Water, sewer rates hiked

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening adopted Ordinance 81-2 increasing the rates for water and sewer services in the village.

The new charges won't be reflected on billings until June, possibly July, village clerk Jim Hine said Wednesday, "because we have to program our equipment for the new rates, and have to get the billing department organized and operating in the new administrative building, which we expect to be occupying in June."

Provisions of the ordinance will become effective five days after publication in The Ruidoso News, including new charges for line and meter installation.

The new minimum monthly charges for metered water service will be:

— Three-quarter inch meter, residential, \$12.50; commercial, \$15 and institutional/industrial, \$25.

— One inch meter, residential, \$15; commercial, \$25 and institutional/industrial, \$50.

— Two inch meter, residential, \$25; commercial, \$50 and institutional, \$75.

The fixed monthly charge for unmetered water service, solely for extinguishing accidental fires, will be: two inch, \$4; three inch, \$8; four inch, \$8; six inch, \$15 and eight inch, \$23.

The new commodity charge, for water used for any purpose, will be:

— \$1.75 per 1,000 gallons in excess of 4,000 gallons up to 10,000 gallons or less.

— \$2 per 1,000 gallons in excess of 10,000 up to 15,000 gallons.

— \$2.25 per 1,000 gallons in excess of 15,000 gallons.

The new charges for sewer will be:

— Three-quarter inch meter, residential, \$5; commercial, \$10 and institutional/industrial, \$15.

— One inch meter, residential, \$10; commercial, \$15 and institutional/industrial, \$25.

— Two inch meter, residential, \$15; commercial, \$40 and institutional/industrial, \$85.

The commodity charge for sewer will be 50 cents per 1,000 gallons used in excess of 4,000, determined from the meter reading for water.

The fixed monthly charge for sewer customers without municipal water service will be: residential, \$5; commercial, \$10 and institutional/industrial, \$15. The commodity charge will be 50 cents per 1,000 gallons of liquid waste in excess of 10,000 for residential; 50 cents per 1,000 gallons in excess of 20,000 for commercial and 50 cents per 1,000 gallons in excess of 25,000 for institutional/industrial customers.

Fees for specific services, to be charged when this ordinance is effective, include:

— Utilities expansion charge: \$100 per single family residential lot contained in a development; \$200 per multi-family residential lot and \$300 per commercial lot.

— Metered service lines: Three-quarter inch, \$750; one and one-half inch, \$850 and two inch, \$1,500.

— Fire lines: Four inch, \$1,238; six inch, \$1,276 and eight inch, \$1,375.

— Sewer connection: Three-quarter inch meter, \$50; one inch meter, \$75, two inch meter, \$150.

— Non-payment turnoff and turnon, \$27.50 and dry taps to water mains, \$110.

— Standby charges, where sewer connections are available but not used, \$5 monthly.

Details on Ordinance 81-2 will be included in The Ruidoso News when it is published.

In other business, the trustees:

— Received a proposal from the Ruidoso Library Board for expenditures of approximately \$8,700 from Revenue Sharing funds for equipment and a suggestion from Mrs. George Banks that some of this money be spent on installation of street name signs. No other requests were received at this hearing on Revenue Sharing funds, with receipts estimated at \$144,000 for the next fiscal year.

— Were advised by village attorney Lee Huckstep that Ralph Rush has executed the lease on the Municipal Swimming Pool and that the document was awaiting the signature of Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.

— Were advised by trustee George White that Eagle Creek Inter-community Water Users Association has applied to the State Engineer for a conversion of the six cubic feet per second association water supply to 4,343.8 acre feet per year. Also that the association has granted the village the right to drill a deep well, perhaps 1,500 feet White said, on association property.

— Were advised by Frank Potter, purchasing agent, that the three recently drilled wells are scheduled for test pumping next week; and that the next test well will be drilled at Bog Springs.

— Approved using the consulting services of Industrial Water Engineering,

Incorporated, Albuquerque, to reduce corrosion in water mains, at a fee of about \$2,700 on a trial basis until July 1.

— Authorized water superintendent Jim Wills to hire Ron Scraggs, Mesalero, as work superintendent for the water department.

— Instructed village clerk Jim Hine to proceed to determine the lineal foot cost of installation of approximately 4,500 feet of sewer main to service La Mission Development Company and Alto Crest Subdivision, Unit Two, and other areas in the vicinity of the Swiss Chalet. The request to determine this cost was by Jim Reid, an El Paso, Texas, developer, who said, of those who would use the service, "All are willing to share in the expense, willing to foot the bill."


— Instructed village attorney Huckstep to proceed with action to vacate a portion of Juanita Street, one block behind Mid-Town Mart.

— Authorized Hine, Potter, a Boyle Engineering representative and Wayne Dacy to meet to determine usage of property located behind Service Contractors in Palmer Gateway.

— Adopted Resolution 81-5 adding a paragraph dealing with traffic control signs in subdivisions; and Resolution 81-6 amending design and construction standards for subdivision paving.

— Accepted the sole bid of Border Machinery, El Paso, in the amount of \$34,500 for a used flatwheel tandem roller and \$8,500 for a lift type trailer.

— Approved the transfer of a liquor license (Kings) from Olen Featherstone to Danny and Karen Morris.

Downs okays budget for fire department

Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday evening set a fire department budget of \$30,368 for fiscal year 1981-82, including a small amount to be set aside for the purchase of a new fire truck in 1984.

Expenditures planned for the department include \$2,500 for insurance; \$4,500 building expenses; \$1,000 for conventions and schools for department members; \$4,000 for equipment operating expenses; and \$18,368 for operating expenses and lease purchase payments.

The trustees plan to put \$5,000 in reserve for the new truck.

The list of other equipment to be acquired is extensive, including hose dryers, air packs, portable radios, protective clothing, a portable pumper, hoses, shovels, fire chains and jacks as some of the fire fighting equipment to be purchased within the next fiscal year, according to fire chief Ray Walker.

During the meeting, the trustees also approved a bid from Artesia Fire Equipment for a fire hose at \$3,485; and a hose washer and turntable, at \$3,780.

The trustees also discussed a number of

considerations for planning of the municipal budget as a whole, setting priorities for expenditures of revenue sharing monies.

Village clerk Virginia Spill advised that the federal government recommends that revenue sharing funds be used for capitol outlay projects, rather than operating expenses. She requested the council's consideration of purchasing microfilming services, so that village records could be preserved in a safe location other than the municipal building.

Other priorities discussed for the funding included fencing of the area around the village water tanks; renovation of the municipal building, particularly the roof; additional equipment storage areas and fire hydrants.

In other business, the trustees:

— Adopted an ordinance establishing the water department, to correct records after the ordinance was discovered missing. A stipulation was made that the village would not provide water to residents outside the village limits, "from and after

Ruidoso School District patrons will vote May 12 on a \$8,350,000 bond issue to be used primarily to finance a new high school.

Presently, district patrons are paying \$5.97 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Because of the passage of the two mill levy, this year's school tax will rise to \$7.97 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

Last correction on date for C-C Espree Party

The date for the Espree Party, to be sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, is June 23.

With passage of the proposed bond election, Valliant said, taxes will rise to \$13.93 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. After three years when the mill levy is completed, taxes will drop to \$11.33 for four more years.

"We plan to repay these bonds in seven years because we don't think it is right to hold the taxpayers to terrifically high interest rates for the next 10 to 15 years," Valliant said.

Based upon a projected six percent growth rate over the next 20 years, the district's administration and faculty have outlined a plan adopted by the Ruidoso Board of Education.

The program, according to Superintendent Pat Valliant, will make maximum use of all school facilities while allowing for constant expansion.

Valliant said the first step in the long growing process was the passage of a two mill levy in February, by a five to one margin. If the bond issue passes, the district will be bonded to capacity and become eligible to seek Emergency Capital Outlay Committee (ECOC) money, which does not need to be repaid, he said.

"We will apply to receive a total of \$6 million from the ECOC, to be received over three consecutive years," Valliant said. "Because we plan to build the high school in three phases, we are requesting \$2 million per year. We will have to let three contracts and the building program will have to take place rapidly and efficiently to complete it within three

years," Valliant said.

He added that while the high school is being built, portable buildings will be used to house overflow students at White Mountain Middle and Elementary Schools. Valliant noted that a portable classroom was purchased this year by the district for use at Nob Hill Elementary.

"As soon as we move into phase one of the high school, we will be able to begin renovations of the present high school complex for continued use," Valliant said.

The high school will be built to house 750 students with a gymnasium to seat 1,500 people. An auxiliary gymnasium, auditorium, tennis courts, stadium and track are also planned in future expansion.

Valliant said, over a 20-year projected expansion period, all school facilities will

be constantly upgraded and remodeled to meet the needs of the growing student population.

He said plans also call for several new buildings, so that by the year 2000, all administrative offices will be located at the present Nob Hill site; kindergarten and first grade will be in a new building; grades two and three will be housed at the present White Mountain Elementary complex; grades four and five will move to the mid school building; grades six through eight will be located at the present high school; and grades nine through 12 will be in a new high school.

Ancillary services, such as special programs will be absorbed into those buildings, similar to the present system, according to the plans.

Pfeffer certified police hypnotist

Lieutenant Dave Pfeffer, head of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Ruidoso Police Department, has been certified as a police hypnotist by the Therapeutical and Investigative Hypnosis Institute of Houston, Texas.

Pfeffer has just returned from a 50-hour course in Forensic and Investigative Hypnosis at Texas A & M, College Station, as one of only 50 certified police hypnotists in the nation.

He is now qualified to conduct sessions in forensic and investigative hypnosis for

police investigations.

"All hypnosis of persons will be conducted under controlled circumstances," he said. "Basically I'll be working to fill in memory gaps, or loss of memory, brought on by stress, suffered by witnesses to, or victims of, violent crimes."

"Used this way, hypnosis is a catalyst to gain necessary recall in cases involving rape, armed robbery, assault, murder, severe car accidents, as stress can blank out visual and all sensory recollection.

Lukens quits as police chief

Paul Lukens, Chief of Police in Ruidoso since March 20, 1972, has resigned effective May 14. He will be privately employed in Ruidoso, he said.

He started his 18 year tenure with the department in October, 1960, as a police dispatcher and, in December of 1965, as assistant chief and criminal investigator left the department until November 1969, when he returned as a patrolman. He served as Lieutenant of the Criminal Investigation Division from March of 1971 until assuming his duties as chief.

Among police schools he attended was the National Academy of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in 1974, graduating with a 4.0 average.

"I want to thank the citizens for their help and strong support shown me over the years," he said, "that helped us to develop a modern and efficient police organization."

"I want to thank all of my troops, they're a fine bunch of officers."

"Also, we couldn't have built our department into the fine organization it is without the support and assistance given me by village clerk Jim Hine and all of the governing bodies it has been my privilege to serve under."

Downs set for May 9 meeting start

Ruidoso Downs has been the showcase for American Quarter Horse Racing. That's fine. And Ruidoso Downs Racing Secretary Donald Rausch wants to keep the mountain track at the forefront of the country's quarter horse operations.

It's just that when Ruidoso Downs opens its 70-day horse racing meet on May 9, he wants the thoroughbreds to command a prominent position, too.

"I want to have more thoroughbreds at Ruidoso Downs," he said as he begins his first complete season as Ruidoso Downs Racing Secretary. "I beat the drums at Phoenix and the California Fairs to get thoroughbreds. Some of them just don't quite fit the conditions at Hollywood Park. You can bring a thoroughbred down to Ruidoso and make a pretty good living.

"I'm really pushing the thoroughbreds. A lot of people take it for granted you can't run a thoroughbred at Ruidoso, but you can," he said. "We run seven races a day for thoroughbreds. There's plenty of room for thoroughbreds."

Rausch's hustling apparently obtained results. Among the new thoroughbred stables at Ruidoso this season are Kelly Winters from California and Red Duncan and Billy Jacot, who were stabled at Turf Paradise in Phoenix over the winter. "The

quality will be better than ever, especially thoroughbred-wise," said Rausch, who took over as racing secretary with about six weeks left in last season's Ruidoso meet.

The quality should be the highest ever. The competition for the 1,800 available stalls was the fiercest ever with 4,800 applications for space.

"I've talked to the last three secretaries and they said that's the most applications ever received. With the purses so high, everyone wants to run at Ruidoso," he explained. "It's hard to tell a man who wants to bring seven or eight horses he's been making payments on for futurities that he can't have stall space.

"It's a very tough problem to get 4,800 horses into 1,800 stalls," Rausch said.

While Rausch has upgraded the thoroughbreds, the quarter horses certainly haven't slipped in prestige, either.

Almost all the standouts at last year's meet will return, headed by Higheasterjet.

The Pine's Easter Jet gelding has been resting at Austin, Texas, since capturing a nose decision in last Labor Day's \$1,200,000 All-American Futurity, the centerpiece of quarter horse racing in this country.

Mighty Deck Three, the runnerup, will also return to race during his three-year-old campaign. He shod his sharpness by

losing by the thinnest of noses in the \$90,020 West Texas Derby April 5 at Sunland Park.

Besides his brilliant effort in the All-American, Mighty Deck Three easily annexed last summer's \$400,050 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and ranks among the all-time quarter horses in money earned.

He's won \$346,245 for owners Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas.

Alamitos Futurity, who won the \$145,094 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic; and Rocket Jet Bug, the victor in the \$500,180 Rainbow Derby, will also return to Ruidoso Downs. "We'll have the best thoroughbreds ever and we always get the best quarter horses. We'll have the best racing in this area of the country," Rausch said.

The meet's feature races, naturally, include the Triple Crown of two-year-old quarter horse racing. The Kansas Futurity (\$335,000 est. purse) on May 31, the Rainbow Futurity (\$800,000 est. purse) on July 26 and the All-American Futurity (\$1,300,000 est. purse) on closing day, September 7, are for juveniles.

Three-year-old quarter horses also have their Triple Crown. It begins on May 24 with the Kansas Derby (\$25,000 est. purse), continues on July 5 with the Rainbow Derby (\$575,000 est. purse) and ends with

the All-American Derby (\$1 million) on August 30.

Three-year-olds and older quarter horses have the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic (\$175,500 est. purse) on August 2. The first running of the Rainbow Silver Cup (\$175,500 estimated purse) for 4-year-olds is slated for June 14.

Thoroughbreds have 27 stakes and feature races, including the Ruidoso

Thoroughbred Futurity, for two-year-olds on September 6 with an estimated \$125,000 purse. Other featured attractions for two-year-olds include the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity on June 14 with an estimated \$35,000 purse, the Rio Grande Futurity (\$40,000 est. purse) on August 9 and the Norgor Futurity with an estimated \$100,000 purse on July 12.

Three-year-old thoroughbreds have the \$25,000 est. Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby on August 23 while older horses have the \$25,000-added Ruidoso Mile on September 5.

Racing will be conducted primarily on a Thursday-through-Sunday schedule from June 4-September 7. In May, racing will be on a Friday through Sunday schedule, except for a special card on May 14 for the Kansas Futurity trials.

Post times (except for seven special days) will be at 1 p.m.

"Under hypnosis a person can often recall license numbers, physical features and clothing worn by suspects and descriptions of vehicles."

Pfeffer also said police hypnosis is "not the same as employed in stage productions. People will not do anything under hypnosis that they wouldn't do of their own accord."

"All people who might be hypnotized in a police investigation will be evaluated to see if they are emotionally suited for hypnosis. Bear in mind that hypnosis is controlled by the person who is the hypnotist."

He also said, "Police hypnosis will be an invaluable tool in solving some of our crimes where people just don't remember incidents, because their memory has been blanked out because of stress."

A spokesman for Ruidoso's CPS office said they were notified of the power outage by their supplier, Plains Electric, distributor of electricity through several western states, due to work to be accomplished on service lines.

Carrizozo corporation launches golf and recreation fund drive

The Carrizozo Golf Course and Recreation Center are receiving new monetary support, through membership sales, available from Lincoln County Arriba Incorporated.

The non-profit corporation has assumed management of the golf course and recreation center, which includes a bowling alley, swimming pool, snack bar, games, ball fields and fishing lakes near the golf course.

Family memberships are available for \$150 per year, according to spokesman Howard Shanks. This tax-deductible contribution will allow all members of a family to play golf for a year.

Those who are unable to make such a contribution, (or non-golfers) are encouraged to purchase a corporation membership for \$10, also tax-deductible. Other donations may be made in the

form of "sponsorship" for \$2,500 per year. Shanks said the corporation has received four such pledges; and hope to obtain at least five more — one for each of the course greens. Those funds will go for general course and green maintenance.

Lincoln County Arriba was formed after local citizens had "tried everything to get funding" for operation of the area, from state, federal and private sources. Charitable donations from a single individual had financed the operations in the past, but were terminated as of January 1, 1981.

Plenty of funds were available for "development" of such complexes, Shanks said, but none of the agencies were willing to provide operating expense monies.

The town of Carrizozo received a loan from the state for \$40,000, which is providing for continued watering and maintenance.

Trail ride set this weekend

An overnight trail ride, for anyone with a horse or mule, is scheduled this week end under the sponsorship of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners.

The riders will leave Western Highlands at 10 a.m., Saturday and head their way over mountain trails to Lucas Wells, east of Ruidoso Downs.

Riders will pay \$15, including meals and feed for animals; non-riders may camp overnight for \$11 each; and persons driving to the camp site may eat dinner Saturday evening for \$8 or they can obtain breakfast Sunday for \$4.

Sunday entertainment at the camp site will include balloon busting, polo, pole bending, barrel racing, horse shoe pitching and, Saturday evening, live entertainment will be featured.

Man injured in car mishap

H. J. Cooper, 70, Ruidoso, was slightly injured Monday in an accident which took place near village hall on Wingfield Street.

Cooper's car left the road and went into a ditch, apparently after he swerved to avoid hitting another vehicle.

More than \$100 damage was incurred by the Cooper vehicle. He was treated at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital for injuries, and released early Tuesday morning.

Area forest permits sold only in Ruidoso

All permits for forest products on Smokey Bear Ranger District will now be sold at the Ruidoso office only, according to Paul Gordon, district ranger.

Gordon said permits are required to take fuelwood, Christmas trees, wildings and other forest products from forest land, and in previous years, permits have been available at the Ruidoso and Captain administrative offices.

Because of money handling and personnel limitations, Gordon said, permits will now be handled only through the Ruidoso office.

Permit applications can be hand delivered or mailed to the office, Drawer F, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

"The Ruidoso office will normally be closed during weekends this fall," Gordon said. "Therefore, we expect an increasing amount of mailed applications from those

who cannot get a permit in Ruidoso during the normal Monday through Friday business hours."

Meeting on bubonic plague set in Capitan

A public informational meeting on bubonic plague will be presented in the County Fair Building, Capitan, at 7 p.m., Friday sponsored by the Lincoln and Otero Trappers Association.

A representative of the State Health Improvement Division, Santa Fe, will show slides and speak on the symptoms of plague and its prevention.

New project measures announced by RC&D

Propagation of turkeys, diversion dam repairs and fire fighting equipment are among the new project measures being undertaken by the South Central Mountains Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council.

Three new project measures were adopted at a Tuesday meeting in

Following the meeting, the group toured the Space Hall of Fame, straits of wild turkeys in the Jicarilla Mountains, with the aim of controlling grasshoppers and other insects more successfully. They hope to restrict hunting in the area until the turkeys become established.

The council members also agreed to help with repairs for a water diversion on Tularosa Creek, which feeds the Tularosa Community Ditch Group.

Assisting the community of Lincoln in getting a water tank and pump for their present truck was the third project adopted by the group. They will also look into construction of a new building in which to house another truck in the future. They hope to locate the new building about six miles west of Lincoln.

A previous project to find land in Carrizozo for construction of a group home for mentally retarded men in Carrizozo was reported as complete.

A report on the progress of another project measure, a well at the Fort Stanton Farm, was also presented to the group. The well was tested at 350 gallons per minute, and a pump is to be installed soon. The well is to be used for irrigation at the farm, which provides therapy for students at the facility.

The RC&D members also heard a report from state senator Wyatt Atkins on the recent legislative session. Atkins dealt with the problems involved in having bills passed.

The Tuesday gathering served as the annual meeting of RC&D, and the following officers were elected:

Hall assists in seizure of 15 tons of marijuana

Coast Guard Second Class Petty Officer Ron W. Hall, Alto, recently participated in the seizure of an estimated 15 tons of marijuana on board an unmanned 65-foot shrimp boat, 30 miles south of Galveston, Texas.

Petty Officer Hall is stationed at the Galveston Coast Guard Base, and was the engineer aboard one of four Coast Guard boats dispatched to seize the shipmer, and 12 men, including six Houstonians, on two 40-foot yachts.

Coast Guard and Customs officials apprehended the shipmer Little Al; a Houston vessel Dorado; and the Pearland, Texas-based Tyrant III, when a Houston-based Coast Guard helicopter reconnaissance flight over the Gulf of Mexico reported the vessels grouped together.

Officials said the shrimp boat was

suspected because the nets were unused and the deck was not cluttered with the usual fishing tackle seen on operating shrimpers.

The vessels arrived at the Galveston Coast Guard base where the suspects were questioned then transported to Galveston County Jail.

Also participating in the arrest were officers from the Galveston Police Department, Galveston County Organized Crime Control Unit, Drug Enforcement Administration agents, the United States Attorney's Office and United States Fish and Wildlife representatives.

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Retired teachers to be honored at Monday tea

Two retired Ruidoso school teachers will be honored Monday at a 4 p.m. tea sponsored by the Ruidoso Education Association (REA) at the high school library.

Ruth Moore and Lindy Samelson have taught school a total of 88 years between them, and were this year voted into the Eastern New Mexico Education Association's Hall of Fame.

The teachers were nominated by the REA and were recognized at a ceremony in Roswell recently. Being accepted into the Hall of Fame is considered one of the

greatest achievements in the careers of both women.

"When they presented me with my plaque at the ceremony in Roswell, the 20 teachers from the REA who attended stood up — that really made me feel good," Moore said.

Samelson was quite surprised to hear that she had been named into the Hall of Fame. "This is really something, to be honored like this, by your peers," she said.

Samelson began teaching in 1936, prodded along by Marie Rooney, who was teaching first grade at the time. No third grade teacher was available, and because Samelson had the necessary training, she became the obvious choice.

Over the years, she taught in every school building as it was added to the system.

"In those first years we got along just fine. When we changed the system over from a county school to a municipality, we forgot one important thing — to order books," Samelson said. Books were still available from the county and because of a very active parent organization, a hefty library developed.

"I remember that sickness was never a problem then. I think it was because we were so isolated and nobody ever had enough money to leave town and bring back new germs — we were so used to our own, that we just never got sick, to speak of."

Before long, however, Ruidoso began to grow and with that growth came a wave of chicken pox. "The kids got so sick, I thought they were going to die... I guess because they weren't as immune."

Samelson moved with the fourth, fifth and sixth grades to the present high school building, where she eventually ended up with one fifth grade class. Because of more growth, she was transferred to the Stetson School, just outside Ruidoso Downs.

"I guess if I had to choose, I enjoyed those years at Stetson School the most. The kids were so anxious to learn and we had a very strong PTA which made my job so wonderful," Samelson said.

Eventually, the present Nob Hill School was finished and Samelson again moved her classroom. "When we first moved in there we had lots of room. Well, that lasted about two years and it finally got about as crowded as it is now; then we got White Mountain Elementary built," she said.

Upon completion of that complex, Samelson volunteered to move and she once again taught in a new school. A few years later, she moved back to Nob Hill, where she completed her career.

Samelson also served a term as county superintendent of schools and taught high school during the early years of her career. Although she has a degree in piano from the University of Kansas in Lawrence, she became a favorite teacher of many elementary children, she believes.

"I really cared about the kids," she said. "I know some of those kids are grateful for the things I did — they've told me so. But I think the parents are grateful too." Samelson's years as a teacher were also years of change for education in general. "I think they've (teachers and administrators) made great strides in special education and bilingual education and in science. More children read better now and there's more of an effort made to do things for the brighter students than in years past," she said.

The National Education Association (NEA) has also had an impact on education, she said. "They've made it a lot easier on teachers to get involved in the community. NEA has encouraged professionalism for teachers. I think if all the teachers left town for a year, the town would really feel it in every way."

"The various service clubs, Girl and Boy Scout programs, churches, just about every organization has teachers as the backbone," Samelson said. "I think the NEA has given teachers the opportunity to do this — when I first started it wasn't like that."

RUTH MOORE began her teaching career in 1951 as a way to support her family when her husband died. She is a graduate of Christian College, now Columbia College, in Columbia, Missouri. She attended the University of Kansas and took some courses at the University of Missouri, over a period spanning 20 years.

When Moore went to work for the local system, she held a temporary teaching certificate, which listed all courses needed to graduate. She did earn certification and taught third grade 27 years and seventh grade one year.

"Seventh grade was not my niche," Moore said. "I taught third grade my first year, and when there was an opening in the seventh grade, I volunteered to take it. It just didn't work out at all. It didn't take long to realize my mistake," she added.

So, Moore returned to the familiar elementary classroom, where she remained until retiring in 1979.

"My greatest experience as a teacher were the plays and programs we gave. I remember special things that happened with certain kids and how excited the children always were," Moore said.

Moore is perhaps best remembered for the way she incorporated art into every phase of learning. "I like art projects the most and I was always pleased to teach art. I thought everyone did excellent work as they interpreted an idea, so I was always complimentary," she said. Moore eventually submitted and had published, several original elementary art

projects in Instructor, a national teacher's publication. She was also recognized by having some projects displayed in former Governor Jerry Apadoca's office.

Moore said some of the most important advancements in education since she began teaching include enrichment programs for above average students. "The idea of finding children who have special needs and then offering help for them is one of the best things to happen to education," she said.

She feels the NEA has been helpful over the years in "solving teachers' problems in getting higher salaries and in lowering student-teacher ratios. I remember one year when I had 50 kids in one classroom. NEA has helped that; helpfully, the ratio will be around 25-1 or could be up to 30-1, which is much better than 50-1."

Both women feel Ruidoso is fortunate to have a more stable year-round population, and an economic base to support year round residents, resulting in more students finishing school in Ruidoso that also started school here.

"Children are more apt to learn more when they aren't being shuffled from one school to another," Moore said.

The advent of television also had a very positive affect on children, over the years, both women agree. "TV made a great deal of difference, for the good. Because Ruidoso has always been so isolated, television was a way to see the rest of the world without spending a lot of money or going a great distance," Samelson said.

While both former teachers feel television has taken a bite out of normal study time, they feel the change has not been detrimental. "There are so many good programs on television, especially the public stations, sponsored by NEA or recommended by various national organizations. I think television has helped children's vocabularies," Samelson added.

Moore said children "will definitely be in front of the television if there's a good children's program on."

Another new concept both teachers incorporated into their careers was the open classroom. This type of instruction allows the child to progress at his/her own pace in a relaxed environment. The traditional, commonly called "closed" classroom, was favored by Moore. "Some ideas from the open classroom were good, but I always felt the children were more attentive in a closed classroom, and I always felt I had more control over them," she said.

Either way, she said, "children always get the 'three R's'." Samelson had special training to teach in the open classroom and believes "it is ideal with 15 students or less to each teacher. It is a perfect size to fit everybody's needs, but," she said, not a realistic idea.

"Ruidoso's system is good because it has both types of classrooms, and they work very hard to slot the children into the type of classroom that fits their needs best," Samelson added.

Retirement has meant time to pursue hobbies for both women. Moore devotes her time to her children, Linda, who now lives in Albuquerque, and Joe, a resident of Littleton, Colorado. She also has four

grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

She had a third child, Wood, who died in an accident at New Mexico Military Institute in the 1950's. She also works at the Hospital Auxiliary's thrift shop two days a week, plays bridge once a week, and has developed her skills in art, as well as joined a local extension club.

Samelson has maintained her membership in the local teacher's sorority saying "it's just another way to keep up professionally." She is also a member of the Alpha Alpha Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, Saint Eleanor's Guild and is doing lots of garden work. She keeps up a supply of kindling and also maintains close touch with her son and his family.

"It's a chance for me to be freer than ever with my time. I can do whatever I want," she said.

Moore, who misses teaching, said she still offers her help at the schools on occasion. "I work with the children on art projects and whatever they need me for; whenever they call and ask for my help, I go."

In Denver, where the three brothers were born, their parents' savings were wiped out by the panic of 1896, and the family fell upon very hard times.

Through it all, the family had many happy moments, which Uncle Jerome called upon for his moving pictures, and later for a column on a newspaper of which he was editor.

Uncle Jerome said he would raise the family out of poverty and uphold "The Proud Name of Storm," he would become famous as a Broadway actor.

He had a modest beginning as an actor, and became very confident. He told the director of the play that if ever the leading man should be sick that he, Jerome, had the whole show memorized, and could step in and play any part.

The leading man did become sick, and the director took Uncle Jerome at his word and let him step into the lead. Here was his chance of a life-time, but right at the crucial moment, his memory completely failed him. And down he went, taking the play with him, his career as an actor finished before it had well begun.

Humbled and bristled, Uncle Jerome went out to Los Angeles to visit his Mother, Althea Ellen Reno Storm, his father, Francis David Storm and his sister, Leonora Storm "Aunt Nonie."

Just by sheer accident he got into the movie directing and went to the top.

His terrible experience as a leading actor, remained with him; but he turned it to good effect a hundred times telling and writing about in the most side-splitting humor.


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


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


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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Once or twice in the past, this column has pounded on the head of Larry Hamm, boss of the state's motion picture promotion bureau.

We hinted that Hamm might be one of those state employees who don't always distinguish clearly between their own interests and those of their employer.

We also have chided him for not being a hotshot success at bringing movie producers to the state to do their work. But, believe it or not, we're actually feeling a twinge of sympathy for Hamm this week.

If he's in Puerto Rico at that meeting of film commissions, he's hearing some strong language from big shots at film studios explaining why they won't be making movies in states with anti-blind billing laws.

Yeah, you're right. That's the kind of law New Mexico has, thanks to another one of this columnist's favorites, Senator Les Houston.

Why do movie producers care about the matter?

Well, those who produce movies as part of a major film company also distribute movies, their own and those of independent producers.

They feel laws which forbid blind bidding by exhibitors on the product they will show are a knock at them, and they don't see any reason to reward states by spending millions there when the state has already bit a piece out of them.

There are 20 other states like New Mexico in this regard. Colorado just killed an anti-blind bidding attempt in committee in its legislature, and Alabama and Tennessee are rushing to get theirs off the books.

Here's how one studio head spells out the

situation, in letters he has been sending to governors: "Twentieth Century-Fox will not willingly start a motion picture of television production in the State of —"

— If there is a feasible alternative, as long as your blind bidding legislation is in force. We will go elsewhere to states more hospitable to the needs of all of the industry."

Was New Mexico aware such action might take place when its law was being considered?

There was evidence of the short-sightedness of the action even then.

But the measure was being lobbied by Julius Golden, now Houston's unpaid public relations consultant, and by Lou Avolio of the big Commonwealth Theaters chain.

When the point that major studios might retaliate was raised at one committee session, Houston said, "Who needs their money?"

That's an easy question to answer. New Mexico does. It's good money, spent in ways which do the state no harm, and we've invested lots of our own dough to help attract it here.

Smiling off, as he well knows, is one of Senator Houston's faults. This particular case of it could come back to haunt him politically.

This town is getting too small.

When this reporter made an appointment last week to meet with one of his mysterious "sources" in a local drinkery, the very man the source was raving on came in and sat down at the next table.

Betcha Woodward and Bernstein never had that kind of trouble. It only happens in New Mexico, where we all know one another and at least half of us are first cousins.

Dear editor:

In light of recent published accounts of remarks made by members of the Ruidoso Board of Trustees during your last meeting, I feel compelled to recount the facts surrounding the Village's referendum concerning the municipal swimming pool.

As you recall, on October 14, 1980, Ralph Rush appeared before the Council and requested that he be allowed to lease the pool from the Village. He did not set out the terms of the lease he was proposing.

At the Council meeting of November 11, 1980, when asked whether or not a lease of the pool was legal, I advised the Council that, since in my opinion the pool was being utilized for governmental purposes, it could be leased only after the voters of Ruidoso approved of such action in a public referendum.

Public notice of the referendum was prepared by my office and was incorporated with the notice pertaining to various pending bond requests to be presented to the Ruidoso voters. The public notice did not contain any specific information on the proposed lease because, again, such information did not exist at the time.

After discussions with Mayor Davis, Village Manager Jim Hine and Village Purchasing Agent Frank Potter, it was my impression that, in the event the voters of Ruidoso desired the pool to be leased, the Village would then decide what basic

terms such a lease would contain and advertise for bidders in order to obtain the lease arrangement most beneficial to the Village. A review of the Council's minutes has substantiated my recollection. At the October 14, 1980, meeting, after being advised that "it would be necessary to advertise that the pool was for lease and if more than one proposal was submitted, all would have to be considered," a motion was passed to "call for proposals on lease of the city pool." On November 25, 1980, after Ralph Rush "again presented the Council with a request to lease the municipal pool," Councilman Seyner's motion "to call for bids" was passed. The minutes for the December 9, 1980, Council meeting recite: "Mr. Harris stated that the call for bids on the swimming pool had not been published since it was still his opinion that the pool is used for governmental purposes and would have to have a referendum on whether to lease the pool or not."

It was my opinion then, and is my opinion now, that the procedure originally contemplated by the Council would comply with the legal requirements set forth in our statutes.

I concur with Mr. Huckstep's advice that the recently approved lease to Mr. Rush, if challenged, would be invalidated by a District Court — not because the public referendum was "unlawful," but because, after Ruidoso's voters decided the pool could be leased, the Council proceeded to fix the terms and award a lease to Mr. Rush without seeking other potential bidders for the lease through proper notice to the public. Were the Council to advertise and let bids on the swimming pool, awarding the lease to the highest bidder, as I was led to believe they would, it is my opinion that the statutes would be complied with and the resulting lease valid.

In closing, let me comment briefly about Councilman Seyner's published remarks with respect to "errors and omissions" and the possibility of "taking action against" me concerning my past legal advice to the Council. To imply to the public that my interpretation of a statute constitutes "bad legal advice" or "malpractice" is an irresponsible accusation. When an attorney is employed to give legal advice or render legal services, he impliedly represents that he possesses the requisite degree of learning, skill, and ability necessary to the practice of his profession. An attorney is not an insurer or guarantor of the results of his work. Rather, an attorney must use reasonable care, diligence, and skill in the performance of his professional duties, and he is liable to a client for negligence when, and only when, he fails to do so.

In addition to the fact that reasonable care, diligence and skill was utilized in formulating the advice I gave to the Village concerning leasing the Village swimming pool, that advice was valid, and I still stand behind it.

The Council has developed a pattern in recent months of making public accusations first and determining the actual facts later. I would suggest that such reckless rhetoric offers a much greater exposure to litigation than the current pool-leasing controversy. In particular, remarks made to the public by members of the Council that my advice was bad or unsound obviously have a detrimental effect upon my reputation within the community. Unless such remarks cease immediately, I can assure each of you that the Village will be given the opportunity to explain to a jury why such remarks do not constitute defamation.

President Reagan's economic program is evoking a lots of interest in Congress, with the possibility that his Tuesday night appeal to the Senators and Representatives to approve it will provide that last ounce of pressure to bring it to pass.

One announcement on Reagan's plan that raised some eyebrows was the comments by House Speaker Tip O'Neill that the Democrats didn't have the votes to pass their own tax cutting/spending bill.

O'Neill has the years of experience in Washington to lend considerable credence to his remarks.

Naturally there are those Democrats who say O'Neill doesn't know what he's talking about — but we wonder if they really believe that, or if they are just making noises in the hopes of garnering enough strength to defeat Reagan's proposals.

We can hope that, when the roll call vote is taken, that all dissidents, and those interested in the future of the United States, will vote according to the wishes of their constituents — to cut government spending, reduce taxes and work out a belt-tightening financial control program that will result in a balanced budget by 1984.

The one thought that must be bothering some of those attacking Reagan's economic package just has to be how far they can go without putting their re-election chances in jeopardy. Which is a lousy criterion upon which to use as motivation to vote for legislation the majority of citizens obviously favor. — CD

May 20 is the deadline for applications for the Design Arts fellowships in all categories of the Design Arts program of the National Endowment for the Arts.

design projects of special merit, with priority given to applications likely to have practical results.

regional groups, and coalitions for action on design issues. Maximum grants in this category have not been established.

This program promotes excellence in the fields of architecture, landscape architecture, urban design and planning, interior design, industrial design, graphic design and fashion design.

Matching grants of up to \$40,000 will be given in the Design Exploration/Research category for experimental and innovative research on design. Priority will be given to projects addressing major current design issues or helping to define or resolve new or recurring design problems.

Complete information, guidelines, and application forms may be obtained from the Director, Design Arts Program, National Endowment for the Arts, 2401 E St., NW, Washington, D. C. 20506. Information and application forms are also available from the New Mexico Arts Division, 113 Lincoln Ave., Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501. The Arts Division's phone number is 827-2061.

Grants for individuals include senior-level sabbatical fellowships of up to \$15,000 to enable accomplished professional designers to explore areas of interest or new approaches to design.

The Service to the Field category funds organizations serving the design field, including national membership or-

Individual project fellowships of up to \$10,000 enable professional designers and other qualified individuals to carry out specific design, educational or research projects which will contribute to the design field or will assist in their career development.

For designers in the early stages of their careers, for those returning to the field after prolonged absence, or for those changing careers within the designing profession who wish to carry out specific projects, fellowships of \$5,000 are available.

To encourage the professional growth of talented design students, the Endowment will make non-matching grants of \$9,500 to accredited institutions with graduate programs in the design arts so that they may provide \$800 fellowships to outstanding students pursuing thesis-level projects. These monies may not be used for tuition.

The Design Arts program has four major categories of grants for organizations. Design Communication grants of up to \$50,000, matched, support projects that educate and inform the public and professionals on the value and practice of design, the impact of design decisions, and the relationship between design and human behavior. Activities may include conferences, exhibits, workshops, seminars, or the development of materials for publication or presentation.

Design Demonstration grants of up to \$30,000, matched, support specific planning and design activities such as feasibility studies, conceptual and schematic design, and planning studies for





Burt Wittrup to UNM journalism department

A 20-year veteran of state news gathering will join the University of New Mexico's (UNM) department of journalism this fall.

Burt Wittrup, former managing editor of the Albuquerque Tribune and for more than 18 years an Associated Press (AP) staff member, will become an assistant professor.

Bob Lawrence, department chairperson, said, "Burt Wittrup is a news and prose professional who has been teaching under deadline pressures throughout his career. 'What they called 'Burt's finishing school' has placed former employees of his as directors of science news for the New York Times, the AP science writer on the west coast, two AP bureau chiefs in this country and two others who are chiefs of bureaus overseas," Lawrence said.

Wittrup in 1978 received the Dan Burrows Award, named for the late Tribune editor, for his "continuing outstanding contribution to journalism in New Mexico."

He served with the AP in Albuquerque from January, 1961, until September, 1979, becoming city editor of the Albuquerque Tribune. A year later he became managing editor.

While he was city editor, the Tribune staff won the New Mexico Press Association first-place awards for community service, investigative reporting, news writing and feature writing.

Tony Hillerman, journalism professor, author and special assistant to UNM president William E. Davis, in nominating Wittrup for the Burrows award, said: "If you are working with Wittrup, nothing short of the full professional competence will do. And down through the years, just about all of us have worked with Burt."

"Dozens of interns and beginners have broken into journalism under his tutelage. Many of these beginners have been students of mine. Without exception, they found Wittrup to be tough, demanding, fair — without exception. 'They admired him, and because they admired him, they tend to adopt his ways.'"

Wittrup, 46, was born in Elk Horn, Iowa. A Navy veteran, he attended UNM under the G.I. Bill and earned a Bachelor of University Studies degree.

Lawrence said Wittrup's appointment continues the UNM journalism department's traditional emphasis on selecting seasoned professionals "with street sense, who have been where their students are going."

"But we don't just look for experience, we look for those men and women who have thought about and improved the profession while practicing it. In Burt Wittrup we're adding another faculty member whose performance has contributed to improving journalism."

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I'm interested in a small electric trolling motor for my small pram, but since I've had no experience with them, I wonder how practical they really are. It would seem one might spend more time charging the battery than fishing. Could you comment on this? Jay S., Wisconsin

Dear Jay — Most fishermen who own electric trolling motors, particularly bass fishermen, will tell you they nicely fill the gap between their gasoline outboard and a paddle. They will silently ease you into coves and along the edges while freeing your hands for fishing. The flick of a switch is much easier than starting an outboard when you want to move only a short distance. For the most part they are trouble free and dependable.

Then comes the question of batteries. The majority of electric motors require a twelve volt battery for power. No doubt many people use a standard automotive battery for this purpose, but they are not the best choice. The "deep cycle" marine batteries are much more suitable. Auto batteries are designed to provide maximum cranking power for a few seconds, then have to be recharged. On the other hand, marine batteries provide lower amounts of energy over longer periods. Their design allows them to be run down and recharged many times (several hundred) with little loss of capacity. In short, they are designed to run small electric motors and accessories rather than provide short burst of high energy. How long will the battery run a trolling motor? Well, it depends. These motors come in all sizes and speeds. A fully charged battery might reasonably be expected to run a twelve pound thrust motor at one-half speed continuously for more than six hours, or full speed for more than three hours. These are, of course, only estimates, but you can see this adds up to a lot of intermittent use. After using the battery it should be brought to near full charge. If you don't already have one,

you'll need a small battery charger.

The purchase of a marine battery and a charger could very well equal the cost of a small trolling motor, but considering the hours of enjoyment they can provide you will likely consider the investment justified. Talk to someone who owns one first if you're unsure.

TIP FROM READER — Early spring brings warmth and sunshine that beckons canoers and kayakers to bring their boats into the water after a long winter's rest. But, beware! The American Canoe Association (ACA) warns that spring might possibly be the most dangerous time of year for canoeing.

The waters of spring are usually very cold. In many areas they were spawned by melted snow and ice a very short time before. Then too, the river water from such melt is apt to be high and running rapidly. This, of course, adds to the danger of capsizing and hampers rescue efforts should they become necessary.

When the decision has been made to paddle such waters, one should always plan to wear a wetsuit, and never venture alone. The ACA says, "When the air and water temperatures add up to less than 100 degrees F., conditions are severe and a wetsuit should be worn." If you aren't sure of water conditions, and your own ability, it would be wise to give the water a chance to warm some and quiet a bit.

A reminder might be in order that the third annual National Fishing Week will be observed May 11-17. Early reports indicate this year's observance will enjoy even more participation than the last.

The primary purpose of NFW is to introduce more people to the fun of fishing, especially youngsters. Many communities will be holding contests, derbies, clinics, and demonstrations to stimulate interest. The biggest single event will be a water-front festival in Washington, D. C. This affair should have a little of just about every aspect of fishing, along with live music of many kinds.

Teaching kids to fish endows them with one of the greatest opportunities to enjoy a lifelong communion with nature. If properly instructed they will also learn sportsmanship, conservation, and patience. Keep this date in mind and make it a point to get better acquainted with a kid — maybe even your own.

UNM General Library due millionth volume

The University of New Mexico (UNM) General Library will celebrate the acquisition of its millionth volume May 2 at 2 p.m. on the south mall of UNM's Zimmerman Library.

On hand to help celebrate the event will be Governor Bruce King; Henry Jaramillo, president of the UNM Regents; UNM president William E. Davis; UNM library dean Paul Vassallo; numerous other UNM officials, faculty and staff members and students; Patricia Battin, vice president and university librarian at Columbia University; the New Mexico Brass Quintet, and others.

The acquisition of a millionth volume signifies the reaching of a certain level of maturity of a university, Vassallo said, "the top universities have the top libraries."

By comparison, the two universities in the nation which have the most volumes in their libraries are Harvard, with a collection of approximately 10 million, and Yale, with a collection of about seven million.

"You have to keep in mind that these are much older institutions. They've had a longer time to build up their libraries," he said.

At UNM, the millionth volume is actually four separate works, all relative to New Mexico. They include:

— "Richard Hakluyt, The Principal Navigations, Voyages, Traffiques and Discoveries of the English Nation (London, 1598-1600)." The acquisition consists of three volumes bound in two and is said to contain 1.7 million words. The work contains specific references to New Mexico.

— "J. W. Chatham, of Cambridge, South Carolina." This is an unpublished manuscript narrative of an overland journey from South Carolina to New Mexico on the Santa Fe Trail in 1849.

— "Thomas S. Lubbock." This is an original, signed manuscript account of the Texas-Santa Fe Expedition.

— "Frank Hamilton Cushing." This original sketchbook includes 27 sketches drawn by Cushing in his ethnological observations among the Zuni, Havasupais and Walapais.

The acquisitions were purchased with donations totaling \$38,000, including \$1,000 gifts from the General Library faculty and staff, the Alumni Association, the UNM Foundation, the Graduate Students Association and the Associated Students of UNM.

The acquisitions were selected by the UNM President's Committee on the Millionth Volume, chaired by Dr. Chester C. Travelstead, UNM provost emeritus and professor emeritus of educational administration.
