Orthopedic surgeon locates in Ruidoso

The Ruidoso/Hondo Valley Hospital has acquired the services of an orthopedic surgeon, Paul G. Echols, M.D. Dr. Echols, his wife and three children moved to Ruidoso after a three-year stint at the United States Air Force Hospital in Lakenheath, England.

"We're very happy to be back in the Southwest," Dr. Echols said. "We were ready to come back after about six months in England, but it just wasn't possible till now."

Dr. Echols said that he was a long time friend of Ruidoso's Dr. Paul Whitman, who helped make the move here a reality. He and his wife Kathy, who was born in Pikeville, Kentucky, have three children: Sarah, age six; John, age four, and Rebecca, four months.

Sarah will be entering the second grade at Nob Hill Elementary School, and John will be enrolled in the new Ruidoso Christian School.

Dr. Echols was born in Dallas, Texas, and did his undergraduate work at North Texas State University, graduating in

1969. He received his M. D. from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston in 1973, and in 1973 and 1974 did his first residency (in surgery) at Wilford Hall, United States Air Force Medical Center, in San Antonio, Texas.

Dr. Echols was commissioned in the Air Force Medical Corps in 1969 as a Lieutenant. After finishing medical school, he went on active duty as a Captain, and was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel just before moving to Ruidoso. He resigned his commission August 13, 1981.

From 1974-1978, he was Resident in Orthopedic Surgery at the University of New Mexico Affiliated Hospitals. Then in 1978, the Echols moved to England, where they stayed until this summer.

"My main goal right now — and that of Ken (Moore) — is to establish a thorough orthopedic capability here in Ruidoso. We're pretty much starting at ground zero now as far as equipment goes, but we'll be working on that, so that soon the hospital will have all the orthopedic equipment that a town this size needs."

Bull riding contest ends cancer drive

Any person, man or woman, who is willing to try their hand at riding a mechanical bull — for fun and charity — is invited to Jerry Dale's, Wednesday beginning at 9 p.m., to join in the fun associated with the final action in this year's cancer fund drive.

"What we're looking for," said Ken Moore, chairman of the Lincoln County Chapter of the American Cancer Society's current fund drive, "is lots of people to come out and have a good time."

"If anyone wants to ride the bull to see how high they can put the numbers, fine. Any and all riders welcome. If they just want to watch the riding — a fine."

"We want to make this a fun night, for

everyone — and we especially urge our visitors to Ruidoso to come out and join us."

The bull riding will be in four categories: men's amateur and advanced and women's amateur and advanced. Entry fees are \$5 and trophy belts will be awarded to the winners in each division.

The Clay Mac Band will provide dance music through the evening.

The cover charge Wednesday night will be \$3, with \$1.50 being contributed to the fund drive by Jerry Dale's.

Entry blanks are available at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital or at Cousins', though entrants may sign up at the last minute.

Hospital's ICU unit dedicated

A ribbon cutting ceremony and an open house marked the grand opening of the newly constructed Intensive Care Unit (ICU) Thursday at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

The monitoring equipment of the ICU has been in operation for one and one half years, but its housing has only now been completed. The facility cost over \$140,000, with \$83,000 of that being donated by a two-year fund drive.

Officials at the ribbon cutting included Pinkie Jones, chairman of the hospital's Board of Trustees; Don Sims, chairman of the advisory board, who directed the fund drive; Sonny Edwards, chairman of the Board of Directors at Sunland/Ruidoso Downs, and Dr. Roger Beechie, chief of the hospital's medical staff.

The hospital also unveiled a waiting room, donated by the family of the late Jerry Garcia.

"The ICU and our new specialists Dr. Kirkgaard and Dr. Echols will enable us to give our patients a much more complete Moore," said hospital administrator Ken Moore. "Previously we would have had to transfer many more patients to a larger hospital. And time is of the essence in an emergency."

Moore expressed his sincere thanks to the many people who have contributed towards installation of the ICU.

"Basically, we'll be able to handle everything now except open heart surgery, kidney dialysis and severe head trauma,"

said Dr. Lance Kirkgaard, who joined the hospital's staff last month.

Perhaps the central piece of equipment purchased by the hospital is a Hewlett-Packard cardiac monitoring system, which has telemetry capability. With it, patients can be monitored either in their rooms or in transit through the hospital.

Another important acquisition was an air-handling unit, which cost \$14,000, and exchanges the air in a room 15 times an hour.

Each of the four beds in the ICU are connected to wall mounts which supply oxygen and suction lines. Blood pressure is monitored with two Swan Ganz catheters — an intracardiac pressure measuring machine.

Aside from the new specialists, the hospital has also made other personnel improvements. The recent addition of Emergency Medical Service physicians on weekends during tourist seasons will continue, and the hospital medical staff has agreed to provide coverage without salary during weekdays on a rotating basis which involves all staff members.

In addition, specialty consultation in orthopedics, vascular, and general surgery, and internal medicine will be available on a seven-day-a-week basis. (See related article on Dr. Paul Echols, the hospital's new orthopedic surgeon).

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Round Table Top wins derby

Round Table Top, a colt who started the current Ruidoso Downs season as a maiden, slapped around some of the finest three-year-olds in the Southwest while cruising to an easy victory in Sunday's Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby.

The duel covered a mile-and-sixteenth, offered a gross purse of \$22,500, and did much to muddle the water among three-year-olds now campaigning at Ruidoso.

Ruidoso patrons placed most of their wagering affection on Glover D., an impressive gelding who was gunning for his third stakes victory of the season. A win in the Derby most likely would have sewn up Horse-of-The-Meet honors for Glover D., and would have made him the obvious three-year-old champ.

But Glover D. dropped a comparatively light impost of 120 pounds, lost all heart for the battle after traveling a mile and sagged badly in the homestretch. The gelding finished fourth as a 4-5 shot, losing ground with each stride.

It was a far different story with Round Table Top, the colt ridden magnificently by Joe Martinez for Herbert L. Turner of Winston Salem, North Carolina. Martinez brought the colt charging out of the gate, from the No. 10 post, and quickly assumed the lead.

At first, it appeared Martinez' strategy of trying to lead all the way would end in folly. Surprisingly, Round Table Top easily fended off an early attack from Dark Knight. Next, he matched Glover D. stride-for-stride down the straightaway.

When Glover D.'s resolve was broken, Round Table Top took a breather, then inched into the clear. He was several lengths in front at the head of the stretch, perfectly positioned to cast aside a game but non-threatening move by the 9-2 shot, Fill Mackis Cup.

Round Table Top glided under the wire two and one fourth lengths on top, earned \$11,284, and returned mutual payoffs of \$8.20, \$3.60, \$3.40. The win was his third of the meeting. The first victory — and the first of his career — came at Ruidoso on August 2. The Derby venture marked Round Table Top's fifth try at racing.

Fill Mackis Cup, piloted by Gilbert Villescas, ended up two and one fourth

lengths in front of the fast-closing 34-1 shot, Draconic's Lady. Fill Mackis Cup collected \$4,965, pushing his 1981 winnings up to \$36,058. The gelding paid \$4.40, \$3.40. He's owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas.

Draconic's Lady, owned by Lynn Dubose of Hobbs, returned a show price of \$7.80 and earned \$2,708.

SPANISH SPADE, ace of the stable owned by V. J. Callaway of Hobbs, raced as a prohibitive favorite in Saturday's feature race at Ruidoso Downs and came through with a length victory.

But the colt nearly had more than he could handle from the 56-1 outsider, Miss Gross.

The latter, owned by Billy Fulgham of Ft. Worth, Texas, set a high-flying pace in the six-furlong journey and repeatedly resisted the challenges of the people's choice.

In the final strides, Miss Gross tossed in the towel and slumped into second place. Spanish Spade covered the journey in 1:16 1-5 seconds and returned \$2.60, \$2.60, and \$2.20. Billy Byers was in the saddle. Earlier in the season, Spanish Spade won Ruidoso's \$40,120 Rio Grande Futurity.

Miss Gross handed out \$22.80 to place and \$4.40 to show in Saturday's effort. Kacy Dawn got in third and refunded \$2.40.


Saturday's headliner was one of six elimination trials leading to the \$112,010 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity on September 6. The top finisher in each trial automatically made the grade.

HIGHEASTERJET, the gelding who won last year's All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, emerged as the top qualifier for the \$1 million All-American Derby.

Higheasterjet turned in a blockbuster performance on Friday, winning the fourth race by three and one fourth lengths and clocking the 440 yards in a brilliant 21.67 seconds.

That 21.67 clocking was a seasonal record. More important, though, it held up as the fastest of the day and made Higheasterjet a standout in the upcoming All-American Derby.

All 12 races on Friday's program were qualifying heats for the Derby. Those chalking up the 10 fastest times earned

four record in the August 30 finale.

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A-A Futurity trials Thursday

Can any two-year-old horse defeat Special Effort?

That's the overriding question as 14 time trials are scheduled on Thursday for the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. The 10 fastest qualifiers from Thursday's trials will earn spots in the All-American Futurity on Labor Day.

The All-American offers the winner \$528,000. It is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses.

Special Effort has won the first two legs

of the Triple Crown — the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities.

If he passes the time trials and earns a berth in the All-American Futurity, he will receive an opportunity to become the first two-year-old Triple Crown winner in quarter horse racing.

Undefeated in seven lifetime starts, Special Effort has earned \$497,643 for owners Dan and Jolene Urnsch. A win in the All-American would push his career earnings past the \$1 million mark.

While Special Effort competes in the fourth race for trainer Johnnie Goodman and jockey W. R. Hunt, some other outstanding juveniles will also be seeking All-American positions.

Other key performers include Winkum, runner-up to Special Effort in the Rainbow Futurity, in the 14th race. Winkum will

face the speedy filly Rebellor.

Greybon, the Sun Country, Futurity winner at Sunland Park, will race in the fifth event while Just A Play Mate, victor in the West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park, will race in the sixth.

Dashingly, who has earned more than \$425,000 during a successful campaign at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles, California, is set for the eighth race. Magic Gold Mine, who captured the \$238,101 Blue Ribbon Downs Futurity at Sallisaw, Oklahoma, in March will race in the 10th event.

Johnny Vittoro, who has won six straight races and more than \$132,000, will run in the 11th heat.

Friday's highlight will be the All-American Derby Consolation at 440 yards. The winner will collect \$30,000 from the

total purse of \$146,000. Sudden Dash (22.06) and Hempens Easy Tam (22.07) were the two fastest qualifiers.

The Ruidoso Sprint Championship at six furlongs, tops Saturday's card. The purse will be \$15,000-added.

Sunday's feature will be the finals of the All-American Derby at 440 yards. The gross purse of the All-American Derby is \$1 million with the winner receiving \$350,000. Higheasterjet, winner of the Rainbow Derby, and Easily Smashed, who captured the Kansas Derby, will collide. A win for Higheasterjet would propel him over the \$1 million mark in career earnings. He would thus become quarter horse racing's first millionaire.

Post time for Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday's racing programs will be 1 p.m.

Funds derived will also help defray camping and equipment costs of the Scouts, pay for the materials used by Scoutmasters and Scouters in their work with the troops and packs; pay for the patches, badges and awards earned; and

"The district office," Scoutmaster Rudy Flack said, "provides us with help on a regular schedule, to aid us with developing programs and to solve any problems we might have. Their help is indispensable to our Scouting programs in Ruidoso."

One example of benefits to local Scouts from fund drives is that 40 local boys were able to attend Camp Wehnapay at Sacramento this summer and another group attended the Aquatic Camp, Carlsbad, where they earned badges in swimming, boating and related activities.

Lance Kirkegaard, will be staffed 24 hours a day.

Moore said that the hospital's next major acquisition would probably be a DuPont Automated Blood Chemistry Analyser. This will give the hospital staff

constantly updated information on the condition of a heart patient's blood.

"We're really excited about these changes," Moore said. "Ruidoso is growing rapidly and deserves the best in medical care. We'll be continuing to search for ways to improve the efficiency

and quality of health care delivery to Ruidoso and the surrounding communities of Lincoln County."

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



What is "major league" and what isn't? I was talking to a friend of mine from California via the telephone a few days ago and he was saying that because New Mexico didn't have any "major league" professional sports teams this state was not a hotbed of athletic activity.

I then asked him what he thought "major league" meant. He said it was having a team in one of either the National Football League, the American and National baseball leagues or the National Basketball Association.

Of course New Mexico doesn't have any teams in those particular leagues. However just because a team plays in one of the above leagues doesn't really mean it's of "major league" caliber.

Take for example the San Diego Padres or the Toronto Blue Jays in baseball. A good case can be made for saying the Albuquerque Dukes are a better team than either the Padres or Blue Jays despite the fact the New Mexico club is only in AAA baseball.

The Dukes have the best record in "minor league" baseball and could probably give a few other teams besides the Jays and the Padres a real run for their money.

Some people on the west coast or in Texas don't rate New Mexico college football highly because the University of New Mexico and New Mexico State aren't in the Pac-10 or Southwestern Conference.

However both of these schools have fielded competitive football teams for years and sent a good number of players on to the professional ranks. Witness running back Don Woods, a New Mexico graduate. Although he was recently released by the San Francisco 49ers he was NFL Rookie of the Year in 1974 with the San Diego Chargers.

Another New Mexico graduate, Steve Myer, played four years with the Seattle Seahawks before a back injury forced him

to retire this summer. New Mexico State is rated a strong contender for the Missouri Valley Conference crown this year and the University of New Mexico should be an improved team in the West Coast Athletic Conference.

But perhaps New Mexico's biggest asset is its outdoors sports such as fishing, hunting and skiing not to mention horse racing at Ruidoso Downs and Santa Fe.

While my friend said these sports don't come under the realm of "athletic activity" because they're not team sports outdoors activities are enjoyed by millions of Americans every year.

Thousands of people have been turned off in the past few years by "big — time" sports because of the very high salaries made by many professional athletes. As a result the outdoors sports boom, which had never really lost popularity, has gained many new supporters.

And New Mexico has plenty of things to do as far as outdoors activities go. Sports like tennis, golf, hunting and fishing require lots of concentration as well as physical conditioning.

So who is to say what is athletic? There will be an inter-state encounter when two Lubbock, Texas under-12 years old soccer teams come to Ruidoso Sunday to tangle with two of the local under-12 teams.

According to Butch Grantham, director of the Ruidoso-Sertoma Youth Soccer Association, the teams from each area haven't been selected yet.

But the encounter, scheduled for White Mountain School, should be an interesting one.

State Fair planning profile of visitors

An extensive survey — to get an accurate profile on the average person who attends the annual New Mexico State Fair — will be conducted during the 12 days of the 1981 centennial exposition in Albuquerque.

Fair Manager Bill Humphries announced today that Dr. Paul W. Zickefoose, an economics professor at New Mexico State University (NMSU) in Las Cruces, would supervise the survey.

The actual survey work will be conducted by some 60 Distributive Education students at Albuquerque's Del Norte High School. Larry D'Anza is their instructor and will assist Zickefoose in the overall operation.

Humphries said: "We've felt for a long time that the fair has a strong economic impact on the State of New Mexico and the city of Albuquerque, but we'd like to get a better picture of it. Such a survey should

bring out some interesting facts and also give the fair management some background for future planning."

Fairgoers will be spot-checked, with about one percent of the total attending being asked to participate in the study.

Among other things, they will be asked where they are from, number in their party, age group, where they are staying, what they plan to see at the fair and how much money they plan to spend at the fair.

Zickefoose, who has been at NMSU since 1954, has been conducting economic studies for the State Highway Department for a number of years and is highly regarded in his field.

The survey will be the first one of persons attending the New Mexico State Fair since 1968, when considerable information on the average fairgoer was garnered.

State Fair planning profile of visitors

An accurate survey — to get an accurate profile on the average person who attends the annual New Mexico State Fair — will be conducted during the 12 days of the 1981 centennial exposition in Albuquerque.

Fair Manager Bill Humphries announced today that Dr. Paul W. Zickefoose, an economics professor at New Mexico State University (NMSU) in Las Cruces, would supervise the survey. The actual survey work will be conducted by some 60 Distributive Education students at Albuquerque's Del Norte High School. Larry D'Anza is their instructor and will assist Zickefoose in the overall operation.

Humphries said: "We've felt for a long time that the fair has a strong economic impact on the State of New Mexico and the city of Albuquerque, but we'd like to get a better picture of it. Such a survey should

bring out some interesting facts and also give the fair management some background for future planning."

Fairgoers will be spot-checked, with about one percent of the total attending being asked to participate in the study.

Among other things, they will be asked where they are from, number in their party, age group, where they are staying, what they plan to see at the fair and how much money they plan to spend at the fair.

Zickefoose, who has been at NMSU since 1954, has been conducting economic studies for the State Highway Department for a number of years and is highly regarded in his field.

The survey will be the first one of persons attending the New Mexico State Fair since 1968, when considerable information on the average fairgoer was garnered.

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
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The Dreamer

The program includes demonstrations and a question and answer period.

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
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
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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — The Moral Majority doesn't seem to have much clout in New Mexico.

At least that's one conclusion you could draw from results of that survey of elected Republican leaders in Bernalillo county.

Of 389 such officials polled, 246 responded, and 76 percent of them said President Reagan should forget the Jerry Falwells of this world and get on about running the government.

They were almost equally strong in their feelings about that "Teen Chastity Bill" of Senator Jeremiah Denton, for which funds are included in the Reagan budget as the only new categorical grant program. A full 87 percent of those responding said that idea was ridiculous.

And on that most emotional of issues, abortion, 62 percent of the respondents said it is a private matter between a woman and her physician.

Strangely, a long story on this survey in the state's largest daily failed to note most of these facts.

You could easily get the impression whoever fed that story to the paper wanted to create an image opposite to the survey's actual findings.

Republicans sometimes proceed in that fashion. As reported by this writer earlier, in this very case they kept on surveying till they found enough people favoring John Irick as their candidate for goernor, after preliminary results showed most respondents were really for Bill Sego.

This writer has been criticized for being too tough on the powers that be among New-Mexico-Republicans. It's that kind of thing — deliberate distortion of facts — which helps to fire our on-going suspicions.

The reason to make an issues survey is to find out what your people are really thinking as Hester Eastham, who was in charge of this one, said most clearly in her

covering letter.

You're not required to make the results public — but if you do, you ought to tell the whole truth.

For instance, if 74 percent of the responses say both evolutionism and creationism should be taught in schools and 56 percent say textbooks should not be screened for their "moral values," you should have the courage to report that fact, not suppress it because it embarrasses you.

Playing with the truth doesn't change it. Besides, Republicans might make some inroads among those not of their political faith if they demonstrated they don't all adhere to the philosophy espoused by some of their dinosaur-like leaders here in New Mexico.

There are some who might be attracted to know that 65 percent of those answering this questionnaire were so liberal as even to espouse serious consideration of a mere woman running for Congress or Lieutenant Governor.

Not everyone in the state might consider that thought dangerously liberal, as it would appear those reporting this story did when they apparently suppressed it.

We can all feel safe now.

The state has just issued 14 pages of regulations governing the holding of bingo games and raffles.

We also have a salaried employee, who will devote his full time to this important subject.

All the parish priests in the state should glow with pride when they see what their efforts have led us to.

And we all know, don't we, that having accomplished this, we will someday have a whole department of state government, supported by tax funds, charged with the responsibility of handling this matter.

That's how government keeps growing.

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Chile has long heritage of hot debates

People are often surprised to find the bright green chile pepper, darling of the New Mexico vegetable industry, is neither vegetable nor pepper.

That doesn't seem to bother anyone,

especially the loyal chile fans who are sprouting everywhere as the pungent pod continues to take the country by storm.

Columbus gets credit for being the first to misname the chile. When he found the West Indian natives, they were growing the fiery fruit.

Since Columbus was sure he had found the Far East, there was no doubt in his

mind that he had found the highly valued pepper of the East. It never occurred to the explorer that these Indians and their pepper were totally different from their counterparts in India.

Columbus proudly took his so-called pepper back to Spain and in a few years it was popular across Europe and England.

The confusion about what to call the fire pod was only the first of many more arguments to follow. For years, there was a hot debate about how to spell the pod's name.

The debate finally centered on the spelling — chile or chili. Most New Mexicans preferred the chile spelling, but the vegetable marketing industry usually labeled its product with the alternate form — chili. Even the vegetable processors weren't too sure; some called their product chilli.

New Mexico State University issued a news release in 1966 that was supposed to cool the spelling debate, at least within the state.

The authority in that release was Mrs. Fabiola C. de Baca Gilbert, a member of one of the oldest Spanish families in New Mexico. She was a Santa Fe County Extension home economist at the time, and recognized expert and author on New Mexico foods.

She said the Incas of Peru cultivated the plant hundreds of years before Europeans discovered that the world was not flat, and before anybody dreamed the Americans existed. The Incas called the pod aji (pronounced ah-hee). In their language, chile means cool or cold, a name given to the less pungent pods.

Gilbert pointed out that in New Mexico the pod has always been called chile, whether hot or mild. In the Republic of Mexico, she said, it was called either chile of aji, but never chilli.

In fact, all Spanish dictionaries of that time spelled the word c-h-i-l-e, and gave the definition simply as "aji."

With the spelling debate temporarily cooled, chile lovers thought they could burn their palates in comfort. But it was only three years later when another conflict surfaced. This one was in the New

Mexico legislature, of all places.

The state's lawmakers agreed to honor chile with an official title, but there were sharp differences of opinion about the exact honor to be bestowed.

Some thought it should be the official state fruit while others wanted it named the official state vegetable. Botanists agreed the chile was actually a fruit, but commerce insisted on referring to it as a vegetable.

Commerce had the final word. The chile was proclaimed the official state vegetable, an honor it had to share with the Pinto bean.

Considering chile's long history in New Mexico, it's not hard to understand that people are willing to get a little fiery over its name and classification.

Chile, however, is not a native plant to New Mexico. It grows here only with irrigation and cultivation. It's a member of the nightshade family and a cousin of the tomato and potato.

Nevertheless, the bright chile ristras drying under the Land of Enchantment sun clearly marked the progress of the Spanish Conquistadores across the state.

Out of sheer hunger and poverty, if nothing else, early New Mexican settlers warmed their palates with chile concoctions of every sort imaginable. They even used it as an antioxidant to help preserve dried pork.

Maybe that's why any modern chile cookbook, such as the one written by Mae Martha Johnson, NMSU Extension food specialist, contains recipes for everything from hors d'oeuvres to after-dinner salads loaded with green and red chiles.

Although hungry settlers and their descendants knew little about nutritional labeling, they had accidentally developed a taste for a nutritious food, Johnson said.

The nutritionist said as the chile matures the plant packs more and more carotene (vitamin A) into the pod. The chile seems to keep most of its vitamin A content when frozen, canned or dried.

It's a different story with vitamin C. Ascorbic acid or vitamin C is affected by both heat and oxidation. The vitamin C content of chile builds up in maturing pods until it reaches a peak in about October.

Canned or frozen chile loses about a third of its ascorbic acid content, and the dried red chile loses almost all its vitamin C, regardless of the drying method.

Most New Mexicans find the fact that chile is good for them to be of little consequence. They just like its spicy taste. People won't stop eating the pod long

enough to argue about that fact that it's not a pepper, or whether the proper spelling is chile or chili, or whether it's a vegetable.

All they know is that it's delicious, and that seems to be enough for just about everybody.

Nitrogen solution use keeps going up

New Mexico farmers are using greater quantities of nitrogen solutions each year for direct application on crops.

Nitrogen solutions made up almost 40 percent of all nitrogen fertilizers sold in New Mexico in 1980, according to Larry Cihacek, Extension plant nutritionist for New Mexico State University. That's up from 23 percent in 1970 and 25 percent in 1975, Cihacek said.

Much of the nitrogen sold in solution is used for direct injection into irrigation water. Nitrogen application in irrigation water has both advantages and disadvantages, Cihacek said.

The major advantage is the sharp reduction in labor and equipment, which cuts application costs. This method also lets plants be fertilized anytime they need nitrogen, even if the plants are too large to use tractor-mounted equipment.

Applying nitrogen with irrigation water also eliminates the number of times field equipment moves over the soil and, as a result, reduces compaction.

The method also allows more frequent application of smaller amounts of nitrogen during the growing season. It reduces fertilizer loss through leaching, improves fertilizer efficiency, and may reduce overall fertilizer cost while improving yield.

Application through irrigation systems also disperses the fertilizer over a wider soil area, compared to direct injection into the soil. The low nutrient concentration in the irrigation water is often beneficial on soils that have low nutrient levels and low water-holding capability.

Among the list of disadvantages with this system, the farmer has to consider that the fertilizer will be carried wherever the water goes. Water penetration in a field is not uniform, even on the best irrigation runs.

More water penetrates the soil at the head of an irrigation run, and at the ends of a furrow or flood basin, leaving the middle short of both water and fertilizer. However, this is also true of most types of

broadcast or surface applied nitrogen fertilizer because it must be dissolved by irrigation or rain water.

Nitrogen also tends to remain in the top few inches of the soil when applied this way. It may be above the zone where the bulk of feeder roots occur, and may stimulate growth of shallow-rooted weeds. However, this problem also occurs with surface applied fertilizers.

Fertilizer loss, called denitrification, that is the result of waterlogged topsoil is usually greater from the topsoil layer.

For best results, nitrogen should not be introduced into irrigation water at the beginning of the set, Cihacek said.

Best results are obtained when the fertilizer is timed to enter the irrigation system near the middle of the set time, and is also timed to end shortly before the set is completed. This prevents leaching of the fertilizer to an area below the reach of roots, and also doesn't leave it too near the surface.

Irrigators need to make four decisions before applying nitrogen fertilizers through an irrigation water system.

They need to know the amount and kind of fertilizer to use, and the exact number of acres to be irrigated per set. Soil texture must be considered to determine the amount of time for fertilizer application. These elements let the farmer calculate the rate at which fertilizer will be injected into the system.

Although anhydrous ammonia is often injected into irrigation water, this practice is not recommended for systems using enclosed lines or sprinkler systems.

Anhydrous ammonia causes calcium precipitation in hard or high-calcium water, and will clog valves, gates and pipes, and reduce the amount of water applied.

Irrigators can get more information from the Extension Guide A-125, "Applying Nitrogen Fertilizers in Irrigation Water." The guide is available free in most county Extension offices.

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FBI seeking Cedric Aldaz Jr.

Cedric Aldaz Jr., is the prototype of a transient criminal.

Moving from state to state, he has felony arrests dating back to 1969, primarily for narcotics violations. He's no stranger to jail cells in Illinois, North Carolina and New Mexico.

Now he's wanted again, this time by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the Otero-Lincoln County District Attorney's Office.

The 36-year-old Fort Stanton native has been named in warrants charging him with armed robbery and unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

FBI files show that Aldaz and his brother Rudy were implicated in the April 9, 1977, armed robbery of the Old Mill Curio Shop in Ruidoso. Two men, one armed with a knife and the other armed with a sawed-off rifle, escaped with a large amount of jewelry. Some of the jewelry was recovered shortly after the robbery, while a smaller amount was seized by police in Marietta, Georgia, more than a year later.

Rudy Aldaz subsequently was convicted of the robbery and was sentenced to a 10-50 year prison term. His brother is still running.

Cedric Aldaz is described as being a white male of Hispanic descent, 5-11, 160 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. He has a tattoo of a tiger's head on his upper left arm.

Police believe Aldaz has continued his transient ways and could be just about anywhere in the country or even as far away as Hawaii or Alaska.

Anyone having any information about the possible whereabouts of Aldaz, who goes by a variety of aliases including Junior Aldaz or Isador Aldaz, is asked to call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933, or

Otero County Crime Stoppers at 437-2000.

Meanwhile, Rio Rancho Crime Stoppers is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the solution of the July, 1981, burglary of a residence at 3913 St. Andrews Road. An estimated \$40,000 worth of items were taken, including a large amount of ladies' jewelry. And the program also is looking for the persons who fired a shotgun blast at a garage door at 4102 La Colorado in Rio Rancho. Anyone with information can call 842-3916 or 1-800-432-6933.

Dona Ana County Crime Stoppers, at 528-8000, is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the solution of a \$15,000 residential burglary in Las Cruces. The victims returned from their vacation

on July 12 to discover that burglars had taken jewelry and silverware.

Santa Fe Crime Stoppers is hunting a white male in his late 30's or early 40's, 5-5 to 5-7, with a slender build and a moustache who robbed the Capitol Bank on Rodeo Road on July 29. The offender escaped in a white, older model Plymouth with a crumpled door. A reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered by the Capitol city program, which can be reached at 968-5555.

And Silver City Crime Stoppers, at 538-5254, is offering rewards of up to \$2,000 for information leading to the arrests of the offenders of crimes ranging from the armed robbery of a McDonald's Restaurant to the burglaries of B&D Hardware

and Truck Sales and vandalism of the sewer lines in Central.

In addition to the "Crime of the Week", the State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 32 local Crime Stoppers programs in New Mexico also pay cash rewards for information leading to the arrests and indictments of other major crime offenders and the capture of wanted felons.

To date, more than 3,700 major crimes have been solved by the New Mexico law enforcement agencies as a result of calls to Crime Stoppers programs throughout the state. In addition, almost \$1.5 million worth of stolen property and narcotics has been recovered, while 1,439 out of 1,456 individuals prosecuted in court have been convicted.

Canning methods change as altitude increases

Because of New Mexico's high altitudes, it's necessary to make altitude adjustments when canning in either a steam pressure canner or a water bath.

A steam pressure canner must be used for all low-acid foods. Low-acid foods include vegetables, meat, poultry and fish. It takes a canning temperature of 240 degrees Fahrenheit to destroy botulism-causing bacteria in low-acid foods, according to Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist for New Mexico State University.

At sea level, 10 pounds of steam pressure develops the required 240 degrees. At higher altitudes, it's necessary to add one pound of pressure for each 2,000 feet above sea level.

Home canners living from 2,000 to 4,000 feet above sea level should use 12 pounds of pressure to be sure of killing all bacteria in canned foods. People living between 4,000 and 6,000 feet elevation should use 13 pounds of steam pressure. Use 14 pounds

between 6,000 and 8,000 feet, and 15 pounds between 8,000 and 10,000 feet.

Small pressure saucepans can be used for canning if they are deep enough to hold the rack and pint jars. However, since a small pan reaches the processing temperature faster and cools quickly, increase the processing time about 20 minutes.

Some manufacturers don't recommend use of their pressure saucepans for use above 3,000 feet. Read the instruction book that came with the saucepan carefully to see if it can be used safely.

Most pressure saucepans, and some canners, use a weight pressure regulator adjustable to only 5, 10 or 15 pounds of pressure, rather than a continuous-reading pressure gauge. Use 15 pounds of pressure when canning foods anywhere in New Mexico with a weighted pressure regulator.

A longer boiling water bath is also necessary when processing fruits and vegetables in New Mexico's higher

altitudes.

Water's boiling point depends on the atmospheric pressure. Since this pressure decreases as altitude increases, the actual boiling temperature of water goes down.

Most canning directions give processing times for sea level. For a boiling water bath lasting less than 20 minutes, according to these directions, increase the processing time one minute for each 1,000 feet of altitude.

For any recommended processing times over 20 minutes, add two minutes for each 1,000 feet above sea level.

Home canning produces safe, inexpensive and good quality products, but only if the food is carefully selected and prepared, and if reliable instructions are carefully followed.

All good canning books give altitude adjustments. "Home Canning Pressures and Processing Time," Extension Guide E-313, is available at County Extension offices and is an excellent free guide.

Chile group donates \$10,000 for research

The newly formed New Mexico Chile Improvement Foundation has put in a tall order to New Mexico State University (NMSU), but they also have put up the money for their request.

The foundation recently presented a \$10,000 check to NMSU President Gerald Thomas for chile research. Lewis Blad, chairman of the Chile Advisory Committee, in presenting the check, said the foundation has confidence in the university and its chile research program. Blad is a chile processor and grower from Hatch.

The foundation, which was formed in January, collected the money through a voluntary \$1-an-acre assessment by growers. Arturo Jurado, a Mesilla Valley grower, is the foundation chairman.

The organization hopes to contribute an additional \$10,000 this year. Nearly 18,000 acres of chile are grown in New Mexico with more than half grown in Dona Ana County.

The money will be used for research on red and green chile varieties with emphasis on chile with longer pods, uniform pungency, higher yields, faster maturing pods and disease resistance. They also are hoping researchers will develop a paprika type chile that grows well in the Mesilla Valley.

According to Dr. Koert J. Lessman, director of NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station, the university has the scientific capabilities to focus on chile research. Those capabilities include genetics, plant breeding, management and tissue culture.

Joe Nelson, local processor and grower and a member of the Chile Advisory Committee, said there is a "lot of action in the chile business." He said this involves not only growers and processors, but also the foundation, the experiment station and

the New Mexico Department of Agriculture. He credits Dr. L. S. Pope, dean of NMSU's College of Agriculture and Home Economics, for "aggressively backing the committee."

Earlier, area growers and processors toured chile research plots at the Plant Science Research Center near Las Cruces. There, Dr. Roy Nakayama, a chile breeder, reported on research efforts to develop milder varieties, larger pods and chiles that are easier to pick.

The group also viewed experimental irrigation methods designed to reduce water use by chile. Dr. Peter Wierenga, an agronomist, said more research is planned on using water to control the taste of chile. Less water causes hotter chile, he said.

Dr. Donald Cotter, a horticulturist, gave an overview of promising cultivation research. In one, results show that the plant produces chile even under low nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizer rates. In transplant studies underway at Las Cruces, Roswell and Espanola, he said results show that plants from soaked seeds sprout earlier than plants from untreated seeds.

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



NFL PRE-SEASON FOOTBALL GAME
