Village eyes Natural Gas Company purchase

Ruidoso trustees Tuesday authorized a feasibility study to help determine whether the village should purchase the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company, on Carrizo Creek Road.

Meeting in executive session following adjournment of the regular meeting, the trustees decided to engage local engineer Willis E. Umholtz to do the study, village manager Jim Hine said Wednesday morning.

Hine noted that the owners of the company were honoring the right of refusal granted to the village in the original franchise ordinance, governing the sale of the gas company.

The feasibility study will include the

amount of pipe, size of lines, rate structure and distribution system of the company, said Hine. No selling price for the company has yet been discussed, he added. Umholtz will be paid a fee not to exceed \$6,300 for his services, according to Hine.

Another topic of discussion during the executive session was the lease of the village swimming pool at Schoolhouse Park to Ralph Rush. Rush allegedly failed to comply with terms of the lease, which went into effect earlier this year. The matter was turned over to the village attorney for disposition.

During the open segment of the meeting, the trustees approved the sale of \$1.5 million in general obligation bonds to Kirchner Moore and Company of Denver, Colorado, at an effective interest rate of 11.69708 percent. The interest bid was the

lowest of three received by the village.

Revenue from the sale will be used for street work, renovation of the police station and acquisition of land and construction of a fire substation or stations.

The trustees also adopted ordinance 81-21, which defines mobile homes and buildings. The ordinance defines as mobile a building designed to be moved, as opposed to a building that is designed to sit on a permanent foundation, said planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp.

A yearly fee to the village of \$300 was approved for beer and wine licenses for restaurants. The trustees took the action after hearing a report from local restaurant owner Cliff Anderson. According to Anderson, owners of eight of the 15 restaurants eligible for the licenses have indicated they wish to apply, and

three others have expressed interest.

Anderson noted that although the state has set fees for the licenses, very little other information has been sent out. The state fee is \$750 per year, plus \$100 for Sunday serving, plus \$150 application fee, he said.

Areas in which restaurateurs seek guidelines, Anderson stated, include whether food must be ordered with beverages and what the required age of workers will be.

"We are honestly in a complete state of limbo at this time," he said. Asked whether he thinks a \$300 local fee is equitable, Anderson said, "I do." A public hearing on the proposed fee must take place before it becomes effective.

Also at the meeting, trustee Sherman Atwood voiced a concern about the Ar-

chitectural Review Advisory Committee (ARAC), saying he has heard numerous complaints about it.

"Apparently there are some very dictatorial powers being used," he said. Atwood mentioned sign color as an area of complaint. "If we have one or two people in this town trying to cram earth tones down people's throats, those one or two people should be removed," he said. It was pointed out that ARAC is an advisory body only.

Planning and Zoning Commission member Mike Mulholland suggested that Atwood's concerns might be based on unfounded rumors. Atwood said that he plans to check further.

In other business, the trustees approved ordinance 81-20, annexing 279 acres of land in the area of First Christian Church.

Finally, the trustees heard a request for greater involvement on their part in the operation of the Counseling Center by director Tom Harper. Trustee George White volunteered to serve on the center's board.

Schools set staff reduction plan

Tuesday night's Board of Education meeting got off to a humorous start when some White Mountain Middle School teachers showed up, dressed as monsters, a scrubwoman, a box, a school nurse, the Lone Ranger and a couple of flashers.

The group sobered up, however, in carrying out board business. Adoption of reduction in force policy dominated part of the meeting, highlighted by a presentation from Bob Palko. The policy was drawn up in the event that there may be more teachers than the number of students merit in the Ruidoso school system.

"The advisory council recommended we adopt this policy now before the need arises," said Palko. It is hoped that establishing a policy now will take the "subjectivity out of the reduction and take a more objective approach if the situation arises," said Dave Parks, board president. The policy states that the board must

prove it is necessary for a force reduction. A drop in enrollment alone is not a justifiable reason for reducing the number of teachers, according to Palko. Order for reduction would start with certification, then tenure, followed by seniority and finally education and degree. Anyone released from teaching because of reduction in force would be re-hired in a reverse order.

If a teacher is released because of a reduction in force, that fact will be recorded in their file, according to the policy.

"The time to adopt this is when it's not a pressing matter because when it is, it gets emotional," Parks said.

However, members of the board say the situation should not arise in the Ruidoso school system in the near future. In the superintendent's report, Pat Valliant reported enrollment in the four schools is

1,484 students, which is 28.5 students over the estimate (kindergarten students are counted as .5).

Also approved at the meeting was a call for bids for a double-wide portable classroom building to be used as an addition to White Mountain Middle School in easing classroom over-crowding.

"It's desperately needed," said Sid Miller, Mid-School principal. "One new building is lovely, but two sure would be nice. I know that's not possible, though."

Call for bids on fleet insurance was also approved. The bids will be opened at a January 1982 meeting, since the current contract expires in February. "This is just housekeeping," Parks said.

Resignation of Pebble Moore, special education teacher at the Mid-School was accepted as well as the hiring of four new staff personnel. These include Beth Powers, replacing Pebble Moore; Cynthia

Geyer, to teach fourth grade at White Mountain Elementary School; Gena Johnson, aide for Nob Hill Elementary and the high school to help non-English speaking students; and Cathy Palmer, special education aide at the high school and Nob Hill Elementary.

In other business, the board approved: —Transfer of funds from the Building Construction account to the Purchase of Land account to use in paying such things as surveying and drilling on the site of the new high school.

—Board meeting dates for calendar year 1982.

—Authorization of the superintendent as the official representative for the filing of Public Law 81-874 application for the school year 1981-1982.

The board's next meeting is November 10, at 7:30 p.m., at the White Mountain cafeteria.

Cable TV rate hiked at Downs

Following much discussion, some rather heated, the Ruidoso Downs trustees finally approved the resolution for the Cablevision of Lincoln County rate increase.

Under the franchise in effect for Cablevision service in this area, Ruidoso acts as the "mother" city for the

surrounding area, which includes Capitan, Ruidoso Downs and Alto.

When the franchise was first accepted by Ruidoso, it was the "intent for areas served by Cablevision to follow rate increases that Ruidoso approved," according to Paul Crown, Cablevision manager.

"Well, I would like to be shown where it says in this franchise agreement that we have to accept an automatic rate increase. I've read it three or four times and I can't see it," said trustee Bob Power.

The agreement does state that Cablevision will not raise the rates for Ruidoso Downs any higher than the in-

crease imposed upon Ruidoso. "I don't want to sound bullish, but I'm not down here for you all to accept it. The original intent of the contract was that it would be automatically accepted and I just want to get it straight on the records,"

Lodger's Tax group sets advertising plan

Lodger's Tax Committee (LTC) members Tuesday dealt with specific itemization and line item approval by the village trustees of funds budgeted to the Chamber of Commerce for tourist promotion.

Ed Hyman, LTC chairman, expressed surprise that when the \$48,000 anticipated annual budget for the Chamber was presented to the village this year, "it went through without discussion. We were set up for line item approval," he said.

It is his understanding, Hyman said, that the planned advertising funds, submitted to the village, "in arrears," on a quarterly basis, are "subject to the recommendations," and to "tentative," not "line item approval" by the trustees.

The committee approved a motion to

"provide assistance to the Chamber of Commerce, subject to presentation, every three months, to the village for its approval," with specific itemization to ensure against "duplicating some requests."

A question raised by some (himself excluded), LTC treasurer, Al Junge, said, is whether lodger's tax funds should be spent on local advertising, with the local media, given the fact that Ruidoso's only radio station is owned by the LTC chairman, and that the local media might consider promoting the community as a public service.

Hyman, owner of radio station KRRR, responded to questions of favoritism.

Frankly, speaking for myself—and I think I can speak for the newspaper, too—I don't give a damn (for the advertising fee)."

In other action, the committee: —agreed to authorize \$2,000 per diem to state police for extra police protection for Aspencade;

—approved a request by Ed Jungbluth, Chamber of Commerce executive director, for \$20,000 to be budgeted for 1981-82 ski season advertising;

—granted approval of \$8,000 1981 Aspencade advertising budget.

—heard an opinion from village manager, James Hine, on the possibility of obtaining a list of area lodgers who either

are not collecting a lodger's tax, or whose taxes are delinquent.

A tax, Hine said, "is a sacred thing," and the village is only "an advisory board."

Collecting delinquent lodger's taxes, is "in litigation in the courts now," Hine said.

Not only that, but the state legislature has decided the lodger's tax is a separate fund, Hine said, and "is putting it into the general fund."

LTC member, Pinky Jones, said when lodgers started collecting Lodger's funds tax and using them to advertise this community, it reflected directly on the gross income in this community."

High School band in competition

Ruidoso High School band has been practicing daily in preparation for the fifth annual "Parade of Champions" this Saturday in Las Cruces.

The event, sponsored by New Mexico State University's Pride Marching Band includes competition among 17 high school

Flores is assisted in directing by drum majorette Pam Stone and Joe Kemery, student teacher from Eastern New Mexico University.



'With heartfelt thanks'

Charles M. Schulz, creator of the comic strip PEANUTS, expressed his thanks to the thousands of readers and well-wishers who wrote cards and letters to him after his recent heart surgery.

Schulz has had a practice of answering in some fashion all the mail he received from PEANUTS fans, but the recent volume proved too large to handle.

In a statement sent to the 1000 newspapers worldwide which carry the comic strip, Schulz wrote:

"Dear Friends:
I have been deeply touched by the many, many cards and letters which readers and school children have sent to me since my heart surgery, and I very much regret that it has been impossible to acknowledge most of these wonderful greetings.

Therefore, if you will forgive me, I should like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude for all of the kind messages you have sent.

With heartfelt thanks,
Charles M. Schulz"

When Schulz went into the hospital on September 2, his readers seized the opportunity to tell him how much they care.

Cards and letters arrived by the boxful—get-well greetings from across the United States and around the world.

Many came from school children. Schulz received hundreds of hand-drawn and hand-painted correspondence. Some were huge murals expressing sentiments with cut-outs of the PEANUTS characters and hand-lettered messages.

Well-wishers also chose the telephone to convey their support to Schulz. Calls came in from as far away as Australia, Africa and England—everywhere the PEANUTS strip and news story about Schulz's operation reached.

One call came from closer to home, Washington, D.C. President Ronald Reagan called Schulz while he was in the hospital and later sent a plant.

With Schulz following his doctor's recommendation to rest and walk a mile a day, he will be back at his drawing board in several weeks.

And that's about all his well-wishers and fans could ask for.

UNM doctor will head international radiologists

Dr. Robert D. Moseley Jr., chairman of the radiology department at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine, has been named president elect of the International Society of Radiology (ISR).

In his new position, Moseley is in charge of organizing the 10th International Congress of Radiology for an expected 15,000 participants in 1985. He will become president of the society at that meeting in Hawaii and serve until 1989.

Moseley said the ISR sets world standards of radiologic safety, education and measurement. The group is also investigating the results of cancer therapy worldwide.

Since 1973, Moseley has served as the chief delegate of the United States in the international society. He had been an alternate delegate for about 10 years prior, he said.

He was named president elect at this year's international congress in Brussels, Belgium, which was held under the patronage of King Baudouin I. Moseley was presented to Queen Fabiola at the opening ceremonies.

Wherever the congress is held, the host country's head of state is invited to attend. Accordingly, said Moseley, the president of the United States has been invited to the Honolulu meeting.

Crown said.
Crown continued, saying the "public file" is already two increases behind. Essentially, Ruidoso Downs can't refuse the rate increase, according to Crown.

"What are we beatin' this thing to death for, then?" said trustee Dan Shaver. The resolution was passed soon afterwards with trustees Shaver and Lois Beavers voting in favor of the resolution while trustees Power and Harold Mansell voted against it. Mayor Wheeler broke the tie by voting yes to approve the resolution.

Trustees indicated they might be interested in changing the franchise agreement so they would not have to follow Ruidoso's decision.

"Anything Ruidoso gets, we have to eat. I'm tired of it," Shaver said.

In order for Ruidoso Downs to first get Cablevision, they had to agree to follow Ruidoso in any pay hikes to make it economically feasible for the company to lay down cable in the Downs area.

In other business, the Trustees discussed Ordinance 81-7 which is a renewal of a 25-year contract for Continental Telephone of the West, pending approval at the October 28 meeting.

Also discussed was a resolution to increase the budget to allow purchasing radio equipment for the Ruidoso Downs police and fire departments.

Previous specifications on items needed for fire department equipment were sent to the State Fire Marshal, but they were not authorized. When the resolution is drawn up, it will ask for approval of the trustees to increase capital outlay from the general fund to pay for the bulk of the equipment. It is estimated the city will save \$12,000 or \$13,000 if they buy the equipment outright without a lease agreement.

Mayor Wheeler announced that the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) has scheduled a water supply construction meeting for October 27 in Albuquerque.

paneled cabin with kitchenette which sleeps 12, for \$150 a night.

Village trustee, Benny Coulston, who spoke at the luncheon, expressed his admiration for lodgers. "You people have got to be the most patient people in the world, to sit with those businesses seven days a week — and to put up with some of the things you do."

Coulston said he "has a lot of faith in Ruidoso," despite his problems with

"two very precious commodities" — the limited amount of deeded land available for purchase in New Mexico — and water.

But water, Coulston said, is a serious problem "all over the country, not just in Ruidoso."

Although the village five years ago passed a water improvement bond, he said, not a whole lot can be done when "Eagle Creek is just a poor watershed." Unfortunately, Coulston said, "Mother Nature just does not have it rain past the Swiss Chalet."

Calvary unit on bivouac at Bonito Lake



Mid-School students learning exercises

Jumping up and down, shaking their arms, loosening the neck muscles, forward rolls and head stands are a few of the

things White Mountain Elementary School students do three afternoons a week when John Eberle comes to visit.

Eberle, director of the Ruidoso Gymnastics Academy, donates his time from 2:30 Monday, Tuesday and Friday af-

ternoons to help supplement the students' physical education program.

"This has been done in a number of fields before," Eberle said. As an example, he said Elaine Garrity has taught an exercise class at the school. "I

knew they needed help at the elementary school," Eberle said. His daughter, Sarah, nearly three years old, often participates during these sessions.

Eberle has been director since last November. He and his family had been living in Albuquerque where Eberle was working for a steel company.

"I really liked my job and it paid well, but this is what I've always wanted to do," Eberle said. Originally from Chicago, Illinois, Eberle attended the University of New Mexico (UNM) in Albuquerque where he received a full athletic scholarship for his gymnastic ability.

"When I graduated from high school, I was third in the state of Illinois on pommel horse," he said. He was offered several scholarships but chose to attend UNM because the gymnastics team was fourth in the nation and there was an Olympian on the team.

In his fourth year at the university, Eberle was eighth in the nation on pommel horse. "I never really had dreams of being in the Olympics," Eberle said. To compete in the Olympics, a person needs to qualify

in all six men's events and Eberle said he would not have been good enough in all events.

After college, Eberle returned to Chicago to take the job with the steel company. "We didn't like Chicago, though. We liked New Mexico — the climate is more temperate," Eberle cited other reasons they decided to move back.

Eberle had wanted to start his own gymnastics club, but said it takes a lot of money to get such a project going. "The basic equipment alone can cost \$25,000," Eberle said.

So the set-up in Ruidoso appealed to him when the job was offered last November.

Major responsibilities of Eberle's job are to coach his team along with teaching beginning and intermediate gymnastics classes. Recently, he has offered a boys' class.

"I have 45-50 kids enrolled in that class and will probably end up with 75-80." However, Eberle limits individual class sizes to ten children per instructor.

Eberle said most of the youths in the gymnastics program are girls and he attributes this to the fact that there are

more sports in which boys may be involved.

"I encourage kids in our program to be involved in other sports. Not everyone likes gymnastics," Eberle said.

His main objective in donating his time in teaching the elementary students is to expose the children to physical education.

"I would like to see the elementary school get a physical education program going. I think P.E. is very important. I want to expose these kids to gymnastics and P.E. because they can learn things that will help them in other areas," Eberle said.

His purpose in teaching the White Mountain students is "not a sales pitch. It's to expose them to P.E. If a by-product of this program is getting some of the kids interested, then great," Eberle said. He doesn't tell the children in the class that he has an academy, but if one of the students asks him about taking lessons, he tells them to have their parents call him.

"Athletics teach goals, morals... not to win at all costs. I just wish we had more time to spend with the kids," Eberle said.

Around Sports with Gary Brown



Last weekend was full of surprises as far as professional and college sports were concerned.

The college football scene saw Arizona stun top-ranked USC, surprising Wisconsin (which may be the surprise team of the entire season) top Ohio State and disappointing Notre Dame fell to Florida State. There were countless other upsets but the above three were probably the most noteworthy.

Wisconsin's 4-1 record this season is especially gratifying to see. In past seasons the Big-Ten has been virtually a two-team league (Ohio State and Michigan) with Purdue making infrequent stabs at topping the main powers. However the Badgers' rise this season gives indications that the Big-Ten may be coming a more balanced conference. Wisconsin hasn't been to the Rose Bowl since 1963.

While the colleges were having more than their share of upsets the National Football League had a few surprises also.

San Francisco's 45-14 crushing of Dallas tops the list. The 49ers have two All-NFL defensive players they didn't have last year (linebacker Jack Reynolds and defensive end Fred Dean) and their defense is 200 percent better than it was last season.

The New York Jets edged a New England squad that continues to be the biggest disappointment of the entire league 28-24 and Minnesota nipped San Diego 33-31. The Vikings' win was surprising since Minnesota has never done well against AFC clubs and the Chargers have been favored to win the Western Division of the AFC, probably the toughest division in the league. But perhaps the biggest surprises were reserved for the major-league baseball playoffs.

Oaklands three game sweep of Kansas City was probably the biggest surprise. Many people thought the A's would get beaten easily by KC but the A's pitching and the brilliant managing of Billy Martin proved to be too much for the Royals.

Montreal's winning the NL Eastern crown (beating Steve Carlton twice in the process) and the Dodgers' rally to top Houston for the NL Western title were other surprises.

Many people have felt Carlton was the best pitcher in the game and the idea that the Phillies could lose with him pitching the final game was absurd.

LA beat Houston at its own game, pitching. Even with Don Sutton out, I thought the Astros would win their division. But the Dodgers proved they're not a has been team as many observers felt they were before the season started.

Upsets keep sports interesting. Let's hope there are plenty more of them in the next few months.

If Ruidoso High School's football team continues undefeated and wins the state 3-A title the Warriors may be the only school in the state to win state championships in three different classes.

Ruidoso won the state title in 1955 and 1957, (as was mentioned in The News last Thursday) competing in class C. Since then new class divisions have been started.

and the Warriors moved up to AA play to win the state title in 1972.

Athletic director Doyle Howell was the coach then and current head coach Darrel Stierwalt was an assistant. Howell was named Associated Press Coach of the Year, quarterback Blaine Williams was picked as Back of the Year and Ken Perryman was named Lineman of the Year.

The Warriors defeated Jal 12-6 for the championship and reversed the decision of a year before when Jal beat Ruidoso 21-6 for the state crown. Ruidoso was 10-1-1 for the 1972 season, losing only to Tularosa (26-21) and tying Socorro (14-14). Ruidoso took a hard fought 14-10 victory over Kirtland Central in the semi-finals.

A state championship in the AAA division was especially notable since Ruidoso, with an enrollment of around 475, is competing against schools with student bodies up to 1,200. In fact, Silver City (defending 3-A champion) is on the verge of passing the 1,200 mark and going into the AAAA class.

It's a bit rough to pick the National Football League rankings this week since everybody except Philadelphia has lost at least one game and not many teams seem able to take charge.

So the Eagles are still first. They're the only team to be consistent throughout the first six games. Coach Dick Vermeil has accomplished wonders when one considers the amount of injuries to running backs the team has had.

Denver is second, largely because they've been able to win even when they don't play well. Like in Sunday's 27-21 win over a crippled Detroit team.

Put Buffalo third, mainly because they looked excellent in defeating Miami and they have one of the better defensive units in the league.

Los Angeles is fourth. The Rams are coming on now, regardless of who they play at quarterback. For years LA has had one of the deepest squads in the NFL and they've always been tough where it really counts, the offensive and defensive lines.

San Diego is fifth but it's a timid fifth. The Chargers have been awful defensively and you don't win championships that way. The SD offensive power and the fact several traditional NFL powerhouses are down this year puts the Chargers high.

Honorable mention status can be given to any number of clubs. Slumping Dallas must be given consideration as should Houston, Tampa Bay, San Francisco, Atlanta, Kansas City, Miami and Cincinnati. The Dolphins dropped way down because of their loss to Buffalo and their defense has given up over 1,400 yards in the last three games.

Two things should be mentioned. Dallas plays LA and Philadelphia in the next two games and the Cowboys need to win both games to stay in hot playoff contention. If Dallas loses to the Eagles any hopes of a division title could go down the drain. Philadelphia is already two games ahead of the Cowboys.

Although the Eagles stand a good chance of winning the NFC Eastern title they won't win the Super Bowl. They still have some limitations talent-wise and Vermeil's coaching ability may work against him like it did in last year's Super Bowl. If he overworks his team again they'll come up short.

Unbeaten Ruidoso favored to continue string Warriors, Tularosa renew big rivalry

What is so special about a Ruidoso-Tularosa football game?

It's generally regarded as one of the best high school rivalries in the state. It's a natural rivalry between two towns 30 miles apart that love their football.

And the rivalry has been intense despite the fact that Tularosa has a 18-6-1 edge over the years.

So when Ruidoso travels to Tularosa for a 7:30 p.m., game tomorrow both teams will be sky high for the encounter.

The Warriors won 14-0 last season for their first victory in 11 years and will be a solid favorite to win their second in a row tomorrow night.

Ruidoso is 6-0 on the season (1-0 in district 3-AAA action) compared to Tularosa's 4-2 mark and 0-1 record in district play. The Warriors have scored 132 points and given up just 33, boasting one of the top defensive units in the state.

Despite Ruidoso's statistical advantage and better record Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt expects a tough game.

"They're (Tularosa) always a tough defensive team," he said. "They're well coached and are a physical ball club."

"I'm looking for a defensive game," Stierwalt said. "Both teams are good at it and the kicking game should also be a critical factor in the outcome. Intensity could also help determine the outcome."

Tularosa, which was an upset 13-7 loser to Deming last week, has good depth but has been hurt by injuries, particularly to its running backs.

"I've had five or six running backs alternate this season," said Wildcat coach Bob Cerny. "However, they've been injured off and on so I've had a different lineup practically every week."

Greg Silva is one of the best Tularosa running backs and is also a standout at defensive back. Other running backs include Jack Mabel and Mike Chavez. Piffi Martinez, Bill Mendoza and Samuel Lounas go at fullback. Lounas is also a standout at middle linebacker. The 5-10, 175 pounder, is one of the better defensive players in the district.

Chris Cerny, son of the coach, is the quarterback in Tularosa's power-I offense. The team is oriented to a ground attack and coach Cerny may try and alternate all his running backs.

Defensively a pair of 200 pound tackles, George Lester and Albert Armijo, give the Wildcats size up front. They, along with Lounas, anchor a Tularosa defense that has given up just 12 points a contest.

Experience is another plus factor for Tularosa. They have 11 starter backs from last season, several of whom went both ways. The Wildcats have decent depth with 40 players on the squad.

However, the Warrior stack up favorably to Tularosa at almost every position, particularly on defense.

Ruidoso gave up a touchdown last week in its 20-8 victory over Cobre and that was the first touchdown scored on the defense since the second game of the season.

The Warriors have no weaknesses on defense. Lon Nunley at middle linebacker

is certain to repeat his all district mention of last season and perhaps make all state this time around. With Byron Wright and Kyle Flack on the outside lineley helps make up possibly the finest linebacking trio in the state's 3-AAA division.

Ruidoso has lots of depth in the line. John Montoya, Darluis Rad, Ken Bradley, Bud Smith, David Swalander, Robert Swanner, Craig Carson and Ron Bell have all logged considerable time up front.

Scott Neal, Grady Williamson, Darin Smith and Don Nunley are an experienced defensive backfield that seldom makes mistakes.

Offensively the Warriors should be able to move on the Wildcats, particularly with Neal in high gear after missing two games with a broken index finger. He ran for 156 yards last week.

Billy Woodul will again start at quar-

terback, and Chris Lopez will go at fullback, although Lon Lopez could also see some time there. Williamson will be ready to go at flanker although he suffered a few bumps and bruises from the Cobre game. Woodul will also throw to Rad at tight end and Darin Smith at split end.

The offensive line gave Ruidoso's backs some outstanding blocking last week. Swalander will again go at center. Wright and Bud Smith blocked well against Cobre and have been consistent all season.

Before Ruidoso's victory last year the Warriors last won in 1968 when they romped to a 34-6 win. Even the Warriors' great AA state championship team in 1972 fell to Tularosa by the narrow score of 28-21.

But Cerny knows times have changed and he figures his club will have a tough battle on its hands.

"Offensively we'll have to try and stop Neal first," he said. "Ruidoso has lots of other good players but he's the man we have to stop in order to slow down their offense."

"Offensively we'll just try and do what we normally do to score," he said. "We don't plan anything different but they're tough so we'll have to be ready."

NOTES-Ruidoso was ranked second in the Associated Press state AAA poll against this week, getting five first-place votes to 13 for top-ranked Artesia. Higland of Albuquerque is tops in the AAAA poll with Carlsbad second. Moriarty is first in the AA poll and Texico tops in the A poll while Carrizozo received honorable mention status.

"We played well, like we can, in the first set," he said. "However in the other sets we lacked concentration or something and couldn't get our game together. We probably lacked self-discipline in those sets. But the first set showed me what we can do and I think we've got a chance to

win the district."

Castanon praised Lori Morel for her play in the backcourt and Bridget Almagor for outstanding play at the net.

But the coach would like to see more consistent play from the whole team.

"I don't think everybody on our team has played well at the same time," he said. "Still I know what we're capable of playing and I'm optimistic."

The Warrior junior varsity remained winless as it fell to Tularosa in two sets, 7-15, 5-15.

Ruidoso hosts Deming in a 1 p.m., match Saturday. Deming defeated the Warriors in two sets the first time the teams met.



Rogers' mule set world's record for half-mile run

A local trainer had a very successful meet in last weekend's mule races, as her mules won a major event for three-year-olds and set a world record in an open race.

Gail Rogers and her husband J. B. own Rogers' Longears Ranch near Ruidoso Downs. Gail is a full-time mule trainer.

"I make every mule meet all around the

country — all year 'round," said Mrs. Rogers. This year, the mule circuit took her to California and all over Texas.

Racing closer to home last weekend, the Rogers' three-year-old, Cajun Queen, won the Long Ears Derby at 330 yards on Saturday. Then on Sunday, Rabanito won the Mule Skinners Stakes at one-half mile

in a world record time of 58.2 seconds.

Rabanito was ridden by Susan Anderson of Ruidoso Downs. The three-year-old, whose name means "little radiash," was coming off of a win in the Duke City Derby at Albuquerque the weekend before.

The Rogers stable will next race at Rawhide, Arizona November 12-15.

Operation Game Thief benefits from donations

Operation Game Thief (OGT) received \$980 from applicants who did not draw an elk license to hunt public lands this season.

Approximately 20 percent of the 5,000 unsuccessful applicants donated their license fee refunds to the cash reward program initiated to help curb wildlife law violations. The donations are tax deductible.

"Twenty percent—and almost \$1,000—is a good percentage considering this is the first year elk hunt applicants have had an opportunity to donate their refunds to OGT," said Dan Pursley, program coordinator. "If the State Game Commission elects to continue the unit management system for elk, the possibility of refund donations—and the public's awareness of the option—may increase revenues to Operation Game Thief."

The commission set the new unit management system to prevent over hunting and to help rebuild herds in popular elk areas of the state, according to Jack Herring, big game research biologist with the department.

"In recent years, any eligible applicant received an elk license," Herring said, "therefore, there were no elk license refunds to donate." Refund checks to those who did not donate to the anti-poaching program will be mailed soon.

As big game seasons get under way, OGT needs more cash in the reward fund, Pursley said. Last year, OGT paid out more in rewards to anonymous callers than in any year since the program was initiated in 1977.

"Peak season for OGT is generally November, when big game hunting is in full swing and we have a lot of hunters in the field to help watch for violations," Pursley said. "That's when the toll free OGT line is busiest, when the reward fund is drained the most, and when we need more revenue to carry us through the season."

In a two week period during last year's big game season, OGT paid callers in eight of 11 cases called in to OGT—73 percent. Usually, officers close about 25 percent of the OGT calls through arrest or citation. The eight cases involved illegal killing of deer and elk—the most common violations during peak season.

As Operation Game Thief becomes more

widely known, more people are reporting violations, Pursley said. "That increased number of reports will lead to an increased number of citations, arrests or convictions—and that means an increased number of payoffs. We'll need to generate more cash for the reward fund."

Operation Game Thief pays \$250 or more for information leading to arrest or citation in big game or endangered species cases, \$100 up for information involving illegal killing of small game, game birds or fish.

A toll free number—1-800-432-4263—is provided for caller's convenience—"and that number is printed on big game, bird and fishing licenses for those people out hunting who witness a violation," Pursley said.

Callers are not asked their names, and they are not asked to testify in court. Information needed includes as much of the following as possible: date and place of the violation, description of the violator and his vehicle, with a license number, type of violation, and place where illegally taken game may be hidden.

One of the most important details is a vehicle license number, Pursley said.

Hornbuckle loses Mid-Amateur

Playing on what he called "the most difficult course I've ever played on in my life" Tommy Hornbuckle of Ruidoso lost out in the first round of the United States Mid-Amateur golf championships match-play Monday at Belle River Country Club near St. Louis, Missouri.

Hornbuckle, who had shot a 73-78 to qualify for match play last weekend, lost to Lawrence Buckwell of Roswell, Georgia two and one.

"It was one of the worst rounds in my life," Hornbuckle bluntly said. "It just was one of those days. It was a hard course. The length and the fact it was hard for putting made the course so difficult. They were the fastest greens I've ever played on."

There were 150 golfers entered in the tournament, restricted just to golfers 25 years of age and older with a USGA

handicap of five strokes or less. 84 golfers qualified for match play.

"I was pleased with my qualifying score because of the toughness of the course," Hornbuckle said. "After all your score in qualifying isn't as important as the qualifying itself."

Hornbuckle was the only New Mexico golfer in the tournament. There were several golfers from Texas but most of the participants were from other parts of the country.


What plans does Hornbuckle have for the future?








2 RUBIA PICKED up the pace on the inside rail, as Miss Atascosco County, began lagging behind the forerunners, seemingly running out of steam at this point.






Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — If there's any way we can beat any part of the country out of any water, we ought to do it.

So here in New Mexico, cowboy hat in hand, coming on as part of the High Plains Study Council with all sorts of plans about how to beg or buy us more water.

Now, by and large, these are good plans — realistic, not grabby, even somewhat practical.

But will they ever come to pass? Probably not — for reasons we shall consider.

The current study, which really started as a plan for refurbishing the Ogallala aquifer on our state's eastern and Texas' western border, has many attractive aspects.

For instance, all we are asking of neighboring states like Arkansas (next door to Texas) is that they yield up surplus water, specifically the flood waters they obviously don't want.

We're even willing to admit water is a commodity, and to buy it.

Who could go further than that? But will those other states, the ones which get the excess water (there's seldom anything which meets that description here), be willing to deal with us?

Well, if you want to see how states cling to this most important product, all you have to look at is how New Mexico reacted when El Paso wanted to come across our state line and drill some wells on our soil to provide water for their town.

"No way!" we said, more or less with a single voice.

Admittedly, the case there is not exactly

the same, but there is a lesson to be learned. Nobody really wants to try to get along with the amount of water nature provides; nobody ever really believes his state has too much.

The Secretary of Agriculture for the State of Texas, who sat at the right hand of his state's governor at this meeting, said it well: "When the nation reaches the stage at which it needs food badly enough, the Congress of the United States might do what is needed to make this High Plains plan come into effect."

A Dallas television reporter asked, "Do we have to run right up on food crisis before that will happen?"

The answer to that question is "Probably yes."

Did Congress do anything about our energy crisis before we were in the middle of it?

Not so you'd notice it.

And unfortunately Texas Governor Bill Clements even ruined some of that scenario by admitting that if his state had more water, it wouldn't go to agriculture. It would go, he said simple, to Houston, where the people are.

Houston, needless to say, has no connection with the Ogallala aquifer, which the High Plains Council was originally organized to study.

Besides, the timing on this whole project, one of those massive works of their imagination dreamed up by the Corps of Engineers, could hardly be worse.

Even Jimmy Bush in the White House wanted to cut water projects. Imagine what the budget-choppers at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue will do in these times.

I want you to know how much I have enjoyed lovely Ruidoso! I spent a week there in June of this year, and could not believe the changes, since I was there in 1927.

I was 13 years old and am now 68. My home (in 1927) was on the Mill Iron Ranch near Dodson, Texas. I was ill with inflammatory rheumatism, and went to visit an aunt in cool Ruidoso.

I got on the train in Shamrock, Texas, some 50 miles from home, quite a journey to get to the train by car, and I was to arrive in Alamogordo, New Mexico, the following afternoon at 4 o'clock. For some reason the train did not make the stops we had expected, and when I arrived in Alamogordo about 8, there was no one to meet me. My aunt and uncle had gone to their home in El Paso, Texas, for fresh fruit and supplies to help me get well. They were Mr. and Mrs. Frank McConnell Jr.

The depot agent did not know what to do with a sick child, and I did not know how to call my relatives. We did not have a phone in our home in Dodson, Texas. My aunt and uncle learned from the depot agent that I had already arrived. The neighbor lived on the main road of Ruidoso and had a stand. They let me make and sell the things they made. One was a kind of hard candy on a stick and dipped in chocolate. It was out of this world, delicious! I was happy to wait on customers. One side of their cabin let down to make a counter, and they also served lemonade and a cherry drink, this was long before the days of Kool-Aid.

My vacation was cut short because of the ravages of rheumatic fever. (We called it inflammatory rheumatism.) In spite of this illness I am married to a wonderful man, and we have observed our 50th wedding anniversary. We have three children, eight grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Our daughter and husband have lived in New Mexico for over 20 years, and are teaching school in Eunice, New Mexico. They have a cabin in Ruidoso, and are great boosters for New Mexico, "The Land of Enchantment."

While visiting them in June I looked for land marks of 1927, enjoyed the signs of lovely churches, seeing the buses with J.O.Y. on the side inviting people to church. We also went to the "flee market", fabric shops, art galleries and a horse market.

There's still talk that Governor King may call a special session of the Legislature, possibly around Thanksgiving, to tackle the problem of redistricting.

We can't see, other than from the viewpoint of aspirants for seats in the Congress, where this is a monumental problem.

If our state legislators will simply follow county lines, east and west, cleaving the state into two districts of even population, with a slight adjustment to put Bernalillo and perhaps one other county adjacent into one district, the problem is solved.

The main thrust of aspiring politicians is against the incumbents: Senator Domenick and Congressman Lujan, from the northern portion of the state; and Senator Schmitt and Congressman Skeen from the southern portion.

Dividing the state north and south would leave the incumbents as primary targets of the opposition.

It would also leave Bernalillo, with the state's largest population area, as a Bernalillo district, from which the people could, as they do now, fight for their vested interests — which just might result in better representation for the newly created districts.

Political haggling to give some candidate a power base to further personal interest, through zig-zag district lines, might not be in the best interests of the electorate.

If enough voters lovingly advise their legislators that they want a fair shake out of redistricting, it's very likely the legislators will get the message — especially if they harbor political aspirations. —CD

Is there a doctor in the house?

When we lost Dr. Willie Horton many of us lost not only a friend but also the only doctor in general practice in Ruidoso. To those with everyday physical problems it meant in many cases driving to other towns for medical attention. This is necessary in spite of the fact that we have many doctors practicing in our Village. But almost to a man — these doctors are all specialists, neither equipped or soliciting a general practice of medicine.

What's the answer?

We need one or more doctors for general practice in Ruidoso and should do

whatever is necessary to encourage events to that end. Let's face facts — our local doctors (and dentists) cannot handle our present patient flow. Hours of waiting (if you can obtain an appointment) are not uncommon. Many patients are being referred to the Hondo Valley Hospital Emergency Room where proper treatment or diagnosis is inadequate and often expensive. Local general practice physicians would eliminate this unsatisfactory condition.

I would favor bringing into Ruidoso several doctors for general practice. To you who may read this letter — if you agree with the above please let me know as I intend to do whatever is necessary to accomplish this. If you agree please call me at 257-7615. Your call will be appreciated and will help to get the job done.





Sunland's nominations secretary adjusting to new role in racing

Jan Buehrer has the best of both worlds — she can utilize her office skills and still maintain a friendly relationship with Sunland Park horsemen.

In her first year as nominations secretary at Sunland Park, she handles the nominations and sustaining payments for the nine major futurities and derbies. She also supervises the four major thoroughbred futurities and derbies at Ruidoso Downs.

"I really like it a lot," said the 30-year-old wife of jockey Wayne Buehrer. "I like working with the people. It's a challenge. Mr. Mac (Finlay MacGillivray, Sunland Park's general manager) has been just super to me. So has Don (Racing Secretary Don Rausch) and all the office personnel."

Besides helping horsemen with the major Sunland Park races, she also uses her previous management experience. For two years, Jan served as executive secretary for the Michigan Quarter Racing Association.

"I handled payments, minutes and complaints. That has helped me a lot. And with Wayne riding here, it also has worked out well," she said.

For each important Sunland race, horses must be nominated and then each owner must maintain eligibility with various sustaining payments.

"I have to be sure the check is for the right amount. Then the checks are deposited. After they clear the banks, CD's are purchased, tear-apart forms are typed, the eligibility lists are made and then mailed back to the owners," she said.

"Thirty days from the time the nominations close, the list of nominees is sent to the New Mexico State Racing Commission."

She said it's almost impossible to determine the exact value of the major races this early in the season since many of the original nominees fail to enter the

trials. Some horses are injured, change trainers or are taken to other tracks.

However, she and Rausch estimate between half and 75 percent of the original nominees eventually enter the trials.

Despite the abundance of checks she receives, very few are returned from the banks.

"Not many of them bounce. It's very surprising. If they do bounce, their horse is dropped from the list and the names go to the stewards and they can take action," she said.

"Two problems I've had is that some owners don't mail their checks with certified letters. That way, if the letter is certified and they can show us proof they mailed the payment before the deadline, we can still accept them for the race, if the letter should be lost in the mail."

"Another problem is lots of horsemen think because they know me they don't have to get their payment in by the deadline. That's not true."

She has known the Sunland Park backstretch employees from her days clocking morning working workouts. Jan started her job last January after a request from Rausch.

"Don and Mr. Mac wanted someone here at Sunland who the horsemen could make payments to and someone to take some of the load off Dorothy (Dillard, Ruidoso Downs Nominations Secretary, who with Jackey Brewer, previously handled all

Sunland and Ruidoso Downs nominations)," she said.

"I assist Dorothy a little. She's definitely been a big help to me. She's done this for so long. Jackey Brewer (Ruidoso Downs sales secretary) has also been helpful."

"You have to understand horsemen because they're a special type of person. With Wayne riding, it's helped knowing them. You also have to understand you're going to put in a lot of weird hours. A lot of time, you're dealing with people who don't know anything about the races or payment schedules. They've just bought their first horse and they don't know what to do."

Besides clocking horsemen and working with the Michigan Quarter Horse races, she has been a groom and trainer in Michigan, Indiana and Ohio. She's trained horses at Glendale Downs in Hillsdale, Michigan; Beniah Park near Columbus, Ohio and Hoosier Downs in Southern Indiana.

While Wayne and Jan are already involved with horses, two younger Buehrers are apparently following the same course as their parents.

Daughter Marcie, 6, has been asking for a horse and son Mark, 9, worked for trainer Tony Fenack this summer cleaning stalls at Ruidoso Downs.

"It's going to take time for me to learn this job," Jan said. "But everyone has been so nice. I couldn't have had more help from horsemen."

I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

New Mexico has always been a leader in wildlife conservation and one of the many credits that has been bestowed upon New Mexico has been the initiation of Operation Game Thief (OGT). This sportsman version of "Crimestoppers" was launched on June 1, 1977, and has grown and been adopted by many other states since then. All the credit for the success of the Operation Game Thief program has to go to the dedicated sportsman conservationist of New Mexico, for without their contributions the program would have failed long ago.

The OGT program asks that any fisherman, hunter, camper, and citizen who witnesses what they suspect to be a violation of any game law, to call a toll-free number (1-800-432-4263) and report the information. Any caller may remain anonymous and they are assigned a special number to assist in any reward

payments. If the information leads to the arrest or citation of a game violator, the caller can receive a cash reward. All cash rewards paid come from those individuals and companies who have donated to the OGT program and this has been the basis for the continuing operation of a very successful program.

Many ideas have been initiated to promote the reward fund by private donations but one of the most unique ideas comes from Carlsbad where a local businessman, Harold Trinder, opened a "Game Thief Store." Trinder's thought was to open a non-profit store, ask the sportsman to donate various items, sell the equipment at a fair price and turn over all the proceeds to the Operation Game Thief reward fund.

In August the "Operation Game Thief Store" was opened in Carlsbad. Trinder received donated articles, some of which he reconditioned, and he was officially open for business. Those people who donate articles receive a receipt that provides for a tax exemption the same as if they were donating cash to any type of non-profit organization.

Of course Trinder's idea will only succeed if the public cooperates but it is innovative ideas such as this that has kept the OGT program strong in our state for the past four years.

Thanks to dedicated conservationists such as Trinder, the people of New Mexico can be proud of the wildlife conservation programs going on in our state.



Question: What can sort through 5,000 accounts and provide a status report on a given one in the blink of an eye? What can print at a rate of 300 lines per minute? What can teach a person how to operate it?

By now, it is clear that we are talking about something more than human. We are.

Answer: The Village of Ruidoso's new \$82,000 IBM System 34 computer.

Installation of the computer coincided with the opening of the new village administrative office building in July. A village utility rate increase went into effect at the same time, and the system was put right to work.

"We were all scared of this machine at first — just petrified," said billing department head Judy Franzer. But Franzer and her colleagues, Mary Wimberly and Bonnie Swenor, are fast becoming old hands on the computer.

One of the jobs routinely handled by the computer is customer inquiries. When a customer wants to know the status of an account, Franzer demonstrated, the computer is keyed into the inquiry mode and the account number is typed on the terminal keyboard.

The terminal viewscreen instantly displays a readout which includes water, garbage and sewer charges owed (if any), current and in arrears. If desired, a printout of the same information is ready moments later.

Payments of village utility bills are logged much more quickly with the system 34 than they were before, Franzer noted. "Three months ago, it would have taken us 11 hours to go through three bags (batches of payments)," she said, "Now it takes a little more than an hour."

Another advantage of the computer is a capability of handling two or more jobs at the same time. For example, one person can be inserting meter readings on one terminal, while a second keys in address changes at the other.

Although utility billing is the only village function now on the new system, there are plans to add others. Payroll, personnel, revenue summary and paving

assessments will soon be programmed, according to village manager Jim Hine.

The computer contains a detailed course in operation of the system. Sitting at a terminal, an employee can learn, study, review, take exams and be assigned credit.

Built-in safeguards in the computer make the operator's job easier. The machine repeats the instructions it is

given by the operator so that there is no mistake about what is to be done. A sample readout is: "You asked for cycle 07 to be sent to the billing file. If correct, enter yes to continue."

Another important safeguard in the system involves diskettes, metallic disks the size of 45 rpm phonograph records. A diskette containing everything in the computer's memory is kept at an employee's home. That way, in the event of something happening to village hall or to the computer's central processing unit, the department's records are safe. The diskette is updated each week.

Despite the awesome work and time saving capabilities of the system 34, the machine has not eliminated the need for plenty of time consuming, manual, human labor.

"We double check everything," said Franzer, "You can never check enough." That way, she noted, most mistakes are caught before bills go out to customers.

The computer prints the bills. Two copies go to the customer, said Franzer, and they should return one copy with their payment. The job of separating the perforated copies to prepare them for mailing is done by hand.

Franzer credited former village employee Cathy Uhr with choosing the

system 34. Computer consultant Jimmy Anderson of Hobbs, who programmed the new machine for utility billing, thinks it was "a very wise decision."

Anderson, who works with many different models of computers, called the system 34 "one of the best machines on the market today."

He also praised Ruidoso village em-

ployees for being very positive and receptive to the new system.

Three months after starting, Franzer and her fellow operators are beginning to feel at home with their talented electronic coworker. She was asked if they enjoy working with it.

"Oh yes," she said. "It's fascinating — we just love it."




