# Higheasterjet wins Derby

Higheasterjet, the gelding who won last summer's \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity, blasted out a head victory in Sunday's 17th running of the Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The Rainbow, the second leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds, packed a cash value of \$595,850 (including the Consolation) and handed Higheasterjet a check for \$208,547.

That beefed the gelding's career income up to \$658,282, making him the fourth best money maker in quarter horse history.

While Higheasterjet was enjoying another giddy swirl of big time money and glory, the Rainbow turned into a disappointment for the people's choice, Easily Smashed. The colt, who'd won the \$224,740 Kansas Derby earlier in the season, strolled into the Rainbow arena with a perfect four-for-four record this season.


More importantly, perhaps, the colt was being billed as a possible Triple Crown winner. But he failed to generate the kind of penetrating attack necessary to overhual a fiery speed demon like Higheasterjet.

After breaking a bit sluggishly, then getting pinched between horses, Easily Smashed lapsed into a holding pattern and couldn't make headway in the critical 100-or-so yards from the finish. The well bred colt finished third, a little more than a half length away from the winner.

Separating Higheasterjet and Easily Smashed was Dr. Depot, a 20-1 outsider who turned in an absolutely stunning performance. After breaking in second place, the gelding needed about 100 yards to find his bearings. After that, he was pure fury. He bore down on Higheasterjet with crushing power. Had he not run out of ground, victory would have been his. Higheasterjet, thanks to his flashy get away, which put him about a length in front in the early stages, was able to nurse his speed down to the wire.

Higheasterjet stormed over the 440 yards in 21.73 seconds, which topped Easily Smashed's seasonal record of 21.96. Higheasterjet is owned by G. D. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas.

The gelding represents another luminous success in the astonishing string of achievements being recorded by trainer Johnie Goodman and jockey W. R. Hunt. The two are unquestionably the most potent combination in quarter horse history. Their achievements, which almost defy credibility, include the following: last

## Higheasterjet's trainer lauds speedster

Johnie Goodman may be the master of the ship, but his crew certainly rates plaudits.

"That's why we don't call it Goodman Racing Stables. It's called Goodman Racing Team. I'm tickled with all my crew," said the trainer of Higheasterjet who sped to a head win in the \$595,850 Rainbow Derby Sunday at Ruidoso Downs.

All week prior to the 440 yard dash, the runners were rampant around Ruidoso Downs that Higheasterjet was hurting. Either sore, or sick. But definitely not ready to beat Kansas Derby winner Easily Smashed.

"He isn't sore or anything. Those were just bad rumors," Goodman said. "He's had problems, but he had chips (in his knees) removed over the winter by Dr. Bullard in Weatherford, Texas."

\$1,280,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, led practically throughout although Dr. Depot, a 19-1 outsider made a bold move.

Easily Smashed, the 9-10 favorite, was jostled around at the start and finished third.

Still, Goodman cited groom Keith Newsome, who has cared for the Pine's Easter Jet gelding since he was a baby; and assistant trainer Dennis Blackman.

"My whole crew spent the whole winter on these horses. Give them all the credit," he said.

Jockey W. R. Hunt, meanwhile, said he was ahead for most of the race. "He got away well. You don't want to mess up. He's (Higheasterjet) a fast horse if he just stays up (healthy)," he said.

"A lot of people were doubtful after the Futurity. They thought it was just a fluke race or something. But now they have to

give him a little recognition. He's more than just an average horse.

"I just wanted to prove it for Higheasterjet. I thought they (Easily Smashed and Higheasterjet) should be equal. Higheasterjet won the All-American and Easily Smashed won the Kansas. But both are great horses."

Owner G. D. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas, cited Goodman, saying:

"I gave Johnie 49 percent of the horse during All-American week last year. To me, he's the greatest trainer in the world." Highsmith owns the remaining 51 percent of Higheasterjet.

Jockey James Lackey was all smiles after Dr. Depot's impressive performance. (He ran a fast closing second).

"He ran great. He left real well. Higheasterjet was right there and kept up with us. Dr. Depot was trying all the time," he said.

## Rash of car accidents occurred in past week

A number of traffic accidents have caused injuries to area residents over the past week, with rain-slicked streets contributing to several of the mishaps.

Ellyn Anderson and Veronica Sanchez, both of Ruidoso, were injured last Monday in an accident on Highway 37 near the Minit Mart. Sanchez had just exited the store's parking lot, according to police reports, when Anderson's car struck her vehicle.

Anderson was admitted for treatment at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital. Sanchez was treated and released at the hospital. She was cited for violations of "special stops," and for no driver's license.

In another traffic accident, Richelle Burgess of Ruidoso was treated at the hospital for a cut lip, after an accident Thursday morning at the same location on Highway 37.

A car driven by Shirley Furth of Ruidoso was heading south on Mechem and had

stopped for a left turn into the Minit Mart parking lot.

A car driven by Frank Burgess of Ruidoso hit the rear of Furth's car, causing the injuries to Richelle Burgess, a passenger.

Police reports indicated Furth's brake lights were inoperable and she was cited for violations of stopping laws and turning movements. Burgess was cited for following too closely and for no driver's license.

Other accident causing injuries were reported at about 5 p.m., Tuesday near Security Bank; about 5:45 p.m., Thursday on Sudderth Drive near Big T and at 12:30 p.m., Friday on Cavilan Canyon Road near the Fawn Ridge turnoff. Police reports of those accidents were unavailable Monday morning.

## Downs trustees pass ordinance on sales tax

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Thursday adopted an ordinance increasing the Gross Receipts Tax by one half percent, effective January 1, 1982.

The 1981 legislature reduced the state levy by 5 percent, and authorized municipalities to increase it by that amount by ordinance.

The Gross Receipts Tax (sales tax) will be four percent until January 1, when it will return to the four and a half percent that had been charged prior to July 1.

Revenue generated by the tax will go into the general fund, but will not be applied for the cost of utilities.

Petitions for submitting this action to a referendum must be presented to the trustees within 30 days of the passage of this ordinance.

## Pounds facing burglary rap

William Glenn Pounds III of Ruidoso Downs was arrested Thursday and charged with larceny over \$100 and burglary. He was arrested in Ruidoso Downs by local officers.

The arrest came after Gladys Finlay, Chaparral Motel, reported \$8,850 worth of jewelry taken from her room. She also reported the theft of the suitcase in which the jewelry was stored, valued at \$875.

Pounds was released later on \$10,000 bond.

Charges of possession and distribution of marijuana over eight ounces have been dropped against Jay Phillips and Brian Saldin of Ruidoso.



Gene Ridgeway, was tied on the day following the hearing.


District Attorney Steve Sanders said to The News Thursday that his office had not made a decision about dropping charges against Phillips, and was considering appealing Doughty's decision.




A DETERMINED DUO, this girl and her horse turned in one of the faster times at Saturday's performance of the Sriokey Bear Stampede Rodeo.

# Higheasterjet wins Derby

summer's \$1,431,850 All American Derby with Native Gambler and the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity with Higheasterjet; the 1981 Kansas Futurity (\$787,350) with Special Effort; and the 1981 Rainbow Silver Cup (\$132,510) with Native Gambler.

Higheasterjet handed out mutual payoffs of \$4.88, \$3.60 and \$3.20. Dr. Depot, ridden by James Luckey for Barbara Smith of Lewisville, Texas, paid \$14.40 and \$5. Easily Smashed, who got away as a 4-5 favorite, paid \$2.60 to show.

Here's the complete order of finish, with money earned: 1st — Higheasterjet, \$208,547; 2nd — Dr. Depot, \$85,336; 3rd — Easily Smashed, \$48,850; 4th — Sunlist Moon, \$25,621; 5th — Perseverance, \$23,238; 6th — Native Tea, \$22,642; 7th — Rule The Deck, \$22,046; 8th — Heza Bunny, \$21,450; 9th — Mighty Pass Em, \$20,854; 10th — Matty Mito, \$20,258.

LUCKS GAY CHIC, a colt owned by the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma, pounded out an easy one and one-fourth length win in Saturday's \$88,594 Rainbow Derby Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.

Lucks Gay Chic surprised his foes with a quick getaway in the 440 yard dash and never looked back. He fattened up his lead with each stride.

The winner stopped the clock in a seasonal record time of 21.84 seconds and collected \$18,393. Richard Bickel was in the driver's seat.

Baby Hold On, a filly owned by Gerald and Darlene Blue of Amarillo, Texas, rallied out of third place to bag the runner-up purse of \$12,875. Willie Lovell was up.

Layover Charlie, a 38-1 outsider, ended up a nose behind Baby Hold On and collected \$9,809 for third.

Fans who supported Lucks Gay Chic in the mutuels collected \$10.60, \$4.60, \$3.80. Baby Hold On refunded \$1.40 and \$3.60. The show price on Layover Charlie was \$7.80.

The odds-on favorite, Runnin Barre, was a bit reluctant to enter the starting gate and held up matters for a few minutes. When the gates sprung open, the people's choice broke sluggishly. She was unable to improve her status and finished a disappointing fifth. Still, she earned \$8,583 for her efforts.

Lucks Gay Chic came out of the Consolation with a 1981 record of 5-1-0 from six starts. He went into the dash with current earnings of only \$10,007.

Saturday's card also spotlighted the \$13,875 Governor's Handicap at six and one-half furlongs, and all the glory went to the 4-5 favorite, Ruffast. The five-year-old mare humbled some of the finest talent in the Southwest, winning by two and three-fourths lengths and setting a seasonal record of 1:20 flat. Ruffast led almost from start to finish, never giving her foes a fighting chance. Bickel was aboard that one, too. Ruffast earned \$8,325 for her owner, Jay Childers of Borger, Texas.

Ruffast handed out low mutual payoffs of \$3.80, \$3.40 and \$2.80, and stamped herself as the handicap star of the 1981 season. Scott's Courtship, a 17-1 shot, took second (\$14.40, \$8.20). Double B Express moved well at the turn for home, but had to settle for third (\$4.40).

Ruidoso's skyrocketing business trend continued as 8,624 fans jammed the mountain track for the July 4th holiday program and wagered an astonishing \$929,742 on the 12 race program. It was one of the highest handles in Ruidoso history.

THE HEAT IS ON, the filly who finished a close second in the recent Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park, sailed to a coasting two and one-fourth length win on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly easily won the sixth race, which was one of 27 first round qualifying heats leading to the \$880,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity at 400 yards. The Rainbow Futurity is the second leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds.

The top two finishers in each of Friday's 27 trials will join the 54 survivors from Thursday's stanza in the final qualifying runoff on July 9. In that round, they'll be running against the clock. Those chalking up the 10 fastest time will advance into the grand finale on July 25, shooting at a victory purse of about \$238,000.

The Heat Is On, ridden by Jackie Martin, looked like a champ while winning her Friday trial heat in a sharp clocking of 20.39 seconds. It was among the fastest clockings of the long afternoon. The win payoff was a meager \$3.

A newcomer who made a big impression was Rebelier, who won the 24th race by a length in an extremely fast clocking of 20.38. It was her third win in three career starts. The daughter of Dash For Cash is owned by Ann Freeman and Alice Fisher of El Paso, Texas.

SPECIAL EFFORT, the colt who traded hands in late May for \$1 million and went on to win the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity, took his first step toward the \$800,000 (est.)

Rainbow Futurity on Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The expanded 27 race card (which began at 8:30 a.m.) was devoted entirely to first round elimination trials for the Rainbow Futurity.

Another 27 races were slated for Friday. The top two finishers from each race on Thursday and Friday will advance into final elimination round on July 9. In that stanza, the 108 surviving hopefuls will be running against the clock.

Special Effort made his Rainbow bid in Thursday's 23rd race and boomed to an extremely impressive two and three-fourths length win. Jockey W. R. Hunt obviously kept a saug hold on the colt — since the win was virtually assured when Special Effort stormed into an early lead. Despite the tight reins, Special Effort kept opening up his advantage. If allowed to, he probably could have won by five lengths. His clocking of 20.31 seconds was one of the best of the long afternoon.

Special Effort went off at 1-8 and paid

\$2.20 to win, place and show. That win payoff set a seasonal low.

Special Effort now holds a perfect career record of four wins from four starts and looms as a solid Triple Crown contender.

Special Effort is owned by Dan and Jolene Urachel of Canadian, Texas, and leased to their daughter and son-in-law, Dana and Timothy Guidry, also of Canadian.



## Around Sports with Gary Brown



Welcome to the great outdoors! After driving through hundreds of miles of hot, dry desert to suddenly come upon this cool mountain resort blessed with an abundance of outdoors sports activities is a mind-blowing experience.

And covering sports in this mountain community should be an interesting experience.

Having lived in Northern California for 30 years I've been conditioned to the team-oriented professional sports concept. Living just 20 miles east of Oakland where a trophy case full of professional championships have been won at times I've lost track of the outdoors sports I participated in when I was young.

But I shouldn't have any problem keeping track of the numerous outdoors activities here in Ruidoso. Everything from skiing to hunting and fishing is here for the outdoors fan. And not to mention horse racing.

With the richest horse race in the world, the All-American Futurity, coming September 7, that climaxes an action-packed summer sports schedule in the Ruidoso area.

But the fall brings high school sports and that means strong, competitive programs at Ruidoso High School. Particularly in basketball where the boys' team went to the state semi-finals last season.

Interest in basketball is high not just in Ruidoso but in the entire state of New Mexico as well. Last season's state 4-A championship game between Hobbs and Albuquerque drew over 17,000 fans, third highest total for a state high school championship game in the entire country. That's especially outstanding when one considers the entire state has less than 1,500,000 people, about the population of Houston.

So much for the theory that basketball is just a big-city game.

But football is big in Ruidoso too. The Warriors came within just nine points of tying for the district championship last year and garnered their first winning season in 11 years.

And New Mexico's football playoff system is a good one too. With state playoffs in four divisions The Land of Enchantment is ahead of California which as yet doesn't even have any high school state playoffs in football and is only beginning to organize state playoffs in basketball.

Countless other sports such as soccer, gymnastics, distance running and baseball are also popular on the local level.

Actually sports are more popular in small towns like Ruidoso where there is more community backing for these activities. In large cities high school sports and what outdoors activities there are have to compete with other forms of entertainment. As a result prep sports and the like are usually swept to the back page of the major metro papers' sports sections. They often appear only as team scores in the scoreboard section without any summary.

Attention is focused on major league professional sports in large cities and high school athletes and outdoors enthusiasts receive very little press ink for their endeavors.

But Ruidoso isn't a large city and sports and outdoors fans can count on seeing their favorite activities frequently on The News sports pages.

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# Alcohol production on farms labeled uneconomical

On-farm alcohol production is not an economically feasible alternative to gasoline although it is receiving a lot of attention from farmers, researchers and government officials, according to specialists at New Mexico State University (NMSU).

"Many people think of alcohol fuels as a national security measure, new markets for American grain, a chance to increase farm income and security from fuel shortages," said James Libbin, NMSU Extension economist.

"Farmers may be hurt if they attempt to produce alcohol on the farm because of very high production costs. Farm units incur very high capital costs per unit of production and are not able to recover

valuable by-products." Ten years ago the United States imported relatively little oil. During the first half of 1980, however, this country imported over five million barrels of oil per day, at a daily cost of roughly \$250 million. The increased effectiveness of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and the political instability in the Mideast have greatly increased not only the cost of imported fuel but also national vulnerability to arbitrary supply interruptions, said Lowell Catlett, an NMSU agricultural economist.

The federal government recently set a goal of 600 million gallons of annual United States production capacity for alcohol

fuels by the end of 1981. The United States Department of Energy recently funded three alcohol fuel projects in New Mexico plus a project at the New Mexico State University Clovis Branch Experiment Station.

While alcohol fuel offers a major potential for national security interests, the NMSU economists question whether it is enough reason to promote alcohol fuels.

The economists also feel that while alcohol fuel production will be a new market for grain, there are some aspects of this factor which may not be all that advantageous.

"First, we are really most concerned with the price and thus the final income, not with selling all the grain that is produced," Libbin said. "Yet the first thing to get hurt by increased grain prices is alcohol fuel production. Secondly, if we increase grain production, fragile or marginal lands may be sacrificed."

Currently, the United States burns about 100 billion gallons of gasoline per year. If it was possible to convert all America's corn, grains, sorghum, wheat, potatoes, sugar beets, sugarcane, barley and oats into alcohol fuel, it would save only about 21 percent of our gasoline, Catlett said.

"The important perspective to remember is that even if we replace one percent of conventional fuels with renewable resources, we have made a major step in conserving the dollars flowing out of the United States to buy

foreign oil," the NMSU economist said.

While alcohol fuel production is now feasible at the large industrial plants, on-farm systems do not appear to be economically feasible, Libbin said.

Some relevant alcohol production cost estimates for on-farm production were recently published by South Dakota State University (SDSU). The plant at SDSU is capable of producing around 9,000 gallons of fuel alcohol per year. However, the plant processes only one batch of corn per week.

Each batch contains 960 gallons of fermentation mash and yields about 93 gallons of 190 proof fuel alcohol. Assuming that the plant could operate 48 weeks per year, potential output is 4,464 gallons.

The capital investment required for this system is nearly \$90,000. When capitalized at a 10 percent interest rate, capital costs amount to over \$12,000 per year, or \$2.70 per gallon. Other fixed costs average 76 cents per gallon.

The operating costs amount to \$1.82 per gallon, for a total cost of \$5.28 per gallon. Subtract 30 cents per gallon credit for the by-product mash, the net final cost is \$4.98 per gallon, if corn is \$2.34 per bushel.

Next, assume that the plant can operate nearer its capacity. If two batches can be processed each week through the same plant, capital costs rise slightly to \$90,600 to account for more grain storage. But, annual capital costs at 10 percent interest, fall from \$2.70 per gallon to \$1.40.

Other fixed costs fall from 76 cents to 49 cents per gallon, and operating costs fall from \$1.82 to \$1.76. Consequently, net costs after credits falls dramatically from \$4.98 per gallon to \$3.27.

Assuming one batch per week, corn prices from \$2 to \$2.50 imply alcohol costs of \$4.75 to \$4.98 per gallon. Under a two-batch system, corn prices ranging from \$2 to \$2.50 imply alcohol cost of \$3.12 to \$3.33 per gallon. If corn prices increase, as they did this year to \$3.50 per bushel, then the cost per gallon increases substantially.

It is important to remember that you need nearly 18 gallons of water to produce one gallon of ethanol, Libbin said. "This is a major concern in the Southwest." In addition, the energy content of alcohol is not as high as gasoline. To entirely replace a gallon of gasoline, you need about 1.5 gallons of 200-proof ethanol or nearly two gallons of 170 proof ethanol.


Alcohol production requires major inputs of both capital and time as well as a reliable heat source, consistent supply of grains or some other feedstock, significant amounts of water, and large and readily available markets for both alcohol and mash.

Farm production of alcohol is a highly technical operation which requires constant monitoring and control. Although some automatic control devices can be used, they add to costs substantially.

Fuel alcohol production and continued research should not be discouraged in general. Grain alcohols can have a substantial impact on the national economy by replacing imported oil and providing additional grain markets.

"Farmers may be hurt if they attempt to produce alcohol on the farm," Catlett said. "The large plants are much more economical than small, on-farm plants."

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## Suggestions to cut summer cooling costs

Summer in New Mexico means hot temperatures outside and high utility costs to keep it cool inside.

JoAnn Less, Extension housing specialist at New Mexico State University, suggests these tips to help your home stay cooler and your cooling costs down.

— If you are getting ready to repaint your home, try a lighter color. Light colors reflect more sunlight and absorb less heat.

— Check insulation, caulking and weatherstripping through your home. Many people think these measures are only for the winter months, but they work just as effectively during the summer to keep warm air out.

— Install fans in your attic to move the hot air out as it collects there.

— Choose efficient cooling units, and keep them clean and in good repair. Air conditioning units are labeled with an energy efficiency rating (EER) that tells how efficient the unit is. Higher numbers

mean more efficiency.

— If you have refrigerated air, keep the unit on 78 or 80 degrees. Be sure not to block the air flow.

— Shade windows from the outside and keep windows covered from the inside on the sunny sides of the house.

— Open the refrigerator as little as possible, check the door seal and clean the coils to be sure the unit is running efficiently.

— Turn off all unnecessary lights because they add heat. If possible, use the fluorescent type light that does not build up heat.

— Use heating appliances early in the day or in the evening hours. Not only will they be operating during a cooler period of the day, but you will also be helping keep down the peak load demand during mid-day.

— Exhaust fans in the kitchen and bath will draw out cool air so run them sparingly during the hot hours of the day.

A week that many ranchers and farmers consider to be good protein feed for livestock may actually be poisoning their livestock when it's fed alone. Until more research is completed, ranchers should hold off on reseeding their land into kochia, according to Extension specialists at New Mexico State University.

Kochia is also called fireweed or burning bush. It is a common weed in most western states.

Research shows that the early growth of this coarse weed is leafy, palatable and nutritious, said Larry Foster, Extension beef cattle specialist. Kochia also seems to be drought resistant, grasshopper resistant, leafy and high in seed yield, protein and carbohydrate content.

In the 1940s, South Dakota State University researched Kochia but it never caught on as a domestic forage crop.

Many forage species have both good and bad qualities, said Charles Glover, Extension agronomist. For example, alfalfa is an excellent forage crop but it also causes bloating in ruminants. Under certain conditions crested wheatgrass can cause grass tetany. Kochia also causes several adverse reactions.

Kochia has been linked to photosensitization or an over reaction to light in cattle, sheep and horses. Cattle that have

eaten large amounts of kochia may also develop a central nervous system disorder called polienccephalomalacia, blindness, lethargy, jaundice and gastrointestinal distress.

Kochia, particularly under fertilization and cultivation, may be a nitrate accumulator thus leading to nitrate poisoning. Livestock losses have been documented in several locations in the United States. In at least one instance, over 200 head were lost.

Kochia, like most plants, doesn't always cause these problems, Glover said. No one knows when it is safe and when it is dangerous.

Any livestock producer using kochia as a forage should be extremely cautious and keep a close watch on livestock grazing kochia. "Be prepared to change the diet immediately if you see symptoms of toxicity in your livestock," Foster said.

There is currently little animal research data available on kochia as a crop, Foster said. "Perhaps as we learn more about what makes kochia toxic, the ranchers can graze it. But until then, livestock producers should be aware of the possible problems."

## Agent Orange videotape available

"Agent Orange: A Search For Answers," a 30-minute videotape produced by the Veterans Administration (VA), has received awards from the International Television Association (ITVA) and the Health Education Communication Association (HESCA).

The videotape is available from VA regional offices, medical centers and Vietnam vet centers for use by local social and professional groups and television stations in Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico.

By mid-June, the seven VA medical centers in the four states had given a total of 1,150 Agent Orange physicals requested by Vietnam veterans during the last two and one half years. By the same time, the four regional offices had handled a total of 228 Agent Orange claims filings. Of those, 181 were rejected and 32 were pending. Three others approved were based on the skin rash chloracne.

The ITVA awarded its Golden Reel of Excellence last month for the videotape's "highly effective form of communication, which helped the user organization better achieve its stated goals." The videotape also was cited by ITVA for creativity, innovative techniques and high production values.

The second recognition, from the HESCA, was an Award of Merit presented for "outstanding achievement in the use of television for education in the health sciences."


The special Agent Orange tape, designed for Vietnam veterans, describes the various herbicides used in Vietnam, with particular attention to the herbicide Agent Orange. The viewer is shown possible side effects associated with herbicides and steps to follow when contacting a VA medical center about suspected exposure.

The program was produced by the VA Office of Environmental Medicine, with production by the agency's Learning Resources Service.

Veterans service organizations, television stations and other interested parties wanting to use "Agent Orange: A Search For Answers," should contact the director of the VA regional office, medical center or Vietnam vet center in Denver, Colorado; Cheyenne, Wyoming; Salt Lake City, Utah, or Albuquerque, N.M. Also, the medical center director in Fort Lyon or Grand Junction, Colorado, or Sheridan, Wyoming. VA personnel also are available to respond to questions following showings in those areas of the videotape.

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
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# Inside The Capitol

Of course, Toney departed when the reporters were asked to leave — which could indicate one of two things.

First of all, Anaya probably has contributed as much as anyone around to the disunity within the party. Probably he would have been a little embarrassed to stay around while Democrats talked about how to get back together.

And then too, there is the fact that Toney gravitates to reporters like no other politician in the state has since Dave Cargo, a man of whom he is strikingly reminiscent.

This column wouldn't want you to believe that anybody present at that unity meeting came outside and spilled the secret beans, but those wispy rumors which got to the outside world lead us to believe that some good and positive things happened.

If so, the Republicans better watch out.

If the Democrats could get together . . . If the Apodaca wing and the King wing could begin to pull in the same direction

If the East Side and the North could begin to understand the same language

If there should arise a single leader . . . then the Democrats of New Mexico would begin once again to be a menace to the opposition.

(And as an incidental feature, if Brad Hays, current boss of the Democrats in the state, pulls that off before his term in office is up, he will go down in party history as a hero.)

Meanwhile, what was the opposition party up to?

Republicans were meeting in Alamogordo the same week-end Democrats were convening in

Albuquerque. They too have their problems.

One would think that the Grand Old Party, being more or less in charge of everything in New Mexico (they have four out of four Congressional seats, plus a man in the White House who has only to snap his fingers to be given whatever he wants), would be a center of happiness unlike anything seen since the invention of Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Not so. The one thing Republicans can't do is get people to run for office.

You know why not?

They're afraid they might get elected.

For years, Republicans would put their name forward — say, Wilson Hurley for Supreme Court Justice — on the understanding that this would not commit them to having the campaign or do anything otherwise gauche or declassé.

Naturally, they took it for granted they would not be elected, and hence would not have to serve.

That kind of understanding allowed the New Mexico Republican party to go on being more of social club than it is a political instrument. Being a Republican got to be like being accepted into the Country Club, as long as you didn't have to worry about success at the polls.

Ed Mechem first made New Mexico Republicans a little nervous, because he got elected to almost everything he ran for. Then came Manuel Lujan, and they weren't sure what to make of him. He was followed by Pete Domenici . . . and from then on, they have won more big ones than they have lost.

Imagine their dilemma. While Democrats are reunifying, Republicans are still learning how to fight with one another and not apologize for succeeding. Political evolution is the most interesting kind.

## Congressman Joe Skeen

reports from Washington



As I write this, final plans are being made for my trip to New Mexico during the July 4 Congressional "recess." The itinerary includes visits to eight cities — from Farmington in the far Northwest to Lovington in the far Southeast — during a 10-day period.

The people who deal in words in Washington decided several years ago to call the Congressional recesses "District work periods." I suppose that's a good description and closer to reality than "recess," but I look forward to having the opportunity to come back to New Mexico and visit with people. I enjoy it so much, in fact, that it is hard for me to look on my visits to the state as "work periods."

I don't know how anyone could be an effective member of Congress without taking the opportunity to return to his or her District regularly to visit with the people there. It would be very easy, I suppose, for someone to get caught up in Washington and to drift away from the beliefs, philosophies and feelings of those who elected us.

That's never been a problem for me, however, I have been a part of New Mexico for so long that I feel a need to go home on a regular basis. Since I've been in Washington, I've visited the state on an average of twice a month and have had the opportunity to visit with thousands of New Mexicans throughout the Second Congressional District.

After each trip, I've come back to Washington with new insights into how the

people in the District feel. These insights have helped me to seek out information on various bills before the Congress and to cast my votes in committees and on the House floor in a way that I believe best meets the concerns of the people in the District.

In some cases, these insights have prompted me to change the way I look at some of the issues. A good case in point is the bill that the House passed recently providing funding for Legal Services.

When I first began to consider the matter, I felt that the Administration was correct in believing that Legal Services had gotten out of hand; that the people involved had lost sight of their original reasons for being and that the program needed to be ended.

But, as I talked with people in the District and went through the mail that came in from others, I began to understand that the program as it was originally structured was necessary for those New Mexicans who cannot afford to pay an attorney from the private sector.

Then, as the bill began to take its final form on the House floor, I could see that most, if not all, of the objections to the program had been addressed by amendments to the original bill. When the time finally came for a vote on Legal Services, I was able to vote with the majority for passage and, thus, to assure that the program would continue after the necessary changes had been made to make it again acceptable.

A new development, a charge of voting fraud, is adding interest to the court battle between Alamogordo attorneys Steven K. Sanders and James J. Weldon the post of District Attorney for the 12th Judicial District.

During two days of court action last week Sanders alleged that some of the write-in votes cast for Weldon were forgeries.

This is a serious charge to levy against election officials.

This court action stemmed from Sanders being declared the winner, by 296 votes, by the State Canvassing Board. This margin was determined after the canvassing board rejected write-in votes that did not meet accuracy requirements set forth by Secretary of State Shirley Hooper, a member of the canvassing board.

Weldon is contesting the rejection of those votes by claiming that voter intent, regardless of how his name was written on the ballot, should be the sole factor in determining the winner of that election.

We feel, if it can be positively determined that a vote was cast for Weldon that vote should count. That's the American way, the candidate with the most votes wins.

We also feel that Sanders' allegations should be thoroughly investigated. If he can prove his charges, well and good; if they prove to be false, he should be held accountable. That, too, is the American way. —CD

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
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**Real Estate Facts**

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The sale of an existing home has many far-reaching economic effects on a community — far more than most people would imagine, states the Ruidoso Board of Realtors.

For instance, before a sale, owners spend an average of \$500 to \$1,000 to get the home ready for sale. At the time of the sale expenditures of between \$2,500 and \$3,500 per home are generally made. During the first year of ownership, the proud new owner will probably spend from \$2,000 to \$2,500.

Therefore, for every 100 existing homes sold, a community reaps from \$500,000 to \$700,000 in economic benefits. And these figures do not even include the earnings of real estate practitioners and mortgage lenders.

Prior to a sale, homeowners generally try to prepare their home so that prospective buyers will see it in the best possible light. Many home improvement and clean-up jobs are finished in the hope of attracting and expediting a sale. Major recipients of this spending activity (estimated at between \$500 to \$1,000) include painters; hardware and building supply stores; carpenters, roofing, plumbing and electrical contractors; rug and drapery cleaners; and appliance repair firms.

Firms that benefit from the \$2,500 to \$3,500 spent at the time of the sale include moving companies, real estate appraisers; termite inspectors; structural inspection firms; surveyors; property insurance and title insurance companies; and the local government, which benefits from fees and taxes paid. Expenditures at the time of the sale generally average around 3 to 5 percent of the selling price of the home, according to the Economics and Research Division of the National Association of Realtors.

In addition, there is a strong link between buying a home and the subsequent, above-average purchase of goods and services. In the 12 months following a transaction, homebuyers outspend long

term homeowners by a substantial margin. These after-sale expenditures — \$2,000 to \$2,500 — range from major capital improvements and the purchase of furnishings, to smaller household and yard items.

The impact of homesales on a community is even more staggering when consideration is given to the subsequent rounds of spending which occur when the recipients of home sales spending (i. e., movers, painters, roofers) take their increased earnings and spend them on a wide range of goods and services.

Although difficult to pinpoint, the National Association of Realtors estimates that such spending totals an additional \$1 to \$1.5 million.

Adding it all up, the sale of 100 existing homes can generate nearly \$1.5 to \$2 million in new business for merchants, service men and women and the country's economy. Taking this into consideration, it's easy to understand why an existing home sales component must be considered when evaluating a community's economic health.

**Focus on Small Business**

Dear Mr. Shafer: I understand a tight budget has forced the Small Business Administration to restrict eligibility for loans to disaster-damaged businesses. Is this true?

Yes, because of reduced federal spending, business disaster loans are being restricted to 60 percent of loss, to stretch available funds.

The maximum loan limit remains at \$500,000 for businesses that have received direct disaster damage, but is reduced to \$100,000 for businesses that have sustained only indirect, economic injury from a disaster. Home and personal property loans are still made for up to 100 percent of losses.

Business disaster loans also are now made only to concerns unable to get private credit. This provision does not apply to loans for homes or personal property. The business disaster loan interest rate is five percent (three percent for homes and personal property). Previously, SBA made business disaster

loans at five percent to firms that could not get private sector credit and at 13 3/8 percent to those who could.

The amended disaster loan regulations provide that disaster declarations will be made by SBA if at least 26 homes and/or businesses have suffered uninsured losses of at least 40 percent of their estimated fair replacement value, or at least three businesses have been damaged to the same extent and at least a quarter of the workforce in the community will be unemployed for at least 90 days as a result of such damage.

Dear Mr. Shafer: I am interested in getting a franchise for a business. Does SBA have a franchise loan program?

SBA does not have a franchise loan program as such. Some holders of SBA loans, however, have received loans for franchise purposes. SBA estimates that franchise loans represent approximately five percent of its business loan portfolio and only 1.8 percent of all loans.

SBA does not enter into blanket agreements with franchisors. The Agency does not act as a regulator and does not attempt to set standards or otherwise control franchisors. SBA's role, primarily through the assistance of the private lenders using the Agency's guarantee authority, is to provide opportunities to individual business people.

New business ventures carry with them high risks of failure — and franchises are no exception. Franchises very often are held by men and women making their first start into the business world. Between the banking industry and SBA, an effort is made to determine, in each instance, the reasonable assurance that a loan can be repaid from earnings. In that process, no one is assured of a risk-free environment.

## Crime Stoppers seek young murder suspect

Law enforcement officials throughout the Southwest are continuing their manhunt today for a young murder suspect.

The man, described as a white male in his early 20's, 5-9 to 6-4, with a slender build and blond, curly, collar-length hair, is wanted in connection with the stabbing death of Merle Stice, 58, of Topeka, Kansas.

Stice's body was found in a Tucumcari motel on June 28.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward and the Tucumcari Crime Stoppers Program is adding a \$350 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the unidentified suspect.

Stice apparently was en route to his home in Topeka after leaving Gila Bend, Arizona, on Saturday, June 27. He had been working as an electrical contractor in Los Angeles, California, and told his brother he was going to Phoenix, Arizona, to cash some checks.

Investigators say Stice travelled extensively and was known to carry large amounts of money. Detectives did not


immediately know if the murder suspect worked with Stice or was a hitchhiker picked by the victim. They can place the pair together on Saturday in Arizona and both the victim and the suspect checked in to a Tucumcari motel together on Saturday night about 9:30 p.m.

Detectives declined to specify a motive in the killing, although robbery has not been ruled out. Stice's wallet was missing when his body was found. Also missing was Stice's 1979 red Chevy Luv pickup. It was found June 30 in Amarillo, Texas.

Anyone having any information about the case is asked to call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933, or Tucumcari Crime Stoppers at 461-2160.

Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 32 local Crime Stoppers programs offer cash rewards on a regular basis for information leading to the arrests and indictments of major crime offenders and the capture of felons. The State Crime Stoppers Commission paid cash rewards to six callers last month.

Each Tuesday and Thursday evenings, an average of 50 local ladies (and an occasional man or two) gather at the Ruidoso Gymnastics building to spend 45 minutes stretching, shaking, bending and bouncing their way through a series of simple choreographed routines. The routines are based on jazz dance movements, and are accompanied by

varied musical selections — anything from Willie Nelson to the Beach Boys or Peggy Lee to Leon Redbone. The other important part of the accompaniment is the shouted encouragement of the instructor — in this case, 23-year-old Rosanne Paysour of Alamogordo.

Class participants also get to do some shouting. "All the instructors encourage their students to whoop and holler and scream — really let loose," Paysour said. "The idea is to let the body take over and work overtime while you let your mind take a break."

If it's that much fun, can it really be exercise? The answer is yes, since Jazzercise creator, dancer Judi Sheppard Missett, designs the routines to utilize every part of the body. The 45 minute classes take the students through warmup, progressing to those which challenge the cardio-vascular system, and finally to a "cool down" series. Jazzercise also

concentrates on improving muscular flexibility, coordination, muscle tone and strength.

Jazzercise was first introduced in California, and has spread to all 50 states and ten foreign countries. It is featured in a weekly segment on the P. M. Magazine television program, and has been publicized in the print and broadcast media throughout the country. An enthusiastic response by the President's Council on Physical Fitness at a 1979 presentation was highlighted by the spontaneity of one council member, who was moved to join the demonstration in progress.

Ruidoso participants are equally enthusiastic in their praise of Jazzercise.

"For those of us with office jobs, it's great," according to Sus Donlevy. "You have an opportunity to boot and holler and run around, have a good time, and maybe

lose a couple of inches at the same time."

Donlevy said she's tried exercising on her own, but such programs didn't last long, because, "they're no fun — and Jazzercise is fun. How many people get to go out dancing twice a week? And getting in shape is a by-product of having a good time," she added.

Another participant is Coni Foster, who attends with four or five of her close friends. Foster is one of those who insists, "I hate to exercise."

But it's a different story when it comes to Jazzercise, Foster said. "To me, it's something I do because we laugh a lot — it's not hard to do and there's a lot of pleasure in it.

"If anyone had ever told me I would go and exercise deliberately, I would have told them they were crazy." Her group of friends consists mainly of wives and mothers, and the Jazzercise class is an opportunity to get out and do something,

"just for themselves. The camaraderie is important, too," she said.

After class, Foster said she and her friends like to head for the nearest 7-11 to "get crazy" with a "Diet 7-Up," or, if they've really worked out — an ice cream bar.

Scott Barnett said he enjoys the class because it's "an all-over workout."

He compared the class to yoga, in that each participant can concentrate on their own progress, "and if you mess up, nobody cares."

Barnett, who is a recent graduate of Ruidoso High School, said the class also compares favorably with the organized calisthenics which are part of the curriculum. "It's not repetitive at all — there's always something new," he said. "And no one is standing over you saying 'do your pushups,' or 'you're doing that wrong.'"

Barnett said he also liked the format of the classes. Since he is "working two jobs," and he "doesn't jog or anything," he finds he can "get a full week's worth of exercise in just two days."

In general, Jazzercise instructors are said to expend about three times as much energy during a class as do the participants. The slight of Paysour's healthy six-foot-plus frame is a testament to the beneficial effects of the Jazzercise program. Her style and attitude are also a part of what keeps her local students coming back for more.

"Rosanne's fantastic — she's an inspiration," said Alice Smith. Foster concurred with the description, and said, "She's so vibrant — you watch her and you start to think, this is easy."

Besides, they both admitted, "we keep thinking that if we keep this up, maybe someday we'll look just a little bit like her."

## Jazzercise instructor Paysour calls teaching a 'dream come true'

"SMILE! IT MAKES IT EASIER!"

The Jazzercise craze arrived in Ruidoso last March in the person of Rosanne Paysour of Alamogordo. The 23-year-old North Carolina native is a natural in her newfound occupation.

Instructors must be well versed, not only in the physical motions of the routines, but also in positive reinforcement of their student's performance in class.

Jazzercise is billed as "fitness with flair," and a method of "releasing emotions by keeping in motion," and an instructor like Paysour exemplifies both slogans.

Paysour has inspired a dedicated following here and at her other classes in Capitan and Carrizozo, with a style that is part cheerleader — "Come on — you can DO IT!" mixed with just a little of a drill sergeant — "I can't HEAR YOU!" when she feels the class needs to do some additional "whooping and hollering."

Paysour greets new participants with an admonition to pace themselves, adding, "I allow cheating — as long as you smile."

She keeps the students in an upbeat frame of mind even during the most strenuous routines with such encouraging words — as well as the obvious enjoyment she derives from her work. Applause often follows the completed routine. The ovations are a sign of the students' pride in their own accomplishments, and partly for Paysour's ability to inspire them.

Paysour moved to Alamogordo last August when her husband was assigned to Holloman Air Force Base. Her background includes ten years of dance studios — ballet, jazz, tap, and Scottish dance — starting with a ballet class when she was "five or six" years old. She was also active in sports, but finished her college education with a bachelor's degree in history.

"It's been a dream of mine to teach exercise or find a career where I could be active and work with people," she said. She began attending a Jazzercise class in Alamogordo, and her instructor encouraged her to try for a teaching spot.

Paysour was required to pass a state audition, judged by a group of state instructors, and a national audition held in Denver, Colorado, last February.

Each instructor must purchase a videotape machine, and receives tapes of new routines from Jazzercise creator Judi Sheppard Missett every seven to eight weeks, Paysour said.

Her Ruidoso classes begin at 6:45 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays at the Gymnastics Association building. Classes are also held at 5:15 p.m., Monday and Wednesdays in Carrizozo and at 4:45 Tuesdays and Thursdays in Capitan.

Registration is continuous, and enrollment is by the month or per class.

Of her job, Paysour said, "I love it — it's really rare to find a job you really love doing. It's great to be able to help people improve their physical and mental health, and reap the benefits yourself at the same time.

"When people first come in, they're really inhibited," because few have the

opportunity or necessity of "really moving," in their work and home life.

"It's neat to see a lady come in the first time, covered from head to toe in warmups — and a month later, she'll be on the front row in a hot pink leotard.

"If you feel good physically, you feel good mentally, and when you're feeling good about yourself, the benefits spill over into every part of your life."

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

A portion of the municipal gross receipts tax is to be dedicated toward a specific purpose or area of municipal government services as listed below as to purposes and amount of deduction: General Fund - Section 4. Effective Date. The ordinance date of the Municipal Gross Receipts Tax Ordinance shall be January 1, 1982.

Instead of sorrow, I have a feeling of gratefulness at having this Christian gentleman for a friend, and am thankful that he was so highly appreciated by all of us.

He was like a brother to us, and he truly gave his life for his fellow man — working at his calling of healing long after his own rugged health had begun to fail.

In the higher sense, Dr. Horton has not left us, for he left so much of himself with us. He has left us an example to follow in leading a good life; and he will ever dwell in a fond spot in our hearts.

And we knew right away it was a mistake. The concept wasn't funny or even interesting. Luckily we realized it before going any further." A source close to the show—the first venture of Johnny Carson's new production company—told me: "Angie looked over at the producers and said, 'I was terrible, wasn't I?' " It was obvious to everyone that the show had laid an egg. "It sure looked like it would be a winner. Carson Productions picked the best people in the world to handle it.

**TV BACKSTAGE:** Dean Martin was knocked out by his garage door the other night. He was hit on the head as the door suddenly came crashing down because of an electronic fault. Yet bold Dean soon recovered and drove off later to have dinner with a few buddies at the Beverly Wilshire Hotel. . . .
