# Village may hire planner

Village manager Jim Hine told the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Monday that the village should be ready to hire a full time permanent planner by the first of March, 1982.

Hine was invited into the regular commission meeting to explain why he recommended to the village trustees October 27 that a proposal to hire a temporary planner under a one year federal program be abandoned.

He repeated to the commission what he told the trustees — that the leading candidate for the job had turned it down because he felt there was not enough work to justify a one year position.

Because several studies and reports have already been conducted — including a detailed water study, a report by planning consultant Eric Kelly, the Sierra Blanca Airport study and three different comprehensive plans — the candidate felt

that the existing data needed only to be consolidated and implemented, Hine said.

Conditions attached to the \$25,000 Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) grant that was to have funded the one-year planning position (with the village putting in \$8,333) were a factor in the decision to give up the idea, Hine acknowledged.

Commission member Alden Deyo had earlier said that the FmHA conditions "deny the existence of a master plan" for the village. Comprehensive master plans were published in 1961, 1970 and 1976.

Member John Schuller noted that in the conditions, "more social gatherings are called for than public meetings." He went on to say, "Their requirements were absolutely ridiculous."

Commission chairman Mike Waldron summed up the feeling of the commissioners when he told Hine that the members had felt the federal program might be a "good vehicle" toward getting a permanent planner.

"I think Ruidoso is five to 10 years

behind the time of needing a professional full time planner," Waldron had said earlier.

Hine acknowledged the lack of such a person. "In my opinion, the need is here — it has been," he said.

The village manager went on to point out the difference between a temporary planner, who would update existing plans, and a permanent planner, who would implement them. "If we haven't implemented three plans, what good is a fourth?" he asked. "They do their work and then leave."

"We need a full time planner — a person who can review everything from every standpoint — meet with department heads a month ahead (of a proposed development) being presented to the Planning and Zoning Commission."

He noted that a consolidation of village ordinances and resolutions governing development must be completed before the village can hire a planner. Village Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer

John Cupp stated Tuesday that the task of putting the ordinances in a "sensible, presentable form" is nearly finished.

Hine said Tuesday that besides proper coding of ordinances, capital improvement proposals and traffic circulation plan proposals should be finalized early next year, thus permitting the full time planner position to be acted on by March 1. He noted that the decision to fill the position rests with the trustees.

In other business, the commission: — Approved a correction in the minutes of the September 2 meeting confirming a rezoning of a lot owned by Elmer Pirelli to C-1 (light commercial) without restrictions.

— Approved a replat of Lot 79, Block B at Sleepy Hollow for Laverne Walkup after determining that the replat presented no encroachment problem.

— Approved a change in the final plat of Granite Place Condominiums, moving one building and breaking construction into three phases.

## Bank seeking charter to locate in Ruidoso

Alan Hunton, vice president and secretary of First City Financial Corporation, announced today that application has been made to charter a national bank in Ruidoso.

"We are enthusiastic about the possibilities of a new bank in Ruidoso," said Hunton. He announced that the organizers and proposed directors of the new bank are Reed H. Chittim, also proposed as Chairman of the Board; Joe P. Loving Jr., who is the proposed president of the new bank; Jack Daniels, R. M. Moran and Cecil Brown, William F. Mayton has been named as the proposed cashier and will be actively involved with

the organization of the bank.

The proposed bank has an option on the property located at the northwest corner of Mechem Drive and Rio Arriba Road, near Forest Lawn Cemetery.

The application is being processed by the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, and a definite answer is expected sometime after the first of the year. Officers of First City Financial Corporation expressed high hopes for the acceptance of the application, and expressed their desire to provide the residents of Ruidoso and the surrounding

## Clarifier authorized for sewage treatment

The Joint Use Board (JUB) Monday approved the purchase of a primary clarifier for the Regional Wastewater System (RWS).

The primary clarifier filters sewage as it enters the RWS treatment plant, separating solids from sediment. The flow is then funneled through the secondary clarifier for final filtering.

In suggesting the purchase of the primary clarifier, project engineer Quinton Daniel, Alamogordo, noted that available RWS funds total \$7,315,253 and that the project cost is pegged at

\$7,156,872, leaving \$158,381 that is unallocated.

The approximate cost of the clarifier is \$140,000, Daniel said, which will leave close to \$18,000 for the village to use for reseeding the area surrounding the new treatment plant.

"You will need it (the clarifier) anyway within about five years," said Daniel. He estimated the cost of the piece of equipment could increase 12-15 percent per year.

# 'We Are Family' Warrior gridgers geared up for Silver City

"We Are Family" was the theme of the Pittsburg Pirates in their world championship season two years ago, and the song would serve as well for the 1981 Ruidoso High School (RHS) Warriors.

The feeling that the RHS players and coaches are one big family was expressed by many of the 17 seniors on the team who were interviewed on the eve of their biggest game ever—Silver City Friday night.

"We think of each other as family—we're all very close," said fullback and defensive end Chris Lopez, son of Joe M. and Grace Lopez. Chris is one of six Warriors who have played football for Ruidoso all four years of high school.

His freshman year, 1978, was also the first year as head coach for Darrel Stierwait. That year, the team had a record of one win and eight losses. In succeeding years, they improved from 3-7 to 7-3 to this year's outstanding 8-1.

Lopez attributes the improvement to the way the team practices. "We have a good time, and you've got to have fun at what you're doing," he said. "This gets everybody in a good mood and wanting to work harder."

Chris hopes to continue his education beyond high school. He is interested in computers and agriculture.

Mark Mobley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Mobley, is another four year veteran. He plays defensive back.

Mobley named sportsmanship as a valuable lesson he has learned playing football. "If you can get along with your rivals, it will help you later in life," he said. Mark plans to attend college in Colorado, to study business and compete in skiing.

Scott Neal, who alternates between quarterback, tailback and safety, is the son of Doyle Neal and Patricia Hall. This four year player noted that while it took the coaches a while to turn the program around, record-wise, they changed the attitudes of the players from the start.

"When they showed they cared about us, we showed something in return," he said. Scott plans to study physical therapy and psychology in college. He listed Old Dominion and Washington State as his top choices of schools.

Lon and Don Nunley are the twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. L. Ray Nunley. Lon, a middle linebacker and fullback, is a four

year letterman. Don, at safety and tight end, has played three years.

Asked what he has gotten out of playing football, Lon said, "A lot of self respect—and respect for other people. Football has taught me to fight back when I'm down, when I'm losing."

Lon plans to play college football, possibly at Arizona State or San Diego State.

Don, who says he may have a try at college football while studying business, noted that playing for Ruidoso has taught him to study harder.

Darin Smith, son of Lawson and Sonja Smith, plays split end and cornerback. Smith, along with Don Nunley and junior quarterback Bill Woodul, attended a quarterback/receiver camp in Bakersfield, California, last summer.

The practice of catching over 1,500 passes in three days paid off. Smith caught a game-winning touchdown pass against NMMI, and Nunley made a TD reception last week against Truth or Consequences.

But Smith, who plans to major in art at college, pointed to the support the Warriors give each other after mistakes as a major factor in the team's success. "Everybody says 'that's all right, we'll get 'em next time,' and that helps a whole lot," he said.

Another four year gridder for the Warriors is Ric Pearson. Ric, at offensive tackle and offensive end, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard A. Pearson.

"You learn a lot about life," was Ric's observation about football. "If you want something, you have to work for it." Pearson plans to study chemistry or oil technology at Texas Tech.

All of the Warrior seniors expressed confidence going into the Silver City game, and four year veteran Dariush Rad said it this way: "I think we're at our prime right now—and we're gonna tear 'em up."

Rad, at tight end and linebacker, is the son of James and Shirley Furth. Dariush listed discipline, physical stamina and mental awareness as the benefits he has received from football. He plans to study dentistry and music in college.

Ronald Bell is a three year player. The defensive tackle is the son of Bertie Bell. Bell, who said football has increased his strength and kept him in shape, wants to attend a technical-vocational school after high school.

Ken Bradley, who plays tackle on both offense and defense, is the son of Wayne and Mary Bradley. His mother is Sandy Jones.

Bradley said that he has a lot of respect for the Ruidoso coaches, who work for three hours after the players leave practice. "Stick with things—don't quit," is what he said football has taught him.

Ken plans to study architecture or petroleum engineering at either Texas Tech or Lubbock Christian.

Peter Garcia, the son of Ray and Berna Garcia, transferred to Ruidoso this year from Mountainair. The tailback and safety noted that he has played more here than at his former school, where the coaches thought he was too small. Here, he said, ability counts.

"What they let me do—it makes me put out more of what I can do," he said. Pete plans to attend hair styling school, then go on to college.

Jack Holland, son of Nancy Holland, played defensive end for the Warriors but was injured in the third game this season.

"I just wish I could play more," he said. Holland has had two operations on his knee, but he feels that his three years of playing were worth it.

"It's really changed my attitude about everything," he said. "It's given me more of a winning attitude." Jack plans to study medicine at Oklahoma University.

John A. Montoya, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Montoya, is a two year player at right defensive end. "I just hope they don't have any loudmouth backs," he said of Silver City. John said that remarks from the opposing offense get the Ruidoso defense mad and rowdy, but added that he tries harder when he's mad.

Montoya is unsure of his future plans. He indicated that he would like to study architecture.

Doug Schmidt, son of Larry and Nancy Schmidt, is another Warrior who has been out much of the season with an injury. The two year lineman said that the team's pregame meetings are the best part of the program.

"We're all together—we're real close," said Schmidt. Doug, who is looking forward to competing in wrestling this year, hopes to study aircraft design or a related field.

Philbert "Bud" Smith is a three year veteran at defensive guard. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Smith Jr., Bud participates in rodeo in the off season. Asked if riding bulls helps his football, Bud said, "No—you get hurt in rodeo."

Smith would like to study engineering at Fort Lewis University in Colorado.

Wade Torres, son of Mrs. Lazina Gallerito, has played two years and is now

at defensive tackle. His prediction about Silver City: "I think we'll beat them but it's going to be a real tough game."

Wade wants to study welding and carpentry after high school.

Byron Wright, son of Jerry and Deanna Wright, is a third year player at line backer and offensive guard. He attributes the team's improvement to the years of playing together.

"I feel real comfortable with all my team mates," he said. "Out there I know them so well—I know I can rely on them."

Byron said that he has learned group cooperation playing football—relying on other people when he needs help. He would like to play in college while majoring in


business, possibly at West Texas State.

Wright reiterated what so many of the seniors stated about their team when he said, "It's a very close, family type thing."

The players and coaches will naturally be sad to see the relationship they have developed as a team come to an end. It is fitting that this group of seniors' final season has come to a do or die battle for a berth in the state playoffs.

As Ric Pearson put it, "Finally we've worked our way up—it's time for state."

But win or lose against Silver City, the Ruidoso High School Warriors have had a tremendous season. All of Ruidoso can be proud of the seniors, the other players and the coaches—the RHS football family.



# Ruidoso merchants cooperating to halt influx of 'hot checks'

John Carver, special assistant to the District Attorney's (DA) Office, Twelfth Judicial District, Monday told members of the Retail Merchants Committee that the local business community is going to have to serve notice on worthless check artists that "Ruidoso is not going to be a haven for bad paper."

At a noon meeting at the Chamber of Commerce, Carver and Debbie Walker, with the DA's office in Alamogordo, listed some procedures merchants need to follow to combat the "hot check" problem some merchants say has inundated Ruidoso for the past eight months.

"I get two of them (bad checks) every thirty minutes," Richard Sandoval said. Others at the meeting who said they have had very few or none at all in all the years they have been in business here were told by Carver, "You've been very lucky."

Carver urged the merchants to use caution in accepting checks (doubly so on weekends and holidays) and to require sufficient identification from customers paying by check. He asked them, further, to "work with us and take a few extra minutes to check all information" taken on the checks.

For those merchants wishing to file a complaint, Carver said the DA's office will only accept cases involving checks issued for goods and service. "We have an office in the Four Seasons Mall," he said. "My desk is directly across from the coffee pot."

In other business, the committee:

— Passed a motion on the request of Jeannie Culbertson and Nancy Radziewicz, to support, with "in kind services," the New Mexico Special Olympics Winter Games, scheduled for January 26-29, in Ruidoso. Culbertson expressed appreciation for the generosity of local merchants who have already contributed skis and meals for team members.

"Donations of any kind would be greatly appreciated," she said. Windbreakers for the teams are still needed, she said, "and there are other operating costs still to be taken care of." Radziewicz said merchants who would like to help out will find it a "very rewarding experience."

— Turned down a request by Dick Shaw for a Chamber sponsored advertising campaign for a four day jazz festival "a group of us has been trying to get organized for thirty months." While the merchants supported the idea of a jazz festival, they agreed with Chamber director Ed Jungbluth, that they should not lend active assistance for any undertaking "unless it is a fund raising project for the Chamber."

— Passed a motion by Tom Kelham "that this group seek the resignation of any member missing three consecutive meetings." Since the committee meets only twelve times a year, Kelham said, "We should have actively participating members."

The Mescalero Apache Tribe has greatest access to the various forms of the news media to release information pertaining to the Tribe, its members and all of its operations, than having to rely on the Cloudercroft Journal.

I, as President of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, am the only authorized representative to represent and pronounce releases and information pertaining to the Tribe and I unequivocally deny any meeting or contact with the gambling industry by me, authorized representatives of my office or the Tribal Council.

The Tribe is pleased with the progress made and its continued development of the tourism industry on the reservation. It is sad that we must take the time to answer and address irresponsible statements about the Tribe.

The Publisher of the Cloudercroft Journal would do well to study the complexity of the gambling issue as it relates to state and Federal laws.

Board members briefly discussed the possibility that unforeseen problems could arise in the final stages of plant construction which would necessitate the use of the unallocated funds. However, if any funds remain after the plant is completed, the money must be returned to the funding agencies.

"Can the board take another month to discuss this?" asked Jim Hine, Ruidoso village manager.

"One problem with delaying this is the cost is subject to change," said Daniel. He said once the unit is ordered, it will be approximately 28 weeks before delivery. Before it can be ordered, however, the purchase must be approved by the contractor, the Environmental Improvement Division in Santa Fe and by the Environmental Protection Agency in Dallas, Texas.

The board then approved the purchase. Hine announced that bids on laboratory and chemical equipment for the sewage treatment plant will be opened at 2 p.m., November 17, in his office in the Administrative Center. The board will act on the bids at the regular meeting December 7.

The board also adopted Resolution 81-1 in compliance with the state's open meeting law to establish regular meeting hours and dates.

# Capitan's water now clear, cool, refreshing

Cool, clear refreshing water. That's what Capitan residents are enjoying now that their new filtering system is in use.

Only a month ago, however, residents were still putting up with brown, smelly water which, while considered safe to drink, was unappealing for most residents and damaging to their laundry and appliances. A meeting in late September in Capitan clarified the problem and brought citizen complaints out into the open.

"The water has improved," said Leon Eggleston, village clerk for Capitan. "We now have two complete filter systems. One is large, while the other one is to be used for a back-up system."

The major problem Capitan residents were dealing with during late summer and fall was a broken filtering system. A back-up system was put into use when the

problem was discovered, but the process of clearing out the plugged up pipe system took a few weeks.

"The new filtering system was in operation October 16 and within a week, things were back to normal," Eggleston said.

The extra back-up system will be used principally when the main unit is undergoing maintenance, according to Eggleston. If water use was to exceed the output of the one filtering system, however, the back-up system could be used simultaneously to help meet the demand.

Eggleston still expects Capitan to experience dirty water in the summer. "That is when the lake turns over. Ruidoso suffers from that, too." But for the rest of the year, Capitan's water woes should be corrected, according to Eggleston.

# Warriors tangling with Silver City Friday night

It will all be on the line tomorrow night. Almost three months of hard practice and nine hard games will come to a head when Ruidoso High School's football team hosts Silver City at 7:30.

What will be at stake is the championship of the district 3-AAA and a berth in the state playoffs.

The Warriors are 8-1 overall, the best record in the state's AAA division. However Ruidoso's one loss was to district foe Tularosa 18-0 three weeks ago. Silver City, the defending district champion, is only 7-2 on the season but is 4-0 in district play and crushed Tularosa 31-4 last week.

If Silver City beats the Warriors, the only way Ruidoso can make the playoffs as the second-place team is if Tularosa loses to Cobre. Tularosa is 2-2 in district play and if the Warriors and Wildcats tie for second place Tularosa will get the playoff bid since it defeated the Warriors. The AAA playoffs begin two weeks from now.

But forget about the Tularosa-Cobre game. Ruidoso can determine its own fate by beating Silver City.

"That's what we have to do. It's a must game for us," said Ruidoso head coach Darrel Stierwalt. "We can't worry about whether Cobre beats Tularosa. We just have to concentrate on beating Silver City. We want to do it ourselves."

But that may be easier said than done. Silver City lost two of its first three games but has won six straight since then and is ranked first in this week's Associated Press state AAA poll. Ruidoso is fourth.

And Stierwalt knows Silver City will be tough. "They're definitely the best team we will play during the regular season," he said. "They're well balanced on both offense and defense. If you stop the pass you have to worry about their running game and vice-versa."

Silver City is the type of team that likes to run over people. The Colts fell to 4-A

power Carlshad 61-0 in the first game of the season but have turned their season around since then and have started to dominate people.

"They're bigger than us," Stierwalt said. "But I don't think they're any stronger man for man."

Silver City runs out of the power-I offense. However, the Colts may not have the services of star running back David Bowman. Bowman injured his knee against Tularosa and is doubtful for the contest.

"Right now it's up in the air whether he'll play or not," Silver City coach George James said of Bowman. "His knee is hyperextended and we don't know his game status."

If Bowman can't play, the Colt running game will be hurting. Jim Vasquez is another fine running back and his brother Joe is the starting quarterback but, according to James, Silver City doesn't have too much else.

"We're awfully young," James said. "Last year we had quite a few seniors on the team. This year we have mostly juniors and a few sophomores. In fact, three or four sophomores might start for this week."

George Reeves is the outstanding Silver City lineman on both offense and defense.

He's got plenty of size (6-2, 220 pounds) and strength to make him one of the outstanding linemen in the district.

James is also high on defensive back Eddie Cruz, a swift 145 pounder who is the backbone of a superb SC secondary.

Two of the Colts' touchdowns against Tularosa were set up by pass interceptions.

Despite his teams' obvious talent, James is reluctant to praise them highly.

"We're awfully inconsistent," he said. "One week we're up and one week we're down. Against Tularosa we got a couple of turnovers and turned the game around. I think they tried to overdefend us."

Regardless of how well the Colts played against Tularosa last week Ruidoso seems to have the talent to match Silver City point for point.

The Warriors have more depth in the backfield than they've ever had. With Scott Neal and Bill Woodul alternating at quarterback Ruidoso has a good quarterback in the game at all times. Neal is also an outstanding runner.

Ruidoso has other weapons besides its quarterbacks. Chris Lopez and Lon Nunley provide a powerful inside running game, while Grady Williamson and Pete Garcia provide speed and quickness for the outside threat.

Neal and Woodul will throw to receivers like Darin Smith, Don Nunley, Williamson and Darriush Rad.

The Ruidoso offensive line, which has played well all season, had probably its best game of the year against Truth or Consequences (T or C) last week as the Warriors romped to a 38-16 victory.

"We got super blocking from David Swalander, Bud Smith, Byron Wright, Craig Carson and Ric Pearson against T or C," Stierwalt said. "They really created some holes."

James admits stopping the Ruidoso offense will be a big task.

"They've got a lot of weapons," he said. "I don't know if we can stop the power running of Lopez and Nunley (Lon) or the speed of Neal. Their passing attack is a lot better than it was last season too."

Defensively the Warriors have given up 36 points in the last two games but most of those points came after Ruidoso had already taken a big lead and was not playing its first team. On the year the Warriors have scored 210 points and given up only 79.

Rad, Pearson, Wright, Kyle Flack, Lon Nunley, John Montoya, Robert Swanner and Ken Bradley are some of the defensive standouts for Ruidoso.

But the key to the game will be ball control, Stierwalt said.

"Offensively we can't have any mistakes," he said. "If we get an opportunity to score we have to score. We can't give up the ball inside our 40 like we did against T or C."

"Defensively we've got to play super, no mistakes and no penalties."

If the Warriors can play mistake-free football both offensively and defensively, they should be in the playoffs when they begin two weeks from now.


However, the two Ruidoso squads that played Lubbock gained experience from the matches that will surely help them in future encounters.

## Deer hunt stratification schedule change

Game and Fish officers will be available in more than 40 towns statewide next week to change deer hunt stratification dates for hunters, according to Bill Montoya, assistant director of the department.

Game and Fish Department offices will also be open during regular working hours—8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday—in Santa Fe, Raton, Albuquerque, Roswell and Las Cruces.

Hunters who need their deer licenses restratified to a different hunt period should take advantage of the varying schedule next week, Montoya said, conservation officers will be in the field most of the month and could be difficult to locate for last minute changes before deadline.

This year's rifle season for deer is divided into four hunt periods—two in the north, two in the south—beginning with the first northern hunt November 6-8 (D-1-N). The second northern hunt (D-2-N) is November 13-18. Southern hunt periods are November 20-22 (D-1-S) and November 27-December 3 (D-2-S).

Hunters are allowed to send any one of the hunts, and license vendors code the licenses at time of purchase. The hunter whose plans change at a later date can, however, select a different date and have the license changed.

Changes in hunt dates can only be made by Game and Fish employees using special stamps, Montoya said, and must be made before the deadline. Deadline is the day prior to the opening of the hunt period for which the license is coded.

Deadline for changing from D-1-N is November 5; from D-2-N, November 12;

from D-1-S, November 19; and from D-2-S, November 26.

Montoya said anyone who waits until deadline day to change his stratification may not be able to locate a Game and Fish employee to change the stratification. Officers may be out of town or keeping odd hours due to night patrol and other types of work typical of the deer season.

**Forest Service lists recent road closures**

Certain roads in the Lincoln National Forest have recently been closed to vehicular traffic, Smokey Bear District Ranger Paul Gordon has announced. The following areas are included in the closures:  
— Forest Road 580 in Tortolito Canyon, west of the section line between Section 12, Township 9 S, Range 11 East and Section 12, Township 9 S, Range 12 East. The area immediately west of this line has been added to the White Mountain Wilderness and use of motorized equipment is prohibited within the boundaries of the wilderness. A fence and gate has been installed across the road leading into the area.  
— 48,000 acres in the White Mountain Wilderness and 34,000 acres in the Capitan

Mountains are now closed to vehicle entry. "Anyone planning to hunt in these areas is encouraged to familiarize themselves with these boundary changes," Gordon said. "If there are questions, write Smokey Bear Ranger Station, Drawer F, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345 or telephone 257-4095."  
Access into Tortolito Canyon area is through private land, Gordon said. Landowners in this area, as well as many other locations adjacent to the National Forest, allow the public to cross their land to reach the Forest.  
"Private landowners have no legal obligation to permit this access," Gordon said. "Abuse of this privilege may cause landowners to discontinue this courtesy."

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Everybody wants publicity, but they want it controlled. Our Department of Corrections, for instance, has a full-time public relations man. He is a competent practitioner, who probably puts out more press releases right now than any other agency of government.

He's telling the story the Department would like to have told. Here's how the recent report on our pen delivered by the American Correctional Association pictures what kind of publicity the institution needs:

"There needs to be a feeling of stability, hope, and progress for the inmates and staff, instead of the current situation in which PNM's administration is constantly under media attack. PNM's inmates may be of the opinion that perhaps the current correctional administration will not be in office very long, making it unnecessary to follow their directions and program."

That means we should tell the story the Department wants told.

Now these guys have gone to court to ask Judge Santiago Campos to make us tell the story the Department wants told—or at least to keep us from telling any other.

We in the press, they claim, "inaccurately and incorrectly" print and comment on such things as the reports delivered to the court on the state's success or failure in complying with the reforms it promised.

We are bad guys because we don't sing their song.

How sad.

How much they miss the point.

We do not work for them. We work for the public.

We are not canaries, tuned to the music of government. We are independent of government, and often opposed to it, at

least in some of its more outrageous manifestations.

Should we be allowed only to compliment Bruce King because if we fail to do so some may form the opinion that he may not be around much longer?

Should our stories be checked by the American Correctional Association to be sure they do not hurt the feeling of the prison's administration before they are sent to be set in type?

Should you hear no side of the story but theirs?

You know the answer to all those questions. It is so obvious we need not even supply it.

One hopes Jimmy Campos knows it equally well.

So far, Oscar Jordan is the only announced candidate for the State Land Commissioner's job on the Democratic side. He'll probably be joined later by Jim Baca, the booze man, and Dave Santillanes, ex-tourist director. (That's young Dave, not his father, who is a Bernalillo county commissioner.)

Two Spanish surnames on the ballot may help to cancel one another out, but Baca says he has a secret weapon which will allow him to work twice as hard as anybody else, no matter what nationality his surname.

He has an identical twin brother, often referred to as "Jim's clone," who can take to the hustings at the same time Jim does.

That allows for blocation of the candidate—the first time, to our knowledge, that has taken place in New Mexico politics.

Could be a big help in the campaign, but we have checked carefully and can assure you only one Baca would be allowed to occupy the post if elected.

## Sense & Nonsense

Fraud, waste, and mismanagement in the federal government for the past several years, had been a lot like the weather—everybody talks about it, but nobody does anything about it.

This Congress, and this administration is making a strong attack on fraud and mismanagement. Much of this reform has been spurred by the recent budget cuts on federal programs and agencies. Programs are having to make do with less federal dollars, and none of these dollars can be wasted. To encourage good management, I cosponsored legislation to reduce this mismanagement of our federal dollars with the Waste, Fraud, and Abuse Reduction Act of 1981, which withholds a percentage of an agency's funding each year encouraging them to reduce waste, fraud, and abuse by that percentage.

We are a government of the people, however, and the people we serve and govern must be our greatest watchdogs. In order for us to clean up fraud, waste, and mismanagement, private citizens are

essential for any reform we might undertake. Otherwise, our directives, our legislation, our efforts remain empty rhetoric.

Now we have the means, through the Inspectors General Office of the Office of Management and Budget, to get you, the private citizen, involved in cleaning up waste, fraud, and mismanagement. A recent survey showed that 95 percent of those polled said they would report a wasteful or fraudulent activity if there were toll-free numbers to call. These toll-free numbers are now available for 21 different agencies and departments of the federal government and give you a direct line to the Inspectors General who investigate these charges.

In addition, the President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency is working on strategies to make sure that whistleblowing is both appropriate and plays a vital role in the reform process. They will receive weekly reports from the Inspectors General on investigations being conducted around the country and will report on those investigations to our office when they directly affect New Mexico.

Cleaning up fraud, waste, and abuse is not just the government's job, but your job as well. Your tax dollars support government functions and activities and you have a right to know and make sure that these dollars are managed properly.

### editorial

Providing fire protection in Ruidoso may be one of the biggest problems confronting the village trustees in the near future.

It's a matter of street grades which, as we understand it, exceed 20 percent in certain areas of the village.

Fire Marshal Derald Waltrip advised the trustees, at their October 27 meeting, that the department's present trucks, under certain icy conditions, cannot negotiate grades exceeding ten percent.

At that meeting the trustees approved Resolution 81-16, limiting street grades to 10 percent on main thoroughfares and 12 percent on less used streets.

This resolution is meaningless, as the trustees have the option of granting variances on street grades at their pleasure.

If the new limitations are not to be enforced, then it is incumbent upon the village to provide vehicles that can deliver fire protection anywhere in Ruidoso.

We feel the availability of fire protection in Ruidoso could have as much effect on future development as the ability of the village to provide water and sewer service on request.

If there's anything we don't need, it's a multi-million dollar fire sweeping through a subdivision, perhaps threatening the entire village, because firemen couldn't get to it.—CD



## Aielgiance wins Mount Cristo Rey

Allegiance, a gelding who's been improving sharply in recent weeks, generated a big stretch kick and swept to a half-length win in Sunday's Mount Cristo Rey Purse at Sunland Park.

The sprint covered six and one-half furlongs and put a \$4,000 purse on the line. A \$12,500 claiming price was in effect — a price which was considerably more than the level of competition Allegiance has been trying since late summer.

On September 11, for example, the gelding was unable to score against five grand company. So his owners dropped him down one more notch and he won with a four grand price on his head.

Since then, it's been a steady climb back to respectability. Two weeks ago, Allegiance rallied out of 10th place to down an \$8,000 group.

With that recent score to his credit, a number of Sunland patrons apparently felt Sunday's Mount Cristo Rey was a reachable target for Allegiance. The gelding got away as the second favorite at just under 3-1 with Kevin Scholl in the driver's seat once again.

The early glory went to a pair of longshots, Court Star (9-1) and Sturdy Tom Cat (14-1). The two duelled it out briskly as Snuffy, the people's choice handled by Angel Jacobo, settled in third place — but

always within striking range. Allegiance was in fourth place at this point, ostensibly out of the hunt.

As the field approached the head of the stretch, Court Star had about all the heat he could stand and began fading out of the picture. Snuffy moved up steadily in a well judged effort and took control at mid-stretch. The gelding appeared to have a lot of octane in his reserve tanks.

Allegiance, trained by Fred Danley for H. T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque, launched a prolonged drive after he reached the upper stretch and took dead aim on Snuffy. As Snuffy negotiated the final stages of the sprint, it was obvious he wouldn't be able to hold off Allegiance. The latter took charge with authority.

Allegiance clocked the distance in 1:18 1/5 seconds, which was only three ticks off the seasonal mark. The mutual payoffs amounted to \$7.80, \$3.40, \$2.40. The winner collected \$2,400.

Snuffy earned \$880 for second and handed out \$3 to place, \$2.20 to show. Sturdy Tom Cat, with Willie Lovell up, got in third and paid \$3.60.

**BOTH DIVISIONS** of Saturday's first installment of the Rio Grande Marathon Claiming Series at Sunland Park turned into well fought stretch battles.

Each division carried a \$3,000 purse, plus a three grand claiming price, and covered the mile-and-sixteenth course.

The first division went to Little Guy, an 11-1 shot who found reserve stamina late in the stretch and regained the lead from the high flying 9-5 shot, Sir James. Little Guy hit the tape a half-length on top and collected \$1,600 on behalf of his owner, Barry Germany of El Paso, Texas.

Little Guy was piloted by Isaac Flores. The gelding, much to his credit, survived plenty of pressure from Sir James when that one began a big move at mid-stretch. For a few jumps, Sir James appeared to be in control, ready to zoom into the clear. But Little Guy outlegged the people's choice in the crucial final yards.

Little Guy returned \$23.90 to win, \$5.40 to place and \$4 to show. The winning time was 1:45 4/5 seconds. Fans who backed Sir James cashed at the rate of \$3.40 to place and \$3 to show.

The second division went to Jollie Rallie, an eight-year-old gelding owned by Frank and Robert Cappellucci of Trinidad, Colorado. Bobby Don Harmon was at the controls.

Jollie Rallie, packing 3-1 odds, locked horns with My Dad Jess, a 9-1 shot, throughout the stretch run. As the two reached the wire, Jollie Rallie got the upper hand and hit the finish line a neck in front.

After the dust had settled, Frank Thompson, the trainer of My Dad Jess, lodged an objection against the winner, claiming interference in the stretch. The stewards rejected the allegation and supporters of Jollie Rallie collected \$8.20, \$4.60, \$4. The winning time: 1:47 1/5.

My Dad Jess refunded \$8.50 and \$5. Beyond The Stars, the 9-5 favorite, came in a weak third and refunded \$3.

## Carrizo Lodge now registered as 'cultural property' in state

Carrizo Lodge, built in 1926 by New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) as a summer camp facility for cadet students, has been selected by the state Historic Preservation Bureau, State Planning Division of Department of Finance and Administration, as a "registered cultural property in the state," Herb Greggerson Jr., said last week. Greggerson, former owner and "now manager" of the lodge, said Carrizo Lodge's main building, a sand-colored, fortress-like structure, is recognized by the state cultural committee for its architectural significance.

Greggerson said he and new owner,

William Michael Furman of Odessa, Texas, several months ago submitted the 55-year-old property for consideration and recently were notified by mail of the committee's decision.

The state will submit Carrizo Lodge's name to the National Archives, for consideration by the National Register of Historic Places, Greggerson said. State Architectural Historian Kathleen Brooker will visit the property on Carrizo Canyon Road at some future date, "to look it over," he said.

Over the years, the lodge has served as a meeting place, a summer camp facility for both NMMI and for a girls' school, a square dance center, a meeting place for Alcoholics Anonymous, and as an art

activity center.

Since 1954, when New York artist Frederic Taubes persuaded the Greggerson family to allow him, "on a one year trial basis," to teach the first artist workshop, Carrizo Lodge has enjoyed a growing reputation as an art activity center with a talented staff of regionally and nationally recognized and published artist-instructors. Taubes died in June of this year, Greggerson said.

Beginning next June 7, and continuing for 28 weeks, six different instructors (one at a time) in six different studios will conduct fine art and crafts workshops for "card carrying artists" recruited from a mailing list of 10,000 names, Greggerson said.

## Race horse owner J. D. Barton sort of eased into the business

The best success story in the history of thoroughbred racing in the Southwest began in 1987 when J. D. Barton, a rancher from Higgins, Texas, was travelling through Oklahoma and decided to visit some friends in the small town of Del Reno.

At the time, Barton — maestro of a 12,000-acre cattle ranch — was yet to own a racehorse. In fact, he had no thought of buying a racehorse when he spotted a mare which had just been shipped from Michigan to Del Reno.

The mare was called Coya's Ego. Even though she was a thoroughbred she'd never raced. The career her owners had mapped out for her was one of a hunter-jumper. "I liked the looks of the mare," Barton said. "But I had no intention of racing her. I just thought I'd keep her a while, then sell her. I know I wouldn't have any trouble selling her since I knew a lot of horse people around the country."

So Barton bought Coya's Ego, paying only \$1,000. The mare was shipped to Higgins, and Barton decided she was "so grand-looking" it would be shame not to try her in racing. "We took her to the bush tracks at Arnett, Oklahoma, and Berger, Texas, and she beat everything there at five furlongs," Barton said. "She even beat some horses which shipped in from La Mesa Park."

Barton concluded the mare needed a crack at some real competition, and brought her to Sunland Park, where she ran two seconds and a third in three outs. Then she turned five years old, and since she was technically still a maiden, she was no longer eligible to race in New Mexico.

Next, it was off to Waterford Park in Virginia, where five-year-old maidens are allowed to compete. Coya's Ego made her first Virginia appearance in a maiden race and won by 13 lengths. Next came an allowance race, and she outlegged her competition by four lengths.

The mare was returned to Sunland Park, where she won several races. Later, she injured a knee and was retired.

Although Coya's Ego showed good running lick, her real value came as a broodmare. Her first three foals didn't set the world on fire, but her fourth — after she was bred to Bold Tactics — hit the jackpot. The colt was called Bold Ego.

At first, Bold Ego was just another Southwest sensation. He ripped up anything tossed in his path. But could he run with big league competition around the country? Bold Ego quieted his critics with a brilliant campaign at Oaklawn Park, winning three of that track's top events for three-year-olds.

Later, the colt made a national reputation by finishing a close second in the Preakness Stakes. It's rare enough for a horse from the Southwest to even start in a Triple Crown race, let alone finishing second at 7-2 to such a national king pin as Pleasant Colony.

At this writing, Bold Ego's career record stands at 10-2-1 from 17 starts, and this has generated paychecks totaling some \$422,000. The colt is now stabled at The Meadowslands in New Jersey, where he recently made his first start since the June 1 Belmont Stakes, and finished second in a \$25,000 allowance race after missing out a fery race at six furlongs. (The four-furlong closing was 44 and change; the final time, 1:09 4/8.)

Later this month, Bold Ego gets a chance to sink his fangs into a \$50,000-added Meadowslands stakes at six furlongs. Barton says the plan is to go in two or three other Eastern stakes, then return Bold Ego to Oaklawn Park in February, where he'll try to blitz the \$250,000-added Oaklawn Handicap at a mile-and-an-eighth. "We'll race him throughout his four-year-old season, but we haven't decided, at this point, in what direction he'll go after Oaklawn," Barton said.

Well before Bold Ego turned into such a stakes giant, an interest was sold to one of Barton's close friends, Dr. Joe Kidd, an El Paso, Texas, physician. The remaining ownership is held by the Double B. Ranch, a 76-acre spread located at Anthony, (just a few miles down the road from Sunland Park). The Double B. Ranch is owned jointly by Barton and his mom, Margaret Barton.

During the summer, when Bold Ego's value began to skyrocket, Barton reached this conclusion: "The horse is becoming so valuable, it makes sense to spread the risk around."

The potential value of the colt, considering his obvious appeal as a sire of

quarter horses here in the Southwest, is immense. So a 50 percent share in Bold Ego was sold to Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. These are the folks who brought the world two recent All-American Futurity winners — Special Effort and Pie In The Sky. Although no figure has been announced, inside reports put the Urschel outlay at around \$2 million.

So what's Bold Ego worth today? Barton said: "If this horse goes ahead and makes another \$100,000 or \$200,000, we're looking at a syndication of \$6-8 million."

Here's a quick rundown on Bold Ego's accomplishments: he started off by winning Sunland's \$204,359 Riley Allison Futurity in the spring of 1980, earning \$22,061 from the \$204,359 purse. At Ruidoso, he easily won the Kindergarten Futurity. "We wanted to find out how good he really was, so we sent him to California for the \$100,000 Hollywood Juvenile Championship," Barton said. The colt ran third at 8-1 — and stamped himself as big league caliber.

The colt visited the New Mexico State Fair and found easy pickings in the \$100,000 State Fair Futurity. He finished his two-year-old season with about \$175,000 in winnings.

Bold Ego launched his three-year-old career at Santa Anita, but finished fifth in the \$50,000-added San Miguel. So it was over to Oaklawn Park, where he found his destiny — winning the Southwest Handicap, the Rebel Handicap, and the \$200,000 Arkansas Derby.

In the Kentucky Derby, he went off at 8-1 from an outside post in a 21-horse field, lost ground badly at the first turn, and ran 10th. ("I wasn't disappointed — he had to go too fast too early to get position, but he still finished far ahead of such big horses as Proud Appeal and Cure The Blues," Barton said.)

In the Preakness, he finished second by a length after setting most of the race. In the Belmont Stakes, he hit the gate at the start, had a troubled journey, and finished far back. "I told our jockey, John Lively, not to punish him if he wasn't in contention," Barton said.

Although it's been a while since that marvelous summer of 1981, and those Triple Crown races, Barton said he's still walking on air. "It takes a while for all of it to sink in."

**BOLD EGO**, who left New Mexico to establish a national reputation in last spring's Triple Crown races, ran eighth in the Pallasades Thursday night at the Meadowslands in East Rutherford, New Jersey. The Pallasades, with a \$50,000-added purse for three-year-olds at six furlongs, was run in very muddy conditions, according to J. D. Barton, one of Bold Ego's owners. "John (jockey John Lively) said he never got a hold of the track. He didn't fire. John said he felt pretty good going to the post. But the mud started to hit him in the face and he kind of pulled up. John said he ran an even race," Barton said. "I talked to Jack (trainer Jack Van Berg) and he said he pulled up fine." Barton said Bold Ego, winner of the 1980 Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park, may run in an allowance race in about 10 days at Aqueduct. Other possibilities include running the prized three-year-old at Churchill Downs or on the new turf course at the Fair Grounds in New Orleans. "We're going to take him to Oaklawn Park in February," Barton said. One possibility for Bold Ego at Oaklawn Park is the Hot Springs, Arkansas, would be the Oaklawn Handicap. The Pallasades race was Bold Ego's second outing since the Triple Crown races ended last June with the Belmont Stakes. He ran second in his first outing. Bold Ego's major effort this season include finishing second behind Pleasant Colony in the Preakness Stakes at Pimlico and winning the Arkansas Derby last April at Oaklawn Park.  
**PEDRO BENITEZ** was the only rider scoring two victories in Friday's 12 race program. He won aboard What A Fashion (\$7.40) in the sixth and on Midnight Kiss (\$11.80) in the eleventh.  
**BEGINNING THIS FRIDAY** Sunland Park will present 11 race programs due to the shortening of daylight hours. Starting December 4, Sunland Park will drop back to 10 race programs as the winter months

## Casey Lambert begins career as jockey

 Despite his famous horse racing surname, Casey Lambert was never pressured into riding as a career. "No, never did my father (ex-rider and now successful trainer Cliff Lambert) tell me what to be," admitted the 16-year-old apprentice jockey. "He told me I could try it, but never did he say I had to. He said, 'You don't have to be a jockey, you can be whatever you want.'"  
 "He always encouraged me, but I doubt it would have bothered him, if I hadn't wanted to be a jockey, said the younger Lambert.  
 "About two years ago, I decided I wanted to be a jockey," he said. "My size (5-3) made me want to ride. I can tack 107 (pounds) easy. I've always liked riding horses. I've been galloping and working them since I was 14."  
 Casey's career started amazingly well during the last week of August at Ruidoso Downs. His first win came aboard the veteran campaigner Double B Express in the \$18,515 Ruidoso Sprint Championship. "I was surprised to win that race," he said. "That horse has a chance to win. (He paid \$78.60)."  
 After a fine beginning in the mountains, Casey journeyed to Albuquerque to compete at the New Mexico State Fair meeting against the finest riders in the Southwest.  
 He captured the State Fair riding title with 21 victories. Besides winning on his father's horses, he also piloted winners for trainers J. Doyal Roberts, Coy Hendrix, L. Z. Roberts and Jim Curry.  
 So that started Casey thinking. "I was real happy with the title. I knew all the good Pat Valenzuela was doing in California. So I wanted to try it. Then when I did so good at Albuquerque, that really made up my mind," Casey said.  
 After the State Fair ended on September 27, the Lamberts were western bound. Casey started riding at the Oak Tree

Meeting at Santa Anita in Arcadia, California. Instead of riding against regionally-known riders, he was facing such standouts as Bill Shoemaker, Laffit Pincay Jr., Chris McCarron, Sandy Hawley, Eddie Delahoussaye and Darrel McHargue.  
 "The first two weeks, I won one race and that horse paid \$127.40. Every horse I rode was a longshot. I think the shortest-priced horse I've been on was 16-1," he said.  
 "Santa Anita is a great place because of the money and the horses. Overall, there's not necessarily any one great horse, but there's so many good ones. The race I won was just an allowance race and my horse got \$15,000."  
 Lambert has ridden for such well-known California trainers as Charles Whittingham, Tom and Willard Proctor, Loren Rettele and Chuck Talfero.  
 Lambert is attending Arcadia High School in Arcadia, California, where he is a junior. He is a former student at Coronado High School in El Paso.







The use of solar energy is becoming more popular around the country, according to the Ruidoso Board of Realtors. With energy costs soaring, home builders are using passive solar design as well as active solar collectors. There has also been an increase in the number of earth shelters and "dome homes," and some owners of existing homes are adding everything from solar greenhouses to collectors for heat and hot water.

Heating bills can be reduced in some geographic areas by as much as 90 percent, depending on design and location. In a few instances, home-owners have even achieved total self-sufficiency.

While this may seem a very practical answer to spiraling energy costs, one problem remains: What happens if someone decides to build a structure which blocks your sunlight?

Solar access legislation, adopted in some areas around the country, is critically important to anyone using the sun's rays. Without it, an owner may find his solar collectors resting in the shade of newly-

constructed high-rises.

Only two states have enacted a "Sun Rights Law." New Mexico and Wyoming specifically protect solar access to anyone who builds a solar energy system. Fourteen other states have general "enabling" agreements may be drawn to benefit all protect access to sunlight in planning or zoning regulations.

Twenty-three states, including ten with enabling laws, recognize easements, which are private agreements whereby a neighbor agrees to preserve an unobstructed path for sunlight across his property to your solar collectors. Such agreements may be drawn to benefit all future owners as well. Some financial institutions require an easement or other verifiable agreement of solar access before a loan can be approved on such systems.

A person should thoroughly investigate solar access rights before making any kind of investment in an active or passive solar system.

# Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — I was introduced to deer hunting last season, and although I did not score, I saw deer and loved every minute. My husband convinced me to join him on a hunt, and I only hope he doesn't regret it when I accompany him again this season.

For a greenhorn, I did learn a lot about the outdoors last year, but I realize there is a lifetime of learning ahead. There are still some techniques about deer hunting that I need to know more about.

There seems to be two popular ways to hunt whitetailed deer. One is to pick a spot along a trail, then sit or stand in wait for a deer that might come along. The other is to quietly stalk along a trail with the hope of sneaking close enough to a resting or feeding deer for a shot. Last year, I only sat on a stand hoping for one to pass, but it seems more exciting to be able to sneak up to an unsuspecting deer.

Which method do you think is more productive? Ann T., Delaware

Dear Ann — There is a third method of deer hunting which you did not mention, and that is driving. In this method several hunters form a loose line in the woods and begin walking in a specified direction. As they walk, they may yell or beat brush and trees. All of this commotion is intended to drive deer past hunters who are stationed ahead of the pushers. Since this method is the least sporting and imaginative, as well as the most dangerous, no more will be said.

The most productive of the two methods you mentioned is hunting from a stand. There is, of course, more involved than

just walking into a woods and sitting down. The area should be scouted very carefully to locate the regions with the best vantage points and the greatest activity. Careful attention should be given to concealment and body movement, otherwise you may never see deer that see or hear you first.

Stalking a deer in the woods is an art that most people do not master. It requires a high degree of skill and an extraordinary amount of patience. Few people possess, or can even develop, the skills necessary for consistent success at stalking. But if you enjoy a challenge, you can find it here.

Remember this. One deer does not make you an expert. Animals, as well as humans, sometimes make mistakes.
