

## LADY JOCKEY FIRST TO WIN STAKES RACE HERE

# Pride of Loom wins Norgor

Vickie Smallwood became the first lady jockey to win a stakes race at Ruidoso Downs when she guided Pride of Loom to a front-running victory in Sunday's \$69,624 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity.

Pride of Loom made it look easy, getting a heads-up jump out of the starting gate (from the No. 10 post) and staying in control all the way.

The odds-on favorite, Faneuil Lass, took up the chase eagerly and settled in second place. The two held their positions down the back stretch run of the four furlong dash.

At the turn for home, Pride of Loom let out a few more notches, and that's when Faneuil Lass clearly found herself in a hopeless cause. The filly tried her best to make up ground, but jockey Smallwood asked Pride of Loom for another burst of power, and the 6-1 shot delivered the goods.

The gelding coasted across the finish with an impressive 3 and three-fourths length lead. Faneuil Lass conked out steadily and had little in reserve when she reached the wire.

Pride of Loom clocked the four furlongs in a brisk 46 2/5 seconds, establishing a seasonal record. The gelding is owned by Hugh C. Preston Jr., of Burkburnett, Texas. Bob Arnett does the training.

Pride of Loom enriched himself by \$34,464 and returned betting payoffs of \$15, \$3.40 and \$3.80. The track surface was still wet from heavy rains which fell earlier in the day.

Pride of Loom's easy victory put a lot more shine on his image. Previously, he wound up a well beaten second after opening a four length lead down the backstretch.

Bara Lass, a stablemate of Faneuil Lass, came in third. The two were coupled in the betting and returned \$2.20 to place, \$3 to show. Both fillies are leased by Cleber Massey of Abilene, Texas. Faneuil Lass, who went into the Norgor looking for her third straight win against no defeats, collected \$15,164 for her runnerup effort.

Bara Lass, a coasting winner in the Norgor trials, picked up a paycheck of \$8,271.

Huge What, the second favorite at 5-2, made up ground steadily to finish fourth. The colt earned \$4,135.

Fans who linked Pride of Loom and Faneuil Lass in the quinella collected \$11.20.

Pride of Loom came out of the Norgor with a career record of 3-2-0 from six starts, and earnings of \$39,032.

LATE SCRATCHES reduced the field for Saturday's Peter Hurd Handicap at Ruidoso Downs to only five starters — which seemed to make Glover D. something of a leadpipe cinch.

Ruidoso patrons jumped all over Glover D. and made the gelding a commanding one-to-five favorite in the six furlong spin which offered a total purse of \$11,015.

Since Glover D. had only four foals to worry about, Ruidoso patrons apparently concluded the gelding had the match sewed up — despite the stiff 127 pounds he had to carry.

But Glover D. ran into a buzzsaw in the form of Mr. Powder River, a speedburner who tore out of the gate and fought off the people's choice all the way.

As they turned for home, it was apparent Glover D. had more than he bargained for. That 127 pound load obviously took its toll. As the favorite began to weaken, jockey Leroy Coombs finally applied leather to Mr. Powder River. The 3-1 shot poured on

the coals and put a half length between himself and the favorite. He was much in control when he crossed the finish.

The gelding, who'd won his previous spin by nearly six lengths, packed 119 pounds in the Peter Hurd and picked up a victory paycheck for \$6,743. The gelding is owned by Clarence and Cestine Carpenter of Anthony. The mutuel payoffs: \$8, \$2.20, \$2.20.

Glover D., ridden by Richard Bickel for Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas, earned \$2,472 — which boosted his 1981 money line up to \$43,460. The gelding paid \$2.20 both to place and show.

Reddy Rampart, a 19-1 outsider, finished a distant four and one-half lengths behind Glover D., but that was good enough for a third place purse of \$1,123 and a \$2.20 show piece.

The combination of Mr. Powder River and Glover D. produced a quinella payoff of \$3 even — a seasonal low.

Wagering on the race included a show pool of \$31,003 — of which \$24,577 was bet on Glover D.

## Village adds water, sewer connections

Water connections in Ruidoso totaled 5,015, and sewer connections 2,323, as of June 30, 1981.

For comparative purposes, Ruidoso's population was pegged at 4,284 in the October, 1980, preliminary census count, which also showed a total of 5,418 housing units in the village.

The current water connections reflect an increase of 396 above the 4,619 in 1980 and that was 183 more than the 4,436 in 1979. The two year increase in water meters is 589.

For sewer connections, the increase the past year is 147 over the 2,176 in 1980, which was 342 more than the 1,834 on record in 1979. The total increase in sewer connections for the two years is 489.

## School board meets Tuesday

The Ruidoso Board of Education (BOE) will hold its regular meeting on July 14 at 7:30 p.m., in the Administration Building at the high school.

The BOE will vote on in-state and out-of-state per diem raises, and on approval of the Superintendent Pat Valliant as Director of Finance and Representative for all federal programs and activities.

Bids will be opened on milk products, maintenance of office machines, musical instruments, microfilming services and new office equipment.

## Juveniles charged with officer assault

Two Ruidoso juveniles were arrested early Friday morning, following a disturbance at Two Rivers Park in which a Ruidoso police officer was injured.

Patrolmen Ron Hentges and Bob Kenney answered a call regarding a loud party at the park about 1:30 a.m., and were reportedly "jumped" by a group of about eight juveniles.

During the scuffle, Hentges incurred cuts and bruises, and was treated and released from Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Two juveniles were charged with assault on a police officer, disorderly conduct, allowing self to be served, possession of alcoholic beverages, possession of marijuana and violation of probation.

They were transported to a juvenile detention facility at Carrizozo.

ComFIRE will meet again August 20 at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce building.


## Villages' trustees to meet

## Trainer elated over Pride of Loom

Pride of Loom is a better runner than trainer Bob Arnett is a handicapper.

"When we drew the 10 hole (post position) I was really downhearted," said the veteran conditioner after his Pride of Loom tallied a frontrunning 3 and three-fourths victory in Sunday's Norgor Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

"I talked myself out of thinking I could win with the bad post position," he said. "I guess I'm not much of a handicapper."

Maybe not, but he certainly performed like the expert trainer he is in correcting the Loom gelding's ailing shins.

At Sunland Park, Pride of Loom hurt his left front shin while losing a nose decision

in late April to Plucky Hussy in a Riley Allison Futurity trial race. Plucky Hussy went on to win the prestigious Allison Futurity in early May.

"We fixed his shin and then we ran him here and his right front shin was hurting when he won," Arnett explained. "In the trials (on June 25 for the Norgor Futurity), I tried to baby him. It took a lot of hard work."

"When this horse is right and healthy without shin problems, I don't think there's anything in the world that can outrun him for four furlongs," he said.

Arnett apparently solved the gelding's shins problems. He scooted out in front under fine handling by Vickie Smallwood

to the early lead in the four furlong chase which lured 10 entrants from the four trial races.

She quickly moved Pride of Loom over to the rail as Faneuil Lass, part of a 1-2 favored entry with Bara Lass, started to press. The first quarter was a swift :22.

Around the turn and through the stretch, Pride of Loom drew out in :46 2/5, the fastest four furlong reading at Ruidoso Downs this season.

"Vickie did exactly what I told her. I told her to break him out of there on top and then get over (to the rail). We've never really asked this horse to run on the front end. But when you're going a half-mile and there's that many good speed horses, we had to be up there."

# Irrigation tour held on Hondo valley farms

Thursday's afternoon pasture tour on irrigated acreage on the Elm and Robert MacDaniel and Clem Weindorf farms in the Hondo Valley attracted about 20 persons.

The walking workshop was conducted by Greg Haussler of the Soil Conservation Service for the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District.

Before the tour, Haussler briefly summarized local irrigation practices.

"The Weindorf's use Jose tall wheat grass," said Haussler. "The name is kind of interesting — a fellow named Joe Davis was developing this strain for the Soil Conservation Service at Las Lunas a number of years ago. While he was

working on the project, his Hispanic co-workers called it 'Jose's wheat grass' and the name stuck."

The Jose has the highest protein content of the three main types of pasture grasses used here. (The other two are tall fescue and orchard). But it is also less palatable to cattle.

Jose is the most productive of the three, according to Haussler, with an output of 17,000 pounds of forage per acre. Tall fescue produces 14,000 pounds and orchard grass about 10-12,000 pounds.

The Weindorf's run four head of cattle on the three acres they planted 10 years ago. Haussler said that the pasture could hold twice that many head with added fertilizer. The Herefords graze a week at a time on each of the three plots into which the pasture is divided. When they are

rotated, the grazed plot is irrigated with three inches of water and allowed to rest for two weeks.

"Pasture is most productive when it's treated like a hay crop," said Haussler. "It's also best if you can alternate pasture grazing with rangeland in the surrounding hills, but that's not possible for most irrigated farms in the valley nowadays."


Ernest and Robert MacDaniel's 25 acres are in tall fescue, as is 80 percent of the Hondo Valley's irrigated acreage.

The MacDaniels planted the fescue when they bought the farm back in 1950. "It was just full of cockleburs then," Ernest said. "We were told back then that we were forced to buy the land, because we'd never get rid of the cockleburs."

"But we stayed on top of them and they've never been a problem after the first year or two. The same man who warned us about the place came back. 'First, I'd like to admit I was wrong, and second, why don't you sell me the place?', he said."

The main problems faced by the MacDaniels have been flood related. "I see people building below irrigation ditches all the time now, and that's crazy," said Ernest. "This field was made by floodwaters."

He said that 27 cattle were drowned when a hailstorm and a flood hit the farm on the same day in 1965. Recently they had to build a stone revetment when the river threatened to wash out the bank holding irrigation pipes.

The MacDaniels run a herd of 63 cattle on the 25 acres. They fertilize most years with a 15-20 nitrogen-phosphorous fertilizer. None had been applied this year, but the cattle were still belly deep in fescue.

The farm has also produced a different kind of crop. "My old Apache friends used to tell me, 'We're just newcomers here,'" Ernest said to tour members. "The Pueblos were here a long time before, but the Apaches eventually raided them to death. We've had archeologists come out here to dig up a site. Our old adobe farmhouse was built before people started filtering the clay, and we've found a number of shards in the walls that archeologists have estimated to be 6,000 years old."

**BOLD LOVE**, a chestnut mare owned by Thelma Spencer of Edmond, Oklahoma, outdistanced eight foes in Friday's renewal of the Jet Deck Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The duel covered 440 yards and put \$10,700 on the line. The victory share amounted to \$6,420.

Bold Love, ridden by Steve Harris as a 7-2 shot, broke sharply and drifted to the outside rail. Despite the slightly wayward course, she didn't lose her early lead.

She was about a length on top at the half-way point, then poured it on at the end to hit the wire with a commanding three and one-half length lead. The winning time of 21.84 wasn't too far off the seasonal record of 21.73 (set by Higheasterjet in the Rainbow Derby on July 5).

**SPECIAL EFFORT**, the colt who won the recent \$787,350 Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, won by four and one-half lengths on Thursday's program and set the top qualifying time for the upcoming Rainbow Futurity.

Special Effort gave another knockout

performance, leading from start-to-finish and covering the 400 yards in 20.02 seconds. That was the fastest clocking of the 11 Rainbow elimination heats.

Earlier in the season, Special Effort set the top qualifying time for the Kansas Futurity, then won the finale by a length. On the eve of the Kansas Futurity, the colt was purchased by Dan and Jolene Urachel of Canadian, Texas, for \$1 million. The Kansas is the first leg of the Triple Crown; the Rainbow Futurity is the second leg; the All-American Futurity on Labor Day is the final leg.

The Rainbow, which comes up on July 28, offers a gross purse of about \$658,000 and hands the winner about \$230,000.

After purchasing Special Effort, the Urachels leased the colt to their daughter and son-in-law, Dana and Timothy Guidry, also of Canadian.

In Thursday's spin, Special Effort operated as an overpowering favorite while racking up his fifth straight win against no defeats. He's earned nearly \$270,000 thus far. The colt is trained by Johnnie Goodman. W. R. Hunt is the jockey. Fans who backed Special Effort on Thursday got a low win payoff of \$2.40.



### Homemade Chile

- 5 lbs. cubed beef
- 2 lbs. ground pork
- 1/4 diced onion
- 6 cloves garlic
- 1 tsp. cumin
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 2 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne
- 1 bottle mexene chile powder
- 2 28 oz. canned tomatoes
- 2 15 oz. tomato sauce
- 14 oz. red enchilada sauce
- 2 1/2 cups boiling water
- 1 can beer

Brown meat, onions, garlic in large roaster. When meat is light tan, stir in seasonings. Add boiling water, shred tomatoes by hand. To meat mixture, add tomatoes, sauces, beer. Cook oven low heat 1 1/2 hours. Skim off grease, add 2 cups water and cook 1 hour longer.

Cooked pinto or red beans may be added the last ten minutes of cooking.

When cooked in large amounts this may be frozen and also save fuel.

Since I came to Ruidoso people have been telling me what a big pro football town it is.

Not that this fact makes Ruidoso unique by any means. Almost anywhere in mid-July people start talking about the real "national pastime" and with the number of tourists from the Lone Star State it should be almost expected that pro football has a popular foothold in this town.

Thus people are bound to be interested in what Peterson's 1981 Annual Pro Football magazine has to say.

Since that publication is in its 21st year, whatever is said between its covers usually has some basis for it.

But some of its National Football League predictions for the upcoming season seemed to lack logic.

And the numerous Dallas Cowboy and Houston Oilers fans in the Ruidoso area will probably find plenty at fault with these predictions.

In Rich Kucner's article on the American Conference outlook he sees the Oilers finishing last or fourth (whatever sounds best) in the Central Division.

Considering that Houston finished with an 11-5 record and tied Cleveland for first (The Browns were declared champs by way of the complicated NFL setup for breaking ties) in the division it would seem Kucner's prediction has no basis.

Kucner has Pittsburgh coming back to snare the division title, with Cleveland second and Cincinnati third ahead of the Oilers.

Sure, the Central Division is a well-balanced one with no really great team or a really poor one either. But the Oilers have been a steady winner for several years and it wasn't all because of Bum Phillips.

Any team with the great Earl Campbell and the veteran arm of Ken Stabler has to be considered a contender for the division title. Sure, Stabler had a bad year last season but I saw him rally Oakland back from certain defeat too many times when he was with the Raiders to brush him off as a has-been.

I see Houston making the playoffs this season as a first place or wild card team. The Oilers don't have enough balance to go all the way but last place? No way.

Another (strange) prediction in the AFC has Oakland, the defending Super Bowl champions finishing third in the Western Division behind San Diego and Kansas City.

The Raiders just managed to make the playoffs last season as a wild card team but then they still tied for first with San Diego, each team ringing up an 11-5 record.

Oakland has had a winning tradition too long to suddenly fall from a Super Bowl championship to third place, regardless of what happens in the furor over the possible move to Los Angeles.

The Raiders have a nice combination of experience and youth and that should help them even more this time around. Plus quarterback Jim Plunkett has gotten over his confidence-shattering experiences at New England and San Francisco.

But the biggest reason the Raiders will win their division is that the Chargers have the bad habit of losing the big game, especially against Oakland.

Peterson's predictions for the National Conference have Philadelphia winning the Eastern Division and conference titles again with the Cowboys coming up second on both counts.

Apparently a lot of people go along with this reasoning, despite the fact that Dallas was supposed to be rebuilding last year and yet still tied the Eagles with a 12-4 record.

But this season will be all Dallas. The Cowboys, more than any other NFL team, with the possible exception of the Raiders, have the knack of winning close games in the last few minutes.

In last year's NFC championship game the Eagles didn't give Dallas a chance to do this because they controlled the ball behind Wilbert Montgomery's finest game.

But Dallas has too many offensive tools, with Danny White coming into his own as a star at quarterback and Tony Dorsett a standout at running back, to lose again.

Plus that defensive line the Cowboys throw at quarterbacks can win games by itself.

Look for the Cowboys to win the Eastern Division and go on to make the Super Bowl. The Eagles will make the playoffs and beat the Rams in the wild card game but will fall to Atlanta. Dallas, of course will beat Central Division winner Detroit and then topple the Falcons in the conference finals.

Who will be the Cowboys' opponent in the Super Bowl?

None other than the Los Angeles, I mean, Oakland Raiders, who will topple New England for the AFC crown.

As to who wins the 1982 Super Bowl. Read about it here in January.

## Karate used as a pure art form

To most people the very word karate symbolizes lethal power and life-killing quickness.

But to the serious karate student karate is really an art, where one can gain self-confidence and find new ways to relax.

Such is the case in Terry Sanders' karate class at the Ruidoso Gymnastics Academy every Wednesday night.

"I teach karate as an art and as self-defense, not for people who want to be killers," Sanders said as his class went through warm-ups recently. "The class gives people a chance to learn to relax and develop self-confidence."

There are seven people in Sanders' class and they are in various stages of karate training.

Mike Herrera, who has been in Sanders' class for a year, has a green belt and is the highest-level student in the class. The youngest is seven-year-old Drew Moorman who is very advanced for his age, according to Sanders.

"Seven is about the minimum age I would take," said Sanders. "Usually I don't like to take kids unless they are at least 10. But Drew is a different case. He's very mature for his age. Some kids twice his age aren't as mature as he is."

Sanders thinks that Kung-Fu movies and other karate-type TV and movie shows have hurt the sports' image.

"I want people who are serious about karate," Sanders said. "Not those who are in it just for the kicks."

The class begins each session with warm-ups to loosen their bodies. Bendovers exercises and head bobbing help the student get ready for the class.

After the warm-ups the class goes into various types of exercises. One such exercise is kumite, which means simple fighting. One type of kumite is freestyle movements in which the students go into slow motion without actually hitting each other. Sanders calls it 90-year-old freestyle because of the slow motion movements.

"I can teach it in fast-motion too," Sanders said. "It's just that most of my students are still learning and it's easier to teach it this way."

As the students gain experience they progress in the quality of their movements.

"The more a student does an exercise the better he or she gets at it," said Sanders. "As they get more experienced they take on more complicated movements."

When students start out in Sanders' class they are given a white belt. As they progress they can go all the way to the black belt, which Sanders himself has.

But Sanders says that most people don't realize that anybody can learn karate, even older people.

"I'm trying to get more people involved," he said. "Almost anybody can learn it."

## Moffat likes soccer's future

While admitting that the turnout was a little disappointing ex-Dallas Tornado star Bobby Moffat sees a bright future for youth soccer in the Ruidoso area after his "Techniques Soccer Camp" ended last Friday.

The camp, which was conducted at White Mountain School, drew around 35 kids from the area and lasted five days.

"Last year we had kids from Alamogordo come here and this year we split the camp up so perhaps the turnout here wasn't that bad," said Moffat. "And the potential here for soccer is good."

The youths were taught the various fundamentals of the round ball sport, shown films and then allowed to participate in several games.

"Dallas has the biggest program in Texas and the southwest," said Moffat.

On Friday, the last day of the clinic, the kids were shown films, participated in one-on-one contests and then played two games inside the gym.

Moffat, who has conducted soccer clinics in the Texas and New Mexico area, said soccer development in Ruidoso is as far along as it is in most areas of comparable size and population.

"It's (Ruidoso) equal to most areas in New Mexico where soccer is still relatively undeveloped," he said. "How far the area will go depends on how much exposure the sport gets and how many people start to show an interest in the sport. Some world-class soccer is televised on ESPN locally and that helps get the sport exposed."

But areas like Dallas, California, Seattle, St. Louis and Washington, D. C., generally have the highest quality and quantity of youth soccer in the United States, according to Moffat.

"Dallas has the biggest program in Texas and the southwest," said Moffat.

"Areas like Houston aren't quite as developed yet but have some good teams and are strong in ethnic soccer leagues."

"Seattle is also a strong area because it has a good pro program and lots of youth leagues in the area," he said. "California has a very strong overall program and it has lots of areas which are very strong in soccer."

Moffat and his assistants conducted a morning camp in Alamogordo every day before coming up to Ruidoso for the afternoon clinic.

"I think some people thought it might be too hot here to go to a camp in the afternoon," Moffat said. "But Ruidoso doesn't usually get that hot so the weather here was almost ideal."

Butch Grantham, director of the Ruidoso Sertoma Soccer Association, will conduct youth signups starting August 1. Anyone

wanting to play soccer can contact Grantham at Morgan Mountain Sports.

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## Warrior duo nominated for A-A

# Americans like ice cream

This year Americans will eat their way through an astonishing 1.25 billion gallons of ice cream. That's a frozen, flavored mountain 500 feet square at the base and taller than the Empire State Building.

People sip it in sodas, spoon it in parfaits and sundaes, lick it in cones and nibble it on sticks. They'll consume it in hundreds of flavors and combinations.

Ice cream, in one form or another, has a long history of giving pleasure. Iced confections were enjoyed through all of recorded history and their popularity has increased steadily.

Few foods, with the possible exception of bread, are more acceptable to people of varying tastes, climates and cultures.

Ice cream has long since ceased to be strictly a hot weather treat. In the United States it has become a staple. The average American eats 23 quarts of ice cream, ice milk and sherbet each year.

The whole delicious thing started long before the Christian Era. Borden Ellis, Extension dairy specialist for New Mexico State University, said ice cream was probably not invented, but evolved from

chilled wines and other beverages that were popular centuries ago.

In the fourth-century B.C., Alexander the Great is reported to have been fond of iced drinks. Marco Polo returned to Italy from China in the 13th century with a recipe that contained milk along with the usual juices, fruits and flavoring. He reported such ices had been made in Asia for thousands of years.

Ice cream was introduced into the American colonies as early as 1700 when a caterer named Phillip Fysic announced in a New York newspaper that he was prepared to supply the gentry with various confections, including ice cream.

George Washington doted on the dessert. In the summer of 1790, he bought more than \$200 worth from a New York shop. He later had two ice cream freezers installed at Mount Vernon.

The ordinary citizen of the new United States didn't know much about ice cream until Dolly Madison came along. She served it for the first time in the White House to guests at her husband's second inaugural in 1809.

Dolly's frozen desserts were so delectable they were described in mouth-watering detail in newspaper social columns.

Since those early days, a dramatic evolution has taken place in the ice cream industry. The most significant change is the tremendous increase in factory-made ice cream novelties — ice cream on a stick, in bars, cups and sandwiches. Some of them happened quite by accident.

It was around 1874 when soda water became a popular drink and was thought to give one health, vitality and long life. Soda shops started up all over the country, selling flavored versions of the bubbly water. This drink was the basis of the ice cream soda.

The story goes that a concessionaire at the Franklin Institute celebration in Philadelphia ran out of flavoring for his soda water, so he bought some ice cream to melt down and add as flavoring.

Customers were buying at such a rate that he did not have time to melt the ice cream and started serving it in chunks with soda water. This new drink was a hit

with the hungry public and the ice cream soda was born.

The ice cream cone, along with apple pie and hot dogs, has become a national symbol and is celebrating its 75th birthday this year. The portable confection was introduced to the population at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in 1904 at St. Louis, Missouri. That was also the time ice cream was becoming the rage nationally as a dessert.

Americans now consume five billion ice cream sticks and four billion cones a year. In spite of all the novel methods developed over the years to introduce ice cream to a hungry public, probably no invention did more to expand the nation's taste for the icy confection than the hand-turned ice cream freezer.

It was originally dreamed up by a young genius named Nancy Johnson in 1846. Since the commercial ice house was already well established in most large towns, the new ice cream was in demand wherever there was ice available in summer months.

The hand-turned freezer's arrival on the national scene made it possible for every family in the land to become acquainted with, and to enjoy, the special qualities of ice cream.

One thing remains constant about ice cream — the popularity of vanilla. Year in and year out, it accounts for about half of all sales. Chocolate is second with about 13 percent and strawberry is third with about seven percent.

Nobody really knows how many flavors share the remaining 30 percent. However, in the past decade more than 240 flavors have been manufactured in the United States and new flavors keep popping up all the time.

There is only one good reason to make or eat ice cream — pure pleasure. Nobody eats it for nutrition or body building. It is eaten primarily to please the taste buds and any other senses involved in eating.

## POW/MIA recognition day set

Veterans Administration (VA) facilities in Colorado, Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico will observe National POW/MIA Recognition Day-1981 July 17 to honor former prisoners of war and those still missing in action.

Appropriate ceremonies or observances at many of the VA medical centers, regional offices and Vietnam vet centers will be linked in the four states and elsewhere with individuals, veterans service organizations and/or such groups as American Ex-Prisoners of War, Intermountain Barbed Wire Club, Bataan Veterans Association, Survivors of Wake, Guam and Cavite, National League of Families and POW/MIA, said VA officials. Special VA outreach also has been initiated. In Colorado, about 600 claims folders have been identified by the VA as those of former prisoners of war who reside there. Those folders are being reviewed to see whether those former POWs are receiving all the veterans benefits to which they are entitled and may need, said Norm Alverson, director, Denver VA Regional Office.

On recognizing former POWs and the MIAs, President Ronald Reagan said: "Brave men and women who have fought

for our country should always be proud of their courage and honor on the battlefield. And it's fitting that we pay this special tribute to those who so heroically endured the hardships and torture of enemy captivity... Just the thought of the terrible pain that they suffered and endured should be seared in our memories forever.

"Let us remember too, that six years after American involvement in Vietnam in the war, we still don't have a full accounting of our missing servicemen from that conflict — an accounting that was guaranteed in the Paris Peace Accords that brought the fighting there to an end — an agreement which has been violated."

Later, in his proclamation of National POW/MIA Recognition Day-1981, the President said: "Throughout American history our prisoners of war have been called upon to make uncommon sacrifices. In fulfilling their duty as citizens of the United States, they have defended American ideals while suffering unimaginable indignities under the absolute control of the enemy. They remained steadfast even while their

treatment contravened international understandings and violated elementary considerations of compassion and morality.

"All Americans ought to recognize the special debt we owe to our fellow citizens who, in the act of serving our nation, relinquished their freedom that we might enjoy the blessings of peace and liberty. Likewise, we must remember the unresolved casualties of war — our servicemen who are still missing. The pain and bitterness of war endure for their families, relatives and friends — and for all of us. Our nation will continue to seek answers to the many questions that remain about their fate."

## Saving certificate regulations change

Many people have money locked into saving certificates that are paying lower interest rates than other types of savings or investments. However, early withdrawal penalties may make it impractical to switch the funds.

In the past two years, regulators have changed the rules twice for early withdrawals. Deciding which rules apply to an individual savings certificate depends on when the certificate was purchased, says Jackie Martin, Extension family finance specialist for New Mexico State University.

For certificates of deposit purchased before July 1, 1979, and not extended or renewed since that date, the penalty is forfeiture of three months' interest on the amount of deposit, plus the reduction of the interest rate to the savings deposit rate on the balance of the amount of deposit to the date the certificate was purchased.

For certificates renewed or extended on or after July 1, 1979, but before June 2, 1980, the penalty is forfeiture of three

months' interest for certificates with maturity terms of less than one year, or forfeiture of six months' interest for certificates with maturity terms of one year or longer.

For certificates purchased, renewed, or extended on or after June 2, 1980, the penalty is forfeiture of six months' interest for certificates with maturity terms of one year or longer, forfeiture of three months' interest for less than one year maturities, and forfeiture of all interest for certificates of less than three months' maturity term.

These penalties apply regardless of how long a certificate may have been on deposit. If a deposit is withdrawn too soon, the penalty could include part of the principal.

A bank may assess a greater penalty if it chooses; however, banks are legally required to describe exactly what the penalty is for early withdrawal.

Banks must allow early withdrawal upon death of any owner of a time deposit, or if any owner of a time deposit has been declared incompetent by a court. Regulations permit withdrawal without penalty, but some institutions may enforce it.

Banks need not apply penalties when allowing early withdrawal for time deposits if the deposit is an Individual Retirement Account or Keogh account and the person for whose benefit the account is maintained is 59½ or older, or has become legally disabled.



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

**When Is An Outlaw  
Not An Outcast?**

This message is being sent to you on July nine with all the world turning greener by the hour, after still another good rain, after several previous benedictions from the sky.

And these words will reach you on July thirteen. And the next day, the fourteenth, at about eleven o'clock at night, it will be one hundred years to the day and the hour that Billy The Kid stumbled into an ambush that was not meant to be an ambush: a group of men who had been hunting him, yet did not expect to find him at that hour so late and dark.

It was at this accidental meeting that the Kid met his death. (So they say.) Earlier this year, back in April, it was the one hundredth anniversary of the Kid's last escape. (Or can we be sure that it was his last?)

So, soon now we begin presenting "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid" the annual historical pageant held every year the first week end in August. Betty Schreengost says we might begin practicing around the fifteenth.

Since the pageant turns the clock back an even one hundred years, your mind naturally drifts back to those days and you ponder what difference there may be in those times and these.

To those traveling west to territorial Lincoln County (then the size of the state of Indiana) the government made it clear that they would be defended against the Apache Indians, if that were possible, and that the rest of the way they were on their own. Therefore, they were advised to follow the custom of that day and time to go armed at all times.

Therefore, the carrying of a gun or pistol did not make one an outlaw. And furthermore, in a land such as this, where was the law for a person to be "out" of? After all, it was pretty much "every man for himself, and the devil for them all" as the old Texas Trail Driver said of the land "beyond the Red River."

Still, there were the laws of God and the unwritten laws of our lives which spring therefrom. It was easy to fall into trouble, and many, The Kid included, found it difficult to escape a troubled life.

The Kid in his youth, his boyhood in fact, in defense of his life, killed a man who was about to kill him. This led to other trouble which could brand him an outlaw.

After The Lincoln County War, in which The Kid had been merely a fighter on the side of one of the factions — after refusing, unlike all the rest, to accept the offer of Governor Lew Wallace to go free if he would lay down his arms — after refusing

this because he was bitter at the death of his friends, and also realizing he would be killed if he went unarmed — then the Kid did become in fact a true outlaw.

Yet he was never an outcast. Far from it. Even at the height of his outlawry, he was welcomed practically wherever he might go, especially by the Hispanic people, to whom he was a real benefactor and champion.

For The Kid was true to certain rules of the code of honor of the west.

**A Word About  
Then and Now**

Today we can hardly pick up the newspaper without reading about crimes almost too horrible to mention; and of school pupils and other youths wreaking damage and destruction.

Since The Kid is the most colorful character of the American West, a sincere study has been made of his life.

It is known that in school in Silver City, The Kid and his fellow students did not try to tear the place down. On the other hand it is documented that The Kid was very helpful with the chores around the school, and respectful and well behaved at all times. Attacks upon teachers or destruction of property were as distant from the minds of these children as night is from day.

Even the most hardened gun man would not think of being disrespectful to a woman, much less harm her — and they would not even use rough language in their presence. And such a thing as harming a child was unheard of. Old people were respected.

Therefore, if there were such a person as would commit the ghastly crimes we hear of every day, he certainly would not last long.

As we look back over the one hundred years to the days of our pioneer forefathers, what are the thoughts that come to our minds?

Are some valued traditions slipping away from us? Do we need to look back and renew our devotion to the principles that made this nation great?

**The Kid, What  
Was He Like?**

Some day when they get the science of judging character from handwriting down to a fool-proof exact science, then we will have a chance to examine completely the character of Billy The Kid. For there are many examples of his hand writing over at the old courthouse at Lincoln.

The handwriting itself to one side, the actual thought content of the letters has been said to be that of "a clear thinker."

The nearest you can come to knowing a man without actually being acquainted with him is to know his friends. When I was a teen ager here in the early days I was acquainted with some of The Kid's best friends. And these proved to be some of the best friends I and my family ever had.

The original intent of the Pageant was to honor the pioneers of the Southwest; and the show is still intended to be a tribute to our forefathers of the frontier.

A very serious and sincere effort, through the years, has been made to make the show as authentic in every way as possible.

The show is in a class by itself, being the only Western pageant that takes place on the exact spot upon which the real dramas took place. It is a true community undertaking in the old pioneer spirit. And the public has been most appreciative and generous through the years.

Come over and help us turn the clock back, exactly one hundred years, in honoring the spirits of our pioneer forefathers, whose hard work and faith in God, paved the way to make this one of the best places to live in the entire world.

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
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# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Ellenberger walked. There are those of us in New Mexico who feel the famous basketball coach of the University of New Mexico, having been found guilty on 21 of 22 felony counts, should have received at least a little imprisonment.

We think that a year of unsupervised probation is hardly any punishment at all. We might be so suspicious as to ask what would have happened if someone less well-known had been in this fix. We might even make so bold as to conclude that those whose faces have not been on the telly and in the papers could well have gone to the pokey.

Ellenberger didn't. He got off. Though he says he still intends to appeal, because he doesn't believe he is guilty of anything, he came out of all this with no lasting punishment, no major inconvenience and little real suffering.

Hardly an example of the notion that in the U. S. A. punishment should follow crime.

And why did he get off so lightly? Well, Judge Phil Balamonte of Albuquerque, not notably given to letting those who break the law go unpunished, said it was because Ellenberger wasn't the only one who offended.

That seems to lack something in logic. Isn't that a little like considering a member of the Mafia who has committed crimes, and saying, "I'll have to let you off because there are others in your organization worse than you, who have not yet been apprehended and charged?"

If Ellenberger gets off with no punishment for things he was charged with and found guilty of, what motivation is there to prosecute — let's say, just for example — his boss, Bud Davis, head of the University of New Mexico?

To refuse any meaningful punishment in this case was in effect to make all those others who might conceivably also be involved feel safe and sound.

So Norman walks. He suffered some, admittedly. He lost his job. He had the long period of time while he waited to be judged — though, on the basis of his own evidence, that caused him little worry; he kept telling us how sure he was of his baptismal innocence.

Now, Judge Balamonte may have acted on certain ideas.

For instance, he may have felt that Ellenberger's career as a basketball coach is effectively ended. That's probably true. The judge may also have felt that having to pay Leon Taylor's legal fees might be enough to impoverish the ex-coach for many years to come. That's probably true as well.

But the fact is that this case is another example of the reality that our judicial system does not very well handle white-collar crime.

Would a guilty black have gotten this kind of slap on the wrist? Would a Hispanic?

No, don't turn away from those questions.

They are real. They are valid. This guy, who, in real life and on the stand in the courtroom, gives some evidence of being incapable of feeling guilt, who would like us to believe all that he has done is break some arbitrary rules of the NCAA — this guy walked.

Do you feel good about that? Does that make you believe our system of justice is equally operative for all?

If not, join those of us who think events in an Albuquerque courtroom in recent days have been more than a little distasteful. "Disgraceful" might well be the word.

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## Sense & Nonsense

Federal assistance programs to state and local communities are too complex, too burdensome, and too wasteful. Reform in the current system is long overdue and suggestions have ranged from total federal control of all grant programs (categorical) to total local control (special revenue sharing).

Block grants are a common sense approach which fit somewhere in between. Although just recently proposed by President Reagan as part of his economic recovery program, they are not new ideas. I had a direct part in shaping legislation for three of the five block grant programs now in existence — Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA), Community Development and Social Services. I also led the fight for two other block grant proposals, consolidating nutrition and education programs, which unfortunately were defeated.

This is why I support President Reagan in his efforts to consolidate categorical

grants, making them flexible, and let local government, mayors and governors who are elected officials, administer them within broad national goals.

The Senate Omnibus Reconciliation Bill has proposed seven block grant programs which are estimated to save approximately \$2 billion in FY 1982. They include Social Services, Community Service, Health Services, Maternal and Child Health, Preventive Health Services, Home Energy, and Elementary and Secondary Education Grants.

The Senate Bill achieves substantial reduction in Federal control over nearly 100 education, health, and social service programs. It increases the states' flexibility in delivery of services, while reducing the paperwork burden and administrative overhead costs. Best of all, the existing categorical programs, under the Senate proposal, will not simply disappear and be swallowed up in a massive block grant, but will allow for an orderly and gradual transition to state control, while providing safeguards for existing functional areas.

Admittedly, block grants are only at a proposal stage in the legislative process and there is a long, hard road ahead before any block grant proposal becomes a reality. The House has to this point rejected any block grant proposals. While its members believe that the federal grant program should be simplified and the "red tape" associated with it reduced, they argue that national goals will not be met.

This, in short, is the major argument against the block grant approach. The Federal government, these Congressmen argue, has the direct responsibility to guarantee that federal money is used wisely.

The distrust of state government inferred in this argument is archaic thinking. State governments have improved dramatically from the time of the New Deal when it appeared that only the federal government could deliver these services. State governments can and should be expected to take on more responsibility. Local governments — and local interest groups — must learn to work more closely with governors and state legislatures in addressing local needs.

The Senate bill is a modest approach to block grant legislation, giving enough time for transition so that local administrations can set up their structure to deal directly with the local agencies involved. Restrictions also include detailed reporting of programs, which will all be published for public review. This will insure that block grant money will be used for the general national purpose, as intended by Congress. Money spent on items not defined in the broad national goals would be illegal and would require repayment by the state or local government found in violation.

The time has come to try something new, because the old system is not working. Block grants are not a miracle, or a panacea that will instantly make all federal programs improve dramatically, but they are a step in the right direction. The federal government is reducing the funding for federal grant programs to states and local communities so we can get the federal budget under control. We in Congress must give the states and local communities the opportunity to get their own fiscal houses in order, by allowing them to more efficiently distribute Federal dollars through the block grant approach.

### editorial

Thanks to Judge Phillip Balamonte's convictions on how collegiate sports operate, former UNM coach Norm Ellenberger's conviction on 21 counts of fraud and making false public vouchers doesn't even add up to a slap on the wrist.

Ellenberger doesn't have to serve any time, doesn't have to make restitution or pay a fine.

In explaining his sentencing of Ellenberger, who was found guilty of those 21 counts by a jury, Judge Balamonte said: "I'm being asked to sentence a man who was only one cog in the entire machine called college ball. I'm being asked to sentence a man because he got caught, not because his conduct was unacceptable."

And here we'd always thought that what you got caught at is what mattered.

There are two developments, following Ellenberger's conviction, that are interesting. The UNM Board of Regents immediately released a prepared statement absolving UNM President William E. Davis of any complicity in the scandal, and Davis issued a statement saying he never had any advance knowledge of illegal actions in the sports program.

Makes you wonder how much after the fact knowledge he was privy to.

In view of the success of Ellenberger's recruiting program, to entice good basketball players to enroll in UNM, and due to his success as a coach, we wonder how it would be possible that Davis was unaware of how UNM's recruiting program was handled.

Makes you wonder what UNM's Board of Regents uses as criteria to judge the competence of their chief administrator. —CD

## Some are loafers, but animals do perform some jobs better than man

Since prehistoric times, humans have domesticated and trained animals to help them perform onerous chores. It started with cavemen training dogs to help in the hunt, and today people are still dreaming up new schemes to make animals do their dirty work, according to the National Wildlife Federation.

Over the years pigeons, especially, have been found to be cooperative workers. "During the four-month Prussian siege of Paris in 1870, pigeons carried hundreds of thousands of official and private messages to and from the outside world," says the National Wildlife Federation's bimonthly publication. "The messages were inserted in a small goose quill and attached by waxy silken thread to the strongest tail feather."

During World War II British forces dropped pigeons in baskets from airplanes so that local residents could retrieve them, attach any information that might be of interest to allied forces and then release the birds. After circling the area once or twice the pigeons would head for home, perhaps hundreds of miles away.

Researchers now think pigeons may have a future as assembly line inspectors—checking for defects in drug capsules or electronic equipment, for example. Human inspectors tend to make errors about 15 percent of the time, whereas pigeons make errors only one percent of the time, one psychologist found.

"And they don't get bored," adds National Wildlife. "Studies have found that they can remain on the job for three days straight without sacrificing accuracy. The birds do loaf on the job though, so most pigeon projects call for three birds inspecting in tandem, each a check on the others."

The technique used in training pigeons and other animals is called positive

reinforcement, developed by B. F. Skinner, the famed behaviorist. It involves using food as a reward—when, for instance, a pigeon spots a defective drug capsule—and ignoring wrong behavior. Animals are not starved; the reward is part of a daily ration.

British submarine commanders employed this technique during World War II. Their submarines would release large amounts of bread in the water, and gulls would flock to it. After a while, the birds gathered naturally at the sight of a long, dark shadow sliding underwater. Spotters ashore alerted the authorities. No one knows how many German U-boats fell victim to a flock of hungry gulls.

Positive reinforcement has also been used to train macaques, short-tailed monkeys, to harvest coconuts from the tallest palms in the fields of southern Thailand. And in Boston, a capuchin monkey named Heliion does household chores for a 24-year-old man who is paralyzed from the shoulders down as a result of a car accident. Heliion can turn on the lights, put cassettes into a tape recorder, retrieve food from the refrigerator and feed her owner.

The military has a long history of putting animals to work. In one battle with the Romans, Hannibal set elephants in his front lines, ready to charge. His plan backfired, however. Spooked by trumpets and irritated by the enemies' darts, the elephants turned and stampeded into their own cavalry.

Today, the United States Coast Guard is training pigeons to spot orange, yellow, and red—the colors of life jackets, buoys, rafts, and flags. The pigeons will be carried in a plexiglass bubble beneath a helicopter and will peck at an electrical switch when they see these colored objects floating on the ocean below.

The Navy, meanwhile, has long used sea lions and other marine mammals to

retrieve or deliver objects at great depths. "Apparently," says National Wildlife, "They work better than humans, who require—scuba—gear—decompression chambers, medical personnel, good weather, and a few days to complete a mission."

A Navy porpoise has carried tools and messages to aquanauts in a lab 200 feet below, off the California coast. Sea lions have recovered antisubmarine test rockets at depths of 490 feet. And a killer whale has been trained to recover dummy torpedoes from depths of 1,600 feet.

During World War I, pigeons were commonly used as "spies," carrying messages back and forth across enemy lines. Whenever the Germans occupied new territory, they made it a practice to destroy all the pigeons in the area. An estimated one million Belgian pigeons were captured or killed in that war. Probably the most famous was Cher Ami, a plucky British racing pigeon. When an American battalion advanced too far ahead of its lines, it was surrounded, and neither humans nor birds could get through heavy fire to report the battalion's location. The last hope was Cher Ami.

"Through the fusillade of fire, the little racing pigeon rose, heading for home carrying the vital information," recounts National Wildlife. "Suddenly, a burst of shrapnel ripped its leg. But it didn't stop. Gaily, it flew on, reaching the base in 25 minutes. The message, attached to the wounded leg, hung from a few shreds of snew."

Today, Cher Ami's stuffed body is on display at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D. C. A real war hero, it serves as a reminder of the amazing feats animals can be trained to perform for humans.

## California wool show topped by New Mexico sheep ranchers

New Mexico's sheep ranchers dominated the individual judging classes and walked off with the major best-of-show awards at the 1981 California World Show June 22-26 in Orland, California.

New Mexico won first place for the best group of seven fleeces. The statewide entry was made up of fleeces from three wool producers who were not identified. Tony Treat, Roswell area rancher, was a

triple winner in overall show categories. He won plaques for the supreme grand champion fleece, the grand champion ram fleece, and the best ram fleece.

The A. D. Jones Estate, Tatum, was a double winner. The Jones ranch won plaques for the most valuable fleece from a manufacturer's point of view, and for the best ewe fleece from a flock of 350 or more. Ernest Perez, Encino, was the other

overall show winner with the best prepared group of three purebred fleeces.

Treat and the Jones ranch were also divisional winners. Treat had the champion ram fleece in the purebred division, and the Jones ranch had the reserve champion ewe fleece in that division.

The Jones ranch also had the reserve champion purebred market fleece in the commercial division.

In the commercial market ewe division, Joyce Brothers, Picacho, posted a one-two finish with the champion and reserve champion fleeces.

New Mexico ranchers dominated the individual classes in the purebred and commercial divisions.

Ernest Perez and Chris Perez, Encino, were first and third in the Rambouillet ram class. Ernest Perez also had the first and third place entries in the Rambouillet ewe class.

The top four places in the Debouillet ram class were won by New Mexico ranchers with Tony Treat, first; Twin Butte Sheep Co., Picacho, second; A. D. Jones Estate, third; and Goodrum Brothers, Roswell, fourth.

The A. D. Jones Estate and Goodrum Brothers were first and second in the Debouillet ewe class.

The Debouillet sheep is a cross of the Delaine and Rambouillet breeds, originally developed on the A. D. Jones Estate ranch, and now recognized as an individual breed. It has been known for several years for wool quality.

In the purebred commercial division, Ernest Perez took first and third for fine combing ewe fleece. The Jones ranch and Goodrum Brothers were first and second in the half-blood combing ewe fleece class.

Walter Overton, Yeso, took second place in the fine combing fleece class of the commercial market ewe division. Joyce Brothers were first and second in the half-blood combing class, followed by the F. V. Cauhape Ranch, Hope, third; and Diamond A Cattle Co., Roswell, fourth.

Jim Sachse, Extension sheep specialist at New Mexico State University, helped prepare the New Mexico entries for the California Wool Show.

Sachse said, "This is an excellent showing in a highly competitive show, and it reinforces the reputation for wool quality coming off New Mexico ranches."

New Mexico sheep ranchers also dominated the National Western Wool Show in Denver in January, winning that show's sweepstakes award for the 13th consecutive year.

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# Killers, burglars, sought

What is the cost of a human life? In the case of Joe P. Baca, it apparently was the cost of two guns and some fancy grips.

Baca, an employee of United Nuclear Corporation, was gunned down in his Grants home by intruders on December 11, 1979. Today, the case remains unsolved.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission and the Uranium Country Crime Stoppers Program each are offering up to \$1,000 for information leading to the solution of Baca's murder.

Grants Police Department investigators said in their report that the victim's son, Claudio Baca, discovered his father's body around 3:40 a.m., on December 12. He had been shot several times with a high caliber weapon.

Detectives reported that when they were called to the murder scene, a white blanket was found in the hallway containing two rifles and a Polaroid camera and case.

Additionally, two handguns were missing from the Baca residence. One was a .38 caliber Smith and Wesson model 15 revolver with a serial number 23K8978. The gun had some fancy pearl handles with inlaid turquoise and a medallion. Also missing was a F.I.E. .22 caliber revolver with plastic grips. The gun's serial number was A15889. Neither weapon has been located.

Who killed Joe Baca? What happened to the missing guns? Anyone having any information about either of these questions is asked to call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-4933, or Uranium Country Crime Stoppers at 287-8400. In either case, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Elsewhere around New Mexico, Crime Stoppers programs are offering cash rewards for information solving the following crimes:

—The March 28 burglary to the Carnegie Library Restaurant at 123 West Third Street in Roswell. ## Tips on tipping while traveling

If women wonder why service in restaurants is poor, it may be because women generally don't tip as well as men. According to restaurant owners, women are not generous, even when service has been excellent.

One restaurant owner estimates women tip less than men 90 percent of the time. Another owner said some women don't tip at all, while men always tip. A travel agent noted that women travel agents sometimes fail to tip when they should.

Women also tend to tip less in groups than when they are alone or in pairs. An example cited was a group of women eating together at a restaurant where the bill came to \$80.

Someone in the group suggested a \$5 tip, a meager six percent and far below the standard 15 percent.

Many people do not realize waitresses and waiters are paid less than the minimum wage because tips are supposed to supplement their salary, said Jackie Martin, Extension family finance specialist for New Mexico State University. Martin has some guidelines for tipping.

In restaurants the waiter or waitress usually gets 15 percent, but expect to tip 20 percent in large cities or resort areas. The tip is figured on the amount of the bill before tax is added.

The bartender or cocktail waitress gets 15 percent of the tab. If a wine steward's services are used at dinner, he usually receives 15 percent.

Taxi drivers normally get 15 percent of the fare.

In most hotels and motels, the maid is usually not tipped unless the person or family stays several days. An average tip would be \$1 or for two or three days, more if longer.

Room service tips are usually 15 percent of the items delivered. The bellman expects 50 cents a bag with a minimum tip of \$1. Hotel courtesy van drivers that meet guests at the airport usually receive \$1, or more if there are several bags to handle.

Airport skycabs also receive 50 cents for each bag handled, but the general rule has been no tipping for curbside check-in. However, experienced travelers say the trend is to tip 25 cents or 35 cents a bag for curbside check-in. Airline personnel, such as flight attendants, are not tipped.

On guided tours where there is a tour guide and bus driver, tip the tour guide 50 cents for each person in the group for a half-day tour, and \$1 for each person on an all-day tour. The bus driver's tip is usually \$1 per person. Where the bus driver doubles as the tour guide, tips should follow the recommendation for the tour guide.

A travel agent is the best source of information about proper tipping amounts in special circumstances, such as an extended tour.

There is quite a difference in the amount hairdressers and barbers are tipped, but 15 percent is customary in larger cities.

When the barber or hairdresser makes a special effort like shuffling appointments, arriving early or staying late, to accommodate a customer's special needs, extra consideration is certainly in order.

if conditions are right. It takes only a sufficient amount of moisture and shade, or subdued light. Dense stands of trees in low lying areas are apt to create conditions that are conducive to growing moss on all sides of a tree. For this reason, moss should not be considered a reliable indicator of direction. An inexpensive compass is certainly a much more dependable guide. I can't understand how anyone who risks becoming lost will venture without one.

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



### NBC secures Rose Bowl rights

New York—The National Broadcasting Company, which has had an ongoing relationship with the Rose Bowl since 1927, has extended its broadcast agreement with the annual New Year's Day Classic through the 1986 game. Terms of the contract extension were not disclosed.

In making the announcement, Arthur Watson, President of NBC Sports, remarked: "NBC is extremely pleased to be continuing its long partnership with the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association and the PAC-10 Conference. This great event is truly unique in the world of sports and NBC's lasting association with the Rose Bowl is equally unique in the annals of sports broadcasting.

"With this extension, NBC enters a new era of comprehensive involvement with the event that has truly earned its distinction as the 'granddaddy' of all collegiate football games."

#### History

NBC has been a vital partner in establishing a number of significant firsts in Rose Bowl history, among them the first nationwide radio broadcast in 1927; the first nationwide television broadcast in 1952 (the first year that NBC televised the Rose Bowl); and the first color telecast of the game in 1955.

NBC Sports' 31st consecutive Rose Bowl telecast, the 68th renewal of the post-season classic—which matches the champions of the PAC-10 and Big Ten conferences—will be presented New Year's Day, Friday, Jan. 1.



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

Lorimar Productions had wanted to write Jock out of future scripts but were thwarted by a screenwriters' strike. Instead, they've had to hire a replacement for the CBS-TV series. An insider says: "Pat Hingle, who has specialized in roles requiring a Western accent, has already signed a contract. His casting is interesting because he is the actor who was first asked to portray Jock Ewing. But he turned it down because the salary wasn't high enough—and the role eventually went to Jim Davis."
