CAPITAN MOUNTAIN OIL, GAS, DRILLING ISSUE

Lease meeting tomorrow

Oil and gas leases in the Capitan Mountains Wilderness, which have received national attention this week, are the subject of a public meeting at 11 a.m., Friday at the Ruidoso Public Library.

The Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest is hosting the meeting. Its purpose is to receive public input for an Environmental Assessment Report that the United States Forest Service is preparing on four lease proposals.

Three of the leases have already been approved by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) of the United States Department of the Interior, according to District Ranger Paul Gordon. The fourth is pending.

The leases are located about 25 miles north of Tinnie near the village of Arabela. They encompass a total area of 7,779 acres, of which 2,280 acres are wilderness.

Gordon explained that the lease applications were made before the exact boundary of the Capitan Mountains Wilderness was defined in the New Mexico

Wilderness Act, which took effect in late 1980.

When the boundary was defined, portions of the four leases fell within the newly designated wilderness, Gordon said. The district office then recommended that issuance of the leases be delayed pending completion of an environmental assessment report on the wilderness portions of the lease areas, he added.

This recommendation was repeated by the Lincoln National Forest office, Gordon noted. At the regional level of the Forest Service, however, Gordon said the recommendation was changed.

According to Gordon, it was recommended to BLM that the leases be issued with the stipulation that the wilderness areas remain untouched while the environmental assessment report is being prepared.

Three of the four leases were then approved by BLM. Gordon speculated that the change in the Forest Service recommendation from the district to the regional level may have reflected "the spirit of the (Reagan) administration," regarding time saving in energy development.

Approval of the leases, the first for oil and gas exploration in a wilderness area,

prompted United States Representative Manuel Lujan to propose that the Department of the Interior be prohibited from acting on mineral leases in any area designated as wilderness.

The Associated Press, in a Washington datelined story carried in Wednesday's El Paso Times, quoted a letter from Lujan to Congressman Morris Udall of Arizona in which Lujan called the action granting the Capitan Mountains leases "a monumental and unprecedented reversal of federal policy."

Udall is chairman of the full Interior Committee and Lujan is the senior Republican on the House Interior Committee. A resolution introduced by Lujan seeks to declare a state of emergency throughout the wilderness system and thus prevent the Department of the Interior from ruling on lease applications in wilderness areas.

Although Lujan reportedly fears that oil and gas exploration in the Capitan Mountains could lead to "desecration" of the area, Gordon pointed out that the wilderness is protected by the stipulation in the leases which prohibits activity on or under wilderness land.

assessment report on the wilderness areas within the leases is positive, Gordon said, exploratory activity could proceed. Before this could be done, however, the lessees would be required to present a plan of operation detailing their intent.

At that time, Gordon explained, a joint BLM and Forest Service site specific analysis would be undertaken. Thus any exploratory activity would be done under very controlled conditions, according to numerous federal standards, he emphasized.

In the meantime, no exploratory activity is permitted on the wilderness portions of the leases, Gordon said, including slant drilling below those areas.

The intent of tomorrow's meeting, said forester Dennis Roy, is to get the public involved in identifying issues and concerns relating to the leases.

Information available to those attending the meeting includes mapping of the proposed leases and the wilderness boundary, pertinent laws and a description of the Capitan Mountains Wilderness environment.

Roy said that he hopes the public will participate in the making of "a good sound decision" on the lease proposals.

C-C planning evening Yule shopping hours

Area residents who are unable to do their Christmas shopping within normal business hours will have an opportunity to shop in Ruidoso until 9 p.m., the first three Friday evenings in December, if the 112 businesses contacted by the Chamber of Commerce agree to participate.

The Chamber Board of Directors in yesterday's noon business meeting at the Chamber decided to contact local merchants and restaurants to see if they will stay open late one night a week beginning the first Friday following the community's annual Christmas Tree Lighting festival,

November 28, 6:30 p.m., at the "Y," Highways 70 and 37.

The 112 retail shops, ski shops, restaurants and others, will be asked to stay open late on the evenings of December 4, 11 and 18, Archer Wilson, board member, said.

Restaurants will be asked to feature a "shoppers special" dinner for late shoppers to take advantage of on those dates. Another possibility is a "treasure hunt," which will offer a discount or prize for evening shoppers, who will be required to go to several different businesses in town.

Trustees acting today on buying gas company

The Ruidoso trustees will meet in special session at 4 p.m., today at the Village Administrative Center to discuss the proposed acquisition by the Village of the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company.

The trustees will vote on whether the village should exercise its right of first refusal on purchase of the gas company, which was written into the original franchise agreement with the company.

A feasibility study on the proposed acquisition was commissioned last week. The study, conducted by engineer Willis Umholtz, found that "it appears to be feasible and practical for the Village of Ruidoso to acquire and operate a natural gas utility."

The special meeting was called because the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company stockholders' meeting begins Friday. The company's owners have requested an indication of interest or disinterest in the purchase on the part of the village at their meeting.

If the trustees do indicate a desire to pursue the acquisition, negotiations on a purchase price will begin, according to Umholtz.

The proposed acquisition would be financed by a revenue bond issue, according to village manager Jim Hine. Actual purchase of the utility would have to be approved by Ruidoso voters in a special election, he added.

Forest fire prevention meeting here Friday

Officials from the local, county and state levels of government are expected to participate in a meeting Friday in Ruidoso on coordination of fire prevention and suppression capabilities.

The aim of the meeting is to promote a common understanding of fire problems on state, National Forest and private land, according to Chris Zamora, district forester with the New Mexico State Forestry Service.

Zamora and Lincoln National Forest Supervisor Jim Abbott have organized the event at the suggestion of attorney George Fetting of Alamogordo. The group will concern itself with Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Steve Makowski, of the Smokey Bear Ranger District, will conduct a field trip for the group, which is expected to include state Representatives John Merishon, Maurice Hobson and John Beebe.

The aim of the tour, said Makowski, is to "make the legislators aware of the potential for a wildfire of significant economic impact." Looking at fuels — what can burn in a fire — roads, water systems, construction standards and materials, and overall growth in the area should serve to identify the need for cooperative prevention and suppression efforts, he added.

Besides the legislative delegation, invitations to participate have been issued to the Lincoln and Otero County commission chairmen and managers, the mayors of Ruidoso and Cloudcroft, the state fire marshal, and representatives of the federal Bureau of Land Management and Indian Affairs.

The meeting is scheduled to convene at 9 a.m., Friday at the Smokey Bear Ranger Station.

Chamber airs future promotions

Shoppers will be able to take advantage of late shopping hours on the evenings of December 8, 11 and 18, if 112 retail merchants, ski shops, restaurants and others, agree to stay open until 9 p.m., on those evenings. The Chamber of Commerce will mail letters to the businesses, requesting their cooperation, Ed Jungbluth, Chamber executive director, said at the board of directors' meeting at the Chamber office yesterday. "Shopper's specials," such as meals at special reduced rates and "treasure hunts," offering discounts or prizes to winners are some of the inducements which merchants will offer late shoppers.

Other business on the board's Wednesday agenda included:

— A report by Jungbluth and Morgan Clough, concerning the winter Ruidoso advertising campaign directed at markets in Texas and Mexico. After a budget

reassessment, Clough said, there is a likelihood that the three planned insertions of ads in Texas newspapers will be cut to two, for budgetary reasons. While the Mexico budget is firm, he said, the Houston market may be dropped because it is not cost effective.

— A report by Jungbluth and Larry Langford, on the community's Christmas tree, a giant white fir, which has been tagged and will be cut in the next few days, for the Christmas Tree Lighting festivities on November 28, 6:30 p.m., at the "Y," Highways 70 and 37. Langford told board members, "The ranger said we should take a good look at this tree, then lower sights — because we'll never find another of its quality."

— A request by Jerry Bigham of Jerry Dale's, for a menu guideline for the Valentine's Espree party which he will cater for the \$15 per ticket cocktail-buffet next February 15. The board voted on a

country-western type barbeque. Bigham suggested, and the board agreed, on a \$700 savings to be made by utilizing his club's in-house band for the party instead of hiring additional entertainment.

— Approved a suggestion by Archer Wilson that an Art Festival Committee be formed, with operating costs derived from proceeds from both fees, to oversee tickets, food booths, entertainment and exhibitors, for Ruidoso's annual Art Festival. Flodie Wilson was named chairperson for the 1982 Festival.

— Heard a request by Jeanne Culbertson, recreation supervisor for Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, and Hilde Strobel, head ski instructor for the 1982 New Mexico Special Olympics Winter Games, for "ideas, suggestions and financial assistance" for the games, which will be held at Sierra Blanca and Eagle Creek ski areas, on January 26 through 29,

next year. Culbertson expressed gratitude to Ed Jungbluth, Altrusa Club of Ruidoso and to Jerry Dale's for their past support. Jerry Dale's will sponsor a benefit dance for the games on a Friday before they begin. And Ed Jungbluth suggested businesses in the community might be willing to buy a \$50 sponsorship for individually handicapped skiers.

— Heard a report by Jungbluth on roadrunner stickpins which could be given to people passing by the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce booth at the Dog and Pony Show in Dallas, or at the Boat Vacation and Travel Show, also in Dallas, next March.

— Heard a request from Jungbluth on behalf of the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department and Police Department for contributions from Ruidoso residents, for non-perishable foods which will be put together for Thanksgiving meals to the needy.

Bishop case ends in mistrial

Twelfth Judicial District Judge Robert Doughty Wednesday granted a mistrial in the case of the State of New Mexico versus Donald Ray Bishop, 28, Ruidoso Downs, on charges stemming from a drug bust made by local police officers last March 3.

The mistrial was granted following a request for such action from Bishop's attorney, Gary Mitchell of Ruidoso.

Mitchell based his request on the fact that a material witness, former Ruidoso Downs police officer Gene Ridgeway, failed to appear in court. "The court is well aware certain evidence was presented in this court and the jury has seen that evidence," Mitchell said. "They can be prejudiced by that."

Prior to Judge Doughty granting the dismissal, Deputy District Attorney Jay Rosenthal, prosecutor, stated he had contacted Ridgeway, who was listed as a Ruidoso Downs police officer last July, at his current residence in Seminole, Oklahoma.

Rosenthal said after he discussed the necessity for his appearance in court with Ridgeway, he "advised me he would appear without proceedings." Rosenthal said he accepted Ridgeway's agreement to appear in court in good faith, without a subpoena being issued.

Although a plane ticket was sent to Ridgeway at state expense, and a state

employee was at the El Paso, Texas, airport Tuesday to meet him, Ridgeway did not appear.

Rosenthal, though unable to contact Ridgeway, said he spoke with his attorney, Randy Parsons, in Oklahoma, who indicated his client had no intention to appear, and that he would deal with whatever came up, when it came up.

Rosenthal said he didn't deny that prejudicial evidence had already been presented to the jury, and in light of that, consented to the mistrial, as did Bishop. The mistrial order contains the stipulation that Bishop may be retried on the charges within six months.

An evidentiary hearing was requested by Rosenthal before a retrial is set, with Mitchell agreeing.

"There are certain matters in this case that will be presented to the Lincoln

County Grand Jury," Rosenthal said.

Charges filed against Bishop, in the court action resulting in the mistrial, included aggravated assault on a police officer; battery on a police officer; disorderly conduct; resisting or obstructing an officer; and destruction of property.

Bishop, and three other persons, were arrested March 13, and Bishop was charged, by Ruidoso Downs police, with two counts of possession of a controlled substance, hashish, LSD and marijuana.

At the time of his arrest the Ruidoso Downs police department announced the seizure of "more than a million dollars worth of illegal drugs," including "1,162 grams of hashish, 136 tabs of LSD, seven vials of liquid LSD equal to 3,000 tabs and 17.5 grams of marijuana." Ridgeway, as the officer in charge of the arrest, stated

the street value of the drugs was estimated at \$1,173,000.

Ridgeway, who was also operating the Ruidoso Laboratory of Clinical Medicine, announced shortly after Bishop's arrest that he had analyzed the substances seized in the drug bust and determined they were hashish, LSD and marijuana.

During Tuesday's court action, however, Peter Del Mar, a chemist with the New Mexico State Police Crime Laboratory, testified that in all of the items he analyzed, he discovered less than one ounce of marijuana. The rest of the seized substances, Del Mar said, was plant material. Del Mar said he was "rather puzzled with the fact Ridgeway's conclusions were so different than mine."

All local charges against the three persons arrested with Bishop were dismissed earlier this year.




Funston Tuesday said of the more than 40 foot evergreen, "Take a good look at this tree — then lower your sights, for you will never find another of its quality."



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Ruidoso scheduled to change districts in 1983-84 year

The New Mexico Activities Association has tentatively agreed to realign districts for Class AAA high school athletic teams, a decision that will affect Ruidoso High School.

Under the new ruling, which will not be made official until representatives of every AAA school in the state vote by mail within the next two weeks, there will be four districts instead of the current five existing in the 1983-84 school year.

Ruidoso, which presently belongs in the 3-AAA district, would switch to the 4-AAA district. The new district would have Goddard of Roswell, (presently an AAA school) Artesia, Lovington, Portales, Tucumcari and Ruidoso. District 3 would have Silver City, Deming, Cobre, Truth or Consequences (T or C), Socorro and Los Lunas. The first four schools are currently in district 3-AAA with Tularosa and Ruidoso.

"It doesn't make that much difference one way or another for us," said Ruidoso athletic director Doyle Howell. "Whether we're in district 4-AAA or district 3-AAA they're both tough."

Howell admitted he had mixed feelings about the new realignment. "We've gotten used to our current district," he said. "We've got a good rapport with the other schools and fans. We really feel at home in this district."

"The main reason the AAA class is switching to four districts instead of five is because the pre-playoff football games caused a lot of problems. Now you have some teams vieling the week after the regular season ends to see who qualifies

for the regular playoffs. With the new system every second-place team will automatically go on to the playoffs."

Warrior varsity basketball coach and football offensive coordinator Barry Nelson didn't feel that strongly about the new proposal.

"Whether we're in the 4-AAA district or the 3-AAA district it doesn't make that much difference," he said. "Competition is competition. Artesia and Portales are always tough but so is Silver City."

Ruidoso has been in the 3-AAA district for three years. The Warriors were in the AA class before entering the 3-AAA district in the 1979-80 school year.

Other returning lettermen include guard Wade Wilson and forwards Michael Forte and Kyle Schautteet. The Warriors have several other fine prospects to team with Scott in the backcourt. Marc Delhotal, a 5-10 guard up from the junior varsity, has looked impressive in practice. Nelson also has the advantage of

having three transfers trying to make it in the backcourt. One of them, 5-8 Pete Garcia, started for the warrior football team as a flanker and tailback this season. He played for Mountaineer last year. The other transfers are Todd Lopez from Oklahoma and James Williams from Alamogordo. 
AAA grid playoffs boost top pairings


Another upset-oriented weekend makes for a new leader in my National Football League ratings this time. Philadelphia replaces Dallas as the top ranked team in the league. The Eagles have the best record in the NFL (10-2), as a result of the losses by Dallas and San Francisco, and have been highly consistent this season. Cincinnati moves up to second by virtue of its decisive victory over Los Angeles. The Bengals have beaten Pittsburgh, Los Angeles and San Diego this season and are definitely for real. Dallas drops to third as a result of its 27-24 loss to Detroit. The loss was critical since it put the Cowboys a game behind Philadelphia in the National Conference Eastern Division race. Neither team may lose another game until they bust helmets in the second-to-last game of the season in Dallas. That makes a Cowboy victory over the Eagles then a virtual necessity. Denver is a narrow pick for fourth. The Broncos looked impressive in beating Tampa Bay but lost quarterback Craig Morton indefinitely with an injured shoulder. Whether the Broncos win their division may well depend on how Steve DeBerg does in place of Morton. San Francisco is fifth. The 49ers missed a golden opportunity to virtually clinch the NC's Western Division title when they lost to Cleveland in the last minute. The Niners still hold a three game lead over Los Angeles and Atlanta mainly because those teams haven't played consistently all season. San Francisco still is a near-cinch to make the playoffs as no other team in the National Conference outside of Philadelphia, Dallas and Minnesota has won more than five games. There is a bunch of teams battling for honorable mention status: Minnesota, Miami, Kansas City, the surprising New York Jets, Pittsburgh and Buffalo. San Diego and Atlanta continue to rank as the NFL's biggest disappointments. The Chargers again displayed a pathetic

defense in their 44-23 loss to Seattle Monday night. Atlanta, which had a sparkling 12-4 mark last season, was considered by many observers as the team to battle it out with Dallas for the National Conference title and a trip to the Super Bowl this year. However, the Falcons have been highly inconsistent this year and at 5-6, are three games behind the 49ers in their division. While the second Cowboy-Eagle game will probably be regarded as the biggest NFL game of the season there are also important games coming up in the AFC's Eastern and Western Divisions. Denver still has to play San Diego and Kansas City and only has a one game lead in its division. Oakland last Sunday and have to play the surging Jets in New York soon. Buffalo can't be counted out of the Eastern Division race either. ***** Oops. It seems I made a mistake in Monday's paper and forgot to mention two members of the Ruidoso Gymnastics Academy's Mountaintops team. Stephanie Garms and Hillary Heid also made the trip to Carlsbad Saturday with the team and competed there. The Mountaintops had some hard luck and finished last in the Carlsbad meet. However, they have almost a month off before they meet Albuquerque Gym School December 12 in the Duke City, and coach John Eberle plans to make some changes in the practices. ***** Congratulations to New Mexico Highland's football team. Highlands defeated Southern Colorado 33-13 Saturday to win the Rocky Mountain Conference championship. With major college teams like the University of New Mexico and New Mexico State going through mediocre seasons it's nice to see a team like Highlands enjoying a winning and successful season.

Warrior wrestling coach optimistic about season

Ruidoso High School wrestling coach Gerald Ames thinks his team is improved over last year and he'll get an idea just how improved it is when the Warriors compete in a takedown tournament at New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped (NMSVH) Saturday in Alamogordo. "It will involve several schools and each match will be decided on two out of three takedowns," Ames said. The Warriors, who have around 35 athletes out for the varsity and junior varsity teams, will compete in a full tournament December 5 at NMSVH and follow that with a two day tournament at Las Cruces December 11-12. "I definitely see some improvement this season," Ames said. "We took fourth in the district last year and I can see us taking third or second this season. Silver City won it last year but lost everybody. Still they should be tough as they always are."

Deming (which finished second last year) and New Mexico Military Institute (third) could be tough. Ruidoso has three wrestlers returning who competed at the state meet last year. David Swalander, Doug Schmidt and Ray Montes all took fourth in the district last season and competed at state. Swalander competed at 145 pounds last season and could go at 155 pounds this time around. Schmidt wrestled at 119 pounds last year and will likely go at 126 pounds this season. Montes went at 105 pounds last season and will probably stay at the same weight class this year. The biggest problem will be replacing Robert Langston in the 167 pound division. Langston took third in the state in that weight class last year. The Warriors also lost two other wrestlers to graduation. However, Ruidoso might have more depth than last season. 



Among her other goals — Masters in watchmaking Sarah Albright's goal

Sarah Albright is as tiny and precise as are the watches she is learning to make and repair at Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell (ENMU).

As one of three women in the program at ENMU, Sarah attends classes five days a week, commuting from Ruidoso each day at 169 miles round trip.

"Most people think I'm crazy for driving that far," Sarah said. But she has a home in Ruidoso and likes it here, so she is willing to make the drive every day to earn her degree. So far, Sarah said she has put 55,000 miles on her car since she began the program the summer of 1980.

Before enrolling in the watchmaking school, Sarah had attended Kansas State University with a major in art and music. "To get a good job in either area, you have to be exceptional and I was just average," Sarah said.

So after a break from attending college, Sarah decided to try watchmaking partly with the idea that it wouldn't be hard to find a job.

"I once tried to fix my brother's Davy Crockett watch, but I couldn't. It's still buried beneath the elm in the backyard someplace," Sarah said. But what really started her on the idea of repairing watches for a living was when she told her watch in to be fixed and they told her it would take at least six months.

"I figured they must need people. Then I found out that ENMU had a watchmaking school." The school in Roswell is the only one in the United States that was originally sponsored by the Swiss Watchmakers Institute.

For her first year at ENMU, Sarah

received financial aid in the form of a scholarship from the Altrusa Club of Ruidoso.

The program at Roswell is a two-year continuous program with a one-month break in the summer. Sarah plans to earn her Master's certificate this spring and graduate in May. "I'll be the first woman at ENMU that has passed with her masters," Sarah said.

Sarah has recently learned she is also qualified to go to Switzerland for a 20 week course at the Swiss Watchmakers Institute. Only five students from the United States are accepted into this class each year.

"I want to go so bad. All I need is to find someone who will sponsor me to go there," Sarah said.

Although watchmaking is what Sarah enjoys most, she also enjoys the jewelry classes that she takes as part of her degree. Currently, she is working on casting wedding rings for her parents for Christmas. She also took a gemology class and works with both gold and silver. "I'll be a bona fide jeweler, too," Sarah said.

Sarah defies the stereotype image of an aging man, stooped from always bending over his work, as she has many interests and "loves to country dance." She used to ski until a knee injury put a stop to it. She also likes to hike in the area.

After Sarah completes her training, she isn't sure if she'll want to open her own shop or just work with a jeweler. "I'll have to see," she said. However, she does want to remain in Ruidoso and will continue driving 169 miles a day to school to accomplish that goal.





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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Nick Franklin has a thankless task.

Why he wants it, nobody knows. He's the new state chairman of the Democratic party, elected about ten days ago, at a Central Committee meeting in Albuquerque.

He had no opposition for the post, because nobody else wanted it.

Franklin comes from what can loosely be termed the Jerry Apodaca wing of the party. He was chief legal adviser and then Secretary of Energy and Minerals during Jerry's term in office.

The other, or Bruce King branch of the party, didn't even bother to put forward an applicant. They just went along with giving the job to Franklin.

As usual, his first effort will be to pay off the party's debts. They appear to come to something like \$32,000, including \$3,000 to \$4,000 owed to Brad Hays, the man who just went out of office as chairman.

Apodaca probably lost a hard worker in his primary race with Jeff Bingaman when Franklin took the job.

As chairman, he will be expected to remain neutral in that fight — and Franklin is the kind of guy who will probably bend over backwards to make it clear he's doing that.

He and Cordelia Sanchez, also elected by acclamation at the Central Committee meeting, will only serve for five months, since a new rule has been adopted which calls for election of the two leaders in April of odd-numbered years.

Governor Bruce King, at last week's press conference, sounded like he is still on the prod.

One example of that was his remark that "legislators are going to have to be a lot

more responsive to dire human needs than they have showed themselves to be in the last few weeks."

He also talked with some heat about his willingness to keep "the sharks" away from the domain of Corrections Secretary Roger Crist — though he wouldn't tell us who the sharks are when we pressed him. Some of us thought he meant Senator Caleb Chandler and his Criminal Justice Study Committee.

One of the candidates for governor says he had trouble getting people interested in his race until that Albuquerque city election was over. All over the state, he reports, people were following that one with great interest.

It sure got down and dirty before it was over, didn't it?

This column had previously criticized Gordon Sanders' johnny-one-note style of campaigning, which consists principally of hyperbole.

He did manage to create some questions about Harry Kinney in the closing days of the campaign, and was immensely successful at getting Kinney ticked off. (That's not too difficult. Harry is normally the mildest-mannered of men in his everyday activities, but he has a short fuse. When he gets angry, his face gets red all the way to the top of his head.)

In the final analysis, however, Albuquerque voters must have decided that the ability to rant and rave on the idiot box is not sufficient training for the post of mayor of the state's largest city.

So Kinney, who grows to look more and more like a Roman emperor every year, got his old job back, and Gordon can continue to criticize City Hall from the relative safety of a broadcasting studio.


Perhaps Reagan's best gambit would be to decide what course he wants to take, then, before announcing his intentions, confer with leaders on both sides of the Congressional fence.

Though the honeymoon is over, if Reagan plays his cards right he still might enjoy a happy marriage. All he has to do is change his ways. —CD


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HOW TO READ YOUR ELECTRIC METER



Reducing energy consumption can result in lower utility bills. If you'd like to see exactly how many kilowatt hours you have saved through your energy saving steps, you can easily monitor your electric meter, keeping weekly or monthly records.

Begin with the dial on your left, choosing the number the indicator has just passed. In the illustration, subtract the previous reading "88543" from the present reading "89018" to get the kilowatt hour usage. Be sure to record the dates the readings are taken, since the reading is good only for measuring kilowatt usage for the number of days between readings.

INCOMPREHENSIBLE

For most of us, the figure of 1,000,000,000,000 has a new meaning. Still incomprehensible, but a new meaning.

In trying to conceive of that figure before, one could imagine the existence perhaps of one trillion ants, or one trillion rocks, or one trillion weeds. But now there is something manmade: the national debt. The lid has been lifted to allow it to go to \$1 trillion. That's one thousand billion dollars.

The government could cut this down to size, as the French once did, by devaluation, taking three zeroes off the figure. That would cut the debt to \$1 billion. But who would want their \$20,000 salary cut to \$20? Nevertheless, the \$20 would buy as much as the \$20,000, as the French proved in 1958.

There are those among us who refuse to let themselves worry; it's all paper, anyhow.

But it matters greatly. Collapse of a nation's currency can also bring collapse to the economy and to the government itself.

The Senate's action recently in raising the federal debt limit was inevitable. Bills have to be paid, no matter how onerous the method.

But Senator Proxmire is to be applauded, instead of chided, for his 16-hour protest. It served, as he intended that it should, to call attention to the magnitude of the debt and the consequences of too much government spending. — News-Bulletin, Belen

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

SUNLAND PARK boosted purses for the first time this season. "We've raised purses \$3,300 a week and \$13,000 a month," said Racing Secretary Donald Rausch. "We've left the bottom purse (\$1,800) alone and put the money in the races for our better horses."

The increases, after the first four weeks of racing, are due to the booming business at the West El Paso track.

An indicator of the increased handle was Friday's handle on an 11-race card. The handle of \$217,959 was \$40,037 above a year ago when \$177,922 was wagered, an increase of 22.5 percent.

"We hope we can continue to raise purses," Rausch said. "It helps us fill the races as well as getting the better horses to run."

FRIDAY WAS ONE of the season's most fruitful days as eight of the 11 betting choices posted triumphs. Winners included Exclusive Thymus (\$4.20) in the second, Viva La Chick (\$3.20) in the third, Our Man Harry (\$5.00) in the fourth, Pal's Reason (\$4.20) in the sixth, Easy Honor (\$5.60) in the seventh, Exclusive Venture (\$4.60) in the eighth, Bare Blade (\$6.20) in the ninth, Zip's Zippy (\$3.80) in the tenth and Peter Pistola (\$6.60) in the eleventh. That was the best day for favorites this season.

BARE BLADE, a seven-year-old Blade gelding, continued his domination of the \$5,000 thoroughbred route claimers at Sunland Park. He posted a three and three-fourths length win in the Sunland Park Claiming Stakes Friday at six and one-half furlongs. That was his third victory this season with one second in four outings and he became the first runner to record a trio of wins this season. He's owned by Clarence and Diane Easley of Pueblo, Colorado, and is trained by Stephen Easley. He was ridden by Louie Figueroa.

THE TIME OF 19.50 must be Native Gypsy's favorite clocking. For the second straight race, the four-year-old Special Secret mare was timed in 19.50 when she scored a three-fourths length win in the featured \$5,800 Savannah Swinger Distance Series No. 2 at 400 yards on Saturday. Native Gypsy raced to a 19.50 clocking while winning an allowance race on November 7. It is the season's best for 400 yards. Native Gypsy is owned by the

Three C Racing Stables of Pampa, Texas, and is trained by Bob Arnet. Richard Bichel has ridden her in both Sunland Park races this fall. This season, Native Gypsy has three triumphs with six seconds and two thirds for winnings of \$20,125.

TROPIC RULER, who won an allowance race this summer at Ruidoso Downs, finished fourth as an even money favorite Saturday at Hollywood Park in Inglewood, California. The race was the inaugural running of the \$78,375 Prevue Stakes at seven furlongs. Tropic Ruler, co-highlighted at 122 pounds, battled Supulveda for the early lead, but faltered in the stretch run. Lafitt Pincay Jr., rode Tropic Ruler while Chris McCaron rode Supulveda, the eventual winner, who was second favorite. Tropic Ruler, who broke from the first position, finished second in the Arlington-Washington Futurity this summer at Arlington Park. That is the nation's richest race for two-year-old thoroughbreds.

SEASON'S BEST READINGS over the weekend included three horses with 1:17 1/5 clockings for the six and one-half furlongs. Bare Blade (\$6.20) who won Friday's featured Sunland Park Claiming Stakes and Apalachee Chief (\$53.40) who captured Saturday's eighth race, a chase for claiming horses scaled from \$20,000-\$17,000 and Another Destiny (\$20.20) who won a starter allowance on Sunday, all set that rapid timing.

TRUE ROUNDER (\$3.80) set the season's fastest five furlong reading when he zipped to victory in Sunday's eighth race for allowance runners. His time was 57 4/5 seconds.

TOTAL HANDLE over the weekend was a booming \$904,957, which was a solid gain of 24.78 percent over the same three day weekend a year ago. So far this season, the daily average stands at \$305,068. That's a fat increase of 26.22 percent over the average at a comparable period last year. Betting-per-race is now average \$28,384, up 27.54 percent over last year's comparable \$20,671.

THE NO. 7 POST produced six winners over the weekend to lead in that category. Here's the situation from a seasonal standpoint: No. 1 — 14 wins, No. 2 — 21, No. 3 — 25, No. 4 — 9, No. 5 — 20, No. 6 — 13, No. 7 — 13, No. 8 — 19, No. 9 — 13, No. 10 — 14, No. 11 — 0, No. 12 — 0.

Artist Ted Robertson holding one man show

Ted Robertson, a Southwestern artist who is becoming well known nationally, will be at Smith Limited Gallery, 662 Sudderth, Saturday, November 21, from 7:30 to 10 p.m., for a one-man showing of his latest works, Sonya Smith said Monday.


own. His pastels and oils are vibrant in color and breathtakingly beautiful."

Chicks Passem All wins All-American Sale Futurity

Chicks Passem All, a gelding with modest earnings of less than \$5,000, broke into the big money with a runaway victory in the November 15 renewal of the All-American Sale Futurity at Sunland Park. The 400 yard struggle—restricted to 1980 graduates of the All-American Sale at Ruidoso Downs—split up a total jackpot of \$191,047.

That was the richest purse in the history of fall racing at Sunland. The winner's slice amounted to \$95,523.

Chicks Passem All allowed Seventy One South, the betting favorite, to get away winging. In the early going, the people's choice (8-5) appeared to be rolling to a brilliant win. He was on the rail, well in the clear, and ostensibly in control.

But when Chicks Passem All shifted into high gear, there was no stopping him. The gelding surged toward the lead and collared Seventy One South. For a few strides, the favorite tried to fight back, but his reserves were quickly depleted and he readily tossed in the towel.

Chicks Passem All established a half-length lead in short order, but that wasn't enough to suit him. He kept piling up his advantage and flashed across the finish with a commanding length lead.

The gelding, purchased in the All-American Sale for \$57,000, stopped the clock in 19.78 seconds. A week earlier, Chicks Passem All had covered the 400 yards in 20.09 seconds, emerging as the top qualifier for the Sale Futurity.

That victory in the trials—which came by a booming three and one-half lengths—put Chicks Passem All's career record at 3-2-0 from seven starts. But his money line was a paltry \$4,954.

Sunland partons were obviously impressed by Chicks Passem All's trial victory and made him the second favorite in the finale. The gelding was ridden by Jacky Martin, one of the nation's leading quarter horse jockeys.

Ironically, Martin got the ride on Chicks Passem All by default. The reason: Jockey Jimmie Hunt qualified three horses—Chicks Passem All, French Jeans and Seventy One South. As a result, Hunt had his choice of mounts, and opted for Seventy One South (the top money maker of the field with winnings of \$66,319).

Regretfully for Hunt, his decision was not the best—since Seventy One South caved in when put to severe pressure. The colt, who ran a disappointing third in the trials at 20 cents on the dollar, ended up fourth in the finale.

Chicks Passem All is owned by E. Wayne and James Johnson of Huntington, Texas. The trainer is Johnie Goodman—the gentleman who's won the last two editions of both the All-American Futurity and All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs and established himself among the greatest quarter horse trainers of all time.

Fans who centered their pari-mutuel attention on Chicks Passem All were vindicated with payoffs of \$5.60, \$2.80, \$2.20.

The Pipeliner, who tolls for M. C. and Mark Stuck of Midland, Texas, lived up to expectations (based on his second best qualifying time) and charged powerfully in the final steps to take second. Gary Sumpter was at the helm.

The Pipeliner handed out \$3.80 and \$3. He also picked up \$32,478 to go with his current money line of \$19,407. Conrad Rountree trains the colt.

Jays Mainspring, operating at 9½-1, rallied well out of fourth place to finish third. He was only a nose behind The Pipeliner. Jays Mainspring is owned by the Second Guess Syndicate of Ft. Worth, Texas.

Third place was worth \$19,104. Jerry Nicodemus was in the driver's seat. The show price was \$3.80.

Here's how the also rans checked in, and the amount they banked: 4th—Seventy One South, \$13,373; 5th—French Jeans, \$9,552; 6th—Sisys Breeze Bug, \$7,641; 7th—Hempens Jet, \$5,731; 8th—Broken Pedal, \$3,820; 9th—The Timekeeper, \$1,910; 10th—Shesachamp, \$1,910.

Here's a look at the pedigrees of the top three finishers: Chicks Passem All (a gelding) is by Pass 'Em Up out of Chicks Called Sue; The Pipeliner (a colt) is by

Botchery out of Steamie; Jays Mainspring (a colt) is by Duck Dance out of Should Fly.

In a surprising display of form, the top three qualifiers ran that way in the finale.

Here's the field from the perspective of qualifying times: Chicks Passem All, 20.09; The Pipeliner, 20.22; Jays Mainspring, 20.22; French Jeans, 20.25; Sisys Breeze Bug, 20.42; Shesachamp, 20.42; Broken Pedal, 20.46; The Timekeeper, 20.48; Seventy One South, 20.49; Hempens Jet, 20.51.

An interesting sidelight to the All-American Sale Futurity is the fact that total cash outlay for the 10 finalists, when they traded hands in the All-American Sale in 1980, was \$162,200—or an average price of \$16,220.

In view of the Sale Futurity's gross purse of nearly \$200,000, that \$16,220 average buying price appears particularly appealing.

Here are the prices the 10 finalists drew in the All-American Sale: Chicks Passem All, \$57,000; Jays Mainspring, \$23,000; Broken Pedal, \$21,000; French Jeans, \$12,000; Sisys Breeze Bug, \$11,000; Seventy One South, \$10,000; Shesachamp, \$8,500; The Timekeeper, \$8,000; Hempens Jet, \$8,000; The Pipeliner, \$3,700.

Going into the Sale Futurity finale, the earnings of the 10 finalists totaled \$152,722.

After disbursement of the Sale Futurity purse (\$191,047), the average earnings of the 10 finalists amounted to \$34,376.

NATIVE GYPSY 400 yards her own seasonal record for a quarter length win in Saturday's second leg of the Savannah Swinger Distance Series at Sunland Park.

The mare also gobbled up a paycheck of \$4,080, which pushed her 1981 earnings over the \$20,000 mark.

Native Gypsy is owned by the Three C Racing Stables of Pampa, Texas. Richard Bickel does the riding.

The Savannah Swinger was clocked in 19.50 seconds—exactly the time hung up by Native Gypsy when she rolled to a one and one-half length win on November 7. That 19.50 clocking stands as the fastest of the meeting thus far.

Native Gypsy broke a bit sluggishly in the Savannah Swinger and found herself in sixth place. Hempens Easy Tam, a 7-1 shot, and My Kids Trouble, off at 5-1, knocked heads while struggling for the lead.

Hempens Easy Tam gradually faded out of the picture, but My Kids Trouble, who'd won the first stop on the Savannah Swinger journey, quit when he neared the wire and dropped well out of it.

With about 100 yards to go, Native Gypsy moved up suddenly to challenge. She snared the lead with several big jumps, then literally took off. She was under no pressure in the final yards. The mare is trained by Bob Arnett.

Tewatee, a 18-1 longshot owned by O. C. Carlton III of Richmond, Texas, turned in a big late attack on the far outside and grabbed second place money of \$1,496. Larry Byers was at the controls.

Hempens Easy Tam, piloted by Jerry

Burgess, held on for third in a plucky performance.

The payoffs looked like this: Native Gypsy—\$7.60, \$3.60, \$3; Tewatee—\$9.20, \$7.60; Hempens Easy Tam—\$4.

The gross purse of \$8,800 included added money of \$5,500. The third and final leg in the series comes up on November 28 at 440 yards and offers an added purse of \$6,000.

BARE BLADE picked up his third win of the meeting and set a seasonal record for six and one-half furlongs while cruising to an easy victory in Friday's Sunland Park Claiming Stakes.

Bare Blade operated at just over 2-1 in the wagering and ended with a widening three and three-quarters length lead. The gelding was well in control throughout the stretch.

The clock was stopped in 1:17 1/5 seconds, knocking two ticks off the previous seasonal mark set by Tiffany's Martini on October 24.

Bare Blade enjoyed quite a payday, picking up \$3,168 out of the gross purse of \$5,280. The gelding is owned by Clarence and Diane Easley of Pueblo, Colorado. All 12 contenders in the Claiming Stakes carried a five grand claiming price.

Only one, Who's Arguing (who ran sixth at just under 5-1), was claimed.

Bare Blade's victory pushed his 1981 earnings up to a handsome \$14,502. Fans who backed the seven-year-old gelding collected \$6.20, \$3.40, \$2.60.

Mean And Lean, a 28-1 outsider handled by Rebecca Thompson, settled in second place at the start and managed to retain that slot all the way. The gelding earned \$1,161 and paid \$13.20, \$10.60.

Petty Craft, who toted Bobbie Don Harmon in the top load of 122 pounds, hit the wire less than a length behind Mean And Lean and earned \$633 for third. The show price was \$5.40. Petty Craft went off at 7½-1.

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

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

Social Security information

In most jobs, the social security tax is taken from your pay automatically. But on some jobs, you should ask to be sure your pay is reported for social security.

If you work in someone's home—cooking, cleaning, doing yard work, or some other job—your cash wages count for social security if you earn \$50 or more from one person in a three month calendar quarter. Be sure the person you work for has your social security number and reports your pay.

Many employers will offer to pay only cash (no checks) and make no deductions from your pay. This is to the employer's advantage because he or she does not pay the employer's share of social security taxes. It's unfair to the employee because the employee does not get credit for his earnings which earn quarters of coverage

for social security protection.

It's important to remember that the exact amount of social security benefits you and your family would get depends on how much you earn. If your earnings are not reported, you would get less social security or you might even not be insured with less than enough quarters of coverage.

Some places of business will offer to let you work for them on a self-employed basis. If your work is supervised by the employer, you are an employee of the business, not self-employed. The employer must withhold social security taxes from your pay and he must match your taxes withheld by the same amount. Self-employed individuals must pay all of their own social security taxes at a higher rate.

Saturday, December 19, 7 a.m., "Whooping It Up." This tour, about the endangered whooping crane, first conducted in November is being repeated due to its popularity. Sunday, December 27, 3:30 p.m., "Roost Tour." Sunset and the sight and sounds of thousands of birds returning to their evening roost will be the setting for this tour that will deal with sandhill cranes, snow geese, and other waterfowl behavior.

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Racing Secretary's job 'tough'

Donald Rausch is a firm believer in choosing a right time for everything.

"Five years ago, I was offered the job as racing secretary for Ruidoso and Sunland, but I didn't take it. I didn't think I was ready for it. A racing secretary is under a lot of pressure," he said.

"I was doing real good with the jockeys I had at the time so I didn't want to take such a hard job," said Rausch, one of the Southwest's finest jockey agents.

But times changed.

In the summer of 1980, one of Rausch's friends, who serves on the Ruidoso-Sunland Board of Directors, suggested he take the vacant racing secretary's job at the two sister tracks, Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

Now Rausch had a different perspective about the administrative position.

"Then, I'd felt I'd gone about as far as I could as a jockeys' agent. I'd won all the major quarter horse and thoroughbred races with my riders. Now I felt I was ready to take on the racing secretary's job," he said.

So in August of 1980, Don Rausch quit being a jockey agent for the first time in 16 years and assumed the racing secretary's position.

It's not that his jockey agent's career was unsuccessful. Far from it.

He campaigned at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park in New Mexico as well as the Chicago, Detroit, California, Colorado and New York based tracks. His riders included some of the country's finest quarter horse jockeys such as Jacky Martin, Gary Sumpter, Jerry Nicodemus, Larry Byers, Jimmie Hunt and Jerry Burgess. Among his better known thoroughbred riders were Danny Whited and Richard Strauss.

Now, Rausch is charged with the supervision of the racing programs at two entirely different yet similar race tracks. Ruidoso Downs, located in the Sacramento Mountains, is a picturesque setting. With lush green pine trees all around, the racing at Ruidoso Downs is held from May through Labor Day each year.

While neighboring Texans swelter under the summer heat, the temperatures rarely top 90 at Ruidoso Downs.

The track is famous for some of the, if not THE, best quarter horse racing in the country. The meet's most prestigious attraction, the All-American Futurity, will have its richest race ever on Labor Day 1982. The gross purse will be \$2,530,000 and the winning horse will receive \$1 million.

Both figures are unparalleled in quarter horse, thoroughbred or standardbred history.

Sunland Park, meanwhile, is located just six miles west of downtown El Paso, one of the country's fastest growing metropolitan areas. It is a mile track with wide turns, unlike Ruidoso Downs which is a five eighths mile oval.

Sunland Park, which runs from October through early May, is more famous for its thoroughbred races. Its closing day attraction, the Riley Futurity, is the nation's second richest race for two-year-old thoroughbreds.

"There's really not much difference between Sunland and Ruidoso except that I write more quarter horse races at Ruidoso. We have more distance races at Sunland Park," said the 41-year-old official.

"I haven't missed being a jockeys' agent. In fact, a whole lot of being a jockeys' agent pertains to the racing secretary's

job. The gripes, the races you write. All that comes from being a jockeys' agent and growing up in New Mexico where I knew all the horsemen and I get along with almost all of them.

"The vast majority of the horsemen at Sunland and Ruidoso have been real good to me. They've really given me a chance. I know their needs and wants after working as an agent for so long. It helps me to know the horses and what kind of races they want."

"It's a little tougher than I expected it would be after doing it a little more than a year," he said. "But I enjoy it. I've been

real pleased with the secretary's job. It's been working out real good."

An indication of Rausch's expertise at writing races popular with the El Paso area horse fans is the booming business during the first month at Sunland Park.

Through the first month of Sunland Park's seven month racing season, the average daily handle showed a healthy 26 percent hike over the corresponding 1980 figures. That enabled Rausch to hike the purses by \$1,300 a day or \$13,000 a month.

And that's obviously going to endear him to the horsemen. Which isn't at all a bad position to be in for a former jockey agent.


