

Downs' hope for water loan fades

Good news was in short supply Thursday when the Ruidoso Downs trustees met with a representative of the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) in a pre-loan hearing.

The trustees hoped to secure a grant/loan package from the FmHA to finance extensive improvements of their ailing water system.

Village clerk Virginia Spall told John Thomas, the FmHA representative, that Ruidoso Downs needed to construct a one million gallon storage reservoir and a new grid of water lines to meet the needs of its citizens.

"We're having to run some pumps 24 hours a day and we are still just barely keeping up with demand," said Spall. "Should one of the pumps break down we could run into real problems, because we can't keep any reserve water on hand."

The Downs' present storage tank holds 365,000 gallons. But it has leaked extensively during the winter, leaving the village short during intensive summer usage. The village received a \$100,000 grant from the state Water Construction Act earlier this year. They had hoped to convince FmHA to deliver the remaining \$662,000 bill for the proposed storage tank and delivery system.

But Thomas made it immediately clear that this was highly unlikely. "I want you to know that I'd like to see you get this system," Thomas told the trustees. "But you need to understand that I have the responsibility of cutting all grants down to the bare bones. Any monies we made available would have to be for the present population and very little future growth."

"It's doubtful that any grant money will be available, and a loan would probably have to be for a smaller system than you want. The fact is that we don't have any money now and won't until October 1st. Even then, because of budget cutbacks, we

only expect to receive around \$4 million. And we've already received applications for \$15-20 million of loan money in New Mexico."

Thomas suggested that the trustees might want to apply for only the tank at present, because "a smaller package is much easier and quicker to put together."

Jacob Vigil, a representative of Boyle Engineering in Albuquerque, which hopes to handle the project, agreed with Thomas. "It might be in your best interests to get the cake before you go for the icing," he said.

Vigil also indicated that the trustees might have to settle for a tank somewhat smaller than the proposed one million gallons. State guidelines suggest that each community receive financial help to construct water retaining systems only at the rate of 700 gallons for each meter.

Ruidoso Downs has 448 water meters at present, according to Spall. That technically only qualifies them for a 308,600 gallon storage tank. The total comes to 368,600 with a surplus for fire suppression added on (at 50 gallons a minute for two hours).

The Downs faces some unusual problems, though, because of the nature of its users and the time of year in which they make their demands. "90 percent of our population is on welfare or retirement here, and they just can't afford to pay high rates," Spall told Thomas. "And I hate to say it, but we're getting a request for about one meter a day now."

Another extenuating circumstance is the enormous water usage at the racetrack for four months a year. And the village is facing a lawsuit in August because it did not have enough water on hand to put out a fire.

Boyle Engineering currently is putting together a draft proposal for a water storage system which they feel will be acceptable to FmHA. When the proposal is finished, it must be presented to the Ruidoso Downs trustees for approval before being sent to FmHA.

Agriculture Bill Stephens, also took a stand against "Site B". He then made \$30,000 of state money available to study the alternative "Site A", and hinted that the state would help bear the additional costs it entailed.

"Site B" already contained an old airstrip surrounded by BLM land, while "Site A" would require extensive earthmoving and purchase of private lands. "Site A" also faces problems in that it is located near a waste disposal site. Federal regulation prohibit airstrips within a certain distance of waste disposal sites, because of the possible hazard to the large number of small animals and birds attracted to the area.

The \$50,000 made available by the SSIA last week will enable the BLM to study the experiments being conducted at "Site B" to determine their value, and whether or not the proposed airport will in fact be a disturbance.

The funding was unanimously approved by the SSIA. BLM director Robert Burford

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Ruffast wins Kid Handicap

Ruffast took another big step toward "horse-of-the-meet" honors with a convincing neck victory in Sunday's renewal of the seven furlong Billy The Kid Handicap.

The five-year-old mare, patiently ridden by Richard Bickel, stayed in third place during most of the journey. At the turn for home, Bickel decided it was time to make his presence felt. He asked Ruffast to slip into high gear.

The mare didn't overpower her adversaries with a blast of speed. She gradually wore them down. Draconic's Loom, the 5-1 shot who set most of the pace, had enough of Ruffast's tailgating strategy and called it quits at the head of the lane. He faded to third, well out of contention.

That left stakes winning Banquero as Ruffast's last roadblock. The classy gelding, who's won some \$80,000 since the start of last year, tried to square off with Ruffast in the final 100 yards.


But Ruffast, despite the hefty burden of 123 pounds, was too much for Banquero. She inched into the lead near the wire, and Banquero, knowing his cause was hopeless, suddenly conceded. Ruffast was pulling ahead when she hit the tape in a heads up clocking of 1:27 flat (only two ticks away from the seasonal record).

Although Ruffast didn't actually grab the lead until late in the stretch, she appeared to be in control throughout — even when she was galloping along in third place, during the backstretch run.

Earlier in the season, Ruffast picked off the Barlaris Handicap at five and one-half furlongs and the Governor's Handicap at six and one-half furlongs. The Billy The Kid conquest put another \$8,355 in her account, and that swelled her 1981 money line up to \$51,711. Her current record stands at 6-2-0 from eight starts. Last year, the five-year-old mare banged out a sharp 6-3-1 tally from a dozen starts and enriched herself by over \$65,000.

Ruffast is trained by J. Doyal Roberts for the prominent horseman, Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas. The outcome of the Billy The Kid cap surprised few fans. Ruffast, operating as a 3-5 favorite, handed out mutual returns of \$3.40, \$3 and \$2.40. Banquero, pride-and-joy of the Margaret Miller Stable of El Paso, earned \$3,063 for second and refunded \$5.60 and \$3.20 as an overlooked 11-1 shot. Willie Lovell was up. Draconic's Loom, owned by Jerry Trammel of Lubbock, Texas, collected \$1,392 for third. The show payoff was \$20.

One race earlier, the Childers outfit was represented by its star three-year-old, Glover D., in a mile route. The gelding won brilliantly by four lengths and lowered the seasonal record to 1:43 3/5 seconds. That was a two second improvement over the previous mark. Glover D. raced as an odds-on favorite and paid \$2.80 to win. Bickel was aboard that one, too.

EASTER WRANGLER, a 49-1 longshot, stunned his nine foes in Saturday's Zia Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The gelding, owned by Gwendolyn Eaves of Hobbs, flashed across the finish line with a half length lead in the 400 yard dash.

A \$2 win ticket on Easter Wrangler was worth \$99.80 — which probably amounts to the fattest win payoff ever recorded in a Ruidoso stakes race.

Easter Wrangler broke smartly, but was a bit off the lead in the early going. He gradually generated steam and was going at full throttle when he hit the half way point. He took control about 100 yards from the wire and zoomed into the clear.

James Lackey was aboard as Easter Wrangler was making his second start of the 1981 Ruidoso season. The Zia Stakes, conditioned for homebreds, offered a \$10,400 purse. Easter Wrangler's share came out to \$6,240 — which is some \$1,500 more than the gelding's earnings since the start of last year.

Easter Wrangler is trained by Dooley Guinn. Fans who backed the Zia winner to place got a hefty \$59.80. The show payoff was \$20.

El Rey Burner, a 7-1 shot, held on for second after getting an early jump. The colt, owned by Jess Burner of El Paso, Texas, earned \$2,288 and refunded \$5.60, \$5.60. Go High Tymes, a 24-1 longshot, hit the tape a head behind El Rey Burner and earned \$1,040. The show payoff: \$12.40.

The 1-2 favorite, That's Raney, broke a bit sluggishly, could never get into

contention, then dissolved into the pack. He wound up fourth.

Easter Wrangler's win payoff of \$99.80 didn't come close to setting a seasonal record. That mark belongs to Exclusive Thymus, who returned \$201.20 in a non-stakes race on June 26.

One of the biggest mutual payoffs in a

Ruidoso stakes race was recorded on July 15, 1979, when Rushing Silver won the Billy The Kid Handicap and dished out \$60.40.

TEN GALLON HAT led throughout to record a length win over Luckluster in Friday's featured race at Ruidoso Downs.

Ruffast's trainer pleased

Ruffast again earned the respect of trainer J. Doyal Roberts.

"You bet I'm proud of her," he beamed after his prized five-year-old mare tallied a rallying neck victory Sunday in the \$13,925 Billy The Kid Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

"I didn't think she'd go past six furlongs earlier, but now she proved she can go further," said the veteran conditioner. "It was the first time she went seven (furlongs)."

Although Ruffast prefers to race on the front end, she demonstrated she doesn't need the lead.

She was third behind pace setting Draconic's Loom and Banquero in this seven furlong-chase which lured the top eight sprinters on the grounds.

Through a 22 4/5 quarter-mile, a 46 4/5 half-mile and a 1:13 1/5 six furlong reading, Ruffast still trailed. As the three leaders hit the stretch run, Ruffast, was second as Draconic's Loom started to tire.

Through the stretch, it was a two horse battle as Ruffast scooted past Banquero at the wire. Ruffast carried topweight of 123 pounds in defeating the entire field of colts and geldings.

"You're always worried about that much weight on a mare," Roberts said. "Weight'll eventually get them. But I knew they would try to outrun her on the front end."

"She doesn't have to be on the lead, but she'll run better on the lead when she can coast. There was no need to worry (about trailing early). That's what I told jockey Bickel. He knows how to ride a winner."

The victory completed a back-to-back double for Roberts and Bickel.

They combined a race earlier to win with the outstanding three-year-old Glover D., who won a mile allowance race in 1:43 3/5, the season's best clocking.

"He's a nice colt. I don't know how he'd compare with Ruffast. He's a three-year-old and she's older. But I'll take them both," he said.

Christian School sets opening

The Ruidoso Christian School, an inter-denominational school scheduled to open in September, has announced the hiring of two teachers, Shaulla Cull and Joan Huse, both of Ruidoso.

Cull, who will teach kindergarten class, holds a bachelor of science degree in child development and family relations from Texas Tech University. She has completed several hours of graduate work in elementary education from West Virginia University and Oklahoma University.

Her teaching experience includes a stint at the Texas Tech child development lab; with Headstart in Lubbock, Texas; and in the Ruidoso public schools as a third grade teacher. She and her husband, Richard, have been residents of Ruidoso for seven years.

Huse is a graduate of Wheaton College, Illinois, where she earned a bachelor's degree in science with a double minor in Bible and education. She also holds a

bachelor of science degree in nursing from Johns Hopkins University, and has done post graduate work at New Mexico State and Eastern New Mexico University.

She has taught at the West Suburban Hospital School of Nursing, the Pottsville Hospital School of Nursing, the Summer Institute of Linguistics at the University of Oklahoma and at the Bent Mescalero Elementary School.

She will teach first through third grades at the Ruidoso Christian School. Her husband, James Huse, serves on the school's board of directors.

Other school board members, chosen earlier this year, are Roger Posey, president; Paul Tapp; A. A. Behringer; and Robert Harrison.

Registration for the fall semester is now underway, according to administrator Jerry Mauldin. Classes will be held at the First Baptist Church of Ruidoso Downs, of which Mauldin is associate pastor.

Mauldin said he and the board are extremely pleased with the qualifications and experience of the new staff members.

Board members and teachers were introduced to parents and other interested persons at a Thursday night meeting. A Parent-Teacher Fellowship (PTF) has been formed, and the group is in the process of selecting officers. The parents also took the opportunity to inspect textbooks, which are currently available for review and sale at the church. Parent involvement in the classroom was also discussed, Mauldin said.

He said the "enthusiasm of the PTF was great — we had a good time just sharing with each other." School officials outlined the curriculum for the upper grades. Courses offered include Math, Science, History, Language Arts and Bible.

"It won't be a limited educational experience," Mauldin said. "These are the same basic courses you get in the public

elementary or high schools, but we add Bible as required subject matter."

With reference to his appointment as administrator, Mauldin said becoming more directly involved in the field of education had been "a real desire" of his.

The associate pastor holds a bachelor of science degree in secondary education from New Mexico State University and a master's in religion from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas. He became associated with the Ruidoso Downs church 17 months ago to assist pastor Dale McCleskey.

The school will also be offering Bible Classes for college credit. Mauldin said the classes would be scheduled for two hours, one night a week.

Murderer being sought

Eric Davis pursued a simple life. A laborer with the United States Forest Service, Davis, 29, spent his spare time making pottery.

But late in the evening of June 25, Eric Davis' simple life came to a sudden, violent end.

A neighbor near Davis' home, located about 10 miles southwest of Coyote on Mesa De Poleo, told police that gun shots were heard during the late evening hours of June 25. The next morning the neighbor went to Davis' home to investigate and found blood stains around the house. Davis was missing.

State Police officers were notified and when they arrived they observed signs of a violent struggle and blood stains inside and outside Davis' house.

On July 3, Davis' body was found beside State Road 96 west of Coyote. He had been shot several times.

State Police Officer David Osuna, assigned to the murder investigation, said Davis had lived in the Coyote area for the past five years. He said he has been unable to pin down a motive for the killing.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for any information leading to the solution of murder of Eric Davis.

Ridden expertly by veteran Willie Lovell, the Verbatim colt established fractions of 23 1/5 for the quarter-mile, 49 1/5 for the half-mile and 1:02 3/5 for the five furlongs before hitting the wire in 1:09 4/5 for the five and one-half furlongs.

The victory was the third in five starts this season for the colt. He defeated seven other two-year-olds in this allowance race for a purse of \$5,000.

Ten Gallon Hat earned \$3,000 for owners H. L. Beddo and Joseph Miller of Anthony. He paid \$7.60, \$4.20 and \$3.00 as the \$2,800-1 favorite.

Luckluster, who broke poorly, rallied around the turn to finish second under Richard Bickel. He earned \$1,100 and returned mutual prices of \$3.40 and \$2.80 as the \$2,900-1 second-choice.

Dunce's Miss, who finished almost six lengths behind Luckluster, returned \$3.40 to show. He was ridden by Larry Byers and collected \$500.

Trained by Margie Renfro, Ten Gallon Hat boosted his career earnings to \$7,827.

COUNTESS CHERI rallied through the stretch to post a one length victory over pacesetter Head Bookkeeper in Thursday's feature race at Ruidoso Downs.

Ridden by Danny Lavergne, the three-year-old filly was fourth through much of the early running of the six furlong chase for \$10,000 claiming horses. Lavergne moved her to second down the backstretch, before gradually assuming command in the deep stretch.

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

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



Women's sports have come a long way, baby!

In most high school districts in the country girls' athletic programs are budgeted fairly equally to boys' programs. The exception is football, of course, where more money is allocated because that sport returns the largest amount of money to the school.

Women's professional sports are starting to get more attention now, particularly in tennis and golf. And while those sports will never gain popular approval from the average American sports fan to the same extent baseball and football have, they do have fairly large followings now.

But women's sports in this country are still far behind the level reached by women's athletics in the Soviet Union, if you listened to the moaners after the United States-Soviet Union track meet in Leningrad last weekend.

The Soviets won the combined scoring of the mens' and womens' divisions easily. American men won their division but the Russian women trounced the United States women to give the overall edge to the Soviets.

When one considers the fact that the Soviets have been training women on a high competitive level in most "Olympic-type" sports a Soviet victory like the one last week should have been expected.

But no, after the Russians won the track meet several American coaches and TV sportscasters pulled out the crying towel and implied that the Soviet victory was a blow to American track and field prospects.

That is absurd. The Soviet women have beaten the American women almost every time they have met since the series started

back in 1958. America's men have usually won their competition against the Soviets. It was almost expected every time when the two superpowers met that the United States men would win and the women would lose.

The Soviets' combined win should have been expected since they were coming off an Olympic year, an Olympics the United States boycotted. Many of the Soviet athletes had competed in the high-pressure experience of the Olympics and had an advantage against their younger, less experienced American counterparts.

Plus the meet was held in Leningrad, a fact which cannot be ignored. The Soviets had the backing of the home crowd, an especially important advantage since the two countries have reverted to the darker days of the early Cold War in their relationships with each other. Also, the American athletes had to get used to Russian food, something which has hampered this country's athletes in past meetings.

No, when one takes into consideration all these factors, the United States team didn't do that badly in Leningrad. When one considers the fact that women's track in this country has only really gotten started on a large-scale in the past eight years, the United States women did rather well in the competition.

One must look at the overall picture to objectively analyze women's sports in this country. United States women started with virtually nothing and have made miles of progress.

Baby, you'll get better in the future.

Speaking of women's athletes, Half & Half, which is leading the Ruidoso Women's Softball League with a perfect record, was finally granted sanction recently to play in tournaments.

Half & Half went down to Carlsbad this past weekend to compete in a tournament and may compete in more tournaments in the near future.

Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — Although I've been an avid fresh water fisherman for years, never have I dipped a line in salt water. I have had the urge for some time, but being an inlander, saltwater fishing requires a bit of travel. Then, too, I don't really know what to expect.

For years I've been hearing stories of great fishing in the Chesapeake Bay. Since it isn't more than a day's drive to the bay I'm quite interested in making the trip. Since the Bay touches your home state, I wondered if you might tell me something about the area and its fishing. I appreciate any information. Tony D., West Virginia

Dear Tony — I debated about answering through the column for fear of boring some who aren't interested, but since the Bay is a bit unique I decided to give it a shot.

A few statistics from a Maryland Department of Natural Resources guide might first be in order. The Chesapeake Bay is the largest estuary in the United States. Now, an estuary is defined as a semi-enclosed body of water which has a free connection with the sea, and within which sea water is measurably diluted by fresh water from land drainage. The Bay

is 185 miles long, of which 123 miles are in Maryland. It is from three to 33 miles wide. Maximum depth is 174 feet, but the average is only 21 feet. The total surface area is 3,237 square miles.

The Bay waters support more varieties of life than I could name, but principal shellfish resources are, Oysters, blue crabs and clams. For the sportsman a wide variety of fish thrive. Among them are, sea trout, bluefish, croaker, cobia, black drum, red drum, (channel bass), perch, flounder and rock (striper). The striped was for years a favorite game fish, but they now are at about the lowest ebb of many years. Much effort is being made to find out why and hopefully assist their comeback.

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

The Dreamer

"The Wild Colonial Boy"
With all the mountain world turning a more radiant green every day, you cannot help but think of "The Emerald Isle" — that land long known to fame for its wonderful green from one end to the other — and of other things Irish.

Especially since we are in an anniversary season of one of the most famous Irishmen of all: Henry McCarty, alias William Bonney, better known here in Lincoln County and all over the world as Billy The Kid.

Quite some time ago I was visiting that fine lad of Old Erin, Mel O'Reilly. We were trying to piece together that old Irish ballad, "The Wild Colonial Boy," but could not come up with much else but a line or two.

Then one day when I was up watering the aspen trees at Brother Lynn and Maxine's house up near the golf course, who should drive by but The Colonial Boy, himself?

That is, if you call New Mexico a colony (as some back in Mel's native New York sometimes do think of our state). And of course there is nothing wild about the polished young gentleman, a model husband and father of three fine young boys.

Anyhow Mel told me that he had tracked down the words to the old ballad. Over at his house he handed me a green book of Irish songs in which was included this beloved old ballad, so sentimental that you can hardly sing through it without bursting into tears. And strange to say, you cannot help but feel that Mel might look something like the "Boy" in the ballad, being as he is a classic type of the Irish.

The Ballads Of Our West Follows Old Patterns

Handed down to us from the days when the cowboy was in his brightest glory in our west, are many a sentimental ballad — cut out of the same cloth as those of our forefathers across the water.

Some of the more treasured of these are: Little Joe, The Wrangler; When The Work's All Done This Fall; Bill Venero (one of the most heart-rending); I've Got No Use For The Women; Streets Of Laredo; Oh Bury Me Not On The Lone Prairie; The Ballad Of Jesse James; The Ballad Of Sam Bass; and The Ballad Of Billy The Kid.

People of all times and places have composed and sung sentimental, even heart-breaking ballads; but when it comes to songs that "touch the heart," as the Mexican and other Hispanic people say, nobody can touch the Irish with a ten-foot pole.

"The Wild Colonial Boy"

There was a wild colonial boy, Jack Duggan was his name. He was born and raised in Ireland, in a place called Castlemain. He was his father's only son, his mother's pride and joy. And dearly did his parents love The Wild Colonial Boy. At the early age of sixteen years he left his native home, and to Australia's sunny shore he was inclined to roam. He robbed the rich, he helped the poor, he shot James McAvoy. A terror to Australia was the Wild Colonial Boy.

One morning on the prairie as Jack he rode along, A-listening to the mocking bird a-singing a cheerful song. Out stepped a band of troopers, Kelly, Davis, and Fitzroy. They all set out to capture him, The Wild Colonial Boy. "Surrender now, Jack Duggan, for you see we're three to one. Surrender in the Queen's high name for you're a plundering son." Jack drew two pistols from his belt and proudly waved them high "I'll fight, but not surrender," said The Wild Colonial Boy.

He fired a shot at Kelly which brought him to the ground. And turning 'round to Davis he received a fatal wound. A bullet pierced his proud young heart from the pistol of Fitzroy. And that is how they captured him, The Wild Colonial Boy.

Like all ballads, this is based on an actual happening; and I sometimes think that if the troopers had not uttered the second line in the fourth verse, maybe things might not have become quite so violent. An echo of this ancient feeling is heard today in that tragic land of Northern Ireland.

Memories of Australia

In spite of the ill fate of the Wild Colonial Boy, I have nothing but pleasant memories of my few months' stay among those wonderful people, the Australians. And I am reminded of their great folk song, "Waltzing Matilda," another ballad, of a "Swag Man" or wanderer, seeking his fortune, also a tragic story.

And at this season of the time we turn the clock back one hundred years to the pioneer days in Lincoln County, let us remember kindly The Wild Colonial Boy, Billy The Kid, and many another boy "dearly loved" by his parents, whose journey along life's pathway led them somehow into tragedy. And let us say a prayer for all young people starting out to seek their fortune.


Skeen aides in county Thursday

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
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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — The once-respected FBI has been spending its time leading Joseph Montoya II into temptation.

It must be scraping the bottom of the barrel. Isn't it time for all of us to say that these Abscans and Brilabs and other actions where a public figure is targeted and titillated are not what the secret police of the United States of America were designed to do?

Shouldn't somebody — preferably someone high up in the government of the nation — tap these cops on the shoulder and explain to them that they are not in business for the purpose of originating crimes?

Maybe they got mixed up a little. After all, two of their own boys had to get presidential pardons just in the last few months because, it turns out, they were engaging in as many black-bag jobs as a professional criminal.

Not a nice picture. Neither is the one which emerges from Abscam and Brilab, where people who might otherwise have gone sinless got set up by con men in the pay of our government.

Maybe this is not legally entrapment, though we expect to see that litigated for many years to come, but it certainly is hardly in the spirit of something most Americans think most other Americans believe in — that a person should be

considered innocent until proved guilty. That's where the evil in all this Abscam kind of action lies.

Some bureaucrat — which cops are, just as much as anyone else who works for government — says, "I think that guy would commit a crime if he had the chance. Let's offer him the chance, and see if we can catch him at it."

It's that part about how "I think that guy would commit a crime" which is a departure from the time-honored method of doing police business. In that old-fashioned system, one did not read other people's minds; one waited till a crime had been committed before attempting to solve it.

Now everything has been speeded up. Our cops are there to help the criminal commit the crime before they slip the cuffs on him.

This writer, for one, liked the old system, in which true red-blooded nationals knew there were two groups you had to ride herd on because they both tend to get out of hand. They are the military and the cops.

They are, by and large, the biggest crybabies in government. They always sing the same tune to those who appropriate government funds: "We need more money and more freedom from control to do our job."

Healthy civilian government — which is the only kind worth a damn — would say to them, "We'll give you less money and more control. Those are the things you really need."

Do you know the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission? This too is a bunch of gumshoes who go around saying, "That guy over there looks like he might have an impure intention. Let's dangle a little bait in front of him, and see how he reacts."

And — since we're stamping on toes — let's go on and say some of us don't think Crimestoppers, where you pay folks to rat-fink on their neighbors, is such a beautiful concept either.

Sure we've got a lot of crime in America. But will taking away essential human freedoms really cure it in a way in which the price we pay won't be too high?

How about a little respect for one another instead of eternal sneaking suspicions that the other person must be some kind of crook?

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Sense & Nonsense

Early retirement—a boom to millions of Americans — is a major reason why the Social Security system is currently on the verge of bankruptcy. Beginning in 1961, when early retirement benefits could be collected at age 62, many employers, and employees too, found the system beneficial and took advantage of it.

Older employees found the system of early retirement especially attractive during the 1960s. The money was there, so why not take it now while the employee still had several years to enjoy it? Pension plans at the time were very sound and economic conditions (with inflation well below a 5 percent annual rate) were such that the amount of the benefit appeared fully adequate to meet the retiree's needs.

As a member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging, I attended a hearing on the implications of early retirement on the Social Security system. Testimony pointed out that early retirement has a direct effect on the current problems of Social Security solvency. Ideas were

presented for reforms that would encourage the voluntary activity of older workers in the labor force and create incentives for employers to keep older workers on their payrolls.

First off, it should be noted that any pressure put on older workers to take an early retirement option is most likely a violation of the Age Discrimination in Employment Act and the Employee Retirement Income Security Act, which prohibit the use of pensions and retirement policy as a means to displace a worker because of age. The Special Committee on Aging has sponsored legislation to give older workers a fair chance in the labor workforce and prevent these acts of subtle discrimination which use the disguise of early retirement bonuses to get rid of older workers.

But older workers need more than a fair chance to retain their jobs in a labor market riddled by inflation and ever-rising prices. Employers need to be given incentives to retain the valuable services and experience offered by older workers who have been with a company for several years.

The Senate Special Committee on Aging recommended these steps to encourage employers to keep older workers:

— Allow employers FICA credits to keep workers beyond age 62 and beyond normal retirement age of 65. Though it uses a tax credit approach, it will eventually have the effect of changing retirement policies.

— Develop employer education programs on the capability of older workers. This proposal is the best long-term solution to the problem. Frequently employers simply lack knowledge about how to utilize older workers effectively.

— Eliminate mandatory retirement and tighten the exceptions in the Age Discrimination in Employment Act.

Older workers would also be encouraged to voluntarily continue working by the following reforms:

— Increase delayed retirement credit for workers who stay on past 65, and try to establish some type of credit for workers who stay on past age 62.

— Liberalize earnings limitation as a means of encouraging labor force activity for individuals over age 65.

The overall effect of these measures would be to help overcome the current problems in Social Security, by encouraging workers to remain productive longer.

STRANGE PRIORITIES

If the U. S. Conference of Mayors set out, deliberately to make itself look ridiculous, it could hardly have dreamed up anything more effective than the resolution it approved recently.

The resolution, adopted by a 70-41 vote, called on Congress and the Reagan administration to assign urban aid programs the same budgetary priority accorded national defense.

Surely the mayors jest. The Reagan administration, committed to correcting the ominous imbalance between Soviet and American military strength, is asking a receptive Congress for a 1982 defense budget totaling \$222 billion, of which \$184 billion would actually be spent during the 12 months beginning Oct. 1.

Federal aid to the cities is now expected to total about \$60 billion for fiscal 1982.

Do the 70 mayors who voted for the resolution really believe that urban aid should be tripled next year? Or, do they believe that a combination of defense cuts and urban aid increases should result in roughly equal spending for the cities and the military?

If so, they have more confidence than we that CETA programs, rent subsidies, and urban mass transit can somehow keep the Russians out of Western Europe and the Persian Gulf while deterring a Soviet nuclear attack on the United States.

The mayors were right about one thing: It is all a matter of priorities. Theirs are a bit skewed. — News-Bulletin, Belen

While Ruidoso is fortunate in having a village council that generally follows the state's open meeting law, we are looking forward to holding these meetings in the auditorium of the new Administrative Center.

One of the main reasons for this anticipation is that microphones are to be placed at each trustee's station — and there will be one for use of persons addressing the council.

This means that those in the audience will be able to hear the business being transacted. A situation that doesn't always prevail under meeting conditions in the library.

Due to the custom of people in the Southwest being "soft spoken," those seeking council approval of any project — from housing developments to vacation of roads and rate increases — tend to stand in front of the council table and address them as though they were the only persons in the room. Much of what transpires is audible mainly to the trustees, and at times at least one trustee and the secretary keeping the minutes have had to ask what transpired.

Being as the council is transacting public business, and anything coming before the council concerns the public, those of the public attending are entitled to know everything that's said, everything that's going on.

We're not suggesting that there's any attempt to prevent the public from being informed in council transactions, we're just stating the fact that persons transacting the business, including members of the trustees, speak so softly that it's impossible for the audience to keep abreast of the developments.

We'll hail the day when the open meetings of the Ruidoso trustees are truly "open" meetings — which is what we're sure they want and the way it should be. —CD



Today's high energy costs are changing the way new homes are being built. Better insulation, insulated windows, more efficient heating systems, and passive solar construction are becoming the "new wave" of home construction, according to the Ruidoso Board of Realtors.

While many of these ideas can be applied to existing homes, there are some revolutionary new ideas in home design. One of the most interesting is the "dome home."

The most obvious advantage to a dome home is that it provides energy savings of up to 80 percent from a conventional home, and can cost 10 to 15 percent less to build. An air form is attached to the foundation and inflated to form the shape of the structure. A four-inch layer of polystyrene foam is applied to the interior surface, then a two-inch layer of steel fiber-reinforced concrete is added to the underside of the foam. When the shell is cured, the outside form is removed, openings are finished, and a weather-resistant liquid polyurethane coating is applied to the exterior. Since most of the construction takes place within a controlled environment, there are almost no construction delays because of bad weather.

The concrete inner-shell stores heat, making an efficient passive solar design (no active collectors or hardware). The home is extremely sturdy, has an excellent fire rating, low maintenance costs and can be esthetically appealing.

Other energy-saving features include:

— 30 to 40 percent less exterior surface exposure to weather.

— A no-seam exterior which minimize air infiltration.

— No temperature loss through sup porting structures.

— A stronger structure than conventional design.

— Highly efficient insulation.

— An aerodynamic shape which minimize risk of severe storm damage.

The dome home was developed by Tech mar Corporation of Des Moines, Iowa and is being built by a number of firms around the country. Dave Stanbrough, a builder of the dome home in the Des Moines area, says he was amazed when he first saw the design and is surprised that nobody thought of it years ago.

Stanbrough's first dome home consists of four connected domes, which are quite flexible as far as interior design. It's a 2,000 square foot, two story structure with a full basement. Heating costs are projected at less than \$200 a year! When asked about the disadvantages to such a home, Stanbrough said, "I can't think of any... unless someone is averse to round shapes." Stanbrough added that "several (area) lenders are very enthusiastic about the potential savings in energy and maintenance, and (possibly) more home for less money."

The Ruidoso Board of Realtors encourages the development of such ideas and hopes other homebuilders, as well as homeowners, will look for ways to make housing more energy-efficient.

Focus on Small Business

I sometimes think I can boost my sales by offering delivery service to my customers. Is this a good idea?

Delivery service is forced on some small retail and service firms, simply because their merchandise can't be carried home by customers. Other types of stores offer delivery services because their competitors do.

The key point to your question is: Can

you afford the extra costs?

There are several ways of delivering goods — hiring a young person to deliver by bicycle or motor bike, by your own truck (owned or leased) or by common carrier. Sometimes, small business owners make cooperative arrangements, sharing cost of equipment, drivers' salaries and other expenses.

If you offer delivery service it's vital to keep the cost as low as possible. In most cases, three or four deliveries a day can't support the cost of a truck and driver. One rule of thumb on truck operating costs is that the cost will be at least double the driver's wages. Another rule says that a small business person spending less than \$10,000 per year for delivery can seldom justify owning a truck.

Remember, too, that delivered merchandise must be packed to prevent damage. This adds to your costs. A basic suggestion is to sit down and figure all costs involved in delivery — all employee expenditures, vehicle costs and administrative costs. Then you can determine whether deliveries will pay off.

How do you recover money spent to deliver? One way is to require a minimum purchase; if a customer's purchase is less than the minimum, you might add a delivery fee. Another method is to figure delivery costs into your prices. Still another method is to charge for all deliveries, regardless of the amount of purchase.

Regardless of the method used to recover delivery costs, keep in mind that delivery costs must be watched constantly, and controlled. There really is no "free" delivery.



Skin cancer control project being developed in New Mexico

The New Mexico Cancer Control Program (NMCCP) is developing the New Mexico Skin Cancer Project, with funding provided by Johnson and Johnson Company. Under this program, NMCCP will continue issuing brochures on skin cancer prevention and sponsoring training workshops for health professionals and the general public.

Mari Taylor, coordinator of the project, said a brochure called "Sun Smarts" has been printed for two age groups: children 7 to 14, and adults. The group has also sponsored two public sports events to raise people's awareness of how sunscreens and other protection can be used outdoors. "Our message has never been 'that people should stay out of the sun altogether,'" Taylor said. "Obviously that just isn't reasonable. Instead we're trying to convince them to use sunscreens and to be wiser about sun exposure."

The skin cancer project is sponsored by the New Mexico Health Coalition.

As one of the world's highest risk areas for skin cancer, New Mexico was also a logical site for creation of the nation's first registry of serious skin cancers. The New Mexico Melanoma Registry is a cooperative effort of pathologists and dermatologists in Albuquerque and physicians throughout the state.

The goal is to improve the diagnosis of melanoma, which is the only form of skin cancer serious enough to be a threat to life.

Actually melanoma can be quite difficult to diagnose," said Dr. William Black, member of the melanoma registry panel from the New Mexico Cancer Research and Treatment Center. "The patient's prognosis is very closely tied to how early the disease is diagnosed and treated."

Modelled after a similar agency in Australia, where melanoma is more common than anywhere else in the world, the New Mexico Melanoma Registry offers doctors in the state free analysis of tissue samples from patients with suspicious skin conditions.

Black said the program, which depends entirely on voluntary cooperation of doctors everywhere in the state, has been growing steadily.

Meanwhile, cancer education for health professionals will be coordinated through the University of New Mexico (UNM) office of continuing medical education.

Dr. Martin Kantrowitz, assistant dean for community professional education at the UNM School of medicine, said several communities have offered to offset federal funding losses by covering expenses of

running workshops and paying small honoraria to doctors who present programs such as tumor boards.

The only major project associated with NMCCP that has not found alternate funding was a large-scale cancer education and cancer control program operated by the state's Health and Environment Department (HED).

Methods to prevent heat stress

Heat stress, resulting from heat waves and recent record level temperatures in New Mexico, can lead to heat syncope, or fainting, heat exhaustion, or heat stroke, a life-threatening emergency said a spokesperson for the state Health Services Division of the Health and Environment Department.

During the heat wave last summer, at least 1,265 deaths in 26 states resulted from the heat, according to Michael J. Burkhart, Director for the Health Services Division.

"When the body is subjected to heat stress, the heart pumps blood from the core to the extremities," said Dr. Joel Grinolds of the Health Services Division Family Health Services Bureau. "The blood pressure drops which can result in fainting if not enough blood reaches the brain."

A person should lie down with the feet elevated so that blood can reach the brain if fainting occurs, and cool wet cloths can be applied to the skin.

"Evaporation by sweating is also an attempt by the body to get rid of heat," Grinolds said, "but heat exhaustion can occur if there is a greater loss of water and salt through sweating than is replaced by adequate fluids."

Symptoms of heat exhaustion include fatigue, weakness and collapse along with profuse sweating, nausea and dizziness. "The body can lose six to eight quarts of fluid per day," Grinolds said, "so a lot of fluids should be taken during warm

weather as a precaution. If recovery does not occur relatively quickly, medical care may be necessary."

Heat stroke, a severe breakdown in the body's heat regulating system, affects the central nervous system.

"Convulsion and circulatory failure can occur if the victim does not receive immediate medical attention," Grinolds said.

Symptoms of heat stroke include a temperature of 106 degrees or more, a rapid pulse and unconsciousness. The skin is usually hot, red and dry, although sweating is possible.

Grinolds advises relatives and friends to be aware that the elderly have a high risk factor to heat, particularly if there are existing medical conditions such as heart and circulatory disease, diabetes and stroke. Also at risk in the heat are babies and small children because they become dehydrated easily.

Burkhart suggests taking the following precautions to prevent heat stress from causing illness.

— Take plenty of liquids; replace potassium with drinks and food such as orange juice and bananas; include foods high in salt content in the diet during the hotter months.

— Avoid heavy exertion or exercise especially during the hottest part of the day. Joggers should run early in the morning or in the evening. Those working in conditions which expose them to the heat should slow their pace, take frequent breaks and drink a lot of liquids.

— Do not take salt tablets which are dangerous, especially for those with high blood pressure.

— Avoid alcohol because it depletes the body of fluids.

— Do not exercise in a sweat suit or a rubber suit as body water collects inside the suit and cannot evaporate resulting in rising body temperature.

— Wear loose, light clothing that allows sweat to evaporate and reflects the sun's rays. A hat is further protection.

— Use common sense on hot days to help prevent hot weather from causing illness.

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
