## \$16 MILLION WATER PROJECT PROPOSED

# Water study authorized

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening, after hearing a report from Boyle Engineering representatives on a "Proposed Capital Improvement Program" for water development to serve the village, approved allotting \$19,000 for a water study, including core drilling in Grindstone Canyon.

Boyle engineers Fred Burns and Jake Vigil advised the trustees the water development, to be carried out over a period of years, would cost an estimated \$16 million.

Under present conditions, financing this project could be accomplished by the issuance of Revenue Bonds or General Obligation Bonds, or a combination of both, a village official said.

The plan includes:

- Construction of Grindstone Canyon Dam, to hold approximately 1,000 acre feet of water, \$4,860,000.
- Grindstone Water Treatment Plant, \$1,725,000.
- 17,000 feet of raw water transmission line, \$320,000.
- Five million gallon reservoir, \$880,000.
- Pumping station and transmission line to storage, \$387,000.
- Black Forest distribution line, \$36,000.
- Skyland and Gateway area transmission line, \$48,000.
- Rehabilitation of Treatment Plant

- One, \$200,000.
- Raising the height of the Alto Reservoir dam and construction of new outlets, \$2,500,000.
- Rehabilitation of Treatment Plant Two, \$500,000.
- Central control system, \$150,000.
- Replacement of water lines and regulating stations, \$150,000.
- Replacing undersized and old lines, \$450,000.

The project would be divided into three phases:

- Phase I, 1981-1982, dam construction, plant rehabilitation and transmission lines, \$5,380,000.
- Phase II, 1983-1984, treatment plant construction, reservoir, pump station and transmission lines, plant rehabilitation and Alto Reservoir improvements, \$5,781,000.
- Phase III, 1985-1986, treatment plant, control system and transmission lines, \$5,000,000.
- Phase II would provide water to Black Forest Subdivision, Kingswood Reservoir, Skyland and Gateway area.
- Phase III would deliver water to the Ponderosa Heights Reservoir.

No date was set to begin core drilling in Grindstone Canyon, located approximately a half mile south of the Ruidoso Police Department.

The trustees approved Resolution 81-14, setting October 13 as the date to sell the remaining \$1,500,000 in General Obligation Bonds, approved by voters March 24, to finance construction of a new police/judicial complex, street improvements and a new fire hall, close to the stop light at Mechem.

In other business, the trustees:

- Adopted Ordinance 81-16, accepting a multi-city single family mortgage bond fund of \$1.1 million, that will be used for housing construction at a rate of about 13 percent. Village fiscal agent Darrel Fowler of Stern Brothers, Albuquerque, said the bonds should sell for about 12 percent. Fowler also said, regarding the \$1.1 million allocated to Ruidoso, "The (local) Savings and Loans serving Ruidoso got every penny they asked for," in explaining why Ruidoso's allocation was so low compared to the \$20 million that will be divided between Roswell and Artesia.
- Agreed to work with the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association to plan to construct additional shelters for children at school bus stops.
- Authorized street superintendent Jack La May to investigate the cost of construction of a new hot mix plant to make asphalt for street paving. The present plant, La May said, isn't meeting emission standards.

- Appointed trustee George White as a voting delegate to the September 9-11 Municipal League Conference in Roswell.

- Took no action on a complaint registered by Fred Lindau on the new water rates being charged by the village. Lindau was advised by the trustees that his presentation was excellent and that they would take his complaint under advise and consideration. White and trustee Benny Coulston pointed out that the new charge "was experimental" and only for one year, at which time it would be reviewed. They also advised Lindau that the rate increase was necessary to maintain and develop the existing water service. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., said, "Tell your friends that the council listened."

- Heard a request from Mrs. George Brooks that action be taken to clean up a "fire hazard" in the go-cart area operated by Ralph Rush, and agreed to look into the matter.

- Approved, on referral from the Planning and Zoning Commission, Replat of Lot 6, Block 4, Country Club Heights; Final plat of Racquet Court Condominiums, Phase 3; Final plat of Development Plan and Phase 1, Pepper Tree Place Condominiums; Final Plat of Granite Heights Condominiums and Replat of Lots 5 and 6, Kingswood Addition.

## Area drivers warned trucks on Highway 37

# Lodgers plan on developing new Ski Pak

The Ruidoso Lodger's Association (RLA) Tuesday approved developing a 1981-82 Ski Pak, designed to attract skiers from Monday through Thursday.

"When there's snow, we've got people just coming out of the woodwork on weekends," said Clark Carpenter, chairman of RLA. "But by Monday most of them are gone."

With the Ski Pak, we'll offer a deal that on any four days, Sunday through Thursday, the fourth day's lodging will be free. The ski shops will also be cooperating with discounts or free use of equipment on the fourth day, and we're hoping that the ski areas will come through with some type of offer on their passes."

Carpenter said that the Ski Pak might also be set up on a three day basis, with the third day at half price.

In other business, the RLA:

- Set up a committee to study the Chamber of Commerce's concern over a "four day minimum" for guests.
- Appointed Ida Koehler as head of the RLA tour and social committee.
- Dropped the idea of an Aspencade float for this year.
- Put on a "holding pattern" a task force designed to study the "limited seating" concept at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.
- The next RLA meeting will be a luncheon at Nob Hill Restaurant on September 8.

# Downs needs volunteer firemen

Ruidoso Downs has eight volunteer firemen.

A minimum of ten new members are needed, according to Fire Chief Ray Walker, to enable the Fire Department to provide adequate fire protection.

"We have to do something to get more firemen," Walker said Monday evening to the Ruidoso Downs trustees. "We can't do much of anything with just eight fire-fighters."

Walker suggested that village clerk Virginia Spall could accept applications

for membership, to be referred to the department for action. The trustees approved this plan.

Walker also asked the trustees to consider the purchase of a radio communications system, whereby firemen could be notified of a fire anytime, day or night.

Richard Volquardsen of Southwest Communications, operating in Lincoln County, submitted a proposal to install a transmitting system whereby firemen could be called from almost any location in this area.

Volquardsen's plan included a radio tower on Camelot Mountain, with broadcast equipment near the present fire hall, and a base station in the Ruidoso Downs police office. His cost estimate was in the \$8,500 range.

The trustees authorized Volquardsen to prepare specifications for the system and directed Spall to issue a call for bids to be opened at the September 28 trustees meeting.

In other action, the trustees:

- Approved the hiring of two police

patrolmen, Carl N. DuCept of East St. Louis, Illinois, and James R. Riley of Roswell.

- Approved installation of cabinets in the police office for storage and purchase of an emergency light bar for a patrol car.

- Approved a plan submitted by the Lincoln County Home Builders Association to construct shelters for children at bus stops in Ruidoso Downs. Village officials will assist in site selections.

- Adopted Resolution 81-3 for one year's membership in the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

# Sentences suspended in White Oaks fued

Twelfth District Judge Robert Doughty Wednesday, in Carrizozo, suspended jail terms and fines assessed against Larue Wetzel, Robert Crenshaw and Paul Wetzel, all of White Oaks, in action stemming from a fight occurring in White Oaks last December 29.

Doughty suspended the sentences and

fines, he said, because he was convinced the litigants have "learned to live together."

The original sentences, handed down in District Court last March, included:

- Robert Crenshaw, six months in county jail and \$100 fine for battery against Larue Wetzel.
- Paul Wetzel, son of Larue Wetzel, 364

days in county jail and \$1,000 fine for killing six of Crenshaw's sheep that had strayed onto Wetzel's property.

- Larue Wetzel, six months in county jail and \$100 fine on each of two counts of assault against Crenshaw.

The feud, which made headlines in area papers for weeks, had White Oaks residents pictured carrying firearms as

they went about their business, ostensibly for self protection.

Though court testimony given in March, during the trial, was contradictory, sufficient evidence was submitted that there has been physical attacks made by the litigants against one another, resulting in the fines and jail terms imposed in March after a trial by jury for the trio.

# Up With People in concert here

The internationally famous music/dance group Up With People (UWP) will be in Ruidoso on Wednesday, August 19, for a 7:30 p.m. concert at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track Sales Arena.

Tickets are \$4.75 for adults and \$3.50 for children under 12, and may be purchased at Gibson's, Village Hardware, and the Chamber of Commerce.

This marks the first Ruidoso appearance by UWP. They are being sponsored by the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce in a non-profit promotional venture. The group will arrive here from Lordsburg, where they began the New Mexico portion of a year-long tour.

UWP originated as an idealistic concept by its founder Blanton Bell about 15 years ago, according to Libby Chapman.

## Third inmate charged in camp slaying

Criminal charges have been filed against a third Camp Sierra Blanca inmate in the August 2 beating and stabbing death of Scott Wayne Thompson, according to Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez.

Richard Lujan has been charged with capital murder, a term used for killings which take place on penal grounds. Sanchez said that charges may be filed against other inmates as the investigation by the state police and the sheriff's department continues.

Lujan's preliminary hearing with the court magistrate in Carrizozo is to be set within 10 days.

The hearing of the first two inmates charged in the case, Felix Martinez and David Sedillo, has been postponed until August 24, Sanchez said.

Chapman, age 21, and Aida Uribe, 19, are members of the UWP cast who came to Ruidoso early for promotional purposes.

"There was so much unrest and rebellion among the young people then that Bell felt the need existed for something uplifting - a group of young people who were clean-cut and enthusiastic, recruited from all countries.

They would travel around the world spreading a message of hope through song and dance," Chapman said.

UWP, in an idealistic time, was received with a great deal of enthusiasm. Some accused it in the 70's of being outdated, along with many brainchildren of the 60's such as the Peace Corps. But in the present decade, UWP is bigger than ever, and it

appears that they are here to stay.

Musically, the UWP show ranges from show music to 40's and 50's popular music to originals performed by members of the cast. All of it tends to be inspirational in character.

"I've seen the show several times, and

## Congressman Skeen speaks to law officers

Congressman Joe Skeen was in Ruidoso Wednesday to speak at the monthly meeting of the 12th Judicial District Law Enforcement Association at Jerry Dale's.

Skeen had some good things to say about the recent budget cuts in Congress. "Some of the most momentous events in American history have taken place in the last seven months," Skeen said. "A lot of history has taken place in a very short time, and naturally I'm proud to have been a part of it."

"What is happening is a process of reconciliation. Usually that term is used for married couples, but in this case, it means that the federal government is facing up to its limits. Before, it never had to worry about spending without knowing where the money would come from. We thought of ourselves as having unlimited resources, that there would always be more funds coming."

"But now we know that the government is not going to have that much money to spend in the future, so we have to get within our limits."

Skeen said that politicians in

Washington had by no means stopped the growth of federal spending, but that they had reduced it considerably. The effect, he said, was to take the federal government out of competition with the private sector.

"I just want to remind you all that this is the real world — not back in Washington, D. C. You tend to have a much clearer picture than we do on things such as the new immigration policy. So we need your input."

According to Skeen, the United States has dropped from first to 17th in individual productivity for the world. He lays much of the blame on the federal government for taking away individual incentive.

"Federal employment is good, but short-lived compared to jobs originating in a private base. Programs such as CETA that became a municipal employment organization were only supposed to be an educational service."

"In Congress we realize that to make long-term jobs an economic reality, we have to think long-range. This isn't going to happen overnight. We're taking risks, hoping to help return enthusiasm to the American people."

it's always changing," said Ed Jungblath, the executive director of the Chamber of Commerce. "It's not a rock or rhythm and blues concert — but family oriented entertainment that's always a refreshing change of pace from the hectic everyday world."

"They're not a religious group, but the kids are very closely supervised and expected to set a very clean standard. They stay with host families, which is an important part of their educational experience." (Host families are still needed here. See related article, page 4).

"I think everyone that gets on the cast feels very lucky," said Chapman. "They have seven or eight thousand applicants every year, and only room for five or six hundred people."

In their first ten years, over 5,000 young people aged 18-25 participated in UWP, performing at the 1972 Olympics in Munich, Super Bowl X, the Indianapolis 500, the White House, Carnegie Hall, Expo '70 in Japan, and many other places. In 1978, UWP was the first international group of young people to receive and accept an invitation to the People's Republic of China, where they gave over 30 performances in six cities.

Each student selected pays \$4,800 in

tuition, according to Chapman. That only pays for about a third of the costs. They are a non-profit corporation — about half of their funds come from performances, and most of the rest comes from gifts, which are tax-deductible.

"Most of us come out of college for a year to do this, and it really is an educational experience," Chapman said. "Some students receive college credit, but you learn so many practical things — students are encouraged to move through different parts of the production — lighting, dance, vocals, promotion. We also have career days and workshops at intervals. Uida and I are missing out on the last parts of the training (at UWP's home base in Tucson, Arizona) by coming here. But I think the experience is invaluable."

Part of the students' experience here — as at each stop — is a series of meetings with local leaders, businessmen and government officials, as well as field trips. They also engage in what are known as "acoustics" — informal concerts at nursing homes, schools, refugee camps and prisons.

The cast coming to Ruidoso is one of five that the UWP organization is sending out on tour this year. After their tour through Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, they will leave October 5 for a four month stay in South America.

## White Sands schedules last full moon programs

The final series of 1981 summer full moon programs are scheduled for August 13, 14 and 15. Trips back into the history of the White Sands Missile Range and historic accounts of early Tularosa Basin Indians fill the bill on two nights. The space shuttle will be in the spotlight on the other night.

On Thursday, August 13, Jim Bryant, Public Affairs Specialist at White Sands Missile Range, will take the public on a lookback at "White Sands Missile Range — History and Legend". Trinity Site, location of the first atomic device detonation; the V-2 Rocket and the legend of hidden gold on Victor Peak will be featured subjects during the presentation.

The speaker on Friday, August 14, will be Alex Paczynski who is the Northrup Strip Project Engineer at the L. B. Johnson Space Center, White Sands Test Facility near Las Cruces. Mr. Paczynski

received his B. S. degree from the University of Cincinnati and his M. S. degree from New Mexico State University. His talk will be on a subject about which he is very knowledgeable — the "Space Shuttle Mission".

The final night of the 1981 full moon programs, Saturday, August 15, will feature Vernon Brook, a well-known area archeologist from El Paso, Texas. This slide presentation is entitled, "Pre-Historic Indians of the Tularosa Basin. Without such aids as the wheel, metal, burden animals or written records, pre-historic man adapted and survived in the Tularosa Basin for at least 10,000 years. Then, by 1400 A. D. he had disappeared. Brook will show slides of excavated houses and artifacts used for hunting, food gathering and preparation, pottery waxing and ceremonies, while suggesting what might have happened to these people long ago."

## Environmental assessments approved on corridor study

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has approved the environmental assessments submitted by the State Highway Department for the Roswell and Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation sections of the United States 70 Corridor Study.

A "Finding of No Significant Impact"

was made in both instances, department environmentalist Rochelle Byars said. FHWA approval of the findings means that no environmental impact statement or additional public hearings will be required for these sections.

The environmental assessments for the two sections were prepared under department supervision and reviewed with Citizens Advisory Committees, city, county and tribal authorities. Public meetings were held to explain the proposals and get citizen reaction to the plans.

The 13-mile Roswell section extends from the vicinity of Six-mile Hill west of the city to the junction of United States 70-285 north of the city. The route selected is Alternative Three which was slightly modified as a result of comments and suggestions made at public meetings and proposed by local officials. The proposal has been approved by both the Roswell City Council and the Chaves County Commission.

Approval of the Mescalero section was reached through a memorandum between the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and the Highway Department after consultations with the Citizens Advisory Committee, tribal authorities and discussions at public meetings.

Construction plans for the projects are in the design stage. The projects will be let to bid as part of the department's Five Year Construction Program, subject to the availability of federal funding for the United States 70 Primary Highway Connector Demonstration Project.

## Visitors warned about muddy forest highways

Frequent afternoon thunder showers during the past week have brought out a bumper crop of wildflowers and wildflower fans on the Lincoln National Forest.

Visitors should be careful of driving on secondary roads, many of which are muddy. Fire danger throughout the Forest is low to moderate.

On the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, South Fork Campground is receiving heavy use, and the other campgrounds are receiving moderate use. The interpretive programs at South Fork Campground have been concluded for the season.

Highway 532, past the turnoff to Eagle Creek Recreation Area on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation, will be closed on or about August 17 for repaving. This will necessitate the closure of Oak Grove Campground, and the trails at Sierra Blanca Ski Area. Bears have been seen raiding dumpsters at the campgrounds, so campers are asked to keep their food put

away. Bonito Lake is receiving heavy fishing pressure. Trails in the White Mountain Wilderness are muddy. Hikers should beware lightning storms. Fuelwood areas are inaccessible due to the rains.

The Clouderoff Ranger District reports that campgrounds are receiving heavy use on weekends, and moderate use during the week. Bailey Canyon is muddy, and all off-road travel is prohibited. Hiking trails are muddy. All fuelwood areas are closed. Fuelwood cutters are asked to check with the Ranger District Office for current conditions.

On the Guadalupe Ranger District at Carlsbad, Sitting Bull Falls picnic area is receiving heavy use. Resurfacing work is continuing on Highway 137. Fuelwood areas are open, but visitors are asked to watch for rattlesnakes, and be aware of rapidly changing weather conditions.

## NMSU cautiously predicting continued enrollment growth

New Mexico State University (NMSU) officials are cautious but optimistic in predicting that the university's traditional growth pattern will continue in the 1981-82 school year.

An anticipated fall semester enrollment increase of one to two percent is considered "realistic" by Dr. Donald Roush, executive vice president, Dr. Gerald Burke, assistant academic vice president, and Bill Bruner, director of admissions. The general background "situation is about the same as last year," Roush said. Burke added that the number of preregistered students and new students participating in early admissions procedures are about the same or slightly higher than a year ago. The 1980-81 fall semester enrollment on the main campus was 12,347.

A continuing upward shift in the average age of students is expected. In the 1980-81 school year the average age of students on the main campus was 23.6 years. More than a fourth (26.9 percent) are 25 years old or older.

"Continuing, but not spectacular, enrollment increases" are expected at each of NMSU's five branch operations, according to Dr. Lowery Davis, dean of the College of Human and Community Services. "Since we have revised programs to be more comprehensive, we expect enrollments to hold steady or increase."

Registration is scheduled August 10-20 at NMSU-Alamogordo; August 24-25 at NMSU-Carlsbad; and August 28-28 at NMSU-Grants. Fall semester registration for new students will be August 25 on the main campus and the Dona Ana Branch at Las Cruces; new students will register

August 20 at San Juan College in Farmington. Returning students have already preregistered under the continuous registration system.

New developments are expected to assume a variety of forms. Geothermal resources have been tapped on the main campus and will be used to supply the hot water requirements of 11 buildings. Facilities involved range from residence hall to service and recreational. Both indoor and outdoor swimming pools will be heated by the geothermal system. Ac-

ording to Dr. Harold Daw, associate academic vice president, the system was funded by the state at \$829,000 with an estimated payback time of four to six years in energy cost savings. After that point, annual savings in cost of providing hot water for the buildings involved will be substantial. The system is scheduled to be completed and in use by January 1, 1982.

In academic areas, according to Roush, an evening degree program will be instituted on the main campus effective fall semester 1981-82.

## Schmitt announces technology conference

National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Administrator James M. Beggs and Dr. Simon T. Ramo, who headed President Reagan's science and technology transition team, have joined the list of speakers for the October 28-30 Showcase for Technology conference and exhibition in Albuquerque, United States Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt has announced.

Other speakers scheduled for the three-day conference are Dr. George A. "Jay" Keyworth, Director of the Office of Science and Technology Policy; John B. Slaughter, Director of the National Science Foundation (NSF); Gerald Mossinghoff, United States Commissioner of Patents; Dr. Richard Damon, President of the

Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE); Dr. Glenn Schleede, Executive Associate Director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB); and Schmitt.

The conference is being sponsored by Schmitt, the Los Alamos and Sandia National Laboratories, the University of New Mexico, New Mexico State University, New Mexico Tech, the Air Force Weapons Laboratory, White Sands Missile Range, the department of Energy (DOE), and the Federal Laboratory Consortium.

The conference schedule calls for technical sessions, seminars, and exhibits on October 28 and 29, and tours of some of the state's federal research and development installations on October 30.



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
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# Chamber seeks accommodations for 'Up With People' players

# Wilderness assessment scheduled in Capitans

The Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest is in the initial stages of preparing an Environmental Assessment Report (EAR) for oil and gas leasing in the Capitan Mountains Wilderness, District Ranger Sidney P. Gordon has announced.

The Capitan Mountains Wilderness comprises approximately 34,000 acres located on East Mountain of the Capitan Mountains.

An EAR was completed and approved for the adjacent non-wilderness portion of the Capitan Mountains in May 1981. Since the majority of the leases which affect wilderness lands included non-wilderness lands, a decision was made to issue these leases with a "no surface occupancy stipulation" to apply to the areas within the Capitan Mountains Wilderness, Gordon said.

The Wilderness Act of 1964 provides statutory authority for the Forest Service to require "... reasonable stipulations ... for the protection of the wilderness character of the land consistent with the use of the land for the purposes for which they are leased ..."

The EAR will review and resolve the issue: "Under what conditions and stipulations regarding the protection of aesthetic, biological and social values will oil and gas leasing proceed in the Capitan Mountains Wilderness."

Six alternatives representing different levels of protection during oil and gas exploration have been developed:

1. No action. No surface occupancy permitted in the Capitan Mountains Wilderness.
2. Location of drilling sites restricted to those areas least visible from major travel corridors; maximum feasible mitigation on site of visual and biological impacts.
3. Drilling sites located to maximize protection of biological values; visual impacts mitigated to the maximum degree feasible on site through use of camouflage painting, topography and vegetation to screen the operation.
4. Drilling sites located to maximize protection of biological or visual resources on a site basis depending on the relative value of the resource. In some cases biological values will be sacrificed to protect visual resources or vice versa.

5. No restriction as to location of drilling sites; biological and aesthetic impacts mitigated on site to the maximum degree feasible by camouflage painting, use of topography and vegetation to screen the operation.

6. No restriction as to location of the drilling sites; mitigation of aesthetic and biological impacts only to the degree standard-outside-wilderness areas.

Evaluation criteria have been developed against which each alternative will be compared in order to select the preferred alternative, including:

1. Which alternative best maintains the integrity of the overall wilderness character type;
2. protects, maintains and improves, when possible, threatened and endangered

populations, associated habitats areas/objects of special biological interest;

3. allows for reasonable exploration the area for potential oil and gas resources.

"Public input in reviewing the proposed six alternatives and three decision criteria for the oil and gas leasing EAR would be appreciated. We solicit common recommendations or additional alternative criteria that would be pertinent to the report," Gordon said.

And the golfers responded to the large crowd with some excellent golf, probably the best in the tournament's history. Three golfers had scores under 70 in the championship qualifying. And the quality and depth of the tournament was shown when

the defending champion, John Field and the 1980 runner-up, Tom Hornbuckle, both lost in the early going. Leroy Gooch, Ruidoso High School golf coach and 1979 champ, finished second in the first flight consolation bracket.

To illustrate the closeness of the talents involved in the tournament Baker was involved in three sudden-death matches. Jarrett was involved in two one-stroke decisions besides his sudden-death win over Baker.

The tournament is gaining a "regional" look to it as most of the golfers were from outside of the Lincoln County area. Jarrett is from Lubbock, Texas, and Baker resides in Fort Worth. Field is from Las Cruces and Dan Koesters, who lost to Baker in the semi-finals, hails from Alamogordo.

But probably the most notable feature of the tournament was the fact that two "youngsters" were in the championship flight final. Winner Mark Jarrett celebrated his 22nd birthday on the final day of the tournament and runner-up Angus Baker is only 19.

Former Ruidoso High School standout Kevin Sivage was impressive in the qualifying round as he tied for the lowest score among first flight golfers with a 78. Gooch also fired a 78.

So the youth factor was big in the tournament. And if the trend continues people could start referring to golf as a "young man's game," in the same way they do about basketball, baseball and football.

But both young and old enjoyed the 33rd Cree Meadows Golf Invitational. It had all the excitement, pressure and looks of a major tournament on the pro tour.

One thing working in a losing team's favor, however, is the fact that with the new split season everybody starts out even again. If one of these teams gets a winning streak going that could bring the fans back to the park.

# Ruidoso impressive in workout

Ruidoso High School's football team started practice Tuesday on the road to what head coach Darrel Stierwalt hopes will be the Warriors' best season in many years.

Ruidoso, which garnered a 7-3 record last season, had 18 players returning from that squad plus several fine prospects up from the junior varsity team.

"I'm really pleased with the way the guys look so far," Stierwalt said after yesterday morning's practice. "Our returning veterans look good enough to begin playing games right now."

Thirty-eight players were suited up for yesterday's practice but Stierwalt expects more soon.

"Five or six players are still on vacation

and there's a possibility we might get a couple of transfers from California," Stierwalt said.

Stierwalt and his assistants are putting the players through two practices a day, a morning practice from 9 to 11 and an afternoon practice from 5 to 7. The players were issued pads and given a lecture Tuesday morning before going through an offensive practice in the afternoon. Yesterday the coaches put the team through a defensive practice in the morning and a defensive one in the afternoon.

"We plan on alternating defensive and offensive workouts," Stierwalt said. "Like we'll have an offensive practice tomorrow morning (Thursday) and a defensive one in the afternoon."

Stierwalt said that his backfield looks to be the strongest point of the team so far.

"We knew they'd be good," the coach said. "After all they've been on the team for four years now and they all know the system pretty well. They know how to run a formation."

Billy Woodul, a 6-1, 185 pound junior, is expected to be the starting quarterback in the Warriors' combination wing-wishbone offense. Scott Neal, who quarterbacked the team last season, will go at halfback to take advantage of his speed. Lon Nunley, an all-district linebacker, and Chris Lopez are solid fullback candidates.

"We expect to throw the ball more than we did last season," Stierwalt said. "Last year other teams sort of expected that we would run with the ball and most of the time we did. But this year we'll probably run about 60 percent of the time and pass about 40. Woodul has a lot of ability and we plan to take advantage of that."

On defense Lon Nunley 6-1, 200 pounds, heads an experienced group of linebackers. There are several defensive backs returning from last year's team but the line must be rebuilt.

Ruidoso will host a three-way scrimmage August 27 against Portales High School and Cathedral High School of El Paso. The Warriors open the regular season with a home game against Estancia High School Friday, September 4.

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

## National Guard trained at Bonita

Headquarters and Headquarters Battery (HHB) of the 1st Battalion, 200th Air Defense Artillery, New Mexico Army National Guard in Roswell, recently conducted training in preparation for the Skill Qualification Test (SQT). SQT is a three part test in which the individual soldier is tested in general and specific areas. General areas having to do with basic skills that every soldier should be able to perform, such as assembly and disassembly of the M-16 rifle within four minutes, be able to send a radio message using proper codes and radio procedures, first aid, map and compass reading to name a few.

Specific areas having to do with the soldier's individual Military Occupational Skill (MOS) such as fieldstripping the M-42 Duster (a tank like air defense weapon) if

his MOS happens to be that of an M-42 Crewman or be able to set up a radar station if he happens to be a radar operator. Over sixty members of the unit, which is commanded by Captain James Melton of El Paso, participated in the exercise which began August 1 with a convoy from Roswell to Bonita Lake near Ruidoso. The training was conducted by members of HHB alongside with members of the New Mexico State Guard. The State Guard detachment, headed by Colonel Rex Skellett of Ruidoso, was in charge of training the men in the proper technique of repelling. Which was done by about fifteen men on a volunteer basis off a 100 foot rock, using two ropes instead of one for the sake of safety. Colonel Skellett is also a member of the White Mountain

Search and Rescue team. The State Guard is made up of volunteer men who will take the place of the New Mexico Army National Guard if the National Guard is ever called up into federal service. The members of the State Guard receive no pay for their time and efforts.

## Obesity is stigma in our society

Negative attitudes about obesity are pervasive throughout American society and they are learned by most people at an early age regardless of sex or ethnic origin according to two University of New Mexico researchers.

The research suggests that education regarding obesity is overdue. Dr. Sara Dawn Smith, an elementary education professor, and Dr. Mary Harris, an educational foundations professor, began their study of obesity stereotypes in 1978. Since then they have interviewed 47 persons of all ages and from numerous ethnic backgrounds to discern the nature of the stereotyping, how early it begins and how strong it is.

"Clearly we believe that the public needs education about the complex causes of obesity," Smith said. "A substantial group of even the adult subjects in our study still accept a view of obesity which implies that the obese person could easily achieve normal weight by eating less. Obesity is a real stigma in our society. It seems to me that it is at once regarded as a sin, a disease and as ugliness. We need to begin educating people at an early age that it is unfair to blame obesity on the individual."

All the participants in the study, which included nursery school, first and fifth grade students and adults, were asked if they knew anyone who was fat, what the causes of obesity are and whose fault it is if someone is fat. Drawings of normal, underweight and overweight persons were also included with the questionnaire.

"The overwhelming response to the survey by people of all ages was that fat people are responsible for their own obesity," Smith said. "But what surprised us was that even overweight people had the same attitudes as everyone else. Many fat people have internalized the negative

attitudes of society toward obesity." Smith said female participants in the survey were more likely than males to know someone fat and to give complex explanations of obesity. Anglo, Hispanic, Native American and black participants did not differ in their attitudes. Adults, as might be expected, gave more complex explanations of obesity than children.

"Weight control is a billion dollar industry in our society," Smith said. "Fat people who are full of self-hatred are disadvantaged in many ways. They face discrimination in areas such as employment and they are made to feel they deserve to be discriminated against."

She said case studies to measure public attitudes about a variety of physical disfigurements show that people have a stronger prejudice toward obesity than almost any other physical problem.

Smith and Harris asked participants in the study to give names to the overweight people illustrated in the study questionnaire. Although most of the nicknames given could be classified in a neutral or normal category, a substantial amount of

derogatory names such as "bulldozer," "chubs," "big Ethel," "hamburgers," "porkchops," and "blubber" were suggested.

Other nicknames given to the illustrations of overweight persons included "lonely," "sexy," "bossy," "sir," "happy," "coach" and "the giant."

"Sometimes people just react to a fat person as a fat person," Smith said, "and neglect all their other human qualities. Another study of overweight adolescent girls showed they became withdrawn and passive because they just expected to be persecuted or rejected because of their weight."

She said the prejudice that exists about overweight people seems to be so ingrained in society that it is not really viewed as a prejudice.

"The results of our study suggest that although accuracy of knowledge about obesity increases with age, education about obesity at all age levels may be needed to reduce misinformation and accompanying negative attitudes."

## UNM names Sparks to head Robert O. Anderson Schools

Dr. Morgan Sparks, recently retired president of the Sandia Corporation in Albuquerque, has been named Dean of the Robert O. Anderson Schools of Management at the University of New Mexico (UNM), President William E. Davis has announced.

Sparks will assume his UNM duties with the beginning of the 1981-82 fall semester August 24. He succeeds Dr. Jerry Jordan who resigned earlier this year to accept a post on President Ronald Reagan's Council of Economic Advisers.

Dr. William Peters, who has been acting dean since Jordan's resignation, has been appointed associate dean for academic affairs for the undergraduate and graduate management schools, Davis said.

Sparks, who earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Rice University and a doctorate in chemistry-physics from the University of Illinois, spent 38 years in scientific and management positions in the Bell System. He was president of Sandia for nine years and, at the same time, was a vice president of Western Electric, the Sandia Corporation parent company.

Sparks is the author of numerous technical publications and has been granted 10 patents in the general area of semiconductor electronics. In 1977 he was named recipient of the Jack A. Morton Award of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, for meritorious achievement in the field of solid state devices. The University of New Mexico in 1980 awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Science.

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

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# Rio Grande cutthroat population down to 100 breeding age fish

The Rio Grande cutthroat, official state fish, is down to a population of barely more than 100 breeding age fish in Taos County's Rio Chiquito, a focus of state Game and Fish Department and United States Forest Service efforts to keep the native trout off endangered species lists.

Fisheries surveys indicate scattered, mostly much smaller, populations of pure-strain native cutthroats may remain in a few headwaters in the San Pedro Parks and Pecos Wilderness areas, according to Bob Patterson, research biologist with the department's Fisheries Division.

"People tend to associate headwaters with cutthroats, because that's where the natives are still found," Patterson said. "Unfortunately, these upper reaches are marginal habitat, where the fish are more subject to drought and other problems of

low water flow. We're going to have to open up the lower reaches of some streams if we're going to have good populations of the natives."

Patterson said Rio Grande cutthroat evolved during the Ice Ages, most recent of which ended about 10,000 to 15,000 years ago. Until European man's influences began to have significant impacts, the fish was found throughout the mountain drainages of the Pecos and Rio Grande rivers — including the Rio Grande itself almost as far south as Albuquerque.

(The only other trout native to New Mexico is the Gila trout, in southwestern New Mexico. It is on state and federal endangered species lists and also an object of restoration efforts.)

"Habitat changes," Patterson said, "are what brought the native trout to such low population levels." He cited irrigation diversions, timbering, mining, road-building and livestock grazing as major factors that reduced stream flows, increased siltation and raised water temperatures beyond the trout's tolerances.

Introduction of non-native trout — rainbows, brooks, European browns and other subspecies of cutthroat — also reduced the natives' numbers and the purity of the Rio Grande cutthroat strain.

"The other trout compete with the native for food and space," Patterson said. "They eat the Rio Grande's eggs and young — browns especially do that. The rainbows and other cutthroat subspecies hybridize (cross-breed) with them; and the result is a trout, but not a Rio Grande cutthroat trout."

The Rio Chiquito is a good example of a stream that could still support good populations of the natives, but it has been invaded and virtually taken over by European browns. No rainbows, brook trout or other cutthroat subspecies occur in the Rio Chiquito, Patterson said, so the native cutthroat there is a pure strain.

"Just 15 years ago, the population was about 80 percent Rio Grande cutthroats and 10 percent browns. Now it's greater than 99 percent browns and barely one percent cutthroats," Patterson said.

The aggressive brown trout breached two fish barriers placed to keep them out, he said, and after getting a start, steadily increased their numbers. "It was a geometric progression."

Several things contributed to the brown's success: It spawns in the fall, and its eggs and fry have a more stable water flow than do those of the spring-spawning cutthroats, which hatch during the runoff. Too, "It's warier. The average fisherman doesn't do as well against the browns, but the native is more gullible." Browns become piscivorous — fish-eating — at a smaller size than do other trout, and steadily consume the eggs and fry of the cutthroats.

Surveying the Rio Chiquito, Patterson said, biologists found that "very likely all the cutthroats are in the stretch from a beaver dam just below Borrego Crossing to the headwater. There may be a few strays below there, but very few."

The Rio Grande cutthroat's last stronghold in the river comprises about 1.6 miles of the Rio Chiquito's 16-mile length. Patterson said surveys revealed an average 288 fish per stream mile in the upper stretch, an average 1,600 fish per mile on a test section three miles below Borrego Crossing. "Obviously, the lower stretch is better trout habitat."

During the surveys, fisheries crews used electroshocking equipment that stuns the fish without killing them. During three forays through the upper Rio Chiquito, they removed 231 brown trout. Patterson estimated his crews missed about 40 browns, "but the beaver dam below the crossing helps as a natural barrier, and although it's hard to put a benefit figure on it, removing that many browns is insurance that we'll still have cutthroats there next year."

He pointed out, though, that a nine inch female brown will produce as many as 300 eggs, and rapid repopulation is likely.

Next summer, the department and United States Forest Service will launch an intensive effort to recapture the Rio

Chiquito for the native cutthroats. They will rebuild a fish barrier near the stream mouth at Talpa to prevent new emigration of brown trout and remove the browns from the river, either through extensive and repeated electroshocking or by applying derria root, a fish suffocant, to the stream.

"We'd originally planned to remove the cutthroats for safekeeping this summer by electroshocking, then using the fish suffocant to remove all the browns in the stream, leaving the entire river open for restocking with cutthroats," Patterson said. "We ran into local opposition from a few people who were afraid of the suffocant. It's harmless to humans, plants or livestock, and we've used it in municipal water supplies safely, but it put the program off for at least a summer."

Electroshocking is more expensive and holds lower likelihood of success, he said, but is more acceptable to some Talpa-area residents.

"The electroshocking alternative also hinges on funding," Patterson said. "To hold any hope of success, we'd have to shock the entire stream 10 times a year for three years, removing brown trout and leaving the cutthroats, before we could see really significant gains."

The department has had little success in attempts to rear cutthroats in hatcheries,

Patterson said, and needs a natural hatchery such as the Rio Chiquito for a source of fish for stocking in other streams as they are prepared for the natives.

"Even if we could hatch them by the millions, right now we don't have any place to put them where they wouldn't be eaten and crowded out by the browns or hybridized by rainbows and other cutthroats," he said.

"We have to select at least several streams that still have good enough water for the natives, remove all the other trout in them, build effective fish barriers to keep the non-natives out, and stock Rio Grande cutthroat in them — or we aren't going to have any Rio Grande cutthroats."

The state has approximately 1,400 miles of trout stream, not all of it suitable for cutthroats, and about 200 miles of trout stream in Taos County, so setting aside some streams for natives would not significantly affect anglers seeking rainbows or brown trout.

The State Game Commission has also extended a higher bag limit on brown trout taken from the Rio Chiquito. An ambitious angler can keep 32 browns per day and have 64 in possession — double the usual limit — from the Rio Chiquito. The double bag limit runs through July 31, 1982.

"Any cutthroats caught," Patterson said wryly, "are to be returned to the water."

## VA insurance interest rate hiked to 11 percent

The annual interest rate charged by the Veterans Administration (VA) on National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policy loans has been increased to 11 percent retroactive to last July 29, said Joe Cordova, director, Albuquerque VA Regional Office.

NSLI coverage was provided service personnel on active duty from October 8, 1940, through April 24, 1951. Those who converted that World War II coverage to a permanent plan may obtain loans up to 94 percent of the cash value of their individual policy. In fiscal 1980, VA made about 96,000 loans on NSLI policies, Cordova said.

The July 29 change doesn't affect the loan interest rate on United States

Government Life Insurance (USGLI) policies, he pointed out. Interest rates on USGLI policies, which were extended to military personnel who served between May 1919 and April 1951, are set by law.

The loan interest rate on NSLI policies was increased to five percent in 1971. Since that time, other investments made for the insurance trust funds have yielded increasingly higher earnings and dividends for policy holders. The increased interest rate will permit earnings on policy loans to become comparable with other investments.

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## Charging by phone can be dangerous

Giving out credit card numbers over the telephone is a fairly common practice these days. Many items are bought on credit over the telephone by credit card number.

Motel and hotel reservations can be guaranteed by card number, but there's always a risk for the card holder, according to Jackie Martin, Extension family specialist at New Mexico State University.

For example, one fraud involved persons who were notified by telephone that they had won a trip. They were then asked to give their credit card number. Later they found unauthorized credit charges ranging from \$60 to \$400.

A dishonest sales clerk taking credit card orders over the telephone can use customers' card numbers to charge other items, also by telephone. The dishonest clerk gets the merchandise and the card holder gets the bill.

Most businesses have access to a toll-free telephone number they can use to verify account balances, so the dishonest sales clerk can even find out the amount of available credit on a given card number.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation cautions consumers never to give out their credit card number over the telephone. If someone calls and asks for a credit card number, for any reason, ask for a number to call back — then call the

police. The best way to head off fraud of this type is to keep all credit card receipts and check them against monthly statements. If there are any unauthorized charges, notify the credit card company immediately.

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# Forest campground use time explained

The growing popularity of developed campgrounds in the Lincoln National Forest has resulted in the imposition of "stay limits" for two groups of campgrounds, according to a Forest Service spokesman.

He explained that the stay limits were inadvertently described incorrectly in a news release issued by the Forest Service last week.

Camping in the developed recreation areas listed below is limited to 14 days within a 30-day period. The areas are South Fork; Manjeau; Skyline; Oak Grove; Three Rivers; Deerhead; Pines; Sleepy Grass; and James Canyon Campground.

The same limit, 14 days within a 30-day period, is in effect for Silver, Saddle,

Apache and the Silver Overflow Campgrounds. For the purpose of this order, the spokesman said, these four sites are considered one.

Otherwise, unless the area is posted, visitors may camp on the forest for up to a total of 30 consecutive days.

Rains have brought out the wildflowers in many areas of the forest, particularly in Cox and Scott Able Canyons, according to forest visitors.

In the Smokey Bear Ranger District, at Ruidoso, South Fork Campground is receiving heavy use, and other campgrounds are receiving light use. Bonito Lake is down, somewhat, but streams are running muddy and higher than usual. Visitors are asked to be prepared for lightning storms and slick roads due to

thundershowers. The Visitor Information Service program is being conducted on Saturdays at dusk at South Fork. Fuelwood gatherers are asked to check with the district officer before planning to cut or gather wood.

At Clouderoff, campgrounds are receiving heavy use on weekends and moderate use during the week. Belle Canyon is muddy and all off-road travel is prohibited. Unsurfaced roads are muddy, because of rains falling daily. The campfire programs at the Silver Overflow Area have been concluded for the season. Trails are muddy and all fuelwood areas are closed. Fuelwood gatherers are asked to check with the ranger station for current information on the fuelwood areas.

Applications for campground hosts for

the 1982 season are being accepted by the Clouderoff District. Requests for application blanks will be taken over the phone and the blanks will be mailed to persons requesting them.

On the Guadalupe District, at Carlsbad, Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is receiving heavy use; road conditions are good; weather conditions change rapidly; rattlesnakes are out and campers are urged to be aware of the possibility of potential flash flood in low-lying areas. Trails are in good conditions and fuelwood areas are open.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground is receiving heavy use; fishing is fair on the Penasco River; roads are dry, except in the area of showers; and fuelwood areas are open.

## There are ways to handle missed airline connections

There are only two kinds of airline passengers, those who have missed connecting flights and those who are going to.

Airlines don't guarantee their schedules because there are too many things beyond the airlines' control that can delay a departing flight — bad weather, air traffic delays and mechanical problems.

Airlines usually help passengers find alternate flights, and may provide food and other basic amenities during long waits at the airport, according to Jackie Martin, Extension family finance specialist at New Mexico State University.

However, airlines won't accept responsibility for other kinds of expenses or losses that passengers incur when airline schedules come unstruck, Martin said.

If a flight is delayed, try to find out why, but keep in mind that airline employees might not have the answer. If the problem is local weather or air traffic problems, all flights will probably be late and there's not much the passenger or airline can do to speed up departures.

If it's a mechanical problem, or if the crew is held up on an incoming flight, the passenger is better off trying to arrange another flight. However, there may be a cancellation charge or higher fare when switching reservations.

If a flight is cancelled, the airline will rebook passengers on the first available flight to their destination. There is usually no additional charge, even if the only available space is in first class. Finding

extra seats, however, is difficult during peak travel seasons or over holidays. Each airline has its own policy about what it will do for passengers delayed at the airport. If the delay is expected to be four hours or longer, the airlines will usually pay for telephone calls or telegrams to people at the passenger's destination to explain the situation and give new arrival time.

Most airlines also will pay for a hotel room if passengers are stranded overnight. Another common practice is to pay taxi or limousine fares between the airport and the hotel, and to give passengers vouchers for food at an airport restaurant.

Passengers who are facing a long delay and find the airline's staff can't or won't help should keep track of all out-of-pocket expenses caused by the delay. Write the airline's consumer officer for reimbursement after arriving at home.

Airlines almost always refuse to be responsible for other financial losses resulting from a missed connection or delayed arrival.

Passengers who have a potentially lucrative business deal, or are to give a speech or lecture, or have to be present at any time-sensitive event should allow extra travel time.

Airline delays and cancellations aren't unusual, so defensive counter-planning is a good idea when time is the most important consideration.







**SANTA FE** — When the Governor pardons a man who has already been returned to prison for a serious crime, you've got to suspect there's some poor staff work going on.

(You get a purge notice if you fail to vote in a general election. If you still live at the address at which you are listed and you want to stay on the rolls, all you have to do is return a simple form and your voting rights are preserved.)

If the total of those taken off the lists runs that high, this will be the biggest removal ever. It will also change the mathematics of the 1982 election.

It doesn't imply, however, that New Mexicans fail to vote. Our actual turnout are good. The problem is that our people are movers, sometimes moving right on out of state.

In 1980, 71.2 percent of us whose names were on the rolls showed up to vote. That's a turnout that's considerably higher than in most other parts of the nation.

What's more, if we had purged properly before that election the numbers might say something closer to 90 percent of those entitled to vote in the state actually did so.

As this reporter grows ever grayer, he fulminates more and more frequently about the relative incompetence of those who are young. Most of his friends smile knowingly, and humor him.

It's among television reporters especially that this trend proves most gripesome. These downy cheeked lads and lasses, we contend, skew the whole noble trade of news reporting with their evident belief that those of us past 50 are well-nigh senile.

Latest offensive example, from an Albuquerque station: "The robbers also killed one of the company's oldest taxi drivers. He was 59."

That ain't old, damnit. Some people of that age even manage, though undoubtedly feeble, to write a column every day. Bet those young whippersnappers couldn't pull that off.

The heavy volume of traffic in Ruidoso this summer indicates that traffic, not water, may be the determining factor in further developing this area as a tourist attraction.

Over the past few years there has been discussion about developing Gavilan Canyon Road into a north/south bypass route from Highway 37 to Highway 70.

Other than talk, little has been accomplished.

So far as traffic to Ruidoso Downs Race Track is concerned, one way to reduce traffic on Sudderth would be to build another street north of Sudderth, leading east to connect with Highway 70. This might be possible from some point on Paradise Canyon Road.

The immediate problem, of course, would be the tremendous cost of both projects.

However, with both state and federal highways involved, and with both of these routes being connecting roads to them, perhaps, before the time traffic forces cassation in local recreational and tourism development, a share-the-cost plan could be worked out utilizing state and federal funds.

A project of this magnitude would take years to accomplish, with one thought being it might be possible to include these two service roads in the planning for converting Highway 70 into a four and six lane freeway.

The way we see it, Ruidoso has nothing to lose if our elected officials start the ball rolling in this direction. — CD

Wayne Buehrer won the biggest thoroughbred race of his career Sunday at Ruidoso Downs, thereby earning jockey-of-the-week honors for the 14th week of horse racing at the mountain track.

Buehrer guided Spanish Spade to a one and three fourth length victory in the \$40,120 Rio Grande Futurity at six furlongs. That compensated for his second place finish in the 1980 Rio Grande Futurity when he was aboard Draconic

Spoke.  
Buehrer's win was the third of the weekend and boosted him back into the top ten jockey standings. He is in tenth place with 21 wins, 18 seconds and 23 thirds from 207 mounts.  
His winning percentage is .101.  
Only minor changes occurred in the rider standings as the first four leaders remained unchanged.  
Jackie Martin continues to be a runaway leader with a safe 25 win margin over

runnerup Richard Bickel.  
Martin has 55 wins with 49 seconds and 32 thirds from 225 mounts. His winning percentage is a fine .244.  
Bickel is second with 30 triumphs, 27 seconds and 35 thirds from 190 mounts. His winning percentage is .116.  
Following Bickel in the standings are Leroy Coombs, Stuart Dolphus, Willie Lovell, Joe Martinez, Steve Harris, W. R. Hunt, Pedro Benitez and Buehrer.

William F. Leach saddled four winners last weekend to remain the trainer leader.  
He has 31 victories, 16 seconds and 12 thirds from 154 starts. His winning percentage is .201.

Following Leach in the trainer standings are Johnnie Goodman, J. Doyal Roberts, Jack Brooks, Bob Arnett, Gerald Marr, Harold E. Nolen, Clifford Lambert, C. Dwayne Gilbreath and Marilyn Asmussen.

This weekend's 15th week of racing features quarter horse trials for the All-American Futurity.

Elimination trials are set for Thursday and Friday with 22 trial heats each day. There will be a special starting time of 10 a.m., each day.


The first three finishers from each 440 yard dash will advance to the time trials on August 27. The 10 fastest runners from those trials will earn berths in the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity on Labor Day.

The All-American Futurity is the third leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses. The winner will receive \$528,000, the richest purse in New Mexico racing history.

Saturday's highlight will be the Three Bars Handicap at 400 yards for three-year-old and older quarter horses. The purse will be \$12,500-added.

Sunday's main event will be the Ruidoso Speed Handicap at four furlongs for three-year-old and older runners. The purse will be \$15,000-added.

## Nationally known auctioneer to call All-American horse sale

It didn't take Bill Tackett long to discover a lifetime occupation.

"I started being an auctioneer when I was 16 years old. By the time I was 17, I was working six cattle auctions a week in some capacity," said the 58-year-old Oklahoman, who is regarded as one of the country's finest horse auctioneers.

It is understandable he became an auctioneer. He lived across the street from a livestock auction in Fayetteville, Arkansas, while he was a youngster.

But horses have long been his forte. He is one of four auctioneers who work the prestigious Keeneland Horse Sales, held four times annually in Lexington, Kentucky. At the July sale, yearlings sold for a record \$3.5 million, \$3.3 million and one for \$2,950,000.

Not to overlook the quarter horses, Tackett has worked as an auctioneer for the All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale for the past seven years at Ruidoso Downs. The All-American is generally regarded as having the finest quarter horse yearlings in the country.

"The All-American is really a great sale.

I thoroughly enjoy it," said the resident of Collinsville, Oklahoma. "I love to come here."

Tackett has also been at the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs' track grounds the past few years as one of the three auctioneers working the summer sale.

"I also do the Heritage Place sale five or six times a year in Oklahoma City," Tackett said. "They also have great quarter horse yearlings; I like to sell them all (thoroughbreds and quarter horses). It doesn't make any difference. I'm a horseman at heart."

"I'm gone just about every week someplace in the country."

He's also done the Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Sale in Lafayette; the Illinois Thoroughbred Breeders' Sale in Chicago and twice annually in Springfield, the Arkansas Thoroughbred Breeders' Sale in Little Rock, the Nebraska Thoroughbred Breeders' Sale in Omaha and the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders' Sale.

Although he participates about 200 days a year in sales, he labels the Keeneland Sales as his greatest thrill.

"At this year's Keeneland Sale, \$92 million was spent in two days. My biggest sale was about two years ago at Keeneland when I sold one for \$1.4 million. It's a great

thrill to make a sale like that. It makes you feel like you've done a good job," he said.

Tackett will return to Ruidoso Downs for the All-American Sale with his two auctioneering partners, who travel around the country and do numerous sales each year. His "team" includes Keith Babb of Monroe, Louisiana and Scott Caldwell of San Clemente, California.

"Most of the time we go around the country together. We travel a lot and are real good friends," he said.

Besides selling horses, Tackett also owns and races horses.

He has 20 broodmares and three stallions on his ranch in Oklahoma, five horses actually racing and six quarter horses and thoroughbreds in training.

Ironically, while he was in Ruidoso Downs last week for the Summer Sale, two of his horses won on the same day. Oklahoma Kid triumphed at Arlington Park while Harley's Pride won at Balmoral. Both are Chicago-area race tracks.

"That's the first time that's ever happened," he said.

Perhaps the best compliment to Tackett comes from Bobby Lewis, director of horse sales for Ruidoso-Sumland. "Bill is one of the finest auctioneers in the country. That's why we have him here," Lewis said.





## Specila Effort launches his Triple Crown bid

Special Effort, the colt who's been sending shock waves through the quarter horse industry, is expected to be the focal point of Thursday's program.

The expanded agenda kicks off the first-round elimination trials leading to the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity.

Twenty-two races are booked for Thursday (August 13), and another 22 are on tap Friday. All together 437 two-year-olds will be stalling it out in the two-day shootout.

Since so many races are in the works, first post both Thursday and Friday is an early-morning 10 a.m. Each of the trials will be run at the classic 440-yard distance.

In order to survive the opening stanza, a hopeful must finish in the top three in his trial heat. The clock will be no factor. That means 86 head will survive Thursday's trials, and another 66 will clear the hurdle on Friday.

Those 132 semi-finalists will then battle it out in the final elimination round on Thursday, August 27. On that day, 14 heats will be staged, and those chalking up the 10 fastest times will earn a berth in the grand finale on Labor Day. The August 27 time trials will also set the field for the first, second and third consolation.

Special Effort, the colt owned by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas, has been a whirlwind so far. His record stands at a perfect six wins from six starts. He made a big splash early in the season by winning his trial heat for the \$387,350 Kansas Futurity by nearly five lengths.

On the eve of the Kansas finale, he was purchased by the Urschels for \$1 million. That was the biggest price ever paid for a quarter horse in training. A few days after

the pact was sealed, Special Effort won the Triple Crown — the \$689,370 Rainbow Futurity. He won his first trial spin by nearly three lengths, then came back in the final runoff and won by 4 1/4 lengths, and also set the top qualifying time of 20.02 for 400 yards. In the finale, he raced as a 1-3 favorite and blasted out a 1 1/2 length win. The victory upped his income by \$232,536.

Next, he went after the second leg of the Triple Crown — the \$689,370 Rainbow Futurity. He won his first trial spin by nearly three lengths, then came back in the final runoff and won by 4 1/4 lengths, and also set the top qualifying time of 20.02 for 400 yards. In the finale, he raced as a 1-3 favorite and blasted out a 1 1/2 length win. The victory upped his income by \$232,536.

The colt's current bankroll stands at \$496,562. He also holds the distinction of being the first horse since Tiny's Gay (1974) to win both the Kansas and Rainbow futurities. Since Tiny's Gay subsequently lost a nose decision in the All-American Futurity, Special Effort stands a big chance of becoming the sport's first Triple Crown winner.

Special Effort, with regular pilot W. R. Hunt aboard, makes his Triple Crown bid in Thursday's 10th race.

Another one to watch on Thursday is Greybon, who won the recent \$320,295 Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park. Greybon, entered in the third race, is one of 29 All-American supplemental nominees at \$15,000 each.

Just A Play Mate, winner of Sunland's \$256,896 West Texas Futurity, is in the 8th race. Dastingly, the \$50,000 All-American Yearling Sale purchase who recently earned \$387,100 in the Skool Dash For Cash Futurity on the West Coast, makes her All-American bid in the 14th race.

Summer Encounter, the third-place finisher in the Rainbow Futurity, goes in the 16th heat.

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

SALES CATALOGUES for the 20th Annual All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale have arrived and are available to the general public. A record 964 quarter horse yearlings have been catalogued in a precedent setting two volume catalogue. The sale, under the direction of Bobby Lewis, director of horse sales for Ruidoso-Sunland, will be held in four sessions for the first time in history. Day sessions, beginning at 10 a.m., are scheduled on August 31, September 1 and 2. The only night session will begin at 7 on September 3. All sessions are slated for the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs' track grounds. Last year, 742 head went through the sales arena, with the total price of \$11,028,300. The average price was \$14,880. Officials are hoping to better those figures.

TRIAL RACES for the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity will be held Thursday and Friday. A total of 437 two-year-olds will compete in the elimination trials for the third leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses. There will be 22 races each day, all at 440 yards, necessitating an early post time of 10 a.m. A total of 23 horses were supplemented at a cost of \$14,260, but only 23 paid the additional \$750 to start in the elimination trial. Horses must finish in the top three on Thursday and Friday to advance to time trials on August 27. Then, the 10 fastest runners earn berths in the All-American Futurity on Labor Day, with the winner receiving \$528,000 for that 440 yard dash. Special Effort, who has won the first two legs of the Triple Crown, the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities, is entered on Thursday in the 10th trial division. He will be ridden by regular rider W. R. Hunt.

STUART DOLPHUS was the only jockey gaining two wins on Thursday's 12 race program. Ten jockeys each posted one victory. Winners included Ramon Apodaca, Danny Summerow, Pedro Benitez, Kevin Schell, John Baca, Jimmie Hunt, James Lackey, Willie Lovell, Henry Urlegas and Rick Theford. Theford piloted Before The Flood to a one and one fourth length victory in the 12th race at seven furlongs. It was Theford's first victory this season at Ruidoso Downs.

NINE OF THE 12 winners on Thursday's program recorded their first triumphs at

this summer's Ruidoso Downs meeting. First time winners at the mountain track included Play Elm Alone (\$10.00) in the first, Custom Mito (\$7.20) in the second, Mighty Thought (\$87.40) in the third, Em Bar Gann (\$43.00) in the fourth, Esta My Place (\$8.40) in the fifth, Turn'N Roman (\$18.40) in the sixth, Uncle Lew (\$8.30) in the seventh, Lanes Golden Eagle (\$12.60) in the ninth and Harpen Daylight (\$30.80) in the tenth.

GLOVER D. continued his domination of the three-year-old class at Ruidoso Downs with a one and one fourth length victory in Saturday's \$15,000 Jockey Club Stakes at seven furlongs. The Valld Appeal gelding has won five races this summer at the mountain track, including three stakes. He's also captured the Aspen Stakes and the Memorial Day Handicap. His only defeat occurred in the Peter Hurd Handicap, when he carried the season's heavy impost of 127 pounds. Owned by Jay C. Childers of Berger, Texas, he has collected \$55,401. He's trained by J. Doyal Roberts and has been ridden by Richard Bickel. He is a strong candidate for horse-of-the-meet honors in the thoroughbred division.

## Brian Dorr and "Stick" return to Incredible *Bold Love's win ends dry spell for owners*

The sounds filtering out of the Incredible on any Thursday through Sunday night may be hard to identify for the first-time visitor. From a distance, one might guess the melodies to come from a well-rehearsed duo on bass and guitar, or perhaps a muted electric piano.

So it's a surprise to turn the corner into the bar and find all six feet six inches of Brian Dorr cramped into a corner with some sort of weird instrument that looks like a cross between a guitar and a bazooka.

The instrument is a newcomer to the musical world, with only about 600 in use. It's appropriately called "The Stick," and in Dorr's hands it is full of surprises. As the evening wears on, the listener will hear some lovely and very versatile music.

Dorr played at the Incredible for most of the summer until July 12, and after a month's leave, he is returning until Labor Day and the All-American Futurity.

"I just got back from California, where I spent over \$1,000 on new equipment," Dorr said this week. "I'll be using some new electronic effects which will enable me to produce sounds from a rock guitar to a saxophone."

Dorr said he has also purchased a sound return device just put on the market by the Stick's inventor — Emmett Chapman — called "Patch of Shades." It enables the musician to blend the various sounds and textures the Stick can produce, weaving them in and out of the melody line to produce a "chorus of sounds."

According to Dorr, "it will be about like going from black and white to color. It's state-of-the-art equipment which has just been made available — some of it hasn't even been shipped to me yet — so I'll be pretty much learning as I go along."

Dorr has been based out of Albuquerque for the last three years, but he's originally from Portola Valley, in the bay area of California.

He started out playing classical piano in the first grade and took up cello in the third, playing in school orchestras. "In high school I got into popular music and took up the bass, which was an easy switchover from cello."

After graduating from high school, he went to work for the Draper Music Center near San Francisco, while continuing to

play with local bands. The store sent him to a musician's convention in Los Angeles in 1977, where he met Chapman, who had just begun marketing the Stick.

"He was just sitting there on this huge convention floor in a booth by himself, getting these incredible sounds out of the thing. I was fascinated and talked to Emmett for awhile; then he sent a dealer rep to our store. I talked the owner into buying one for me at cost, and taught myself to play."

"When I bought it, no one played the Stick, no one taught it, there were no recordings — just an instructional book called 'Free Hands' Emmett had written. So I taught myself for a year, then had a three-hour lesson with Emmett. It took me another year just to catch up with the theory from that lesson. The man is a genius, and I think this instrument is going to revolutionize the musical world someday in much the same way as the guitar once did."

Dorr calls Chapman a "gadgets" who is always experimenting. The first version of the Stick was a guitar with a Mercedes Benz stick-shift attached. The instruments now have 10 strings — five for bass and five for melody — with a body of Brazilian ironwood. They're built by hand in Chapman's workshop in Los Angeles.

"You play this with the same right and left hand rolls as a piano," said Dorr. "But you can't strum. It's not-as-scale-oriented as a bass, so it tends to clash with a normal bass. But the melody side is an incredible lead instrument all by itself. You can do a lot of counterpoint and inversions that are impossible on a guitar."

The material Dorr plays at the Incredible ranges from samba to old showpieces, depending on the audience. He recently had an engagement at the jazz club Danbi's in Albuquerque playing with drums and saxophones.

"What I'd like to get into in the near future would be a melodic sort of jazz fusion," he said. "If I could work out something of the sort in Ruidoso, I'd love to stay here for the fall."

Dorr is no stranger here. In 1980, he played often at the Canopy with a rock band called Ashley Pond. The nightclub still had a single cut by the group on its jukebox before closing recently. He's also played in country swing bands in Albuquerque.

Dorr's plans for the future include recording an album on the West Coast, which he said would be financed by an anonymous Ruidoso resident. In the meantime, he'll be expanding his horizons — and maybe yours — each Thursday through Sunday night in the lounge of the Incredible.

## *Bold Love's win ends dry spell for owners*

Bold Love's victory in the \$145,880 World's Championship Classic at Ruidoso Downs a week ago ended a dry spell for the mare's owners, Thelma and Clary Spencer of Edmond, Oklahoma.

Since the Spencers are deep into quarter horse breeding and racing — they own and operate the 200 acre Spencer Valley Ranch 14 miles north of Oklahoma City — it's good business to win a major stake now and then.

"Bold Love's win in the Classic sure gave my husband's spirits a boost," Thelma said. "It's been a while since we've had a horse who's done this well."

No newcomers to racing, the Spencers have been neck deep in the business since 1988. That was the year Clary decided to give up his prospering home building business in Oklahoma City and go into breeding and racing fulltime. "At that point, we already had the ranch, and the horses," Thelma said. So it wasn't exactly a wild stab in the dark.

The Spencer layout is home to about 140 quarter horses — including about 60 mares. At a given time, three trainers are handling the Spencer horses at various locations. Currently, David Fry runs a 10 head string at Ruidoso; another eight are in the Texas bush track circuit, and another group is in Oklahoma.

Thelma — who's listed as the sole owner of Bold Love — was pleased beyond words when Bold Love nipped Lucka Gay Chic by a head in last week's Classic and earned \$72,940. More than the money, perhaps, is the fact the Classic is a big-league event, one with plenty of national implication. It also goes a long way toward earning an invitation to the rich Champion of Champions on the West Coast this winter.

So if you're an owner intent on re-establishing your name in the quarter horse business, the Classic is a good way to go about it.

Still, Thelma notes the Classic isn't the biggest race the Spencer outfit has won. She said: "About 10 years ago, we had a half interest in Top Ladybud, and she made over \$100,000. Then we owned Top Bug, another mare — she made about \$123,000. In 1968, she was named the nation's champion mare. She ran second in the Oklahoma Futurity, and third to Three Oh's in the All-American Futurity. I suppose Top Bug was the best we've ever had. But you can't tell about Bold Love. She's not through running yet."

A finicky sort, Bold Love seems to be a time bomb — only no one knows when the fuse is likely to go off. Early in her career, she set track records at Sallisaw and Midway Downs, both in Oklahoma. "She's such a tiny thing, so it was kind of amusing to watch her win against all those big horses," Thelma said.

But Bold Love made a really big splash when she moved to Sunland Park in the spring of 1980. On March 28 of that year, she flashed over 400 yards in 19.17 seconds.

establishing the world record. That was in a trial heat for the \$65,375 West Texas Derby. In the finale, Bold Love raced as a heavy favorite, but gave in to the 4-1 shot, Zip Zorro. The filly then went into a turn down.

Thelma said: "She was just tired of being in training. She'd been in training since the end of her yearling year. She needed a long rest, and she needed to put on weight. During the past year, she's grown so much, and I think that helped her a lot."

Bold Love came around in grand style at the current Ruidoso meeting. First, she won a 400 yard allowance spin by nearly two lengths. She followed with a three and one half length win in the \$10,700 Jet Deck Stakes at 440 yards. Next, the mare won her Classic trial (in the third-best time) by one and one half lengths. The clincher came last week when she won the Classic finale by a head as a three to one shot.

Before the Classic trials, word began spreading. "We got some calls from people interested in buying her. But we're undecided what the price would be. We'll either sell her if we get the price we want, or keep her for a broodmare. I imagine we'll go ahead and run her next year."

The story of Bold Love began several years ago when the Spencers bought a thoroughbred mare in Kentucky. The mare was already in foal to Bold and Brave, and the result was the colt, Bold Moon. The Spencers raced Bold Moon in New Mexico. He set a track record at La Mesa Park (at a sprint distance) and earned about \$25,000 in three seasons. He also won at four furlongs at Ruidoso in 1974.

The Spencers also happened to have Lovely Moon, a mare they'd raised. "She was a Triple A runner, and she raced around Stroud and Sallisaw," Thelma said. Lovely Moon was bred to Bold in the result was Bold Love. Just before Bold Love set that world record at Sunland Park, the filly's daddy (Bold Moon) was sold by the Spencers. The timing wasn't the best since Bold Moon's value was cranked up a few notches when his daughter set that world record.

As a yearling, Bold Love was a nervous sort, with a mind of her own, and didn't take kindly to the training routine. "She was the hardest yearling our trainer," David Fry, ever broke," Thelma said. "As a two-year-old, she was about six months behind schedule, and missed all those big juvenile races. It was kind of discouraging. She was nervous, and stubborn, and just wouldn't settle down."

Fry finally solved the problem when he found a goat to bunk with Bold Love. "The two kind of took up with each other right from the start," he said. "The goat stays with Bold Love all the time, and the mare's nerves are kept nice and calm."

The mare's 1981 campaign at Ruidoso is just about over. There's only one other possible engagement — the Three Bars Handicap on August 15.

## Winkum tops Friday's elimination trials for All-American Futurity

Winkum, whose undefeated streak was snapped in the Rainbow Futurity, heads the field for the Friday's second day of 22 elimination races for the All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The first three finishers from each trial race will join the 66 first, second and third-place finishers from Thursday's 22 races in the time trials on August 27. In the time trials, the 10 fastest runners will advance to the finals of the \$1,530,000 All-American on Labor Day.

The winner of that 440 yard heat will earn \$228,000, the richest purse offered in New Mexico racing. It is the third leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses.

Winkum opened his career with four consecutive triumphs and qualified for the \$688,340 Rainbow Futurity on July 26, at 400 yards.

But the Ichibon colt ran second, one and one-half lengths behind the spectacular Special Effort in that second jewel of the Triple Crown. Still, he earned \$100,362 for that superb performance.

Owned and trained by Jack Brooks of Edmond, Oklahoma, Winkum debuted with a length win in a Kansas Futurity trial heat, then won the Kansas Futurity Consolation on May 30 with another length victory.

He won his Rainbow Futurity trial heat by a nose before running second in the Rainbow. Overall, he's won four races

with one second for an impressive earnings' line of \$126,754.

Winkum, who will face eight foes in Friday's fourth race, was supplemented to the All-American for \$15,000. A total of 23 horses who will run in the elimination trials were also supplemented for \$15,000.

Another prominent entrant is Rebel, who has won her five career outings. Owned by Ann Freeman and Alice G. Fisher of El Paso, Texas, the Dash For Cash filly scored her most important triumph in her latest start. She tallied a half length victory in the \$97,000 Rainbow Futurity Consolation on July 25.

That \$19,931 paycheck boosted her earnings to \$24,551. She's trained by O. S. Carlton III.

Two other horses who competed in the Rainbow Futurity are set to run on Friday. Go For Bugs, who ran eighth in the Rainbow, will compete in the first race while Seventy One South, who was fifth in the Rainbow, will be in the third race.

Saturday's highlight will be the Three Bars Handicap at 400 yards. It's for three-year-old and older quarter horses seeking a purse of \$12,500-added.

Sunday's featured attraction will be the Ruidoso Speed Handicap at four furlongs. It's designed for three-year-olds and older thoroughbreds eyeing a purse of \$15,000-added.

Post time for Saturday's and Sunday's 12-race program will be 1 p.m.

## Trainer enjoys 1-2-3 in Rio Grande Futurity

If Billy Hitt could vote for his favorite race at Ruidoso Downs, there's little doubt he'd choose the Rio Grande Futurity.

"I like it real well," he said after he saddled the first three finishers in Sunday's \$40,120 Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. "I heard they did away with it. I hope it's not true. It looks like it's one race I can win. That's why I like it."

The popular trainer had the winner (Draconic's Lady) and the runnerup (Draconic Spoke) in last year's Rio Grande. This year, he had the winner (Spanish Spade), the runnerup (Draconic Runner) and the show horse (Shesgottheadandy).

"I liked the mare (Shesgottheadandy). I thought she was the class here," Hitt said. "She came up a little short. The colt (Draconic Runner) figured to run a big race. They all did."

"I was hoping we'd be one, two, three turning up the backside and that's the way it was," he said. "It's been a good day. I've

got some nice colts and they've run well for me."

In scoring a one and three-fourths length victory, Spanish Spade gave Jockey Wayne Buehrer his biggest win in a thoroughbred race. Buehrer was aboard Draconic Spoke last year so it was a step ahead.

"When I asked him to move at the five-sixteenths pole," Buehrer said, "he won handily. He responded when I asked him and went on pretty much on his own."

"I helped Mr. Hitt during the winter, but when I broke my leg in El Paso (at the Sunland Park meeting), I lost a lot of mounts. I'm very lucky to get to ride one of them back."

Buehrer also thanked owner Virgil Callaway of Hobbs. "Mr. Callaway puts a lot of confidence in Larry and Billy Byers and myself," he said. "That helps an awful lot."

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
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
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# Garden Club's rules for 1981 Flower Show

## GENERAL RULES

1. Any amateur gardener may enter this show.
2. Entries will be received from 7 a.m. to 10:00 a.m., on the day of the show. Entries received after 10 will be placed on exhibition and not judged.
3. Judging will begin at 11 the morning of the show.
4. The public will not be allowed in the show during judging. Only required personnel may be present.
5. Show will be open to the public from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m., on opening day and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., on following day.
6. Exhibits may not be removed before 4:30 p.m., on date show ends and must be removed no later than 7 p.m.
7. The Flower Show Committee will exercise all care, but cannot be responsible for loss, breakage or unclaimed containers or accessories.

## RULES GOVERNING AWARDS

1. Awards will be given only for quality. The Standard System of Awarding will be used.
2. Only one first (blue), one second (red and one third (yellow) to be awarded in each class or subclass. Honorable Mention (white) may be given to other meritorious exhibits scoring 75 or above. First place exhibit must score 90 or above. Second place exhibits must score 85 or above. Third place exhibits must score 80 or above.

## TOP AWARDS FOR HORTICULTURE DIVISION

1. Exhibit must be a named Blue Ribbon winner scoring 95 or over.
2. Any award may be withheld if no exhibit meets specific requirements.
3. One Award of Horticultural Excellence (rosette of green, orange and blue ribbons) may be awarded to the exhibit judged as finest in the entire Horticulture Division.
4. The Award of Merit (rosette of orange ribbon) may be awarded to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over in each of a designated number of sections.
5. One Arboreal Award (rosette of two shades of green ribbon) may be awarded to a named exhibit in a section of named specimens or collections of named specimens, composed of tree or shrub branches.

## TOP AWARDS FOR DESIGN DIVISION

1. A blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or over, but not necessarily the highest scoring blue ribbon winner.
2. The judges may withhold any award if no exhibit meets the requirements.
3. Tricolor Award: (Rosette of blue, red and yellow ribbons) may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner in a specified section or group of classes. In the exhibit, all plant material must be fresh. One award may be given in Arrangement Design Section and one may be given in Table Design Section.
4. Award of Distinction: (Rosette of brown ribbon with gold lettering) may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner in a specified section or group of classes. All plant material must be dried.
5. Creativity award: (Rosette of purple ribbons) may be awarded to a blue ribbon winner in a specified section or group of classes. The exhibit is to be designer's choice of fresh and/or dried plants material with or without other components.

## ADDITIONAL AWARDS

1. Educational Award: (Rosette of brown and white ribbons) may be offered to a class of exhibits designed to instruct the public. A minimum of two exhibits required. The winning exhibit must score 85 or above. This award not open to commercial entries.
2. Junior Achievement Awards: (Combination of red, white and blue ribbons) may be awarded to outstanding design, educational and/or horticultural exhibits in the above categories.
3. Sweepstakes Awards: (Rosette of green and white ribbon) is awarded to the exhibitor winning the largest number of blue ribbons in a Division by the Flower Show Committee. Two awards may be given, one in Horticulture and one in Design Division.

## DIVISION I - HORTICULTURE "IN A SUMMER GARDEN"

- Rules:
1. All entries in Horticulture classes must be grown by the exhibitor and must be correctly named as to variety, whenever possible. Top awards will be given to named entries only. Entries must be grown in this area to be eligible for awards. Other entries may be entered for exhibit only.
  2. Potted plants shall have been in the hands of the exhibitor at least three months. This rule also applies to hanging baskets.
  3. The exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but is limited to one specimen of each variety or color in each class or sub-division of a class.
  4. Specimens must be well-groomed and free of dirt, water spots, diseases, insects and spray residue; no dressings such as polish, oils, etc., allowed on foliage of any exhibit.
  5. Containers will be provided for the Horticulture specimens.

- Section A — "Moonlight and Roses" Roses: (Eligible for Award of Merit) (Sub-divided as to class, variety and color.)
- Class No.:
1. Hybrid Tea — grown disbudded; a. one bloom, b. three blooms, same variety; c. three blooms, different varieties.
  2. Floribundas — a. one bloom, b. one spray.
  3. Any rose not listed above.

- Section B — "Chromatic Fantasy" Dahlias: (Eligible for Award of Merit) (Sub-divided as to class, variety and color.)
- Class No.:
1. Formal decorative — one bloom; white, yellow, orange, red, lavender, purple, pink, blended or bi-color.
  2. Informal-decorative — one bloom; white, yellow, orange, red, lavender, purple, pink, blended or bi-color.

## DIVISION II - DESIGN "VARIATION ON A THEME"

- Rules:
1. Plant material for Design Divisions need not be grown by exhibitor, but design must be the work of the exhibitor, unassisted. Florist material is permitted.

5. All containers, bases and accessories must be marked with the name and address of exhibitor.
6. Contrived flowers or plant forms of recognizable plant material, fresh and/or dried, are permitted if allowed in schedule.
7. Backgrounds, bases and accessories are permitted in all classes of design division; however, emphasis to be on plant material.
8. Designs (with or without background provided by exhibitor) may not exceed thirty-six inches high and twenty-four inches wide.
9. A card of explanation of the exhibitor's interpretation may accompany designs and will aid the judges and inform the public.
10. An exhibitor may enter as many classes or subdivisions in each class as desired, but is allowed only one entry in each class or subdivision thereof.
11. Closing date for entries is August 24, 1981.
12. There must be at least four entries in each of three designated classes to qualify for the top awards. If there are not the required number of entries in designated classes to award the top awards, then a Best of Class Award (scoring 95 or above) may be given.
13. Novices (new exhibitors) see Handbook, Page 10. Section E winners are not eligible for top National awards but are encouraged to display their design talent without handicap of being competitive with more experienced designers.
14. Requirements for Design classes are listed under "Awards Rules" of this schedule. Please Read Carefully and conform to the specifics of the class.
