

DECA plans seafood sale

Fresh seafood will again be made available in Ruidoso when the Ruidoso Distributive Education Club of America (DECA) Chapter sponsors a sale May 29 and 30, at Gibson's parking lot.

DECA sponsor Eddie Parker said pre-orders will be taken until the day of the sale, with the local chapter to receive 40 cents per pound on all pre-ordered seafood. Order forms are available from DECA students and at co-operating businesses.

"We will have to turn in 2,200 pounds of pre-orders to get 40 cents per pound and we will get 25 cents for every walk-up sale per pound," Parker said.

He said this arrangement, negotiated with Trans Alaska Seafood, is one of the best the DECA Chapter has ever had. "We have had to sell up to 4,000 pounds in previous sales, to get 40 cents per pound, so we feel like we'll actually come out way ahead in the long run with this contract," Parker said.

The chapter will offer the following seafood items at the May sale:

Pine Salmon steaks, silver salmon steaks, medium lobster and extra large lobster tails, breaded fantail shrimp, medium headless shrimp, extra large jumbo shrimp, jumbo shrimp, small cooked Alaska shrimp;

King and snow crab, ling cod steaks, cod, red snapper and walleye filets, halibut steaks, smoked pink and red salmon and whole pink and red salmon.

As in past sales, the seafood will be sold in packages of two to five pounds depending upon the type of seafood ordered. "However, this can be a benefit," Parker said, "because the seafood is individually quick frozen."

He said only as much seafood as needed for one meal can be taken out at a time.

"It's actually cheaper to buy seafood at the sale than elsewhere and because it's so low in calories and cholesterol, it is a very

good food to put on the table," Parker added.

For example, one eight ounce portion of cod has only 178 calories, while an eight ounce portion of beef has 715 calories, before cooking, Parker said.

Walleye, which will be offered in sample portions during the day of the sale, "is literally bursting with protein," Parker said. "One gram of walleye is 20 percent protein, ranking it the highest of all our seafood offerings," he said.

Proceeds from this seafood sale will be used to help defray costs of sending 28 DECA students and six sponsors to Anaheim, California, to attend the National Career Development Conference (CDC) in June.

Parker said these expenses will run nearly \$7,000 which includes everything but meals. "Even though this is a lot of money, if we flew to California, the cost per person would double," Parker said. DECA students will charter the high school activity bus for the trip and will be gone about 10 days, incorporating some sightseeing into the tour, Parker said.

"We will be able to make the trip for under \$200 per person, with adults a little higher," Parker said. Students plan to foot the bill for side trips not included in the CDC package, which are now being planned.

The Pepsi Learn and Earn Project, the only chapter project submitted for national competition, is currently being revised and retyped, Parker said. "We have gone through and made some changes in sentence structure and have tried to catch all the typos," he said. "We will have that in the mail to the national Pepsi Cola Office in New York by Friday."

Parker said seafood orders can be placed by calling the high school at 257-7324, or evenings, 378-4864. Mike Clarke, DECA president, can also take orders at 257-5034.

Water supply improving

Ruidoso's main water supply, Alto Lake, is over half full, with more than 60 million gallons of water measured in the reservoir Friday, according to village clerk Jim Hine.

Hine said that, with proper conservation measures and careful future planning, Ruidosians can look forward to having an adequate water supply through the summer.

Hine said the reservoir is getting full primarily because of spring runoff from Sierra Blanca, which goes into Eagle Creek and the Rio Ruidoso, feeders into Alto Lake.

The old Hollywood well, Hine said, "has always been treated as an emergency source of water. Because water from this well is not as high in quality as water produced by Eagle Creek or the Rio Ruidoso, we don't generally use it during normal demand periods."

He said the new well drilled at Hollywood has tested at about 50 percent less hardness than the old well and, with a new blending project, hardness of the water could be further decreased.

"The blending project construction will probably begin within 30 days and includes installation of chlorination equipment, pressure tank, pumping house, additional line equipment and a storage tank for the Hollywood well water," Hine said.

The blending project, Hine said, will involve mixing the new Hollywood well water with water from Eagle Creek and the Rio Ruidoso, to make a higher quality water. Cost of the blending process was put at \$250,000 by Hine.

He said three other wells drilled recently in the Gavilan Canyon area are to be tested "to determine their capacity to pump over a 24-hour period." Hine said such analysis would have been completed sooner but various problems, such as the test pump blowing up and the casing developing a wrinkle, have delayed tests.

Once in the system, well water has some advantages over surface water, Hine said. "Well water only needs to be chlorinated before it goes into the system. Surface water must be processed through the treatment plant."

"Well water also has its own built-in reservoir, so no evaporation or seepage is experienced, as with surface water."


Hine said two more well drilling projects are planned, and will probably be completed by May 30. One will be drilled in the Bogg Springs area and the other, with permission already granted from the Eagle Creek Water Users Association, will be drilled on Eagle Creek property.

Water treatment is also a problem trustees will have to solve in the future, Hine said. Currently the village has three water treatment facilities. The newest is the Alto treatment plant that can supply 1.5 million gallons per day and is "easily capable of producing up to two million gallons, with minor revisions," Hine said.

The Gavilan Canyon treatment plant can process up to a half million gallons per day and the Upper Canyon facility can produce 200,000 gallons per day.

"What we will need in the future is an off-channel water reservoir near the Upper Canyon plant, so that when we have an abundance of runoff, we can store it there until it's needed."

"Both the older plants need to be renovated somewhat, including installing new filters and sand traps," Hine said. Studies are now underway to determine if

the Gavilan Canyon facility is capable of being enlarged to treat more water, he added.

Continued additions of storage tanks will probably be needed in future years, Hine said, to keep up with Ruidoso's growing population.

Hine said Ruidoso has the capacity to store 18 million gallons of treated water,

and "we like to keep that much on hand all the time in case we are threatened with a big fire," he said.

"These are the same problems Ruidoso has always faced, and we've tried to eliminate some of them, but actually, it's just been a game of catch-up for us," Hine said.

He said that continued conservation "by

everyone in the village's water system" is essential to having enough water to meet human needs when "we get to the high demand months of July, August and September."

"For those of us living in the Southwest, water will continue to be a major problem for both municipalities and any user of water."

Being oldest graduate a thrill for Gladys Knox

Gladys Knox, who will celebrate her 85th birthday Friday, has become the oldest living graduate of the college where she earned her teaching degree, the University of Sciences and Arts in Chickasha, Oklahoma.

Knox was honored recently as "the oldest in time, not in years," she said, remaining the only living graduate from the class of 1916. The other graduate died about ten years ago, Knox said.

"You see, I'm not the oldest in years because I graduated when I was 19," Knox said. She attended a reunion of the alumni last month and found several old friends. "No one was there from the class of '17 — all three of them have died," she said.

Class members from 1918 were also absent; however, the five graduates are still alive, Knox said. "The two from the class of 1919, I knew; it was wonderful to see them again, and they're older than I am, by the way."

Knox said she was a high school graduate at 16, began teaching at 19, and earned a Master's Degree at the University of Oklahoma in 1924 in English and liberal arts.

She jokingly refers to herself as "just an old maid school teacher." However, Knox decided early on that she wanted to travel, so applied to the civil service office in Washington, D. C., to teach overseas. "I was put on a waiting list, so I kept teaching high school English at Bartlesville, Oklahoma."

In August of 1929, barely three weeks before the beginning of the Great

Depression, Knox traveled from New Orleans, Louisiana, to the Panama Canal, where a teaching position awaited her arrival.

"We used to call the Zone area the Atlantic and the Pacific sides; I taught on the Atlantic side," she said.

She met R. K. Knox while living in the Panama Canal Zone, and they married in 1933.

Knox said she didn't mind missing the Depression years in the United States. "I'm glad I wasn't here. Of course, we had our salaries cut and it was hard on us, but I don't think we felt the impact that those in the country did," Knox said.

"In fact, I remember they used to save all the fresh milk for children and nursing mothers; everyone else had to drink canned milk. I got so used to it, I still prefer canned milk for cooking," she said.

Knox said Canal Zone employees received two months of vacation time per year. "We saved it and every two years, we came to the States for four months," to visit relatives.

This lifestyle continued through World War Two. "We lived in a place a lot like an army barracks," Knox said. "We had all the essentials provided; so we could buy other things at the commissary on base."

"The cost of living was low, because of the commissary. It was an interesting place to shop because they had things shipped in from all over the world," Knox said.

It was in that commissary where she purchased a variety of beautifully carved

pieces of furniture, knick knacks unique to other countries and several Oriental collectibles, which she still puts to practical use.

"It was exciting to live there during the war. I still don't know why the Japanese didn't bomb the Canal Zone instead of Pearl Harbor; it would have been just as easy," she said.

In 1946, exactly 17 years later to the day, the Knoxs sailed for America, where they settled in Ruidoso to retire. "Somebody found out I was a schoolteacher so I got hired to teach high school English. It's the only job I ever got that I never applied for," she said.

In Ruidoso, R. K. found "the best garden spot in the country" in his back yard. Until he died two years ago, he could usually be found cultivating any number of garden vegetables and flowers.

While R. K. was gardening, Gladys was teaching, organizing the Ruidoso Chapter of Rainbow Girls, and chartering Amaranth and Eastern Star Chapters. She joined the Ruidoso Woman's Club, the Hospital Auxiliary, the Extension Club and helped organize senior citizens. She is a lifelong Republican, and quit teaching after ten years in the Ruidoso system "because I just got tired of it; I just wanted to quit so I'd have time for other things," she said.

Knox is also an international honorary member of Beta Sigma Phi sorority, and is active in the United Methodist Church. She

Prize winning author spoke here

One of New Mexico's native sons, W. W. "Bill" Southard, of Clovis, has found fame and fortune as the author of a prize-winning western novel which is on the way to selling as many copies as Louise L'Amour's best books.

Southard, who spoke to a small audience at Ruidoso Public Library Friday, was raised in Artesia and attended school at Eastern New Mexico University in Port

tales in preparation for a successful career as a journalist.

Southard began writing his first published novel, "Season of Vengeance" about two years ago, and entered the finished product in the Twentieth Century Fox/Bantam Books First Western contest. It was selected the winner in November, 1980, and Southard has become an "overnight success" in the world of

western storytellers.


He said Friday he has just been notified that his book is into its third printing, with 115,000 copies now available. "It's the largest number of first novels ever printed in Bantam's Western line, except for L'Amour's," Southard said.

Southard, a newspaperman for more than 20 years, said he got his start, "or perhaps got deterred from starting" as a creative writer, as a fifth grade student.

His teacher, Mrs. Silver Tooth, assigned everyone an essay. Liking that section of classwork, Southard promptly went about describing a cellar as "dark" which means a moldy sort of wetness.

His teacher had never heard of the word "dark" so put "no such word" on his paper. "Of course, I never used the word again," he said.

Southard read a lot of westerns as a youngster, spending his evenings reading "until I'd fall asleep." He learned several years ago that "anyone can write a book" and was delighted to learn that many successful authors are former newswriters. "That was the number one preparation for being a good creative writer," Southard said.







Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Once in awhile this department blows a little smoke about that famous "Sagebrush Rebellion," just to keep poverty-stricken rancher-crusaders on that topic like Charlie Lee moderately honest.

The Rebellion is that movement that wants to snatch back all the federal lands within a state's borders.

Recently, the former head of the Bureau of Land Management, which runs most federal turf out here in the West, said the Rebellion was a "political phenomenon."

That's gotta be news. Nobody we know ever thought it was a theological or philosophical phenomenon.

All it was was an effort to scare the pants off the bureaucrats so they'd knuckle under and start listening to reason.

They had already started doing that when Jim Watt got himself named Secretary of Interior. He may turn out to have been a secret Sagebrush Rebel all along — and might get the feds out of the land business altogether.

If you see a man in boots and a cowboy hat in New Mexico who looks like he wore them even before they became fashionable with the smart set, he's liable to be such a Rebel — and proud of it.

But you Rebels are moderate compared to some people in the country.

Those are the ones who want to flat-out sell all the federally owned land. They say vending it would net the nation enough money to pay off the national debt — whatever that is. (Most people we speak to don't exactly understand how we can owe ourselves money, but apparently we do — and lots of it.)

This idea, which may have started out as half a joke, begins to grow more popular.

Harold Agnew, who used to be boss at Los Alamos National Labs and is a man with an IQ that's almost certainly above 100, has been going around preaching it lately.

He says the mathematics work out; we could get the country out of debt by some skillfully run auctions of all those precious holdings.

Who else has ever come up with a proposed solution to the national debt which would wipe it out at one pop?

And it's not a whole lot wilder than the notion of a Sagebrush Rebellion, now known as a "political phenomenon."

Besides, Agnew whispered to this writer the secret and devious part of his plan: He figures the Arab sheiks would do most of the buying — and about five years after they did, we could nationalize all their holdings.

Newspaper story say Jeff Bingaman, candidate for nomination to the U. S. Senate, is thinking about being his own campaign manager.

Jeff's a lawyer; he ought to remember that old saying about the man who represents himself in legal matters having a fool for client.

Same thing's true of candidates acting as their own managers.

Every candidate needs somebody to tell him the truth, which is one of a manager's main functions. Nobody would be likely to run for office if his ego wasn't a little swollen already.

In those circumstances, truth-telling can be very necessary medicine.

No charge for the political advice, Jeff — though there are people who used to pay this person for it, and three of them served terms in the United States Senate, the place at which you're aiming?

Regulatory reform was one of President Reagan's highest priorities during the election campaign and he wasted little time issuing an executive order freezing "midnight" regulations that were enacted just prior to his inauguration. While past administrations simply talked about reducing onerous government overregulation, President Reagan backed up those words with action by appointing a Task Force on Regulatory Relief headed by Vice President Bush.

The Task Force, with specific instructions by the President to "take action, not write reports," is, I'm happy to report, doing just that. Under the strong leadership of Vice President Bush, they have, in a matter of a month's time, released a list of regulations that are scheduled to be postponed, reviewed, or otherwise reformed.

These actions were quick and decisive, but in no way reckless. They reflect a growing attitude by the American people that something must be done to control the issuance of new regulations, a process which has in the past been at times arbitrary and capricious. While everybody agrees that government regulation is necessary in some cases to insure fairness and equity for business, industry, labor, and the health of individual citizens, many of them also add that some of these same regulations make for unfair competition in the free market for business and industry, stifle the productivity of labor, and do not necessarily protect the health of employees and individual citizens.

As is the case with President Reagan's economic program, these cuts in federal regulation go across the board, affecting nearly every regulatory agency of the federal government. All regulations listed, whether they are listed under newly proposed rules for possible postponement, or currently existing rules to be reviewed for possible modification, will have Regulatory Impact Analysis prepared by the agencies that issued them, to assess whether the regulation under question is necessary or burdensome.

One example of regulations that need some review is the Department of Energy directives for electric utilities and large industrial fuel users to switch from oil and natural gas to coal. The directives were issued with the good intention that these utility companies and industries would use more of our nation's plentiful coal reserves. They also prohibited the use of the golden spike caused when first the rails, linking the country east/west, were joined.

When Ruidoso School District patrons go to the polls May 12, to vote on a \$2.25 million bond issue, several factors must be considered:

— Passage of this issue will bond the district to the full amount permitted under the law.

— Once bonded to capacity, the school district will be eligible to apply for Emergency Capital Outlay Committee funding in the amount of \$6 million, for building expansion.

— This six million dollars, due to the district being bonded to the maximum, need not be repaid to the state.

— Under a seven year payoff of the \$2.25 million, plus the two mill levy approved in February, the tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed valuation would be \$13.93 for the next three years, then it would drop to \$11.93 for the following four years, after which time the bonds would be retired.

Planners for the development of village facilities in Ruidoso have pegged the annual growth rate at eight percent per year.

For the school district it means enrollment will continue to rise from the present 1,450, or so, to 2,000 or more in the not too distant future.

The Ruidoso schools have received statewide recognition for the excellence of the curriculum available. To enable the district to continue to offer this quality of education to the children it serves, it is imperative that the schools have the necessary facilities.

One thing more, it appears as though paying for \$2.25 million through bonds and receiving an additional \$6 million in state funds that do not have to be repaid is, considering today's money market, a virtual bargain. — CD


DEGREES IN BUNCHES
