

Expansion set at race track

The contract for expansion of the All-American Turf Club and grandstand at Ruidoso Downs Race Track was awarded to an Albuquerque construction company over the weekend.

The successful bid of \$1,364,067 was submitted by John R. Lavis Construction Company.

The award of the contract was made during a meeting of the Ruidoso Downs board of directors. According to General Manager Finlay MacGillivray, construction will begin immediately after Labor Day, and the project will be completed prior to the start of the 1982 season.

The need for a major expansion, MacGillivray noted, has been a major concern of the board of directors. "The expansion will relieve a congested and difficult situation," he said. "We appreciate the tolerance and patience of our patrons. Starting next summer, our facilities will be far more spacious and comfortable. An expansion of this dimension is long overdue."

According to plans prepared by the Burns-Peters architectural firm of Albuquerque, the Ruidoso grandstand and clubhouse will be extended 125 feet east toward the top of the homestretch. The addition will extend over the site now occupied by the paddock. The width of the addition is 135 feet.

The paddock, and jockey quarters, will

be re-located in the infield, at a point just east of the totalisator board. A tunnel, passing underneath the homestretch, will provide access to the paddock.

The new paddock will be located so that saddling activities will be in full view of the entire grandstand. New general offices will be included in the expanded facilities.

The new structure will continue the architectural lines of the existing grandstand. Thus, the addition will be a three-level structure, in complete harmony with current architectural themes.

The All-American Turf Club, which consists of a mezzanine and upper level, will be increased dramatically in size.

Eight hundred new seats will be available in the Turf Club and grandstand.

MacGillivray noted that Turf Club seating is being offered on a five year plan and on a seasonal basis. Grandstand seats will be sold by the season. Some will also be available to a day-to-day basis.

The expansion plans also call for new mutual lines, new concession areas, expanded dining facilities and additional restrooms.

The project is the most ambitious expansion at Ruidoso Downs since 1972, when the Jockey Club was enlarged and the All-American Turf Club was built.

The expansion, MacGillivray said, will "contribute even more momentum to the remarkable growth pattern Ruidoso Downs is now enjoying."

Love garners Art Festival's 'Best of Show'

In his first year at the Ruidoso Art Festival, Santa Fe sculptor Harrell Love was named by his peers as the "Best of Show."

"I'm really honored and gratified," said Love, a man with a warm, gentle smile and a soft voice. "It's nothing that I expected, of course, but it does make a lot of the work seem worthwhile."

Love is one of many success stories at this year's festival who dropped out of the "workaday" world to take a chance at working for themselves in the world of art.

But in Love's case, the story has an added twist: he had started out as a painter, then grew dissatisfied with his work and quit his artistic vocation for some eight years.

He was born on November 2, 1940, in Arkansas and showed a talent for drawing at an early age. In 1961 he received a Bachelor's degree in art from the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, and went on to additional studies at the University of New Mexico, Wayne State University, the Memphis Academy of Art and the University of Oklahoma.

Love worked mainly with oil paintings during this period. He spent two years as an art instructor at Wiley College in Marshall, Texas, and three and one half years teaching at his alma mater.

Then in 1969 Love decided to throw his artistic career overboard. Until 1978, he worked in the pharmaceutical business, first in Tulsa, Oklahoma; then in Oklahoma City.

"Just in the last few years I started experimenting with wood sculpture," Love said. "Something about it felt right; I sensed that this was what I should have been doing all along."

"Well I was making a good salary in Oklahoma City, but I felt that I wanted to take another shot at living off of my art. I was very hesitant at first about bringing

this up to my wife, but she was supportive. In 1978 we moved to Santa Fe and opened a gallery ('Touch of Love Gallery Ltd.')."

During the festival, Love was able to renew acquaintances with several doctors he had known while working in the field of medicine. "That was the best decision I've made in 40 years," he told one of them.

"I want to tell you, it was rough at first, but I feel that we've been blessed. This (the award) is the kind of thing that makes you feel that you were right to have faith in yourself."

Love's sculptures are unique for both their original design, and the beauty in which they are executed.

His specialty is birds in flight that have a certain dream-like quality. "I don't use a model—I might see a picture in 'Field and Stream' or somewhere, but I think about them for a long time. You won't see any long necks like this on a real bird—that's just how it comes out of my mind."

My own favorite was a piece called "Rapture"—a longish sculpture of an old woman with upturned face, her eyes focused on something not-quite-definable as she leaves this world.

Love uses wood from many sources—driftwood from Maine, domestic hardwoods as well as imports from Africa and the Orient. The wood for "Rapture" came from Africa, and the woman's face is of an undetermined race—perhaps Indian or black.

"That piece gave me some trouble," said Love. "It was in an unusual shape, and it took me a number of days to figure out what it wanted. The idea of 'Rapture' came from the Scripture. I wanted her to show both ecstasy and sadness at the same time."

Love's gallery also includes roadrunners and other pieces—like 'Scout'—which are not easily categorized.

"I just think about what I could be doing now if I'd been working with wood all along," said Love. "I'm proud of my work, but I know it could be so much better."

Special Effort wins futurity

Special Effort, the colt who was purchased for \$1 million earlier this summer, blasted out an easy win in Sunday's 18th running of the Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Special Effort now owns the first two legs of the Triple Crown and threatens to become the first horse in quarter horse history to make a clean sweep.

The final leg—and the biggest of all—is the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity, which closes out the Ruidoso meeting on Labor Day.

Prior to Sunday's Rainbow renewal, only one horse in history won the first two stops on the Triple Crown journey. That occurred in 1974 when Tiny's Gay polished off the Kansas and Rainbow futurities, then lost the All-American to Easy Date by a nose on the last jump.

No such heroics, nor much drama, has been attached to Special Effort so far. The colt has been overpowering his competition with ease. On May 31, he won the Kansas Futurity by a length as an even-money favorite and earned \$260,522. On Sunday, he led all the way while winning the Rainbow Futurity by 1 1/2 lengths, earning \$232,536 out of the gross purse of \$669,390.

Special Effort clocked the 400 yards in a seasonal record time of 19.97 seconds, surpassing his own previous clocking of 20.02 (which he set in qualifying trials for the Rainbow Futurity).

On the eve of the Kansas Futurity, Special Effort was purchased by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. The \$1 million price was the highest ever paid for a quarter horse in training.


After winning Sunday's Rainbow, Special Effort now holds a spotless career record of six wins from six starts, and career earnings of \$496,582. His current value makes that \$1 million price tag look like a bargain.

Special Effort is trained by Johnie Goodman. W. R. Hunt is the rider.

Fans who made Special Effort an awesome favorite in the Rainbow collected \$2.60 to win, \$2.20 to place, \$2.40 to show. Winkum, who ran courageously at the end, finished a head in front of Summer Encounter and collected \$106,502 for second. The mutual returns were \$2.40, \$3. The colt is owned by Jack Brooks of Edmond, Oklahoma. Jacky Martin was up.

Summer Encounter, trained by Jack Brooks for Jerry Wells of Purcell, Oklahoma, collected \$54,479 for third. Steve Treasure was in the saddle. Summer Encounter was coupled with Winkum and Greybon (who ran sixth) as a betting entry. The entry went off at 7-2.

The Rainbow was run without incident and was simply a case of Special Effort

outclassing his foes. The colt got a tremendous first jump, and quickly established a solid lead—perhaps as much as a length. The colt continued to open his advantage. He was never under any threat. When he reached the finish, he was still gaining. Jockey Hunt never used the whip.

Winkum broke in third place, appeared on the verge of dropping out of contention, then came flying at the end to bag second. Summer Encounter was ahead of Winkum at the midway point, but still finished strongly.

The Urschels, shortly after purchasing Special Effort, leased the colt to their daughter and son-in-law, Dana and Timothy Guidry, also of Canadian.

Here's how the also-rans checked in, with purse money earned: 4th—Six Doubles, \$28,568; 5th—Seventy One South, \$25,911; 6th—Greybon, \$25,246; 7th—Struck Silver, \$24,582; 8th—Go For Bugs, \$23,918; 9th—Man O Grit, \$23,253; 10th—Tams Easy Native, \$22,569.

Wagering on the Rainbow Futurity (including the quinella) amounted to \$110,402, a seasonal record.

REBELIER ROLLED UP her fifth straight win in Saturday's \$97,000 Rainbow Futurity Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, who hit the finish a half-length in front, is owned by Ann Freeman and her mother, Alice Fisher, both of El Paso,

Texas.

Rebeller was purchased by the Freeman-Fisher partnership in early June, reportedly for \$275,000. The Rainbow Consolation packed a winner's purse of \$19,931, which pushed Rebeller's career income up to around \$25,000.

The Consolation win also made Rebeller the first five-time winner of the current Ruidoso meeting. She's yet to taste defeat.

Rebeller started her racing career on May 10, winning a Ruidoso maiden race by one and a half lengths. She took her next three outs as the public favorite, but was made a 5-2 second choice in Saturday's outing.

The filly got off to a fast start under Jerry Nicodemus and remained in control throughout the 400 yard journey. She was timed in 20.21 seconds. Rebeller is trained by O. S. Carlton III.

Tarbug, a 22-1 outsider handled by Larry Byers, broke in fourth place, but came on with a fast closing charge to finish second. The runnerup purse was \$13,952. Tarbug is owned by Betty Lou Shebestor of Wynnewood, Oklahoma.

The Heat Is On went into the Consolation as an odds-on favorite looking for her fourth straight win. After being loaded into the No. 10 post, the filly got a case of nerves and reared up. When the gates opened, she got away tardily and never

managed to launch a serious threat.

But the filly closed gamely and ended up in third place, a nose behind Tarbug. Jacky Martin was at the controls. Third was worth \$10,630. The Heat Is On is owned by G. I. and Kathleen Martin and M. Virgins Murray of Talban.

Fans who backed Rebeller in the betting collected \$6.80, \$4 and \$3. Tarbug returned \$10.80, \$4. The Heat Is On dished out a \$2.40 show payoff.

The remaining order of finish, with purse money earned: 4th—Tiny Cee, \$9,965; 5th—Artic Belle, \$9,501; 6th—Karens Jet, \$7,972; 7th—Yeller Fuel, \$7,308; 8th—Daring Wonder, \$6,643; 9th—Miss Blue Diamonds, \$5,979; 10th—Broken Pedal, \$5,315.

After three days of wandering around the Ruidoso Art Festival, several things come to mind: sights, sounds, smells, and the stories of the artists themselves.

There were the crowds sitting down to eat on the patio of the high school under skies which were alternately sunny and coolly overcast. It threatened to rain all weekend without ever really getting around to it.

The smell of smoke and frybread coming from the Mescalero booth, where women stood around a fire in a circle turning the frybread with sticks while the men stood in the background with arms crossed behind the arbor, watching children run in and out of the tipi.

A throng of people moving up and down the central "mall", where a parking lot had been transformed into something resembling a medieval fair. Countless babies in carriages. Couples from Texas carting off their treasurers. Crowds of children standing around the puppet

Jeanine Terry of Tempe, Arizona, was situated directly in front of the east entrance. She offered a perspective on the people who visited the festival: "Admission is charged here, which is very unusual, so as an artist you know that more of the people are looking to buy than if just anyone could walk in."

Jungbluth said that the festival will retain its current size, though there were over 300 applicants for the 100 available artists' booths this year. With a likely increase in demand for those spaces in the future, the quality of the Ruidoso Art Festival can only become greater.

There were the sounds of Rod Baird's bamboo flutes filtering in and out of the bustle of the crowd. And the shrill whistle of Joel West's clay flute ocarinas. But above all, the Ruidoso Art Festival was the artists themselves, talented, persevering, taking risks that most of us only dream of. Making the festival into one of the finest around.

Bruce McElya, a Ruidoso photographer, seemed to be speaking for most of the artists when he said: "I've been to many art fairs around the west, and believe me, this is one of the best. You've got three times as many applicants as artists, so the

Man injured in car mishap

C. F. Jones, 76, of Bingham, was reported to be in serious condition Monday morning in the Intensive Care Unit of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, following an automobile accident at the Ruidoso Downs racetrack about 12:30 p.m., Saturday.

Ruidoso Downs police chief Ray Garner said Jones was traveling eastbound on Highway 70, attempting to turn left into the race track, when his car was struck by another driven by Mary Boyd, 47, Roswell.

Boyd's 11-year-old son Darin, was also injured in the accident, but was treated and released from the hospital. Garner said Jones was to be cited for no driver's license and improper left turn.

Grass fire did little damage

A fire which broke out about 12:15 p.m., Thursday burned about one-fourth acre of brush and grass on Gavilan Canyon Road between the gravel pit and riding stables.

Ruidoso Fire Department and U. S. Forest Service units answered the call and had the blaze under control within minutes.

A Forest Service spokesman said the fire was definitely man-caused, but no specific cause was determined. "Our only lead was the discovery of fresh horse tracks at the site," the spokesman said.

Crambe could be cash crop for state

An economic study just released shows that crambe, a crop valued for its high oil content, could be a feasible cash crop in New Mexico.

The study by New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Agricultural Experiment Station indicates that the state's climate, processing capabilities and potential demand could support crambe production.

"It doesn't appear that crambe is a miracle crop, but it is a better alternative than some crops now grown in the state," said Dr. Martin Blake, the agricultural economist heading the study. He said the goal in doing the study was to evaluate the economic potential of crambe in New Mexico.

Often when a new crop doesn't live up to its billing, it gets a bad reputation. "In most cases," Blake said, "the initial research wasn't bad and neither was production. The failure was in poor marketing coordination.

"When the soybean was first introduced, it looked like a real loser, but the market was developed and now it's a real cash crop," he said.

Crambe is not really a new crop. The plant, native to the Mediterranean area, was first tested in the United States in the 1940s. In 1963, Dr. Koert J. Lessman, then at Purdue University, began the first detailed agronomic work with crambe. Lessman is now director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at NMSU.

Crambe's rediscovered potential has been spurred by several factors. Many work in New Mexico's favor. The main production incentive is the demand for crambe oil. Crambe seed and its pod contain 26 to 38 percent oil. The refined oil can be a mold lubricant for steel casings, a rubber additive or an ingredient in waxes.

Euric acid from purified crambe oil serves a myriad of uses including making nylon and polyester, lubricating jet engines and even in making insect repellents.

However, it is rapeseed, not crambe that is the major source of euric acid. The United States imports about seven million pounds of high euric rapeseed oil a year, mainly from Canada and Europe. But Canada is now concentrating rapeseed production for food oil and is working to reduce the seed's euric acid content.

The declining supply could be bolstered by crambe, the only other source of high euric acid oil.

Also, erratic changes in the price of soybean meal has cattle producers looking for a more stable source of feed meal. Crambe could fill this need as well. Tests have shown that cattle fed 25 percent crambe meal and 75 percent soybean meal gain as much as cattle fed only soybean meal.

The economic analysis shows that in the state's southern region, crambe is a feasible alternative to upland cotton and green chile if it is double cropped with onion or lettuce. In the northern region, it is a feasible alternative to permanent

pasture if it is double cropped with wheat. The state's high dry climate eliminates many diseases and insect problems and provides an extended growing season.

Blake pointed out that 65,000 acres of crambe are needed yearly to satisfy projected demand for oil. "Whichever region organizes a stable production and marketing system will more than likely capture this market."

Downside at New Mexico's cottonseed processing plants also favors crambe. According to Blake, crambe can be processed at soybean and cottonseed oil mills with only minor machinery adjustments.

Crambe meal also is important to the profitability of growing and marketing the crop, the analysis shows. It can be used safely as a source of protein for cattle.

Although federal law prevents crambe meal from being transported across state lines, New Mexico's large commercial feedlots can use all the crambe meal produced in the state. Interstate clearance is expected soon and then crambe meal can be shipped to larger commercial feedlots in other states.


The question remains, however, of how to market the product. "The big danger with any product is producing without a market, especially with a new crop," Blake said. The best solution is forward contracting, or selling ahead of production.

"It seems that two major groups are willing to forward contract — distributors who know where the markets are and oil mills that crush seeds such as sunflower and cottonseed," he said.

Forward contracting is commonly used to market specialty crops such as chile or perishable crops that need to move into the market quickly.

"The market is there," Blake said of New Mexico, "but the question is who's going to get the ball rolling. If you can't sell the crop, then it doesn't matter how well it will grow."

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
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


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

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Soil maps are reliable for infiltration testing

Soil texture characteristics mapped by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) could be a reliable shortcut for determining soil infiltration rates, say research agronomists.

The agronomists, led by Dr. Peter Wierenga of New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station, recently compared SCS soil survey data with data from field tests. They found the two "surprisingly consistent," said Wierenga.

The positive relationship between the two sets of information means that farmers may be able to use the maps in estimating soil infiltration rates and sidestep costlier methods, he said.

Normally, reliable estimates of the infiltration rate require taking several field measurements either by the infiltrometer or the auger hole methods. Both are costly, time-consuming methods that require some skill. Even then, variability often can be great because physical properties of the soils vary from area to area.

Knowing the soil's infiltration rate is important in designing irrigation and drainage systems. Infiltration rates that are either too high or too low require specialized irrigation techniques. A very low infiltration rate may cause water to stand on the surface for a long time after irrigation or rainfall. Subsoils with low infiltration rates or low permeability may require closely spaced artificial drains and may not be suitable for septic tanks.

"Estimating infiltration rates from existing data would be less expensive and may be suitable for field applications where mapping of the infiltration rate is desired," Wierenga said.

However, the researchers wanted to be sure the SCS information corresponded with field data. To find out, they took an SCS soil survey of a 230-acre farm near Socorro and compared the survey with infiltration rate measurements taken on the farm.


They then constructed maps illustrating the variability in surface and subsurface infiltration rates throughout the 230 acres. The 11 mapping units in the survey had eight soil types ranging from fine sandy loam to clay.

"On a point-to-point basis, the comparison didn't look good," said Wierenga, "but when all soil series were considered, the agreement between actual measured rates and those from the soil maps was quite acceptable."

The comparison shows that it isn't advisable to depend solely on soil maps to decide where to put a septic tank, but it does show that maps are good for general irrigation management. The maps are also excellent sources for general survey information.

Fortunately, said Wierenga, New Mexico has been well served by the SCS, particularly in the Socorro and Mesilla Valley areas. The free surveys are available through local Soil and Water Conservation Districts. He said SCS or county Extension agents would be able to interpret the survey if a farmer had difficulty with the data.

Sal Castillo may not be used to playing at a high altitude but he sure wasn't bothered by it in the Ruidoso Tennis Classic which concluded yesterday at the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club.

The El Paso player took an easy 6-1, 6-1 victory over Jerry Wheeler of Albuquerque for the singles title and teamed with Sam Rivera for second place in doubles competition. Jim Altamirano and Larry Ollason defeated Castillo and Rivera 6-4, 7-6.

"I played well both days," said Castillo of his victory over Wheeler and his semi-final upset of second-seeded Dave Geatz Saturday. "But the altitude obviously affected Wheeler. It's hard to hit passing shots when the ball is traveling so fast because of the altitude."

Castillo, who was seeded third behind Tim Garcia and Geatz going into the tourney, said it wasn't the first time he had played Wheeler.

"I've played him once before but I wasn't at the best of my game," he said.

Castillo and Rivera found the doubles team of Altamirano and Ollason a little too much to handle. The surprising doubles champions toppled tournament director Alex Dorato and Andy Meikle 7-5, 6-4 in the semi-finals after disposing of Garcia and his younger brother Galen 8-2, 6-3 in the quarter-finals.

Rivera and Castillo had beaten Geatz and Gary Wheeler 7-5, 6-4 in the semi-finals to advance to the final round.

Saturday's singles semi-finals saw two upsets with Castillo topping Geatz and

Wheeler, who was seeded fourth, stunning Tim Garcia 7-3, 7-6.

"He (Garcia) didn't get enough returns," said Wheeler of his semi-final victory. "It's the worst I've seen him play. The high altitude got to him."

Wheeler had to come from behind in both sets to get his victory.

Castillo had to go to three sets to topple Geatz, 6-3, 4-8, 6-4 but was in control of his match most of the way.

To get to the semi-finals Castillo beat Ruidoso's Dennis Johnston, 6-1, 6-4 in the opening round and Galen Garcia, 6-2, 6-4 in the quarter-finals. Johnston and Dorato were the only Ruidoso players entered in the tournament.

Wheeler toppled Dorato, 7-6, 6-1 in the quarter-finals to warm up for his match with Tim Garcia.

Garcia topped Tom Rios, 6-1, 6-4 in first-round action and then beat Rivera, 6-4, 6-4 in the quarter-finals.

Dorato looked impressive in doubles competition as he and Meikle beat Joe Long and Gary Stanifer, 6-3, 7-6 in the quarter-finals.

Much of the three-day tournament was played in overcast, rainy weather. This also had an effect on the performances of some of the players.

This was the second year the tournament has been held and it brought 19 singles players and 11 doubles teams together.

I am a hunter and fisherman by choice. I feel no guilt when participating in these activities and apologize to no one. The moral and social issues surrounding these sports are cause for constant debate, and it isn't likely that I could add any brilliant new ideas, but I do believe hunters and fishermen pay their dues and are entitled to enjoy their sports without undue harassment. But enough of that, because I want to get a point across about fishing.

For a long time now, I've been enjoying what fishing has to offer, and I learned to do so with my dad. Those early days spent dunking worms and getting acquainted are among the finest in my memory bank.

Seldom do I meet a fisherman who exhibits more understanding of fishing than my father had. His patience was unrelenting and his love for the sport never faded. Surf fishing was his favorite. For hours he would sometimes sit on the sand gazing into the ocean, without so much as a word. Talk wasn't always necessary because I knew what he felt. If anyone caught fish, he did also. Yet, he never displayed a desire for great stringers full, and if he caught none, the experience was enough. He enjoyed all aspects of hunting and fishing, and I always felt he had a deep understanding of the natural world. My only regret is that I did not share and learn more from him before he departed this life.

Fishing may not be the best way for a father to instill worthwhile values in his son, but it has to be one of the better ones. I worry sometimes that the father-son fishing outing is a waning tradition. That would be an unfortunate thing, not only for the dad and his son, but for the perpetuation of fishing itself. Nothing will kill fishing surer than apathy from the youngsters. They must be taught what it takes to safeguard and perpetuate our fishery resources. They must understand the meaning of sportsmanship and fair play. The idea of catch-and-release and why it is important must be understood.

The innocence of youth needs a direction from the wisdom of age if they are to fully understand and appreciate what the outdoors really means. In an era when the visual arts portrays the wild kingdom as a world of talking fish and cuddly, near human animals, our youngsters must learn that the world of the outdoors is a frequently cruel and nearly always fragile environment that must be cared for.

Give a youngster a day and take him fishing. You will both benefit more than you know, and you'll learn something. I guarantee it.

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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — There is a disease which some of us refer to as "cityroom syndrome."

It often afflicts editors and other executives of daily newspapers who sit inside their buildings and believe that they are there privy to what is going on outside the great world.

(The only way to check on what is going on outside in the great world is to go outside into the great world.)

Those people who run newspapers who are shy, for instance, and who feel safest when they have sealed themselves up inside their cityrooms, rest easy there.

The trouble is that from there — even with the help of the wire services and one's own reporters — it is easy to miss the story of what goes on out in reality.

Example: An editorial from last Sunday's Albuquerque Journal.

This one got on the case of Corrections Secretary Roger Crist, who is certainly not a lasting friend of this department.

What the Journal was griping about was the fact that Corrections Secretary Roger Crist had selected a construction firm named Morrison-Knudson to be overseer on \$90 million of construction for state penal institutions.

That happens to be one of the few good decisions Crist has made since he got his job in New Mexico.

Those of us on the outside of the Journal can more or less sit around and see how this whole shot developed.

— First, some local Albuquerque firms — not Morrison-Knudson, but more like Bradbury and Stamm, and Lemcke Construction, who bid on the job and didn't get it — sang the blues to the Journal.

— Second, the Journal's morgue put out a lot of stories about Morrison-Knudson, including old clippings about Fabian Chavez, Jack Weber, Jack McMann and Ron Hamilton, none of whom really matters in the present instance.

— Third, an alarm went off in the head of somebody at the Albuquerque Journal who believes that, having the clippings from his own paper, he knows the full story of past vice and corruption.

— Fourth, an editorial, having little to do with reality, came out of that person's typewriter.

What's the problem with all that process?

Well, for one thing, it's that none of those names of those "famous" persons has anything much to do with one another.

None of these so-called "facts" relates to

anything else in this editorial.

Morrison-Knudson which isn't an important company simply because it's large, made a fine presentation of this penitentiary matter. As a result of that presentation, it got the job.

And the job is one which matters. Taxpayers who are putting up the money to build all these new penitentiaries our state suddenly finds itself of a mind to construct something about such building is going to be in charge of them.

Our dumb state hasn't done so good in that area in the past.

Neither have our local builders. Neither, needless to say, has the Albuquerque Journal, which makes smart remarks about Fabian Chavez and Jack Weber, at one time or another public relations persons for Morrison-Knudson in New Mexico.

The Journal and its attached newspaper, the Albuquerque Tribune, do, however, know how to apply for the use of tax-free bonds to allow themselves to build a big new plant when they need one.

Somehow, "cityroom syndrome" does not then move anybody to write editorials to appear in their papers to oppose that idea.

This disease is a highly selective one. Apparently, it only takes effect when somebody else — like Morrison-Knudson — is getting the gravy.

The following is a letter that I have submitted to Mr. L. L. Davis Jr., mayor of Ruidoso, requesting assistance with a deplorable situation. I am requesting that you publish this letter.

Dear Mayor Davis:
When my husband and I purchased land in Ruidoso, we were fully cognizant of the fact that Airport West, Unit 2, was partially zoned for commercial use, but we rightfully assumed that we were protected by the restrictive covenants pertaining to this area.

Your attention is invited to Paragraph A-1* of the enclosed copy of the aforementioned covenants. It clearly states that the land shall not be used for any purpose which would create a nuisance. This would seem to rule out a permit for the establishment of a restaurant and saloon which infringes so closely upon a residential area. To refer to Cousins' Restaurant and Saloon as a nuisance is a gross understatement. It is a constant source of monumental aggravation, property damage, and traffic hazards. It is becoming increasingly obvious that adequate parking has not been provided for saloon patrons. Not only do they drive across our property, but they park in front of our driveway, in our driveway, on our property, on both sides of the street, and sometimes even in the middle of the street. On numerous occasions I have called the police for assistance. As always, Police

Chief Swenor and his officers have been most courteous and helpful in trying to alleviate this intolerable situation. However, I would like to suggest that "No Parking" signs be posted in the affected areas as an aid to harassed residents as well as to the Police Department.

Closing time at the saloon is a period of nerve-shattering din in the middle of the night. The revelers and inebriates leave in a cacophony of screams, honking horns, and roaring motors. It would be hard enough if they were parked only in the saloon parking lot; but since many of them are parked on our property and that of our neighbors, it is unbearable. Should you doubt the veracity of these statements, you are cordially invited to spend a night in our home and personally experience this unpleasantness.

Paragraph A-4** of the restrictive covenants deals with the problem of trash. It clearly states that all trash containers shall be placed underground or completely enclosed. This is not the case with the Cousins' establishment. The back of their lot faces out homes and it is strewn with all kinds of litter. This has ruined what was once a very pleasant view. The litter problem does not remain within the confines of the Cousins' property. Their patrons, who park on and around our property, also feel free to discard their trash there. It is then incumbent upon us to clean up after them. Our area was once very neat and well-kept, but it is becoming increasingly difficult to keep it that way.

In the past, you have publicly spoken out against mobile homes. We live in a mobile home, and I assure you that mobile home is not synonymous with slum, and mobile home dweller is not synonymous with second class citizen. Our home is quite presentable, and we are law-abiding, tax-paying citizens who have every right to expect protection from the hazards and annoyances foisted upon us by the operation of Cousins' Restaurant and Saloon.

I sincerely hope that you will see fit to give us the assistance needed to solve these problems.

BACK 'EM OR REPLACE 'EM

A short time ago the Trustees overruled the Planning and Zoning in two cases where mobile homes (R-3) were being moved into an area zoned for single residences (R-1). In spite of the Village Attorney's agreeing with the P&Z recommendation that the mobile homes not be allowed in an area zoned for single family homes the Council overruled the P&Z.

Shortly thereafter the Village Attorney resigned. In this situation emotion outweighed the logic of following the ordinance restricting mobile homes.

On July 14 the Council was asked to approve plats covering 41 condo units known as the Navajo Project. This project had been approved by the P&Z.

It appears, however, that after approving the project a flaw was discovered which might affect a final approval. So, Mike Waldron, as chairman of the P&Z, went before the Council to explain his position in opposing the proposal which his committee had already approved.

Because Waldron took this position the P&Z was roundly criticized by the Mayor for failing to have all their "dicks in a row." In a situation as in this case no one wins as it places a committee, appointed by the Mayor and approved by the Council, in a untenable position. In this particular case it was Waldron's responsibility to advise the Council that they might be approving a project which given the facts, in the case might be otherwise rejected. For his trouble the P&Z was taken to task.

Perhaps the whole matter should have been handled outside the confines of a public meeting.

The Otero County Grand Jury, before being discharged last Wednesday, issued a report accusing former District Attorney Frank Wilson, and his staff, of destroying files and investigative reports on the activities of former Alamogordo mayor and councilman Frank Carr.

Carr recently pleaded guilty to five counts of criminal sexual activity with minors, acts for which he is yet to be sentenced.

What's interesting in the Grand Jury's accusation, concerning the destruction of files and records regarding Carr, is the recommendation that "the next Grand Jury continue to investigate problems surrounding the Frank Carr case and his activities involving young children, which existed for over 20 years, such being common knowledge among local police, judges and public officials."

Those allegations should cause those concerned considerable concern.

The new Otero County Grand Jury impaneled last Wednesday certainly should pursue the accusations made against Wilson.

Further, we feel their investigation should be conducted with zeal and as expeditiously as possible.

Should their investigation indicate that action be taken against Wilson, and others concerned, we trust that this action will be forthcoming.

Should Wilson be able to prove these accusations false, we trust he will immediately set out to clear his name.

But the main thing we hope is that this matter will not be swept under the rug. —CD


ON WATER SUPPLIES

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

still is time to do something about it. At the present rate of conversion, plus growing demand, he estimated that surplus land could be eliminated by the end of the 1980s.

During the 1970s, 40 percent of all new housing was constructed on rural lands, and demographic trends indicate that the population will continue to shift toward rural areas, Jeffords said. The important thing, he warned, is to make sure this


development doesn't take place on prime farm land.

As we approach the turn of the century, there will be a tremendous increase in the demand for food. The Ruidoso Board of Realtors is of the opinion we should protect prime agricultural lands, but should not restrict the right of American property owners working with local governments to determine the highest and best use of their land.

Cattle rustling case unsolved

The sprawling Red Rock Ranch meanders its way over more than 100 sections of rocky, hilly rangeland some 40 miles northwest of Magdalena.

Near the tiny Alamo Band Navajo reservation, the ranch is certainly not on any well beaten path.

But sometime in February or March, intruders paid a visit to the Red Rock Ranch. Manager Len Cox wishes they hadn't.

When Cox started counting heads after his spring roundup he came up short 50 Herefords, valued at more than \$25,000. Cox initiated a search for the missing cattle, but no strays were found.

The cattle rustling case is a rare one for the west-central area of New Mexico, according to Livestock Board Investigator Mel Sedillo.

He said the missing cows and calves had been branded with a Slash/Bar-D on the left hip. No leads have been developed.

This week the State Crime Stoppers

Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of this cattle rustling case. Anyone having any information can call the Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-5983. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Meanwhile, Crime Stoppers programs throughout New Mexico have reported some recent successes.

A tip to Hobbs Crime Stoppers resulted in the arrests of two 16-year-old boys in connection with the armed robbery of a local gas station. Captain Bob Barbaree said \$861 in cash was recovered with the arrests of the pair.

Taos Crime Stoppers also continued to produce impressive results. Robert "Witt" Trujillo, 25, of Taos, was arraigned July 13 after a tip to the local program led police to a motel room in Evanston, Wyoming.

Trujillo was charged with the June 4 burglary of the Moonface Gallery on the Taos Plaza in which some \$50,000 worth of Indian jewelry was taken. The jewelry has not been recovered.

A call to Albuquerque Crime Stoppers

cleared still another homicide. Police say Danny Melendez was arrested without incident at his Southeast Heights apartment in connection with the stabbing death of Bill Chackee, 34, outside the Escondido Lounge on Central Avenue.

Meanwhile, a tip to Socorro Crime Stoppers helped police snare an Albuquerque man wanted in connection with one of the largest fraud schemes in state history. Joe Frank Tafuya, 36, was arrested by Socorro police last week after a caller reported seeing a man fitting the description of a fugitive featured on television by Albuquerque Crime Stoppers.

Tafuya was indicted in June in connection with a fraud ring that allegedly bilked businesses out of as much as \$500,000. The ring used multiple identifications and numerous post office boxes to defraud the businesses.

And still another tip, this to the Crime Stoppers program in Tucson, Arizona, helped Albuquerque police arrest an 18-year-old woman in connection with the February 8 armed robbery of a Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurant. Angela Marie Johns is being held on \$50,000 bond. A second woman was arrested by Tucson police as a result of the same call.

While Crime Stoppers programs throughout New Mexico continue to make life miserable for criminals, plans are progressing rapidly to make life a little brighter for the state's golfers.

The inaugural "Tee Off Against Crime" golf tournament will be held Saturday, August 22. At the Arroyo Del Oso golf course in Albuquerque. The tournament will feature law enforcement and civilian divisions and a two-man bestball. More than \$1,000 worth of merchandise will be presented to the competitors. Entry fee is \$35 per person. Proceeds will go to the State Crime Stoppers Commission reward fund.

distinct styles — mine more free-flowing than his geometrics. We do still have something of a 60's look, but that's being crossed — especially with the silk cloth — into more of a designer look. Our best clients are some of the women from the upper class east side of Oklahoma City, and they want their designs to be 'one of a kind.' They all are, actually, because each piece is done by hand."

The Bacigalups use a batik method, drawing on the cloth with a fine pointed "wax pen" before each stage of the dying. The result is something similar to the old tie-dying method, but much more precise.

ANOTHER FAVORITE with the kids was Pat Trujillo's caricature booth. Trujillo is an Albuquerque resident who does work for the Albuquerque Journal editorial page as well as free lance work. "I only do about three art shows or

festivals a year now," said Trujillo. "I just don't have time for more. When I come down here, there's more than I can handle. I've done 40 kids in the last two hours, and I take a break every half hour or so just to recover."

While Trujillo draws the caricatures with rapid strokes, he talks to the subject to find out their hobbies. One curly-headed

girl of eight years said that she was a basketball player, and she appeared on the page as a giant, soaring above the rim like a Kareem-Abdul-Jabbar for a slant.

For me, Trujillo drew a caricature of the archetypal reporter banging away, a bare light bulb hanging from the ceiling, rejects falling off the desk. The \$5 fee seemed well worth it, just for the laugh.

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I'd like to collect a few wildlife prints, but most are priced above what I can afford. The thing I don't understand is why they are so expensive when they are really only copies of an original painting. Could you explain this? Jim G., Arkansas

Dear Jim — It is true that prints are copies of original art, but the process must be expertly done on quality paper in order to capture the color and detail of the original.

There are several other factors that determine the price of a print. If the artist is well known and his painting becomes popular, the price goes up. Usually, such works are issued in numbered and signed, limited editions, meaning only a specified number will be available with the artist's signature. The number issued may be only 250, or possibly more than 1,000. The less issued the more expensive the print. Frequently, remarked prints are also

offered. In such a case, the artist draws a small design in the lower print margin and signs it. This is sometimes done in pencil. A remarked print is more expensive than a signed one. Limited edition, numbered and signed prints can be a very good investment, but I wouldn't suggest investing heavily until one has learned why a certain print might increase in value.

If you simply want a print by a well known artist to hang and aren't particularly interested in its future value, many times smaller versions of limited prints are later issued on an unlimited basis. They are unnumbered and unsigned, but usually are quite inexpensive.

If you can mat your print and make a frame for it you can save some bucks by buying it unframed. But if you have as many thumbs as I, maybe not.
