public exposure.

Some of our residents, be they permanent or temporary, who have been apprehended and found guilty of burglary, possibly are wishing they hadn't been exposed to Ruidoso's detectives.

During this past March, for instance, the detectives investigated thefts and burglaries in which property valued at \$19,131 was stolen.

In addition to suspects arrested, Ruidoso's detectives recovered \$12,363 of this stolen property and returned it to the owners.

This amounts to a recovery rate of 64.6 percent, compared to the national recovery average of eight percent.

We congratulate Ruidoso's detectives on a job well done. — CD

Focus on Small Business

Dear Mr. Shafer:
One of the biggest can of worms for small business to open is the federal government's policies on patent rights. What is being done to get a uniform national patent policy?

The newest can opener is legislation recently signed into law by President Carter. It's called the University and Small Business Patent Procedures Act.

This law gives small businesses and universities first option to title on inventions made in performance of federal research and development contracts.

This patent policy revision, replacing 28 different agency policies on the granting of patent rights, gives small businesses and universities the incentive to develop and market their inventions. However, to retain title they must report and file patent applications on the inventions within a reasonable period of time. Previously,

many federal agencies retained the patents to inventions created with federal money.

Other provisions of this legislation allow the United States Patent and Trademark Office to reexamine issued patents at the request of any party. Patent holders and challengers thus can avoid costs and delays of patent litigation.

The law also establishes fee schedules based on a percentage of average estimated costs, including for the first time patent maintenance fees to be paid over the life of the patent.

To insure that the increase in fees does not discourage independent inventors and small businesses from filing patent and trademark applications, the Patent and Trademark Office will adopt regulations for fees that reflect the ability of small concerns to pay, probably with fee levels for processing, filing, and maintenance.

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — First there was the cane pole, then fiberglass rods, then came graphite, and today, we have boron rods. The higher up the list from fiberglass, the more the price climbs. The boron rods are very expensive, at least to me, and I wonder if the price is justified. There are people who believe the higher the price, the better the product; and they wouldn't settle for anything less than the most expensive. But can these new materials justify their cost? I'm a serious fisherman, but I also have budget limitations. Gene R., Mississippi

Dear Gene — There are, indeed, material choices to fit most pocketbooks. The split-cane rod you refer to was a favorite for many years and they are still an excellent choice, but as you might know, they are also one of the most expensive because of the many hand operations required in their building. Fiberglass rods have been the top seller for many years, and I don't see that changing. It is a good material, rugged, and inexpensive.

People fish for different reasons. Some enjoy getting out in the fresh air and actually catching a fish is of secondary importance. Others are diehard fishermen and will settle for nothing less than the best equipment available. These are the anglers who eagerly await the graphite and boron materials, or any improvement technology can afford.

The boron rods are usually made of about 25 percent boron fibers, maybe 65 percent graphite, and the rest fiberglass. The better graphites rods are about 90 percent graphite and 10 percent fiberglass. The salvation of these materials is that they provide superior sensitivity and balance, as well as good casting distance. They are light and comfortable. Their big disadvantage is that they are easier crushed and broken than fiberglass. All things considered, I believe you get your money's worth from these rods if you strive for perfection.

On the subject of rods, one of my pet peeves is the way manufacturers of good rods stick second rate guides on their product. In a season or two they rust and cut from line wear. There is evidence that better guides are being used by some as standard practice nowadays.

Private emergency medical help available to touring veterans

An acute medical emergency involves a veteran.

A Veterans Administration (VA) medical facility isn't readily available.

The veteran must be admitted to a private hospital.

Then what? Veterans and their relatives should be aware generally of the benefits and assistance available to them if an emergency occurs involving a veteran, advise the directors of the seven VA medical centers in Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico.

If VA medical facilities aren't readily available — and the veteran is admitted to a private hospital because of an emergency — the veteran, a relative or a member of the private hospital staff should take these actions:

— Immediately contact the nearest VA medical center communications clerk or medical administration assistant on duty.

— Give the veteran's name, social security number, where hospitalized and the telephone number, name of the doctor, diagnosis and the date and time hospitalized as well as if the veteran has a service-connected disability related to the condition requiring the emergency medical treatment at a private hospital.

— Have the attending physician at the private hospital contact the nearest VA

medical center as soon as he or she determines the veteran's condition is stable enough to permit transfer to the VA.

The directors said that if the veteran has a service-connected disability and the hospitalization in a non-VA hospital was an emergency, the VA in most cases can authorize payment for those medical expenses — when it has been clearly established that the hospitalization involved a service-connected condition.

If a veteran is traveling — and requires hospitalization involving his service-connected condition at either a private hospital or doctor's office — the VA should be notified within 15 days. That is so eligibility can be established and authorization for payment of care initiated.

The VA medical center directors stress that the VA won't be able to make such payments for any type of medical care received for a non-service-connected condition.

They also note that not all VA medical centers provide emergency-ambulance service themselves. For example, the Denver VA Medical Center doesn't.

If a veteran or his or her relative calls such a VA medical center for emergency ambulance service, he or she will be referred to the local 911 emergency system.

But the VA medical center directors stress that if the veteran's condition requires immediate attention, he or she should be transported to the nearest community emergency facility that can potentially save his or her life.

"That policy won't make everyone happy," said one of the VA directors. "But it clearly saves lives, which is our primary concern. In that instance, the VA isn't responsible for private medical bills which may result from the emergency."

The VA medical center directors also stressed:

— If the veteran's condition is non-service connected, VA won't assume the cost of the emergency ambulance or private care received. But it will effect transfer to the nearest VA medical center as soon as possible.

— If the veteran's service-connected condition is involved in the emergency care, the VA should be told that fact immediately. That is so that authorization to pay for the private care and ambulance charges can be arranged along with transfer to a VA medical center as soon as possible.

The directors cautioned that that information is of a general nature and every case involving a veteran in an emergency-medical situation must necessarily be handled on its own merit.

Next fall's migratory game bird hunting regulations proposed

Preliminary hunting regulations for ducks, geese and other migratory game birds for the 1981-82 hunting season have been proposed by the Interior Department's United States Fish and Wildlife Service. No major changes from last year's hunting regulations are proposed at this time.

The proposals, published in the March 26, 1981, Federal Register, describe tentative season frameworks, daily bag and possession limits, and shooting hours for migratory game birds in the contiguous United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto

Rico and the Virgin Islands. Species discussed in the proposals include ducks, geese, brant and swans; doves and pigeons; cranes; rails, coots and gallinules; and woodcock and snipe.

Shooting hours will remain from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Framework dates for ducks and geese will be from October 1, 1981, to January 20, 1982, for the Atlantic Flyway; from October 3, 1981, to January 20, 1982, for the Mississippi Flyway; and from October 3, 1981, through January 17, 1982, for the Central and Pacific Flyways.

All of the published proposals are subject to change later if indicated by information obtained from surveys, State conservation agencies and the public. Public comments on the proposals are invited through June 10, 1981, for Alaska, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands; July 13 for other "early" seasons (those opening before October 1); and August 24 for the "late" seasons (those opening after October 1). Comments should be addressed to the Director, (FWS/MBMO), United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. 20240.

To ensure that the public has ample opportunity to comment on the proposals, two public hearings will be held to review the status of migratory game birds and consider the proposed hunting regulations. The first hearing will pertain to early season regulations and will be held on June 19, 1981, at 9 a.m. in the Department of the Interior auditorium on C Street between 18th and 19th Streets, N. W., in Washington, D. C. A second hearing on regulations for seasons opening on or after October 1 will be held on August 4, 1981, at 9 a.m., also in the Interior Department auditorium. Persons wishing to participate in these hearings should write to the Director (FWS/MBMO), United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. 20240, or telephone 202/254-3207. Those wishing to make statements should file copies with the Director before or during each hearing.

ALOHA PARADISE


Let's face it, Spelling-Goldberg Productions and ABC have made beautiful music together over the years with "Vega\$, "Charlie's Angels," "Love Boat," "Fantasy Island" and "Dynasty." Besides the latter, there really isn't much substance to these programs. They are pure escapist forms of TV entertainment. The ratings have proved that there is an audience for these shows, although interest in "Charlie's Angels" and "Vega\$" has withered.

"Aloha Paradise" is nothing more than a land-based derivative of "Love Boat" and "Fantasy Island." The cast and crew are located on the alluring Hawaiian Kona Coast, where, ironically enough, TV is passe.

Debbie Reynolds, who is attempting to pump some fresh blood into her anemic career (she's better known as Princess Leia's [Carrie Fisher's] mother), is the hostess at the posh resort. Her associates Bill "Bob Newhart" Daily, Pat "Flying High" Klous and Stephen "Kotter" Shortridge perform the other little tasks that make this paradise that much more enjoyable. Then, of course, there are the Spelling-Goldberg players, i.e. fading movie and TV stars who need a little exposure. There's nothing wrong with this concept, except for the fact that the scripts are loaded with too much drivel. None of the secondary cast members really has to work hard, with the few lines that are dished out each week. Debbie Reynolds is the program's focal point, and despite the lack of good scripts, the veteran actress does try awfully hard to please her audience as well as her clientele.

Quite frankly, "Aloha Paradise" is a visually stimulating show to watch, but I have a gut-feeling that audiences will be saying aloha to this paradise sooner than ABC expected.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: According to Hollywood insiders, sexy **Suzanne Somers** of ABC's "Three's Company" is planning to switch channels following secret talks with CBS. She's been offered top spot in a copycat series that could knock the ABC show out of the ratings. The leggy blonde's role as Chrissy Snow has been slowly squeezed out of "Three's Company." And a CBS source confirmed she's been having long talks with top brass there about her own series. He said: "CBS would really like to call it 'Chrissy' or maybe 'Chrissy's New Life'—but they have to consult their attorneys to see whether ABC has legal right to the character. Maybe we could call it 'Missy' or even 'Sissy.'" Meanwhile, Somers will do her first CBS show in June when she slips into uniform as a navy entertainment officer in a song-and-dance special aboard a carrier in the Persian Gulf. Husband **Alan Hamel** confirmed the variety role—but shot down rumors of marital breakup. He said: "Our troubles have brought us closer together." Hamel would not say if his wife has managed to get the \$150,000 per episode from CBS that ABC had refused her. "Nothing is finally settled," he said. Somers' big-dollar demands—she wanted nearly \$4 million a year salary plus a \$20 million a year profit slice—outraged "Three's Company" producers and led to her freezeout. "All I want is more money—more of the pie," she said, after refusing ABC's \$850,000 a year compromise offer. She then complained that co-stars **John Ritter** and **Joyce DeWitt** shunned her and she was escorted by guards on the set and "treated like a criminal." Now she is so mad she says she is suing ABC officials "who won't even talk to me."

TV BACKSTAGE: **James Garner** has won an unprecedented commitment from NBC for his new "Maverick" series beginning in September. The show will be on the whole year regardless of the ratings. But that's probably a safe bet for NBC execs who know Garner has one of the best track records among all TV actors. Praise, anger and frustration—that's what surfaced when some critics viewed "The American Short Story" series of adaptations of classic American short fiction. The apparent paradox was prompted by the programs' quality—as one critic asserted, not because they are bad, but because they "are so good. One got an exasperated sense of literary riches available to the networks," he added. "If program executives ever dared to film anything but topical best sellers." "American Short Story," initially televised several years ago, is currently being rebroadcast Saturdays nationally on Public Broadcasting Service stations, funded in part by a grant from Xerox Corporation. **Henry Fonda** hosts the 13-week series.

TV CLOSEUP: A leading actress on the TV sitcom "Soap" says she would be mortified if her husband cheated on her. And **Katherine Helmond** swears she'd feel even worse if husband **David Christian** betrayed her in his heart. "I think it's worse if a husband is mentally unfaithful," she told me. "I mean if he's secretly emotionally involved with another woman. You know, sex is one thing, very casual for some men, and it doesn't mean a man is necessarily in love, or that he doesn't love his wife. Of course, I think a husband shouldn't cheat, period, but I'd rather have mine cheat physically than mentally, and I'm pretty sure David feels the same way."

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

Remodeling Grand Opening

R.A. Bennett began his merchandising career in Ruidoso on November 1, 1948, when he opened the Quality Grocery in what is now Pine Tree Square.

After nine years, Bennett decided to expand and improve his service to the community and in the spring of 1957, in a 40X80-foot building, held a grand opening in the store's present location.

As Ruidoso progressed, so did Bennett's grocery business and in 1965 he added 3,200 square feet of floor space, plus a basement, to the store. This was followed by a second expansion in 1971, with the addition of 2,400 square feet of merchandising area.


The addition was completed at a cost of \$780,000, with


The improvement features energy saving equipment with refrigeration and compressors controlled by computers. A heat recovery system was incorporated in the expansion, with the refrigeration equipment heating the store and providing hot water.

Power use is constantly monitored, to lower consumption of electricity and eliminate peaks and valleys in the demand. This is the first such system installed in a store in the Southwest. The store also has a generator that will provide electricity to keep the store operating during power failures.


