## OUTSIDER WINS FLYING CHARM STAKES

# Special Hank by a nose

Special Hank, an 8-1 outsider, held on grimly for a nose win in Sunday's renewal of the Flying Charm Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The 870 yard tussle offered a gross purse of \$8,875 and handed the winner \$5,325.

Special Hank, a four-year-old thoroughbred, tolls for Lowell F. Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas. Salustio Burgos got the ride from trainer George Cosper.

Special Hank—with only limited experience in 870 competition—now looms among the top 870 horses in action at Ruidoso. The gelding stormed into the lead at mid-stretch, but had to fight off wilting attacks from the 5-2 shot, Capi's First, and the 3-2 favorite, Greene Again.

At the finish, Special Hank was in front by about two inches. Capi's First, in turn, was a nose in front of Greene Again. The winner handed his supporters \$19.20 to win, \$5.80 to place, \$3.60 to show.

Capi's First, a thoroughbred owned by Paul and Nelda Salisbury of Midland, Texas, collected \$1,952 for his runner-up effort. The mutual returns were \$3.80 and \$2.60. Greene Again, the property of Buford Dugger of Three Rivers, Texas, had to be content with an \$887 paycheck. The show price was \$2.40.

The quarter horse, Rockets Flame, surprised his foes with a quick get-away. Before his foes could catch their breath, Rockets Flame was two lengths on top, threatening to lead all the way. He began to weaken at the turn for home, then drifted wide. In the process, he caused Greene Again to also go wide, and that just about ruined the favorite's chances.

Special Hank, who came out of the No. 7 post, took over third place down the backstretch, then moved powerfully when he hit the straightaway. Capi's First was never far off the lead. The roan filly found her best stride in the homestretch.


Greene Again, who'd won the Master Salls Handicap earlier in the season, made up considerable terrain at the end. He carried the top load of 124 pounds.

Special Hank, in with a 115 pound load, picked up the second 870 win of this career (out of three starts). His only defeat at the 870 distance was a second (by a neck) in the Master Salls Handicap on May 30.

The winning time of 46.85 seconds eclipsed the previous seasonal mark of 46.99.

FILL MACKIS CUP charged into the lead at the head of the stretch and galloped to an easy four length win in Saturday's second running of the Norgor Thoroughbred Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The six furlong sprint carried a \$34,640 purse and handed the winner \$14,320. Fill Mackis Cup, operating as a 4-5 favorite,

## Two 8:30 a.m., post times set

An early post-time of 8:30 a.m., will be in effect at Ruidoso Downs both Thursday and Friday this week.

The reason: both days will consist of 400 yard elimination trials leading to the \$650,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity.

Twenty-seven races are slated for Thursday, and another 27 are on tap Friday.

In order to survive Thursday's card, a contender must finish in the top two in his trial heat. Time will be no factor.

At the end of Thursday's program, 54 two-year-olds will still be in the running.

These 54 will join the 54 survivors from Friday's program in the final elimination round on July 9.

On July 9, they'll be running against the clock. Those chalking up the 10 fastest time will meet in the grand finale on Sunday, July 26.

That projected purse of \$650,000 will make the 1981 edition of the Rainbow Futurity the richest in the history of the event.

The Rainbow Futurity is the second leg of the famed Triple Crown for two-year-olds.

# Mescalero sets Fourth of July weekend action

Fourth of July weekend action at Mescalero, July 2-5, includes the Puberty Ritual ceremonial, Indian dancing, rodeo and a street parade at 10 a.m., July 4.

Puberty Ritual participants, in the four day public ceremony, are Miralene Shanta, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Shanta, and Fredeana Chino, daughter of Mrs. Lala Chino and granddaughter of Joe Seda and Mescalero Apache tribal president Wendell Chino.

The maidens, in ceremonial attire, participate in rites that are conducted to prepare them to enter womanhood. In addition to the ritual activities, the maidens will perform the Dance of the Apache Maidens in the ceremonial arena. Rodeo action begins at 1:30 p.m., July 3-5 in the arena that offers covered grandstand seating. Events scheduled include wild horse race, barrel race, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, team roping, calf roping and boot race.

Annette Lester, reigning "Miss Mescalero," will be featured throughout

the weekend, in dancing appearances at the ceremonial grounds and in the July 4 street parade.

Indian dancing will begin at 1:30 the afternoons of July 2-5, in the ceremonial grounds, featuring gourd, social and group dances.

A highlight of the dancing is the presentation, at dusk each evening, of the Dance of the Mountain Gods.

This spectacular dance is performed before a huge bonfire and tells the story of a blind man, and a crippled man, members of the Apache tribe, that were miraculously healed by mountain gods, as they huddled in a cave, fearful of possible death. The Apaches have performed the "Dance of the Mountain Gods," for many years at ceremonies, to drive away sickness and evil and bring good health and good fortune to the tribe.

Visitors to Mescalero are advised to check into restrictions on the use of cameras at the ceremonial grounds, with no restrictions imposed during the parade or at the rodeo arena.

## Airport managers met here

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., welcomed the members of the New Mexico Airport Managers' Association to Ruidoso Friday morning, as the first group taking advantage of meeting room facilities in Ruidoso's new Administrative Center.

Davis said that the Council Room is ideal for small groups and as soon as the auditorium in the Center is completed that "we'll be able to accommodate meetings of up to 100 people, without disrupting everyday village business."

Association president Tim Morris said that 16 of the state's 32 airport managers attended Friday's meeting and that "all of them told me they were very much impressed with the new Administrative Center."

Parshell Reynolds of the Legislative Finance Committee told the managers that a study of property taxes paid on public use areas of privately owned airports is being made that could result in a tax exemption on the public use areas.

"The Association," Morris said, "is planning to propose a constitutional amendment at the next legislature, to try and get the taxes exempted on those areas."

The group was advised that Calvin Bond of Los Alamos, is making a study of airport charges to car rental agencies and on land leases, to propose that all member airports develop standard charges for these services.

# Charges made in DA election

The winner of last November's Twelfth Judicial District Attorney's race may be decided today and Tuesday in District Court in Alamogordo.

The election of Steve Sanders of Alamogordo is still being challenged by write-in candidate James J. Weldon, also of Alamogordo.

The latest developments in the case came last week, with Sanders filing a document charging that a number of Weldon's write-in votes were "invalid, illegal and fraudulent attempts at forging and simulating write-in ballots."

According to Sanders, forgeries were found in Otero County's precincts 23, 24, 53 and 54. The District attorney also hired a handwriting analyst to examine the scrolls of paper on which write-in votes were cast.

Sanders alleges that the Otero County commissioners, acting as a canvassing board following the election, "determined in excess of 350 more write-in ballots... than were determined and certified by precinct officials," the night of the election.

Weldon originally challenged Sanders' election after the State Canvassing Board declared Sanders the winner by 296 votes. Weldon claimed he would have been the victor if all votes "in which the intent of the voter was clear," had been added to his tally. The State Canvassing Board did not allow votes with incorrect first or last names or initials for Weldon.

Third District Judge Garnett Burks of Las Cruces will preside at the hearing this week.

# Lincoln Visitor's Center opens

The Visitor's Center in Lincoln opened Saturday with an afternoon open house, as visitors viewed the art work and memorabilia of yesteryear exhibited in two sizeable rooms.

Paintings by southwestern artists, including a large number of Peter Hurd prints, are displayed on the walls. In addition there are Billy the Kid movie posters and an exhibit of saddles, chaps, an Apache Indian medicine vest, western relics and Indian cultural displays.

Slide shows on construction of the Center and on many of the other attractions of Old Lincoln Town were run throughout the afternoon in the small theatre separating the two display rooms.

Guided tours of the historic highlights of Old Lincoln Town, with the guides giving an explanation of the Lincoln County War, the activities of Billy the Kid, and describing life in Lincoln 100 years ago preceded the opening of the Visitor's Center.

One woman, from out of state, said to The News reporter, "This is the most fantastic display of western paintings I've ever seen. And I especially appreciated all of the Peter Hurd prints, because I have some of them in my home and I'm glad to see that this Center is giving him just tribute."

# Two killed in Sunday car crash

Two young women were killed and five other persons were injured in a two-car accident on Highway 70 about two miles west of the Otero County Line Sunday at 6:59 p.m.

A car driven eastbound by Kevin J. Gilmore of Alamogordo apparently was attempting to pass a tractor-trailer rig, according to New Mexico State Police officer P. J. Darden. The Gilmore vehicle struck head-on a car driven by Sandra Jo Cook, 22, of La Luz.

A passenger in the Cook car, Jean L. Porter, 21, of Tularosa, was pronounced dead at the scene. Cook was pronounced dead later at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Other passengers in that car who suffered injuries included Barbara L. Porter, Tularosa; Cynthia K. Thomas of Tularosa; and Lois A. Mullins of Alamogordo. Thomas was transferred to an

Alamogordo hospital. Porter and Mullins were transferred to St. Mary's in Roswell. A passenger in the Gilmore car, Eddy

Lee Whisenant of Alamogordo, was treated and released from Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

## Rites set for gunshot victim

Ismael Miranda, 28, San Patricio died early Saturday of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound, Lincoln County Sheriff's officers reported Monday.

He was taken to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital by his brothers, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Miranda was born in Lincoln County May 26, 1955, and was a lifelong resident of the area.



which produced a money line of \$20,953. He's trained by Bill Leach, the No. 1 man in Ruidoso trainer standings. The winning time was an alert 1:15 4/5 seconds.

Aminau, a 6-1 shot owned by J. L. Perkins of Navasota, Texas, came on gamely to finish second, earning \$7,620. The filly was never too far from the lead—until Fill Mackis Cup took charge with such authority. Aminau was ridden by Stuart Dolphus. The tote returns: \$4.20, \$3.60.

Third went to Clinkinman, who turned in a remarkable stretch move after lagging badly in the early going. Clinkinman overtook most of the field in the stretch. The show payoff was \$3.40. The colt earned \$2,078. Leroy Coombs was up.

Sunday's Night, a gray filly owned by Sam Henderson of Odessa, Texas, tried her usual front running tactics but was unable to nurse her speed over the final furlong. She faded to fourth at just under 4-1.

**DUNKER BILL** came from far behind at the turn for home and pulled out a half-length win in Friday's six furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

Dunker Bill is owned by Latane Stevens of Lamesa, Texas. The win was the second of the gelding's career. Danny Summerow was up.

Queen's Winter, a 4-1 shot handled by Vickie Smallwood, set a snappy pace for most of the journey. The filly was still in front with about 25 yards to go. In the final strides, though, she was unable to fight off Dunker Bill's attack.

Fans who backed the winner collected \$10.40, \$5.40, \$3. Queen's Winter salvaged second and returned \$4.80, \$2.40. Nuther Brother, the 3-2 favorite, came on for third and paid \$2.20. The colt clipped heels with another horse in the first turn and nearly went down.

The allowance sprint for three-year-olds was clocked in 1:17 1/5 seconds. Dunker Bill earned \$2,400 out of the four-grand purse.

AS THE HORSES were being loaded in the gate for Thursday's four furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs, Bara Lass got a little anxious and slammed against metal.

Unfortunately for jockey Louie Gomez, his knee was in the way, and he wound up stretched out on the ground.

## Environmental meeting set Wednesday

Local contractors, realtors and other interested persons are invited to attend a Wednesday night meeting called by local environmentalists Hari Mukhoty and Jim Edwards of the Environmental Improvement Division (EID).

Purpose of the meeting will be to discuss applications for liquid waste disposal systems, and the procedure for obtaining variances to install such systems on small lots.

They will also discuss the "difference in responsibilities between the EID and the Commerce and Industries Division." The meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso public library.

The race was delayed while Gomez was taken off the track by ambulance, and another jockey was lined up as the pilot of Bara Lass.

As it turned out, though, the mishap didn't bother Bara Lass in the least. She broke smartly under Joe Martinez, allowed Pride of Loom (an odds-on favorite) to open a four length lead, then zeroed in for the kill in the upper stretch.

When Pride of Loom ran out of gas at mid-stretch, Bara Lass bolted into the clear, winning by 2 1/4 lengths in 47 2/5 seconds. The payoffs: \$13.80, \$3.60, \$2.20. Pride Of Loom, ridden by Vickie

Smallwood, returned \$2.40, \$2.20. Big Bad Tune (\$2.20) took third.

Gomez did not appear to be seriously injured, but was taken to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital for X-rays.

Thursday's headliner was one of four elimination trials for the July 12 Norgor Futurity (\$69,624). The top two finishers from each trial automatically made the grade. A draw was to be held among the third place finishers to fill the two remaining berths.

The three other trial winners were Faneul Lass (47 1/5), Huge What (48 4/5), Sunny Mama (48 2/5).

## Burgos had it figured

Salustio Burgos had the Flying Charm Stakes figured perfectly.

"I knew he could go to the front (Rockets Flame). That didn't surprise me at all," said the rider on Special Hank, who captured Sunday's \$8,875 Flying Charm Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

"I was looking for him to stop, so I stayed behind him. I didn't figure he would lead that far after coming off all those short races," said the veteran jockey.

As Rockets Flame began to tire around the turn for home in the 870 yard dash, Burgos began urging Special Hank for his best stride. And that's exactly what the four-year-old gelding provided.

"I started asking him at the head of the lane," Burgos said. "He responded real

well when I asked him. I tried to stay as close as I could. My saddle slipped a little, about the middle of the track, but I didn't want to break stride to fix it."

Lunging to the wire, Special Hank posted a nose victory over Capri's First, who also made a bold move down the stretch run. Special Hank's time of 46:85 was the fastest 870 yard clocking this season.

The topweighted horse among the 10 entrants, Greene Again, with 124 pounds, didn't get away in front as usual. But once the four-year-old Shecky Greene horse began his move, he just missed.

The 3-2 favorite made his attempt on the outside and finished third, just a few feet behind Special Hank.

"I was worried about the five (Greene Again). If he ever breaks well, he'll be tough to catch," Burgos said.

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# Moffat "Techniques Soccer Camp" needs participants

Bobby Moffat's "Techniques Soccer Camp" will be coming to Ruidoso for the second straight summer next Monday, though preliminary response has been slow.

"Last year quite a few people waited till the last moment to sign up, and I suppose they're doing the same thing now," said Butch Grantham, director of the Ruidoso Sertoma Soccer Association. "We will be accepting registrations up until Monday morning, the first day of the camp. But we wish that the parents that plan to send their kids to the camp would make an effort at early registration, so that we can take care of the logistics."

Moffat's soccer camps have become something of a phenomenon throughout West Texas and more recently, in New Mexico. He will be holding two a day camps in Las Cruces and El Paso for the first time this summer, and there will be a concurrent camp in Alamogordo the same week as the one in Ruidoso.

"We've already had about 90 applicants for the morning camp in Alamo," said Grantham. "It's possible that the afternoon hours here (2-6) are a little awkward for some parents. We've only had about 25 applications so far, compared to 87 last year."

One possibility for parents with schedule conflicts is to call Grantham at Morgan Mountain Sports and try to arrange a car pool with other parents.

Grantham said that the camp is open to observation. "We had about 20 or 30 parents stay for the whole session last year, and I think they enjoyed it as much as the kids did."

Dick Reeves, coach of the Scorpion's boys soccer team, said that the week-long camp represents an invaluable experience for the participating boys and girls. "There are a lot of things they'll learn in camp that a coach doesn't have time to show them in the regular season. You just can't teach a kid a whole lot in two or three hours a week. They also have a lot more fun than in a regular practice — Bobby (Moffat) is great working with kids and makes sure that they enjoy themselves while they learn."

Reeves also emphasized the low cost of the camp. "The camp is only \$50 — which compares to prices ranging from \$100 to \$225 for some other camps in the state. An Albuquerque camp being held the same week as the one in Ruidoso, with the same hours, runs over \$200 including dorm costs. Our camp figures out to \$2.50 an hour, and that's a pretty cheap babysitter!"

The United States is the last country in the world to embrace soccer as a major sport, according to Reeves. Because of the newness of the sport in America, it presents a special challenge to coaches. Children must be taught to "unlearn" some of the more cut-and-dried aspects of other organized sports, in order to adjust themselves to soccer's fluid nature. One particular problem for youngsters is learning to play with rules that are often open to interpretation.

Moffat and his staff will spend 20-30 minutes each day going over the sometimes confusing rules of soccer with the children. After about two hours there will be an indoor "skull session," emphasizing a particular aspect of the game.

If Moffat and his staff of eight have been teaching corner kicks, then members of the camp will watch films of professionals doing corner kicks.

There will also be one day devoted exclusively to goal keeping.

"If a boy or girl has been playing one position exclusively and is happy with it, then we can emphasize the fundamentals of that position," Grantham said. "But they will also be exposed to all other aspects of the game."

"The camp is also a great beginning for a kid that has never played soccer but wants to learn," Reeves said. "This is not a sport like football that requires a specialized skill or basketball that requires height. Athletic talent doesn't have that much importance for a beginner in soccer, and size is of even less importance. I've seen kids come onto my team that were almost totally uncoordinated, but they worked hard at it and improved tremendously. I've also seen these same kids use the basic athletic skills they'd picked up playing soccer to go on to greater success in other sports."

Grantham asked that parents who have registered their children meet Monday morning beside the gymnasium at the back of White Mountain Middle School.

## Jewelers upset Chips

The Jewelers pulled off an impressive 9-4 win over the Mescalero Chips Thursday night in men's fast pitch softball play. The loss was the third in a row for the Chips, who were dropped into a tie with the No Names for the league's second best record.

### Special handicap hunt set

## Antelope hunt license deadline nearing

Hunters planning to hunt antelope on public lands have only until 5 a.m., on July 10 to apply for a license. The applications for this summer and fall's hunts may be submitted by mail to the Special Hunt Section of the Department of Game and Fish in Santa Fe, or in person at departmental offices in Albuquerque, Las Cruces and Roswell.

Antelope license fees are \$16 for residents and \$101 for nonresidents. Two persons may apply under the same application number. Application should be made on Form U, using hunt codes, and applicants with ranch preference should specify this on the application. Occasionally, however, two persons who apply as a party may be assigned to separate but adjoining ranches.

An unlimited number of licenses are available for the A-1 bowhunt August 8-15.

25 licenses are available for each of the A-5 bowhunts at Fort Wingate. Licenses for the A-5 hunts will be allotted by drawing on July 22. Unsuccessful applicants for A-5 licenses may be awarded A-1 licenses.

Application for firearms and other bowhunts (A-2, 3 and 4), for the muzzleloader hunt (A-6) and for a special hunt set this season for handicapped persons (A-7) is restricted to residents or nonresidents who did not hold antelope licenses of any kind in 1980. The A-7 handicapped hunt applicants must furnish a certificate signed by a medical doctor or doctor of osteopathy attesting that they are totally and permanently dependent on a wheelchair, crutches, canes or a walker for mobility and that this condition is caused by a permanent disability in both legs. Up to 50 licenses are available for this hunt October 3-4 between Vaughn and Roswell in parts of management units 23 and 37.

Up to 200 licenses are available for the A-6 muzzleloader hunt October 3-4 in unit 29 east of White Sands Missile Range.

Licenses for the A-2, A-3, A-4 and A-9 hunts will be allotted by public drawing in the Game and Fish Department's Santa Fe office on August 12.

Inquiries about applications should be directed to the Special Hunt Section, Santa Fe, 827-2307. Inquiries about drawing results should be directed to the Game Department's area offices no earlier than a week after the drawing.

If no license is issued to the applicant, all but \$1 of the application fee will be refunded by state check. Refunds are mailed within six weeks after the drawing. The application form also provides a means for unsuccessful applicants to donate their refund to Operation Game Thief.

## Wildlife violations result in heavy fines

Wildlife law violations in the northeast area of the state have resulted in heavy fines for a Taos man and a nonresident.

Raymond M. Martinez, 21, Taos, was fined \$400 and given a 90 day suspended jail sentence recently by Colfax County Magistrate Glada Sanderson, Raton, on a charge of illegally killing a deer in the Ute Park area. Martinez was given a one year probation period, and further convictions on wildlife law violation charges will result in Martinez' having to serve the jail term.

Department of Game and Fish Conservation Officer Don Jones also charged Martinez with spotlighting after stopping Martinez with the deer at dusk on December 15. The spotlighting charge was not proven, however, and was dismissed.

Martinez has been convicted of several other violations of game and fish regulations: fishing without a license, illegal possession of fish, fishing in a closed area and failure to appear in court.

The Department of Game and Fish assessed Martinez \$100 civil damages for the state's loss of the deer and has recom-

mended to the State Game Commission that Martinez' hunting and fishing license privileges be revoked for three years maximum period allowed by law.


Martinez also faces loss of the firearm used in commission of the latest violation. State law provides for confiscation of firearms or bows used in illegally killing, possessing or transporting big game.

Glenn D. Tarpley 47, Pampa, Texas, was fined \$300 and Colfax County Magistrate Florence Nowlin, Imbros, June 16 after being convicted of illegal possession of trout. He was also assessed \$156 in civil damages to the Department of Game and Fish.

Tarpley was one of a party of 13 licensed anglers who had allegedly taken 78 fish over the possession limit on Vermejo ranch property, a total of 494 fish — 28 rainbow trout and the remainder brook trout. The anglers were checked at a routine roadblock in York Canyon between Raton and Vermejo set up to determine violations in the canyon.

Tarpley was charged by Conservation Officers Bob Welch and Bob Parish.

In Thursday's nightcap, the Blues defeated the Cardinals to raise their league-leading record to 13-1.

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

## State's sporting license sales soared in 1980

Hunters and anglers in New Mexico — including nonresidents — spent almost \$5.5 million on licenses during fiscal year 1980, according to a study by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS).

The actual figure — \$5,424,120 — is about half a million dollars more than fiscal year 1979-80.

Hunting licenses, tags, permits and stamps issued in New Mexico for residents number 140,813; for nonresidents, 10,663, with a gross cost to hunters of \$3,342,988.82.

Fishing licenses, tags, permits and stamps issued for residents totaled 160,570; for nonresidents, 72,667, with a gross cost to anglers of \$2,081,131.18.

There were 144,316 paid hunting license holders and 220,504 paid fishing license holders in New Mexico in 1980; paid license holders are counted as one individual, however, regardless of the number of licenses he or she purchases.

The number of paid license holders in each state and the amount they spend are used by the FWS in determining the amount of funds apportioned to the states for fish and wildlife management under the Federal Aid in Fish and Wildlife Restoration programs. Under these programs, states are reimbursed for up to 75 percent of the costs of approved projects. License sale figures are compiled by the states and provided to the FWS.

Any licenses issued free of charge do not count toward certification, and can reduce

the amount of potential federal reimbursement.

During the 1979 fiscal year, 336,085 licensed hunters and anglers in New Mexico entitled the state to more than \$2.5 million in federal funds for fish and wildlife restoration and hunter safety training programs. The funds are derived from excise taxes sportsmen pay on sporting arms and ammunition, archery equipment and fishing tackle.

Nationally, hunters spent slightly more than \$222 million in 1980, anglers more than \$196 million on licenses. Total income collected from license sales of all kinds was \$45 million over fiscal year 1979 totals.

The national figure does not fully reflect the actual numbers of hunters and anglers in the United States or persons who are exempt from buying licenses to hunt or fish. In many states, special provisions are made for senior citizens, persons under 16 years of age, the handicapped and certain military personnel, and many coastal states do not require licenses for salt water fishing. In addition, some people buy licenses in more than one state, and, therefore, are counted more than once.

New Mexico in the past has not provided for free licenses of any type. However, during the coming fiscal year (1981-89), free general hunting licenses (deer, bear and turkey) and fishing licenses will be issued to 100 percent disabled veterans certified by the Veterans Service Commission.





Then on the evenings of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth, just about dark all to the northeast was thunder and lightning—especially on the dusk of the twenty-fifth the lightning display was especially beautiful.

In talking about signs of approaching rain with Robert McDaniel, he said the best sign of all is the song of the Rain Crow. I agree, only this time I did hear this little troubador of the rain.

Robert said that there was a rain crow right close to his house who sang the rain tunes just before these very welcome thunder and lightning storms.

The Rain Crow's song is not very loud, so you have to be fairly close to him, unless it is a very still and quiet day.

This morning June twenty-five about ten, all the world was still, and sure enough, down toward the river here came the unmistakable notes. He was up in the thickest branches of a large walnut tree. I walked up close and tried to get a look at him, but nothing doing. He shut up and stayed hidden. After I left and was about two hundred feet away, here he came with his call, "Quee-cook, Quee-cook, Quee-cook."

From the continual roar of thunder and the ceaseless flashing of the lightning, you could tell a heavy rain was falling over around Lincoln. By the time the storm got to the land of the Storms, it had dropped most of its water. And yet over here, Mother earth was more than happy with what moisture she received. And now in just a day, her emerald smile is over all the fields beneath the white clouds sailing in from the east.

**The Storm Responds.**  
Over at the crossing the stream has that amber color and the extra speed that lets you know rain has fallen in the upper reaches of the stream. The river is happy

over this help from above, and is humming a merry tune as it rolls along, eager to hasten down and fill in the dry spots that have come in the river bed during the drought.

**"The Blessings You Have"**  
Often during the dry times, I feel that this weather is brought to make us grateful. And today I am remembering something told to me by our Grandmother Storm (Althea Ellen Reno Storm).

Both she and her husband, Francis "Frank" David Storm were school teachers. In fact, Grandmother Storm was the first woman principal of a school in the history of the state of Pennsylvania.

In Denver, Colorado, for some reason they thought they might try farming, out east of Denver — for a while, Francis had reached them of the richness of the soil out on the prairies.

They had been used to the agricultural regions back in their native Pennsylvania, where drought was never heard of. Sure enough, a terrible drought struck that country, and on top of that, there must have been some kind of panic or depression in the kind. This was about 1881 or 1882 when their eldest child, Lynn, (our father) was about two and a half years old.

Grandmother and Grandfather Storm were sitting at the dining table talking over the troubled times. They were people of great courage and pride. However they could hardly see their way out of the hard times that had befallen them.

Unbeknownst to them, Lynn was playing under the table listening. A few days before, his parents had been reading to him out of a little book, probably "Aesop's Fables." The stories told a moral or lesson, and then at the end of the story this message would be summed up in one sentence.

At the height of their worried talk, Lynn came out from under the table, looked at them with his large eyes so full of kindness and intelligence and said, "Be content, if you can, with the blessings you have."

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


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

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Dennis Stevens and Vernon Kerr, Republicans, thought their party's national computer could provide lots of information about how to redistrict New Mexico. It can't. Nobody put in the right information — which is not surprising. Almost nobody has the right information. Even at that, Stevens and Kerr appear to be ahead of the Democrats, who, as far as this column has been able to determine, seem to be composed largely of Brian Sanderoff of the governor's office, with a legal pad and a No. 2 pencil, trying to redistrict the state of New Mexico manually.

Anybody who uses the figures developed by the Legislative Council Service in this matter could end up with a lot of legal problems. Indians, for instance, could do some suing. In the absence of other information, here's what the Council Service has done — Take the most recent election held, and list the turnout for every precinct in every county.

— If the turnout for a particular precinct was 10 percent of those actually voting in that county in that election, decide that this precinct constitutes 10 percent of the total population of that county.

— Multiply the number of people in the county, as given by the 1980 Census, by 10 percent, or the appropriate figure, as arrived at above. For purposes of redistricting, the Council Service says, that's how many people there are in this precinct.

You can see why Indians, who don't normally have anything like their total

population turn out for elections, might say that method does not really represent the total population strength of the precincts in which they live.

Non-Indians could be equally dissatisfied.

The fact is, we don't know how many people there are in the precincts of New Mexico — but those precincts are the measure by which we are expected to redistrict ourselves.

How come precincts and Census tracts by which our people are enumerated are not coterminous?

Well, back in 1972, we had a chance to get together with the Census Bureau and bring the two into some kind of congruence.

Did we do that? Come on. You know New Mexico. We got uppity and in effect said, "Those Census Bureau folks aren't going to tell us how to operate. They can just get lost."

What many of our politicians wanted least was anything recognizable — that is, measurable; most of them thrive on confusion, not clarity.) So here we are in the early 1980's.

We have to redivide our state into fair and just election districts, not only for Congresspersons, but also for each and every district in our state House of Representative and our state Senate.

Is New Mexico ready for this exercise? You gotta be kidding. For the last ten years we've been acting as if this problem would never arise.

And suddenly it's here ... to our consternation.

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Senator Harrison Schmitt reports to New Mexico

One fact is clear in the on-going debate about the MX intercontinental ballistic missile: the MX is necessary as a deterrent to Soviet missile threats.

However, one other fact is also clear: it is not necessary nor cost-effective to follow the Carter Administration's proposal to spread 200 MX missiles all over the West.

This so-called multiple protection shelter or "MPS" basing mode doesn't make any sense strategically. MPS doesn't make any sense economically. MPS doesn't make any sense technically. MPS doesn't make any sense philosophically.

Strategically, MPS basing of the MX can be overwhelmed by increased numbers of Soviet missiles and warheads.

Economically, MPS basing will soak up tens of billions of dollars in 1983 and 1984 at the same time when other absolutely necessary defense expenditures must be made and the total federal budget must be brought into balance.

Technically, MPS basing will use up valuable land, water, material and labor resources necessary for other agricultural, energy, industrial and defense purposes.

Philosophically, MPS basing assures an indefinite commitment to weapons of mass destruction rather than the rapid development of weapons of mass protection.

Later this month, two subcommittees of the Senate Appropriations Committee will hold three days of hearings, a joint review, of the MX missile program. The Defense subcommittee, on which I serve, and the

Military Construction subcommittee, will take a careful look at the MX basing controversy. Clearly, there are alternatives to the MPS, or "multiple protective shelter" basing mode. These alternatives will be considered.

The most cost-effective alternative to MPS we will examine now appears to be a combination of activities including the upgrading of our existing land and submarine-based missile forces, the acceleration of the deployment of land, sea and air-launched cruise missiles, greatly improve our civil defense readiness, and, most importantly, begin the rapid development and deployment of anti-ballistic missile defense systems.

The new MX missile itself can be best utilized, along with anti-ballistic missile defenses, as a replacement for out-dated Titan and Minuteman intercontinental missiles.

Although in the repair of our conventional defense forces we must rely on more wide-scale use of proven weapons systems, our strategic defense policy must result in the leapfrogging of Soviet technology. We must do what Americans do best: use our technological prowess to develop the advanced warning systems, the laser and other anti-missile weapons and the necessary command and control structures that make weapons of mass destruction obsolete; make the policy of "mutually assured destruction" obsolete.

In other words, "Mutually Assured Protection" must become the watchwords of our strategic defense policy.

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
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
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# Seek smuggling suspect

Jurors must often feel like a bride at a wedding where the bridegroom doesn't show up.

There are at least two good reasons why Steven Joseph Mara didn't show up before a jury in Santa Fe on February 4 of this year. Number one is that he was facing charges of possession with intent to distribute nearly 1,600 pounds of marijuana, with a street value of \$1.5 million. The second is, that he was released on his own recognizance.

On November 9, 1980, a twin engine Piper Navajo airplane crash landed in a field about six miles southeast of Crownpoint. The aircraft had been specially equipped for long distance flying, but apparently ran out of fuel anyway. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) investigators at the scene said "every bit of space in the plane was filled with marijuana, almost 1,600 pounds of it." Mara, a pilot, was found hitchhiking about a mile from the plane. Following an investigation, Mara was charged with possession with intent to distribute marijuana.

For several years now, authorities have been trying to get higher bonds set in drug related cases, due to the large amounts of money available to smugglers. Unfortunately, it appears their pleas have fallen on deaf ears.

Steven Joseph Mara is described as being a white male, 34 years old, 6 feet, 168 pounds, with brown hair and brown eyes. He was born on September 19, 1946, in New York, but has spent a great deal of time in New Mexico, much of it in Santa Fe. He is licensed to sell real estate, and gems and minerals. His parents live in Lantana, Florida, and he has a brother in Yonkers, New York.

DEA authorities, however, believe he is still in New Mexico, and this week, the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to Mara's capture. Anyone having information on his whereabouts is asked to call the Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933. Callers do not have to reveal their identities, and the calls are not taped or traced.

In other areas of the state, Crime Stopper programs are seeking information on a variety of crimes.

On April 16, just after midnight, several

fires were set at the headquarters of the Lone Pine Ranch near Glencoe. The ranch owner, George F. Lore, has estimated the loss at nearly \$100,000. A special reward of \$1,000 is being offered by Lore, through the Roswell Crime Stoppers program, for information which would help investigators solve the crime. Anyone having information should call Roswell Crime Stoppers at 623-9000.

Otero County Crime Stoppers are seeking information on burglars who broke into the Basin Electronics store in Gibson's Shopping Center. Items taken included a 19 inch Sanyo Color TV, several Sanyo combination AM-FM radio cassette tape recorders, and a Sanyo turntable. Anyone having information which would help solve the case should call Otero County Crime Stoppers at 437-2000 to become eligible for the \$500 reward being offered.

In Silver City, burglars broke into the La Plata School and stole the amplifier system. Grant County Crime Stoppers is offering a \$200 reward for information leading to the solution of the crime, and has a standing reward for information solving any burglary or extensive vandalism to the public schools. Grant County

Crime Stoppers can be reached at 538-5254. San Juan County Crime Stoppers is looking for some auto thieves and a cattle rustler. A 1976 silver colored four door Mazda, New Mexico license DRC-155, was stolen from in front of 414 Helland, Wednesday night, May 13. On June 2, a pale green colored 300 series Ford van, New Mexico license CZ-8444, was taken from 422 North Mesa. On May 29, someone killed a cow at the Sterling Harris residence on the La Plata Highway, taking only the hind quarters. Various rewards are being offered for information leading to the solution of the three crimes which occurred in the Aztec area. 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

# Desert bighorn sheep released in Peloncillos

Twenty-eight desert bighorn sheep — 10 ewes, 10 rams and eight lambs — were released into the wilds of the Peloncillo Mountains of southwestern New Mexico Friday. They had been held since November in a 40-acre paddock built to get them accustomed to the area.

The ewes are part of a group of 12 captured from the Kofa game refuge in western Arizona last November and given to New Mexico for assistance by the Department of Game and Fish in their capture. The ewes were pregnant when captured, and the lambs were born in the Peloncillo paddock.

Two of the 12 ewes died in the paddock. Andrew Sandoval, bighorn research specialist with the department, said a department crew removed poultry wire surrounding the paddock and about 800 feet of paddock fencing, to allow dispersal of the sheep into the mountains.

The poultry wire was placed around the fencing to prevent the lambs from getting caught in the paddock fencing and to prevent predators from digging into it.

"The release was not a mad dash by the sheep to get out of the paddock, but a more gradual drifting through the opening," Sandoval said. "They could leave im-

mediately or stay for several hours. All we did was let down the fence that retained them."

The entire paddock will eventually be disassembled.

"We expect the ewes to remain in the area close to the paddock site," Sandoval said. "The paddock was built to retain the sheep while they become imprinted to the habitat, thereby minimizing losses to predation in the wild through their familiarity with the area."

The release of the sheep was originally scheduled for early June, but biologists have been attempting to reduce predation by mountain lions and modify livestock fences in the area to allow easier passage by the bighorn sheep.

The 20 adult sheep are radio-equipped, with half of the rams wearing camouflage collars as part of an experiment to determine the effects — if any — of colored collars on predation. Sandoval believes the brightly-colored collars might make the sheep more susceptible to predation.

The sheep will be monitored for the next year by a graduate student from New Mexico State University.

Since the rams were placed in the paddock, they have remained segregated

from the ewes. Sandoval expects the breeding season — which should begin in two to three weeks — and the warm weather — which would keep the sheep near the single water catchment in the area — to integrate the sheep and prevent them from scattering.

The 100 percent lamb survival among the small herd is significant. "Survival rates among sheep born in the wild generally are extremely low and average about 30 percent. The lambs range in age from three to five months and include — as closely as we can determine — five females and three males," Sandoval said.



# I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

Believe it or not, the hunting seasons are just around the corner. And, if you haven't studied the new big game proclamation yet, you might find yourself missing some of the early special hunt application deadlines.

In fact, it is only three weeks until the July 10 deadline for public antelope and bighorn sheep permits arrives. Therefore, here are the specifics in applying for hunts for those two species.

The antelope hunt in the southeastern part of New Mexico is referred to as the A-4 hunt and will be held September 25 and September 27 of this year. The number of public permits or licenses will be determined following the July survey for this area. These permits will be distributed by means of a public drawing which will be held in Santa Fe on August 12.

Applications to enter the drawing for public antelope permits must be made on Form U, which is available at Game Department offices and from license vendors. These forms must be filled out completely, signed, and accompanied by the proper license fee in order to be valid.

Resident antelope permits are \$18 and non-resident permits are \$101. Up to two persons may apply on the same form, and completed forms should be mailed to the address given on the form or delivered to the nearest Game Department office.

A change made in this year's application procedure that you may not be aware of is that personal checks will no longer be accepted. The correct license fee which must accompany the application must be in the form of cashier's check or money order. The Game Department will return all applications accompanied by personal checks.

Applicants for the public drawing may designate a hunt preference on the application form. You may state either a ranch name, or a management unit number from the antelope unit map given in the big game proclamation. A sincere effort will be made to honor all ranch

requests. However, at times this is not possible due to the limited number of public permits allotted a particular ranch, or to the fact that ranches made up of entirely private land are not required to accommodate public hunters. In addition, ranchers have the option of whether or not to have an antelope hunt on their ranch during any given year.

Private land antelope licenses are allotted for use on privately owned lands within the hunt area when the ranch owners or lessees sign hunting agreements with the Game Department. These allotments will be publicized on August 21.

Application for a private land antelope license must be made on Form W, which is also available from Game Department offices. There is no deadline for purchase of private land antelope licenses. However, these licenses can only be obtained from the Game Department's Santa Fe office, and the sooner you apply, the more likely you are to have your landowner license before the opening day of the hunt.

Private land antelope licenses are not valid unless the hunter also has in possession while hunting, written permission of the landowner to hunt on his ranch. It would be well, therefore, for the applicant to contact the landowner before investing in the license.

Anyone may apply for an antelope license, except for those of you who held a New Mexico antelope license of any kind in

1980. In most antelope hunt areas the bag limit is one fork-horned buck antelope with horns longer than the ears.

July 10, 1981, is also the deadline for Rocky Mountain Bighorn Sheep applications. The Pecos hunt, S-1, is scheduled for September 5 through 13 with up to ten licenses to be issued. The Glenwood-San Francisco River hunt, S-2, is set for February 13 through February 21, 1982, with up to six licenses to be issued. Desert Bighorn Sheep will not be hunted this year.

Form U is to be used when applying for the bighorn sheep drawing. No more than one person may apply on the application form. Only those of you who have never held a license to hunt bighorn sheep in New Mexico may apply.

The fees to accompany Bighorn Sheep applications are \$26 for bona fide New Mexico residents and \$301 for non-residents. Bighorn sheep licenses will be allotted through a public drawing in Santa Fe on August 12.

Needless to say, the time to apply for this year's antelope and bighorn sheep hunts is right now!

Obtain a current big game proclamation, study carefully the pages concerning antelope and bighorn sheep, and then, make application for the desired hunt.

No applications will be accepted at any of our Game Department offices after 5 p.m., on July 10. And remember, no personal checks.

## Life is a Question of Opportunity

In a period of America's history when most women stayed home and tended husband and family, Girdie Ware was still expanding her educational horizons and those of others. At 80 she is still at it.

Combining her book learning with considerable practical experience, Ware, at 75 began a new career as a private counselor in child development. On the side she serves as the Oklahoma representative of the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission.

She obtained her Bachelor of Arts in 1921 from the University of Texas and has, over the years, attended seven universities and taken innumerable courses, obtaining several degrees.

Her collective degrees and the various subjects she has studied "somewhere along the line" have provided her with a rich background in early childhood education and development, psychology, family relations and home economics. "I guess all these disciplines have stood me in good stead," she modestly told a writer from the National Council on the Aging.

Asked how she managed to pursue her varied interests over the years, Ware says simply, "I believe that, as things come along, we must make the most of every opportunity."

As an example, in 1938 her late husband, Grady Ware, took leave from Oklahoma State University where he served for years as a poultry specialist, and went to Cornell for an advanced degree. Ware followed and, true to her code, "took advantage of" an opportunity at that university.



College for Women, thus adding an international dimension to her life.

Always interested in people at any stage of their lives, Ware's pioneering spirit caused early involvement in the field of aging. She assisted in the establishment of a senior center in Oklahoma in the early 50's — a beginning of what has become a country-wide movement. In addition, she also established a course on aging at OSU, also a "new" idea.

Noting also that she was exposed to Robert S. Laubach's experimental methods of teaching reading, Ware sums up her life-long learning and teaching simply by saying, "I had unlimited, interesting and challenging experiences. Now, I am like a zealot. I simply have to encourage other professionals, especially younger ones, to make the most out of every opportunity. It is not only important professionally, but it is important for one's own growth and satisfaction."

Enrollment in last fall's semester of adult education classes in the Chicago area rose by 20.2 percent: There were 15,690 persons enrolled in the adult education classes, a jump from 13,750 persons.

There are more than 500 teaching sites in the Chicago metropolitan area for the Education Network for Older Adults (ENOA), and hope for more. ENOA is working on a program to provide information on financial aid opportunities available to Chicago area oldsters (55 plus).

### "The Five Forty-Eight" with Luckinbill and Hurt

Laurence Luckinbill and Mary Beth Hurt star in "The Five Forty-Eight," the final program in the encore presentation of "Three Cheever Stories," which airs on "Great Performances" Monday, June 29, over PBS. Produced by WNET/THIRTEEN, New York, the Cheever Trilogy is made possible by a grant from EXXON and by public television stations.

**CONFIDENTIAL REPORT:** The shooting of J.R. Ewing in Dallas last year has rekindled memories of another shootout—the murder of President **John F. Kennedy** 17 years earlier. But the shooting of **Larry Hagman's** famous villain is not the only link viewers have been drawing between the Kennedy clan and the Cowboy Camelot of Texas. The world now knows who shot J.R.—it was Kristin Shepherd—but the public can still only guess who killed the other man in Dallas. The coincidences between J.R. and J.F.K. are astounding: Both were sons of unbelievably rich, individualistic, hard-driving fathers—**Joe Kennedy** and Jock Ewing—who guided their sons. Both had well-bred matriarchal mothers—**Rose** and Miss Ellie—whose only concern was preservation of the family. Both had two living brothers—**Bobby Ewing** and **Bobby Kennedy**, and **Teddy** and Gary. Both had young sons named John. Both had beautiful dark-haired wives, Sue Ellen and **Jackie**. Both cheated on their wives with abandon. "We've heard this before," say the people at Lorimar Productions, the producers of the CBS-TV hit. "But we really don't pay any attention to the comparisons. They have nothing to do with our stories. Any similarities are strictly in the minds of the viewers."
