

Hospital's Hunter/Jumper Show set October 7-11

The second annual Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Charity Horse Show, scheduled October 7-11 at Ruidoso Downs, and sponsored by the Ditchrider's Association of Ruidoso and El Paso, Texas, will feature larger purses than last year.

The Hunter/Jumper Show will offer more than \$30,000 in prize money and is being upgraded to "A" status by the American Horse Shows Association. The prize money includes \$15,000 for a special Grand Prix and \$2,500 for a tentatively scheduled hunter classic.

During a Ruidoso News telephone in-

terview last week with Ditchrider's chairman Donald Leslie, El Paso, he said the association was considering foregoing the Grand Prix due to possible scheduling conflicts with California shows. He said the Ditchriders want to attract horsemen coming from California towards shows in Albuquerque, Houston, Texas, and New York, to Ruidoso Downs.

But Leslie's co-chairman Winnie Lewis of Ruidoso said Wednesday, "The Grand Prix will be held whether it conflicts with the California shows or not. We've already taken out the loan money, and with this kind of prize money, we'll be a strong enough draw to proceed regardless."

About 200 horses participated last year, and Lewis says that she expects upwards of 300 this year.

As indicated by the title, the show is designed to raise money for the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

The hospital is owned by Lincoln County and leased to Southwestern Community Health Services. Until last April, the Ruidoso hospital was under the directorship of a board of advisors in Albuquerque. At that time the hospital set up its own Board of Trustees, and has since undertaken a number of internal improvements aimed at increasing its efficiency and self-reliance.

One of these improvements has been to install a new Intensive Care Unit (ICU). Hospital administrator Ken Moore said that the ICU will cost at least \$50,000, and he is counting on the horse show to raise a significant part of that.

"We were granted a \$60,000 loan, but \$50,000 was spent on monitoring equipment," said Moore. "So we're still about \$30-\$40,000 short."

In addition to the expansion in facilities, the hospital is also bringing in new specialists. Moore said, "The purpose of this equipment and the new doctors is simply to save lives. We will now have the capability to handle more of the emergencies that previously would have had to go to Alamogordo. That hour's ride can often mean the difference between life and death."

Two specialists will join the hospital staff this summer. The first, Dr. Lance Kirkegaard, is currently with Mercy Hospital in California. He will be moving

to Ruidoso July 10 to practice as an internal specialist in thoracic and vascular medicine.

The second is Dr. Paul Echols, an orthopedic surgeon who is currently head of the army medical services in England. Echols, who attended medical school at the University of Texas at El Paso, and did his residency in Albuquerque, will arrive in about five weeks. While in town last week for a visit, he spoke of the hospital improvements that the horse show would help make possible.

"The purpose of the hospital should be to satisfy the health care needs of the public," Echols said. "To do that, the hospital has to be able to attract a core of specialists. The hospital has to be able to assure the prospective specialist of three

things: that there will be enough patients, that the doctor will have access to the proper equipment, and that support in areas outside his area of expertise will be available."

"We have a strong spirit of cooperation here that has been a pleasure for me," Moore said. "Some of our strongest support has come from the members of the Hospital Auxillary (Pink Ladies). We hope that the public will realize the importance of the work they are doing in connection with the horse show."

The Pink Ladies will be selling advertising in programs to be sold at the horse show, with half of the proceeds going to the hospital. They will also operate a food booth on the grounds that will feature items from the hospital's Pink Shop.

Shaver named Downs trustee

The Ruidoso Downs governing body is again composed of five members following the naming of Donald L. Shaver as a trustee at Monday evening's board meeting.

Mayor Norman Wheeler recommended Shaver to complete the unexpired term of trustee Don Rierson who resigned recently. Shaver's appointment was unanimously approved. His term will expire in March of 1982.

Shaver, a Ruidoso Downs resident since December, is the local director of the New Mexico Employment Security Department, with offices in Gateway Center, Ruidoso.

Shaver was sworn in Wednesday and will assume his duties at the June 22 meeting of the trustees.

In other action, during the 45 minute meeting, the trustees:

— Adopted Ordinance 81-3, setting the fee for business registration at \$25, effective July 1, 1981. The \$25 fee will apply for one year registration renewals beginning January 1, 1982.

— Received a proposed mobile home ordinance for review, with action on adoption to be taken at a later date.

— Were advised by village clerk Virginia Spall that the tentative budget for fiscal year 1981-82 is set at \$527,034. Final action to adopt the budget will be taken at the June 22 meeting.

— Received notification from the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division that the village's application for a \$100,000 grant to provide water storage had been denied, due to shortage of grant monies.

— Directed trustee Bob Powers and Chief of Police Ray Garner to investigate the cost of evaporative cooling and refrigerated air conditioning for the police department and municipal judge's chambers.

— Set a special meeting July 2, at 7 p.m., in the Municipal Building, to adopt a Gross Receipts Tax Ordinance setting the rate at 4 1/2 percent. After July 1 the tax rate will be four percent until the new ordinance goes into effect January 1, 1982, at the 4 1/2 percent rate.

Downs needs five member P&Z board

Ruidoso Downs, mayor Norman Wheeler said to The News Monday, "needs five people willing to serve on our Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z)."

Wheeler said P&Z has "been inactive for months," and that "there is no P&Z now," as members either resigned or moved out of town.

"We need a P&Z, and need it now," Wheeler said. "We have to plan our future growth, need to get our zoning laws set and have to set the rules for mobile homes."

"We expect, from inquiries we have received, that there will be a lot of commercial and residential growth once the new sewer system is operating. To handle this growth, we need a P&Z with members who are interested in the future of Ruidoso Downs."

Wheeler said volunteers to serve on P&Z can contact him, or village clerk Virginia Spall, to indicate their willingness to serve on P&Z.

"Once we have enough people interested to form the P&Z, requiring five members, the trustees can approve the nominations to serve," Wheeler said.

RLA to aid in tourism survey

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Association (RLA) Tuesday joined the Chamber of Commerce as a voting member and agreed to help develop a Chamber plan whereby RLA could directly participate in tourism promotion in this area.

Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber, suggested that RLA participate in a Chamber survey to determine the areas their clientel originates. Survey results, he said, would enable RLA members to more effectively advertise their facilities.

"I think it would be helpful for both of us to get a more precise idea of where these people are coming from, both summer and winter," Jungbluth said. "That goes for Mexico as well. Most of the Mexican plates

seen around here are from Chihuahua, but that ignores the fact that a great deal of these tourists are from other states and rented their cars in Juarez."

In other action, the RLA voted to:

— Contact Ruidoso Downs Race Track officials to determine if unoccupied grandstand seating, held by season ticket holders, could be made available to RLA's guests.

— Establish a "complaint desk," to act on complaints about motel service received by the Chamber.

— Form a committee to design a bilingual poster with fireplace operating instructions, and other standardized information, for display in facilities operated by RLA members.

FOUR NEW WELLS PRODUCING WATER

Village budget \$5,362,192

At a final hearing Tuesday evening Ruidoso trustees approved a budget of \$5,362,192 to operate the village for fiscal year 1981-1982.

"This is," village clerk Jim Hine said, "the largest budget in the village's history."

In addition to the regular budget, the village anticipates receiving \$144,324 in Revenue Share funds.

The budget, which must be approved by the state Department of Finance, includes these categories:

A WELL DRILLING report was given to the trustees by Frank Potter, administrative assistant, stating that the village has drilled four producing wells this spring.

Potter's report said:

— The new Hollywood Well, that produced 1,135 gallons per minute (GPM) during testing, and 700 GPM during sustained testing, has been approved for use by the State Engineer.

— Well No. 1 at Plant No. 2, produced 400 GPM during testing.

— Well No. 2 at the Gavilan Water Tank produced 350 GPM during testing.

— Well No. 3, at the corner of Gavilan and Lower Eagle, produced 135 GPM during testing.

Potter said pumps, motors and other equipment necessary to operate the last three wells, in the event of an emergency, will be delivered "in about a week."

Additional pump house equipment, water line construction and well equipment must be installed before the wells

can be used to regularly produce water for village consumption.

An "Application to Appropriate," to use water from the last three wells, has been filed with the State Engineer. The application, Potter's report said, "falls under the Section of Supplement Basic Surface Rights of Rio Ruidoso."

Potter also said that drilling of another well, at Bogg Spring, started June 5.

In following up on plans to drill a second well near Eagle Creek, the trustees authorized Hine to advertise for bids for this project. Trustee George White said the State Engineer, in granting the permit to drill this well, recommended "Huey Drilling of Capitan, as the only area driller capable of drilling 1,500 feet." The trustees had previously agreed that this well would be test drilled to that depth.

Mayor breaks four tie votes

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., at Tuesday's meeting of the village trustees, cast four affirmative votes to break ties on the projects approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) and submitted to the trustees for final action.

The mayor's tie breaking votes were cast on these P&Z referrals:

— Final plat for The Springs Condominium, Tract A, Block 1, Airport West, Second Addition. This project, to consist of 71 units, has no access to sewer service at the present time. The motion to accept the plat was by trustee Benny Coulston, with second by trustee Frank Sawyer. Coulston and Sawyer voted aye, with trustees Sherman Atwood and George White voting no. Prior to the vote Tim Collins, of Burke-Collins Associates, representing the developer, stated the units can be provided with sewer service by connecting to mains located within a reasonable distance from the development.

— Final plat for Timberwind Condominiums, Lot 10, Block 4, White Mountain Unit 4, 11 units. Sawyer moved acceptance with second by Coulston, with both voting aye and Atwood and White

voting no.

— Final plat for The Village of Camelot Condominiums, Phase One, nine units. Coulston moved acceptance with second by Sawyer, with both voting aye and Atwood and White voting no.

— Final plat Crown Point, in Camelot Subdivision, with 25 units in the first phase, with 60 units planned ultimately. Sawyer moved acceptance with second by Coulston, with both voting aye and Atwood and White voting no.

Prior to the trustees acting on P&Z referrals, White said he was "going to vote no" on all new developments "until the village has an adequate water supply," to service them. Trustee Atwood said he would also vote no on those developments for the same reasons.

On the replat of Lot 1 B, Block A, Navajo, for a proposed small shopping center and condominium project, Sawyer moved approval, with second by White. Sawyer and Coulston voted yes, Atwood voted no and White said he was "not voting."

The replat of Parsons Tract, Paradise Canyon, for residential development, was

approved with Atwood casting the only no vote.

A petition for vacation of a portion of Cree Meadows Drive, adjacent to Lot 1, Block 1, Skyview Heights, requested by Lamar Osbourn, was unanimously approved. After the meeting, in answering a question posed by The News concerning his four tie breaking votes, mayor Davis said: "It wasn't a case of my being tenacious on these projects. I voted in favor of them because, for the past 20 years, we've been constantly inviting people to build homes in Ruidoso and I'm not going to discourage growth."

"There has always been the question of enough water. We've got water, plenty of water. We have four new wells that will produce water. We'll have more wells that will produce water. Water is no problem and we should do everything we can to promote growth."

"After all, most of these condominiums will be occupied for only part of a year and, economically, I can't see anything but advantages to Ruidoso from these projects."

C-C gained 117 members

"Fantastic," and "unbelievable" were the words used by Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce president Richard Sandoval to describe the success of Wednesday's membership drive.

With 117 new members signed up, Sandoval said the drive exceeded all expectations, as well as the official goal of 50 new members.

"It makes me proud to be a part of Ruidoso," Sandoval added. "This proves we really are a people's Chamber of Commerce."

In the competition between the Good Guys and Bad Guys membership recruiting teams, the Bad Guys once again were victorious, garnering 61 new members and compiling 1,347 points, under a system devised by Chamber officials.

The Good Guys obtained 55 new members, with 1,144 points. Extra points were awarded the team members for collecting paid memberships, and for signing up new members who were not on the "prospect list."

The Bad Guys responded to their victory, with assistant leader Wayne Sivage saying that "until the Good Guys learn to lie, cheat and steal, they can't win."

Bad Guy leader Larry Langford added that the competition was "closer this year — the Good Guys are learning."

Professor set to test track's racing surface

How good is the racing surface at Ruidoso Downs?
That's what a Massachusetts Institute of Technology professor will determine when he spends June 23 at Ruidoso Downs using a revolutionary new method of analyzing race track surfaces.
"We're anxious to see the results," said Finlay MacGillivray, Ruidoso Downs general manager. "We're confident this track will stand up against any track in the country."
"The Board of Directors felt this was a good opportunity to show once and for all the caliber of our track surface," MacGillivray said.
The entire project is being financed through the generous offer of a Ruidoso Downs patron, MacGillivray said.
George W. Pratt Jr., M.I.T. professor of electrical engineering and computer science, will conduct the test. He's also an adjunct professor of veterinary medicine at Tufts University.

Pratt will fly here from Boston for the testing procedure. He's also analyzed race tracks in Canada and several throughout the United States.
The first testing segment consists of attaching an accelerometer to the left front hoof of a horse, who is sent over the track at a working speed. That provides actual data from the hoof on the impact with the track.
The purpose is to look at the mechanical properties of the cushion, its uniformity and other aspects. Pratt suggested Ruidoso Downs officials use two horses, one on the inside rail, and the other 20 feet away from the rail.
The second segment involves using a drop hammer. This mechanical test measures the stiffness and energy-absorbing capacity of the track and is done every 1/10th of a mile at 5, 10, 15 and 20 feet off the rail.
Pratt will tape-record the data from both tests and they will be analyzed at M.I.T. in

Cambridge, Massachusetts.
MacGillivray said the Ruidoso Downs racing strip has been under close supervision the past three years.
"For three straight years, we've spent a lot of money preparing and sustaining our race track for the season," the general manager said. "Knowing that a good track is an absolute necessity, we constantly strive to keep it in top shape. Each year we go through the process and this will be an annual expense."
MacGillivray said each spring Ruidoso officials renovate the cushion; check, level and repair the base; replace and pack the cushion; then add a new cushion.
The project, which costs about \$30,000 each year, takes about a month. "It's similar to a highway project," he said.
"We've never had our race track analyzed in this manner. It's a new technique," MacGillivray said.
The results will be announced as soon as Ruidoso Downs receives the analysis.

Rainbow Silver Cup inaugural here Sunday

Musical Charge, a horse who has experienced a dramatic resurgence this year, heads the field for the first running of the Rainbow Silver Cup Sunday at Ruidoso Downs.

The Rainbow Silver Cup offers a purse of \$132,510. The winner of this 440 yard chase for four-year-olds will receive \$66,255.

The Silver Cup is the first step in Ruidoso Downs' plan to offer four-year-old quarter horses an opportunity to compete for major purses such as those offered to two and three-year-old quarter horses.

Next year, Ruidoso Downs will introduce the All-American Gold Cup, which is estimated to have a purse exceeding \$700,000.

Although Musical Charge was an unimpressive three-year-old last season, he has been unbeatable as a four-year-old.

The Roma Charge horse scored one third in six outings last year, but has won all four starts this year.

His latest triumph was a head decision in the third Rainbow Silver Cup trial race last Friday. More importantly, his time of 22:26 for the 440 yards was the best of the 10 qualifiers.

Owned by Randall R. Sanders of San Antonio, Texas, Musical Charge began the year with two allowance victories at Trinity Meadows at Weatherford, Texas, then captured an allowance chase at G. Hollie White Downs in Brady, Texas.

Overall, he's earned \$2,235 in 1981 on his four wins. He's trained by Hugh Tucker and was hidden in the trials by Jackie Martin, Ruidoso Downs' leading rider.

Problems hit Horton Field improvements

A few problems developed Tuesday night when the Ruidoso Board of Education (BOE) opened bids on bleachers and a press box for W. D. Horton Warrior Field.

The BOE noted that some bids were not in compliance with specifications, calling for weathering steel grandstands; some firms had apparently not visited the site and one declined to do site preparation. Also, it hasn't been determined if the apparent low bidder, Playtime, of Mars, Pennsylvania, is licensed to do business in New Mexico.

"It looks like we've opened up a can of worms," said Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hansen. The BOE discussed the option of rejecting all bids, but determined that were the BOE to take that course, there would be little chance of completing the bleachers in time for the opening of the fall football season.

None of the problems seem likely to stall the project however. They will be calling Playtime this week, to determine their eligibility. The variations from specifications of the second lowest bidder — McClain's of Albuquerque — are not major (they offer painted or galvanized steel instead of the weathering steel). And the construction firm of Robert Beaver, Ruidoso, has said it can do site preparation should the BOE choose Construction

Specialties' bid, the third lowest.

At a special June 24 meeting on Notice of Sale of Bonds, the BOE will also rule on the bleacher bids. Superintendent Pat Valliant indicated that one of the two lower bids would probably be accepted.

Ruidoso Gun Club seeks continuing growth

Some city dwellers seem to think that people with a fondness for owning and using guns are of a type — typically middle aged beer-swilling construction workers.

A visit to a Sunday afternoon shoot by the Ruidoso Gun Club (RGC) would quickly dispell that notion. On the firing line there are young wives and teenage boys as well as a few men with a well-defined waist line. Mothers sit under the shade of nearby acrob oaks with their babies while older children run out on the range between rounds to reset the targets.

The RGC uses silhouette shooting — pieces of thick metal in the shapes of turkeys, pigs, chickens and rams. The animals are placed five to a group in front of an earth berm at increasing distances. Variations in their size make the metal animals appear the same size through a rifle's scope.

Club president Charlie Moore calls silhouette shooting the only spectator shooting sport. The National Rifle Association (NRA) has given notice to its popularity by putting it into a class of its own.

Silhouette shooting started in Mexico, and originally used real animals. But with each rifleman having the potential to hit 40 targets in any given competition, game grew scarce. There were also complaints to the north, and the use of real animals was banned in the mid-50's.

Some gunmen in Arizona picked up on the sport from their Sonoran neighbors in the 50's, and it spread quickly eastward. Silhouette shooting is now practiced in most states, although strongest in the southwest, and is the fastest growing shooting sport in America.

The original RGC was started back in 1937. "The Ruidoso Club was very strong in the 50's, producing several Olympic Champions. But then it stagnated in the 60's — I think at one time they only had four or five permanent members. I guess that was a reflection on everything guns represented because of Vietnam," Moore said.

Moore moved to Ruidoso in 1976 and has been president of the RGC for the last two years. He has seen the membership grow to nearly half a hundred at present, and hopes that growth will continue.

"We give trophies to the winners of each Sunday's competition now," Moore said. "But I think most of those participating would rather be competing for prizes such as a new rifle. We'll do that and return the money to the competitors when we get enough members for the overhead."

Cash prizes cannot be awarded because of the club's amateur status.

There are three shoots a month: on the first Sunday, a .22 rifle silhouette shoot, on the third Sunday, a pistol shoot, and a high-powered rifle competition on the fourth weekend. The range is on Forest Road number 443, east of Ruidoso Downs and opposite the Garden Center Nursery and the cemetery. Contests start at 10 a.m., but Moore said that may be changed to 1 because of conflicts which church services and such.

First time visitors to the range are given unclassified status. They fire 10 rounds at

each type of animal and are given a class rating afterwards — from Class B for under 9 hits to Class AAA for over 23.

According to Moore, one of the most fascinating aspects of silhouette aboping is that there has never been a perfect score. "I don't think it will ever happen," he said. "There are just too many factors involved. The wind can shift suddenly; there are variations between some shells, or the heat could require an adjustment in your scope. You're trying for perfection but even with the best shooters it's always just out of reach."

A first time yearly membership in the RGC runs \$25. This includes membership in the NRA and a subscription to the American Rifleman. Members of the NRA also receive free firearms and liability insurance. Thereafter, RGC fees are \$10 yearly plus five hours work on the range.

The RGC involves itself in a number of services to the public. They offer a class on the use of hand-guns, design especially for homes where the husband, for protection, has bought his wife a pistol with which she is unfamiliar. They are also involved in lobbying efforts concerning gun-control laws.

"Man has always taken pride in his weapons and decorated them, whether it's a spear or a deer rifle," Moore said. You're just not going to take that away from him. With current legislation we've got a situation where a father cannot legally even give a gun to his son.

"But the use of firearms among the family is a tradition going way back. We give people a chance to come out here and improve their skills, to be awarded when they do. It sure beats breaking bottles."

Ptarmigans relocated to Pecos Wilderness

Eleven pairs of Colorado's white-tailed ptarmigan have been released in New Mexico's Pecos Wilderness area to increase the species' numbers and thus enhance survival of the species in this state.

The ptarmigans were taken from the Loveland Pass area of Colorado northwest of Denver May 26 by Colorado Division of Wildlife and New Mexico Department of Game and Fish biologists. They were transported by Department of Game and Fish aircraft to Santa Fe, then by helicopter into the wilderness. The birds had been in captivity less than 24 hours when they were released May 27, according to Greg Schmitt, biologist with the Department of Game and Fish Endangered Species Project.

United States Forest Service wildlife specialists from both the Carson and Santa Fe national forests assisted in the initial planning and habitat surveys that began more than three years ago in preparation for the transplant. They also obtained special permission from the Secretary of Agriculture to use the helicopter in the wilderness area. Three teams of Forest Service personnel took the birds from the helicopter and released them in pairs about 1,000 yards apart in the alpine habitat.

No Names upset Ruidoso Blues

The No Names made a name for themselves in fast pitch softball play Tuesday night by conquering the previously undefeated Ruidoso Blues, 11-9.

Blues pitcher Ray Gann retired nine straight batters over the first three innings as his teammates jumped to a 9-0 lead. But fourthstop Brett Blackwell led off the fourth with a double and the No Names went on to score four runs in the inning. Blackwell, who batted 3-4, also got things started with a hit in the fifth when the No Names scored four more runs, and they finally took the lead with a three-run sixth.

Pitcher Gary Caughron held the Blues hitless over the final four and two-thirds innings to pick up the win. The No Names are now 7-2 and the Blues fell to 8-1.

Schmitt said the released ptarmigans appeared unaffected by the relocation and in good health. Some of them began eating and drinking immediately after their release, an indication they may have few problems in adjusting to their new home.

New Mexico biologists expect the birds to begin nesting within a couple of weeks, but will not survey the ptarmigans again until mid-August, after the nesting season, Schmitt said.

The white-tailed ptarmigan is native to New Mexico but because of a population decline is now on the state's endangered species list, Schmitt said. Game management biologists speculate the decline may be related to early sheep and livestock grazing in the alpine tundra above timberline, which ptarmigan inhabit.

The loss of cover, trampling and erosion due to heavy grazing may have exposed the ptarmigan to increased predation. Livestock may have eliminated or severely reduced sub-alpine tickets, which one authority on the species, Dr. Clait Braun, identified as the critical winter food source of these ptarmigan.

The ptarmigan has never been a legally hunted species in New Mexico. Biologists speculate, however, that early herders, who probably killed ptarmigan for food, may also have contributed to the decline.

Schmitt said some of the birds still inhabit areas in northeastern New Mexico near Wheeler Peak and occasionally are seen in the San Juan Mountains of northwestern New Mexico near Chama. Those areas are apparently the southern limits of its range. To the north, the ptarmigan ranges from Alaska and the Yukon Territory, as well as westward from the Rockies to the Cascades of Washington and to Vancouver Island. Colorado appears to be the center of abundance for the species.

"We collected these ptarmigans from Colorado because we don't have surplus birds in New Mexico for relocation into adjacent habitats presently unoccupied," Schmitt said. "The birds taken from Colorado — where they are a gamebird — will have little — if no — impact on Colorado's ptarmigan population."





Hunting, fishing license revenues on the increase

Americans who hunted and fished last year spent a record \$418 million on licenses, tags, permits, and stamps, G. Ray Arnett, Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks of the Department of Interior has announced.

Total income collected from license sales of all kinds was \$45 million over fiscal year 1979 totals, including \$222 million for hunting licenses (up \$23 million from 1979) and \$196 million for fishing licenses (up \$22 million from 1979).

The total number of hunting license holders in the United States reported during fiscal year 1980 was 16,297,074 down from 16,551,885 in 1979. Fishing license holders totaled 27,994,917, compared to 27,947,397 in 1979.

The figures do not fully reflect the actual numbers of hunters and anglers in the United States. They do not include persons who are exempt from buying licenses to hunt or fish. In many states, special provisions are made for senior citizens, persons under 16 years of age, the handicapped, and certain military personnel, and many coastal states do not require licenses for salt-water fishing. In addition, some people purchase licenses in more than one state, and, therefore, are counted more than once. The license sales figures are compiled by the states and provided to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

Revenues from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses are used by the states to conduct their fish and wildlife management and restoration programs. The numbers of license holders in each state are used by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service in determining the amount of funds apportioned to the states under the Federal Aid in Fish and Wildlife Restoration programs. Under these programs, states are reimbursed for up to 75 percent of the costs of approved projects. For the current fiscal year, which ends September 30, 1981, \$114 million for apportioned in Federal Air funds for fish and wildlife conservation.

Mexican wolf pups born in captivity

After several unsuccessful attempts, the highly endangered Mexican wolf has been bred in captivity for the first time, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has announced, giving hope to United States and Mexican wildlife officials in their joint effort to save the species from extinction.

The only female in captivity and possibly the last hope for saving the species, produced a litter of four pups May 29 at the Wild Canid Survival and Research Center in St. Louis, Missouri.

Wildlife biologists were especially pleased that three of the pups are females. As a precautionary measure against catastrophe, two have been moved to the St. Louis Zoological Park, which has

special facilities and experienced personnel for caring for young animals. The other two pups are being cared for by the mother in her isolated den. Service officials hope that the females, along with the six males already in captivity at the Sonoran Desert Museum near Tucson, Arizona, can form the nucleus of a captive breeding program.

The adult female and her mate were transferred from the Arizona facility last year to the Wild Canid Survival and Research Center in hopes that the large, secluded habitat there would be more conducive to breeding, which had been unsuccessful with two other mates in 1978 and 1980.

The Mexican wolf, a subspecies of the gray wolf that occurs in the United States and Canada, is rapidly nearing extinction in Mexico with fewer than 50 of the elusive animals scattered over remote areas of that country. The Fish and Wildlife Service and Mexico's Direccion General de la Fauna Silvestre began a cooperative effort to save the species in 1976, including captive breeding which was stalled until 1978 when the female was captured. She was pregnant when captured but only the males in the litter survived. Biologists have been unable to locate another female in the wild, giving added importance to the arrival of the three "she" pups in captivity.

Violators of fuelwood rules sought

Personal Fuelwood Cutters on the Lincoln National Forest are being asked to protect their fuelwood supply by reporting suspected violations of fuelwood regulations to the nearest Forest Service Officer. If you wish to remain anonymous you may report suspected violations by calling (505) 437-2286, collect, seven days a week. You need not disclose your name.

A Forest Service spokesman said in a notice to personal fuelwood cutters this week, "Some woodcutters are stealing your wood! Folks who take fuelwood in violation of regulations are ruining everyone's chance for a continued future fuelwood supply."

Some of the regulations being violated are cutting wood without a permit, or with one that has expired; exceeding the permitted quantity; failing to treat their slash as is specified on their permit; not recording wood taken on their permit before leaving the cutting area; Reselling their personal use wood; cutting wire fences or leaving fence gates open; littering; driving on wet soil or steep slopes; cutting painted or signed trees, or the wrong species; cutting outside the designated area or on adjacent private land; not utilizing all the wood from trees they cut down to pieces as small as 2 inches in diameter and one foot in length; leaving high stumps; using a chainsaw without an approved spark arrestor; or smoking in a flammable area.

Small business development aid programs offered

E. Maine Shafer, District Director for Small Business Administration (SBA) has announced the endorsement and expansion of the Agency's 503 program which is designed to help small businesses enter into economic development projects.

"The 503 program encourages private sector involvement in job creation and economic recovery within a community," Shafer said. "The program definitely is in keeping with President Reagan's initiatives and the directions that SBA will take in the future."

"Under the program, which began with an amendment in July, 1980, to the Small Business Investment Act, SBA certifies development companies to provide long term, fixed asset financing to small businesses. The financing is up to 50 percent, not to exceed \$500,000, of the cost of a project. The remaining 50 percent must come from non-federal sources.

"The 503 program makes joint federal and private sector financing available to small businesses for up to 25 years for land acquisition, building construction, expansion, renovation, or equipment," Shafer said. "Economic development endeavors need this. Long term financing for small businesses is always in short supply, but that is particularly true now."

The 503, or certified development

company program, enables the development company to sell debentures linked to an identifiable small concern, with a full SBA guarantee. The amount of each debenture guaranteed by SBA may not exceed half the cost of the project.

"We anticipate that the 503 program will result in increasing small business development within designated areas of communities that are involved through their certified development company," Shafer said. "Because the program is intended to serve target areas and requires a demonstration of genuine community support by having at least 25 members in a development company, it will be a valuable local tool in the President's drive for economic recovery."

The certified development company program, operating under section 503 of the investment act, differs from the SBA state and local development programs under sections 501 and 502 in its use of guaranteed debentures rather than direct loans, and its requirement for companies to have added capabilities to assist small business.

Forty-one development companies have already been certified under the 503 program nationally. 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Ecuador's new president UNM affiliate teacher

Ecuador's new president, Osvaldo Hurtado, taught political science courses at the University of New Mexico's (UNM) Andean Study Center in Quito, Ecuador, from 1973 to 1977 according to an official of the UNM Latin American Institute.

Dr. Nick Mills, a program specialist in the UNM Institute, was director of the Andean Study Center from 1973 until last year when the center was closed because of funding problems. Mills worked closely with Hurtado and translated a book on Ecuadorian politics written by Hurtado and published last year by UNM Press.

Hurtado, who was elected vice president in 1978, became president of Ecuador May 31 when former President Jaime Roldos

died in a plane crash. He will serve the remaining three years of Roldos' five-year term.

"Hurtado has a very strong affection for UNM because of his association with the Andean Center," Mills said. "He supported the center's efforts to provide a medium for North American students to study Ecuador first hand."

Mills said Hurtado is likely to closely follow the programs and policies already established by Roldos.

"Roldos and Hurtado worked very closely together," he said. "They were in agreement with one another on the three major directions of their administration — gradual social reform, economic

development and strengthening the democratic foundation of Ecuador."

As vice president, Hurtado was president of the central government planning agency which drew up and published a national development plan based on Roldos' three major goals.

"Hurtado has a strong commitment to that program, which is basically a five-year plan," Mills said. "I feel certain that Hurtado is not pleased to assume the presidency in this way. He's not out for power for the sake of power. He's astute, wise and he has a vision for Ecuador which is very patriotic and commendable. He wants to make that vision of Ecuador as a progressive democratic nation a reality."

Mills said Hurtado's major problem as he assumes the presidency is that his party does not have a majority in the Ecuadorian congress. Hurtado was elected as a member of the majority Concentration of Popular Forces (CFP) party, but denounced his affiliation with CFP after the election and reassociated himself with Popular Democracy, a coalition of progressive conservatives and Christian Democrats. Hurtado helped found the Christian Democratic party in the early 1980s.

Ecuador returned to constitutional rule in 1978 after a three-year transition period from dictatorial rule. Hurtado's Christian Democratic party had been suspended

from activity by the government prior to 1978.

Mills said Hurtado should maintain the cordial relationship Ecuador currently has with the United States.

The only major controversy I can think of that exists right now between the United States and Ecuador is a disagreement over territorial waters for tuna fishing," he said, "but I think that is close to being resolved."

Hurtado gives the Carter administration's human rights policy an important role in assuring the success of the three year transition period to constitutional government.

"There were many efforts to sabotage the transition," Mills said, "but in crisis situations the Carter administration gave

strong support to the proponents of constitutional rule. Hurtado thinks that made the difference."

Ecuadorians are still apprehensive about the Reagan administration and its policies toward Latin America, Mills said, because they fear the constitutional trend could be reversed if the United States does not offer continued support.

During the time that Hurtado taught at UNM's Andean Center, Hurtado was also a professor of political science at the Catholic University in Quito.

His book, "Political Power in Ecuador," was translated by Mills and published by UNM Press last year. Mills also translated into English the Ecuadorian National Development Plan at the request of Hurtado.

Roosevelt's Invasion Prayer

Not very long ago a group of scholars and historians got together to choose the greatest message in words given during the last one hundred and fifty years.

They were practically unanimous in giving first place to Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

High up on the list were Winston Churchill's "Blood, Sweat, and Tears"; Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream"; John Kennedy's "Think not what your country can do for you; but what you can do for your country"; and Franklin D. Roosevelt's "We have nothing to fear but fear itself."

Last Saturday, June the sixth, was the thirty-seventh anniversary of the Normandy Invasion, the greatest and most important military move in history.

On that date I was with the Thirty-Second Infantry Division on the coast of New Guinea. Half way across the world our brother, Joe, was an Infantry scout with the Timber Wolf Division.

The world held its breath as in England, the English Channel, and the coast of France the Normandy Invasion was taking place.

In our jungle camp the boys in our company gathered around the radio, and this usually joking band of young fellows turned very serious. Many had kin on the European side of the war. We all knew that the fate of the world hung in the balance. There was no news of the actual invasion except that it had begun.

Then clearly over the radio came one of the most easily recognized voices of all time, that of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

He was saying a prayer to Our Father in Heaven for the men who would fall and, indeed, were falling at that very moment. I have never seen a group of men so deeply affected, and have never in my life heard anything so greatly appreciated, and so comforting.

"Embrace them, Oh Father, to your heart," are some of the words I remember. I felt that Roosevelt was praying for our brother, Joe. And all of us in our hearts prayed along with the president.

Our brother, Joe, (Joseph Duffield Storm) fell in Germany, February twenty-five, 1945, three days before his twenty-eighth birthday.

All his life Joe had hated war, he was a Christian gentleman of a very compassionate nature, and he was filled with sorrow at the suffering of all soldiers and civilians of all the nations involved in the war.

So, in remembering Roosevelt's Invasion prayer, I send up a prayer on behalf of our brother, Joe, for all those soldiers and civilians alike, who have suffered in all wars.

And on the season of this anniversary, let us remember the words of Abraham Lincoln, at the close of the American Civil War:

"With malice toward none, and with charity for all, let us bind up the wounds of the nation . . ."

In this immortal phrase we might in place of the word, "nation" put the word "World".

And let us all pray that the "wide desolation" of war may vanish from the face of the earth.





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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Not all readers read equally well. For those of you who phoned or wrote to say Jack Daniels never served in the United States Senate, this column never said he did.

We did point out that he failed to keep the Clinton P. Anderson seat for the Democratic party when he went down to defeat at the hands of Pete Domenici — which is precisely what happened.

The writer, who was intimately and actively involved in the winner's campaign that year, needs no reminder of how things went during that contest.

One of those who called with the foregoing comment was Ruben Miera, our Cabinet Secretary for Transportation.

He was also lightly distressed that we said he plans to back Charley Rudolph in next year's race for Corporation Commissioner.

Who said that? Ruben wanted to know. In this business, you don't normally blab the names of your sources just because some state official thinks you should. We put Ruben off by noting that he had been seen (by these very eyes) lurching with Rudolph at the new Altozoo's just last week.

Eric Serna, who will be Rudolph's opponent, was evidently not invited to that

lunch. What we didn't tell Miera was that two close friends of all three members of this emerging drama had sidled up to us in dark corners and spilled the beans about his preparations for backing what he sees as the winner in next year's race.

(What is that little sixth sense inside you which says, when they protest too heartily, that you have hit them where they live?) A do-it-yourself redistricting kit for members of the Legislature?

Why not? Leaders of both Democrats and Republicans are going to view the redistricting question differently from the way it is seen by individual legislators. Party bosses have to do what's best for the party, and single holders of legislative seats can easily get sacrificed in the process.

That's why Tom Warson, doctor in poli sci and skillful analyst of political numbers, is offering an unusual service: He'll deal with legislators on a one-by-one basis, to show them the best way a new district should be drawn around the seat they presently occupy.

What makes Warson unusual is that he has been gathering information on how New Mexicans vote for many years. (That's a lot different from the way they are registered, which is about all most so-called political analysts can tell you.)

All Warson's information is already computerized — something both Republicans and Democrats are presently paying a mint to get done.

He'll take the latest census figures, registration figures and the voting patterns in recent years for any legislative district, and counsel a lawmaker on what he or she can afford to give up, what he or she should be asking for and where his or her real strength is.

If most lawmakers show up here in Santa Fe with a Warson plan, party biggies may not be able to work their will with such alacrity.

That would make this fall's special session even more interesting.

The outcry over President Reagan's proposed changes in Social Security may have obscured the disturbing truth underlying those proposals — Social Security is in trouble and the Congress must take steps to solve its problems if the system is to continue.

In 1960, Social Security cost \$11.6 billion — 12.6 percent of the federal budget. By 1975 that cost had risen to \$44.5 billion, or 19.8 percent of the budget. In just six years, the cost has more than doubled — to \$134 billion in 1981. It now accounts for 20.8 percent of the budget and if the trend continues will amount to more than 24 percent of the budget by 1984.

To pay for this Social Security payroll taxes have grown accordingly. In 1960 the tax rate was three percent on a maximum

salary base of \$4800, for a maximum tax of \$144. By 1975 the rate had gone to 5.85 percent on a maximum salary base of \$14,100 for a maximum tax of \$825. The tax now stands at 6.65 percent on a maximum salary base of \$29,700. The maximum tax is now \$1975, but under current legislation would rise to \$3260 in 1990.

Under current law, the largest of the three Social Security trust funds will experience cash flow problems late in 1982 and will be in deficit by the end of 1983. This financial condition will exist despite the continual increase in payroll taxes.

Social Security will also experience a long-term financial problem primarily resulting from demographic change. It is becoming more and more commonplace to work fewer years, which reduces income to the system. Because of the birth rate and death rate trends, the ratio of retirees to workers will rise from the current one retiree to every three workers to a ratio of two retirees to every three workers by the year 2035. There simply won't be enough payroll taxes to support that large a retirement program, causing a large deficit — despite the fact that payroll taxes will rise to 7.65 percent by the year 2011.

The financial condition of Social Security is highly sensitive to economic conditions, particularly inflation, unemployment and the Gross National Product (GNP). High inflation, high unemployment, and declining economic growth put additional strain on the trust funds. For example, inflation over 6.7 percent causes early retirement benefits at age 62 to be greater than if one waits until 65. When more people choose early retirement, fewer funds go into Social Security and more are paid out.

What all this means is that there IS a serious problem that must be faced. But I want to assure New Mexicans that changes won't be made overnight. President Reagan's proposals are merely that — proposals. They'll be carefully studied by Congress. Extensive hearings, debate, and public discussions will be necessary before benefit changes are made.

The important thing to know is that Congress will not allow the Social Security system to fail. Benefits will continue to be paid in full on a timely basis. Congress is committed to the concept that inspired Social Security. The nation's elderly have earned their benefits and it is the Federal government's responsibility to insure that they get them.

A number of possible solutions will be examined in exhaustive hearings and discussions. Each citizen — worker and retiree alike — will have an opportunity to present a viewpoint.

We must make progress toward solving the problems of the Social Security system — not just for the sake of those already retired, who depend on a monthly check, or for those who plan to retire in the near future — but for the sake of young workers who have many years to pay into the system, and for generations of Americans who will want to depend on its security.

The members of the Planning and Zoning Commission, we believe, are to be commended for their efforts to insure that Ruidoso's future growth will be accomplished in an orderly manner.

To aid their efforts to achieve orderly growth, P&Z is seeking professional guidance to develop workable ordinances to insure that all future developments will best serve the needs of the village and the people.

Due to an unprecedented \$8,642,552 in building permits issued since January 1, it is apparent that P&Z has indeed been busy. Among the problems P&Z is facing is insuring adequate inspections of all building and seeing that all zoning regulations are met.

Their latest problem concerns developing an ordinance covering modular home installations. Adding to the confusion is the need to update the ordinances affecting mobile homes.

P&Z is charged with determining that no developer or builder is trying to get around existing ordinances or violating restrictive covenants. Considering the current rate of residential expansion, based on that \$8.2 million in building permits, keeping tabs on everybody is a monumental task.

To appreciate the magnitude of P&Z's responsibilities to the village, consider that they are averaging about 20 building or development requests at their regular meetings. Fortunately new building permit application forms are being used setting forth exactly what must be done to obtain one, which doesn't reduce, by one iota, the work load being shouldered by P&Z.

We feel that everyone should know that P&Z members are doing their job to the best of their ability, that they are striving to insure that building and development is done by the rules, and though theirs is a thankless job, we congratulate these citizens on their endeavors. —CD

This secretary has answers

When it comes to helping persons with racing questions, there's no one better than Maureen Murphy.

"I like people. I don't mind the questions at all," said the secretary in the Racing secretary's office at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park. "I like to help anyone who comes in anyway I can."

Although her main job is to assist the secretary's office, most days it seems she is in constant demand on the telephone or with horsemen needing advice.

Where do I find my papers? Who is the owner of a certain horse? Where is the scratch board?

The 36-year-old secretary answers all the questions in a friendly manner. No question is too small to answer.

"I really enjoy my job. All I've ever wanted to do is work at a race track," she said.

When she was growing up, Maureen helped her father, Willia Hayhurst, who is a long-time horseman. Her father rode steeplechase horses in New York and Great Britain about 40 years ago. He also trained horses and has served as a jockey agent at Ruidoso Downs.

"My two other sisters and I would help at the farm. I've been involved with horses all my life in some way," she said.

The El Paso resident is also related to the Byers family, one of the premier racing families in the Southwest.

"My sister is married to Larry Byers (a well known Ruidoso-Sunland jockey), so that makes Kelly Byers (who assists Daily Racing Form correspondent Bob Dudich with sending information from Sunland-Ruidoso to Los Angeles) my niece," she said. "Billy Byers (an apprentice jockey, who is Larry's son) is my nephew."

Before assuming the Ruidoso Downs-Sunland Park job three years ago, she worked as the horsemen's bookkeeper at Centennial Race Track near Denver.

"Being a horsemen's bookkeeper wasn't that much different from my job here. That's why I like it so much," she said.

At Ruidoso-Sunland, she handles

numerous tasks, such as typing the over-nights which contain the entries for the next day's races. These are distributed regionally to patrons, news media members and entertainment outlets such as restaurants and lounges.

She updates the owners and trainers of the horses who are listed on the official track programs, and organizes the official papers of all the horses at either Ruidoso or Sunland Park.

She also registers horses and sends in owners' transfers for quarter horses to the American Quarter Horse Association in Amarillo, Texas.

More importantly, she serves as a helpful liaison between the racing office, the horsemen and general public.

Besides being a full-time mother to the racing secretary's staff, she is also a bonafide mother to two children, Glenn, 13, and Kathy, 11.

"I hope I can help people with whatever they need," she said.



TEN HORSES, all owned by Texans, earned spots in the inaugural running of the Rainbow Silver Cup finals at Ruidoso Downs on June 14. The 10 fastest qualifiers from Thursday's trials advanced to the 440 yard dash, which offers a total purse of \$132,510. The winner of this race designed for four-year-olds, will earn \$66,255. The qualifiers and their times include Musical Charge (22:25); War Win (22:26); Public Affair (23:28); Johnny Drake (23:31); Native Gambler (23:32); That's Roney (23:32); Story Jet Deck (23:36); Chicks Charger Bar (23:40); Charge It Papa (23:47) and Paint The Town (23:51). Public Affair, Johnny Drake, Native Gambler and Charge It Papa were sold in the 1978 All-American Select Yearling Quarter Horse Sale at Ruidoso Downs. Trainer Hugh Tucker has two entrants: Musical Charge and That's Roney.

THE 10 QUALIFIERS for the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity trials were determined after Friday's three trial races. The Futurity takes on added significance since Bold Ego, last year's Futurity victor, went on to become one of the country's top three-year-olds this year. The race for two-year-olds, will be run at four furlongs on June 14. It carries a purse of \$29,600. The participants include: Luckily Smashed, Tonkawa Charger, Platoon Star, Tammy Bond, Miss Gross, Somebody's Lady, Pollinary, Easter Honor, Kacy Dawn and Breakage Insurance. On the also eligible list are: What Speed, Union Patrol, Bionic Lil and Coys's Prize.

BIG BIDDER became the first horse to win three consecutive races this season at Ruidoso Downs when he scooted to a 3/4 length triumph in Friday's featured tenth race. He posted a rapid 1:15 4/5 clocking over the six furlongs as he defeated eight foes running for a claiming price of \$7,500. Owned by S & S Farms, of Odessa, Texas, he is trained by William F. Leach and was ridden by Henry Urlegas. He returned \$7.00 as the favorite of the crowd of 2,790.

TWO SEASONAL fastest times were recorded on Friday. Luckily Smashed, who roared to a four and one-fourth length win

in the first division of the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity trials set the season's best in the four furlong division with a 47 2/5 clocking. Baby Hold On, who scored a one and one-fourth length win in the eighth race, was clocked in 17:62 for the best 350 yard reading this season. That was also the fastest 350 yard reading since Holme Maid zipped to a 17:72 effort on June 8, 1979.

TWO SEASONAL fastest times were recorded on Saturday. Banquero, who tallied a half length win in the Rio Grande Stakes, raced to a 1:20 4/5 reading, the best eight and one-half furlong effort this year. In the next race, the 11th at 550 yards, Pass Em Up Deck was timed in 28:18, another seasonal best.

TRAINER William F. Leach, Ruidoso Downs' leading trainer, and jockey Henry Urlegas combined for three winners on Friday's card. They opened with Luckily Smashed (\$3.80) in the fifth, continued with Big Bidder (\$7.00) in the tenth and concluded with Azure Sno (\$4.40) in the 12th.

The three-year-old Mighty Deck gelding finished fourth and pulled up badly after the race. After a few minutes of walking him around on the backstretch, he was led off the track under his own power. Mighty Deck Three won last year's Rainbow Futurity and finished second in the \$1,200,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs last September. He is owned by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas.

HIGHREASTERJET made a triumphant return to Ruidoso Downs by romping to an easy two 1/4 length win in Sunday's eighth race. Under a hand ride by jockey W. R. Hunt, the three-year-old Pine's Easter Jet gelding made his first out since scoring a nose win in last September's \$1,200,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. Last season, he earned \$416,255 on four wins, one second and one third in eight appearances. He's owned by G. D. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas, and is trained by Johnnie A. Goodman. Highreasterjet ran into a stiff headwind and his time was a fine 18:06 for the 350 yard course. The race drew 10 three-year-old allowance quarter horses. He is expected to be a prime candidate for the Rainbow Derby and All-American Derby later this summer at Ruidoso Downs.

WAGERING DURING the four day weekend reached \$1,649,588, which was a gain of 23.67 over the corresponding four day weekend of a year ago. Saturday's show was up \$30,765, while Sunday's total handled an astonishing gain of \$128,188. The daily wagering average is now \$34,192 (after 17 race days). That's an increase of 18.29 percent over the same period last year. Fans are now getting a per-race average of \$34,172, an increase of 13.06 percent. The turnstile count over the weekend topped out at 14,422, an increase of 6.78 percent.

County Fair Queen contest set July 4

A horsemanship/personality clinic for candidates for 1981 Lincoln County Fair Queen, is scheduled for 7 p.m., June 20, at the Capitan Fair Grounds.

The queen contest, sponsored by the Lincoln County Fair Board, will be a highlight of the July 3-4 Smokey Bear Stampede, with the queen to be crowned during the rodeo the afternoon of July 4.

Competition is limited to single women, 16 through 21, who attended a Lincoln County high school. The entry fee is \$10, with all entry money awarded the winning contestant.

Lisa Ferguson, 1980 Fair Queen, will present the clinic for contestants, with each participant to bring their horses and hats. The clinic is also open to younger girls who may intend to be a queen candidate in the future.

The personality portion of the contest

will be conducted at the show ring bleachers, with the judges asking several questions of each contestant.

The riding portion, in the rodeo arena, will require each contestant to ride a set pattern, after which three minutes of freestyle riding will be permitted to demonstrate horsemanship. Contestants must wear blue denim pants, white shirt, boots and hat of their choice. Judging will be based 60 percent on horsemanship, 40 percent on personality.

All contestants will be required to appear at all rodeo performances and ride in the July 4 street parade.

The queen will represent the county at the State Fair in Albuquerque and will be required to conduct the contestant's clinic in June of 1982.

This year's queen will receive a trophy belt buckle, tiara, bouquet of wood roses and a cash purse from the fair board and county commissioners as well as the entry fees.

The entry deadline for this year's queen contest is June 20. Entry blanks and information are available from Linda Gibson, Box 509, Carrizozo, phone 648-2582; or from Willa Stone, Box 484, Capitan, phone 354-2356.

Gold Cup entry rules established

If horsemen wish to enter their three-year-old quarter horses in next year's All-American Gold Cup at Ruidoso Downs, they must make all payments on their horses for this year's All-American Derby.

The only way a horse will remain eligible to the inaugural running of the 440 yard Gold Cup for four-year-old quarter horses is to make all payments for the All-American Derby, including the \$500 entry fee on August 15.

"I'd hate to see a horse miss out on next year's race because he has a slight problem and can't run in the Derby," said Dorothy Dillard, Ruidoso Downs' nominations secretary.

"I think we're looking at a purse of at least \$700,000 and probably more," she said.

The Gold Cup, tentatively scheduled for the early part of August of 1982, will pay 10 months. There will be no consolation.

The purse for this year's All-American Derby on August 30 is limited to \$1 million. All money over that ceiling will be carried to next year's All-American Gold Cup.

The Derby, for three-year-olds at 440 yards, is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses at Ruidoso Downs.

After the August 15 entry fee, the only other payments required for next year's Gold Cup is a \$100 payment on or before December 15, 1981; a \$150 payment on or before February 15, 1982, and a \$250 payment to enter the Gold Cup trials.

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

Davidson 'retired' to become a horse owner

After a man does well in business, builds up a little equity, gets some land with a few oil wells, a ranch or two with some cattle, he's ready to take it easy.

It's time to join the old-timers' club and take caravan trips to Mexico, and sign up for the church sing along group. Maybe it's even time to buckle down to more TV watching, laying around the house, putting on weight and worrying about it.

This may be the prototype of the American Retirement Dream gone to pot, but it's no description of Ernie Davidson — and a growing number of former businessmen you find in the stable area of a racetrack. "I always wanted to train my own horses full time, and now I'm doing it," Davidson said. "It rejuvenates you."

Instead of making a six a.m. date on the golf course, Ernie practically beats the sunrise to Ruidoso Downs, where he tends to his six horses. No newcomer to racing, he's been an owner for the past 30 years or so.

But until he retired from the business world, he never had time to really go at it with both fists — as a trainer. Perhaps the really unusual aspect of Davidson's dabbling with horses is the fact he's so good at it. Over the years, he's come up with one stakes winner after another. One

of his favorite targets is the prestigious Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

"If you own horses, you're lucky to break even," Davidson said, but his big-smiling face belies this pessimism. "I've always been fortunate. I've always made a little or broke even."

From the beginning, Davidson had a way of being in the right place at the right time — especially when someone was ready to do some favorable horse dealing. His first profession, oddly enough, was that of a baseball player. After being mustered out of the service following World War II, he signed in the Class B circuit at Chickasha, Oklahoma, and kicked around the league for six years, enjoying it to the hilt. Around 1950, a sore arm ruined his career as a pitcher, and left him without a vocation. It also put him in a downcast state of mind. "But I'd been to the races a few times, and liked them. So I thought: 'Heck, if I can't play baseball, I'll try race horses,'" he said.

Opportunity knocked meekly on Ernie's door in the person of Earl Gible (owner of the Gible Oil Co. in Cushing, Oklahoma). "He had three mares he wanted to sell. They weren't worth much, but I borrowed \$500 to buy two of them, and scraped up another \$300 to go partners with him on the third," Ernie said.

The three mares never achieved much — other than getting Ernie in the racing business and forming a racing partnership with Gible which was to last several decades.

Not long after buying those first racehorses, Ernie went into the construction business in Oklahoma, and later formed the Ernie Davidson Construction Company, which built mostly gas stations, and Howard Johnson Restaurants, all over the state. In the early 1950s, his construction business gave him a little more borrowing leverage, and he picked up two mares in a California sale.

The lady who consigned the mares offered Ernie free breedings to the stallion Phil D. Later, when the mares were in foal, Ernie loaded them in the trailer to bring them home. What resulted was something like a Laurel and Hardy scene gone amuck. While on the San Bernardino Freeway, the trailer hitch came loose, and the trailer overturned. "The horses were both in foal, and one was still in the trailer, upside down, and the other was running up and down the freeway. The freeway traffic was blocked for miles," he said. "We caught the loose mare, but I sure didn't know what to do with the one still stuck in the trailer. Then a plumbing truck pulled

up, and this plumber got out, and we sawed the top of the trailer off, and just rolled the mare out. She wasn't even scratched."

The foal of one of these mares was later claimed at Oaklawn Park for \$3,000.

"The other one turned out to be a nice allowance horse, and won at New Orleans and Chicago," he said. "His name was Curve Maker, and a picture of Curve Maker is still used as part of the trademark for Gible Oil Company. You still see this trademark in billboards in Oklahoma."

One of Davidson's first major stakes wins came in the Ruidoso Derby with Son O'Jimmer, owned in partnership with John Dillard. But his best acquisition didn't cost him a cent. Ernie explains: "This fellow gave me this mare, Grand Tillie. So I called B. R. Evans, and told him I'd like to breed the mare to the stallion he'd just acquired, Noble Charger. He said I could have a free breeding."

The resulting foal (named Dub after Ernie's youngest son) was raised in the Davidson backyard. "We had no farm, no place to raise him, he was like a pet," Ernie said. Ernie's wife, Alvera, said, "The kids would play hide and seek with him. I always told them: 'This colt won't be any good as a racehorse — he thinks he's human.'"

But Dub missed winning Sunland Park's rich Riley Allison Futurity by a nose. Later (1971), he won the Ruidoso Futurity and Sunland's Eyes of Texas Futurity. He broke down as a 3-5 favorite in the Sunland Fall Futurity, was saved for stud, but passed away after standing for only a year.

The mare which produced Dub also produced the colt Grand Charger, whom Davidson sold to Gible for \$7,500. Thirty days later, Grand Charger won the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity. In Kentucky, Davidson took a liking to a filly (later to be named Little Tishie) even though she had a nick on the ankle and had been pulled out of a yearling sale. As she was being loaded to be shipped back home, Davidson offered the owner \$5,000. The deal was accepted, and later, Little Tishie emerged as a stakes winner of nearly \$50,000.

Other stakes winners who've carried the Davidson imprint include Doyal G. and Horine. Ask him what the secret is, and he'll say, "Ninety-nine percent is being lucky and one percent is being smart."

Or maybe it's the other way around.

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Dealing in race horses has its compensations

Big money certainly doesn't scare Don Tyner.

After all, he consummated the deal whereby the stallion and stand-out quarter horse, Easy Jet, was syndicated last year for a world record price of \$30 million.

Still, he was pleased with the deal he orchestrated a few weeks ago that sent Special Effort to Dan and Jolene Urschel for \$1 million.

"We felt he was a strong race horse or we wouldn't have paid \$1 million for him," said the 37-year-old Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, horse agent.

Especially strong after the colt raced to a one-length win in the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity on May 31 at Ruidoso Downs.

That was his third straight lifetime victory.

Perhaps the most important factor in Tyner is negotiating, of the deal for the Urschels was Special Effort's clocking of 17:90 in a 350 yard Kansas Futurity trail race earlier this season at Ruidoso Downs. That was the fastest 350 yard reading in almost two years here and one of the swiftest by a two-year-old in recent memory.

"I handle all of Mr. Urschel's acquisitions," Tyner said. We discussed Special Effort after the trials and thought he might be a 'freak' type of runner like Mighty Deck Three (whom the Urschels purchased last summer). He (Special Effort) was the best horse to emerge on

the scene.

"We're more than pleased now. We felt he had a lot of residual value as a stud even if he had gone lame in the race."

Tyner arranged the deal with Special Effort's previous owners, Allen Taylor and Inken Willis of Boeville, Texas, a few days before the Kansas Futurity. Tyner said the \$1 million price was a world record for a quarter horse in training.

He surpasses the previous record for a quarter horse in training — the \$800,000 spent last year for Queen For Cash.

Tyner, who has represented the Urschels in about 18 deals, has handled every sale for the Canadian, Texas, residents except for yearlings, sale purchases and the acquisition of Mighty Deck Three.

Mighty Deck Three, after a brilliant early spring on Kansas non-parimutuel tracks in 1980 was purchased by the Urschels. The Mighty Deck gelding proved his value by winning the \$387,500 Rainbow Futurity and finishing second in the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs last summer.

The Urschels and Tyner hope Special Effort can win those two classics, which compose the second the third legs of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses. The Kansas Futurity is the first leg.

Tyner met the Urschels at the 1978 All-American Select Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs and he began serving the Texans in 1979.

The Oklahoman began his business about nine years ago and has watched it grow into the biggest horse agency in the country.

"If business was any better, I'd jump out of my suspenders," he said. "But I assure you it takes lots and lots of hard work. Every week, I go looking for horses. Right now, I'd have to say the best quarter horses are at Ruidoso Downs."

"I sold some other businesses quite successfully so I thought I could work in this area. The need in the (quarter horse) industry was in the area of agents. I felt the industry needed help in getting clients' horses up where they needed to be in terms of price."

Tyner, who negotiates basically for quarter horses, has an impressive string of major sales. 
"I just hope we can continue selling horses like that," Tyner said. "We're real pleased about Special Effort. He looks like a real good one."

Vacationers warned of plague danger

Dr. Lionel Richardson, District Health Officer for Southeastern New Mexico, states that vacation time which is upon us with camping, hunting and hiking, that vacationers need to be aware of some dangers that may be encountered if caution is not observed in the vast outdoor areas.

The presence of plague is a potentially fatal disease which can affect humans and animals, usually transmitted by the bite of infected fleas.

Recent reports of the presence of plague have been confirmed in Brewster County,

Texas, by Dr. John Bradley, Director of Public Health Region Three.

Campers and other persons working outdoors should be especially cautious of wild animals they observe. The handling or other contact with all wild animals, including rodents, should be avoided. Household pets should not be allowed to roam and should be kept free from fleas.

Continuous surveillance activities to determine any possible areas in which the disease may appear is being carried on with the assistance of Ted Baker, D.V.M., of the Communicable Disease Control Unit in Las Cruces.



Livestock research center studying shipping stress

The clang of iron against iron rises above a chorus of bawling calves. Smoke and the odor of seared flesh fill the barn. Against this backdrop researchers go about their early morning work with the deliberation of assembly line workers. It is processing day at New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Clayton Livestock Research Center.

The calves have good reason to bawl. After being transported from Florida to this far northeastern corner of New Mexico, they are herded into the bar, wide-eyed and confused. There, in various iron, cage-like constraints, they are weighed, poked, inoculated, branded, tagged, implanted with growth stimulants and wormed. Steers are also deboned and castrated.

These indignities are the last in a line of stressful situations in the young calf's life. And although it doesn't look like it, the researchers are trying to find relief for the stress.

"Shipping stress is a lot of sins," said Dr. Glen Loggreen, superintendent of the center. He says stress begins with weaning and continues through shipments to two or three cattle sales and ends after the long haul to the feedlot.

The calves shipped to Clayton spend as long as 48 hours on the road. Sometimes they arrive after going six days with out feed and four without water. Loggreen says most transports are not as long, but because long distance shipments cause maximum stress, they are ideal for research studies.

Stress is a fact of life for feedlot cattle. Although a stressed calf is not sick, its weight loss and weakened condition makes it susceptible to a variety of diseases. Shipping fever, the major culprit, is a respiratory virus that often results in

secondary infections such as pneumonia. Shipping fever leads to death in two to five percent of shipped calves, but death loss can reach 25 percent.

Loggreen, an animal nutritionist, has been researching shipping stress for more than 30 years. Before coming to New Mexico, he was in charge of the beef cattle feedlot research program at the Imperial Valley Field Station in California.

He is proud of the operation at Clayton — its turquoise-painted pipe fencing and sleek steel buildings make it a showpiece among feedlots. At the center's mill, grains can be steam processed, dry rolled and mixed according to exact specifications at the flip of a switch. "The mill is a quality control necessity for our research," he said.

But, he said size is the only real difference between the research center and commercial feedlots. The center can hold about 1,000 head of cattle while some of the largest feedlots hold as many as 75,000 head.

Huge shipments complicate processing at commercial feedlots. These large loads can take as many as five days to process. Researchers have found that allowing calves to recover from shipping and then putting them through the stress of delayed processing is more harmful than immediate processing.

"It's best to get the stress over with all at once and then begin to treat and feed the animals. However, at larger feedlots it's physically impossible to process the cattle all in one day," he said.

To simulate conditions at larger feedlots, researchers at Clayton are processing the present shipment of calves at three intervals. One group is processed on arrival, a second three days later, and a third group at six days. The researchers will then try and bring all three groups back to normal as quickly as possible.

That is part of Mark Grigsby's job. Grigsby, an animal nutritionist and one of the early morning cowpunchers, said when cattle have been shipped they "don't do anything normal." This includes eating. The success of returning cattle to their normal feeding rate is measured at the weighing scale and eventually at market.

Grigsby, who leaves in a day to receive his Ph.D. in animal nutrition from Iowa State University, will return to research protein's role in stress recovery.

Calves always serve as subjects in at least two research projects. Animal scientist Jeff Elliott will study this group for weight response to diets of either whole shelled, steam flaked or steamed whole corn. The goal is to determine the advantage, if any, of flaking the corn.

The town of Clayton, about five miles east of the center, was founded by Stephen Dorsey, a would-be cattle baron. He and his partners got control of the area because it had the best water supply along the railroad. He named the town after his son Clayton. Although Dorsey went broke, Clayton later became an important shipping point along the railroad.

Cattle aren't shipped by rail anymore, but in the fall, truckload after truckload of cattle stream past the center on their way

to Clayton's three feedlots. Clayton is also on the edge of the panhandle feedlot area and not far from slaughter houses in Azarillo and Hereford, Texas.

Location was the prime factor in building feedlots in an area populated mostly by cattle. The choice also was based on feed availability and Clayton's relatively dry, mild winters.

The Clayton Livestock Center was established here for these same reasons. The New Mexico Legislature appropriated funds in 1973 for construction and operation of the 330 acre center, which includes a 120 acre irrigated wheat pasture. Because the site is on the Kiowa National Grassland, the center operates under a special use permit granted by the Cibola National Forest. The center opened in 1977.

The legislature also provided a \$100,000 revolving livestock fund to buy cattle and feed. When the research is completed and the calves are sold, the profit is returned to the fund to purchase next year's calves.

An NMSU foundation, made up of private donors, also has established a revolving livestock fund. The UF brand, worn by every calf on the lot, is testimony to the center's benefactor, the University Foundation.

Employment in state shows sharp increase

A substantial increase in statewide employment headed the list of favorable April preliminary statistics released by the New Mexico Employment Security Department. Agency Secretary Louis R. Bachicha said the report also showed more than 5,000 unemployed workers found jobs during the month.

After a bleak employment performance in March, the state's economy showed substantial improvement in April. Employment normally increases during April with a corresponding drop in unemployment, but the addition of 7,500 employed workers during April 1981 was well above normal. As a result, the state's unemployment rate fell from 8.3 percent in March to 7.4 percent in April. During the same month, the national unemployment rate fell from 7.7 percent of 7.0, not seasonally adjusted, and the United States seasonal rate remained unchanged at 7.3 percent.

In nonagricultural salaried employment, the construction and trade industries reported the majority of new jobs. Construction added 900 jobs, showing a near normal job increase for the third straight month after a year and a half of poor employment performance. The trade industry increase of 1,100 jobs was largely in eating and drinking places and food stores. Manufacturing picked up 200 jobs in April, but most of this gain came from the recall of workers previously laid off at one textile and apparel firm. On the minus side, food sector manufacturing reported the April closure of a major employer.

Mining reported significant but offsetting changes during April. A labor dispute in coal mining led to the temporary loss of 400 jobs. That loss was offset by an increase in jobs in the oil and gas sector, giving the total mining industry no change in April but 1,700 new jobs over the past year.
