

## School bonding cost clarified

Due to a misunderstanding, The News was provided with incorrect information, by a county official, on the assessed valuation figures for the Ruidoso School District, as reported in Thursday's edition.

The correct valuation figures for the school district, plus the cost to school district patrons for bond retirement, per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, provided to The News by Superintendent of School Pat Valliant, are:

Assessed valuation for 1980	\$47,707,001
Present rate on outstanding bonds	\$5.97
Increase on passage of May 12 bond issue	\$5.96
Total rate for bond retirement	\$11.93
Cost of two mill levy, for three years,	\$2.00
<b>TOTAL TAX RATE</b>	<b>\$13.93</b>

On passage of the \$2,250,000 school bond issue May 12, the total tax rate on outstanding bonds would be \$11.93 per \$1,000 in assessed valuation, toward bond retirement over a seven year period.

The \$2, per \$1,000 in assessed valuation, will be in effect due to the two mill levy approved February 3, for three years.

At the end of three years, the rate per \$1,000 in assessed valuation would be reduced to \$11.93, for another four years, after which the \$2,250,000 bond issue would be retired.

Passage of the May 12 bond issue will entitle the school to apply for \$6 million in non-repayable state funds, over a three year period, for construction of a new high school, plus additional improvements in school facilities.

## Altrusa sponsoring student career day

A career day for Ruidoso High School students in grades nine to 11 will be held May 1, beginning at 9 a.m., under the sponsorship of the Altrusa Club of Ruidoso.

The program was planned by the Vocational Services Committee of the Altrusa Club, which includes Linda Skellett, Najla Sluder, Jerri Howden and Liz Monro, with assistance from special education therapist Sandy Gladden.

"We as a committee, recognized the need for a career day," Skellett said, "because all we've ever seen the kids exposed to is various colleges they could attend."

Skellett said successful career persons from a long list of vocations were invited to spend the morning meeting with students to describe their workplaces.

General categories covered by the career day include construction, vocational schools, military, health services, retail businesses, education, business, agriculture, public service, general and miscellaneous.

"Students pre-registered for the three vocations they were most interested in," Skellett said, "so we would have an idea of where the most interest was."

She said each student will be able to visit with up to 12 professional people throughout the three-hour program.

Altrusa members will provide morning refreshments to adults participating, and lunch will be served to everyone involved at the close of the program, Skellett said.

Students will also have an opportunity to critique the program, so future career days can be improved.

## Chamber sets clean-up day

A clean-up day for residents of Ruidoso has been set for June 13, by the Pitch In Committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The "Pitch In" campaign will be approached from three angles, fire prevention, useful disposal of old appliances and other goods, and offering the public a chance to improve their property with various incentives provided by local businesses and the Village of Ruidoso.

Fire prevention measures could include cleaning pine needles from the roof, removing any debris or dead brush and other materials from around structures and moving firewood to a dry storage area away from structures.

Barbara Duff, who has headed previous clean-up drives in Ruidoso, said the Salvation Army will drive to Ruidoso and collect old and broken appliances, as well as furniture.

In the past, the Village of Ruidoso has also pitched in by allowing people to haul their trash to the dump free of charge on designated clean-up days.

Duff added that businesses can also become involved in the drive by offering small discounts to anyone who purchases items to "clean up, fix up or paint their homes or property to make them look nicer."

Others on the "Pitch In" Committee include Mark Mulholland, Rotary Club; Marge Hine; Shiela Harris and Duff, Altrusa Club; Garden Club members; Art Townsend, Lions Clubs; and Ed Jungbluth and Richard Sandoval, Chamber of Commerce.

"We need all the help we can get to make Ruidoso look like a beautiful and well kept community that we all know it is," Jungbluth said. "We are hoping for complete cooperation from everyone on this clean-up campaign."



## Hays, Jungbluth aiding Skeen

A Business Advisory Council, appointed by the United States Chamber of Commerce to assist Congressman Joe Skeen find out the needs of business people, met Friday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Local persons appointed to serve on the 20-member board include Robert Hays, president, Ruidoso State Bank and Ed Jungbluth, executive director, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Other committee members include business people from Roswell, Las Cruces, Carlsbad, Albuquerque, Clovis, Farmington, Artesia and Hobbs. Mark McQuiddy, an industrial consultant from Roswell, chairs the committee, which will meet four to six times a year at varying locations to exchange ideas with Skeen.

At Friday's meeting, Skeen said he was glad to see more business people becoming involved in politics. "Input from all sectors of the business community is very important to those of us in Washington," Skeen said.

He gave his predictions and views on several national issues including:

— President Reagan's economic package. "We need de-regulation of oil prices, budget cuts and tax cuts to make it work. We can't do away with one and expect everything to fall into place," Skeen said the package "was stalled after the assassination attempt because Reagan's personal touch was very important to the whole package."

Skeen predicted that 70 to 75 percent of Reagan's requested budget cuts will eventually be approved.

— Various pending legislation, including an agriculture bill extending the agriculture programs another four years, and changes in the depreciation schedules for businesses which, Skeen said, would provide incentives for businesses to re-invest and expand.

"The United States has dropped from number one to 13th of the largest nations, in terms of production. We have to provide some incentives in the private sector, because it just can't be accomplished by the government."

— Income tax reduction was termed by Skeen, to be the "hottest argument" in Reagan's economic package, which will probably cause the passage of the package to be somewhat delayed.

— Central America. "That is one of the most potentially dangerous places in the world today. The biggest trouble is that those countries are so volatile politically... they have a three-faced government in most cases and I don't think anyone's got a very clear picture of what's really

going on down there."

— Plans for the MX missile. Skeen said this issue has caused many New Mexicans a lot of grief in past months. "Many look at the land (in Southern New Mexico) as a wasteland, but it's not — it took a lot of blood and guts to get that land to be productive and they don't want the MX missile located there (in the Carlsbad area)," Skeen added that sources in the Department of Defense "are not pat yet on exactly what they want to do, and some

aren't even convinced that it's a good land deployment system."

— Projections for short and long range Social Security benefits. Skeen said that "in general, we're in good shape." An \$8 million additional appropriation this year has helped the system, he said. "We need to make it more sound — make it live up to what it was created to do."

Skeen also reviewed specific laws of interest to Chamber representatives and received input from committee members.

Another feature of the party, which is to be held at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, will be the appearance of the Tiffany Brass, which will provide music for dancing.

The band has "a big band sound, but plays a wide variety of music," Pilot Club member Jerry Shaw said. The group is

## Students are staging play

On May 15 and 16, a group of Ruidoso High School students will stage their production of "Oz" in the school gymnasium.

A high school play isn't big news in most towns, but when the production is put together without the benefit of a speech or drama teacher or program — that's a different story.

Ruidoso's last drama teacher left four or five years ago, as far as most of the present teachers recall, and the school's last dramatic production was "Little Abner."

The present play is being produced totally by volunteers — working on their own time. And seldom has such a project made so many of those involved happy — for different reasons.

The players themselves seem to look at the play for the fun they're deriving from a new experience. Most of the adults involved are glad to see the students getting involved in something which is educational, constructive and "broadening" in that it opens new avenues for development and learning.

The first step in the project was to determine whether any interest existed in putting the play together. The original idea came from teachers Sandy Gladden, Maggie Hawthorne, Phyllis Benham and Marty Collins. Gladden and Hawthorne are producing the play, and Benham is acting as choreographer.

The teachers decided to hold an audition "to see if anyone would show up." Anyone (and everyone) did. About 200 students, including prospective "Munchkins" from the elementary and middle school, tried out for parts.

"Over 100 kids are involved," Gladden said. Some got parts in the play; others are working backstage, with props, costumes, lighting and publicity.

Most of the students (and teachers) had little or no experience in these areas, and the teachers felt they needed someone with that experience to make the project a real success.

They found that person in Jean Steinbrecher, former professional drama teacher and costume designer, who owns Fashion Fabrics in Ruidoso. "She's been great," Gladden said. "She really saved us as far as giving

professional guidance to the kids." Steinbrecher agreed to donate her time to be director. Band and choir teacher Danny Flores took on the musical directorship.

Gladden and Steinbrecher also praised local businesspeople and service clubs who donated generously to finance the show.

Rehearsals — four nights a week — began about three weeks ago, and Steinbrecher said she is extremely pleased with the response and the progress of the students.

"It's just wonderful to be working with

kids who really want to learn," she said. "It's so refreshing to have a group of high school students who are so positive toward the experience. And it's not just the high school students — the little kids love it too."

About 40 to 50 elementary and middle school students auditioned for the 16 to 20 munchkin parts. "They're the most free spirited" cast members, she said.

Steinbrecher had to start "from scratch" with her inexperienced students. "First, I had to teach them how to work,

and then we started working on the play," she said.

The play is also a lesson in commitments, she added. Four nights a week is a big commitment for them, Steinbrecher said, and they learned quickly the importance of putting aside books and belongings and "warming up their voices" in preparation for reciting their lines.


The script was chosen with the help of Ron Geisenheimer, drama teacher at



her faithful companion, Toto, played by Neil Harris. At foreground, left, is director Jean Steinbrecher.





# Deyo, Travis to attend training meeting in May

Alden Deyo and Dave Travis, both of Ruidoso, will attend the annual spring meeting of the New Mexico Emergency Services Council May 2 and 3 at the Philmont Scout Ranch near Cimmaron. Both are members of White Mountain Search and Rescue team of Ruidoso.

A highlight of the meeting will be Saturday night, with a keynote speech by Jeffrey Duran, president of the Search and Rescue Dog Association of Seattle, Washington.

Duran, who has participated in more than 100 searches from Mount McKinley to the Adirondacks, will give a slide presentation on the Mount St. Helens disaster. Duran will also conduct workshops on search and rescue techniques.

Another featured training session will deal with "Maps, plotting and field orienteering," to be taught by members of the 1550th Air Crew Training and Test Wing of Kirtland Air Force Base. The instructors are part of an advanced helicopter and worldwide rescue operations training school.

The 1550th is "one of the groups we can call on if, for example, we need helicopters to evacuate injured people," Deyo said. In addition to the formal training sessions at the meeting, emergency services personnel will "have the opportunity

to discuss search and rescue activities and techniques used by other teams throughout the state," Deyo said.

Election of a new board of directors will also be on the agenda. Travis is the current secretary of the state organization.

## Numbers are required on buildings in village

All buildings in Ruidoso are required by ordinance to have street numbers. John Cupp, Zoning Enforcement Officer, said Friday.

"The numbers," Cupp said, "must be at least two and one half inches tall, to be visible from the street."

"The numbering applies to all houses, business buildings and other structures."

"The owners and/or the occupants are

responsible to have the numbers installed. "The ordinance sets out a rather stiff penalty for non-compliance and I don't want to have to enforce it."

Cupp noted that the numbering is necessary to upgrade services provided by the police and fire departments, and speeds up service calls by utilities. "In addition to making it easier for people to find you."

She provided the Tularosa students with a critique of their play. Having returned recently from judging a high school drama festival in Portales, Steinbrecher said she unconsciously had begun making notes during the performance, anyway.

The Tularosa group welcomed the constructive criticism; but "I did it for the Ruidoso students too," she said, to give them an idea of the strengths and weaknesses of the production — to apply to their own efforts later.

Cast members include Lou Ann Wilson as Dorothy; Nell Harris as Toto; Mitch Rhodes as the Scarecrow; Gene Reeves as the Tin Man; Eric Berg as the Lion; Laura Trapp as Glenda; Robin Rhodes as the Wicked Witch; Brian Yowell as the Wizard; Willie Dean as Witch's Guard; Jeanette Weems, Theresa Sanchez and Dierdre Sherwood as Spooks; and Munchkins too numerous to mention.

## Community Public Service seeking 10.06% increase

Community Public Service Company last Wednesday filed with New Mexico Public Service Commission for a 10.06% rate increase. The increase is expected to generate an additional \$4,363,502.00 annually for the company.

Maxie Davis, Vice President-Public Affairs, said that a typical residential customer's bill would increase \$2.85 per month. He cautioned that customers' bills would vary depending on KWH consumption. A typical residential customer uses about 400 KWH per month. The increase for residential customers will be among the smallest increase requested by the company.

Amounts requested by class of customer

are as follows: residential service, 7.65%; general service, 13.77%; large general service, 8.28%; industrial power, 10.43%; municipal power, 12.96%; street lighting, 2.55%.

Davis stated that inflation and higher interest expense were the major reasons for the proposed increase.

## CPS changing name May 15

Community Public Service Company announced Friday that their shareholders have approved a proposal to change the name of the Company to Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

The name will be changed officially on May 15, 1981. It is anticipated that all signs, letterheads, and bills will be changed by July 1, 1981.

In an earlier statement the company explained that the name is being changed because people often have trouble identifying the company as an electric utility because the previous name is similar to those of many federal and state agencies.

## State Realtors Association meeting here



**Birthday Of President Grant**

This message will reach you on April twenty-seven, the birthday of Ulysses S. Grant, Commanding General of the Union Armies in the Civil War, and eighteenth president of the United States.

Grant was a great lover of horses. When he was an infant, his parents would find him out playing under the horses' feet. Somehow the horses knew of his love for them and were careful not to step on him. From an early age he was an expert team driver and horse tamer, and horse trader — doing all the work on the farm in which horses were used.

Grant had no liking for the military and went to West Point to please his father. He did not intend to stay in the army but thought to get a position teaching mathematics (at which he was very adept) in some college, or go back to farming. At West Point, Grant became the greatest horseman in the history of the college.

At the beginning of his memoirs Grant stated: "Man proposes and God disposes. There but few important events in the

affairs of men brought about by their own choice."

This was all too true in Grant's case. The Mexican War broke out and Grant served during the entire war. Then in the Civil War he was supreme commander of the Union Forces. His heart ached at the suffering of the war, and he rejoiced at its close, giving General Robert E. Lee and his men the most generous surrender terms of any war in history.

Grant was a great friend of the Indians, sympathizing with their vast difficulties. He established the beautiful Mescalero Apache Reservation upon which live our friends and neighbors, the Mescalero Apaches.

**One Hundred Years Ago The Kid Escaped**

On Tuesday, April twenty-eight, it will be one hundred years to the day that Billy The Kid made his dramatic escape from captivity with the odds against him "One million to one," surprising everybody but himself.


His difficult lot as an orphan taught him the great value of true friends, and it was in taking up for these friends that much of his troubles resulted.

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — It's 19 months till the next general election, but we already have four candidates for governor on the Democratic side.

Enough already. Let's stop with four. First to announce was Toney Anaya, who told us he wanted the nomination so long ago many may have forgotten it. Certainly his announcement did not so galvanize New Mexico that all work came to a halt. Toney has obviously been running for the job such a while that a formal announcement to that effect changed things very little.

Then there's Les Houston. He's one of those almost-announced candidate who seems to have chosen our humble state as the place where he wanted to run for governor even before he bothered to move here. That's pretty much the way Dave Cargo did it — and there are a lot of us who remember what kind of governor he made us on that strange basis.

Now there's also Ambrey Dunn. Dunn has gone through the formal announcement phase, sometimes referred to as total immersion.

The way we hear it, the acquire of Otero county's apple-growing territory has been more or less permanently attached to a telephone since he announced, just talking to folks who want to press great lashings of money on him with which to support his campaign.

And there's also been a kind of non-announcement announcement from Fabian Chavez, who talked, less than formally, to an Albuquerque Journal reporter over a hot pastrami in a delicatessen.

Like Houston, he's telling us that he intends to announce, though he hasn't bothered to open a headquarters or have

buttons prepared pushing his candidacy, as Houston has.

Fabian obviously intends to bank much on his past experience when he makes the run. He reminds us that he has been on the legislative and the administrative side of state government, and that he even did a stint as an assistant Secretary of Commerce.

This reporter recently accosted him as he was leaving the office of the Secretary of State, where he had been spending time going over the state's election laws with a fine-tooth comb.

(Other candidates would be wise to follow his example in that regard.)

With ten years in the Legislature, plus time as boss of the Department of Commerce and Industry, Chavez probably has more experience in state government than Anaya and Houston combined.

But elections aren't won on experience alone.

Whoever wins is going to have to do a lot of pressing of the flesh, a lot of answering of tough questions and a lot of making promises to get for specific areas of the state what their territory needs most.

By the time November 1982 rolls around, Democrats will have had lots of all three of those things from the four gubernatorial candidates we have so far, plus all the other candidates for public office who have not announced yet.

Governor King assures this reporter he has told John Salvo, Secretary of Commerce and Industry, not to start a campaign for Land Commissioner while trying to do his job at his present post.

He says Salvo's people have "only been looking at the campaign and starting to get organized."

That's not the way we heard it.

### ON OUR LIFESTYLE

You're lower middle class, upwardly mobile (you hope) socially and economically, and wondering what the next step might be. The tax man has frustrated your aspirations for the last two or three years, but it looks like there may be a clearing in the clouds not too far away. You do a bit of dreaming.

That's the situation for most Americans today, as they contemplate the future. We've been having some major changes in lifestyles and viewpoints lately, not all of them voluntary. Inflation has put most of us on a treadmill which has made it difficult to get ahead. In fact, we have to run pretty hard just to stay in the same place — a condition Lewis Carroll warned us about quite a few years ago. But hope is being reborn, and the dreams are again taking shape.

World criticism of the American lifestyle has made us a bit self-conscious. We are called wastrels, prodigals, and exploiters. Few of these charges will bear close scrutiny, but they have had a great effect on the American psyche. There is an independent and free living element in our society (as in any other) that would flout it if they had it, but the average citizen would recoil from ever being accused of practicing "conspicuous consumption."

Well, what are the limits of excess, anyway? Has anybody come up with a code of conduct?

The answer, of course is no. Some things that are practical and essential for certain people (private aircraft to give mobility to management of far-flung industrial companies, for example) would be clearly unnecessary and excessive for the average person.

Life requires three basics that must be economically obtained: food, clothing, and shelter. Even among these we find opportunities for excess. Wholesome food containing basic nutritional needs is still reasonably obtained by American consumers. But most of us enjoy something a bit beyond the essentials. Today it's entirely possible to shoot \$100 on a dinner for two at a high-class restaurant. The difference between the price for the food and what appears on the bottom line of the ticket is for atmosphere or "ambiance."

The same goes for raiment. Basic clothing, to protect the body, is dirt cheap. But few of us are satisfied with clothing fundamentals any more. Even the lowly blue jean has been elevated to designer (i.e., high-priced) status.

Housing is considered the most over-priced necessity in the United States today. Many families have broken the barrier of the traditional 25% income limit to spend for housing. But upon close examination, it will be found that in almost all of these cases the decision has been elective, not forced. Very few of us would settle for a mere roof over our heads. We want more than protection from the elements. We want style and we want comfort. And most of us still insist on plenty of room.

In a developed nation such as ours, transportation comes close to making the list of the essentials of life. Without transportation, few of us could hold jobs, do business, or carry on our commercial and consumer functions of every-day living. Urban, mass transportation in the United States has been a flop. Most of us still rely on the personal automobile. It isn't efficient for most applications, but it gives us what we want, and that is convenience and privacy. Basically, what we're talking about here is the exercise of FREEDOM. Freedom to choose, as Milton Friedman describes it. Freedom to live, as Henry Clay argued so passionately.

For all its apparent waste and inefficiency, the American system has brought more goods and services to more people than anything else in the world. Its benefits to the poor and underprivileged have been incalculable. Tens of millions have risen from poverty to affluence by their own efforts, and have made a contribution to the general society while doing it.

Perhaps we have passed through that painful, introspective period when we had such grave self-doubts about our goals and purposes. Maybe it was well that we have done that. With that period of self-examination behind us, we can once again unleash the powers of creativity and production that freedom makes possible. — Hop Graham, The Lovington Daily Leader

### BURRO HAPPY ENDING

To the great surprise of early skeptics, including Arizona's Governor Bruce Babbitt, the great Unwanted Grand Canyon Burro crisis has been amicably resolved. Cowboys working for the Fund for Animals have extracted nearly 600 wild burros from the canyon and sent them to an adoption holding ground on a Texas ranch.

The burros, not native to the area, had faced death because they were competing with native species and doing environmental damage. Now they have been spared, and more than 200 already have been adopted. It is, as Babbitt observed, a happy ending to the "acrimonious controversy" which once raged over the original plan to shoot the animals. — Alamogordo Daily News

# Fad dieting knocked as way to lose weight

Removing excess poundage may be the new national pastime, but a University of New Mexico (UNM) professor has noted that failure rates on the most popular fad diets may run as high as 100 percent!

According to Dr. James Hill, an expert on diet and nutrition, failure to achieve permanent weight loss occurs because eating behaviors and lifestyles are not modified.

"Many persons believe quick weight loss can be achieved through a minimum amount of effort," Hill said. "Fad diets — high protein, low carbohydrate — offer quick weight loss in the beginning but this loss is mainly water and not fat."

"Fad diets are not nutritionally balanced and may contain an excess or deficit of one or more nutrients. Fad diets also are monotonous and are not easily tolerated for extended periods."

Hill insists there are only two ways to lose weight. "You must either decrease caloric intake or increase caloric expenditure through increased physical activity. By using both these techniques you have a perfect combination for achieving permanent weight control," he said.

Hill suggests that as a person begins a diet he or she should write down the foods eaten during a day, get a calorie counter and add up the calories consumed.

"If you are maintaining weight, then decrease your calories by 500 daily to lose one pound per week," he said.

Cutting back on calories can be achieved by consuming a normal mixed diet while decreasing portion sizes and eliminating unnecessary fattening snacks.

He warns dieters not to try and lose more than two pounds per week because loss of lean body tissue — muscle — will occur.

Before starting an exercise program Hill recommends that individuals first have a medical examination and then choose an exercise that is enjoyable. "Many persons enjoy aerobic types of exercise such as jogging, tennis or swimming. Others start a program by walking briskly," he said.

Hill has observed that the importance of exercise in weight control often is played down because of the mistaken belief that exercise will increase appetite and thus intake.

Not so, claims the UNM professor. "Exercise has actually been shown to decrease appetite and food intake," he said.

Another common belief is that the energy expended during exercise is so low that a person would have to spend excessive amounts of time exercising before achieving a weight loss. For example, to lose one pound of body fat, a person would have to perform calisthenics for 22 hours.

"What people fail to realize," Hill said, "is that exercise, if performed on a

regular basis without an increase in food intake, will eventually result in weight loss. If you were to play golf for two hours a day, twice a week, in a year's time you would lose 10 pounds."

Other health benefits of exercise noted by Hill include increased muscle tone (which may make you look thinner), increased circulatory efficiency, decreased blood pressure and decreased levels of blood fats.

"The keys to losing weight are persistence and then a realistic attitude that it will take time," Hill said. "Permanent modifications in present eating behavior and exercise patterns are the first steps to successful weight control."

# Microwave oven height important

The height of your microwave oven can affect its safety and convenience, said JoAnn Less, Extension housing specialist for New Mexico State University. The oven shelf or rack should be between two inches below and 10 inches above your elbows for the most convenient use.

Researchers at the University of Minnesota conducted a study to determine some standards for the safe and convenient height of the microwave oven. Participants 5'3" to 5'9" tall and between 14 and 65 years of age rated 10 tasks for

convenience and safety.

To develop safety ratings the participants heated soup in a bowl. Results showed that the microwave oven shelf should be higher than the user's shoulder height. The height of the surface on which the oven is placed should be no higher than about three inches below the shoulder.

An oven used by persons over 55 years old should be located so that the oven shelf or rack is at or at least three inches below the user's shoulders.

# Irrigation energy costs to rise

The cost of pumping irrigation water in southwestern New Mexico will take bigger chunks out of farm profits in the next 20 years. Rising energy costs may drive some small farms out of business altogether, according to a study by agricultural economists with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station.

The emergence of the oil cartel as a world price leader has left fuel price projections "clouded with uncertainty," said Dr. Bob Lansford, the agricultural economist who headed the study.

Price unpredictability combined with predictable declines in groundwater resources, also has blurred the future of irrigated agriculture in the southwest closed basins. The basins, in Hidalgo and Luna counties and parts of Sierra, Grant and Dona Ana counties, are important agricultural areas in New Mexico.

Lansford and the other researchers hoped to clarify the picture with an economic model that measures the impact of energy costs on irrigated agriculture. The model was used to simulate production conditions over a 20 year period under four energy price levels. For the simulations, the model incorporated a crop costs and returns budget, a pumping cost model, hydrological data and energy prices.

Under the simulated farming conditions, about 75,000 acres in the basins were farmed in 1978. This acreage would remain constant through 1998 except at high energy price levels. This acreage was planted in 47 percent cotton, 31 percent corn for grain, 16 percent grain sorghum and six percent wheat. The farms were assumed to be above average in size and management.

It was also assumed that the net return to risk and land or net profit except for land charges, was \$11.4 million in 1978. Return to risk, or the profit after land charges, was \$70 an acre.

In the first simulation using a base energy price, farmed acreage will not change. The net return to risk and land will increase to \$11.5 million by 1998. The slight increase is attributed to increased pumping plant efficiencies. However, in some areas declining water tables will require greater pumping depths and offset the efficiency.

Electricity is expected to supply 64 percent of the energy for the pumping plants and natural gas 36 percent. Farm

machinery fuel costs will run more than \$1.1 million for diesel fuel in 1998.

At a low energy price simulation, the effect of rising energy costs will begin to take effect. The net return to land and risk will decrease to \$3.7 million in 1998. Return to risk will be \$34 an acre.

The primary energy source in this simulation is electricity. The average cost of pumping will increase about 55 percent in 20 years. Beginning in 1988, all water will be pumped using electricity as the energy source. By 1998 farm machinery fuel costs will be just under \$2.5 million, a six percent yearly increase from 1978. Cropping pattern, acreage and labor costs will not change.

At medium energy prices, the net return to the land and risk will decrease to \$6.7 million by 1998, or two percent a year. The rapid escalation of prices for diesel and pumping plant fuel and increasing water depths will be responsible for the decrease.

The cumulative effect will slice the return to risk to \$8 an acre. Farm machinery fuel costs will be more than \$3.6 million, a 220 percent increase over the 1978 level. High costs for diesel again will be responsible for the increase.

In the final simulation under high energy costs, the net return to land and risk will drop to \$4.4 million. Diesel fuel, electricity and increasing depths to water will be responsible for the 62 percent decline since

1978. These factors will take 13,600 irrigated acres out of production in 1994 and 1998.

By 1998 farm machinery fuel costs will increase 259 percent to \$4.2 million. Labor costs which were constant at other price levels will decrease as the irrigated acreage decreases. Return to risk will be severely affected by the high energy costs, registering a minus \$19 an acre.

The steady decline in net returns to land and risk in three of the energy price levels indicates that farmers will be forced to increase capital for operating and machinery costs under lower per-acre profit margins. In the long run, this may cause farmers difficulties in obtaining capital, and could cause smaller farms to shut down.

Since labor costs will remain fairly constant in the face of rising energy costs, there could be a shift toward larger farms and more hired labor, according to Lansford.




