

My Going Jesse wins 'cap

My Going Jesse, an 18-1 outsider, overcame another longshot, Pierre The True, before surging ahead to a three length win in Sunday's Speed Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The powerburst covered four furlongs and packed a gross purse of \$18,500. My Going Jesse collected \$9,900 in the finest performance of his career.

Vickie Smallwood, one of Ruidoso's few lady jockeys, added a lot more gloss to her high flying career with savvy handling of the Speed Handicap winner. It was also Vickie's second stakes victory of the season. Previously, she broke the ice with a three and three-fourths length win in the \$69,624 Norgor Futurity, also at four furlongs. She piloted Pride Of Loom in that one.

Her victory in the Norgor Futurity marked the first conquest of a stakes race by a lady jockey in Ruidoso history.

My Going Jesse, like Pride Of Loom, is owned by Hugh C. Preston Jr., of Burkhardt, Texas. Bob Arnett trains for the Preston outfit.

The wagering public took a shine to London Ltd., an invader from the Midwest, in the Speed Handicap. The four-year-old colt went off as an odds-on favorite, and was expected to grab an early lead from the advantageous rail position.

But London Ltd. was outgunned by My Going Jesse and Pierre The True right from the first jump. The people's choice quickly slumped into fourth place and never managed to get his head above water.

Pierre The True, an eight-year-old gelding who's been a standout in 870 yard competition over the years, got a tremendous start and assumed the lead down the backstretch. My Going Jesse, who came out of the No. 10 slot, quickly took up the chase. It was a two horse race all the way.

As they turned for home, Pierre The True flashed all the form of his younger years and appeared determined to fight off My Going Jesse. But the old timer suddenly lost much of his pep, and was forced to toss in the towel when he neared the wire. My Going Jesse went soaring into the lead, winning with plenty in reserve.

The triumph, My Going Jesse's third of the meeting was worth mutual returned of \$37.20, \$11.80 and \$7.20. Pierre The True earned a handsome \$3,630 for second and dish out \$27.60 and \$9.40 as a 28-1 shot. He finished one and three fourths lengths ahead of Special Hank, a 5-1 pick. Pierre The True was ridden by Gilbert Villacast. Salustio Burgos was aboard Special Hank (\$4.80).

Double B. Express, an one-time handicap ace at Ruidoso, excelled with a stirring head victory in the co-feature at a mile. He earned \$3,780 and paid \$5.20 to win. Don Howard was up.

NATIVE GAMBLER punched out an easy length win in Saturday's Three Bars Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and raised his career earnings up to \$629,995.

But the Three Bars income still left Native Gambler in fifth place among quarter horse racing's all time money makers. The No. 4 slot is held at Native Gambler's stablemate, Higheasterjet. The latter's all time winnings stand at \$658,282.

Ruidoso patrons established Native Gambler as an odds-on favorite in the 400 yard Three Bars handicap, and the gelding came through as expected. He broke in second place, a little behind the 7-2 second favorite, Oh Shoney.

At the halfway point, Native Gambler was well in control and gaining with every stride. There was little doubt as to the outcome. The gelding continued to pour it on and was under no threat in the final 100 yards.

The Three Bars carried a gross purse of \$14,215 and directed \$5,529 into Native Gambler's account. The gelding is owned by Gary J. Benton of Lubbock, Texas. W. R. Hunt is the pilot.

Native Gambler's victory was made that more impressive by the fact he had to haul the high weight of 124 pounds. Oh Shoney, who ended up second under Jacky Martin, toled 121. Third went to Miss Breezle Dawn, a 6-1 shot carrying Steve Harris in a low 113 pound assignment.

The difference between second and third place was only a nose.

The track was off from persistent rains, and that slowed Native Gambler's clocking down to 20.25 seconds. Earlier in the season, Native Gambler won the \$132,510 Rainbow Silver Cup by a nose. Last summer, he made his mark with a brilliant half length win in the \$1,431,850 All-American Derby.

Native Gambler's conquest of the Three Bars Handicap was good for modest mutual payoffs of \$3.40, \$3 and \$2.40. The gelding's 1981 record now stands at 3-0-1 from four starts.

Oh Shoney earned \$3,127 for his runnerup effort and returned \$3.80 and \$2.60. Miss Breezle Dawn pocketed \$1,421 and refunded \$3 to show.

JOHNNY VITORO made an impressive Ruidoso Downs debut in Friday's program.

The colt, who's been mopping up in stakes circles in Louisiana Downs, flashed to a length win in the seventh race and notched his seventh straight victory.

He also cleared the first qualifying hurdle leading to the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity on Labor Day.

Friday's agenda consisted of 22 trial races, each at 440 yards. The top three finishers — 66 in all — will be joined by the 66 survivors from Thursday in the final qualifying showdown on Thursday, August 27.

Johnny Vittoro, owned by Ralph Brazwell and Jimmy Wimberley of Vinton, Louisiana, went into Friday's card with a near spotless record of six wins from seven starts. His money line stood at \$131,173. The colt broke smartly from the No. 4 post and led all the way, clocking the course in 22.16 seconds. A tailwind was blowing. The track was off from persistent rains all week.

Fans who backed Johnny Vittoro in his Ruidoso bow got slim returns of \$2.80, \$2.40, \$2.20. Alvin Brossette rides the colt. Another big performance was turned in by Winkum, who blasted out a two and one-half length win in the eighth race and was timed in an excellent 22.10 seconds. Winkum is owned and trained by Jack Brooks of Edmond, Oklahoma.

Earlier in the meeting, Winkum earned over \$106,000 with a closing second to Special Effort in the \$669,370 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso. That was the only defeat in his career. Friday's victory was the colt's fifth. His earnings are now approaching \$130,000. Jacky Martin is the rider.

Winkum raced as heavy favorite and handed out a low \$2.80 to win.

A handful of upsets spotted Friday's program. The tendency began when Override (\$28.20) won the first race. Other upsets: Classy Native (\$32.50) in the second; Bugga Brook (\$52.20) in the fourth; Cute Investment (\$69.40) in the 10th.

SPECIAL EFFORT, the colt who's threatening to become the first Triple

Crown winner in quarter horse history, took a big step in that direction on Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs. Special Effort, despite being kept under a tight hold by jockey W. R. Hunt, blasted out a five and three-fourths length win in the 10th race.

All together, there were 22 races on Thursday's program, and the top three finishers in each advanced into the final elimination round on August 27.

The All-American Futurity comes up on Labor Day, and offers the winner \$528,000 out of a gross purse of \$1,530,000.

Earlier in the meeting, Special Effort easily knocked off the first two legs of the Triple Crown. He won the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity by one length, then bagged the \$669,370 Rainbow Futurity by one and one-half lengths.

Until Special Effort came along, only one horse has won both the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities. That was Tiny's Gay, who pulled it off in 1974. Tiny's Gay lost the 1974 All-American by a nose.


In winning his Thursday trial spin, Special Effort extended his spotless record to seven straight and lifted his earnings up to \$497,643. On the eve of the Kansas Futurity, the colt was purchased for \$1 million by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. That was the biggest price ever paid for a quarter horse in training.

According to word now circulating around Ruidoso Downs, plans are being formulated to syndicate the colt for \$15 million.

A lot of big plungers showed up to watch Special Effort on Thursday, and punched the wagering on the race up to \$83,632. Of this, \$55,166 was bet to show, and \$50,450 was bet to show on Special Effort alone.

The one sided wagering produced a minus show pool of \$11,744, a minus place pool of \$287, and a minus win pool of \$355. The mutual returns on Special Effort was \$2.20 across the board.

Dashing, the filly who recently won the \$1,075,000 Skool Dash For Cash Futurity on the West Coast, was another qualifier on Thursday's program. But the filly was nipped by a nose by The Heat Is On in the 14th race.

School gets outlay funds for building

The Ruidoso Public Schools have received \$1,259,851 in Capital Outlay Council funds from the Department of Finance and Administration for Phase I construction of new high school classrooms.

Superintendent of Schools Pat Vallant said Friday that this is the first money allocated to the school, resulting from the passage of the \$2,250,000 bond issue May 12.

Vallant also said the school district will be receiving \$181,000, for school improvements, as the first installment of the \$315,000 to be generated over three years by the two mill levy approved in the February 3 school election.

The \$2.25 million bond issue is being advertised for sale and scheduled to be sold August 24.

Plans for implementing construction of Phase I building and improvements are being formulated.

ICU dedication set Thursday

The new Intensive Care Unit (ICU) at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital will be officially opened with a ribbon cutting ceremony at 11:30 a.m., Thursday, August 20.

The hospital will also be holding an "open house" from 10:30-3 the same day. Individuals who made donations to the ICU have been given special invitations, and members of the general public are also invited to attend.

Performing the honors at the ribbon cutting will be Pinky Jones, chairman of the hospital's board of trustees; Dr. Don Sims, chairman of the advisory board, who was responsible for directing the hospital's fund drive; Sonny Edwards, chairman of the Board of Directors at Sunland — Ruidoso Downs, and Dr. Roger Beechie, chief of the hospital's medical staff.

After the ribbon cutting, members of the Pilot Club of Ruidoso will present the hospital with a check covering the cost of a \$1,150 bed for the ICU.

"We'd like for people to come in and take a look at the improvements we've made, have some cookies and coffee or punch with us," said Ken Moore, hospital administrator. "We'll be happy to answer any questions. The reason the hours are short is that we need to have the ICU available for use."

The fund drive for the ICU raised \$83,000 over the last two years, according to Moore, with total costs of the unit exceeding \$140,000.

The monitoring equipment of the ICU has been in operation for a year and a half,

but its housing is only now being completed.

"With the ICU and Doctors Whitman and Klerkegaard, there will be very few things that we won't be able to handle now as far as cardiac patients go," said Moore.

The hospital also has a number of other improvements scheduled for the immediate future, Moore said. A Ruidoso family has donated a patient waiting room, which is near completion.

The next equipment to be installed will be a Dupont ACA automated blood chemistry analyzer, which costs \$42,000. Moore said that the analyzer would enable the hospital to make diagnostic tests of the blood of cardiac patients in about 30 minutes, instead of a full day as presently required.

Chili cook-off contestants vying to aid cancer drive

An old-time Texas tradition makes its first public appearance in Ruidoso Tuesday night when Jerry Dale's hosts a chili cook-off as part of the cancer fund drive.

Texans have made exaggeration a way of life, and when it comes to making chili, no quarter is given. In their famous chili cook-offs, Lone Star State cooks seem to vie with each other to concoct the most fiery dish. Perhaps, some have suggested, it's because they know that by the contest's end, the judges will only be able to differentiate between different degrees of heat, not taste.

But promoters of the Cancer crusade hope that at this chili cook-off, which starts at 6, people will be reaching for their pocketbooks as much as the water pitcher.

The Lincoln County branch of the American Cancer Society is attempting to raise \$4,000 to donate to cancer research in New Mexico.

The drive got underway in July with The Longest Day of Golf, which raised about \$800. Proceeds from the first two Tuesday night benefits in August 15 Jerry Dale's — a dance contest and an auction — totalled \$1,400. That means the Cancer Society must bring in an average of \$900 for each of the two remaining benefits to reach their goal.

Admission to the chili cook-off is \$5, which includes both the chili and a night of dancing to the Clay Mac Band. Contestants also pay \$5. Their chili must be cooked before-hand, and cannot contain any beans.

But what exactly goes into each entry is being kept under close wraps as the contest approaches.

"I use an old Lincoln County recipe that

"I use an old Lincoln County recipe that my grandmother taught to my mom, and my mom taught to me," Frank Potter said to the Ruidoso News as he and a group of contestants posed for a photograph. "But I will tell you that I'm going down to Las Cruces this weekend for my chilis."

"I wouldn't believe a word he says," said Potter's archrival Lamar Osbourn. "He cheats. The don't call him Potato

Potter for nothing."

"He's just jealous because I won the Den-O contest this year," Potter retaliated. Named after Denny Loverin and Osbourn, the Den-O contest is a chili-cook off held each January 1 by a group of Ruidoso friends during the Super Bowl.

But Osbourne confided that Potter's dominance could be nearing an end.








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
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Garden Club meeting on flower show plans

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

Offense sparkles

Stierwalt optimistic after first week

As the Ruidoso High School football team enters its second week of practice head coach Darrel Stierwalt is very optimistic about the teams' chances this season.

"Considering the wet weather we've been having I think our progress has been great," said Stierwalt. "We're still missing a few players but we expect them

next week."

Ruidoso now has 40 players practicing, up from about 30 on Tuesday, the first day of practice. Stierwalt hopes the number will rise to around 50 so he can keep 30 on the varsity and put the rest on the Junior varsity.

"Some of our players are still on vacation, the coach said. "And some

players live in Mescalero and have trouble getting rides to practice."

Among the players missing is 5-11, 250-pound tackle Ronald Bell, the biggest player on last year's team. Bell is expected to fortify the Warriors' offensive and defensive lines when he arrives.

Among the other players Stierwalt plans on helping build the lines are tackle Ken Brady and guard Dave Swalander. Both had extensive playing time last season. Stierwalt has hopes that three transfers will join the squad, one a highly regarded wrestler from California.

But the brightest part of the Ruidoso grid picture is the offensive backfield. And quarterback is perhaps the Warriors' strongest position.

Junior Billy Woodul and senior Scott Neal have both looked good throwing the ball in practice. Woodul is expected to

start at quarterback while the shorter, speedy Neal should go at halfback.

Whoever's at quarterback for the Warriors will have a fine group of receivers to throw to. Darin Smith has looked good at tight end while Don Nunley, Grady Williamson and Pete Garcia go at wide receiver.

Passing will be a critical part of the Ruidoso game plan. The Warriors didn't pass very much last year and teams grew to expect a running game from Ruidoso. Also, playing in the AAA division some of the teams the Warriors will play may have a depth and size advantage over Ruidoso. Thus, speed, quickness and passing ability are an important key to Ruidoso's overall success.

The players are currently going through a lot of conditioning and agility drills such as running and blocking tackle dummies.

After taking a look at the recent major league baseball strike it may turn out to be a blessing in disguise for the fans.

Because of the nearly two months lost to the strike the leagues decided to divide the season in half and start the "penant" races all over again. Thus the first half champions of each division will play the second-half winners after the season ends to determine the division champ. If the same team wins each half of the season it will play the team with the next best overall record.

What this means is that a lot of teams received new lives when the new rule was made. Teams like the Chicago Cubs or the San Francisco Giants can start all over again in mid-August. Normally these teams would be almost out of the races by now.

Thus the fans will be able to watch four "new" division races when normally many of the teams would be dwelling well below .500.

Of course the teams that are usually doormats will probably end up that way anyway. The Giants, Cubs and the other mediocre clubs just don't have the talent to keep up with the better teams.

However at least these teams should be within striking around Labor Day.

But it might be a good idea for the powers-that-be in baseball to take a serious look at the "two-season" format and determine whether it might increase fan interest in the cities where attendance has lagged the second half of the season.

After all the owners are in the business to make money and with most of the teams contending in the latter stages of the season it's bound to increase attendance.

Several of the minor leagues, including the Pacific Coast League, already have two-part seasons.

In view of renewed interest shown in minor league baseball during the strike it might be a good idea for the major leagues to adapt the two-half season.

The Reagan administration is thinking about eliminating a federal regulation forbidding sex discrimination in sports programs at colleges and high schools receiving federal aid.

If the administration eliminates Title Nine, the regulation that prohibits discrimination, what effect will it have on Ruidoso High School's athletic programs?

"It shouldn't affect our programs at all," said Ruidoso principal Tom Hansen. "We had girls' programs before Title Nine was formed and we'll have girls' programs if it's eliminated. The ruling has kind of gotten out of hand."

"At first it was set up to allow students of both sexes to participate in classes like boys' auto shop and girls' homemaking. But it's gone into other categories like teachers' rights and sports. It's supposed to guarantee against sex discrimination as far as teachers getting jobs but in most places teachers have an equal chance of getting a job opening."

Title Nine says that a school must allow a student to participate in a sport if the school does not have a separate team for his or her sex. For example if a girl wanted to come out for her school's football team she must be given that chance since there aren't separate teams for boys and girls. However, a school can forbid a girl to come out for the boys' basketball team if there is a girls' team at that school.

"We've never had a girl come out for football at Ruidoso but if she did she would be given an equal chance to make the team," Hansen said.

One of the problems that has come with Title Nine is the fact that girls' sports usually aren't big revenue-makers. Thus if a school district has limited funds for athletics and it must divide those funds between boys and girls' sports, much of that money will be going into sports that don't return much money to the school. Some schools have had to cut some sports in order to balance their budget.

While this may be a problem at some schools Hansen said it hasn't caused any problems at Ruidoso.

"I don't see us cutting any sports back here," he said. "Our enrollment is gradually increasing, around five to six percent each year. We haven't had to cut sports and I don't think we will have to."

But the problems surrounding Title Nine still exist. Many high school districts have cut back much or all of their athletic programs.

There are a lot of pros and cons to Title Nine. The problems that were in existence before the ruling existed or that were created by it could well determine the ultimate fate of college and high school sports.

Master bowlers here

Ruidoso's Holiday Bowl will be the site Friday and Saturday of the West Texas-New Mexico Masters Bowling Association Tournament.

Jack Kannady of Ruidoso, who has competed in several professional bowling tournaments this year, is entered in the competition.

The tournament, which sponsors expect will attract 75 to 80 bowlers, is an adult competition. Entrants must be at least 18 years old, graduated from high school or have written parental consent.

Handicap will be 68 2/3 percent of 200 for men and 75 percent for women, based on the individual bowler's highest 1980-81 average. Bowlers must have at least a 170

average to compete. There will be a maximum of five amateurs and one Master bowler for each pair of lanes. Amateurs will bowl all three games on the same pair of lanes assigned to them. The Masters will move a pair of lanes to the right after each game so that each amateur will have three Masters partners for each game.

White Mountain begins practice

White Mountain Middle School begins football practice Monday, August 24.

According to coach Terry Wharton 35 to 40 boys are expected to come out for the team. Only eighth graders are eligible to play.

"We'll have a meeting Friday, August 21 at our gym for the kids," Wharton said. "If they haven't signed up yet they can come to the meeting and do so. We'll have information for the kids regarding equipment. Parents are invited but not required to attend."

Hunter Safety class starts

A Hunter Safety Course will begin Tuesday at 6:30 p.m., in the Driver Education room of the Ruidoso High School.

Classes will be August 18, 19 and 20; and August 23-24-27, from 6:30-9 p.m. Registration begins at 6:30 Tuesday evening.

The class is for all persons under 18, who intend to hunt this fall or firing guns under any conditions.

In order to purchase a New Mexico hunting license all persons under 18 years of age must have a certificate showing successful completion of a Hunter Safety Course.

The course, however, Gamie and Fish Officer Randy Isler said, "is not limited to those under 18, anyone can take it. In fact, in the case of Colorado, persons older than 18 must have a Hunter Safety Course certificate to purchase a non-resident license."

Parents, Isler said, "are not only welcome to attend these classes with their children, but encourage 'em to."

SANTA FE — What would you like to purchase most in the world? Whatever it is, could you afford to pay for it at the rate of \$4 per day? That cost is too high?

Well, friend, that is what you are going to spend on the expensive military toys the men at the top of the Pentagon will be buying over the next three years.

Not only will you personally be anteing up that four bucks in taxes each day, but so will every other member of your family — man, woman and child.

All those overgrown Boy Scouts in the military uniforms want is a mere (gulp!) \$1.6 trillion for fiscal years 1983 through 1987.

That, if you're not too fast with the family calculator, figures out to \$876 million these guys plan to spend each and every day, Saturdays and Sundays included, for the next five years.

It's too much money, and they must be told so.

Even many of those who voted enthusiastically for the Reagan budget know that is so. (E. g., Pete V. Domenici, senior Senator from New Mexico.)

Do you know how much growth in military spending that is?

Well, if you took where the budget for defense is this year as zero, the total at the end of 1984 would have gone up \$97 billion.



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Those little dudes are hard to come by. The military, of course, don't understand that.

As Domenici said at a press conference in Santa Fe earlier this week, their problem is that, when moving any piece of equipment forward in power or potential, they want to jump to the ultimate cutting edge of the next level.

"Instead of being satisfied to make progress by normal-sized increments," the Senator says, "military people always seem to want to move toward the ultimate — now, today, not tomorrow."

And Ronald Reagan seems intent on giving them their head.

And what do we simple citizens get to say about it?

We get to pony up the bucks — four of them each day from each member of the family, for at least the next half decade.

That's too wild for some of us to stomach easily.

That Domenici isn't forgetting New Mexico while he is a Big Man in Washington was made clear when he went into the heart of Rio Arriba county, home of the patron system in local politics, to denounce patronism.

In a tough speech, he laid it on the line for people there, telling them the North stood no chance of becoming an industrial power in even the smallest way as long as it is run by those who use food stamps and welfare and other government programs to keep the people under control.

Many of his listeners looked a little nervous as he spoke.

Patrons, of course, love the poor.

As long as they can keep them poor, patrons retain their power.

Now let's hear some other politicians speaking up on this same topic.

BETTER SLINGSHOT

Several provisions in a couple of bills newly before Congress ought to make the beleaguered taxpayer's heart do handsprings and nippups. The thrust of this proposed legislation is to somewhat lessen the David-and-Goliath aspects of any contest between a citizen and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

One major problem the taxpayer faces in contesting an IRS assessment he considers unjust is that attorney fees and court costs may total more than the amount of the claim. That discourages litigation. To cure this, one of two bills introduced by Rep. Bill McCollum of Florida would require IRS reimbursement of such costs if the citizen wins the claim in tax court.

That seems only fair, as does another provision which would require the IRS to prove error or wrong-doing in a dispute over a tax return. At present it is the taxpayer who bears the burden of proof.

The two bills contain numerous other provisions, some more worthy of endorsement than others. One we find especially appealing is a restraint whereby the IRS would be barred from establishing collection quotas or offering agents incentives to collect and so much additional tax from persons they audit. On the whole, this is legislation that would do much to give the taxpayer a better break in dealing with Uncle Sam's tax collector. —Alamogordo Daily News

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

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Reasons outlined on why fruit trees don't bear

A fruit tree normally begins to bear fruit soon after it is old enough to blossom freely. New Mexico State University Extension researchers have found a tree's ability to bear fruit depends on the tree's health, its environment, its normal fruiting habits, and cultural practices.

Adequate pollination is also essential to fruit yield.

If any one of these conditions is unfavorable, yields can be reduced or the tree will not bear fruit at all. However, Extension horticulturists say the home gardener can usually control most of the

factors contributing to fruit production. Fruit trees bought from nurseries usually have tops from one to two years old. Grafted trees may have root stock a year older than the top, but this doesn't accelerate fruit production.

Trees can be expected to bear fruit from two to six years after planting, depending on the kind of fruit. Peach trees produce fruit two to four years after planting. Apple, apricot and sour cherry trees produce fruit three to five years after planting.

The gardener will need a little more patience for pear and plum trees, which produce fruit four to six years after

planting. Sweet cherry trees grow five to seven years before they produce fruit.

Dwarf fruit trees don't put as much of their early vigor into developing trunk and branches, so they usually yield a year or two earlier than standard sized trees.

It takes a healthy tree to produce good quality fruit. Weak or diseased trees produce poor quality fruit or none at all. The first step in fruit production is to keep fruit trees free of insects and diseases.

Most hardy fruit trees need a certain amount of cold weather to enter dormancy and to promote spring growth. When winters are too mild, spring growth can be delayed or it can be irregular and slow. Abnormally high temperatures in late winter can cause bud break, something that occurs often in New Mexico.

These factors make the blossoming period begin earlier, or extend it longer than normal, and increase the possibility of frost damage. Injured blossoms may appear normal after a severe frost, but if the pistils (center part of the blossom) are killed, the tree will not bear fruit.

The later a fruit tree blossoms in the spring, the better its chances to bear fruit every year. Almonds and Japanese plum trees are among the earliest to blossom every spring, followed by cherries, European plums, apricots, peaches and pears. Apple trees are usually the last to blossom.

In some instances, trees may not bear fruit because the frost-free season is too short. This is the case for most common pecan tree varieties that can be grown only in southern New Mexico.

Pecan varieties now being grown in northern parts of the United States, such as the Major and Perique, are being evaluated by Extension researchers to test

their adaptability to northern areas of New Mexico.

Fruit trees need good cultural practices during the growing season. About 30 to 40 good sized, healthy leaves are needed to produce one top quality apple.

Trees also need full sunlight for best production. Inadequate sunlight delays the start of fruit bearing and may reduce the amount of fruit on the tree. Avoid placing fruit trees where they will be shaded by buildings or other trees.

Trees will grow more vigorously and bear better if there is enough space to develop their root systems. Don't plant trees where roots of other trees and shrubs will compete for moisture and soil nutrients. Cultivate, mulch or use weed killers around trees to reduce competition from grass and weeds.

Young trees should be carefully pruned to develop a strong framework with a central leader and horizontal branches. Excessive vertical growth will delay fruit bearing and will also reduce the quality of fruit produced.

The most critical part of fruit tree production is pollination. Trees may blossom abundantly, but they will not bear fruit without enough pollination.

Some fruit trees have what are called perfect flowers. The anthers, which contain pollen, and the pistils, which develop into fruit, are contained in the same blossom. Trees that bear fruit as a result of pollination from their own anthers are called self fruitful.

Surprisingly, there are many types of fruit trees with so-called perfect flowers that don't produce fruit from their own pollen. These need pollen from another variety, so they are called self unfruitful.

Some trees — the pecan is an example — have male and female flowers on the same tree. Pollination can be a problem in pecan

groves if the male flower pollen is shed before the female flower is receptive.

Extension researchers at New Mexico State University are also working with fruit tree species that don't fit conveniently into either category. Pistachio nuts are the product of male trees that produce pollen, but no fruit, and female trees that produce the fruit.

To grow pistachios successfully, it requires one tree of each gender planted close to each other.

Most apple trees fall into the self unfruitful category. Extension horticulturists recommend at least two varieties be planted near one another. The Golden Delicious is a self fruitful variety, but its pollen will also generate fruit on other apple trees. Jonathan is another common apple pollinator.

In general, a pollinator is needed for all pear varieties, even though Kieffer and Duchesse set good crops without pollinators. Most pear varieties, especially the well-known Bartlett, are susceptible to fire blight disease. Moon Glow and Starking Delicious seem to be the most resistant varieties to this disease.

Most peach varieties are also self fruitful; however, J. H. Hale, Stark Honeydew Hale and Stark Hal-Berta Giant all need another peach variety nearby to assure proper pollination. The Burbank July Elberta is one of the better pollinator varieties.

Nectarines don't need pollinators. Although the lack of fuzz is the main difference between the nectarine and peach, the fruit is usually smaller than a peach and has a distinctive sub-acid flavor.

Most leading apricot varieties are self fruitful, but production will increase when a pollinator is used. Goldrich and Perfection apricot varieties must be pollinated to bear fruit.

Since Japanese plums bloom earlier than European plum varieties, they should not depend on one another for cross pollination. Stanley, the number one European variety, is self fruitful, and Bluefire and Stanley are the most common pollinizers for other European plum varieties.

Redheart is one of the best pollinators for Japanese plums. Santa Rosa, the most widely planted Japanese plum in New Mexico, is self fruitful.

Prunes are not a different species of fruit. Technically they are plums that can be satisfactorily dried whole without fermentation of the pit. Prune-type plums are generally blue or purple.

Most sour cherries, sometimes called pie cherries, are self fruitful with the exception of Stella and Compact Stella varieties. As a rule of thumb among cherry trees, dark colored varieties will pollinate other dark varieties, and light colored varieties are recommended to pollinate other light colored varieties.

Some fruit trees, such as apples, tend to bear heavily one year and sparsely the next. This is called biennial bearing.

The spring-flowering buds of most hardy fruit trees have actually been formed the previous summer. Therefore, an especially heavy crop one year prevents adequate bud formation the following year.

Biennial bearing is difficult to alter or correct; however, more consistent annual fruit production can be induced by thinning out some of the fruit during the year when trees are producing the larger yield. This can be done chemically or by hand.

Thinning should be done no later than May, before flower buds for the next season are generated. Thin to leave only three to five fruit per yard along the tree branches.

Forest Service water pumps will utilize solar power units

Electricity generated by solar-powered systems will soon be used by the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture, to pump water for campers and livestock and to provide electrical power for equipment at fire lookouts.

Southwestern Regional Forester M. J. Hassell said TriSolarCorp of Bedford, Massachusetts, was awarded a \$200,097.24 contract to design, supply and install five photovoltaic power systems, semiconductor devices that convert light directly into electricity, in the Santa Fe, Lincoln and Gila national forests in New Mexico and in the Prescott National Forest in Arizona.

Hassell said the projects will be funded

under the Federal Photovoltaic Utilization Program, a program to encourage the use of photovoltaic solar cells.

A system in the Lincoln National Forest will pump up to 7,500 gallons of water a day from a shallow well to a tank near South Fork Campground.

Another unit will be installed at North Blowing Well in the Santa Fe National Forest to provide livestock with up to 1,500 gallons a day from a 600-foot well.

Systems will also provide electricity for communications equipment, appliances and water pumps at Signal Peak Lookout in the Gila National Forest and at Horseshief and Hyde Mountain lookouts in the Prescott National Forest.

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Vickie Smallwood chose the winner

The popular lady jockey could either ride Ghost Light or My Going Jesse in Sunday's \$16,500 Ruidoso Speed Handicap

at Ruidoso Downs.
"I told Vickie he (My Going Jesse) showed a lot of speed the other day and

that the ten hole (post position) was the best part of the race track," said trainer Bob Arnett. "The outside was an advantage rather than a disadvantage."

Vickie listened to the veteran conditioner. She chose My Going Jesse and steered him to a convincing three length victory over the four furlongs on a track still rated as good despite heavy rains earlier this week. Her other alternative, Ghost Light, ran ninth.

"Bob told me to keep the owner (Hugh C. Preston Jr., of Burkburnett, Texas) happy," said the beaming jockey. "He's a full brother to Pride of Loom to victory in the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity at Ruidoso Downs on July 12. She became the first female rider in Ruidoso Downs' history to win a major race."

"No, you never get used to winning," she said. "But, I knew at five and one half furlongs, he (My Going Jesse) showed a lot of speed and I just had to hit him once. But going four furlongs is a different story."

"My horse broke excellently, today. I thought I was ahead most of the way. When the other horse (Pierre The True) went by me around the turn, I asked him. My Going Jesse went on and did what he had to."

Arnett, meanwhile, was impressed with My Going Jesse's effort against some of the area's fastest sprinters.

"It was an awfully tough race," Arnett said. "It was unbelievable the horses in there. I knew My Going Jesse was a tough horse going six or seven furlongs, but to beat these kind of horses going a half-mile ... He restored a lot of confidence in me when he ran like that at four furlongs."

Some mulches benefit seedlings

The only ones thinking of Christmas this time of year are New Mexico Christmas tree growers. In the heat of summer they transplant tiny Christmas tree seedlings from the nurturing environment of the greenhouse to the reality of field production.

Normally, seedlings transplanted after the middle of August don't have time to establish a root system deep enough to survive drying winter winds and early spring droughts. However, researchers with New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Agricultural Experiment Station, using a variety of mulches, are trying to extend this deadline until early November.

In preliminary experiments at NMSU's Espanola Valley Branch Station near Alcalde, they compared the effects of various mulches on the survival, growth and development of Austrian pine, Scotch pine and white fir. The three species are grown mostly for Christmas trees.

"Mulches covering the soil around plants have been shown to raise soil temperatures and speed plant maturity," said Dr. Frank Matta, horticulturist and branch station superintendent. Mulches also conserve moisture, reduce leaching of soil nutrients and, if organic, can raise surrounding carbon dioxide levels. Carbon dioxide is a critical element in photosynthesis.

Matta cites research in which organic mulch more than doubled early growth of white spruce. Other studies showed that plastic mulch improved growth of slash pine, Douglas fir and shrubs in low-rainfall sites in northern New Mexico.

First results of the branch station study have been a mixture of success and disappointment. "Clear plastic and black plastic mulches increased survival only of white fir," said Matta. First-year survival was 70 percent with black plastic and 52 percent with clear plastic compared with 15 percent for seedlings with no mulch.

"Fir transplants are more sensitive to their micro-climate. The plastics may have helped maintain that climate," he said. Plastic mulch may have decreased white fir's normally high mortality rate because it provided moisture and warmth for better root development.

Plastic mulches did very little in promoting survival of the heartier Austrian and Scotch pine varieties.

Mulches of plastic used with straw were a deadly combination. Survival rate for all three species mulched with the combination fell below the survival of those with no mulch. Straw used alone reduced survival by 20 percent.

Matta speculates on two causes for the decline. "Decomposing straw takes up

nitrogen from the soil and may rob the plant of valuable nutrients. Also, the greenhouse effect that warms the soil in fall may make the soil too hot in spring." Mulches influenced growth and development only by promoting shoot growth of Scotch pine. All mulches except straw promoted shoot growth of Scotch pine.

The straw and plastic combination also proved detrimental to growth. Clear plastic with straw or sawdust reduced growth from terminal and lateral buds on white fir. Black plastic with straw reduced fresh and dry weights of Austrian pine shoots.

Matta said the preliminary findings indicate a need for closer evaluation of the micro-climate. "This will give us a better understanding of growth requirements, especially of the white fir," he said. The planned tests will evaluate air and soil moisture, air and soil temperature, soil nutrients and the surrounding levels of carbon dioxide.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE PARTICIPATION BY THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO IN THE CITY OF ROSWELL, NEW MEXICO MULTIPLE SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL MORTGAGE PROGRAM; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE BY THE CITY OF ROSWELL, NEW MEXICO OF ITS SINGLE FAMILY MORTGAGE REVENUE BONDS (MULTI-CITY SINGLE FAMILY MORTGAGE PURCHASE PROGRAM) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$20,185,000 TO FINANCE THE PURCHASE OF SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL MORTGAGE LOANS; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY BY THE CITY OF ROSWELL OF NOTICES OF ACCEPTANCE OF APPLICATIONS TO SELL MORTGAGE LOANS, MORTGAGE LENDERS' AGREEMENTS, TRUST AGREEMENTS, TRUST INSTRUMENTS, OFFICIAL STATEMENT, CLOSING DOCUMENTS AND SUCH BONDS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; ADOPTING A GUIDE FOR SERVICERS RELATING TO SUCH PROGRAM, RATIFYING CERTAIN ACTIONS HERETOFORE TAKEN INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, THE AUTHORIZATION OF THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, THE MAILING OF INVITATIONS FOR APPLICATIONS TO SELL MORTGAGE LOANS AND THE AUTHORIZATION OF THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A BOND PURCHASE CONTRACT, REPEALING ALL ACTIONS INCONSISTENT WITH THIS ORDINANCE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the governing body, being the Mayor and Village Trustees (the "Governing Body") of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico (the "Village") has received information and data concerning the serious shortage throughout the Village of decent, safe and sanitary residential housing available at prices and rentals within the financial means of persons and families of low or moderate income; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Governing Body on April 10, 1979, the Village has a program to address such shortage and need (the "Program"); and

WHEREAS, the Village is empowered by the terms of the Municipal Mortgage Finance Act to issue residential mortgage revenue bonds to provide funds for low interest mortgage loans for persons of low or moderate income or to enter into an agreement with one or more mortgage lenders to issue such mortgage revenue bonds and to establish the area of operation of the issuer as the combined areas of operation of the participating municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Village has executed a Cooperative Agreement with the Municipalities of Artesia and Roswell pursuant to which the City of Roswell has been designated as the issuer of the bonds for the purpose of financing the purchase or rehabilitation of persons of low or moderate income of single family residences within the combined planning and planning jurisdictions of the participating municipalities (the "Mortgage Loans"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Roswell, New Mexico Single Family Mortgage Revenue Bonds (Multi-City Single Family Mortgage Purchase Program) in the aggregate principal amount of \$20,185,000 (the "Bonds") will be issued and delivered by the City of Roswell to E. F. Hutton & Company Inc., Stern Brothers & Co., Crocker National Bank, Kious and Company, Inc. and Stillwell and Co., as representatives of the several underwriters (the "Representatives") to provide funds for the purchase of the Mortgage Loans, including the funding of certain reserve funds in connection with the retirement of the Bonds, and certain incidental costs incurred in connection with the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the proceeds of the Bonds will be used to purchase Mortgage Loans made to persons or families of low or moderate income; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has declared, and does hereby declare, that this Ordinance deals with an emergency constituting an immediate danger to the public health, safety and welfare of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village Clerk has presented to the Governing Body at this meeting (1) the proposed form of Trust Instrument (the "Trust Instrument"), dated as of September 1, 1981, between the City of Roswell and Albuquerque National Bank, Albuquerque, New Mexico, as Trustee (the "Trustee"); (2) the Cooperative Agreement previously executed by officers of the Village and by officers of the Municipalities of Artesia and Roswell; (3) the form of invitation for Applications to Sell Mortgage Loans (the "Applications") including a Notice of Acceptance of Application to Sell Mortgage Loans (the "Notice of Acceptance") from the mortgage lenders listed in Exhibit A hereto; (4) the proposed form of Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreement (the "Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreement") to be entered into by the City of Roswell and each of the Mortgage Lenders (each of which has previously executed a Mortgage Purchase Agreement); (5) the Bond Purchase Contract (the "Bond Purchase Contract") dated July 22, 1981, previously executed by the officers of the City of Roswell and by the Representatives; (6) the form of Preliminary Official Statement dated August 11, 1981 (the "Preliminary Official Statement"); and the proposed form of Official Statement dated August 11, 1981 (the "Official Statement"); to be used in connection with the offering of the Bonds; and (8) the proposed Guide for Servicers (the "Guide for Servicers").

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY (The Mayor and Village Trustees) OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. All actions (not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance) heretofore taken by the Governing Body and the officers of the Village directed toward the Program and the sale and issuance of Bonds heretofore and the same is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed, including, without limitation, the mailing by the City of Roswell to potential mortgage lenders of the invitations for Applications to Sell Mortgage Loans.

Section 2. It is found that within the Village there exists a shortage of funds available for the purchase of mortgage loans for the making of mortgage loans to persons of low or moderate income which has resulted in a shortage of decent, safe and sanitary housing at prices which such persons can afford; that this shortage constitutes a threat to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Village; deprives the Village of an adequate tax base and causes such persons to occupy overcrowded, congested dwelling accommodations, threatening the health, welfare and safety of the residents of the Village and impairing economic values; it is further found that an adequate supply of decent, safe and sanitary housing is essential to the promotion of increased productivity of the residents of the Village, to retaining existing industry and commercial activities near or within the Village and to attracting new industry and new commercial activities to the Village, thereby relieving conditions of unemployment. It is further found that the shortage of decent, safe and sanitary housing cannot be relieved except through the stimulation of the construction and rehabilitation of housing and the encouragement of individuals and private enterprise to undertake such construction and rehabilitation through the use of public financing. This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the New Mexico Municipal Mortgage Finance Act, and the Program established, in order to alleviate such shortage.

Section 3. For the purpose of defraying the cost of purchase of the Mortgage Loans, there has been authorized and created by the City of Roswell an issue of revenue bonds to be designated "City of Roswell, New Mexico Single Family Mortgage Revenue Bonds (Multi-City Single Family Mortgage Purchase Program)". The establishment of such issue of Bonds, the utilization of Bond proceeds to purchase Mortgage Loans related to property located within the Village and the terms of the

Bonds are hereby approved. The Bonds shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$20,185,000. The coupon Bonds shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple of \$5,000 and shall be dated September 1, 1981, and shall bear interest from such date payable on June 1 and December 1 in each year, commencing June 1, 1982. The fully registered Bonds shall be in the aggregate principal amount of \$20,185,000 and shall bear interest at the aggregate rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum and shall mature on June 1, 2013. The Bonds shall be payable and subject to redemption prior to maturity as provided in the Indenture and shall be substantially in the form heretofore approved.

Pursuant to the Purchase Contract, the Bonds shall be sold to the underwriters thereof at a private sale at a purchase price equal to 97.35% of the principal amount of the Bonds plus accrued interest to the date of payment and delivery.

Section 4. The forms, terms and provisions of the Bonds, the "A" coupons and the "B" coupons, in the form contained in the Indenture, be and they hereby are approved, with only such changes therein as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore. The execution and delivery of the Bonds, by the Mayor and Clerk Treasurer of the City of Roswell, and the execution of the "A" coupons and the "B" coupons by the Mayor of the City of Roswell are hereby approved.

Section 5. The Guide for Servicers is hereby adopted and approved in the form presented at the meeting at which this Ordinance was adopted.

Section 6. The forms, terms and provisions of the Indenture, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance and the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, be and they hereby are approved, with only such changes therein as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore. The execution and delivery of the Indenture, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance and the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, be and they hereby are approved, with only such changes therein as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore. The execution and delivery of the Indenture, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance and the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, be and they hereby are approved, with only such changes therein as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore.

The officers of the Village shall take all action necessary or reasonably required by the parties to the Purchase Contract to give effect to and consummate the transactions contemplated therein and shall take all action necessary in conformity herewith to purchase the Mortgage Loans, including, without limitation, the execution and delivery of the Indenture, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance and the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, or any other instrument impose any pecuniary liability upon the Village or any charge upon its general credit or against its taxing power; the Village having no obligation to pay out of its general funds, or otherwise contribute any part of the costs of the Program.

Section 11. Nothing contained in this Ordinance nor in the Guide for Servicers, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance, the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, the Indenture, the Purchase Contract, nor any other instrument, shall be construed as obligating the Village, except to the extent provided in the Guide for Servicers, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance, the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, the Indenture, the Purchase Contract, or any other instrument, nor incurring a pecuniary liability or a charge upon the general funds of the Village, or its taxing power, nor shall the breach of any agreement contained in this Ordinance, the Guide for Servicers, the Indenture, the Purchase Contract, the Applications, the Notices of Acceptance, the Mortgage Purchase and Servicing Agreements, or any other instrument impose any pecuniary liability upon the Village or any charge upon its general credit or against its taxing power; the Village having no obligation to pay out of its general funds, or otherwise contribute any part of the costs of the Program.

Section 12. The distribution of the Preliminary Official Statement in its entirety as presented at this meeting, with such insertions, omissions and changes as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore in connection with the sale of the Bonds to the public is hereby ratified and approved; the execution and delivery of the Preliminary Official Statement of the Official Statement in substantially the form presented at this meeting with such insertions, omissions and changes as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore is hereby approved; and the distribution of the Official Statement in substantially the form presented at this meeting with such insertions, omissions and changes as are not inconsistent with Section 3 heretofore is hereby approved.

Section 13. The appointment of Albuquerque National Bank, Albuquerque, New Mexico, as Trustee and Paying Agent under the Indenture is hereby approved.

Section 14. After the Bonds are issued, this Ordinance shall be and remain irrevocable until the Bonds and the interest thereon shall have been fully paid, cancelled and discharged.

Section 15. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 16. All bylaws, orders, resolutions and ordinances, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repeal shall not be construed as reviving any bylaw, order, resolution or ordinance or part thereof.

Section 17. By reason of the fact that it is necessary for the Village to proceed with the financing of the Program and to take other actions necessary to consummate the purpose of this Ordinance, an emergency is hereby declared and this Ordinance, immediately upon its final passage and approval, shall be recorded in the ordinance book of the Village for that purpose and shall be authenticated by the signature of the Mayor and by the signature of the Village Clerk and shall be published in a newspaper which maintains an office in, and is of general circulation in the Village, and shall be in full force and effect five days after such publication.






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FIRST FLOOR PLAN







HBO to go round-the- clock

Will a 24-hour schedule mean any change in HBO's programming?

"The movies are still the core program element," Heyworth said. "We are in very good shape in terms of the movie product that will be coming on the screen in 1982. It will be similar to what has been on HBO over the past few months... HBO will be more than it has been, but not radically changed. It's an evolutionary process."

Will HBO move in the direction of commercial television?

Definitely not, he insisted. "We are not going to fall into the trap of imitating commercial TV because we at HBO are sensitive to offering uncut, uninterrupted programming. It's quite a different experience for the consumer than watching commercial television."

What will fill HBO's daytime schedule? Repeats?

No at all, promises Heyworth. "Once upon a time HBO did have afternoon programming. The amount of programming on the service was less, and the subscriber complaint was that there were too many repeats, so we eliminated afternoon pro-

gramming. HBO has changed dramatically since then. We have 50 percent more programming, and round-the-clock scheduling will be an attribute. With the availability of expanded programming there is not a problem with repetition."

Heyworth said some innovations were being considered for daytime TV, but he would not discuss specifics.

The HBO service will begin 24-hour service on weekends starting September 4th. The non-stop weekend programming will run from Friday afternoon sign-on at about 5 p.m. through Monday morning sign-off at about 2 a.m. In keeping with HBO's policy, no R-rated programs will air before 8 p.m.

"Expanding programming hours on weekends with existing product was the logical next step in our move to 24-hour programming seven days a week," Heyworth commented. "The largest daytime audience is available on weekends, and the 24-hour weekends will be an early bonus for subscribers prior to taking the service 24-hours every day beginning in January."

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: Soap opera fans across the nation were stunned when **Tony Geary**, the runaway favorite to cop the Best Actor award, was snubbed at the Emmy show. As the winner was being named, photographers clustered around Geary, who plays lusty Luke Spencer on ABC's "General Hospital," to record his reaction. Then the crowd of 500—many of whom were shouting "We want Luke"—fell into a shocked silence as it was announced that the award was going to **Douglas Watson**, star of NBC's "Another World." As Watson moved to the podium, surprised TV cameramen left their cameras trained on Geary's face. Even as he accepted the award, Watson himself expressed surprise that he had been chosen. "It was a tremendous shock," he said. "I was sure I wasn't going to get it. I thought it was going to be Tony Geary." Ironically, Geary, 33, became the darling of about 10 million "General Hospital" fans when macho Luke raped Laura Baldwin, who is played by **Genie Francis**. Before "General Hospital" he had small roles on two other soaps, "Bright Promise" and "The Young and the Restless." He is regularly swamped with more than 1,000 fan letters a week.

TV BACKSTAGE: Ernest Hemingway's "The Best of Friends" will be telecast as a Liberty Mutual Dramatic Special over a network of 100 stations during the week of August 22. The one-hour drama stars **Peter Graves**, **Carol Lynley** and **Alex Cord**.
