Bold Love wins Classic

Bold Love got off to a flying start in Sunday's 13th running of the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic at Ruidoso Downs.

The four-year-old mare quickly established a half length lead in the 440 yard dash which offered a gross purse of \$145,880.

That heads-up getaway turned out to be a crucial factor for Bold Love. In the final yards, she was put to extreme pressure by Lucks Gay Chic, a colt running as part of a strong three-horse entry.

But Bold Love, the property of Thelma Spencer of Edmond, Oklahoma, managed to maintain a head advantage when she swept across the finish line. Steve Harris was at the controls.

Bold Love notched her second stakes victory of the meeting (the first was the Jet Deck Stakes on July 10) and enriched herself by \$72,940. That put her 1981 earnings at \$83,672. Since the start of last year, she's earned \$109,489.


Bold Love's journey in the Classic was timed in 21.94 seconds against a headwind. This was a bit over Rule The Deck's top qualifying time of 21.88.

Fans who made Bold Love a 3-1 shot in the Classic collected \$8 to win, \$4 to place, \$3.80 to show. The mare is now a four-time winner at the meeting. David Fry does the training. In last week's trials, she won by one and one-half lengths and set the second best qualifying time of 21.95.

Lucks Gay Chic, owned by the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma, broke in second place. The colt ran gamely, trimming away the deficit at the end — but he just didn't have enough power to overtake Bold Love in the final jump or two. The colt stayed close to the rail all the way.

Lucks Gay Chic, ridden by Richard Bickel, earned \$24,799, which beefed his 1981 money line up to \$34,350. The mutual payoffs: \$3.80 to place, \$4 to show.

Oh Shiney, an entrant of Lucks Gay Chic (both are trained by Hugh Tucker), settled in third place early, then was unable to improve his status. Jacky

The Old West comes to life at Old Lincoln Town this weekend.

There's the 41st showing of the pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid," the Pony Express Race from White Oaks to Lincoln, an Old Time Fiddler's Contest, street parade and various displays depicting life in that area in the late 1880's.

The weekend action includes:

FRIDAY — Pageant, 8:30 p.m.

SATURDAY — Pony Express Race, 8-10 a.m. Fiddler's contest 1:30 p.m. Pageant, 8:30 p.m.

SUNDAY — Street parade 1:30 p.m. Pageant 3:30 and 8:30 p.m.

SATURDAY-SUNDAY:

Viewing memorabilia displayed along the street. Musketry turkey shoot by the Mountain Men of New Mexico. Horseshoe pitching. The bivouac camp of the First New Mexico Territorial Volunteers, depicting conditions in a military camp during the territorial era. Demonstrations of adobe laying, making tortillas and Indian bread, spinning, weaving and quilting. Viewing the Lincoln County Heritage Trust and Lincoln State Monuments.

Headlining the action is the four presentations of the pageant. The setting is the Lincoln County War, centering on the part played in that violent period by Billy the Kid. All of the skullduggery, shootouts and intrigue of the war unfolds in the amphitheatre. In addition, there's the dramatic portions including appeals for aid and the touch of humor is contained in a can-can dance number. The Kid, naturally, is the most featured individual though there may be some doubts as to if he was the somewhat benign figure shown to be in the pageant. There have been script changes for this year's show, including, in this, the 100th anniversary of the Kid's death, an added act showing his demise at the hands of Sheriff Pat Garrett.

The Pony Express Race riders carry first class mail and, for this race, are official carriers for the United States Postal Service. To have letters carried by the riders, and bearing a gold seal indicating it has been carried by Pony Express, letters must reach: Pony Express, Lincoln, New Mexico 88338 by August 5. Each letter must bear 18 cents postage and there must be 50 cents included for each letter to be carried in the race.

Prior to the gunshot starting the race at 8 a.m., at White Oaks, a chuckwagon

breakfast is served by the White Oaks Historical Society. The repast includes bacon, eggs, fresh biscuits, preserves and strong black coffee, all cooked and served outside. Serving gets underway about 6:30 and those attending are advised to wear warm clothing, as the morning air is crisp, if not downright cold, in White Oaks.

The riders follow a mountainous course through the Capitan Gap, to the Rio Bonito and then on to the finish line in the field just north of the Old Lincoln County Courthouse. The race will be over around 10 a.m., and spectators are kept abreast of progress and incidents occurring via radio, which is relayed over the loud speaker.

The fiddling contest occupies much of Saturday afternoon, as there are many contestants in each of the divisions. An enjoyable feature of this contest is listening to the warmup sessions and the jamming that takes place for at least two hours before the contest gets underway. Most of this takes place in back of the courthouse, in the parking area.

For viewing pleasure there is the parade and the various demonstrations and exhibits on the street. Then there is touring the shops, the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, Lincoln State Monuments and the newly dedicated Visitors Center.

Parade marshals this year will be Mr. and Mrs. Robert O. Anderson with Glen Dennis and Sue Graham as parade chairmen. The Fort Bliss band will again be one of the parade highlights.

Information on entering the Pony Express Race is available from Lois Clements, telephone 653-4033, Picacho. Lincoln is located on Highway 380 12 miles east of Capitan and 10 miles west of Hondo. The White Oaks turnoff is just north of Carrizozo on Highway 54 onto Highway 349, a total distance of about 12 miles on blacktop road. For a glimpse into yesteryear, take in the celebration at Lincoln and rest assured you'll never forget "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid."

Ruidoso man accident victim

Camp inmate slain Sunday

An inmate at the minimum security Camp Sierra Blanca died as a result of a beating Sunday, according to state corrections officials. He was identified as Scott Wayne Thompson, 20.

Thompson had been serving a four-year term for armed robbery in Lincoln County. He had only been at Camp Sierra Blanca for two days after a transfer from the Central New Mexico Correctional Center at Los Lunas.

Thompson's body was found at 3:15 a.m., Sunday by Lincoln County sheriff's

deputies, who had been notified when an hourly head count after midnight did not include Thompson. His body was found on the ground behind a barracks after a search.

"It appears he had been hit over the head with a blunt instrument and kicked repeatedly," said Jeff Pederson, state Corrections Department public information officer.

The death was being investigated by the Lincoln County sheriff and by state police, according to Pederson. An autopsy has also been ordered.

Trio facing burglary charges

Brett Campbell, 20, Ruidoso, and two juveniles were arrested last week and charged in connection with recent burglaries of almost \$40,000 in jewelry and cash from area businesses and residences.

A spokesman for the Criminal Investigation Division (CID) of the Ruidoso Police Department said Campbell and one 17-year-old juvenile were charged with three of the burglaries. The other

juvenile, also 17, was allegedly involved with only one incident, and was charged with three of the burglaries.

Both juveniles were referred to the juvenile probation office. Campbell made a first appearance before magistrate James Wheeler, and was released on his own recognizance.

The series of burglaries allegedly began about June 23, when the Anderson Collection reported about \$30,000 worth of

jewelry missing. On July 5, the Sonic Drive-in reported that \$295 in cash had been stolen.

The theft of more than \$5,000 in cash and jewelry was reported taken from two Ruidoso Downs homes and five residences in Pinescliff, on July 20, police said. On the same day, the theft of \$210 in cash was reported by Holiday Bowl.

Much of the cash and jewelry was recovered, the CID spokesman said.

Chamber has installed new information service

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has added a new service which will help provide information to visitors 24 hours a day.

The Chamber office has installed professional cassette recording equipment which plays recorded messages aimed at

answering the three "most asked" questions from visitors, according to Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth.

Visitors activate the tapes by pressing buttons which are mounted in the enclosed foyer of the Chamber office — the area

which is open to the public 24 hours daily.

The three-channel device dispenses information on campgrounds — directions and information on fees and facilities; on current events — what's happening in and around Ruidoso; and on scenic trips which include explanations of routes leading out from and back to Ruidoso. The latter mentions such area attractions as Monjeau, Capitan and the Smokey Bear Museum and Park, Lincoln town, the Hondo Valley, Mesalero Reservation, Cloudcroft, International Space Hall of Fame and White Sands National Monument.

The "current events" tape is updated each Monday morning, with the addition of information on upcoming horse races and so on. The tape will also be used to inform visitors of such events as Aspencade, Arabian Horse Show, Hunter-Jumper Show, Mule Races, the Up with People Concert, Billy the Kid pageant.

The other tapes, Jungbluth said will probably change seasonally. Once the campgrounds close for the winter, information about the ski season, such as ski area locations, rates and hours will probably be substituted for the camping information, he said.


Messages are recorded on an "endless loop system," so that they begin immediately after a visitor punches the appropriate button. The recorder also refers the listener to maps and printed information which is available in the front foyer.

Jungbluth expressed thanks to Ed Hyman, owner of KRRR radio, for his assistance in locating the equipment, which was purchased second hand from a Dallas promotional firm. Hyman has also allowed Jungbluth to make use of his studios for the recording sessions.

Jungbluth said he also is looking into the possibility of installing some sort of counting device which would help the Chamber determine which messages are used most.

Handicap purses hiked for Downs' horsemen

The drastic increase in this season's mutual handle at Ruidoso Downs has enabled horsemen to run for more purse money than ever before.

"Right now, unless something dramatic happens in the handle, we're planning to raise every overnight handicap by \$2,500," said Racing Secretary Donald Rausch. "We're real pleased we can offer so much more in our handicap program."

"It helps the handicaps and keeps the real tough horses running."

Throughout the first 45 race days, the daily average mutual handle of \$514,824 was 14.75 percent higher than 1980's corresponding figure of \$448,461. The total handle was almost \$3 million better than last year's corresponding figure.

In the latest condition book, which runs through August 16, five handicaps were each increased by \$2,500.

The Futurity Prep Stakes on August 7 is now a \$10,000-added race, The Jockey Club Stakes on August 8 is now a \$15,000-added race, the Mr. Tattoo Handicap on August 9 is now a \$10,000-added event, the Three Bars Handicap on August 10 will be a \$12,500-added chase and the Ruidoso Speed Handicap on August 16 will be a \$15,000-added race.

Rausch said the Ruidoso Sprint Championship, set for August 29 at six furlongs, will presumably be hiked from \$15,000-added to \$17,500-added.

"I believe that will be the richest race ever in New Mexico for older handicap horses in a sprint," Rausch said.

"Our overnight allowance races are getting as high as the handicaps, so we're

increasing our handicaps. It's just not right for allowance horses to be getting as much as handicap horses, so we hope this pleases the horsemen."

The remaining handicap races scheduled for \$2,500 hikes include The Roadrunner Stakes on September 3 from

Owner drove 14 hours to watch her horse win

She arrived around 8 p.m., just in time to see her Bold Love post a head victory in the \$145,880 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic at Ruidoso Downs. "Oh, yes it definitely was worth the long drive," she said following the victory, which provided \$72,940. "It's the biggest win I've ever had. We raised her from a baby so it's really special."

"I've been in the horse business 15 years. She's the best because she's mine. We owned the dam and sire and we bred her."

Bold Love led throughout in running a 21:94 clocking for the 440 yard course. But she wasn't always such a brilliant pupil for trainer David Fry.

"The only trouble she ever had with this track was that it was too deep for her last year. She holds three track records (at

"She seems to be getting better each time," said the blond-haired rider. "She broke on top and just stayed in front all the way. I was asking her a bunch since the one on the inside (Luca's Gay Chic) was coming on pretty strong."

was apparent Ruffast was laboring under her heavy burden. The people's choice (she was 1-2) was unable to put up much resistance in the final half dozen strides. That's Class easily swept into the lead, winning by a half length and earning \$8,660 out of the gross purse of \$11,100.

That's Class, the property of Walter Merrick of Bayre, Oklahoma, was moderately weighted at 115 pounds. The mare clocked the five and one-half furlongs in 1:06 4/5 seconds and returned \$13.20, \$3.40, \$2.40.

That's Class holds only one other win at the meeting. That came against Ruffast in the Inaugural Purse on May 10. That's Class was 22-1 in that one.

Ruffast, ridden by Richard Bickel for Jay C. Childers of Berger, Texas, snapped a four race win streak with her rump-up finish in the First Lady. Still she earned \$2,442, and that pushed her 1981 earnings up to \$54,358. Fans who backed Ruffast in the First Lady wagering collected \$2,600, \$2.20.

Cap's First, a 16-1 shot who raced in the first flight all the way, ended up third and returned \$3.20. Ramon Apodaca was up.

Hattab Voladora, the mare who'd won three allowance races in Omaha,

Nebraska, was supposed to give Ruffast some arguments. But Hattab Voladora showed little incentive under her 121 pound load and ran a lackluster fifth.

MR. CLYDE, a gelding who's been chasing some of the leading stakes horses at Ruidoso Downs this season, went against far softer company in Friday's headliner and came through with an easy win.

Mr. Clyde, ridden by Louie Gomez, boomed out of second place in the six furlong sprint and hit the wire nearly two lengths on top. The victory came in his sixth outing of the season. It was also his first 1981 visit to the Ruidoso winner's circle.

Mr. Clyde is owned by Ralph Miller of Ft. Worth, Texas. The gelding went off at just over 6-1 and produced mutual payoffs of \$14.80, \$3.20 and \$5. He earned \$3,540.

The track was good from day-long rains and slowed Mr. Clyde's clocking down to 1:15 2/5 seconds.

True Rounder, a 5-1 shot, set most of the pace, then relinquished the lead and slumped to second. He paid \$6.20, \$4.40. Kansas City Risk, an 8-1 outsider, held on for third and paid \$4.80.

SPANISH SPADE hardly exerted himself while coasting to a two length win in Thursday's six furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

Spanish Spade, piloted by Billy Byers,

galloped along in the middle of the pack during most of the journey. At the turn for home, Spanish Spade began to accelerate. He took change easily and opened up in the stretch.

The spin was one of three elimination trials leading to the upcoming \$40,000 Rio Grande Futurity. The top three finishers in each trial earned a berth. The 10th and final spot was filled via a draw among the fourth place finishers. Funny Phantom won the draw.

Spanish Spade, the property of Virgil Callaway of Hobbs, earned \$1,000 for Thursday's victory and returned low mutual payoffs of \$3.20, \$2.60 and \$2.40. Although light rain was falling from dark and heavily clouded skies, the track was still in fast condition. Spanish Spade was timed in 1:18 4/5 seconds.

Tammy Bond (\$3.60, \$3) finished second at 5 1/2-1 odds, while third went to Mr. Golden Zipper (\$3.20), a 10-1 outsider.

The qualifiers from the 7th race: Shesgottobeadandy, Kacy Dawn, Mr. Zips Bomy; from the 8th race: Draconic Runner, Bionic Lil, Coysa's Prize.

Trainer Billy Hitt enjoyed a big afternoon, launching four winners, including Spanish Spade. His other winners were Draconic Runner, Shesgottobeadandy and Prince Draconic. Those four wins marked a seasonal trainer record (for a regular 12 race program).

Thoroughbred Yearling Sale eases past \$500,000 mark

An unnamed colt by Duck Dance out of Tarnalis Pie brought the top price among the 91 thoroughbred yearlings sold over the weekend in the ninth annual Summer Sale held at the All-American Sale Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds.

The colt changed hands for \$36,000 as John Coates of Austin, Texas, bought him from Mrs. John R. Shaw of Jacksonville, Florida.

The second-highest-price colt in the first straight thoroughbred yearling sale in Ruidoso Downs' history was purchased for \$35,000. Sally Durrigan Sebastian of

Ahliene, Texas, bought Pueblo Ville from Herold Wells of Pauls Valley, Oklahoma. Pueblo Ville is by Old Pueblo out of Nordegg.

Overall, the 91 yearlings sold brought total sales of \$507,000. The average price was \$5,571.

The sale drew high praise from Bobby Lewis, who's in the first year as director of horse sales for Ruidoso-Sunland.


"I think we've opened up the market for thoroughbred yearlings in New Mexico and the surrounding states," he said.

Passion Play, who was purchased for \$15,000 by Leroy Spira of Snyder, Texas.



THIS BOLT OF LIGHTNING bisecting the plains above Fort Stanton was caught by News photographer Greg Stephens Friday afternoon.




A DILAPIDATED HOUSE is dwarfed by cliffs midway between Capitan and Lincoln.

Both Grantham and Moffit have done much to get adult and youth soccer programs going in the Ruidoso area. Without them soccer programs would probably be defunct in Ruidoso.

A note of interest to local football fans. Steve Myer, who was a standout quarterback at the University of New Mexico, retired from pro football last week after four years with the Seattle Seahawks.

Myer played behind scrambler Jim Zorn at Seattle and started only four games, all in 1977. He completed 70 of 130 passes that season for 730 yards.

However, Myer injured his back at the beginning of last season and missed the entire year. He was still bothered by the injury when he reported to camp this year.

Myer decided to hang his pads

quickly and took a 17-0 advantage into the locker room. The winners scored 23 more points in the second half to put away the victory.

Sweeney leads North upset

Just when the big crowd at the University of New Mexico arena seemed ready to fall asleep James Sweeney awoke them with a start.

The result was a 108-103 North victory over the South and an end to the latter's three-year win streak in the AAA-AAAA basketball classic.

The South led by 14 points, 73-59, with 14 minutes left in the contest, Sweeney, who led all scorers with 34 points, started hitting everything he put up from the outside. The 6-2 Albuquerque High School graduate fouled out with less than a minute left in the game but the North had taken a 105-103 lead by then.

Bill Donovan, a 5-11 guard from Sandia High School of Albuquerque, gave the North the lead with two free throws at the 1:00 mark.

By this time the South's 6-5 Vincent Taylor, state player of the year, and 6-7 Bill Turner had fouled out. Thus, the South's tallest man on the floor was 6-4 Louis Marsh of Las Cruces and he wasn't able to rebound with 6-7 Robert Von Amelnunzen and 6-6 Jim Roberts of the North.

The South, coached by Ruidoso mentor Barry Nelson, led the entire first half as it was able to put its running game to work against the supposedly slower North squad.

The incomparable Taylor wowed the crowd in the first minute of the contest as he made a slam dunk off a feed from Hobbs High School teammate Zac Sharp for a 4-2 South lead.

That seemed to spark the 'Rebels' as they drove to a six-point lead several times in the first half. Taylor, Artesia's Mike Aguirre and Glenn Ryan of Ruidoso sparked the South attack. Ryan canned six points in the first half. Taylor and Turner led the South with 20 points apiece for the game and Aguirre, a wiry 6-3 forward, added 19.

The South held a slim 50-47 margin at the 15-minute break but came out at the beginning of the second half determined to break the game wide open. Turner, a Tularosa graduate who is headed for the University of Texas at El Paso on a football scholarship, started hitting inside and the South steadily increased its lead, gaining a 14-point advantage several times.

But then Sweeney got hot and the tide turned.

Sweeney hit a three-point play to move the North within 10 points. Then Sweeney, Von Amelnunzen and point guard Lawrence Pacheco rallied the North to within striking distance in the last few minutes.

The South led 103-96 with less than three minutes left before Taylor and Turner

fouled out. Thus, the North was able to go inside easier. Sweeney hit a pair of foul shots before Donovan put the North ahead and added a single foul shot for a 105-103 North lead.

The South didn't score in the last two minutes of the contest.

Nelson admitted the loss of Taylor and Turner hurt his team.

"It hurt our players more psychologically than physically," he said. "When they went out our players felt they would have a tough time of it."

"I wasn't surprised when Sweeney started hitting," Nelson said. "I felt all along that he would be a threat to us the entire game. Some people didn't think he would hurt us but I felt he'd be very tough."

Nelson also praised the play of Ryan, who had 10 points for the entire game.

"I thought he did very well," said Nelson of his ex-Ruidoso star. "He played an outstanding game on defense against some very good players."

Ryan is headed for Howard Junior College in Texas.

In the AA-A game the North took a 106-96 victory over the South. Deke Lamay of Captain scored 12 points for the losers. The North has won all three games since the AA-A series started in 1979.

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
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Going Strong

Still Flying High At Age 77

Ralph W. Tyler has come into his own in this age of extensive travel, and he's not willing to let up. He remembers the early 1920's wearing a helmet and a leather jacket, he flew from city to city in an open cockpit plane a hundred feet over railroad tracks. Today, he gets most of his writing done while he commutes from his home in Palo Alto, California, to consulting jobs all over the country and the world. "Traveling is the time I do my writing," he said. "I'm too old for stewardesses."

Dr. Tyler is one of the best-known experts in the education field: Director emeritus of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University, senior consultant for Science Research Associates, in Chicago and author of the textbook *Basic Principles of Curriculum and Instruction*. He has taught, and is still teaching, at universities all over the world. At age 77, he has devoted nearly half a cen-



tury to the field of education.

Today, Tyler teaches a seminar in curriculum evaluation and testing at the University of South Carolina, holds chairmanships of the National Advisory Council on Research and Vocational Education and the board of the Marion College Testing Program and is a consultant to the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.

What keeps him going? Tyler says he thinks he has inherited his longevity, since his father, a minister, was active until he died at age 84. He says his three brothers, ages 85, 81 and 75, are

also still active. "My gerontologist tells me that those who keep active live the longest," said Dr. Tyler.

Tyler began his career as a high school teacher in Pierre, South Dakota, in 1921. For the next 17 years, he held teaching positions at the University of Nebraska, the University of North Carolina, the Ohio State University and the University of Chicago. He was appointed the first director of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford, where scholars from the social sciences could spend their time applying their knowledge to problems not traditionally part of their field. He retired from that post in 1967 but has kept himself busy on numerous commission, consulting and teaching posts.

Dr. Tyler is widowed and has three children and 10 grandchildren. Despite his extensive traveling, he says he still finds time to visit his family and often stays with his eldest daughter in Evanston, Illinois.

After being in education for so many years, Tyler has a much more optimistic view of public education than many parents of today.


"Usually, when there is a downturn in the economy, people have to blame something, but they don't blame themselves," said Dr. Tyler.

He said that though most people believe the public school system, in general, is poor, those same people will say their own schools are good. "It's a question of changing attitudes," he said. "Title I evaluations each year show that education overall is improving."

Lockport, New York, has its own share of senior "good buddies". CB radios, antennas and slide mounts have been installed in all five of the town's senior center vehicles. And plans are under way to have a radio at the center manned by seniors.

The installation was provided by REACT (Radio Emergency Associated Citizens Teams), a nonprofit public service organization that provides citizen groups with two-way radio communications in local emergencies.

"The CB system will come in handy, especially for the center's day care escort service," said Millie Brown, director of transportation for the Lockport Center. She cited an example of a driver whose van was disabled on the highway and who had to sit for several hours before receiving help. She hopes the CB systems will prevent those problems.

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SANTA FE—No writer is skillful enough to make a real attention-grabber out of a story on the state's permanent fund.

Somewhat, after money gets above the one-billion-dollar mark, it turns into an uninteresting abstraction. We can all believe a \$20 bill in the pocket of our jeans, but nobody feels that same sense of reality about a billion and quarter dollars.

And that's just about what the state's permanent fund had grown to by July 1 of this year—\$1.24 billion, up from \$857 million when Bruce King took office this time.

Sam Garcia, who is the outgoing investment officer for the state, is proud of that rise, and of at least these other improvements as well:

- Yield from the fund during the last two and-a-half years is up 145 percent;
- Rate of return grew from 6.03 percent to 10.49 percent during the same period; and
- Low-yield assets, which once made up 60 percent of the portfolio, were reduced to 28 percent.

(See? Your eyes are already glazing over from those figures. You wish we'd shut up or at least get on to something more interesting than numbers.)

Well, there is the question of why, with such success to report, Sam Garcia is the "outgoing" investment officer.

Reason: He lost his cool when he was accused of making a couple of unwise stock sales and of leaning on brokers to contribute solely to the Democratic party. Sam mistakenly chose to lash back at his accusers, implying that their charges really emanated from investment counselors who got none of his business.

Governor King may have been a slight amount weak in his defense of Sam, because the Governor had nothing to gain by battling with the powerful folks who

were then accusing Sam of wrongdoing. As a result, the lawmakers simply wrote Sam's job, and with it Sam, right out of existence.

By law, they created a post with even more power and much tougher job specs. Even after culling the original applications for the post once, there are still 40 people vying for the position—which, by the way, is required by law to pay a minimum of \$50,000 per year. (Legally, it could pay anything from that point on up to infinity. No wonder folks want the job.)

As a result, Sam presenting the foregoing statistics to the Board of Finance last week, appeared to be much like a man reading his own will and testament before he has passed on.

Most of those of us who were listening understand where Sam was coming from.

He naturally wants a big "well done," even though we know times—high interest rates, big dividends and lots of bucks for those in the stock-and-bond market—have positively affected almost everyone's investing money, for themselves or for others.

High royalty payments from oil and gas leases on state lands also haven't hurt that rise in yield to the permanent fund either. Sam, in fact, may have been at the right place at the right time: when state-owned property was beginning to generate lots of money for the first time in history.

As for the incoming investment officer, he or she will probably look like a hero too, at least for the first few months.

What matters is total performance. To make us citizens money whether the market is rising or falling is the challenge.

Sam Garcia's opponents don't automatically take over when he goes. Whoever gets the job, we hope he or she will be at least as efficient as Sam has been.

Sense & Nonsense

A survey taken last spring in a major news magazine pointed out that a majority of Americans considered a balanced federal budget a greater national priority than an across-the-board tax cut. As usual, the American people are right.

Not that a tax cut is unnecessary. Congress for years has been trying to balance the budget on the backs of the American taxpayer, which has resulted in uncontrolled spending, higher budget deficits, and runaway inflation, which makes the taxpayers' dollars shrink in value. Without a three year across-the-board tax cut, with business tax reductions, America's productivity will certainly stay where it is today—at zero. With a tax reduction we should reach the three percent productivity growth we have enjoyed historically.

But we must not, in our zeal to cut taxes, forget about budget deficits that could be a reality in the future. Every deficit adds to the national debt, which is expected to top one trillion dollars by the end of the year. The interest on this debt is more than \$100 billion. This is \$100 billion that is not used for any purpose except paying the interest

on the national debt. It does not create new investment. It does not produce any new jobs. It does not contribute one positive factor to our nation's prosperity or economy. In fact, it is a major cause of the current inflation.

This is why, though I enthusiastically support the President's tax cut proposals, I am also aware that without a balanced budget, the tax cuts will not be enough to put this nation on the road to economic recovery. We need to significantly reduce federal spending to increase productivity. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that for every one percent rise in the unemployment rate, the federal deficit is worsened by \$29 billion, \$22 billion from lost revenues and \$7 billion in higher spending on unemployment benefits.

The Senate Omnibus Tax Bill, now being debated on the Senate floor, is almost identical to the President's proposal and contains those incentives which I feel are necessary for economic recovery. The cut appears to be heavily balanced in favor of individuals and small business, but this is only because this group of Americans have had to bear an unfair share of the tax burden of this nation. The President's tax proposals give incentives to what has been the backbone of the nation's economy since the birth of the republic—the small business community.

The across-the-board 25 percent tax reduction over three years benefits not only individuals, but small business as well, since 90 percent of the businesses in this country pay their taxes on an individual basis. There is more in the Senate bill to stimulate small business. A first year expensing provision would allow a small business to deduct a full \$5,000 a year instead of resorting to the slower process of depreciation on the purchase of new equipment. This depreciation allowance would be raised to \$10,000 by 1985.

The amount of minimum accumulated earnings credit for small business would be raised to \$250,000, and the bill would also raise the number of Sub-S shareholders to 25. Both these measures would funnel more capital into small business. The tax bill would also reduce the bottom two corporate tax brackets to 15 and 18 percent, and the limitation on the ITC for used equipment would be raised to \$250,000.

In short, reduced federal spending and tax cuts must go hand in hand in order for the economic recovery program to succeed. I am working hard so that both aspects of the President's program are successful.

We would like to know the criteria employed by Nick Pappas, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD), Roswell, to divide some \$21 million for low rent housing development in Roswell, Artesia and Ruidoso.

We know he did not consult with Ruidoso's elected officials.

It would appear as though Pappas employed a formula based on the 1980 census returns, to come up with about \$1 million for Ruidoso and some \$20 million to be divided between Artesia and Roswell.

The decision certainly wasn't predicated on the rate of residential and business development in the three entities.

We suspect Ruidoso's issuance of building permits exceeds that of either Artesia or Roswell, possibly even both.

We doubt if anything can now be done to gain a more equitable share of these funds for Ruidoso.

We do believe, however, there's someone, with an interest in Ruidoso, that can take the necessary action to have Pappas' memory refreshed to the fact that Ruidoso is in southeastern New Mexico.

In view of the possibility, someplace down the line that SNMEDD can give Ruidoso and Lincoln County some financial assistance, we trust this "someone" will take the necessary steps to refresh Pappas' memory and not necessarily to his satisfaction. —CD

BRIEF BIT: Looks as though Ronnie Baby's has the House Democrats eating out of his hand ... leaving as the question, when'll he get bitten? ... CD

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

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

Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — As a fisherman, I know that I should be familiar with the Dingell-Johnson (D-J) Act, and how it affects sport fishing. I must admit, however, that I know very little about it. I do know it is a manufacturers' tax on some equipment, but I'm not sure what it's used for.

My interest is kindled because I understand a bill has been introduced to expand the present D-J Act. I'd like to know if it's just another inflationary move, or if it will really benefit fishermen? Clayton T., Delaware

Dear Clayton — The Dingell-Johnson Act was passed in 1950. It levies a 10 percent federal tax on some sport fishing equipment at the manufacturers' level. If you guessed this increased cost is passed on to the consumer, you are right. This was really the expected intent. In this way, fishermen play an important role in supporting their sport, just as hunters do.

The proposed expansion of D-J would extend the 10 percent manufacturers' tax to fishing lines, hooks, and other accessories. It would also place a 3 percent tax on certain recreational boats, motors, and trailers. In general, boats under 25

feet, commercial sport fishing boats of any length, and canoes will be subject to the tax. The reasoning here is that at least 80 percent of all recreational boats are involved in fishing.

What about the money raised? D-J in its present form raises about \$11 million annually. The new expanded bill would generate a total of about \$80 million annually. These monies are used to improve and protect fish habitat, provide new public access to fishing waters, construct new fishing lakes, stock fish, and improve management techniques. This includes land purchases and construction and operation of fish hatcheries.

The D-J Act is not inflationary because it is a pay-as-you-go program. It does not use funds that must be borrowed. The monies taken in are distributed to the states on a three-to-one matching basis. That is three parts federal, one part state. Allocations are based upon total state area and number of licenses sold, however, no state receives more than five percent of the total available, or less than one percent.

Is the expansion of the bill a good proposal? I think it is. It allows those who have a direct interest to contribute to programs that are desperately needed to improve and perpetuate the sport of fishing. Many leaders of the boating and fishing industries endorse the program as a good one.

TIP FROM READER — Stings and bites from insects not only cause immediate pain, but often prolonged itching. Scratching satisfies the itch temporarily but does little to stop it. Aside from that, scratching often breaks the skin and paves the way for infection.

The next time you are bitten or stung, try something different. As soon as possible after the attack, wet the spot with water, then rub a meat tenderizer onto the bite. The tenderizer will do wonders to stop the itch. Beverly G., Louisiana

Youth group to camp out in forest

More than 300 Royal Rangers — the boys' outdoor and camping organization of the Assemblies of God Churches — will participate in a three-day "powwow" camp-out at Sixteen Springs, in the Mayhill District of the Lincoln National Forest August 7-9.

The campers, from throughout the state, will work with the Forest Service on several conservation projects during their stay, including cutting especially-designated trees, planting trees, and building a gabion structure to control erosion. The organization has about 35 Alamogordo members and about 150,000 in the United States. It operates in 34 countries, and is 20 years old.

Campers may spend no more than 14 days out of thirty in the Lincoln National Forest, according to a Forest Service spokesman. He explained that until last week, campers were limited to 14 consecutive days on the forest, which meant that after spending one night somewhere else, they could return. Crowded conditions in the campgrounds made the new rule of 14 days out of 30 necessary.

Forest areas are receiving heavy usage

The Smokey Bear District, at Ruidoso, is reporting frequent thunder showers, accompanied with lightning. Fire danger is moderate. Southfork Campground is receiving heavy use and others receiving light to moderate use. Streams are running high and muddy. Bonito Lake is receiving heavy fishing pressure. Secondary roads and hiking trails are muddy after showers. Fuelwood gatherers are asked to check with the ranger district office in Ruidoso before going into any fuelwood areas.

The Visitor Information Service Program at Southfork Campground is held on Saturday evenings at dark. There will be a hunter pistol shoot at the Ruidoso Gun Club Range in Palo Verde Canyon on August 16. The public is welcome. For more information call Charles Moore in the evenings, at 378-4603.

Cloudcroft Ranger District is also having afternoon thundershowers. Fire conditions are low. All campgrounds are open, including Sleepy Grass, where road work is finished. There is a campfire program at Silver Overflow area on Saturdays at dark. The east end of Silver Overflow area is reserved as a special use area for camping clubs, etc. Resurfacing work on United States Highway 82 has been temporarily halted. Secondary roads and trails are in good condition but muddy in places. Fuelwood Area 13 is open. There is a new free use fuelwood area open — stop by the district office for a map. Joplin Ridge fuelwood area has been rained out but will reopen after the roads dry out.

Fire conditions are moderate on the Guadalupe District. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is receiving heavy use. Resurfacing work is continuing on New Mexico Highway 137. Trail conditions are good. Fuelwood areas are open. Public should be aware of changing weather conditions and rattlemakes.

The Mayhill District reports that James Canyon Campground is receiving heavy use. Fishing is fair on the Penasco River. Fuelwood areas are open.

Inasmuch as the application deadlines have passed for public land antelope and elk permits, the fate of you prospective hunters now rests in a hand of cards and the luck of the draw.

A number of hunters have expressed an interest in just exactly what happens to their application once it has been submitted and how the drawing system actually works. Therefore, I am going to address this article to those questions.

When an application is received at the area office level it is first given a quick look for correctness. Upon acceptance, record is made of the species being applied for, the date of receipt, the names on the application, the application number, and the form of remittance. The final destination of all applications, whether from an area office or from individuals, is the Special Hunt Section in our Santa Fe office.

The Special Hunt people again check all applications for correctness. Then, the applications are batched according to each 100 applicants.

These batches of 100's are sent to Data Processing and computer cards are key punched for each individual. Data Processing returns the application and cards back to the Special Hunt people where the information is checked again. Once the information is verified, it is then entered into the computer's records.

Finally, it's time for the drawing and this is where the hand of cards comes in. Ten playing cards are used for the drawing. These are an Ace, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10. The Ace is used for a 1, and the 10 is used for a 0. The other cards maintain their own values, and thus the numbers 0-9 are achieved.

An individual present for the drawing, preferably one that has applied for the hunt, draws one of the cards sight unseen. The value of the drawn card, a 6 for example, means that all applications ending in the number 6 will be dropped from the computer for consideration.

Okay, say there are 100 permits available, but there are 200 applications ending in 6. Another card is then drawn, and let's say it is 3. The computer then runs all of those applications that ended in 6 looking for the next to the last number of 3. It finds 60 applications that end in the numbers 36 and those 60 are pulled as "lucky" applicants. In other words, those 60 now have a permit.

However, we still need 40 hunters. So, another card is drawn for another next to the last number. The card is a 2, so now the computer drops all applications ending in

26. For convenience, let's say there are 39 such applications. Therefore, all 39 go into the "lucky" category which now gives us a total of 99 hunters.

Yet, we still need one hunter in order to fill our 100 permits. Instead of drawing a card for another 2 character number which would involve a rather large number of applications, we would keep the 26 ending and draw for a 3rd character number. Let's say the card drawn is a 10, which is used for 0. So, the computer searches for those applications ending in 026. Again, for the convenience of this example, we will say it finds one such application.

However, the one application has 2 hunters on it, which is one more than is needed. So, the application is rejected and the process is repeated until an application with only one hunter is drawn.

Once all of the permits are allocated, Special Hunt personnel verify all the lucky applicants and a final listing is made and put into record.

A copy of the final listing is sent to each of the four area offices. Neither lucky nor unlucky applications will be notified per se. Of course, at a later date the lucky applicants will receive their special permits in the mail. Likewise, the unlucky applicants will receive all but one dollar of their remittance back.

The refund process is a slow one as those of you that have been on an unlucky list are well aware. This is due primarily to the amount of handling during the refund procedure. The unlucky computer cards go to the Department of Finance Administration who in turn makes out a refund list and the amount of the refunds. This list is sent to the Automated Data Processing people where the refund checks are actually printed. They then send the list and checks to our Fiscal Division where we check for duplicates, printing errors, etc. Finally, the checks are mailed out.

Theoretically, the elimination of personal checks from our application system will speed the refund process up somewhat.

So, contrary to what some people may believe, unlucky money is not being held to draw interest. In fact, it is not even recognizable from other monies while in its Suspense Account stage in the State Treasury.

Hopefully, this article has cleared up a lot of questions you might have had or rumors you might have heard pertaining to our special hunt drawings.

Meanwhile, you'll just have to wait for the antelope drawing date of August 12 and the elk drawing date of September 2. Good luck.

Photovoltaics institute set at NMSU

The New Mexico Solar Energy Institute at New Mexico State University (NMSU) will present its first "Residential Uses of Photovoltaics" (photo-vol-taics) workshop August 23 in the Corbett Center at NMSU.

The photovoltaic (PV) workshop will be co-sponsored by the Southwest Residential Experiment station (SW RES) and the NMSU Alumni Association. Participants will learn about PV principles, definitions and terminology, residential PV systems, current PV hardware, inverters, metering, storage and sizing. Also included on the program will be discussions about PV array mounting methods, PURPA (buying and selling electricity), building codes, maintenance of PV systems and a tour of the SW RES including its prototypes. The Southwest Residential Experiment Station (SW RES), located on the campus of NMSU, is a part of the Department of Energy's National Photovoltaic Program and is managed by the New Mexico Solar Energy Institute.

The SW RES staff believes that by the end of the 1980's people will be able to obtain 50 to 100 percent of their household electricity from the sun. They feel that anyone interested in learning about photovoltaic cells and producing electricity for household use would be interested in attending this workshop.

A \$15 fee is charged to help defray expenses of buses, lunch, breaks and materials. NMSU Continuing Education Units are available. Pre-registration for the workshop is advised to reserve limited space. It wasn't easy for him to set aside his troubles and portray the image of the ideal father. The pressure was just too much for him to bear, so he turned to the bottle."
