## Valliant outlines need for high school building

Ruidoso School District patrons will vote May 12 on a \$2,250,000 bond issue, that will help finance a new high school.

Superintendent Pat Valliant said the future of the school system "literally hinges on the passage of the bond issue." He said if the bond passes, the district will be bonded to capacity and will then be eligible to approach the State Emergency Capital Outlay Committee (ECOC) to seek \$8 million in additional funding, that the district need not repay.

"Of course, we crossed the first bridge to seeking ECOC funds when we passed the two mill levy by about a five to one margin in February," Valliant said.

"The people have always come to our rescue on bond elections and they know we're not going to ask for anything we don't need. The voters have been good to us in that respect."

The present school district tax rate, Valliant said to The News Thursday morning, is \$46.17 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. The bond issue would

over a seven year retirement, increase taxes by \$11.93 per thousand; with the two mill levy, over a three year period, adding \$2 per thousand. After the mill levy ends, the increase would be \$9.93 for another four years.

Valliant said the upcoming election will propose paying off the bonds within seven years "because we don't think it is right to hold the taxpayers to terrifically high interest rates for the next 10 to 15 years."

Ruidoso's overcrowding problems have persisted through the 1980-81 school year, Valliant said, but were alleviated somewhat when a portable building was placed at Nob Hill Elementary. Valliant has already requested two more portable buildings for loan from the ECOC, to use for three years.

"We have overcrowding at both White Mountain Schools and we definitely need two more classrooms, which, if approved will hopefully be here by August 1," he said.

If the bond issue passes, he added, August is also when any ECOC monies allocated to Ruidoso would arrive. "We have requested \$6 million, which we would like over a three-year period, so we could

build the high school in three phases." Valliant said preliminary plans, including a possible 40-acre tract for the new facility, have already been submitted for review to the ECOC.

"Immediately after the election, we will canvass the votes and then go forward with the architect's plans," Valliant said. Architects on the project are Alley-Connell and Associates of Roswell, who have worked with the school system nearly 20 years on various projects.

The first phase of building would encompass high school administrative offices, cafeteria and core classrooms for "the essential offerings." Immediately after moving into the new building, changes will continue throughout the proposed three year building program to accommodate the six percent projected growth rate for the system.

The bond election will also allow funds to make unforeseen repairs and improvements to all plant facilities, which will probably eventually include replacing stadium seats at the football field.

"The Village of Ruidoso is now projecting an eight percent growth rate per year for the next ten years. We are hoping the six percent will allow us just to keep up right now," Valliant said.

nigan's office, The Wild Snail and Holiday Liquors.

The entire Chamber membership voted on the award when they elected seven new board members in March. Outgoing board members will also receive recognition and include Tim Morris, Wayne Dacy, Tom Graham, Linda McGuire, Robert Hays, Ray Heid, Benny Coulston and Harris, who remains on the board another year as past president.

"Only 100 tickets will be sold for the banquet this year. Cousins' has promised us an excellent dinner for our money and we urge everyone to attend," Jungbluth said.

The speaker for the evening will be announced.

position on the lease be recorded and placed with the minutes of this special meeting.

In his statement, White alleged that the provision of Section 3541, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1978 Compilation, specifically Subsection C of that statute, were violated in that the terms of the sale or lease, time and manner of payments on the lease or sale, amount of the lease or sale, and identity of the buyer or lessee were not included in the published notice of the special election of which leasing the swimming pool was one question on the March 24 ballot.

White's letter also contained these statements: "The result of not following the statutes, invalidates the permission that the trustees have been given to lease the swimming pool."

Because it is the opinion of our attorney that the leasing of the pool is invalid, I hereby give notice to you and the Council that I agree that the election was invalid and that we are acting contrary to law. With this in mind I wish to be put on record as being no part as a trustee in any of the leasing of the pool to Mr. Rush (sic).

EXCERPTS OF STATEMENTS made by village officials, prior to the vote to proceed with leasing the pool to Rush, included:

Sayner: "If the election was unlawful, we have errors of omission on our hands. We acted in good faith on advice of counsel."

Huckstep: "I can't say with 100 percent certainty the election was illegal."

The board of directors for the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce decided Wednesday to hold the 1981 Cadillac Party at Cousins' restaurant, where a new addition will make the facility big enough to seat up to 500 people.

The Cadillac Party enters its sixth year as the major fund raiser for the Chamber. The past five years, it has been held at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, with 165 tickets sold.

This year's event, scheduled for August 12, will have 180 tickets available at a cost of \$175 per couple. Jerry Bigham, owner of Cousins', presented a bid which will include four entrees, a cocktail party, a band and the same profit margin as last year.

Another fund raiser, being held for the first time, the Espree Party, is scheduled for June 21, also at Cousins' and features an \$8,000 shopping spree at the recipient's choice of Chamber members. Tickets for that event are \$125 per couple and are also available at the Chamber.

A MEMBERSHIP DRIVE has been scheduled for June 10, designed after last

year's highly successful drive, which netted 97 new Chamber members.

The membership will be divided into two teams, the Good Guys led by Ralph Bellon and the Bad Guys headed by Larry Langford. Both leaders will select assistant team leaders and the working list of potential members "is priceless this year because there aren't as many names on it as there were last year," according to Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth.

A feature of this year's drive will include a follow-up of last year's members who joined during the drive to determine their reaction to Chamber functions and effectiveness. Jungbluth said more emphasis would also be placed on why a business should join the Chamber.

The board also:

Changed the fiscal year for the Chamber to coincide with the village's, July 1 to June 30.

Tabled discussion of a clean-up campaign until delegates of service clubs meet Friday to finalize plans and set a date.

Heard that two typewriters were recovered at a typewriter store in El Paso, Texas, and returned to the Chamber.

Accepted a report on the Easter Egg Hunt, a project hosted by the Chamber Merchants Committee, showing a better response than ever. Larry Langford, chairman of that committee, said the hunt featured about 2,700 plastic hard-boiled and candy eggs.

Were invited to participate in the style picnic May 24 at the intersection of Gavilan Canyon and Hull Roads, sponsored by the Vietnam Veterans of Ruidoso.

Received an accounting of Ledger's Tax Committee allocations which will be presented to village trustees for approval.

Approved a \$75,629 1981-82 budget for the Chamber, including \$43,379 in dues payments.

After Rush asked some more questions about the pool's operation which Davis had stated were public record, Davis said to Rush, "You never asked me for one thing. This meeting stands adjourned."

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Huckstep: "We can handle this under threatened litigation, as litigation threatened, in a closed meeting."

Alwood: "The vote was a public opinion poll, that's what I'd call it."

Coulston: "Anyone threatened to sue us over this?"

Sayner: "The public gave us approval to lease it."

Coulston: "We received legal advice from our attorney (on proceeding with lease arrangements). I was out of town and when I came back I read it in the newspaper... (I think this is) privileged information."

Alwood: "I want an opinion on pursuing the lease terms. Do we advertise lease terms and hold a hearing?"

Huckstep: "The notice asking the people (for permission) to lease the pool didn't comply with the laws, but I will defend the village (in the event of litigation) by any viable means."

After additional discussion, Huckstep said: "On going ahead, I will make my recommendations only to the council."

At this point Davis recessed the meeting for the executive session.

AFTER THE VOTE: Following completion of the vote, with changes as requested by Coulston, Rush requested that other changes be incorporated in the final draft of the lease, including:

An original two year lease with option for a three year extension, after which we have the option for an additional five year term.

I can't get the lease investment back in five years, Rush said. "After five years, I don't get the lease (investment) I will remove the slide (with the statement in the lease) no one else can put in a water slide."

Rush also questioned the trustees about the financial statement on the operation of the swimming pool by the village. "If the pool had a debt (in 1980) how did you pay \$200 in debt service plus salaries (and other expenses)?"

Davis then said, "You should have looked into that before now. You can get the figures on total income and total expenses. That's public record."



## Mule Skinners' trail ride set

All plans are completed for the third annual Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners overnight trail ride, May 2-3, club president Ed Hyman has announced. Those making the ride on horses or mules will leave from Western Highlands, in Ruidoso Downs, at 10 a.m., May 2. The route to be followed, through the scenic Sacramento Mountains, will not be

disclosed prior to departure. "We're hoping that at least 100 riders will take this trail ride," Hyman said, "and though it's a 'mule ride,' anyone riding horses is welcome to join us." Activities at the camp site include balloon busting, polo, pole bending, barrel races, horse shoe pitching, and there will be live entertainment.

The cost for riders is \$15 per person including dinner Saturday evening, breakfast Sunday morning and feed for animals. Non-riders camping overnight will be charged \$11 each, the supper only price will be \$8 and breakfast only, \$4. ## One hundred mile bike tour planned Saturday

About 80 bicyclists are expected to participate in the "Ruidoso Roundabout" Saturday, which will include a 100 mile tour of Lincoln County.

The event is sponsored by Friends of the Ruidoso Public Library, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Alpine Shifters Bicycle Club. The tour will begin at the library at 8:30 a.m., with rest stops for fruit juice in Carrizozo, Lincoln, Glencoe and Ruidoso. Galen Farrington, Alpine Shifters president and organizer of the tour route, said some bicyclists who have pre-registered "will probably finish the tour in 5 1/2 hours." He said some very competitive and avid bicyclists have pre-registered. "We're getting some serious bicyclists to come here," he said. Pre-registrants number about 55 and

include cyclers from New Mexico, Texas, Arizona and California. Each participant will receive a custom designed, five color embroidered patch included in their registration fee of \$3.50, and those completing the 100 mile tour will have the option to purchase a century patch sanctioned by a national bicyclists' club. Registration will be taken through 7 a.m., Saturday, with a \$1.50 late fee assessed each participant, Farrington said. Friends president Kathy Flanary thanked local residents and businesses "who donated time and food to make this event a success." ## Detour on Highway 70 effective at Tularosa

The state Highway Department is planning to put a major detour into effect on the four lane segment of United States 70 east of Tularosa today. The detour will affect about 4,000 motorists who use this part of the highway each day, road agency project manager Brad Carr said. In an area about two miles east of Tularosa and extending east for another four miles, the westbound lanes of the highway will be closed. The two eastbound lanes will be used for two-way traffic. This detour will be in effect for about three months, while the westbound lanes are slightly realigned and completely

rebuilt, Carr said. According to schedule, the job should be completed by early this fall, Carr said. The detour area will be well marked with warning and directional signs, the project manager noted. Concrete median barriers will be used to separate traffic at each end of the project. Rubberized, tubular traffic cones glued to the pavement will be used as median dividers throughout the rest of the detour. The entire detour area will be a "No Passing" zone, Carr said. He cautioned motorists to slow down while driving through the area and to be alert for two-way traffic.

## Local club loses cash

Almost \$3,000 in cash, checks and credit card receipts were reported missing from the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club Monday.

## EMS names information and education specialist

Susan W. Cox, executive director of the Eastern New Mexico Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Corporation Region III office in Clovis announced the appointment today of Ruben L. Ceballos as the Public Information and Education Specialist.

According to Cox, Ceballos will develop and implement an Emergency Medical Services Information program for the region which consists of Chaves, Curry, DeBaca, Eddy, Guadalupe, Harding, Lea, Lincoln, Otero, Quay, Roosevelt, and Union Counties. This emergency medical services information program would benefit the region's residents as well as the tourist visitors traveling through the Land of Enchantment. Cox said, "Ceballos will work closely with all the media, phone companies, police and fire departments, as well as making presentations on emergency medical services to schools, clubs, and other community organizations."

In announcing the appointment, Cox said that it is vital that all residents in the region become aware of the emergency medical services in their communities so they may respond quickly and accurately in the case of an emergency.

The Smile of Spring Grows Ever Brighter

It seemed that on Easter Day, the Spirit of Spring gained new inspiration and strength. Because on that very day the

leaves and blossoms began to hasten out; and the songs of the birds sounded a new note of happiness.

It so happened this year that Easter was on the full moon, the time of a great burst of new spring growth. As you glance up the vale, the gray winding line of the river trees is gone, and in its place is the golden green of the box elder, and, lo and behold, the new delicate green of the rapidly growing oak leaves — long impatient in their winter buds during the late cold spring, now burst forth into the freedom of new growth, rejoicing in the sun. On every hand the cottonwoods are resplendent in their waxy half-grown leaves, shining and glimmering in the western breeze, as the sun shines through the hosts of delicate leaf tissues, casting a glowing light all through the massive spreading bulk of this giant of the leaf tree tribe.

The apple blossom parade has now advanced from Glencoe on up to the fruit belt around Biscuit Hill, and below Ruidoso Downs. The trees present an unusual sight. Usually the blossoms come out well before the leaves with the tree forming a solid giant bouquet of white touched with crimson-pink, and the leaves appearing about the time the blossom petals go swirling through the air and bounding over the ground like snow flakes.

In many places, especially in the upper reaches of the Ruidoso valley, the blossoms held back, and kept holding back, for reasons best known to themselves. You could almost imagine that the leaf buds, kept saying:

"Hurry up. Hurry up, make your move. We can't leaf out until you blossom out. The blossom buds deep in their winter wraps might have answered:

"It is too rough out. Be a little patient. Finally the leaves must have said,

"We are tired of waiting, partners. We will go out and if there is a beating to be taken, we will have to take it."

So out came the leaves, and now you see the rare picture of the late apple blossoms more beautiful than ever set off by the pure "apple green" of the leaves.

With a little time and a little help from Jack Frost, there should be a grand apple crop, and maybe some peaches, pears and cherries. Keep smiling and God bless you.

## Prize winning Western author will speak here

W. W. "Bill" Southard of Clovis, author Season of Vengeance, a western paperback set in the southeastern corner of New Mexico, will speak in Ruidoso May 1 at 7:30 p.m., in the multipurpose room of Ruidoso Public Library.

The program is sponsored by the Friends of the Ruidoso Public Library.

Southard's book is the story of a peaceful rancher's relentless quest to avenge the mysterious murder of his wife. The book is this year's winner of the \$25,000 Bantam Books/Twentieth Century Fox First

Western Novel Contest. Season of Vengeance was selected from nearly 1,000 manuscripts submitted into the contest, which is designed to encourage writing the kind of quality Western fiction popular for decades, according to editors at Bantam.

Southard's book was released in March and film rights were purchased by Twentieth Century Fox, with Southard due to receive profit participation in the film's earnings, if a movie is ever made. Southard is presently editor of the Clovis

News-Journal. He is a native of Artesia and has lived his entire life in New Mexico where he "grew up in a world of Westerns, reading the masters of frontier story telling."

Southard is currently working on his second western novel which will be about "the New Mexico frontier, the men and women who tamed it, and those who died trying," he said.

"I am flattered to be invited to speak in Ruidoso," he said. "We've always enjoyed our visits to that area and are looking forward to spending a weekend there."

## 'Vial of Life' project underway

A "Vial of Life" project, co-sponsored by the Ruidoso Woman's Club and the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Extension Club, will continue through Saturday at several locations in the village.

Chairperson for the project, Charlotte Jarratt, said representatives of both groups will sit at booths at Ben Franklin's, Ruidoso State Bank, Ruidoso Public Library, Safeway, Security Bank and Gibson's, with anyone eligible to fill out the

vial of life form between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. The program is designed to make medical information available to area law enforcement and emergency medical personnel.

Jarratt said the free program involves only a few minutes of time, so each individual can complete a form detailing his or her medical history. The information, which is kept confidential, is made in triplicate, with one copy going to the

sheriff's office and one to the local police department.

### Proclamations available to sportsmen

Proclamations governing big game and turkey hunting and furbearer trapping have been distributed to the department's area offices and license vendors. License applications for various big game seasons are being distributed with the proclamations, according to Norma Ames, assistant chief of the department's Public Affairs Division.

The 32-page proclamation is again in booklet form, similar to last year's, but don't confuse it: This year's proclamation is red and white and has some additional information and changes in regulations. License fees remain the same, however.

Big game seasons (deer, bear, turkey, cougar and Barbary sheep) for firearms hunters are stratified into four hunt periods — two in the north and two in the south. Licenses are validated for those hunts at time of purchase.

Sportsmen should also take special care in reading the section on this fall's firearms elk hunts on public lands. A new unit management system has been initiated for those hunts, and applicants must apply by hunt numbers for one of the 70 hunts scheduled during six different periods and many units from early October through mid-December.

Deadline for enrollment for this fall's hunter training classes is September 30, and anyone 18 years of age or younger must have passed the certified course in order to apply for or purchase a license for hunting with firearms.

Closed seasons have been set on protected furbearers. Trapping for raccoon, badger, weasel, fox, ringtail and bobcat will close April 30 and open again October 1 through March 31, 1982. Beaver, muskrat and nutria season will also close April 30, to open again November 1 through March 31, 1982.

Application forms for purchase of licenses by mail are on pages 30 and 31 of the proclamation, available from department offices in Raton, Roswell, Las Cruces and Albuquerque, or from approximately 350 vendors statewide. Out-of-state sportsmen may write the Department of Game and Fish, Villagra Building, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503.

SANTA FE — Sometimes you gotta feel like you're pretty dumb.

When the Legislature got into a snit because prosecutions as a result of the pententary riot were not proceeding swiftly enough, weren't they criticizing the office of Santa Fe District Attorney Eloy Martinez?

And who was administrator of that office?

Guy named Tommy Florina.

So how come, when the Legislature voted money for a special administrator to speed up the trials, Florina got the new job at a big jump in his annual salary?

As a reward for his previous one, because he's Martinez's buddy and ran his political campaigns.

Who says the patronage system is dead? Florina had better demonstrate very rapidly that he has turned over a new leaf and now intends to hit the ball — just to scramble a couple of metaphors.

When reporters come right out and ask at a news conference about his lousy work habits — including showing up for work in the morning when it's convenient for him and taking his phone calls at Santa Fe Downs during the racing season — he at least knows his performance will be watched carefully.

This column would say Eloy Martinez is smarter than the legislators who were critical of his performance.

He let them talk, and out of it came a new \$30,000 a year job for his pal.

State Representative Fred Mondragon, whose resignation from the Legislature becomes effective on April 30, doesn't have the sunny disposition of his brother the Lieutenant Governor.

Some of the things he said after mailing Secretary of State Shirley Hooper his notice were downright snappish.

Though his major reason for quitting was his business obligations, Mondragon hasn't been happy in the House under control of the coalition.

The Albuquerque legislator claims he was scheduled to be chairman of Appropriations and Finance if Tom Brown had been elected Speaker. Brown lost, and Mondragon was exiled from membership on that committee.

Now he's sore and talking about "vindictiveness" by the coalition leaders.

Maybe so. But Tom Brown, who got beat, took it like a gentleman and went right on working, looks a lot better than Mondragon, who seems to have found that his grapes have soured.

Among the 85 bills Governor King vetoed from the regular legislative session this year, a couple deserve special recognition.

One was that reorganization of the troubled Construction Division at Commerce and Industry. That part of state government needs lots of improvements, but the bill which would have given it back to the construction industry lock, stock and barrel wasn't the way to go.

Same can be said for that try by Highway Commissioners to get back the power to appoint the chief administrator of that agency, also a troubled and sometimes industry-dominated one.

Big Bruce deserves lots of credit for killing those two measures, neither one of which would have been good for the ordinary citizen.

When business gets too grabby, it deserves a punch in the nose.

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## Sense & Nonsense

Two friends, neither an intellectual heavyweight, took a vacation together at a lake resort. Renting a rowboat, the two men proceeded to the middle of the lake, where they were blessed with some good luck and caught several large fish. The one said to the other: "Hey, we should mark this spot so that we can come back here tomorrow." His partner replied, "I'm one step ahead of you, I marked an X on the bottom of the boat so that we'll remember it." "Well," said the first, "that was pretty stupid. How can we be sure we'll get the same boat tomorrow?"

Land surveying in New Mexico is not as haphazard as our two fishermen friends above, but the results in many cases are equally confusing. Take for example the problems of a survey in Lincoln National Forest in southeastern New Mexico. The Bureau of Land Management during the late 1960s, conducted a survey of certain section and township corners within the Lincoln National Forest and since many of

the original corners could not be found, the surveyors set standard brass survey monuments marking the locations. This survey was abandoned in 1969 for lack of funds and was never made official, but the brass markers remained in place and were used by private land surveyors as "official points of reference" in purchasing tracts and parcels of land.

When the Forest Service made an official survey years later, using highly accurate laser technology, private landowners found that the new survey moved these "official points of reference" as much as several feet. This was, in many cases, to the detriment of the private landowner, who suddenly saw his land shrink in size, and value. No wonder many landowners in the area saw the survey as an easy way for the federal government to confiscate some of their property.

This tale could probably be repeated in other Western states, which is why I believe we need to make public land survey reform a major objective of the 97th Congress. As a member of the Public Lands and Reserve Water Subcommittee, I have introduced two pieces of legislation that I believe will go a long way toward making these reforms.

The first bill would help to resolve the current land disputes in southeastern New Mexico. Private landowners, who in good faith relied on an erroneous survey, and had received no notice that the purchase would encroach on federal land, could acquire now-disputed parcels up to a maximum of 10 acres, or 40 acres if the disputed land is adjacent to mineral patents.

The second bill would guarantee that disputes such as these would not occur in the future. Entitled the Federal Land Survey Act of 1981, this bill would provide the basis for a multi-purpose national land information system, a system this country has never had. With the technology we have today, it may be possible in the near future to check land records easily and quickly to learn where a parcel of American land is, what it's like, what and where the easements are, what its tax status is, and who owns it. Land records in this country generally are quaint, clumsy, costly to probe, and not altogether reliable and helpful. By providing the framework to promote the stability and permanence of the nation's records of survey, we can establish an equitable tax base, determine land ownership, cut the cost of land transfer, and ease the access to all sorts of land information, information needed for resource management and environmental planning.

In short, this legislation will foster a new spirit of cooperation, not adversity, between private property owners and the government. The 97th Congress affords us an excellent opportunity to correct some of the current problems and inefficiencies in the present public land survey system and we must not let this opportunity pass us by. After all, we might not get the same boat tomorrow.

In the case of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, in a good winter, with ample snow and a long ski season, the tribe would be hard pressed to accommodate some 200,000 skiers without the housing/dining facilities in Ruidoso.

We're certain that MAT president Wendell Chino understands this.

Likewise, Ruidoso's winter economy is based upon the successful operation of the ski resort. We're certain Ruidoso's business people understand that.

The maintenance of State Highway 537, leading to the ski resort, has been a constant problem to the tribe, Ruidoso and the State Highway Department. Everyone concerned recognizes that an all weather road, minimizing traffic problems, is necessary if the tribe and Ruidoso are to benefit from skiing.

Therefore, at last week's meeting of the highway commission here, it was gratifying to learn that Chino "will be willing to meet" with Ruidoso people to discuss a new road to the ski resort, once he has personally assessed an alternate route.

We're heartened by Chino's remarks and trust his actions will usher in a new era of cooperation between the MAT and Ruidoso. — CD

## Whisper Battle romps to wins

Whisper Battle caught the lead late in the stretch and had no trouble stepping off a 1 1/2 length win in Sunday's Sunshine Handicap at Sunland Park.

The six furlong spin for fillies and mares carried a \$5,835 purse and put \$3,501 in the winner's account.

Whisper Battle, who raced at Sunland (and won) earlier in the season under a five grand claiming price, is owned and trained by Jinx Graham of El Paso, Texas. Fans who supported the four-year-old filly in the springtime wagering collected mutual prices of \$13.00, \$7 and \$4. The winning time was a so-so 1:13 flat, Bobby Don Harmon was up.

Gid's Girl, packing Carlos Rivas, ended with a flying attack but had to settle for second. The filly went off at just over 2-1 and returned \$3.60 and \$3. The second place purse amounted to \$1,283.

Ghost Light operated as a 5-2 shot in the eight head field and got in third after her stretch bid fell short. The show price was \$3. Manuel Toquinto was at the controls.

The crowd of 3,115 made the Jim Perkins

entry of Aminaun and Hemen's Ballerina a 9-5 favorite. Aminaun broke alertly and stayed in control during most of the backstretch run. But she was under seige all the way, and was pretty well short on fuel when she turned for home. She ended up fourth.

Whisper Battle elected to stay out of the early dueling and was in fourth place turning for home. When the early pacesetters began to falter, Whisper Battle slipped into high gear and roared down the homestretch to win with complete authority.

The win gave Whisper Battle a 1981 record of 2-1-1 from seven starts. The work produced a money line of \$8,178.

Graham purchased Whisper Battle from owner-trainer Lewis Germany, after the latter acquired the filly on a five grand claim on January 18. Whisper Battle carried Graham's silks to victory in an allowance sprint in late February.

But Graham's faith in Whisper Battle appears to have been really vindicated by the impressive Sunshine victory.

## Sunland Park Hoofbeats

FOUR COLTS, three fillies and three geldings earned spots with speedy qualifying times last Friday for next Sunday's 350 yard Sun Country Futurity. The Sun Country, with a gross purse of \$320,295.32, offers \$273,532.20 for the finals and a purse of \$46,763.12 for the consolation event on Saturday. It is the richest race ever offered at Sunland Park. The entrants in Sunday's finals include Jays Mainspring (colt, 17.95 qualifying time), Badest Bug Alice (gelding, 17.99), Six Doubles (colt, 18.00), Mothers Little Sin (filly, 18.03), Six Triple Six (colt, 18.04), Our Easy Credit (filly, 18.04), Tarbug (gelding, 18.06), Greybon (colt, 18.06), The Heat Is On (filly, 18.07), Masked Rocket (gelding, 18.08). All won their heat races except for Mothers Little Sin and Masked Rocket. Those two finished second and third, respectively, in the 11th Division. Eight of the entrants are owned by Texans while Tarbug has an Oklahoma owner and The Heat Is On is owned by New Mexicans. The winner of this major quarter horse juvenile chase will earn \$112,491.52.

THE 10 QUALIFIERS for the consolation will seek a winner's purse of \$9,608.86. Entrants include Class Favorite (18.09), Mito's Money Maker (18.12), Easy Trace (18.13), Moons Triangle (18.13), Easy Dawnajo (18.13), Tinsy Gay Truckin (18.14), Red River Bounce (18.14), The Easy Streak (18.16), Truckle Wine (18.16), Wendy Stripper (18.17).

FRIDAY'S EIGHTH RACE produced a minus show pool of \$16.72 as the first three favorites, The Easy Streak, Privileged and Go Easy Lady took the three show positions.

JOCKEYS Jackie Martin and Jerry Nicodemus each tallied four wins on Friday's program, certainly a rare feat even considering there were 15 Sun Country trial heats. Martin scored aboard Perry Go Lucky (\$82.60) in the first, Hack Bull (\$3.40) in the sixth, Greybon (\$3.20) in the seventh and he Heat Is On (\$8.28) in the 14th. Nicodemus won with Jays Mainspring (\$9.80) in the third, Six Doubles (\$11.80) in the 11th, Serious Business (\$6.80) in the 13th and Dusty Rich Lady (\$5.60) in the 15th.

ZIP'S ZIPPY gets an "A" for perseverance. The three-year-old gelding won Saturday's first race, a 6 1/2 furlong chase for maidens. It was his first win in his 21st career try. He had three seconds and one third in 12 runs as a two-year-old and was winless in eight previous attempts this year (with four seconds and two thirds). He's owned by L. G. and Helen Rhodes of Abilene, Texas, and is trained by James W. Curry. Ramon Apodaca rode him to the half length win.

IT APPEARS as if the Southwest will be represented by two horses in the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs in Louisville, Kentucky, on May 2. Following last week's win in the Arkansas Derby, owners of Bold Ego were expected to allow their prized runner to compete in the Derby and now Dr. Leopoldo Villareal of El Paso, Texas, is expected to permit his runner, Pass The Tab, to also seek the prestigious race. Pass The Tab finished second in Saturday's running of the \$155,500 Illinois Derby at Sportsman's Park near Chicago. The mile and 1/8th chase was won by Paristo, who clocked 1:49 3/5, just 2/5 off the track record. Pass The Tab was beaten less than one length. He was ridden by Miguel A. Rivera, who gained fame in 1974 by riding Darby Dan Farm's Little Current to wins in The Preakness and Belmont Stakes. Pass The Tab won all six starts as a two-year-old and earned \$129,287. Among his major wins were triumphs in the \$150,000 Santa Fe Futurity at Santa Fe Downs in late August (by 13 lengths); the \$56,850

Juvenile Stakes at Ak-Sar-Ben in Omaha, Nebraska, (by four lengths); and the Scotch Foursome Spring Laddie Stakes (by 9 1/2 lengths when he tied the track record of :51 1/5 for 4 1/4 furlongs) at La Mesa Park in Raton. His two previous outstays this year included a fifth in the Swift Stakes at Aqueduct and a second in an allowance race at a mile, also at Aqueduct.

IT WAS ANOTHER million dollar weekend, so far as the betting was concerned. The three day total amounted to \$1,067,792, thanks in large part to Friday's stunning \$322,890 (from 15 Sun Country Futurity trials) and Saturday's \$399,544. The Saturday handle was the highest in the history of Saturday racing at Sunland. The total handle for the season is now \$22,838,585, well over last year's \$21,049,959 at the same point (82 race days). The current daily average of \$278,519 is a gain of 0.5 percent over last year's comparable \$256,707.

THE NOS. 6 AND 7 post position each produced seven winners over the weekend. Here are the seasonal totals: No. 1 — 117 winners, No. 2 — 123, No. 3 — 100, No. 4 — 113, No. 5 — 105, No. 6 — 107, No. 7 — 88, No. 8 — 73, No. 9 — 66, No. 10 — 56, No. 11 — 0, No. 12 — 0.

CHAKEE and jockey Louie Gomez combined in Sunday's eighth race to tally a one length verdict. It was the fourth straight win for the seven-year-old gelding, who is owned by Robert N. Hillier of Odessa, Texas, and trained by Ralph S. Henson. Gomez, meanwhile, won his third race of the day. Earlier wins were on Dunker Bill (\$61.00) in the first and Eagle Aire (\$3.80) in the sixth.

### IN STEWARDS' RULINGS:

— Trainers George H. Cosper Jr., and James H. Gubanski were each suspended and referred to the New Mexico State Racing Commission as samples taken from their horses Special Hank and Ima Humdinger, respectively, proved positive for the drug Dinethyl Sulfoxide (DMSO) or a derivative thereof. Horses owned or trained by the two trainers are denied entry pending transfer to a trainer or trainers approved by the stewards. In addition, the two horses in question, Special Hank and Ima Humdinger, shall be reinstated only upon a written report from an official track veterinarian that they are capable of racing without medication. Although the ruling does not affect pari-mutuel payoffs, the payment of first place purse money shall be held in escrow pending further order of the Racing Commission.

— Trainer Michael W. Joiner was suspended and referred to the New Mexico State Racing Commission after a sample taken from the horse High Handed proved positive for the drug Mazindol (Santorex) or a derivative thereof. All horses owned or trained by him are denied entry pending transfer to a trainer or trainers approved by the stewards. In addition, High Handed shall be reinstated only upon a written report by an official track veterinarian that it is capable of racing without medication. Although the ruling does not affect the pari-mutuel payoffs, the payment of first-place purse money is withheld pending further order of the New Mexico Commission.

— Trainer Jimmie D. Claridge was fined \$50 for participating in an altercation in the stable area.

— Trainer Gene T. Tefertiller was fined \$25 for entering a horse without first obtaining an owners' license.

— Trainer Cecil Crabtree was fined \$25 for entering a horse without an owners' license being registered with the State Racing Commission, necessitating a scratch.

## MacGillivray sums up his horse racing goals

 Finlay MacGillivray has supervised numerous complex operations. He managed the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque from 1963 until mid-1980, served as a major in the United States Armed Forces and was a partner in an Albuquerque oil company. But since he assumed the general manager reigns of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park almost a year ago, he has been involved with one area... horse racing. "It's quite different for me," said MacGillivray, who is completing his first season as Sunland Park General Manager. "There's one purpose in this operation - horse racing. While it was so varied at the Fair - stock shows, civic shows and year-round activities. Right now, it's strictly horse racing, which in some ways, is a relief. "I really haven't missed the Fair that much. When I decided to leave, I put it behind me, although I enjoy visiting the Fair and talking on the telephone to people from the Fair." He labeled meeting so many nice persons and watching business increase at both tracks as the most gratifying aspects of his first year. Sunland's daily average mutual handle is up 8.32 percent through April 16 over a year ago. A year ago, Sunland averaged a record \$263,548 and the final figure this year will certainly surpass that mark. Ruidoso did a record \$511,339 a year ago, a figure most officials predict will tumble when the mountain track opens its 70 day season May 9. "I'd sure hope we could do \$550,000 or \$600,000," MacGillivray said. "I think we would be very happy due to the limited physical plant. I think \$300,000 would be a realistic figure if we had a new addition." He termed personnel problems and getting the operation under control as the two biggest challenges in his first year. He cited the recent race track investment bill passed by the New Mexico Legislature as a tremendous boom to the horse racing industry. "It will mean so much to our two race tracks. We'll put it to good use," he said of the bill which allows additional money in tax relief to be earmarked for capital improvements to New Mexico tracks. Although he declined to say what specific areas would be improved at Sunland and Ruidoso, MacGillivray praised the Ruidoso-Sunland Board of Directors. "I'm sure the board will discuss it (improvements) soon. It's a pleasure working with such dedicated, interesting persons who are so concerned with both facilities and who want to improve both operations," he said.

## May visiting hours set at Carlsbad Caverns

The National Park Service has announced that a new schedule of visitor hours will begin at Carlsbad Caverns National Park on May 3 and continue in effect through May 30 when the park's full summer schedule starts.

Under the new schedule, complete walk-in tours will be available continuously from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., each day, and Big Room tours from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., daily. Complete tours through the main cavern are three miles in length and require about three hours, while Big Room tours are one and a quarter mile long and take about an hour and a half.

Also starting on May 3 will be daily lantern tours of primitive New Cave and evening bat flight programs at the natural entrance to the main cavern. The lantern tours through New Cave, which is located 23 miles southwest of the main cavern in the Slaughter Canyon area, will be at 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., daily. Reservations are necessary for the lantern trips and may be made by calling (505) 786-2233.

The bat flight programs at the main cavern will start at about sunset each evening and exact times can be obtained each day by calling the park visitor center at the same telephone number.

The park entrance fee is \$3 per carload daily for private non-commercial vehicles or \$1 per person for those entering on commercial buses. Annual Golden Eagle and Golden Age permits are also available and honored at the park. All entrance permits include use of hand-held radio receivers for listening to interpretive messages along the trail while touring the main cavern.

Concession facilities available at the park include a nursery, kennel, restaurant, gift shop, and underground lunchroom.

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
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# Area horses slated for Kentucky Derby

This is that time of year when our notebook is overflowing. The feature is increased by the fact Sunland Park has only two weeks to go, and will finish up with the \$320,250 Sun Country Futurity and the \$260,000-or-so Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity.

Our notebook has columns to be written on Salustio Burgos, the expatriated jockey from Chile who's won hundred granders on the West Coast, and now hangs his hat mainly at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs.

There's Ernie Davidson, who represents a new breed among horse owners. A big time business man from Oklahoma (oil, construction, horses, etc.), Ernie recently retired from the business of being in business. But he doesn't loaf on the front porch. In fact, he's become a full time trainer of race horses, and we've noticed a growing number of one time businessmen who've fallen (gladly, enthusiastically)

into the same golden years pursuit. But we'll hold off those columns on Burgos and Davidson until we get to Ruidoso, in favor of more pressing matters — the upcoming Kentucky Derby (May 2) and the remarkable turn of events which promises to put two South-west horses in the Louisville classic. One contender from these parts, would be astonishing enough, but two — well, it all smells like something out of a Sylvester Stallone movie.

Yet, come Kentucky Derby Day, the hopes of El Paso, New Mexico, and surrounding areas, will be borne on the shoulders of Bold Ego and Pass The Tab. Almost a year ago to the day, Sunland Park patrons turned out to watch Bold Ego dash to a two 1/4-length lead in the five furlong Riley Allison Futurity (the gross purse was \$206,250). This time, Sunland patrons will be fixed on the TV monitors, watching Bold Ego stretch his determined speed over the back breaking mile and a quarter of the Kentucky Derby.

As everyone now knows, Bold Ego earned his trip to Kentucky with three magnificent stakes wins at Oaklawn Park (all in a row). The set was punctuated a week ago when he led from start to finish in the \$200,000-added Arkansas Derby. The crowd of over 62,000 launched Bold Ego as a commanding 5-1 favorite (he shared the top lead of 123 pounds), and he won like the champ he apparently is.

Before we get ourselves whipped into a fit of enthusiasm, we might note that the Arkansas Derby is certainly big potatoes, but when you go in the Kentucky Derby,

that's when they wheel out all the heavy armor. Still, Bold Ego, won't be any high priced longshot in the Kentucky Derby. I project his odds at between 5-1 and 7-1.

Bold Ego is the property of the Double H Ranch of Anthony (just down the road from Sunland Park), and Dr. Joe Kidd, the well known El Paso surgeon. The colt has done a superb job of running at Sunland, Ruidoso Downs, the New Mexico State Fair and Oaklawn Park.

The big charge against Bold Ego was his speed. Critics contended a distance would eat him up. But he proved them wrong in the Arkansas Derby. His jockey, John Lively, said after the race: "When that horse (Top Avenger) came up to me on the turn, I didn't know how much horse I had left. That horse kept hanging in there. It wasn't until about the eighth pole that I pulled away."

Leroy Snyder, the pilot on Top Avenger, had praise for Bold Ego. "He's a nice horse. I don't know if he can beat the big horses, but he doesn't seem to be bothered by distance." Bold Ego's trainer, Jack Van Berg, said: "He's a great horse and does all we ask of him. I thought he ran a big race. The Staunch Avenger colt (Top Avenger) came up and looked him in the eye, but he just policed him off."

Pass The Tab, the pride of Dr. Leopoldo Villalobos of El Paso, Texas, made a big name for himself at Santa Fe during the summer. He won by staggering margins. But winning in stakes company at Santa Fe doesn't go a long way toward im-

proving the Eastern Turf establishment. So Pass The Tab shipped to Ak-Sar-Ben last summer and won a \$50,000 stakes event in easy fashion.

As a three-year-old, he complained back east, but everything hasn't been on schedule. Pass The Tab certainly hasn't chalked up the glittering success of Bold Ego. His backers aren't dismayed, and from the talk coming out of his camp, big things are expected in the Derby. "He'll run a great race, and he'll finish ahead of Bold Ego," is the upbeat message we've been getting.

So what are the ramifications of having Bold Ego and Pass The Tab in the Kentucky Derby? Obviously, this "unreachable" goal will be regarded as something attainable. A great sweep of enthusiasm should move through New Mexico breeding ranks. More dough will be poured into the business. More state-bred horses — or horses owned by El Paso area people — will be motivated to forthcoming Kentucky Derbys.

Sunland Park, Ruidoso Downs and Santa Fe Downs can now point proudly toward favorite sons who've developed local followings, then proved good enough to run against the nation's chrome plated best.

So these astonishing developments bode well for the prestige of racing in this part of the country. Even the average Sunland fan will hold his head a little higher. If El Paso can produce the likes of Bold Ego and Pass The Tab, how many other local champs will come along in the years ahead?

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**Wilderness Wisdom**  
with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — One thing I've noticed from the pros who fish the tournaments is that the majority use plastic worms for bass. Now, I don't expect, or even want, to hit the trail of a pro, but it sure wouldn't hurt my feelings to become a better angler.

There must be something mysterious about fishing with artificial worms that I don't understand. My luck with them has been nil, and I quickly get discouraged. If there is some secret, could you share it with me? Bill C., Arkansas

Dear Bill — I'm not a good worm fisherman either, but I, too, have noticed a few things. First, these anglers you call pros are just that. Without exception, they have worked very hard for years to achieve that status. Most understand the nature of the fish they seek far better than the average fisherman. They are usually very proficient with several different types of lures, and they recognize when a particular one should be used. So, most of the boys wonder you see on television who collect fish like a vacuum cleaner are really very hard working folks, and they put much more into fishing than most people want to. Whether they still enjoy it as much as you and I is debatable, but at least they appear to.

As for the plastic worms, you're right. Many pros do favor them for bass. Reportedly, one can expect to catch bigger bass on them than on most other lures. And have you noticed that the favorite worm colors of pros are black or purple? Obviously, these have proven to be a favorite of bass.

A worm should be slowly worked from near a shoreline into deeper water, and around stumps and underwater brush piles. A one-quarter of three-eighths ounce, bullet head sinker should be slipped onto the line so it assumes the position of the worm's head. The hook should be made needless by turning it and piercing the worm body up to the barb. If you've noticed, pros fish a worm very intently. Some even keep their eyes glued to the rod tip, waiting for a slight telltale dip. A bass will often pick up a worm very gently. This may be only barely detectable. When you sense the worm has been picked up, lower the rod tip to ease line tension for five seconds or so, then set the hook hard. You'll know if you did a good job.

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# National Wildlife Federation names chief executive officer

Dr. Jay D. Hair, an associate professor of zoology and forestry at North Carolina State University, has been named chief executive officer of the National Wildlife Federation (NWF), the nation's largest citizens conservation organization.

Hair, 35, one of the nation's top authorities on the division of wildlife responsibilities between the federal and state governments, will succeed Thomas L. Kimball as executive vice president of the Washington-based nonprofit conservation group this spring, at a date to be announced later. Kimball, 63, is retiring after 21 years as head of the NWF, with its 4.6 million members and supporters.

NWF's 29-member board of directors, meeting in Norfolk, Virginia, chose Hair for the job after a two year hunt in which search committees screened 161 candidates for the post, considered the most important and influential nongovernment job in the conservation field.

"I look upon this as the top job in the conservation movement," Hair said, following his appointment. "It presents an opportunity to help shape the nation's conservation agenda and I welcome that challenge. I see the National Wildlife Federation continuing its role as a broadly-based, highly responsible conservation organization working for the wise management and multiple use of all our natural resources in the best interest of the greatest number of people."

A 1967 graduate of Clemson University, in Clemson, South Carolina, where he also received his master's degree, Hair earned his Ph.D. in zoology from the University of Alberta, in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, in 1976. He taught wildlife biology at Clemson before joining the faculty of North Carolina State, at Raleigh, in 1977, where he administers the fisheries and wildlife sciences program.

In 1978 he was named a special assistant at the United States Department of the Interior to coordinate the development of a national fish and wildlife policy. His draft of a new policy statement covering the complex relationships between state and federal agencies in the wildlife field gained national attention when it was published in the Federal Register last May.

Hair, now vice chairman of NWF's affiliate affairs committee, has been active in the Federation for more than a decade. He served as president of the South Carolina Wildlife Federation in 1976 and 1977, when it was named NWF's top affiliate of the year. He was elected president of the Southeastern Section of the Wildlife Society in 1979 and is chairman of the National Academy of Sciences' task force on the impacts of emerging agricultural practices on fish and wildlife habitat.

He has published widely in scientific journals and won numerous awards, including the North Carolina Con-

servativist of the Year Award for 1980, presented to him recently by the governor of North Carolina; the 1980 Distinguished Service Award of the Southeastern Section of the Wildlife Society; the South Carolina Wildlife Conservationist of the Year Award, given in 1977 at that state governor's annual conservation awards program; and the United States Army Commendation Medal, awarded in 1971 for meritorious service in Vietnam. In 1975 he was named an Outstanding Young Man of America by the United States Jaycees.

Married and the father of two daughters, Hair lives in Cary, North Carolina, a suburb of Raleigh.

Kimball came to the Federation in 1980 after serving as chief of the state wildlife agencies in Arizona and Colorado. Under him the Federation launched three new conservation magazines (National Wildlife, International Wildlife, and Ranger Rick's Nature Magazine) and increased its annual operating budget from less than \$2 million to more than \$30 million.

NWF also grew from an organization concerned almost entirely with wildlife issues into an across-the-board environmental group involved in lobbying and litigation as well as educational activities, with a chief executive who often speaks for the conservation movement at the White House and before Congressional committees.

The National Wildlife Federation was founded in 1888 at the first North American Wildlife Conference, called by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The Federation's first president was J. N. (Ding) Darling, a Pulitzer-prize winning newspaper cartoonist. Today the Federation has affiliates in all 50 states and in Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

NWF's by-laws provide for a president who presides over the organization's annual meeting and performs other duties. While more than an honorary job, the presidency is unsalaried and thus the executive vice president is in charge of NWF's day-to-day operations subject to direction of the board of directors that appoints him.
