

Chamber needs parade entries, food vendors, for Aspencade weekend

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, 666 Sudderth, is accepting float entries for the October 3 Aspencade parade on Sudderth.

"We're asking merchants, organizations

and individuals to enter a float in this parade," Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said. "In this connection, a group of business or professional offices located in one area could jointly sponsor a float.

"Anyone interested in sponsoring a float should register with us at the Chamber as soon as possible, because a parade of the size of the one held here for Aspencade takes a lot of organizing."

Any group or organization that would be

interested in operating a food and refreshment stand in the park, October 3, should contact the Chamber for information.

"We're not going to have a commercial venture this year," Jungbluth said. "It is

our opinion that a group or organization could operate a food stand and do a good job, besides they could make a few dollars, all of which would stay in the community.

"The Chamber," Jungbluth said, "can't approve, or disapprove, any food selling

project. However, we can help any group that might want to have a food operation by letting them know what the requirements are and tell them where they can get the permits and clearance necessary."

Elks seek game hides for veterans

The Ruidoso Elks Lodge is again conducting a campaign for animal hides, wild or domestic.

The club is asking hunters to donate all hides from bear, deer, elk or other game animals. The Elks also want any hides from farm animals.

The lodge, at the end of the hunting season, sends all hides to a tannery, with the leather being donated to the Disabled Veterans of New Mexico, who make leather items that they sell.

"We've provided our Disabled Veterans

with a lot of leather in past years," said Jerry Story, hide drive chairman.

"This year with the cooperation of all hunters and area ranchers and farmers who are butchering animals, we hope to collect more hides than we ever have.

"The leather is given to our Disabled Veterans free of any charge, to let them make a few dollars for their work."

During bear season, and until the big game season opens, all hides may be left at Hughes Body Shop, Ruidoso Downs, or at the Elks Club, Highway 70 south, Story said.

Camp murder case hearings postponed

Preliminary hearings were held this week in the murder case of Scott Wayne Thompson before Magistrate Judge Sally Ortiz in Carrizozo. After three days of testimony, the hearings were postponed Wednesday afternoon until September 8.

Three Camp Sierra Blanca inmates, David Sedillo, Felix Martinez and Richard Lujan, have been charged with first degree capital murder by the state of New Mexico. The state is asking for the death penalty for all three.

Thompson was found dead from beating and multiple stab wounds to the neck and chest shortly after midnight on August 2. He had been at Camp Sierra Blanca, a light-security prison, only two days after having been transferred from the medium security prison at Los Lunas.

The preliminary hearings are held to establish probable cause. If Judge Ortiz determines that the state has sufficient evidence to warrant a trial, then the case will be bound over to the District Court.

On Monday, Judge Ortiz acted on a motion filed by the defense and ordered the state to turn over all available

Downs drops sales tax rate

The Gross Receipts Tax (GRT) in Ruidoso Downs will be 4.25 percent, effective January 1, 1982.

Earlier this year the trustees had increased the GRT by one-half percent, to make it 4.5 percent January 1, 1982.

The trustees adopted Ordinance 81-6 at Monday's meeting to conform to state law, after being advised by village clerk Virginia Spall that the 4.5 percent rate was in violation of the law.

In other business, the trustees briefly discussed existing problems concerning solid waste disposal and agreed to examine the matter at length at the September 14 meeting.

A-A Derby runs Sunday

Higheasterjet, ranked among the greatest quarter horses of all time, aims for the most evasive mark in quarter horse history in Sunday's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The sparkling Pine's Easter Jet gelding seeks to become the first quarter horse to win \$1 million. Through 12 lifetime races, he has bankrolled \$659,362.

A win in Sunday's 440 yard All-American Derby would add \$350,000 to his account boosting him to \$1,009,362 and he would reach a pinnacle never before achieved in quarter horse racing.

Higheasterjet is fourth on the alltime list of quarter horse money winners. He trails Moon Lark (\$859,356), Easy Date (\$849,709) and Town Policy (\$788,430).

And he certainly has the credentials and ability to reach that lofty plateau in only his fifth start this season.

Higheasterjet is undefeated in four starts this year. He earned a berth in this third leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses with the fastest qualifying from last Friday's 12 trials. He was timed in 21:67 and his win margin of three and one-fourth lengths was the widest margin of the 12 winners.

His 21:67 was a season's fastest time for 440 yards at Ruidoso Downs. In fact, the previous 440 yard seasonal (21:73) was also set by Higheasterjet when he earned \$208,547 for winning the Rainbow Derby on July 5.

The Rainbow Derby was the second leg of the Triple Crown. Only one horse has ever won two legs of the sophomore Triple Crown, My Easy Credit, in 1977.

Nevertheless, Higheasterjet has been a dominating force this season. He opened with a two and one-fourth length win in an allowance race at Ruidoso Downs on June 7, won his Rainbow Derby trial race by one length on June 10, captured the Derby by a head and then performed brilliantly in Friday's Derby trial heat.

Overall, his four victories this season have earned \$213,107 for owner G. C. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas.

A year ago, he stunned the quarter horse industry by winning the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity on Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs. That gave him a superb 1980 record of four triumphs with one second and one third in eight outings for earnings of \$446,255.

Trained by Johnnie Goodman, who also won last year's All-American Derby with Native Gambler, he will again be ridden by W. R. Hunt.

Perhaps his toughest foe in this classic quarter horse race will be Easily Smashed.

The Easy Jet colt earned \$158,634 in 1980 while winning nine of 13 outings.

This year he has been successful again. He won the Kansas Derby, the first leg of the Triple Crown, although Higheasterjet was not entered.

He faced Higheasterjet in the Rainbow Derby for the only confrontation between these two three-year-old giants, but the expected match race never materialized.

Easily Smashed was plagued by traffic problems leaving the starting gate, yet still finished third, just a half length behind Higheasterjet.

This season, he's won five races with one second and one third for winnings of \$133,245, second only to Higheasterjet's earnings.

In Friday's second trial race he finished second behind the speedy filly, Rule The Deck, after leading for much of the race. His qualifying time of 21:86 was fourth best.

Owned by Carol Childs, William F. Leach and Sue May of Ft. Stockton, Texas, he's trained by Leach and will be ridden by Ruidoso Downs' leading jockey, Jacky Martin.

The second fastest qualifier with a 21:76 reading is a West Coast invader who proved her form in California is every bit as impressive in the high mountains.

Queen For Cash streaked to a one and one-fourth length verdict in Friday's sixth trial race under a fine ride by Danny Cardoza, certainly among the finest riders in quarter horse history.

The Dash For Cash filly won two of three races this year at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles, including the Lassie Handicap on June 12. A year ago, she captured four of seven starts with one second and one third for winnings of \$116,029.

She's owned by Anne and B. F. Phillips Jr., of Frisco, Texas, and is trained by Charles Cascio.

Another filly, Rule The Deck, had the third fastest qualifying reading when she blazed to a 21:83 clocking in defeating Easily Smashed by a head in the second heat.

The Scout Leader filly has won four of eight races this year with earnings of \$44,581.

She had the fastest qualifying time for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic with a rapid 21:88 for the 440 yard trial race. She ran fifth, just three-fourths of a length behind winning Bold Love in that August 2 event at Ruidoso Downs.

She's owned by Dirk Jones, a law student at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas, and is trained by R. D. Hay. She will be ridden by veteran jockey Jack Wallace.

Here's a capsule look at the other six entrants in this eighth running of the country's richest race for three-year-old quarter horses:

NATIVE TEA — A Sparkling Native gelding who ran fifth in the Kansas Derby and sixth in the Rainbow Derby, she and Easily Smashed are the only two participants in all three Triple Crown events this season. She tied for the fifth best qualifying time with a 21:93. She's won four of seven starts this year for earnings of \$36,940. A career earner of \$105,575, she's owned by Thomas S. Orr of Edmond, Oklahoma, and is trained by Doug McMullen. Mike Charles is her regular jockey.

SHIVER METIMBERS — This Easy Six filly tied for the fifth fastest qualifying time with a 21:93. She ran second behind Queen For Cash, yet still has two wins, two seconds and one third in six outings this season. Owned by Julianna H. Sikes of Gonzales, Texas, she's trained by Roger Fagan and will be ridden by Steve Fuller.

EXPLOSIVE NATIVE — This Heisanative gelding had the seventh fastest qualifying time with a 21:96. He's won three of seven 1981 outings with one second and one third for winnings of \$21,736. Owned by E. L. Baker of Ft. Worth, Texas, he's trained by Shirley Montgomery-Nichols and will be ridden by Jimmie Hunt.

PERSERVERANCE — A Hempen gelding had the eighth fastest qualifying time with a 21:97. He ran fifth in the Rainbow Derby. Owned by the Bar Lazy B, Colony, Oklahoma, he's trained by Phil Garrett and will be ridden by Wayne Buehrer. He has one win this year and one second in six runs for winnings of \$25,262.

WAR SEA — This War Chic gelding had the ninth fastest qualifying time with a 21:99 reading. He was a half length behind Native Tea in the third trial heat. Owned by Allen Taylor and Inken Willis of

Beeville, Texas; he's trained by Johnnie Goodman. His 1981 record shows one win two seconds and two thirds in nine runs for winnings of \$10,297.

LOVE POEM — A Raise Your Glass filly who had the tenth fastest qualifying time with a 22:00. She also had the tenth fastest qualifying time (via a shake) for last

year's All-American Futurity. She and Higheasterjet are the only two entrants in this year's Derby who ran in the 1980 All-American Futurity. Owned by the McDermott Ranch of Houston, Texas, she's trained by Thomas A. Zarate and will be ridden by Don Tyre. Lightly raced, she's scored two wins with one second in four 1981 outings.

The 25th anniversary observance of the Great Plains Conservation Program will be held Friday at the Lincoln County Fair Grounds, Capitán.

The morning session, emceed by Sid Goodloe, Capitán rancher, begins at 10 and includes a slide show on conservation practices available for cost-sharing, by Greg Haussler, Soil Conservation Service, Capitán; the history and development of the Great Plains Program by ranchers Robert Bell, Lewis Merritt and Goodloe

and a report on program practices applied on the Stirling Spencer ranch.

The noon luncheon is courtesy of local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The afternoon session, emceed by Congressman Joe Skeen, begins at 1:30 with the topic, Outlook for Current Great Plains Program being presented by Ray Margo, State Conservationist; John Bigbee, State Representative; Malcolm Baldrige, state Secretary of Commerce and rancher Bill Lee.

Trustees approve ordinances

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening, after making several revisions during an hour long final hearing, adopted Ordinance 81-17, amending Chapter 9, Section 7, to make changes in density requirements and in the size of lots and open spaces, to renumber certain provisions and to regulate the outdoor display of retail merchandise, seasonal or intermittent sales, and garage sales.

The changes in the ordinances were proposed by the Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and by Planning and Zoning enforcement officer John Cupp.

During the hearing trustees George White, Benny Coulston and Frank Saylor, the only trustees present, with Cupp and Tim Collins of Burke-Collins Associates, made several revisions as village attorney Lee Huckstep reviewed the ordinance paragraph by paragraph.

The amended ordinance will be published as soon as the revisions have been completed. The trustees also adopted Ordinance 81-

15, enabling the village to comply with provisions of the state's 1979 Uniform Fire Prevention Code, giving municipalities the same enforcement powers exercised by the State Fire Marshal.

On request of Chief of Police Dick Swenor, the trustees adopted Resolution 81-18, establishing a monthly charge of \$2.50 to monitor private alarm systems at the police department, and establishing a fee of \$25 per false alarm answered, over two such alarms a month. The resolution also authorizes the police to discontinue monitoring private alarms if charges billed to the owner are not paid within 30 days.

The trustees awarded the following bids: De Luna, Mountain Air, two half ton, four wheel drive pickups, \$17,950; Tom Gronwey Equipment, Albuquerque, backhoe-loader, \$31,806 and water fittings and appurtenances to Kernco, Albuquerque, \$12,971.90; Bowles and Edens, El Paso, Texas, \$7,349.04; Clowe and Cowan, Roswell, \$5,997 and H. G. Relter Company, Albuquerque, \$5,204.06. Each bid, for these

water department supplies, was submitted for specific items.

In other business, the trustees:

— Received letters from Randall B. Kidd, Plainview, Texas, from Cousins', and heard comments by Paul Dionne, St. Stockton, Texas and Chief Swenor, regarding the traffic and other alleged problems in connection with the operation of Jerry Dale's. No action was taken.

— Accepted the final plat of Lakeview Estates, Phase 2, Camelot, for Salvador Vega Jr.

— Agreed to pay the difference, if not in excess of \$2,000, between the cost of 2,600 feet of eight and ten inch sewer pipe to be installed in the Alto Crest 2 and Forest Heights subdivision areas, as requested by Collins. The village will also require easements to be obtained to install these sewer lines.

— Approved the request of Swenor to acquire a K-9 dog to aid in drug and burglary cases, with the original cost of the animal to be defrayed by an anonymous donor.

— Heard a complaint by Al Junge concerning installation of Continental Telephone lines, buried in ditches, in the 100 Block of Royal Drive, with Junge charging the company had not returned the land to its original condition. The trustees directed Huckstep to write a letter to Continental advising them of the problems and of action the village can take if Continental fails to comply by correcting the situation.

— Heard, without taking action, a presentation by Border Machinery, El Paso, representatives relative to installation of a new hot mix plant that would meet emission standards and permit recycling of old blacktop that would be used for resurfacing village streets.

— Expressed the opinion to Collins that if the Carrizo Lodge condominium development, ultimately to contain about 400 units, not annex to the village that the development could be served by village sewer lines. The project would entail installation of about one and a quarter miles of line to attach to the sewer main.

evidence. The defense also filed a motion to sever the defendants (to hold separate hearings), but this motion was denied.

The first three days of the hearings consisted of witnesses called by the state. On Monday, employees at Camp Sierra Blanca testified that at the midnight bed check on the night in question, all three of the defendants were in their bunks.

On Tuesday, assistant deputy medical examiner Charles Lane of Ruidoso told the court that he had observed "lacerations, contusions and abrasions" on Thompson's head after he had been called to the prison for a preliminary examination in the early morning hours of August 2.

The defense attorneys requested that

Lane's description of the neck wounds as "stab wounds" be removed from the court record, and Judge Ortiz complied.

Corrections Officer John Caraway testified that after Thompson had turned up missing in the midnight bed check, he had gone to question Martinez, Thompson's roommate. Caraway told the court that Martinez was asleep and apparently intoxicated, which he verified with a balloon test.

On Wednesday, Camp Sierra Blanca inmate Sam Love testified that he witnessed the three defendants beating another inmate which he could not identify.

The state claims to have other eye witnesses who will appear when the hearings resume on September 8.

Fuelwood permits are no longer available at the Guadalupe Administrative Site; however, permits can be obtained at the Guadalupe Ranger District office in Carlsbad.

Bears have been frequenting campgrounds on the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, and on the Cloudercroft District. Campers should keep all food put away.

On the Smokey Bear Ranger District, South Fork Campground is receiving heavy use on weekends; the other campgrounds are receiving light use. The upper portion of State Highway 532 is closed for repaving, which has necessitated the closing of Oak Grove Campground and the gondola at Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

Water levels in Bonito Lake and the streams are normal. Roads and trails are in good condition. Hikers into the White Mountain Wilderness are cautioned to beware of lightning storms.

Campgrounds at the Cloudercroft Ranger District are receiving moderate to heavy use on weekends, and light use during the week. Roads and trails are still muddy in spots, but drying out. There are a lot of

potholes on the Sunspot road (FR 64). Loose gravel will be encountered on State Highway 24.

On the Guadalupe Ranger District at Carlsbad, Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is receiving heavy use on weekends and moderate use during the week. Resurfacing has been completed on State Highway 137. Trail conditions are good. Visitors to the District are reminded that rattlesnakes are out, and that weather conditions can change rapidly.

The Mayhill District reports that most roads are dry. James Canyon Campground is receiving moderate use. Fishing on the Penasco River is fair.





evidence. The defense also filed a motion to sever the defendants (to hold separate hearings), but this motion was denied.

The first three days of the hearings consisted of witnesses called by the state. On Monday, employees at Camp Sierra Blanca testified that at the midnight bed check on the night in question, all three of the defendants were in their bunks.

On Tuesday, assistant deputy medical examiner Charles Lane of Ruidoso told the court that he had observed "lacerations, contusions and abrasions" on Thompson's head after he had been called to the prison for a preliminary examination in the early morning hours of August 2.

The defense attorneys requested that

Lane's description of the neck wounds as "stab wounds" be removed from the court record, and Judge Ortiz complied.

Corrections Officer John Caraway testified that after Thompson had turned up missing in the midnight bed check, he had gone to question Martinez, Thompson's roommate. Caraway told the court that Martinez was asleep and apparently intoxicated, which he verified with a balloon test.

On Wednesday, Camp Sierra Blanca inmate Sam Love testified that he witnessed the three defendants beating another inmate which he could not identify.

The state claims to have other eye witnesses who will appear when the hearings resume on September 8.





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

My wife is constantly accusing me of having a one track mind: fishing. She says that I cannot eat, drink, sleep, or carry on an intelligent conversation without making reference to fishing. She even claims that in order for me to be able to grasp a new concept, I must first relate it to fish-or-fishing.

Although I am an avid fisherman, I feel her accusations are somewhat unjust. Therefore, I am going to use this article to prove to my wife and to those of other sportsmen that might have expressed similar feelings, that we sporting mates are a pretty knowledgeable lot.

You see, a few weeks ago a new little fisherperson (wearing pink) was born into our family.

Needless to say, since this was our first such addition, I was exposed to several new concepts. As I watched my wife grow into spawning condition, particularly during the latter months, I often found myself dreaming of someday catching a bass with a belly of similar proportions.

The predicted day of arrival approached about as rapidly as would have that of a long awaited tournament. So, to help pass the time of the last few weeks we attended some classroom seminars where local pro's talked about new techniques and gave some secret tips on the "how to's" of landing the newborn.

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — Do you have a leaflet on handling dry ice? If not, would you write and tell this short, plump grandma how to handle it?

How big a piece does one need for a portable ice box? How long would a six inch square piece last? Does one wrap dry ice in newspaper? Would it be placed on the top or bottom of a cooler, and would it freeze an item next to it, such as milk, lettuce, etc.?

Thanks for your help. L. K., Michigan
Dear L. K. — Well, first, no, I don't have a leaflet about dry ice. But, yes, I can help you with some of your questions.

Dry ice, as you may know, is solid carbon dioxide (CO₂) that is frozen by a special process. The temperature of such ice may be as low as -110 degrees Fahrenheit. That's pretty doggone cold, so you wouldn't want to attempt to handle it barehanded, lest you suffer a serious "burn." That's probably why you've heard of wrapping it in newspaper. Actually, the newspaper is a good idea for a couple of reasons. It protects the hands when handling the ice, and provides insulation to slow down the melting process. Dry ice is kind of neat in that it turns directly from a solid to a gas as it melts, so there's no sloppy mess to contend with. When wrapping it in newspaper, use a section with several layers to provide better insulation, thereby slowing down the melting process.

How long a given piece will last in a cooler is hard to say. It depends upon how large and how well insulated the cooler is, as well as the amount of food stored in it. Also, whether the cooler is in the sun or shade, and how often it's opened.

Now, for the part you probably didn't want to hear. Dry ice will likely freeze any food that is in the cooler with it. For this reason, it is generally used to keep food frozen while transporting it, rather than keeping it cool. Frozen food that is properly packed in dry ice, with pieces on the top and bottom, will stay frozen for quite a while; maybe as long as four to five days.

Offensive backfield set for season Scrimmage big test for Warriors

Today is the first real test of how far the Ruidoso High School football team has come in two weeks of practice. The Warriors will host Portales High School and Cathedral High School of El Paso in a scrimmage at 3 p.m. There is no admission charge for the scrimmage. Ruidoso has built its squad up to 56 players and head coach Darrel Stierwalt is

pleased with the way the team has progressed so far. "We're just about set in the offensive backfield," Stierwalt said. "We still have some juggling to do in the offensive line but we'll get there." Junior Billy Woodul is set to go at quarterback. Scott Neal, who quarterbacked the squad last year, will go at halfback. Chris Lopez should start at

fullback while Grady Williamson, who has been nursing a pulled hamstring, is at flanker. Stierwalt also praised the work of senior Lon Nunley. "We're trying to get the fundamentals down pat so that when these guys get to high school they'll know them." The Braves do indeed have a tough schedule. White Mountain opens its season September 19 with a home game against Mountain View of Roswell. They also play Sierra of Roswell and tangle with Tularosa twice. Games against Capitan and Carrizozo round out the schedule. White Mountain will continue to practice once a day until the season begins. The Braves practice each day from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m., at their school.

Besides, teams would be more likely to forfeit the game rather than to actually go out and lose it on purpose with a deliberate error. Deliberately throwing the game on the field would be a moral blow to baseball's image.

However, let's not lose sight of the real aim of modern-day baseball teams. They're out to make money, just like any other business.

While most of the local football attention is centered on Ruidoso High School's varsity prospects, the Warriors' junior varsity has lined up a whale of a schedule.

Conference on Aging set



Lt. Governor Roberto Mondragon will speak on the state program for the over 150,000 senior citizens in New Mexico.



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
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
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
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The Silver Lining

Jimmie is one of the most friendly and helpful fellows you could find anywhere. And we wish him many happy returns of the day, and all God's blessings.

The Return Of "The Juneau Kid"

One of the nicknames I like best was given to me by the one and only Gib Munro, a native New Mexico boy, whose life reads like a story book.

Gib calls me "The Valdez Kid."

I was talking to him about our brother Lynn, who was on his way home from the city of his birth, Juneau, Alaska. There are two "returns" here: He went back to Alaska after — let me see — about sixty-one years. Then he is now, from the latest I hear, on his way back, or already home at Dripping Springs, outside of Austin, Texas.

I said to Gib, "Shall we name my brother, Lynn, 'The Juneau Kid'?" and he said, "Yes, let's do that." So that is settled.

Lynn was born in Juneau, November twenty-eight 1916, after we went back to Alaska from "The States" where we had

been visiting Grandpa and Grandma Kennedy in Denver; and Grandfather and Grandmother Storm in Los Angeles.

Our father, Lynn W. Storm, was mine superintendent at the Alaska, Juneau gold mine, just up Gold Creek from where we lived.

Those were happy days with Lynn, Joe, Mark, myself and John growing up in Juneau, one of the most colorful little capitals in the world. And I am anxious to hear what Lynn has to say about the first one of us to make the journey back to the land of our birth.

Gib Has Background In The Northland

Although born in the little village of Central, between Hurlley and Silver City, Gib Munro's story reaches into the northland.

His great grandfather Munro, was a physician who came from Inverness, Scotland, to Saskatchewan, Canada, in the early eighteen hundreds. His grandfather, Hugh James Munro, came south and settled in Golden, Colorado, where he worked for fifty years for the D. and R. Railroad.

Gib's father, George Hugh Munro, was born in Golden, Colorado, in 1877. He became a prospector, one of that picturesque and indomitable class of men made famous by Zane Grey in his great book "Wanderer of the Wasteland."

After prospecting all over Colorado and Arizona, he came into New Mexico where he met his wife-to-be, Juanita Patron Gutierrez, in Tularosa.

After growing up in Ysleta near El Paso, Gib attended Texas A. and M., and left to become a B-17 Bomber pilot in World War II. He flew a complete tour of missions from England.

Later he went to Colorado A. and M. where he earned a degree in forestry.

There are many interesting chapters in Gib's Story which we will go into later, but one thing is particularly interesting, his grandmother on his father's side Emma Lolla Gilbert, went to school in Hannibal, Missouri, with the immortal American writer, Mark Twain. One of her favorite brothers was named Nathaniel, so she gave Gib his baptismal name: Nathaniel Gilbert Munro.

He is married to the former Ellibather Quinlan, a charming lady. Both are active in the Episcopal Church in Lincoln County. Gib is a partner in the Jennings Oil Company, Ruidoso.



Court decides United States can lease migratory fowl habitat

Federal acquisition of habitat vital to the millions of migratory ducks which breed in North Dakota every year can continue as a result of a decision recently handed down by the United States Court of Appeals in St. Louis, Missouri.

The court decided in favor of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, which had sued the state of North Dakota in 1980, charging that bills passed by the state legislature in 1977 violated federal statutes protecting migratory birds.

"This decision represents a significant victory for wildlife and wildlife habitat," said Thomas Tomasello, attorney for the National Wildlife Federation (NWF), which along with the North Dakota

Wildlife Federation, an NWF affiliate, had filed a friend-of-the-court brief on the side of the government. "It establishes the important precedent that states cannot enact legislation which would eliminate the Fish and Wildlife Service's ability to implement national wildlife programs. Specifically, the decision allows the Fish and Wildlife Service to acquire prairie pothole habitat in North Dakota, thus protecting it from further agricultural development."

The Migratory Bird Hunting Conservation Stamp Act protects migratory birds by providing funds from the sale of duck stamps to hunters for the acquisition and preservation of their habitat. The Fish and Wildlife Service now owns about

768,000 acres of prairie pothole easements in North Dakota, purchased from willing sellers. Under the leases landowners may not drain these areas during the duck nesting and breeding season. The Interior Department agency stopped acquiring easements in July, 1977, after North Dakota passed legislation limiting the duration of the purchased easements and requiring gubernatorial consent before any additional easements could be purchased. It is this legislation which the Court of Appeals found to be illegal.

Prairie potholes are depressions in the land left behind when the mammoth glaciers which blanketed the northern Great Plains during the last Ice Age melted. Potholes are found over thousands of miles of central Canada, and about three million acres of the Dakotas and Minnesota. According to Tomasello, thousands of these potholes in the United States have already been drained and the land converted to agricultural use.

"Potholes provide habitat for all kinds of prairie wildlife, but millions of migratory ducks could not survive without them," he said. "Almost 50 percent of all North American ducklings are hatched in the pothole region. These prairie wetlands prevent flooding in years of heavy rainfall, and provide farmers and ranchers with important forage crops. They also act as buffers against water pollution. This decision will allow the Fish and Wildlife Service to purchase enough prairie potholes to meet the needs of the nation's migratory waterfowl."

The eighth judicial circuit served by the federal appeals court in St. Louis includes the United States district courts of Arkansas, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska and the Dakotas. Unless overturned by the United States Supreme Court or successfully challenged in another area, the court's ruling becomes, in effect, the "law of the land."

Jockey Buehrer likes Perseverance's style

If horses could pick movie actors as heroes, Perseverance would select Rodney Dangerfield.

Why? Because where Dangerfield and Perseverance are concerned, whatever they do fails to gather respect.

"He shouldn't go off at such a big price (mutuel odds) all the time," said Per-

severance's jockey Wayne Buehrer. "He's well bred. By Hempen out of an Easy Jet mare. Besides that, he's running better than ever."

Still, the three-year-old gelding paid \$35.20 for winning his trial race last Friday for Sunday's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

In each of his six races this season,

Perseverance has never been a wagging favorite. Nevertheless, Perseverance has a chance to gain the \$350,000 winner's share when he meets nine of quarter horse racing's finest three-year-olds this Sunday.

The 440 yard chase is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses. It is the country's richest race for sophomore quarter horses.

"He's a horse who requires a lot of training. We train him like a thoroughbred. He gallops around two turns. It's about a mile and a half. That's a lot for a quarter horse," Buehrer said.

"He's a hard horse to ride. He's longer in the back than you'd like. He can't gather himself quickly enough, so I sit on him to get him to run the last part of the race. The horse needs the full quarter mile to run. That's his best distance."

Buehrer, who has been aboard Perseverance in all but one of his six Ruidoso Downs outings, cited trainer Phil Garrett as a major force in the gelding's success.

"Phil has done wonders with him," said the 33-year-old rider. "He's just been super with the horse. A lot of people would have turned him out. He's had leg problems and most of the credit goes to Phil."

Buehrer labled the Hempen gelding as the best quarter horse he's ridden. And no wonder.

He's won one race with two seconds this season for earnings of \$25,262 for the owners, Bar Lazy B of Colony, Oklahoma.

Perseverance qualified for the Rainbow Derby and ran a respectable fifth to Higheasterjet in that event and then was fourth, despite severe trouble at the break, in a World's Championship Classic trial race to Bold Love, who won the Classic on August 2.

Still, Buehrer quickly names Higheasterjet as the horse to beat. The Pine's Easter Jet gelding is fourth on the all time list of quarter horse money winners, had the fastest qualifying time (21:67) for the Derby and could become quarter horse racing's first millionaire by winning.

"You've got to go with Higheasterjet. He not only had the fastest time, he also won the most impressively (by 3 and one-fourth lengths). We can't make a mistake against him," he said. "That's why he's undefeated this year. So far, he hasn't made a mistake and he keeps on winning."

"He was right up alongside a horse I really like (Lucks Gay Chic) in the trials. He made it look easy. He's definitely a race horse."

Buehrer also termed Easily Smashed and the California Invader Queen For Cash as two threats.


"But just to get in a race like this, you need a real race horse," he said. "They're all capable and justifiably are in this race. That's why we run the races. We hope we can outrun the fastest qualifier but we won't know until after the race."

Despite riding for several years, Buehrer said the magnitude of the All-American Derby still impresses him.

"This will be the richest race I've ever ridden in," he said. "Everyone thinks about the big purse and the big race. I don't care who they are. But after I'm on the track, I don't worry about anything else except the race. It's an occupation. It's the one I love. It's a business and I treat it as such."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Here's the latest McCaffrey scenario on how the New Mexico Legislature avoids redistricting itself.

(Note how this plan, like all those previously mentioned, works to the benefit of the Republican party, which really runs our Legislature, while allowing the dumb Democrats to believe they are in charge.)

Step one: Legislators make a "good faith" effort to decide how to split the state into equal districts in early 1982.

Step two: No acceptable division being found, one or another member of the Legislature discovers that the text of the amendment to the Constitution adopted in 1976 says the Senate shall consist of "not more than" 42 members, while the House shall consist of "not more than" 70 members.

Step three: Everyone acts surprised about that fact (including lobbyist Odie Echols, who introduced that language).

Step four: A constitutional amendment is put in to ask the people to designate the exact number of members they wish in each house. Until it is adopted (earliest date possible, November 1982), all further action is of course deferred.

Step five: All districts are left exactly as they are until the people of New Mexico have their full chance to express their opinion in the balloting on the Constitutional amendment next year.

It is obviously impossible then to change any district lines until that voting on the amendment is done — which leaves the Republican party the deciding factor in everything which comes before the Legislature until after the fall of 1984.

Democrats, not being by and large too swift, go along with all this because it allows them to keep their present seats for another two years. They are good at short-

term solutions; long-term ones elude them.

Have you noted the relative demise of that once-noted candidate for Republican nomination to the governor's post?

We refer, of course, to Maxie Anderson. At one time, many people in New Mexico (led, it was supposed) by Manuel Lujan, were in the cheering section for this man, demanding that he grace that race by his presence.

Because he is a super-rich former Texan, it was hinted that we could not find enough poor present-day New Mexicans to run for our local top job. He had to be drafted.

Now our Maxie (whose first name even is a diminutive) is not being talked about so much.

He has told us his conditions. First of all, he has to sell his mining company — which is not too likely with conditions in the mining business nowadays.

What's more, even after that happens, we simple citizens of New Mexico are expected to sit by and wait for his candidacy till he has flown around the world in a balloon.

Well, you may hold your breath waiting for that particular epiphany if you want, but this poor soul, who feels we don't particularly need Maxie, won't do so.

Those who seriously want to be elected to office, as we see it, should be serious candidates, not dilettantes whose hobbies come before day-to-day living.

INFLUENCE OF WORDS

Having recently witnessed a discussion among several persons which began pleasantly but ended in near chaos as the result of poor communication, I am prompted to speak out on the art of communication.

One must remember the personal factor in any conversation. Since approximately fifty-percent of the average person's time is spent in some type of communication, it must be important.

The extent to which a communication will be accepted depends upon the extent to which the speaker is trusted and respected. Since words and their use in communicating ideas seem to have become the chief means of a successful life, it is necessary to give consideration to our speech.

The type of discussion over which disagreement generally occurs is the efforts of a person trying to convince or influence another. This type discussion involves selection of words, actions and the manner in which one conveys his thoughts. It must be a two-way conversation. Each must feel free to speak. Conversation or lack of it can cloud and obscure the intended meaning. It is possible to translate our thoughts and ideas in such a way as to give a pleasant and vivid picture to the listener. A communication bluntly put may give the listener an emotional reaction, and he may not get the main idea at all. The listener may be motivated by bringing into the conversation his ideas and experiences, and by the speaker's listening attentively to what he has to say. Listening is a major part of the art of communication.

It is easy to suspect that some important elements of education are missing since we do deal more and more with words, and day by day they do become more important. Better human relations may be instigated by the better use of words. Since we spend most of our waking hours in communication, the intake and outgo of words fills our lives and deserves consideration.

Recognition or notice of the person to whom communication is directed is important. One must speak directly to that person, and not above or around him.

Regardless of how carefully one weighs words or modulates voice if the person being addressed does not like or respect the speaker he will either close his ears or misinterpret what is being said.

Ralph Waldo Emerson, (oft considered the Father of American Literature) once said, regarding speech, "What you are sounds so loudly in my ears that I cannot hear what you say."

It is my belief that 90 percent of personal problems are the result of poor communication. Let's not forget to listen!

Meantime, without ammunition, the candidates prattle on. Prattle on to the extent that the voter could care less who is running for governor in 1982.


It would appear that members of the state House and Senate would get a message from this voter apathy.



Joe Martinez enjoyed a productive weekend and thereby earned Jockey-of-the-week honors for the third time this season.

Martinez rode five winners during the four days and captured Sunday's \$22,599 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby aboard the rapidly improving Round Table Top. He also tallied three seconds and three thirds from his 22 mounts.

That boosted Martinez from fifth to second place. Despite arriving late at Ruidoso due to prior riding commitments, Martinez had impressed patrons with his riding ability.

He has only 168 mounts, the second lowest mount total of any top ten rider. Still he has a winning percentage of .176.

Jacky Martin, meanwhile, remains the runaway leader in the jockey standings. Martin has 67 wins, a 34 victory margin over Martinez.

The Arkansas native also has 56 seconds and 37 thirds from 270 mounts. His winning percentage is .248.

Other top ten riders include Richard Bickel, W. R. Hunt, Leroy Coombs, Willie Lovell, Stuart Dolphus, Pedro Benitez, Steve Harris and Wayne Buehrer.

In the trainer standings, Johnle Goodman retains his lead for the second straight week. Goodman has 34 triumphs with 7 seconds and 6 thirds from 11 mounts. His winning percentage is a remarkable .306.

William F. Leach, who was displaced from his season-long top spot a week ago, remains the runnerup. He has 33 victories with 22 seconds and 14 thirds from 169 mounts.

Other top ten trainers include Jack Brooks, Clifford Lambert, Bob Arnett, J. Doyal Roberts, Harold E. Nolen, Gerald Marr, C. Dwayne Gilbreath and Marilyn Asmusen.

Racing continues Thursday for the next-to-the-last weekend of this summer's 70 day Ruidoso Downs campaign.

Friday's highlight will be the All-American Derby Consolation at 440 yards. The winner will earn \$30,000 from the total purse of \$146,000.

Saturday's feature will be the Ruidoso Sprint Championship at six furlongs. The purse will be \$17,000-added.

The All-American Derby, with a gross purse of \$1 million will top Sunday's card. The third leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds will be run at 440 yards.

The winner will earn \$350,000 from the country's richest race for three-year-old quarter horses.

The four-day All-American Select

Quarter Horse Yearling Sale will begin next Monday at 10 a.m., in the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds. A record 964 quarter horses have been catalogued for this

prestigious sale. Morning sessions beginning at 10 will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The Thursday session will begin at 7 p.m., so as not to conflict with the horse races.

State Fair parade office open

Another sign that the New Mexico State Fair is coming up soon is the fact that the parade office is now open for business at fair offices in Albuquerque.

posse, under Chief Bob Johnson, handles all details of the parade. H. H. Hooten is parade chairman for the posse.

Joyleen Vaiss is in charge of the parade office, which is open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday to accept entries and provide information on the parade.

There are seven categories for entries: officials; sheriff's posses and riding clubs; school bands and/or marching groups; organizational bands; organizational marching groups and twirling groups; mechanized units, and commercial.

Parade entries close on Friday, September 11.

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THE CURRENT HANDLE at Ruidoso Downs, after 61 race days and 795 races, is \$33,430,163, the current daily wagering average is \$548,035 and current wagering per race is \$42,050. At the same time last year the handle was \$29,645,359, wagering average \$485,969 and per race wagering \$38,154. The daily average is up 12.77 percent and per race wagering up 10.21 percent over last year.



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

Track employees take life saving instruction

Twelve employees at Ruidoso Downs Race Track have been trained in a skill which has nothing to do with racehorses.

It's a skill which could be far more important.

It's a skill designed to save lives.

The technique is called cardio pulmonary resuscitation. For short, it's referred to by its initials: CPR.

In the event an emergency arises — either among track patrons or employees

— those trained in the technique can step in and provide the critical, immediate life saving measures. Those first few minutes, until professional medical help arrives, can mean the difference between living and dying.

According to Dr. Don Simms, one of the track physicians, CPR is a "basic life support technique which helps the victim's heart pump, and helps supply air into the victim's lungs."

The technique is based on massage of the chest to stimulate the heart, and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to restore breathing.

According to Dr. Simms, two principle occasions when victims need CPR assistance concern heart attacks and food obstruction.

"There are many people alive today because someone learned the CPR

technique," Dr. Simms said.

The CPR training covered one two-hour session per day for three days. The instruction was given by Judy Tyson, registered nurse at Ruidoso Honorio Valley Hospital. The assistant instructor was Marianne Atcheson, R.N., the track nurse.

Track employees who received their CPR certificates are Vance Farrel, T. L. Watts, Joe Paxton, Sandy Gladden, Richard Paul, Ronnie Summerow, Hal Yoder, Roy Mayo, Douglas Houseton, Manuel Telles, Roy Dose and Jerry Warf.

Also included in the first graduating class was Kerry Gladden, 12-year-old daughter of Sandy Gladden. Sandy is the All-American Turf Club manager.

Another class in CPR training is being held this week, with another dozen track employees taking part.

Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

TEXAS OWNED HORSES dominated the finals for the \$1 million All-American Derby this Sunday at Ruidoso Downs. Texans owned seven of the 10 fastest qualifiers from last Friday's 12 time trials and Oklahomans owned the other three. The Derby offers the winner a purse of \$350,000. It is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses and is also the country's richest race for three-year-old quarter horses.

THIS 440 YARD DASH, in its eighth year, attracted the winners of the first two legs of the Triple Crown. Easily Smashed, an Easy Jet colt, won the Kansas Derby on May 24 and Highsteerjet won the Rainbow Derby on July 5. Highsteerjet had the fastest qualifying time with a rapid 21.67 reading, which is also the fastest clocking at the distance this season.

EASILY SMASHED had the fourth fastest time in the trials with a 21.86, despite running second in the second heat to the swift filly, Rule The Deck. Highsteerjet and Love Poem are the only two Derby runners who ran in last year's \$1,200,000 All-American Futurity. Highsteerjet won while Love Poem finished last. Ironically, those were their positions, according to the trial times. Highsteerjet had the fastest while Love Poem had the 10th fastest.

THE COMPLETE LIST of Derby runners and their qualifying times include Highsteerjet (21.67); Queen For Cash (21.78); Rule The Deck (21.83); Easily Smashed (21.86); Native Tea (21.93); Shiver Me Timbers (21.93); Explosive Native (21.98); Perseverance (21.97); War Sea (21.99); and Love Poem (22.00).

THE FIRST POST position must be special for Highsteerjet, who seeks to become quarter horse racing's first millionaire in Sunday's All-American Derby. He qualified for last year's All-American Futurity from the first post position, won the All-American from the

one position, won the Rainbow Derby this year from that position and then earned a berth in the All-American Derby from the first post position during Friday's trial races.

JOHNIE GOODMAN was the only trainer saddling two horses who earned Derby positions. He had Highsteerjet and War Sea. War Sea, a War Chic gelding, had the ninth fastest qualifying time. He's won one race with two seconds and two thirds this year for earnings of \$10,297.

THE FASTEST THREE winners on Saturday's program broke from the tenth post position. Mr. Zips Bunry (\$3.50) took the first under Pedro Benitez. Tomimora (\$6.00) won the second under Jacky Martin while Moon Dial Six (\$4.00) captured the third under Joe Martinez.

IN STEWARDS' RULINGS:

— Trainers Hoss Inman (twice) and Larry Morris were each fined \$50 for entering a horse without an owners' license being registered with the New Mexico State Racing Commission.

— Jockey Willie Lovell was fined \$50 for failure to have control of his mount, Tiny Herpen, away from the starting gate during the 8th race on August 21.

TRAINERS Billy Hitt, Clifford Lambert and William F. Leach each qualified two horses for the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity on September 6. The race, at six furlongs, carries a purse of \$112,010 with the winner earning \$56,005. Hitt qualified Shesgottobeadandy, who won Saturday's first trial race and Spanish Spade, who captured the fifth trial race. Spanish Spade won the \$40,120 Rio Grande Futurity while Shesgottobeadandy ran third in that six furlong stakes on August 9. Lambert qualified Big Bad Tune, who was second behind Shesgottobeadandy and Pocket-purse, who won the second division. Leach qualified Luckily Smashed, who ran second in the third trial race and Jack The Knife, who won the fourth trial heat. Other

entrants include Bagdadible, who won the sixth trial race; Miss Gross, who ran second in the fifth trial race; Western Series, who won the third race and Noddintown, who was second in the sixth division. All trial race winners automatically earned berths in the futurity while four of the six second place horses gained positions by winning a special drawing held Sunday morning.

RENE GOTTIATE, who tallied a two and one-fourth length victory in Saturday's 12th race at 570 yards, finally snapped his losing streak. He had competed in 17 races before he won the chase for \$5,000 claimers. He was ridden by Don Howard. The three-year-old Rene Depot gelding is owned by Jerry Rheudasil and Joe B. Turner of Lewisville, Texas. He's trained by L. Larso Lovell.

RACING SECRETARY Donald Rausch has announced the last five stakes and handicaps have each been increased by \$2,000. Saturday's Ruidoso Sprint Championship is now a \$9,500-added event, the Brigand Handicap is a \$14,500-added event, the Ruidoso Mile has been boosted to a \$27,000-added race and the Ruidoso 550 Championship has been increased to \$12,000-added. Rausch has also boosted the purses for the allowance and higher grade claiming races. The total overnight purse distribution for the meet's final five days is \$325,000, for a daily average overnight purse distribution of \$65,000.

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Prismatic artist at D'Oros Galeria

Special Effort syndicated for \$15 million

Special Effort, the undefeated colt who stands a big chance of winning the Quarter Horse Triple Crown, has been syndicated for \$15 million.

The announcement was made by Don Tyner, the well known thoroughbred and quarter horse agent of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Tyner put the syndication package together for the colt's owners, Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas.

The \$15 million deal makes the Special Effort syndication the biggest in quarter horse history, so far as horses in training are concerned. The industry's all-time syndication record was the \$30 million package Tyner pieced together on the sire, Easy Jet.

Tyner announced the details of the

Special Effort syndication at Ruidoso Downs on Saturday, where he and his staff had assembled to wrap up final details.

"The syndication went together smoothly," he said. "They literally lined up to buy a share. We started with an invitational list of 100 names — the finest and most prominent owners in the quarter horse industry. With only one or two exceptions, every person on the list bought into the syndicate."

Attesting to the industry enthusiasm whipped up by Special Effort is the fact Tyner and his crew signed up all syndicate shareholders in only nine hours. The task was broken down into a three-hour session at the Pacific Coast Yearling Sale in California, and two three-hour sessions at Ruidoso Downs.

Special Effort, with only one out to his record (a victory at Gollad, Texas), shipped to Ruidoso Downs at the start of the season as the property of Allen Taylor of Beeville, Texas, and Mrs. Inken Willis of San Antonio, Texas. The colt set the top qualifying time for the \$787,350 Kansas Futurity, the first leg of the Triple Crown.

On the eve of the Kansas Futurity, Special Effort was purchased by the Urschels for \$1 million. That was the highest price ever paid for a quarter horse in training. Special Effort won the Kansas Futurity by a length, then came back to set the top qualifying time for the Rainbow Futurity, the second leg of the Triple Crown.

Special Effort then won the Rainbow by 1 1/2 lengths, earning \$232,536 out of the

gross purse of \$567,380. Only one other horse, Tiny's Gay (1974), has won the first two legs of the Triple Crown.

On August 13, Special Effort boomed to a 5/4 length win in the first round of the All-American Futurity trials, and that triumph put momentum into the idea of a syndication deal prior to the All-American Derby.

Each share in the syndicate cost \$100,000. There are 150 shares. A hundred were sold, and fifty were retained by the Urschels. The terms of each share were \$10,000 down, \$10,000 on December 15, and \$20,000 per year for four years (plus annual interest of 14 percent).

Each share is worth one breeding per season to Special Effort. The syndicate members do not share in any of the colt's track winnings.

Tyner indicated the Urschels plan to race the colt at least through next summer, aiming at the three major three-year-old races — the Kansas Derby, the Rainbow Derby and the All-American Derby.

Special Effort faces the biggest crossroads of his meteoric career at Ruidoso Downs, when he joins 131 other two-year-olds in the time trials for the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity. In order to earn a starting slot in the Labor Day finale, a colt must record one of the top 10 fastest times over the 440-yard course.

If Special Effort wins the All-American Futurity, Tyner estimates the colt's value would double to about \$30 million, which would put the value of each share in the \$200,000 range. He said one syndicate

owner, a few days after paying \$100,000 for a share, turned down an offer of \$150,000.

A key precedent for the high powered syndication of Special Effort is the financial appreciation experienced by the owners of the stallion, Dash For Cash.

"The original shares on Dash For Cash sold for \$82,500," Tyner said. "Today, the value of each share is in the \$800,000 to \$750,000 range."

Tyner, a sparkplug for many of quarter horse racing's biggest financial dealings, recently engineered the sale of Go Effortless, the dam of Special Effort, for \$1 million. Go Effortless was bought by Ken Tureaud, owner of Saket Petroleum Company, of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The \$1 million price, Tyner said, is the highest ever paid for a quarter horse mare.

Jockey tells how he managed Round Table Top's derby win

Joe Martinez didn't want to sound conceited. He also didn't want to say he told you so.

Still, after Round Table Top's front-running two and one-fourth length victory in Sunday's Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby at Ruidoso Downs, he couldn't help repeating what he had told friends all week.

"I might sound stupid and like a braggart, but I said all week this horse can run some," the happy jockey said after he led throughout the mile and 1/16th affair which drew 10 qualifiers from last week's

two trial races.

"I blew him out a half mile yesterday (Saturday) and he came off the track bouncing. He really felt good," he said. "I felt like this colt was going to run a great race."

Despite breaking from the tenth post position, Martinez had the Secondary Market colt in front from the start. He quickly moved over to the rail to save ground.

Down the backstretch, he felt a challenge from Fill Mackis Cup and the odds-on favorite Glover D.

"When Glover D. came up to me on the backside, I thought he's (Round Table Top) going to run second. But then I saw Richard Bickel's horse, Glover D. start to

fade. I looked around and nothing was coming and I said I had it then," Martinez said.

"I thought I had a pretty good shot going into the race. Everybody said Glover D. was the best horse, but I knew my colt could run. I didn't know how fast he could run and neither did he. I knew they were going to have beat him the way he felt all week."

Round Table Top was only making his fifth lifetime start. Martinez had won twice previously on him, including a one length win in the Derby trials last week. He defeated Glover D. who was fourth, by 12 lengths.

"I don't know how good he is and he doesn't either," Martinez said. "He really hasn't been tried yet. The colt felt like a champion to me."

Jockey praises Rule The Deck

Jack Wallace clearly pinpoints two reasons for the success of Rule The Deck.

"I think it's her breeding and her trainer. That's the reason she does so well," said the veteran rider who has been aboard the filly in all her Ruidoso Downs races.

Rule The Deck will get a chance to earn the biggest paycheck in her 18-race career when she faces nine foes in Sunday's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The Derby, with a \$350,000 prize to the winner, is the third and final leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses. The 440 yard dash emphasizes speed and endurance — both qualities of Rule The Deck.

"She's (Rule The Deck) by an excellent stud (Scout Leader) a thoroughbred which puts the extra distance in her," Wallace said. "Plus she's out of a good mare (Mar Deck), who I won the State Fair Handicap (in Albuquerque) on a few years ago. She has a lot of late speed."

"But you also have to give much of the credit to R. D. Hay, who trains her and his wife, Doris, who is such a hard worker."

I've ridden for them for more than 20 years and they're the backbone of why this horse runs so good. They're real nice people and he's just an excellent trainer."

The New Mexico-bred filly has won four of eight starts this year with one second for earnings of \$44,385. She's owned by Dick Jones, a law student at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

To indicate her tremendous speed, she raced to a 21:88 clocking over 440 yards, a 99 speed index, while winning a trial heat for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic. She ran fifth in the finals, beaten by just 3/4ths of a length.

Despite her ability, Wallace termed Rule The Deck somewhat difficult to ride.

"She's hard to ride, but it kind of helps to know her," said the 45-year-old jockey. "To get her away from the starting gate, you have to kind of hold her together. She's a big long-striding horse. You have to keep her picked up. She's not that much different from other horses."

"Most of the good quarter horses have a tendency to drift. She tends to drift out or lug in. I kind of check and make sure I'm keeping her as straight as possible."

Keeping quarter horses on a straight course is nothing new to Wallace. He's been riding almost 25 years and has won such memorable races as the 1965 All-American Futurity aboard Savannah Jr.

"I'm used to riding in them all (major events), but I still feel different about big races," he said. "I start thinking about a

stakes race a day or two ahead of time and I concentrate on it. Almost any rider riding a stakes race either consciously or subconsciously thinks about it. You more or less psyche yourself up for the race."

"No matter how many times you've ridden the horse it never runs exactly the same. You have to be prepared to cope with whatever comes up. You can't freeze up and ride every one the same. If they should lug out, you have to be ready. You must be prepared for any variable."

Still, the Ruidoso Downs resident cited Rule The Deck for her consistency.

"She's not only one of the fastest fillies I've ever ridden, she's one of the fastest horses period. I like her real well. She's got a good disposition," he said.

Rule The Deck had the third fastest qualifying time of 10 entrants with a 21:83 reading. Wallace, however, termed Higheasterjet, as the horse to beat.

Higheasterjet is unbeaten in four races this season, including a win in the Rainbow Derby, the second leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds. He had the fastest qualifying time, a 21:67, which is also a season's best at Ruidoso Downs.

"Higheasterjet does it so easy. When he throws a good race, he's hard to beat and he's thrown a good one each time out. I also think Easily Smashed (who won the Kansas Derby earlier this summer) will run as good or better than the others and he's definitely the next horse you have to worry about," he said.

So what will it take for Rule The Deck to upset the two favorites?

"She's capable of winning, but she must run an outstanding race to win. I've won a Futurity, but I've never won an All-American Derby. It would definitely be a highlight in a person's life to win both races," Wallace said.

Special Effort attracts horse owners

Last fall, a momentous thing happened to Allen Taylor, the pipe line contractor from Beville, Texas.
"I was at the horse races at Laredo, and this friend of mine — trainer Doug McMullen — handed me a Polaroid shot of this yearling," Taylor said.
McMullen backed up the photo by saying something like: "This yearling's for sale and they want \$20,000."
Taylor, a fellow who isn't apt to back away from a promising deal, looked at the photo and like what he saw. The conformation was there. Maybe this yearling could turn into a runner. But what's the breeding? McMullen said: "He's by Raise Your Glass. The mare is Go Effortlessly."

The poets will say a light flashed in Taylor's cranium, a flow of energy moved through his soul. Divine inspiration fell on his like a cool, summer breeze. Maybe so. But all Taylor knows is that he liked the thoroughbred stallion, Raise Your Glass, and he's always had a weakness for the mare, Go Effortlessly. "She was just a mediocre stakes mare," he said. "She never made any real money. But I'd watched her run all through her career, and she had a lot of heart. I figured she could go a distance — 440 or 550 yards. She was a good, solid mare."
So Taylor reached for his wallet, peeled out \$1,000 and handed the cash to McMullen. "Give this to the colt's owner as earnest money," Taylor said. "I'll take a

look at the colt in two or three days, and then decide whether to buy him."
At the time, Taylor had no idea he'd soon be buying one of the great properties in quarter horse history. Within a few months, the acquisition of this colt was to reap a staggering profit, and the colt's value was to keep on soaring.
This colt, as everyone now knows, is Special Effort. He's undefeated in seven starts, he's won both the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities at Ruidoso Downs, and he's now aimed in the direction of the \$1,530,000 All-American Futurity. If Special Effort wins the All-American, he'll become the first millionaire in quarter horse history, the first Triple Crown winner, and his value will take another

crazy lunge — perhaps up to \$25 or \$30 million.
But Allen Taylor's roller coaster ride on Special Effort didn't last long. He got aboard quickly, without much fanfare, and he got off early in the journey — with his pockets loaded with cash. But he's quick to say: "No, I don't feel as if Destiny cheated me out of anything. When I decided to sell Special Effort, it looked like a hell of a deal. I'm a businessman. When someone offers you \$1 million, you have to go for it. Sure, I wish I had the colt back. But I don't feel like a dummy. If I had a chance to do it all over again, under the same circumstances, I'd still sell the colt."
But getting back to the beginnings of the story

After handing over \$1,000 in earnest money, Taylor called his good friend, Johnie Goodman. (Taylor explains: "I've been running horses for 15-20 years, and Johnie has trained every horse I've had. Johnie's a great trainer and a great friend.")
Three days later, Taylor and Goodman went over to Seguin, Texas, and looked at the yearling. The owner was Allen Moreing, whose business is the raising and selling of quarter horses. Moreing also owned Go Effortlessly, the colt's mama.
Goodman looked at the yearling and said: "He looks like a runner." That was all Taylor needed to hear. ("Johnie and I — we don't do a lot of talking," Taylor said. "Sometimes, we'll buy a horse, just on impulse. There's no need to talk it over much.")
Taylor peeled out another \$19,000, handed the money to Moreing, and the yearling was his. That was it. The biggest horse deal of his life was sealed in a minute or two.

of other people, too. One fellow came up and offered to buy a half interest for \$250,000."
But Taylor wasn't interested in taking on another partner.
So the colt was shipped to Ruidoso for the trials for the \$767,350 Kansas Futurity. He won by nearly five lengths and set the top qualifying time of 17.90 seconds.
Next comes another key chapter in the Special Effort saga — the arrival on the scene of Dan Urschel, the high powered sportsman who's become something of a John D. Rockefeller of the quarter horse industry. If Urschel likes a horse, he buys him — and hang the cost.
A day or so after Special Effort qualified for the Kansas Futurity, Goodman put in a call to Taylor. "Urschel's interested in buying Special Effort, and he's talking in the \$700,000 to \$800,000 range," Goodman said. "What do you think?"
Taylor said, responding typically, "If he gets up to \$1 million, call me back."
Another day or so passed, and Taylor's phone rang again. This time the ante was raised to \$1 million. It was an offer few men could resist — especially since the payout for the colt million was spread out nicely to reduce the tax bite. The details of all this were handled by Goodman on behalf of Taylor, and by the hotshot agent, Don Tyner, on behalf of Urschel.
The whole crew, including Urschel, got together at Taylor's place in Beville on the eve of the Kansas Futurity, and the pact was consummated. All loose ends were

As this reporter gets the picture, the colt was syndicated for \$15 million. There are 150 shares, and 100 shares, at \$100,000 each, were marketed in jg time. Urschel retained 50 shares. Each share is good for one breeding per year. The syndication apparently does not affect the colt's racing career, and the money derived from it.
Taylor said, in wrapping up his estimate of Special Effort, "I don't mind saying I've never seen a horse improve as much as he had. There's no way of knowing how good he really is. Everytime you start him, he looks two lengths better..."

Since then he has had numerous hits, many awards and citations and countless bookings all over the world.



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
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
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
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
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
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
