# Trustees split votes 2-1

The Ruidoso trustees at Thursday afternoon's special meeting, in several two-to-one votes:

- Denied a rate increase for Cablevision of Lincoln County;
- Approved leasing the Municipal Swimming Pool to Ralph Rush;
- Approved construction, by Rush, of an amusement park on Carrizo Road near the junction with Highway 37; and
- Approved a master plan and final plats for several developments within the village limits.

On the Cablevision rate increase, trustee George White said, "According to a financial statement (I have) Cablevision made about \$200,000 last year. The new material (in the rate increase request) is not to my liking at all."

White also charged that the company's financial statement omitted disclosures concerning their financial standing, pertaining to retained earnings, and said, "We should look at this in another year," to determine if a rate increase would be justified.

Cablevision manager Paul Crown said, "The reason I'm here is for a rate increase, and to increase converter use, to give the people something they can see, something different."

White made the motion for "rejection of the rate increase," with second by trustee Frank Sayner, both of whom voted yes on the motion. Trustee Benny Coulston voted no.

Rush briefly outlined his proposal to install a water slide at the swimming pool. He also said he would provide liability insurance "to satisfy the village," and suggested a "\$7,000 yearly lease, payable

in monthly installments, or however."

The proposed slide would begin on the roof of the building at the pool and curve downward to enter the pool at the southeast corner, utilizing only a 10x10-foot pool area for entrance into the water. He said that the wooden structure would not damage the building or cause any problems in the use of the pool by swimmers.

Though prices for use of the slide haven't been developed by Rush, he said "charges elsewhere," where slides are in use "are \$3.50 for 30 minutes, \$6 per hour and \$10 for all day." He also said he would have a "\$2 admission charge for everyone for swimming."

At the onset of the operation, Rush said he would operate the pool and slide from 10 a.m.-6 p.m., daily and later in the summer, depending upon water temperature, "would run to 10 p.m."

Lease details are to be worked out Monday, with village purchasing agent Frank Potter, village attorney Lee Huckstep and Rush authorized by the trustees to draw up the lease.

The pool lease authorization, to Rush, was on motion by Coulston, with second by Sayner, with both voting yes. White voted no.

AT THIS POINT in the meeting White issued a statement, "for the record," on the village's need for water.

"I've dedicated myself to getting more water," White said. "And I am strongly in favor of accepting no new subdivisions or developments until our water problems are solved."

"I'm inclined to say I'll vote no on all of them (accepting new subdivisions or

developments), I'm opposed to any additions until our water problem is solved."

Trustee Coulston then said, "I respect Mr. White's opinion. My personal opinion is that Ruidoso will always have a water problem, as do all growth areas."

"There are many avenues, as well as stones to be turned, to make use of water saving devices."

"We need someone to seek out water rights and determine prices."

"The business community is dependent on new growth and building developments. If we stop growth, or the word gets out that we will, development will stop."

"At the next meeting we should name someone to see what water rights are available."

White then said, "And pay them to get the job done."

Coulston then said, "We can have the mayor submit the name of such a person at the next meeting."

The discussion concluded with White saying, "We should get out and buy rights, to have them when we need them. It'd be a good investment."

THE PROPOSAL to install an amusement park, to be operated by Rush, on Carrizo Road, near the junction with Highway 37, was approved, to include waiver of the fencing provision.

The waiver is for one year, for the village to determine if the landscaping is satisfactory enough to permit the facility to operate without the fence.

Specifications indicate the park will consist of a pool, approximately 100x200-feet, using 25,000 gallons of water to provide a depth of 30 inches. Rush will provide boats and motors to be used in the

pool.

The motion to approve installation of the amusement park was by Coulston, with second by Sayner, and both voting yes. White voted no.

Approval of White Mountain Villas' Master Plan and Phase 1, Lots 33 through 36, Block 3, White Mountain Estates Unit 4; Final plat on "The Crest," lots 5 and 6, Block 5, White Mountain Estates, Unit 4; and the Final plat on Vista Del Lago, Phase 2, Camelot Mountain, was given with Sayner and Coulston voting yes on all three projects and, White voting no.

The final plats on Deer Park Valley Subdivision, Units 1 and 2, and on Fox Run Subdivision, in Alto, were approved by unanimous vote.

In other business, the trustees: - Authorized street superintendent Jack La May and village clerk Jim Hine to negotiate applying an overlay on Sudderth Drive, where new sewer mains have been laid, with the State Highway Department.

- Scheduled adoption of an ordinance pertaining to water and sewer rates at the April 28 meeting.

- Approved Resolution 81-4, a temporary transfer of funds from the water to solid waste department, to pay for a new truck and the dumpsters that have been delivered to the village.

- Awarded the comprehensive general liability insurance contract to Buckley Insurance Agency, Ruidoso, who submitted bids of \$10,942 for liability and \$2,394 for inland marine coverage.

- Were advised by Hine that department heads will submit their budget requests for next year to the village on May 11.

# Drugs seized at High Rolls

More than 13 pounds of marijuana, 55 live marijuana plants and 224 grams of hashish were confiscated by Ruidoso Downs and Otero County law enforcement officers Saturday in a raid at High Rolls.

Patrick McCarvell, 29, High Rolls, was arrested and charged with possession of controlled substances, to wit, marijuana over eight ounces and hashish; and with trafficking in controlled substances, to wit, marijuana and hashish. He was lodged in the Otero County Jail.

Ruidoso Downs police chief Ray Garner told The News Saturday that his department had received information Thursday indicating that a "main source of supply (of marijuana) to the Ruidoso area" was in the High Rolls area.

The information came from "a reliable informant," Garner said. Following an "intensive investigation,"

Garner said, a search warrant was obtained, at the authorization of Steve Sanders, District Attorney, from Otero county magistrate Henry Prelo.

At about 12:30 p.m., Saturday, the house in High Rolls was searched by Garner, Downs officer Gene Ridgeway, deputies Jeffrey Farmer and Hollis Bynum of Otero County Sheriff's Department, and New Mexico State Police officer Ron Shilver of Cloudercroft.

Garner said the search yielded 224 grams of hashish, two sets of scales "used in weighing and distribution of marijuana and hashish," 6,164 grams of marijuana (13.56 pounds), 55 live marijuana plants, with grow lights, a vaporizer, timer, potting soil, several packages of marijuana seeds and a pipe.

Garner said the street value of the marijuana alone was \$10,500.

# Details on swimpool lease pending

Though a question was raised by village attorney Lee Huckstep on the validity of the March 24 special election authorizing the leasing of the Municipal Swimming Pool to Ralph Rush, in a letter from Huckstep to Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., dated April 13, the trustees are proceeding with plans to lease the pool.

The last paragraph of the letter: "Should the village go ahead and enter into a lease agreement with Ralph Rush it would stand until challenged in the courts," is the basis for the meeting today of Huckstep, Frank Potter, representing the village, and Rush, to work out lease details.

Items involved in the lease include pinpointing the premises to be leased, lease payments, admission charges, types of insurance to be required, posting of a security bond by the lessee, terms of the lease, months, days and hours of operation, facilities other than the

swimming pool and adequate protection for both parties concerned.

A village spokesman said to The News this morning that the trustees are of the opinion that today's action in drawing up lease provisions will conform to the requirements of state statutes.

# Jones heading hospital board

A board of directors for Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH), chaired by Roy L. "Pinky" Jones, organized Monday and will become a decision making body for the facility, according to Ken Moore, hospital administrator.

Moore said that previously, an advisory board which did not have policy making powers, recommended actions to the board for the Presbyterian Hospital System recently renamed the Southwest Community Health Services (SCHS) in Albuquerque, who established policies for all hospitals in the system.

"I think this is one of the single most important things that has happened in this hospital," Moore said. "With the input of these people, we will be able to run the hospital the way the community wants it run, taking into consideration legal, financial and regulatory needs, as well as the concerns of the county."

Moore added the "composition of the board is excellent. I believe they're going to take the responsibility of being on the board very seriously."

Other board members include Ben Sanchez, vice chairman, serving two years; Moore, secretary, unlimited term as administrator of RHVH; and other

members Clem Weindorf, W. C. "Dub" Williams, and Robert Finley, all serving one year terms; Ruth McGuire and Sue Stearns serving two year terms; and Gary Mitchell and Robert Hays, who join Jones as three year members.

Others serving in ex-officio positions include president of the Hospital Auxiliary, presently Ellen Miller; and Chief of the medical staff, Dr. Roger Beechie.

Moore said under the reorganized system, the local board will become trustees for the hospital, with a corporate board organized in Albuquerque at the parent hospital to "give direction from a corporate standpoint."

Members of the advisory board have been invited to become honorary members of the board of directors, Moore said, and include Dr. Don Sims, Robert McDaniel, Gerald Dean, C. L. "Bones" Wright, Nellie Vickers, J. O. "Bud" Payne, Les Crews, and Ben Hall.

"We will operate under a set of by-laws adopted at the first meeting. We also adopted a conflict of interest statement which will apply to the board," Moore said.

The by-laws give the board respon-

sibility for the overall management of the hospital, subject to approval, if needed, by SCHS's corporate board, Moore said.

The board will be responsible for providing quality health care services to meet community needs and resources; develop both an annual and three year budget with periodic reviews of the operating budget; and make long range plans for future development of the hospital's facilities and programs.

They will also have final approval of the medical staff's by-laws and regulations; will appoint the medical and dental staff and monitor their work; review reports submitted by RHVH staff regarding the quality of care provided at the facility; serve as the final appeal body for issues relating to medical staff privileges and provide guidance to the Hospital Auxiliary.

A community relations and education program will be adopted and implemented to help broaden local support and provide a firm financial base for the hospital. All actions will be reviewed by the SCHS board.

The board members will also be

# Ski Run Road paving scheduled

Additional monies have been allocated to continue a resurfacing project on State Road 532, also known locally as Ski Run Road, begun last summer.

According to the New Mexico Highway Commission, meeting Thursday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, the state legislature has approved completion of an asphalt overlay costing \$950,000, for the road, with construction to begin in August.

Joe Reese, engineer for District Two of the New Mexico Highway Department (NMHD), said the project was scheduled for August so the department could prepare designs for the road.

Highway Commission chairman Louis Whitlock asked Reese to "expedite that project if at all possible," since rainfall precludes most road construction in the Ruidoso area between July and September, according to Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth.

Predictions that Ski Run Road would fall off the mountainside "were wrong, as I noted this year," Jungbluth said. He added the resurfacing completed so far has "not deteriorated as badly as it does when tire chains are needed." He said that because the area experienced a mild winter the road reflected less than maximum usage.

Roy Parker, manager of the ski resort, said 130,000 skiers visited the resort this year, as compared to the 200,000 using those facilities in the 1979-80 ski season. Parker said he didn't feel the road would last another winter, especially if it was a normal one, if repaving was not done this summer.

WENDELL CHINO, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) said he is willing to work with the NMHD, officials in Ruidoso, and members of the Chamber to consider an alternative route to the ski area.

However, Chino, who has put off a meeting with those groups since October, 1980, said, "the holdup is my fault. I planned to hike that area last fall but

because of early snowfall, I couldn't. As soon as I can make an on the spot check, I will be willing to meet with you," Chino said.

Chino cited past differences with village officials when ski area expansion was presented, and said he did not receive much support for those plans. He said he'd like to see a turnaround of attitude by the people of Ruidoso (toward the MAT) which would make for a much better working relationship.

The commission decided to assign subcommittee to study realignment possibilities and problems, with a recommendation to be made in six to eight months.

Chino also took issue with an editorial he said he read in The Ruidoso News, which stated that since the MAT held all leases to operate Sierra Blanca Ski Area, they should also be responsible for maintenance of the road to the resort.

Chino said the MAT will begin maintaining the road on their own "when every other ski area in the state does too." He

said he has "no intention of giving in to editorial positions regarding Ski Run Road."

County commissioner Ben Hall and Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth both asked the NMHD commission to give some consideration to constructing an outlet from Highway 70 to Gavilan Canyon Road, which would provide a Ruidoso bypass primarily for truck traffic.

"Because Sudderth Drive handles the maximum amount of traffic during the summer, it makes it pretty tough for truck traffic going through the village," Jungbluth said.

Hall was also informed by Whitlock that \$2 million was appropriated by the legislature to continue the school bus programs, which are cooperative agreements between the county and state to maintain roads used by school buses.

Hall also thanked the Commission for their cooperative agreement on various road projects in the county.

## Inspiration Corporation will use Downs' water

Inspiration Corporation will receive water from the village of Ruidoso Downs — but only on certain conditions adopted at a special meeting of village trustees Friday.

The corporation had sought water service for a residence and planned Christian fine arts camp, to be located just outside the village limits.

Under a contract approved by the trustees the 19 acre tract of land will be allotted up to 50,000 gallons per month, and any gallonage over 40,000 will be billed at one and one half times the normal rate.

The village will not be responsible for "installation, maintenance or repair" of water lines to the home from the meter, nor for fire hydrants, which the Wadleys plan to install themselves.

The contract also specified that, other than the rate increase, the Wadleys must be regarded as any other water user, and as such, be subject to all water regulations and enforcement action of the village.

Mayor Norman Wheeler also advised the Wadleys that they would probably have to purchase and install a pressure pump, because of the high elevation of their property in relation to the Downs water supplies.

Trustee Bob Power, who cast the sole vote against the contract, said he did so only because he disapproved of selling water outside the village limits.

He also cautioned the Wadleys that the 50,000 gallon figure applied to their entire tract of land, and any future expansion of camp facilities might necessitate the drilling of a well.

According to chairperson for the project, Charlotte Jarratt, representatives of both sponsoring groups will be located at Ben Franklin's, Ruidoso State Bank, Ruidoso Public Library, Safeway, Security Bank and Gibson's, to make the vial of life available to anyone who has time to fill out one form. Booths will be open 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

Jarratt said the form gives a medical history of every family member and must be completed in triplicate. "The original goes into a vial and is sent home with the person to place inside their refrigerator," Jarratt said.

The second copy is given to the police department and the third copy goes to the sheriff's department. "Of course, all information on the form will remain confidential," Jarratt said.

A sticker which should be placed on a window near the front door, will alert emergency personnel that a vial of life has been placed in the home. "Then, if there is an emergency at your home, you will have all the needed information written down and stored in a handy and safe place," Jarratt said.

Jarratt said the program is free and committee members include Jarratt, Jodie Keyes, Billie Knott, Nellie Vickers, all from the Woman's Club; Orby Neatherlin, Dottie Quaid, Lorene Ross and Bea Adams, Extension Club members.

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



The birds are our little spiritual friends, living as they do in the heavens and on the earth; and now I have received a loving message from our mother and all our loved ones in heaven.

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
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# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Let's say in a moment of madness you decide to run for statewide elective office.

How do you time your announcement of that decision?

There are lots of people preoccupied with that problem during the month of April of 1981. They are those who would like to be listed on your ballot when you go to the polls in November 1982.

To announce too early can be a serious mistake. That premature creates the impression that you may be just a mite too eager. It can even leave the populace with the notion that you are incapable of making a living in any legitimate, non-elective capacity.

Toney Anaya, who told us within weeks of his last defeat (by Pete Domenici in the Senatorial race in 1979) that he wanted desperately to be governor, certainly ran that risk.

For most people, an announcement that early would be too soon.

That rule, of course, might not apply to Toney, who has specialized in violating the taken-for-granted regulations of New Mexico politics. Though he is out of office for the nonce, he may still turn out to be a viable candidate in 1982.

("Viable": A word which was once used only by obstetricians and gynecologists, to denote a fetus which was capable of living outside the womb of the mother; but which now occurs frequently on the television shows of such outstanding intellectual lights as Johnny Carson, Phil Donahue, and Merv Griffin.)

Anaya's gamble, of course, is that he may turn out to be a victim of having made his intentions known too soon.

There's also the opposite possibility. Some may wait too long to make their purpose known. (How many wooees have given up while they waited to hear from the wooer?)

And all this doesn't just apply at the top; it isn't only Senatorial, Congressional and gubernatorial candidates who must opt to talk too soon or too late, it is also those in less stellar roles.

Who's going to run for lieutenant governor, for instance?

That choice can affect the outcome of the higher office.

In New Mexico primaries, the two candidates — for governor and for lieutenant governor — do not run as a team. That's okay, except for the fact that

in November, in the general election, they do.

Under those circumstances, you can end up with two fellows running together who are as ill matched as Bruce King and Bob Mondragon. Sometimes that helps the man at the top of the ticket, there are still those who say Bruce would not have defeated Joe Skeen last time out by his paper-thin margin without Roberto on the ticket with him. There are also those who say Jerry Apodaca-Bob Ferguson would not have defeated Joe Skeen-Vergil Rhodes if Rhodes had added anything to the ticket. (Bet you didn't even remember Rhodes was involved in the debacle — and even then, Skeen only lost by the skin of his teeth.)

Maybe it's true that we shouldn't be neglecting that slightly lesser office, though most news people act as though it didn't matter.

So if you want to be governor, you not only have to time your announcement of that fact to a nicety. You may also have to control very carefully the choice of the lieutenant governor candidate whose name appears on the ticket with yours.

### NO WORK NO PAY

After an all day stint of directing traffic in freezing weather at the Rotary enchilada dinner, I had looked forward to the weekly trustee meeting on Tuesday night in a little warmer atmosphere.

When I arrived at the meeting place in the local library it was apparent that a trustee meeting would not be held. Aside from trustee Sayner no other trustee or the mayor was in attendance.

After the required waiting period the meeting was called off, however, in the meantime an individual expressed his feelings that this particular meeting was a must for him since plans already approved by the P&Z needed council approval that very evening as the finalization of the plan was set for the next day. He was not happy about the meeting being cancelled.

On April 30, with only two trustees present, the council stumbled through a session which produced only limited agreement on anything due to the fact that the two trustees present could not agree on anything — so — another trustee meeting was called for the following Monday. The newspaper announcement of the second meeting did not appear until the Monday issue announcing a 1:30 p.m., meeting but since the paper is not handled by the post office until after 1:30 the announcement served no purpose.

Village business must be carried out on

time just as any other business or corporation and when we face a situation where we apparently cannot get the council to meet on time and with a full complement of officials we face a problem. In a corporation failure of a director to attend meetings would call for his replacement.

About a year ago I pointed out to the trustees that the \$40 monthly stipend was unfair and not in line with money paid to officers of other towns. I suggested that the fee be raised to \$100. The trustees then voted an increase to \$250. I then suggested that in view of the 600% pay increase they agree that the monthly fee would be paid only for meetings attended. This was rejected. It would be a good idea as of now to reconsider this point as it is not proper to pay someone for doing nothing. This may or may not improve attendance but might help.

Eight months have now passed and we are still waiting for an answer to the water problem. The trustees should give us a progress report with an anticipated final conclusion date showing a plan for upgrading our present water and sewer system, what is to be done to give us sufficient water in the future, and a water and sewer schedule of increased rates. Our success in well drilling has been good and if wells are the answer to the water problem then so be it, but we need to be informed.

The swimming pool lease, whether by ordinance or contract, or both, should be expedited or summer will be here before we are ready to conclude a contract. In which case we will face another loss in its operation.

Revised plans for the jail operation should be pushed and concluded.

All in all there seems to be a lot of work to be done.

### CURBING THE PRESS

The United Nations idea to license journalists for their own protection is an ominous one.

The stated purpose behind the plan is to give acknowledged journalists credentials that would be recognized by governments as a means of protecting their safety.

The problem is that non-western nations do not see journalists in the same light as the west. The idea of objective reporting unfettered by government manipulation is not big in much of Africa, Asia and East Europe. If a reporter is defined as one who carries U. N. papers, depriving a too conscientious journalist of those papers would be an excellent way of curbing his activities. Without the proposed credentials, the reporter would not be permitted to follow his work. If he persisted in trying, he would not be granted the protection allegedly provided to his card-carrying colleagues. He might even be accused of impersonating a reporter and his safety may be jeopardized.

A free and responsible press would be seriously hindered by this plan. — De Baca County News, Fort Sumner.

### COMEBACK

America's carmakers are making a stirring comeback in competition with foreign manufacturers.

The new breed of United States sub-compact holds its own in mileage tests with German and Japanese imports.

And, of equal importance, there is evidence that domestic engineering and technological skills are producing vehicles that are safer and less expensive to repair than cars from abroad.

Tests by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety assessed the amount of damage suffered by 1981 models in collisions with a fixed barrier at 10 miles per hour. The most dramatic difference was in the comparison between a Ford Escort and the Japanese-made Toyota Corolla Tercel — repair costs to the Ford were set a \$455, while the damage to the Toyota was \$1,030.

In its battle for survival, the United States auto industry is exploiting the traditional "know-how" that for decades made it the envy of its global competitors. — News-Bulletin, Belen

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# Women in Science Workshop scheduled May 23-24 at UNM

Dr. Sally K. Ride, an astronaut with the NASA space program, will give the keynote address during the May 23-24 Women in Science Workshop at the University of New Mexico (UNM).

The workshop, supported by a grant from the National Science Foundation, is geared to facilitate the reentry of women with an associate or a bachelor's degree in science into careers commensurate with their current or projected training.

Following registration and opening remarks, Ride will give the keynote lecture Saturday, May 23, at 9:30 a.m., in the Kiva near the College of Education. Her topic will be "The Future of Women in Science."

A native of California, Ride received a bachelor's degree in English from Stanford University in 1973, and later earned a bachelor's of science degree, master's of science degree and a doctorate in physics in 1973, 1975 and 1978, respectively.

Ride has held teaching assistant and research assignments while a graduate student in the physics department at Stanford. Her research includes working in experimental general relativity and in X-ray astrophysics.

She was selected as an astronaut candidate by NASA in January 1978. In August 1979, she completed a one year training and evaluation period making her eligible for assignment as a mission specialist on future space shuttle flight crews.

In addition to Ride, other speakers who will participate in the workshop include Betty M. Vetter, executive director of the Scientific Manpower Commission, a participating organization of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Washington, D. C. Vetter's topic is "Reentry Women in Science: Candid Career Perspectives."

Mary White, program manager for Remedial Action for Waste Disposal Sites with the Department of Energy, and president of the American Nuclear Society, will discuss careers for women in science in the future.

The final speaker, Cathryn Goddard, an associate with A. T. Kearney, a management consultant firm in Washington, D. C., will discuss "Matching Your Technical Skills to the Market Place."

The workshop panel on personal perspectives on science will include Mary

Anderson, associate professor of engineering, Arizona State University; Elizabeth Dressel, graduate student in anthropology, UNM; and Deborah Bennett and Sandra Zink, both staff members at the Los Alamos Scientific National Laboratories.

Group sessions on writing a resume, job interviews and time management will also be held.

Sponsored by the Behavioral Research Division and the Women's Center, both of UNM, the workshop is for women who received their last degree at least two years prior to the workshop and who are currently unemployed or underemployed in terms of their potential.

The workshop is multidisciplinary and

includes physical, biological, medical (but not clinical), environmental, social and behavioral sciences, as well as mathematics and engineering. Participants will be given candid information about career opportunities in various fields of science and sectors of the economy.

Advance registration is required as attendance is limited to 100 persons. Application forms and a \$10 fee must be mailed to the Behavioral Research Division at UNM. A block of rooms has been reserved in a UNM dormitory at \$6 per night. Luncheons and dinner on Saturday night will be provided. A stipend will be paid to those women who live outside the metropolitan area. Registration deadline is April 24.

## Most forest areas open for recreational usage

The Lincoln National Forest was grateful for a little rain and a little snow last week, which helped to lower the danger of wildfire in the forest.

Steadily increasing visitor traffic is expected on the forest during the next few weeks, as the weather continues to warm up and campers and picnickers begin enjoying the delights of spring.

In the Smokey Bear District, at Ruidoso, water levels are normal, and Bonita Lake is receiving heavy fishing pressure on weekends. Three Rivers Campground and Cedar Creek Picnic Area are open. The remaining campgrounds will open May 15. Small amounts of snow remain in the high country. Trails are mostly clear and roads are in good condition. Temperatures are ranging from the 30's to the 70's. Fire conditions are moderate, with no restrictions. All fuelwood areas except Number Two are open.

At Cloudcroft, fire danger is also moderate. The Joplin Ridge Fuelwood Area is open. It is a charge area. Silver Campground, and the Silver Over-flow


Area are both open, but there is no water and no fees being charged. Bailey Canyon Road is still closed and the portion of the Rim Trail, from a mile south of Alamo Peak Road to Atkinson Field, is closed. Maintenance work on the upper portion of Dog Canyon Trail is in progress. Roads are in good condition, but there may be some isolated muddy spots.

On the Guadalupe District, at Carlsbad, fuelwood areas are open, but some areas are wet. They have received some rain this past week. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic area is receiving moderate use through the week, and heavy use on weekends. Road work is continuing on Forest Road 540, and intermittent road construction is continuing on Forest Road 67, the Rim Road. Motorists should use caution in these areas. Trail and road conditions are wet.

At Mayhill, fuelwood areas are open and James Canyon Campground is receiving light use. It has been raining on the Mayhill District, and some roads may be muddy. Turkey season will be open until April 26.

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# Shale oil production destined for future

The belief that there is more oil in the mountains of Utah, Colorado and Wyoming than in all the known reserves in the Middle East is not all that comforting to those who seek a quick solution to America's energy woes.

"The problem," said one University of New Mexico (UNM) researcher, "is that OPEC oil is relatively cheap and easy to get."

Cheap? Easy? Compared to Rocky Mountain oil shale, rock impregnated with a heavy crude oil, conventional oil sources are less expensive and easier to come by, according to UNM chemical and nuclear engineering Professor Richard Mead.

Four researchers from UNM's Synfuels Lab, established with state funds and now supported by industry, are involved in lab experiments and the study of modeling techniques for recovering oil from shale in situ (in place), a method that promises to be economically advantageous and environmentally necessary.

"Right now there is a glut of oil on the world market," said Eric Nuttall, director of the Synfuels Lab. "Oil from shale is a promising fuel source, but if we can get it elsewhere more cheaply and with less trouble, that's what we'll do."

But he added that soaring fuel prices and dwindling supplies are bringing us ever closer to the shale age.

Nuttall said there are about two trillion barrels of oil in the three state area of Utah, Colorado and Wyoming. Compare that amount with the 20 to 40 billion barrels believed to be in the highly touted Alaskan pools and the figures are staggering. But the shale, 80 percent rock and 20 percent kerogen, a thick, rubbery oil, cannot be extracted by normal drilling operations and that presents considerable economic and environmental challenges.

"Oil shale extraction is highly capital-intensive," Nuttall said. "With high interest rates, a fluctuating market and the emerging differences between the Carter and Reagan energy policies, it's a risky business. It requires lots of drilling and mining equipment, labor and the installation of environmental safeguards."

The method that Nuttall, Mead, chemical and nuclear engineering Professor Ebtisam Wilkins and research associate Deepak Thakur are studying is called vertical modified in situ retorting. Simply stated, a small zone is mined deep in the rock. Conventional explosives are placed in the zone and detonated. The rock above it is reduced to rubble, which falls into the zone. Then heat and air are forced down into the crushed rock, causing the kerogen to flow to the bottom, where it is pumped out and processed.

American oil companies are actively developing modular, semicommercial oil shale operations that could be duplicated easily and on a grander scale. Still, Nuttall

believes the United States will not see a significant impact from shale for 10 to 20 years.

One advantage of the in situ method of oil from shale extraction is the significant reduction in the amount of material to be mined, said Nuttall. For example, the United States currently imports about six to eight million barrels of oil per day. To extract that same amount of oil from shale in conventional mining methods would require the mining of anywhere from six to 16 million tons of rock per day. That's the equivalent of the total tonnage of coal mined in New Mexico.

"The chances of our finding any more new, big reserves of oil in the United States are not good," he said. "It's like the analogy of the golden nugget. We've gone along and picked up all the golden nuggets in the stream. Now we've got to

search harder and dig deeper. If, in the near future, the United States should discover a huge oil reserve somewhere in the free world, that discovery would slow the development of shale for some time. But the shale will always be there for us."

Oil shale has had a cyclic history. Though it has been known about for more than 100 years, its exploitation has been delayed by the discovery of less expensive, easier to extract fuel sources. In the 1920s and 1940s, when the United States appeared to be running out of domestic oil, new reserves were discovered, such as the oil fields of Texas, and oil shale was set aside as an energy source.

"Whatever happens," Nuttall said, "oil shale should play an important role in our energy future. It will not supply all our oil needs, but will contribute to our total energy supply."

## UNM professor named editor of new journal

Dr. Mohammad Jamshidi, professor of electrical and computer engineering at the University of New Mexico (UNM), has been appointed by the Control Systems Society of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) to be the founding editor of the group's new professional journal, IEEE Control Systems Magazine.

The journal, to be published quarterly, will contain technical articles for control engineers and scientists, book reviews, letters to the editor, news items and announcements of technical conferences.

The technical articles will focus on the application of control systems theory and will include survey and tutorial papers.

An internationally recognized expert in control systems, Jamshidi also is an associate editor of Automatica and Journal on Large Scale Systems. He is the author of a forthcoming book on large scale systems to be published by American-Elsevier.

Jamshidi joined the UNM faculty as a visiting professor in 1979 and as a professor in 1980. He previously was a visiting professor at the Technical University of Denmark and a professor in the department of electrical engineering at Shiraz University in Iran.

A World Trade Fellow at the T. J. Watson Research Center of IBM from 1975 to 1977, he earned his doctoral degree in electrical engineering from the University of Illinois in 1971.

Jamshidi's editorial assistant at UNM is Gladys Erickson. The journal's editorial office at UNM is located in Tapy Hall.

A circulation of more than 9,000 is expected for the journal in the United States and foreign countries. The journal's board of editors includes Dr. Peter Dorato, chairperson of the UNM department of electrical and computer engineering.

The IEEE is the national professional society for electrical engineers.

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


