## Australian official visits Lincoln County

Peter Nixon, Minister of Agriculture of Australia, was the honored guest at the Ruidoso State Bank's annual Invitational Bar-B-Q Saturday evening in the Lincoln County Fair Building, Capitan.

"I came to the United States, Nixon said to The Ruidoso News, "to participate in a National Economic Conference as a guest of the State Department in Washington, D. C."

"Representatives of 26 nations attended the conference, where we came up with suggestions on handling inflation, and the energy crises. The results of our study will be prepared as a report to be delivered to the United Nations."

Nixon is from Canberra, Australia's capital, and he has a special interest in sheep production as well as general ranching.

He said, "Sheep production is big business in Australia, particularly in my area." He also said there are many large ranches in the Canberra area and that they are similar to ranches he saw in this area of New Mexico.

"I was invited by Robert Hays (Ruidoso State Bank president) to come to Lincoln County, with arrangements for my visit being made by your State Department."

"I didn't know what to expect and suddenly finding myself in these beautiful mountains, after traveling through miles and miles of desert was a real surprise. But I'll say this, I like this country."

Nixon's after dinner remarks included a comparison of the economic relationships of the United States and Australia and a brief explanation of agricultural policies employed in his country.

## Trustees will meet Tuesday on ordinances

The Ruidoso trustees will meet Tuesday, at 5 p.m., in a special meeting in the office of village clerk Jim Hine, to act on three ordinances and review proposals for Animal Control Services.

Agenda items include: — Final action on Ordinance 81-9, repealing the Occupation Tax Ordinance and enacting a Business Registration Fee. — Under the emergency provisions act,

considering for adoption an ordinance requiring the furnishing of security guards at liquor establishments featuring live entertainment; and an ordinance to establish tow away and no parking zones on Sudderth and Mechem drives.

— Reviewing proposals for Animal Control Services, under which applicants can submit bids for services rendered under contract provisions that have been drawn up by the village.

## Native Gambler wins Silver Cup

Native Gambler catapulted into fourth place on the list of all-time quarter horse money makers with a tenacious nose win in Sunday's first running of the Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs.

The Silver Cup offered a gross purse of \$132,510 and handed the winner \$66,255.

That victory paycheck swelled Native Gambler's career income up to \$619,306 and moved him up two notches on the all-time money list. He passed both Pie In The Sky (\$600,828) and Timeto Thinkrich (\$612,858) and took over fourth place.

Most of Native Gambler's income came last summer, when he pounded out a half-length win in the \$1,431,850 All-American Derby at Ruidoso and enriched himself by a staggering \$521,926.

Native Gambler is owned by Gary Benton of Lubbock, Texas. Benton, a former proprietor of a home-remodeling business in Lubbock, is now a full-time horse owner. Native Gambler is trained by Johnie Goodman and ridden by W. R. Hunt — the same tyroosome which accounted for Native Gambler's All-American Derby conquest and Higheasterjet's triumph in last summer's \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity.

The Goodman-Hunt combine, without question, has turned into the most awesome one-two punch in quarter horse history. Earlier in the current Ruidoso meeting, the two clicked in the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity with Special Effort.

Native Gambler, who went through surgery to remove chips in both knees and an ankle during the winter, made his return to racing in the Silver Cup trials last week. He ran third but checked in with the fifth-best qualifying time of 22.32 seconds for the 440 yards.

Ruidoso patrons figured the outing in the trials was simply a tuneup and made him a 6-5 favorite in Sunday's Silver Cup finale. There was a slight delay in the starting gate as several horses, including top-qualifier Musical Charge, acted up. When the gates sprung open, Native Gambler came out flying. It was apparent right from the start he was ready to run.

After a half-dozen strides, Native Gambler appeared to be in control. Story's Jet-Duck, a rank outsider at better than 101-1, flashed some speed on the rail and was in contention in the early going.

But Native Gambler's real threat


## Tribe seeks parade entries for July 4

## Native Gambler showed his heart

Everything was against Native Gambler. Everything, that is, except, his heart.

"He's had two operations on his knees. He was going against a strong headwind. It was only his second out. He had all that against him and he still won," said jockey Billy Hunt after guiding Native Gambler to a nose win here Sunday in the \$132,510 Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs.

"His unreal," Hunt said. Despite all those adversities, Native Gambler led practically throughout in continuing the domination of Hunt and Trainer Johnie Goodman in major Ruidoso Downs races.

Goodman and Hunt started the streak last August when Native Gambler won the

\$1,431,850 All-American Derby and the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity with Higheasterjet. It continued when Special Honor won the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity two weeks ago.

Their streak with Native Gambler appeared slightly in jeopardy when That's Raney and War Win made surges at the end of the 440 yard test which lured 10 four-year-old quarter horses.

"He left in front and we didn't get in any trouble," Hunt said. "But he got tired. It was only his second out and it took a lot of him going against that headwind."

"I didn't know if he could hold off those others — so we let Hunt continue. If the headwind wasn't blowing so hard, he would have easily."

Is Native Gambler as good a horse as he's ever ridden?

"He's just as good as any of them, if he's not the best," diplomatically said the 26-year-old Denver resident.

Goodman, meanwhile, noted in 1979, he once won all the major quarter horse stakes races at Centennial Race Track near Denver.

"It's a lot harder to win here," noted Goodman, who has been on the hottest streak of any trainer in major quarter horse history. "It never gets old winning, it just gets old losing."

Goodman had nothing but praise for Native Gambler, who reversed a third-place finish behind War Win and Johnny Dark in the trials on June 4.

"He's a great horse. One of the fastest I ever had," said Goodman. "I thought he'd come back tougher since he hadn't been out of the gate except for last week since the Derby. We operated on both knees and his right front ankle over the winter. We did that the winter before, too."

Still, Native Gambler showed the courage and effort that ranks him among quarter horse racing's greatest competitors.

## Driver cited for backending ambulance

Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services director William Kennedy was injured slightly Thursday night when the ambulance he was driving was struck from the rear by another vehicle. The accident occurred about 8:30 p.m.

According to police reports, the ambulance was traveling west on Sudderth Drive and had stopped to make a left turn onto Wingfield Drive.

A car driven by Tonja Fran Turner, 17, Spring Branch, Texas, struck the rear of the ambulance, causing more than \$100 damage to both vehicles, police said.

Kennedy was examined and released from Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital. Turner and a passenger were uninjured. Turner was cited for following too closely and "vehicles to be in safe condition."

# Extremely dry season has lookouts watching for forest fires

With temperatures now hitting 90 degrees in the Sacramento Mountains, the approaching rainy season — traditionally starting around July 4 — will be a welcome relief to most Ruidoso residents.

At the same time, the moderate heat here is a pleasant contrast to the thousands of tourists flocking to these mountains from their homes in the surrounding torrid flatlands.

However, the presence of these thousands of tourists converging in the recreation areas of the Lincoln National Forest will make the ensuing two or three weeks of dry weather seem like an especially long time to members of the Forest Service responsible for fire control.

An average of about 40 fires a year are reported from the Ruidoso area's two lookout towers. Most of these are caused by campers who do not properly attend to

the smoldering ashes of their campfires. Most of the rest are caused by lightning that flashes from turbulent clouds just before the rainy season. These fires have always been here, and before man's arrival served the purpose of thinning the forest's undergrowth.

It is the man-caused fires which primarily concern the Forest Service. They have the responsibility of keeping a lid on potential and real burns which would otherwise — from the perspective of a lifetime — cause irreversible damage.

Steve Makowski, Fire Management Officer in Ruidoso, told the Ruidoso News that "fire management" involves three separate but inter-related areas — detection, prevention and suppression. What follows, in the first of a series, is a look at fire detection.

"I feel that we at the Forest Service — and in Ruidoso — are fortunate to have such a high caliber of lookout personnel," he said. "They do an outstanding job in fire

location." During periods of extreme danger — such as the driest days before the rains arrive, or during hunting season — the Forest Service sends out planes from Alamogordo for detection purposes. "The planes can go over canyons which are not entirely visible from the observation towers. But most of the dry season, the lookouts are on their own," Makowski said.

"Your mind becomes a camera after awhile," said Marsha Gale, who mans the lookout on a hill between Sudderth and Paradise Canyon. "After having spent so much time here, I can even tell when a different car is parked in a driveway. So when something is out of order, it comes to your attention very quickly."

Gale took a pair of binoculars outside to focus on a plume of smoke rising from near the intersection of Highway 37 and Sudderth. "That's just O'Bannon's doing their barbecue," she said. "One of the first things you have to learn is how to differentiate between someone burning trash in the backyard and the real thing."

When Gale spots a fire, she has to pinpoint its exact location. This begins by noting the nearest identifying landmark, then writing down the degree, the township and range, the section and lastly the quartersection. Gale said that this only takes 8-10 seconds now.

If the fire is within the village limits, she will first notify the police with a direct, "ring-down" phone. The "legal" (location) must be radioed to the dispatcher in Alamogordo. If necessary, he will send a slurry bomber to the site. The lookout must record the plane's time of arrival, location and keep track of radio communications between forest service personnel.

During slower times, the lookout must also take readings on the wetbulb (relative humidity), drybulb (temperature), and the wind gauge.

Part of the unwritten duties that go with being a lookout include a role as a sort of unofficial local guide and historian. "I don't think there's a kid in Paradise Canyon that hasn't climbed up here to talk to me," Gale said. She keeps coloring-book stories about Smokey Bear in Spanish and English at hand. "I think the local educational programs have been very good in teaching the children about forest fires. They can all draw you a slurry bomber or tell the Smokey Bear story by heart. The public as a whole seems to be more aware of the importance of fire prevention, but in a dry year like this, you can never overstress the need for caution."

Gale has been with the Forest Service for five years, and has done seasonal work at the Sierra Blanca Ski Area, for 10 years.

"I grew up as an 'army brat,' moved around a great deal, then went to college at Texas Tech," she said. "After four years I moved to El Paso to work in the computer industry, and soon found myself spending every weekend in Ruidoso. After awhile I had to ask myself why I was living in El Paso. It seemed like half my money was going for new clothes, so it was a nice change of pace to come up here and not buy any for a couple of years, to build a house and spend time with friends instead of always being on the run."

This summer marks the first that Gale has spent at the Ruidoso lookout in four years. During the interim, she worked "on the ground" as a Fire Prevention Technician, got married, spent some time with the Youth Conservation Corps as a group leader, and had a baby. She had previously worked at the Monjeau lookout and in relief for both sites. But the present job, she says, has the convenience of being near her 10-month-old daughter.

The lookout at Monjeau was built of stone by the Civilian Conservation Corps back in 1939. It is only 13 miles from Ruidoso, but six of those are over a steep and rocky road. Some lookouts have tried driving in daily, but Richard Cowles has lived in a small apartment below the tower for the last several years. He has a house in Orogrande where he stays during his two days off.

"The lookout covers a lot of ground, so it's not something that can be learned overnight," Cowles said. "I've got quite a bit of experience, but if you were to transfer me to a tower in another mountain range, I'd be lost for awhile."

Because of his knowledge of the surrounding terrain, Cowles is responsible for training new lookouts. His job lasts from about April until the rains begin, and sometimes he will be called back for a brief stint in the fall.

During the "off-season" Cowles works as a Fire Prevention Officer in forest campgrounds. His duties then include regulating wood-cutting, and instructing campers in the proper use of campfires. Before coming to Monjeau in 1977, Cowles put in five years of fire suppression work, including three years on a truck in Capitan. Prior to joining the Forest Service he worked in computer technologies in Las Cruces.

"I get a little lonely up here in April, but as soon as the weather warms people are coming through all the time," said Cowles. "I counted 130 last July 4 alone. Most of the people I see here and in the campgrounds are very conscientious about fire hazards, but it's that one percent who cause the damage."

As evidence, Cowles pointed to a barren terraced area above Bonito Lake. "That fire was back in 1963, and because of the

steep terrain, reforestation hasn't been successful. They had to put in the terraces to keep all the soil from washing down."

Cowles said that he had reported about 70 fires by this time last year. "But

there've been only a few this year — we've been lucky so far. I hope people will realize that this is one of the driest years on record and use extreme caution in the weeks ahead."

quickly materialized in the form of That's Raney, a 3-1 shot handled by Steve Fuller. That's Raney steadily made up ground. As the two neared the wire, Native Gambler began to tire.

When the two thundered across the finish, That's Raney was still trucking at full speed. Native Gambler hung on by the skin of his teeth to salvage the win. The margin of victory was about six inches. The winning time — against a strong headwind — was 22.56.


Native Gambler, who became the 10th straight favorite to reach the winner's circle on Sunday, handed out mutual payoffs of \$4.40, \$3.40, \$2.20. That's Raney, owned by Bill Reed and Hugh Tucker of Abilene, Texas, earned \$22,026 and paid \$3.60, \$2.20. War Win, the property of C. L.

Conner and Hubert Vestal of Houston, Texas, dished out the minimum \$2.20 show price. War Win earned \$13,251. Robert Chesson was up.

The also-rans and the money earned: 4th — Public Affair, \$9,275; 5th — Story's Jet Deck, \$8,825; 6th — Johnny Drake, \$5,300; 7th — Paint The Town, \$3,975; 8th — Charge It Papa, \$2,659; 9th — Chicks Charger Bar, \$1,328; 10th — Musical Charge, \$1,325.

Sunday's program also spotlighted the \$29,660 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs. He often told of a well-beloved man named Nicholas Brill, who was unusually kind to his cattle. From what I can gather Nicholas, or as he was affectionately known, "Nickey", was of Swiss descent. His cattle ranged on the Capitan mountains, and Nickey put in endless work making trails for his cows down the steep and rocky mountain sides. He would call the cows with a yodeling call of his own and they would come running from the very top of the mountain.

Rue came to visit often here at the place and always brightened up the day. He was a Christian gentleman and dedicated his long and colorful life to the unselfish service to others.

We send up prayers for the loved ones and friends of Rue Chrisman, and we all take comfort that now after a life of service to our Lord, he is safe and happy in Heaven with loved ones who have gone on before.

The Lion's Skin

Lately I have been reminded of an old Arabian proverb: "The Lion's Skin Is

This cow, Susie by name, had her fourth calf, and went up the hill where she stayed about three weeks.

Then a few days ago, here she came very thin, with great scratches along one side and some bruises and scratches on the back. In the plainest language she told me needed extra feed, and that she had had a fight on her hands.

My heart came up into my mouth as I wondered about the calf, when here he came stepping out from behind a cedar bush. He is comical looking with dark circles around his eyes, and looked as if he never had a care in the world.

I can not think of any other animal that would have made these marks on the cow. And I tried to figure what had happened.

It is probable that the panther or some other large predator had found the calf, that it had cried out, and the mother came running. And that she had led the animal away from the calf in a running battle, and finally made it to the creek.

Now Susie and her calf are under the wonderful shade of oak, walnut, and wild grape, beside the "still waters" — not completely still in some places, but still cool and sparkling and running fairly strong.

Maybe I ought to take the panther question up with my life-long friend, Arvel Runnels, the great hunter and guide.



# Susie John first Navajo woman to become a M. D.

A total of 75 proud relatives came to Albuquerque from the Shiprock area recently to watch Susie John graduate from the University of New Mexico School (UNM) of Medicine as the nation's first full-blooded Navajo woman M.D.

It's a title she never even considered seeking during most of her life.

"Medical school used to seem farfetched to me," she said. "I thought 'I can't do this because I'm not white. I can't do that because I'm not male.'"

"What I've found out by getting this degree is that anybody can do anything they decide to do."

Even the decision to enter medical school was difficult, however. Traditions and prohibitions that have guided Navajo life for hundreds of generations blocked her path.

The Navajos have no sexist restrictions against women in medicine. In fact, women account for half the traditional "singers" or healers in Navajo society, John said.

But other cultural prohibitions make it difficult to study or practice modern medicine.

Tradition teaches Navajos to shun cadavers — a structure that doesn't mix well with the requirements of anatomy class.

Physical examinations can be taxing because Navajos are exceptionally uncomfortable about nudity, John said.

"At times I just have to turn off my background," she said.

Traditions aside, though, her family background is what made it possible to live in two cultures at once. John credits her parents, Frank and Evelyn John of Beclabeto Trading Post, for supplying a lot of moral support.

"They learned life the hard way," John said. Both orphaned as children, John's parents learned the value of being independent. The lessons in self-sufficiency were reinforced for her while she attended boarding schools in Artec, 120 miles from home.

Growing up in such surroundings, she learned that some kinds of conflicts can't be avoided or resolved — they just have to be lived through.

In high school, she took a job in a local mortuary. The traditions of her people made her uneasy about working in such a

place, but she needed the money.

While attending Fort Lewis College in Colorado, a supportive faculty member helped her recognize her own talent as a student. Encouraged, she signed up for two summer programs for minority premedical students at Harvard University. She observed doctors at work and enrolled in courses like biochemistry and calculus.

And she found she could compete with the best.

"I think that's where I finally got the guts to apply (for medical school)," she said.

Now that school is over, "I'm re-examining myself," she said. The business of becoming re-acquainted with herself is more important now than it ever has been before, she said.

"I think I always took my culture for granted before. Now I'm trying to grasp the richness of the culture behind our traditional sanctions," John said. "You can be part of two cultures without being an outsider. I think it's my duty to help other young people bridge that gap."

The gap is a little narrower today than it was when Susie John was a schoolgirl. Then, members of her family and tribe felt an understandable discomfort about technological medicine. It was foreign.

Hardly any doctors could speak or understand Navajo. Most conducted their examinations through interpreters, she said. Contact with modern medicine was scant. When John was young enough to need a pediatrician, she didn't know such

doctors existed.

When she heard about physicians who work almost exclusively with babies and children, she was fascinated. Her interest grew all through medical school.

Now she's beginning a three-year residency in Phoenix, Arizona, to make pediatrics her own specialty. When the residency is over, she said she hopes to join other Indian doctors and set up a group practice in the Four Corners region.

Come what may, she plans to stay in the Southwest and serve Indians. She turned down a chance to attend Dartmouth Medical School in New Hampshire so she could attend UNM. She has already worked with the Cancer Control Program in Kayenta, Arizona. She chose to serve her required preceptorship, a period of practical experience away from the university, in Shiprock. Traditional medicine healers already know her.

"The Navajo midwives seem appreciative of me because I can transcend both cultures," John said.

Her feelings about Navajo traditions have not been weakened by four years of high-technology education, she said. In fact, appreciation of culture will be an important part of her practice.

"You have to realize that culture and tradition are what have held a patient's people together for 2,000 years," she said. "If it has been strong enough to do that, there has to be something in it that people can continue holding on to for the next 2,000 years."

## UNM names chemistry chairman

An internationally known chemist will become chairman of the University of New Mexico chemistry department beginning August 1.

Dr. Riley Schaeffer is currently a professor of chemistry at the University of Wyoming, where he has also served as dean of Arts and Sciences. In addition, Schaeffer is a former chairman of the chemistry department at Indiana University and a faculty member of Iowa State College.

Schaeffer, who has authored or co-authored more than 100 articles on chemical research, received his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in 1949. He is widely recognized for his work in inorganic chemistry, especially research

involving the element boron.

Schaeffer has held numerous administrative positions in the American Chemical Society, and has served on review panels for the National Bureau of Standards and the National Science Foundation. He had lectured internationally, including seven months at the Weizmann Institute of Science and five months at the University College of London. In 1965, he received a Guggenheim Fellowship in recognition of his achievements.

Schaeffer will be replacing Guido Daub as chairman of the department. Daub, who has been in that position since 1976, will be returning to full-time faculty status with the department.

## Know fishing regulations for good time outings

Summer has finally arrived in New Mexico (with very warm temperatures), school's out and children can be included in fishing-camping trips to the state's numerous waters.

If you plan to take your children fishing this summer, remember that a fishing license is required of anyone over 12 years of age for fishing in any of the state's waters, said Harry Mikel, coordinator of law enforcement research programs for the Department of Game and Fish.

Exceptions to that regulation are properly registered Class A (private) lakes and waters within the boundaries of Indian reservations. A state fishing license — but not a trout stamp — is required at Cochiti Lake, however.

Cost of a junior-senior resident license (not issued to nonresidents) for persons 12 and 13 years old and 65 years and older is \$1.25, plus \$2 for a trout-water validation of \$2.25 with trout stamp.

State regulations also prohibit the use of more than one fishing pole in any trout water — identified in the fishing proclamation for April 1, 1981, through March 31, 1983.

Common violations of regulations during the summer fishing season involve the use of trotlines, Mikel said. State regulations prohibit using more than one trotline per individual in warm-water lakes and trout waters where trotlines are permitted, tying together two or more anglers' trotlines, and using more than 25 hooks on a trotline. Trotlines must be tagged with identification visible above the waterline with the owner's name, address, fishing license number and date the line was set, and checked at least once every 24 hours. Unlicensed fishermen under 12 years of age must include their age on the tag of their trotline. Only one person's name is permitted on each trotline.

Fishing poles must be attended at all times, Mikel said.

Regulations also prohibit the use of any electrical or mechanical device for catching or killing fish or use of game fish, bullfrogs or any parts of those species as bait.

Another common violation is fishing without a license, according to Mikel.

"Funds derived from fishing licenses are used to provide trout from state hatcheries and access to fishing spots, to purchase and develop new fishing waters, to provide campgrounds and manage water to ensure the quality of fishing for years to come," Mikel said.

"People who fish without a license are taking advantage of money paid by other anglers for maintenance of everyone's fishery resource. And regulations are adopted for valid reasons in an attempt to offer every sportsman equal opportunity for participation in this outdoor recreation."

To enforce the regulations and to determine violation rates and most common violations, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish uses both uniformed and non-uniformed officers.

"This policy has been in effect several years, and it shouldn't come as any surprise if the angler standing next to you walks over, identifies himself and checks your license." A resident license with trout validation costs \$11.50. Minimum fine for fishing without a license is \$50, plus \$10 court costs. Fines can go as high as \$500.

For a good time this summer — so you won't have to worry about violating fishing regulations — pick up a copy of the current fishing proclamation. You'll find fishing license and trout stamp costs, regulations for special waters, a list of waters closed to fishing and frogging, waters open to angling with artificial lures and/or fire, rules on scuba diving, use of artificial lights, baits and minnows, and information on donation, possession and transportation of fish.

Proclamations are available from Department of Game and Fish offices in Santa Fe, Raton, Roswell, Albuquerque and Las Cruces, or from approximately 350 vendors statewide.

"By studying the proclamation and knowing the regulations, you'll play a role in protecting your fishery resource," Mikel said. "And you can help further by reporting any violations you witness to Operation Game Thief (the number — 1-800-432-4263 — is also in the proclamation and on your fishing license). You need not give your name and you won't be required to testify in court. And you could be eligible for a cash reward up to \$100."

## UNM studying fusion power for new fuels

Synthetic fuels could be produced from wasted energy in certain fusion power reactors, according to a University of New Mexico (UNM) nuclear engineer.

Dr. David Woodall, chairman of the UNM chemical and nuclear engineering department, heads a University research team in a study of the feasibility of converting so-called "buffer gas" to synfuels.

This buffer gas is injected into the reactor cavity of a particle beam-driven fusion reactor, like the one being developed at Sandia National Laboratories. This gas helps protect the first wall from damage and performs other functions, but it also gathers huge amounts of wasted energy.

By introducing reactants such as carbon dust, carbon dioxide and water vapor to the buffer gas, researchers believe they can produce quantities of synthetic fuels.

Though fusion power may still be decades away, the UNM work could provide a method for greatly increasing reactor efficiency and useful energy output. "It not only appears feasible to produce these synfuels, but, under optimum conditions, their energy content may exceed the total electrical output of the reactor," said Woodall.

For example, he pointed out that a fusion reactor producing approximately 250 megawatts of electrical energy could store an additional 340 megawatts in equivalent synthetic fuels energy, otherwise wasted.

Of particular promise is the creation of such fuels as hydrogen, acetylene and carbon monoxide. "The hydrogen alone," said Woodall, "can be combined with several other reactants to produce ammonia or fuels such as methanol, methane, acetylene, ethylene or hydrazine. And actually, with carbon monoxide and hydrogen, we can manufacture most useful hydrocarbons."

One possible large-scale use of the fuels would involve the construction of an industrial reactor supplying nearby plants with needed synthetic fuels. Meanwhile, the reactor's electricity would be used residentially and commercially.

Woodall is joined in this work by Dr. Gary Cooper, assistant professor of chemical and nuclear engineering at UNM, and by Jim Fisk and Lawrence Sanchez, doctoral students in the department. As part of his PhD work, Fisk is experimentally simulating conditions in a particle beam-driven fusion reactor to study the kinetics and chemistry of the synfuel production. Sanchez is performing a computer simulation of the dynamics of the process.

"Jim's work is very important," said Woodall, "because we're not sure that high temperature synfuels can be extracted and quenched (cooled) before converting back to initial reactants."

But Fisk seems optimistic that the logistics of synfuel production can be worked out well in advance of the engineering and physics problems still facing controlled nuclear fusion. "Some day soon we could simply create synthetic fuels in the manner we're doing in the lab, except that now it takes more electrical energy to produce the synfuels than we receive. Of course, in a fusion reactor, that energy will already be there, just waiting for us."

## Careful lawn sprinkling can save water

Many people over water their lawns because they don't know how to calculate the time a sprinkler should stay on. "They probably waste water," said Charles Hohn, Extension water management specialist for New Mexico State University.

Hohn says that to make the best use of water on your yard, you need to know how deep the roots go into the ground, the type of soil in your yard and the amount of water your sprinkler puts out.

To calculate a sprinkler setting for your yard, set the sprinkler in the beginning point and adjust the water pressure until the sprinkler is producing the pattern you want.

Without turning the water off, turn the sprinkler upside down into a five gallon bucket and time how long it takes to fill the bucket. Now calculate the gallons per minute from your sprinkler at this setting.

Dig in the corner of your lawn to see how deep the grass roots extend. "Most lawn grasses have a root zone from one foot or less," Hohn said.

While you are digging, check your soil type. Sandy soil can only hold one inch per foot of depth. This means that a sandy soil with grass roots extending only one foot needs only one inch of water. Clay soil will hold two inches of water per foot of depth.

Now you are ready to calculate how long to keep the sprinkler in one place. Multiply the number of inches you need (one for sand or two for clay) times the area in square feet the sprinkler covers at its present setting. Divide this by the gallons per minute your sprinkler produces. Finally multiply your answer by 0.9 and you have the time in minutes you need to leave your sprinkler in one spot.

Use the same setting on your entire lawn, Hohn said. As you move your sprinkler, be sure the outer drops from the new location reach the center of your old location. Because of the underground water pattern, you need this much overlap to get an even distribution of water, Hohn said.



# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — It's time to talk again about plans for Congressional districts. This writer doesn't really care whether or not readers press for the McCaffrey Plan.

You may call it the Stairstep Plan or the Northeast-Southwest Plan or Alternate III. The designation doesn't matter.

But the state shouldn't let itself get locked into either of those two simple-minded suggestions the Legislature looked at earlier this year.

Let either of these get enacted into law and the state will be feuding like the Hatfields and the McCoy's for generations to come.

One of those would draw a Mason-Dixon line from the east to the west border of the state that would leave New Mexico about where this nation was in 1860.

And the so-called north-south division is even worse.

For purposes of discussion, each of the three more or less serious plans under consideration first creates a new Congressional district composed of Bernalillo and Torrance counties.

Those two counties together have a total population, the Census Bureau says, of 427,191 people. The ideal district we are aiming to create should have a third of the state's people in it, or 433,323 residents.

Hoyt Pattison's Mason-Dixon division, which hardly got any serious consideration in this year's legislative meeting, then draws a line along the northern borders of Catron, Socorro, Lincoln, De Baca,

Roosevelt and Curry counties, to give us one all-northern and one all-southern Congressional district to go with the Bernalillo-Torrance one.

If we ever split this state in such a simple-minded fashion, we will never get it joined together again for any purpose.

But as we have said the north-south division is even worse.

After you take out Bernalillo-Torrance, this Dan Berry system draws its division down the western boundaries of Taos, Mora, San Miguel, Guadalupe, Lincoln, Otero and Dona Ana counties.

Look at the map, and you'll see that its sole aim has to be to divide the Spanish-speaking North into separate elements.

That's too bad and blatant an attempt for lawmakers ever to accept, it seems to this writer.

That's why we proposed a third alternative, which the Governor has sometimes apparently considered, but which few other people seem to be talking about.

It puts Bernalillo and Torrance's 427,191 people into one district, and then creates another composed of Union, Harding, Quay, Curry, De Baca, Roosevelt, Chaves, Lea, Eddy, Lincoln, Otero, Sierra, Dona Ana, Luna, Grant and Hidalgo counties.

Between them, that grouping has 433,446 people.

The third district, made up of all other counties in the state, has 433,331 people.

The advantages of this suggestion are manifold. Mainly, it does not split traditional ethnic and sociological groupings in the state — with the one exception that it puts the rednecks in San Juan county into a district with their Hispanic and Indian neighbors. (That's too bad, but you can't make San Juan a district all to itself, which is what it would take to satisfy most people up there.)

This columnist doesn't want to bore you by taking up this subject again. We do think, however, that the people of the state ought to be thinking about what kind of Congressional districts they want, and ought to be telling their legislators their preferences.

"I go to the hills for the sound of music." That beautiful message from the "Sound of Music" is being carried out by hundreds of New Mexicans and Texans and other people attending the Ruidoso Summer Festival Inc., featuring the Texas Little Symphony of Fort Worth and a number of immensely talented featured artists.

They are going to the cool, forested hills of Lincoln County to enjoy quality classical music in settings ranging from a horse barn to an historic old town to a U. S. Forest Service picnic ground.

It is the second annual version of the event, which is already becoming a premiere Southwest attraction and holds the promise of getting bigger and better each year.

My wife Allie and I were among Demingites who felt fortunate to listen to several of the performances this past weekend. It was even more fun to see Deming's outstanding young pianist, Jay Schwartz, 15, on "Cloud Nine" as he got to not only hear the performances, but meet the musicians.

Jay, who studies under Mario LaPorta here, aspires to compete in the famed Van Cliburn competition in four more years. The most recent Van Cliburn winner, Andre Michel Schub of New York, performed in Ruidoso Saturday night. Jay, a DHS junior, got to meet him and obtained his autograph as well as some advice on the pursuit of excellence on the piano.

Young Schwartz also met John Giordano, music director and conductor of the Texas Little Symphony, as well as other officials of the Van Cliburn competition.

It was a heady experience for a serious young pianist.

While most of those attending the concerts were not aspiring to concert careers as Jay does, the listening enjoyment in beautiful natural surroundings was satisfying enough.

Among Demingites spotted at the performances were F. C. "Shanty" and Mary Bowman and their daughter, Cathy; their guest at their Ruidoso cabin, Mary Lou Cameron; and C. D. and Lurleen Downing. H. E. "Ed" Thomas and wife Linda were at the outdoor performance yesterday afternoon at Cedar Creek Picnic Ground. They are former Deming residents. Ed, former State Auditor, is now a CPA in Socorro.

It was fun to "people watch" at the Symphony performances. The famed Western artist, Gordon Snidow, was there. He lives in Ruidoso. Present Saturday night was former world champion cowboy Larry Mahan. Also attending was Fern Sawyer, well-known Negal rancher and new appointee to the State Racing Commission.

The first performance we attended was an unusual one. On Friday night, five of the Symphony musicians got together to present a Dixie Land Band Concert at Lincoln. The historic old town, famed as the site where Billy the Kid once made an escape from jail, is being restored by the Heritage Trust. Robert O. Anderson, oilman and landowner in the Roswell area and board chairman of Atlantic Richfield, is among the backers of that Trust.

At the Lincoln Visitors Center, the audience sat on the lawn where they could reach down and grab some cool green grass at the same time they listened to some warm Dixie Land sounds.

John Meigs, the man who decorated the famed Timmie's restaurant at Lincoln, told the group: "We want to revitalize Lincoln to what it was 110 or 120 years ago."

In contrast, the indoor performances are held in what at first seems an unlikely place: the Ruidoso Downs race track sales arena. It's the same place where the million-dollar Rainbow Futurity horses are auctioned. Through a marvelous decorating job, visitors forget they are in a horse barn. It must be good sport for the visiting musicians to tell their classical-music friends elsewhere that they went out to Ruidoso, N. M., and played in a horse barn.

Had to laugh at one of the comments in that vein from violinist Sylvia Stoddard. She was asked about purchasing classical records.

"It's a secret," she said, "but I buy only Country-Western records."

The performances continue through tomorrow night in the Sales Arena. Shari Lewis will be the guest artist at 8 tonight, with Phyllis Diller (yes, she really does play the concert piano) as the attraction along with the Symphony for the final performance at 8 Tuesday.

The sponsors of the Festival go all out to satisfy the performers. When the Van Cliburn winner announced he would not perform with the Baldwin piano already there, the Symphony had a \$50,000 Steinway concert grand trucked from Fort Worth at the last moment and tuned right up to the moment of the performance.

It's a class act in the pines. If you get a chance, go see it.

## Organizational changes set in State Highway Department

A restructuring of senior management functions at the state Highway Department has been announced by Chief Highway Administrator J. J. "Buddy" Hewett.

The new organizational format resulted from a combination of Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), Legislative Finance Committee (LFC) and internal department management studies.

The realignment is aimed at a more even distribution of major authority and responsibility, Hewett said. Both Governor Bruce King and the Highway Commission have reviewed and approved the changes.

The three major department functions: engineering, operations and administration will be handled by directors of newly designated divisions. The three division directors will report directly to Hewett. The seven existing divisions will become bureaus under the three new divisions. Most of the present bureaus will assume section status.

The personnel, training and materials lab bureaus will remain at the bureau level, Hewett noted. This reflects the agency's and external concerns about the importance of these functions and the necessity of strengthening the department in these areas, he added.

The present Director of Engineering and Operations, R. P. "Pat" Burns, will become director of the engineering division when the new organizational plan takes effect July 1. In his new position, Burns will supervise the planning, technical services, design and materials lab bureaus.

### Supplemental irrigation aid available

A model developed by New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment station could help farmers determine the most efficient use of supplemental irrigation. The model is based on a water production function that ties yield directly to the rate of evapotranspiration. Evapotranspiration is water evaporated from the soil plus water transpired through the plant's leaves.

By knowing the water production function, farmers can schedule irrigation based on target yield instead of maximum yield. It also gives irrigation planners guidelines for irrigation system capacities and procedures for scheduling irrigation.

The change will enable Burns to concentrate on the functions which play a major role in the Five-Year Construction Program, Hewett said.

At present, the seven existing divisions reported to Burns. The workload was just too much, the chief administrator said. "I want him to concentrate his engineering and administrative talents on the development of our construction program."

The operations support bureau and the five operating districts. The division will have overall responsibility for construction and maintenance activities throughout the state.

The administrative division will include five bureaus; administrative support, data processing, training, finance and personnel. Directors for the operations and

administrative divisions will be selected before July 1, Hewett said.

Gumerindo De Vargas Jr., the deputy chief highway administrator, will continue in his staff support role to Hewett. In addition to supervising the civil rights and minority business enterprise outreach program functions of the agency, he will assume supervision of two other staff functions: management analysis and internal audit.

The new organizational structure, with just three divisions, more closely parallels the organizational form of other major state agencies, Hewett said.

These changes have been thoroughly studied and carefully considered, he said, and "I believe that they incorporate the best suggestions and recommendations of the DFA, LFC and our own people."

## Suggestions given on summer home cooling

Improper home maintenance this summer could be an invitation to a notorious burglar: heat. Besides making your living environment uncomfortable, it could slowly rob you blind.

But the New Mexico Energy Institute, based at the University of New Mexico, offers some hints for fighting back.

The majority of New Mexico homeowners use evaporative cooling units, also known as swamp coolers. These should be checked by a qualified serviceman at the start of each cooling season. They should have new pads each year, tight electrical pipes. Exposed portions of cooling ducts should be insulated.

Using the cooler wisely can also save energy and money. Early in the morning, run the cooler and open the windows to purge the house of overnight heat buildup. Then turn off the unit, close the windows and resist the temptation to use the cooler until the afternoon.

Evaporative coolers will work right only if windows are open in those rooms where cooling is desired. Closing the windows while the units are in operation actually stops the cooling action, because air flow is vital. Only with refrigerated air conditioning units, which recirculate the air within the home, should the doors and windows remain closed.

In the evenings, when the temperatures begin to fall, turn off the cooler again.

Make sure the cooler is turned off whenever the house is unoccupied.

Shading your home is an excellent way to protect it from the hot rays of the sun. Trees and shrubs help keep some of the sun off roofs and walls, and they intercept solar radiation that causes heat buildup in the east and west walls of the house. Carefully place deciduous trees, which lose their leaves in the autumn, can reduce the need for summertime cooling by 50 percent.

Drapes also throttle heat gain through windows by as much as 50 percent. A combination of light-colored opaque drapes and venetian blinds is best. The blinds should be kept closed when direct or brightly reflected sunlight strikes the windows.

External awnings and overhangs are helpful, as long as they don't trap hot air in the window area or block your view. Long, solid overhangs provide the most effective shading because they are open at the sides to allow hot air to escape and have no effect on window visibility.

Other measures that will help keep you cool include confining the use of cooking stoves, washers, dryers and hot showers to the early morning and evening hours; keeping your attic well ventilated to prevent heat buildup, reviving the clothesline; and doing more cooking and entertaining outdoors.

## Transportation grant programs can aid elderly, handicapped

The state Highway Department has money available to help local non-profit organizations provide transportation for elderly and handicapped persons.

The funds come from a federal grant program administered by the department. For several years, funds available through this program have been used by community groups to buy vehicles for use in specialized transportation programs.

This year, the federal Department of Transportation, through its Urban Mass Transportation Administration, has made \$140,000 available for the purchase of vans or small buses to be used in programs designed to improve the mobility of elderly and handicapped persons. Many of these vehicles are equipped with wheelchair lifts or ramps.

Groups qualifying under the federal guidelines can receive 80 percent of vehicle purchase costs. The balance must be provided through local sources.

In New Mexico, some Community Development Act funds and Indian Self-determination and Education Act funds can be used for matching funds.

An announcement of the grant availability has been mailed to approximately 600 organizations and individuals throughout the state, according to Judy Gray, who is coordinating the program for the road agency's planning division.


This year, applicants must coordinate grant applications with their state Area-wide Planning Agency (Council of Governments or Economic Development

District office).

To avoid a duplication of existing services, applicants will also be required to contact public and private transportation operators in their community along with other non-profit groups already providing transportation services to a variety of users. Groups applying for a grant will be asked to show that their proposed service is not already being provided by others.

Information packets, including grant applications and other forms, can be obtained by writing to Gray at the Highway Department's general office: Post Office Box 1149, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503. Grant applicants must also submit a letter stating their intent to participate in the program. These letters of intent should be submitted to the department by July 31.
