Spanish Spade wins Futurity

Spanish Spade took control at the turn for home and coasted to an easy victory in Sunday's \$40,120 Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso.

The colt, owned by Virgil Callaway, Hobbs, collected \$20,060 to go with the \$6,447 he'd already earned.

Spanish Spade broke alertly in the six furlong sprint, quickly settled in second place, then took command when jockey Wayne Buehrer was ready to squeeze the trigger.

Shesgottobeadandy, an entrymate of the winner, was full of fight most of the way but didn't have enough in reserve when it came to the real dueling in the stretch. Like the winner, Shesgottobeadandy is also owned by the Callaway outfit.

The Rio Grande turned into a bravura performance for trainer Billy Hitt. In addition to training Spanish Spade and Shesgottobeadandy (the latter faded to third), Hitt also trains Draconic Runner. That one came flying down to the wire and took second.


Draconic Runner is owned by Lonnie Bates of Kaufman, Texas.

Ruidoso patrons figured the combination of Spanish Spade and Shesgottobeadandy had the upper hand in the Rio Grande, and made the twosome odds-on favorites. As a result, the mutual payoffs were dropped down to \$3.80, \$2.20 and \$2.20.

The payoffs on Draconic Runner were \$2.20 to place and a lopsided \$2.40 to show.

Billy Byers was aboard Draconic Runner while his pop, Larry Byers, handled Shesgottobeadandy.

Draconic Runner raked in \$3,024 while Shesgottobeadandy earned \$4,413 for third. The winning time on a fast track was 1:16 flat. The Rio Grande is conditioned for two-year-olds either bred or foaled in New

Old Lincoln Days highly successful

Old Lincoln Town was jammed with visitors over the weekend, filling the amphitheatre to capacity for the four performances of "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid" pageant and turning out one of the largest finish line crowds ever for the Pony Express Race.

The team of Ted Clements, Picacho, and David Cunningham, Roswell, covered the 41 miles from White Oaks to Lincoln in two hours, 10 minutes and 39 seconds, with Cunningham in the saddle for the final leg.

Ron Thomas and Glen Hayberry, Bonita, completed the race in two hours, 22 minutes and 54 seconds. Jamil Hindi, Duran, riding solo, had a time of two hours, 39 minutes and 24 seconds for third, with Phelps Anderson and Paul Kelly, Roswell, crossing the finish line in two hours, 43 minutes and 14 seconds.

Kelly, at age 14, is the youngest rider ever to compete in this annual race.

Attendance figures Saturday at the Old Courthouse showed that more than 1,000 visitors signed the guest book. This large

turnout was the talk of the town folks Sunday.

Sunday's street parade was viewed by an audience packing the length of main street, which, a local observer said, was one of the largest crowds ever watching this event.

It was, however, the pageant that was the main attraction. At all performances the amphitheatre was filled. Subtle changes in the script this year added to the oft told tale of the Lincoln County War and Billy the Kid's part in it. Audience appreciation was expressed by generous applause at the end of each scene.

"We've got the pageant in shape now where we're really proud of it," said Betty Shreengost, chairman of Lincoln County Days, "and all of our actors and narrators were very enthusiastic about our improvements in the pageant."

"The cultural attractions and demonstrations proved to be popular with the visitors and we'll be elaborating on this portion of the celebration in the coming years."

Sanders finally wins District Attorney race

James J. Weldon won all but one of the legal battles in the election contest hearings last week at the Otero County Courthouse. But when the dust had cleared Friday, Steven Sanders was counted the winner, retaining his position as 12th District Attorney.

Weldon had contested last November's election in which, as a write-in candidate, he lost by 296 votes. He claimed that he received over 300 more votes than were given him by the State Canvassing Board. Many of the variations on his name were rejected when being tabulated by the Otero County Canvassing Board.

Weldon's attorney Thomas Sandenaw had filed a writ of mandamus with the New Mexico Supreme Court shortly after the election, but it was rejected as having been "improvidently granted."

An election contest was filed in the 12th District Court in January. It was originally expected that the contest would be settled in two days of hearings in late June. But procedural arguments and questions of possible fraud turned the hearings into a legalistic maze.

When the hearings opened again last Monday, attorneys for both parties said that they only expected the proceedings to last two days. But again, the questions raised became increasingly complex, and testimony often carried over into the evening.

When the court recessed for lunch on Friday, it appeared possible that the day's end would still find the issue unresolved. Several witnesses were still scheduled to be called, and there still loomed the probability of a lengthy recount.

In a surprise move, Sandenaw and Sanders' attorneys Joseph Goldberg and William Dixon agreed to forego their final witnesses and proceed directly to their closing arguments.

Those arguments took up most of the afternoon. Sandenaw's contention was that the court should give primary consideration to the intent of the voter. "We don't know the interpretation the precinct workers placed on ballot write-ins, so it is necessary to go to the source, the ballots," he said. "Mr. Sanders by no means received a majority of the votes cast. The only issue is how many of that majority expressed an intent for Mr. Weldon."

Sandenaw pointed to a 1923 New Mexico Supreme Court Case, Gallegos v. Miera, in which the court had reopened the ballots for a recount.

Goldberg, in his lengthy closing argument, countered that a 1947 case in the Supreme Court, Seele v. Smith, had

ruled that the court did not have the power to go behind the printer packs or tallies to the ballots.

"The printer pack is the heart and body

Improvements planned for sewer system

Members of the Joint Use Board (JUB) of the Regional Wastewater System (RWS) last Wednesday approved the installation of new interceptor lines from Adobe Plaza east to the Con-Tel Telephone office, to be connected to the mains to be served by RWS.

The project cost, \$70,000, will be paid for out of the contingency fund in RWS.

The JUB also referred to project engineer Quinton Daniel, Alamogordo, the possibility of including a primary clarifier.

at the RWS plant, for initial treatment of sewage flowing into the plant. This project, also to be paid for out of the contingency fund, if money is available, would cost an estimated \$137,000.

Once the RWS is operating, JUB members said, persons adjacent to the mains, not living within the village limits of Ruidoso or Ruidoso Downs, may hook on to the service. Fees and billing procedures will have to be established, once this service is available.

Pilot Club dispersing money to local causes

The Pilot Club of Ruidoso has announced a series of contributions to local causes, from proceeds of fund raising activities conducted since the club's charter was issued November 22, 1980.

The group August 4 voted to: — Purchase one bed, costing approximately \$1,150, for the new four-bed Intensive Care Unit (ICU) of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Members of the Pilot Club will make this contribution at the August 18 dedication services for the hospital's new ICU.

— Donate \$500 to the non-profit Auxiliary

of the Ruidoso Care Center toward the purchase of a \$13,500 van, with an electric lift, to help transport the center's residents.

The van will be owned by the Auxiliary and the Care Center will be responsible for all insurance and liability.

The Pilot Club is supporting this drive for funds for the van due to many of the residents, including four quadriplegic young people, who are in wheel chairs and cannot leave the premises until van service is available.

The van will be designed with 12 removable seats, so that wheel chairs can

be loaded and secured.

— Contribute \$1,000 to a scholarship fund to be awarded to students at the discretion of the club's scholarship committee for furthering education.

— Donate \$500 to the Home Health Services of Lincoln County for the purchase of any equipment or services deemed necessary.

Club members are also planning additional fund raising activities in support of the "Dr. Willie Horton Memorial Diagnostic Center," which is now being planned as an addition to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

of the election returns," said Goldberg. But the ballots were "the only original evidence of the voter's intent" and should be kept safe.

Goldberg said that the sanctity of the ballot was the issue at stake, and that the court's decision would have a "fundamental and profound influence as to procedures to be followed in write-in campaigns."

Goldberg argued that the sanctity of the ballot had been threatened, because of evidence that the ballots may have been tampered with. "We have no evidence for tampering at the precinct level, but there is evidence of total confusion at the county level," he said.

Sanders' attorneys sought to have the ballots from four precincts thrown out — 23, 24, 53 and 54 — because there was a reasonable possibility that they had been tampered with.

When Judge Garnett Burks, Jr., of Las Cruces, finally issued his rulings to a full court house, it was not in the form of a specific affirmation or denial, but in an opinion on six separate issues the suit had raised. They were:

— Collateral estoppel. Burks ruled that the jurisdiction to decide the election did lie within the court.

— Fraud. Burks agreed with Goldberg's assertion that "it is not necessary to show wrongdoing, only that the opportunity existed." But he said that in his opinion, the standards were too high, the voter would be disenfranchised. "Therefore we have to be somewhat practical about our standards. I believe that confusion on election night is pretty much par for the course in New Mexico, with all kinds of people milling around. But I don't find any evidence here that someone was not keeping an eye on the scrolls."

This ruling exonerated Otero County.

— Handwriting duplications. "We have heard the testimony of two highly competent experts in this case," Burks said. "But as Mr. Kivela (Weldon's witness) said: 'handwriting analysis is not a science but an art.' Mr. Kivela was more reluctant than Mrs. Romero (Sander's witness) to say that some of the signatures were written by the same hand. I am of the opinion that his is the more sound approach."

— On which variations of "James J. Weldon" would be counted as votes for the contestant. Burks ruled in favor of idiosyncrasies, that misspellings that sounded alike should be counted. He also ruled that using one or both initials, or "Weldon" only would be sufficient, but that misspellings such as "Waldon" would not be counted unless accompanied by a proper first name or initial.

— On whether or not the court had the power to look to the original ballots. Burks ruled in favor of the argument of the contestant. "I am not satisfied that the Seal Case is strictly in point, but in the absence of a specific recount procedure, the court cannot recount the ballots."

It was at this point that most of those in the courtroom realized that Sanders would remain as District Attorney. Sandenaw slumped in his seat, covering his eyes with his hand for a moment, while those at the table of the contestee could not conceal their smiles.

Burks also ruled that should Weldon be declared the winner, he would be entitled to emoluments (retroactive pay). But it was really a moot point, the only question being how close Weldon would come when the printer packs were recounted.

The outcome proved to be closer than expected — Goldberg had told Burks that a recounting of only the printer packs would

leave Weldon some 200 votes short. With the additional variations accepted by Burks, the outcome was increasingly in doubt as the evening wore on.

In the end, it was Lincoln County that spelled defeat for Weldon. It was Lincoln County that provided the setting for the precedent-setting Seels-Smith election in 1946. And it was in Lincoln County that Weldon actually lost votes in Friday night's recount.

When lawyers had finished adding the tally sheets from Otero County, Weldon was a scant nine votes short of Sanders. But Weldon lost 33 votes when the review of the Lincoln County tally sheets began at 9 p.m. The final margin was 42 votes — Sander's 4,769 to Weldon's 5,727. If Burks' ruling had applied to the original ballots, Weldon would have been declared the winner by 14 votes.

Afterwards, Sanders said that the results of the judge's rulings had surprised him. "It really seemed that the judge was going to rule in Weldon's favor. I had expected the hearings to be over in a couple of days."

Sanders said that he was relieved to be through with the often strenuous hearings. "I feel that this has detracted from the amount of time I could spend with people who voted for me. I plan to spend much more now up in Lincoln County, with the people of Ruidoso."

Sanders said that if there was an appeal, it would not take up much of his time. "I'll just let my lawyers handle it — they already have briefs prepared."

Weldon wouldn't speculate on the possibility of an appeal. "We won't know about that for a few days, until we see what is written," he said. Judge Burks issued his rulings orally, and the written version forthcoming.

pared to 118 for Banquero), earned \$2,453. That's Class rallied to take third under Vickie Smallwood.

GLOVER D., a giant among three-year-old thoroughbreds in the Southwest, converted Saturday's Jockey Club Stakes at Ruidoso Downs into his fifth win of the summer.

The gelding also notched his third stakes win of the Ruidoso season, and took a big step toward Horse-Of-The-Meet honors. The Jockey Club Stakes, a stepping stone to the upcoming Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby, covered seven furlongs and dished out \$15,000. Glover D. raked in nine grand and pumped his 1981 money line up to \$55,461.

Glover D., the property of Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas, covered the Jockey Club course in an off-track clocking of 1:29 3/5 seconds. He hit the tape with a comfortable one and one-fourth length lead, well in control. Richard Bickel was at the helm.

With such public attention placed on Glover D., the best his backers could get from the mutuels was \$3.40, \$2.50, \$2.50. Fill Mackis Cup, the second favorite at 3-1, sailed in second and collected \$3,300. The payoffs were \$3 to place, an improved \$3.20 to show.

Dynamic Sesenta, an 8-1 outsider, got off to a flying start and stayed in front until the top of the stretch. He gave in readily when Glover D. went charging to the front. At the mid-way point of the stretch, Dynamic Sesenta bothered Reddy Rampart, a 20-1 shot who was coming on along the rail.

As a result of the interference, Dynamic Sesenta, who finished third, was dropped to sixth by the stewards. That put Reddy Rampart (\$4.50) in third. The show purse was \$1,500.

Glover D., carrying the top weight of 122 pounds (as compared to 119 for Fill Mackis Cup), was far behind during the first half of the race. But the gelding had little trouble making up a dozen lengths or so down the backstretch. Doyal Roberts trains the impressive gelding.

Earlier in the meeting, Glover D. won the Aspen Stakes and the Memorial Day Handicap. His only defeat of the season came by a half-length (under a stiff 127 pounds) in the six furlong Peter Hurd Handicap.

THE LONGSHOTS got the upper hand in Friday's renewal of the \$11,600 Futurity Prep Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The outcome was quite a turnaround as Mickey Mac — a 25-1 outsider going after his second win of the meeting — roared to a surprisingly easy one and one-fourth length win. The Prep Stakes covered five and one-half furlongs.


The Right Exit, a gelding carrying 43-1 odds, got in second. Third was taken by Big Bad Tune, a colt carrying odds of 6 1/2-1.

The 6-5 favorite, Luckily Smashed, started well on the moisture-laden track, but steadily faded. He wound up seventh. The second choice, Faneuil Lass, hardly did any better. The filly broke in sixth place, and wound up in that slot. She never offered a threat.

Mickey Mac, the property of LeRoy Spires Jr., of Snyder, Texas, stormed out of second place and overtook the pacemaker, Hugh What, at the turn for

home. Huge What, after putting up some mild resistance, suddenly tossed in the towel.

Mickey Mac, ridden by Kenny Roller, opened up easily at the midway point of the stretch. The Right Exit, ridden by Willie Lovell, moved briskly in the straightaway but never stood much chance of overtaking the winner. The Right Exit is owned by Irving Amussen of Laredo, Texas.



First heart attack patients may enter into study program

"Can heart attacks be prevented by lowering cholesterol?" This is the question asked by a team of researchers at the University of Southern California conducting a national study supported by the National Institutes of Health.

Most heart trouble results from atherosclerosis or hardening of the arteries. Atherosclerosis (hardening of the arteries) gradually thickens and narrows the arteries until the flow of blood is slowed or stopped. When it affects arteries that supply blood to the heart, a heart attack may result.

A clue to cause of atherosclerosis may be that cholesterol, a fatty substance, is found in diseased arteries. However, whether or not lowering cholesterol is

actually beneficial is still uncertain. The National Institutes of Health have recently reaffirmed their support by granting funds for the completion of this project. The four medical centers cooperating in this effort are the University of Minnesota, the University of Arkansas, Lankenau Hospital in Philadelphia and the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. The clinic at USC is available to eligible men and women in the western United States. Persons aged 29 through 64 who have had a first and only heart attack within the past five years, free of diabetes, stroke and heart surgery may be eligible to participate.

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



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Cree Meadows golf championship

Jarrett edges Baker in sudden death

Friday was Mark Jarrett's 22nd birthday and the Lubbock, Texas, golfer found an ideal way to celebrate.

He won the championship flight of the Cree Meadows Golf Invitational.

And Jarrett did it in thrilling fashion, topping Angus Baker in sudden-death on the 19th hole.

"I felt I had a chance. I knew I could compete," the modest Jarrett said after the competition. "I think the key was the fact I didn't have any penalties."

It was a heartbreaking loss for Baker, who won two of his previous matches in sudden-death.

The championship match was close all the way, with Jarrett holding a one stroke lead until Baker tied it on the 15th hole. The match began Thursday afternoon but thunder and lightning after the 17th hole forced a postponement until Friday morning.

Jarrett put an end to the long competition when he birdied the 19th hole.

In semi-final competition Baker beat Dan Koesters of Alamogordo in sudden death on the 20th hole. Jarrett topped Ron Becker, two and one.

Perhaps the finest display of golf in the entire tournament was turned in by Tom Hornbuckle of Ruidoso, who won the championship consolation prize. Hornbuckle beat Ed Wilson, seven and five in the finals, firing an eight-under par.

Hornbuckle, who finished second in last year's tournament, took his semi-final match over Stormy Edwards by a three and two score while Wilson beat Ted Martinez, two and one.

"We had a lot of quality golfers here this year," said tournament director and Cree Meadows pro Bob Hickson. "Probably better than last year and we had a good tournament then, too. This year we had guys from all over. Houston, Fort Worth, Lubbock."

Fifty-five golfers tried out for the championship flight and 168 were entered

in the entire tournament, the largest in the 33-year history of the affair.

"We had quite a few sudden death and 18th hole decisions," said Hickson. "I know Baker was involved in three of them by himself."

Doug Bass of Ruidoso won the first flight competition with a two and one decision over Johnny Gonzales. Charlie Edwards took the consolation prize with a sudden death 21-hole victory over Leroy Gooch.


Soccer signups near

But the Warriors have more than Neal and Nunley returning. Stierwalt has 16 players back from last year's team, about

eight of whom started on offense or defense.

The Warriors will be particularly strong at linebacker. Besides Nunley, Ruidoso has Byron Wright (5-8, 165 pounds) and Derlush Rad (6-2, 180 pounds) manning the linebacker posts. Both will play at guard

Well, it's football season again. This week Ruidoso High School's griders, along with thousands of other young men across the country, will don pads and trudge onto the football field for two weeks of practice.

And a month from now high school bleachers across the country will be packed with screaming, cheering fans.

Of course the high schools aren't the only places where people will be cheering their favorite football teams on. The college and professional version of the game should be playing before sellout crowds this year.

And this could be a banner year for the grid sport. Everywhere you go you can hear people discussing the upcoming football season. Perhaps the reason so many people are anxious for football to start is because they've lost their taste for major league baseball as a result of the strike.

Here in the southwest football has almost always held dominant place in the heart of sports fans. Interest in the sport in this part of the country seems a bit higher than in other areas.

And the popularity of the sport is everywhere. Whether it's in a resort town like Ruidoso, a small desert town or a large southwestern city.

Evidence of the sport's popularity is shown here in Ruidoso. Ruidoso High School head coach Darryl Stierwalt is expecting a turnout of around 50 players for the first day of practice tomorrow.

When a high school of no more than 500 students can get 50 kids to come out for football practice that says something for the popularity of the sport in the town. There are some high schools in California with 1,500 or 2,000 students who don't get that many players out for the team.

This could be a great year for Warrior football followers. And it could be a great year for the game of football as a whole.

Colorado football fans must be awfully short on patience.

I listened to the Denver Bronco-New York Jet exhibition game on radio Friday night. The Jets won 33-7 and after the contest people calling in to a Denver talk show were virtually giving up on the Broncos for the year.

One of the callers' most frequent complaints was about the performance of quarterback Matt Robinson, who completed just one of 10 passes. Many callers called for a trade involving the Bronco quarterback.

These kind of statements border on panic. Admittedly Robinson had a bad game and Bronco followers are concerned because first-string quarterback Craig Morton is 38-years-old and a bit long in the tooth for the game.

However one game does not make a season. Robinson showed signs of brilliance when he played for the Jets and he was probably uptight playing against his old team.

The Broncos have been a competitive team for the last five years, making the playoffs three times and earning a trip to the Super Bowl in 1978. When Denver failed to make the playoffs last season fans saw signs of a letdown.

While this may be true in some facets of the game like the offensive backfield the Broncos still have enough strengths to make them competitive again this year. Their offensive line and whole defensive unit rate among the best in the National Football League.

So cheer... Bronco fans. It's too early for the white flag by any means.

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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — There are tough problems to be decided at the Roundhouse.

Are the people there worried about how to redistrict the state so as to provide a system which will give every citizen adequate representation in his or her government?

Don't be silly. The legislators don't want to be disturbed.

That problem is to be held off till they find themselves in the mood to consider it.

But are those dwellers in Santa Fe, the high temple of New Mexico government, worrying about the fact that this year for the first time we have taken in a billion bucks from the Sap Citizens? Are they saying to themselves, "Maybe this is too much. Should we, as the Scriptures bid us do, temper the wind to the scorn lamb?"

Don't be absurd. If they are thinking about taxes, it is how to increase them, not how to cut them down.

What they are really exercised over at this moment in time is something much more significant and worthy of attention from our rulers:

Are we holding too many news conferences?

Now there's a practical problem, the kind a bureaucrat can really get his or her teeth into.

This column, which made the mistake of being totally honest and saying right out that most news conferences held by Bruce King are pretty boring, and that the more frequent they are the more boring they become, may have helped to force state government to face up to this substantive issue.

Since we helped to raise the question, here is our contribution to the answer:

Yes, you are holding too many news conferences.

The Governor comes out to the round onyx table in his conference room to talk to the representatives of the media when he does not have anything to say.

By at least a factor of two to one, we have too many gatherings of the news people with the head of our state government.

Why does that happen?

Well, partly because almost nobody on Bruce King's staff has the guts to tell him to quit doing what he is doing.

This big, affable, lovable, cowboy-booted person is not at all a good listener.

Those who progress upward on his staff are those who do what he says, not those who tell him what he does not want to hear.

The thing most politicians need more than any other is somebody in their intimate circle who has the endowments to speak up. What ego-driven officeholders need more than any other single thing is to be told the truth.

So somebody ought to have broken it to the governor of the State of New Mexico months and months ago that he was wasting his own time and the time of the news media by hours-long sessions in which almost nothing got communicated.

There's a basic rule of thumb: If you talk for an hour, and all you see on TV that night is 20 seconds, you are wasting your time.

Cut it off. Go home.

Put simply but disrespectfully: Shut up. Stop coming on the inside in the King administration should have had courage enough to say that to the Governor months ago.

Because they do not, they allow him to expose himself, week after week, as an Emperor who has almost no clothes.





Crime Stoppers seek wanted pair

Raymond Garcia is a traveling man. And, with good reason. Police in several states are interested in talking to him and his traveling companion about crimes ranging from escape to murder. Garcia, also known as Joe Gonzales, was wounded during an attempted armed robbery to a fast food store in San Antonio, Texas, in September of last year. After a short stay at a local hospital, he escaped from sheriff's deputies while waiting for a court appearance.

Garcia, born November 2, 1948, is described as a Spanish male, five feet, ten inches, 145 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. He has a tattoo of a cross and the word "Mother" on his left forearm, and a tattoo of the Virgin Mary on his back.

Garcia's traveling companion, Shirlene Montoya, has made the most recent contribution to the pair's popularity. Police in San Diego, California, have issued a warrant charging Montoya with murder in a shooting death in that city in March of this year. Montoya, born September 21, 1948, is described as a Spanish female, four feet, eleven inches, 112 pounds, with brown hair and brown eyes. She has a tattoo of the name "Joe" on her left hand.

Both Garcia and Montoya have spent much of their lives in New Mexico, mostly in Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Tucumcari. This week, the State-Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the capture of Garcia and Montoya. Anyone having information on the pair's whereabouts, should immediately call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933, Santa Fe, Crime Stoppers at 988-5555, or Tucumcari Crime Stoppers, at 461-3507. Callers do not have to reveal their identities, even to collect the reward, and the calls are not taped or traced.

Carlsbad Crime Stoppers this week are seeking information on a number of serious crimes in that city. There have been several incidents of rape and attempted rape, robbery and arsons. If you have any information on who is involved in these crimes, contact the Carlsbad Crime Stoppers program at 887-1888. Substantial rewards are being offered.







Forest closures for off-road vehicles

Hunters visiting the Lincoln National Forest during the coming fall hunting seasons are reminded that off-road vehicle closures and closures on most primitive roads in Mule and Russia Canyons are still in effect, according to a Forest Service spokesman.

popular deer hunting area for many years. The Russia Canyon closure (also marked with signs) was put into effect last year to protect a forest re-vegetation project. As in Mule Canyon, vehicles are allowed on the main road down the canyon, but are not allowed to drive off the road or on primitive lateral roads.

The spokesman said the closures (marked with signs) were put into effect last year in Mule Canyon, near Mayhill, and in Russia Canyon, near Cloudcroft. The reason for the closures is to protect the canyons from serious erosion resulting from excessive traffic. The area is not closed, however, to hunters or other visitors on foot or horseback, and all main roads are open. Mule Canyon has been a

The forest spokesman explained that the Lincoln, in cooperation with New Mexico State University at Las Cruces, is in the process of identifying a specific forest transportation system which will allow forest visitors to drive essentially where they want to go, but not off an established road or trail. The penalty for violating either of the closure orders is a possible six months in jail, a \$500 fine, or both.

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
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
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
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

"Measure for Measure"

The extraordinary dark comedy "Measure for Measure," one of William Shakespeare's less frequently seen plays, will make its encore appearance as part of "The Shakespeare Plays" on Monday, August 10 on PBS.

Set in a corrupt and brawling Vienna, "Measure for Measure" tells the story of a peculiar attempt at moral reform undertaken by Duke Vincentio (Kenneth Colley), Vienna's ruler. Pretending to leave Vienna on a journey, he appoints a deputy to rule in his place—Angelo (Tim Pigott-Smith), a supposedly upright man "whose blood is very snow-broth." The Duke assumes a friar's habit and secretly remains in the city.

Once in power, one of Angelo's first acts is to enforce the ancient law prohibiting pre-marital sex by condemning Claudio (Christopher Strauli) to death. Hearing of Claudio's death sentence, his chaste sister, Isabella (Kate Nelligan, pictured with Tim Pigott-Smith), about to enter a convent, returns to Vienna to plead for her brother's life. Angelo falls in love with the beautiful Isabella, and tries to strike an unholy bargain with her: If she will sleep with him, he will free her brother. The Duke, meanwhile, discovers the plight of the brother and sister, and resolves the conflict through an involved, secret plot, tricking and finally exposing Angelo for what he truly is. The production also stars John McEnery as Claudio's friend Lucio.

"Measure for Measure" was directed by Desmond Davis. Executive producer for "The Shakespeare Plays" was Cedric Messina. Alan Shallcross was script editor, with Dr. John Wilders of Oxford serving as literary consultant.

A presentation of WNET/Thirteen, New York, "The Shakespeare Plays" is a six-year series beginning its fourth season this fall on public television. It is made possible by grants from Exxon Corporation, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and Morgan Guaranty Trust Company. "Measure for Measure" originally aired in April, 1979.

Television Schedule For The Week Of Aug. 10 Through Aug. 16

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT. A smoldering 22 year feud between **Frank Sinatra** and **Lauren Bacall** flared again when she lashed out at Ol' Blue Eyes in a TV interview with **Barbara Walters**. Sinatra had won Bacall's heart after comforting her when her husband, **Humphrey Bogart**, died in 1957. But their romance ended in 1959 after their wedding plans were revealed in the press. Bacall dealt with the incident candidly in her autobiography, *By Myself*, which was published in 1979. And now the still smarting Bacall has blasted Sinatra again. "He has about as much humor as this floor not a laugh in a carload," she told Walters. "No humor none about himself. I sent him a copy of my book and wrote a little inscription and said, 'I hope you understand. Take this in the spirit in which it's written.' And of course, he didn't have the courtesy to answer or anything." Bacall, 56, does a slow burn whenever Sinatra, 65, is mentioned, according to her close friends. One friend says that she tried to patch things up, but Sinatra wouldn't let her. "When her 'Woman of the Year' show opened on Broadway, she tried to make peace by inviting Sinatra and his wife, **Barbara**, to opening night," the friend says. "It was understood that he had accepted and she sent a limousine to pick them up. They never showed. It was a terrible blow to her."

TV BACKSTAGE. "Hostess Family Classics" is set for a TV premiere in January with endorsement of two major U.S. Teacher Associations. "Because of the remarkable quality of these BBC-TV programs, we see them as first-class TV entertainment for joint viewing by parents and children. With the growing trend towards more family-oriented programming, our Hostess division decided to launch this series now to make it available to new and substantially larger audiences on commercial stations - in a special weekly network," **Lauren H. Batty**, President of the Bakery Division of ITT Continental Baking Company, said. The station line-up for the new Hostess Family Classics Network is now being scheduled for prime time access and weekend afternoons. Vitt Media International, agency for the Hostess cake division of ITT CBC, is handling this placement activity. The programs were acquired from Time-Life Television (which also co-produced the series).

TV CLOSEUP. The average 15-year-old has witnessed 18,000 TV murders - as many as were committed in America in 1977. Experts fear such TV violence is turning youngsters into psychopathic killers. "Kids get a front-seat education in the school of killing," Dr. **Steven Worchel** of the University of Virginia told me. Worchel, a child psychologist, said "The kids are made insensitive to violence. The more violence they see on TV the more they accept it. They stop reacting emotionally. Worse still, they get the feeling that violence is an easy way to handle their problems. It becomes something they should do." One TV performer who is campaigning for less TV horror is **Loretta Long**, who has played "Sesame Street's" Susan for 12 years. "Letting children see all that violence is like tossing them some matches and telling them to amuse themselves," she told me. "The violence is presented as perfectly reasonable, and its effect on kids is obvious."
