Water revenues on schedule

Income and expenses of the village water system are about what they were projected to be four months after new rates took effect, according to administrative assistant Frank Potter.

A report on the water system was prepared for the Ruidoso trustees and distributed at their November 22 meeting. The budget for the current fiscal year projected a year-end balance of \$31,490. But this figure could reach \$316,920 if monthly revenue continues to average \$97,628 as it has since July.

If this average is maintained through the whole fiscal year, revenues will total \$1,171,536. The projected total was \$854,616.

Potter pointed out, however, that the four month period just past includes some of the months of peak water use. "Around

March, we'll be able to tell how the projections on our revenues are running," he said.

Despite the fact that the statement shows a zero balance in the system's reserve fund, Potter is optimistic that the fund can gradually be built up. He explained that the village is allowed under state law to build a reserve fund to cover yearly equipment replacement costs, based on a percentage of the total worth of the system.

Ruidoso has not had such a fund in the past, Potter noted. "We've always had just enough revenue to cover bonded indebtedness," he said.

Along with covering replacement costs, the reserve fund may be drawn on for capital improvements to the system which will be needed to accommodate increased future demand.

Festoons of red and green balloons will adorn the entrances to 12 Ruidoso art galleries participating in an open house observance from 5-9 p.m., Thursday and Friday.

Galleries cooperating in this venture include: Jim Pless Gallery, Fenton Gallery, Armadillo Studio and Gallery, International Galleries, Artisan Shop and Gallery, The Woodshed Gallery, The Blue Gem Gallery, Twenty Twenty Gallery, Smith Limited Gallery, McLean's Gallery,

Crucis Art Bronze Gallery and Galleria de Watkins.

Every medium of the fine arts, Sonja Smith, one of the organizers of this promotion, said, "from limited edition and signed prints, to oils and pastels and sculpture will be on display in the galleries.

"This open house is to acquaint area residents, and visitors, with the investment quality art handled by our local galleries."

Smith said that "after the first of the year the gallery owners will meet to act on forming a permanent organization to promote Ruidoso as a nationally known art center.

"The gallery owners have discussed this in recent informal meetings and all agree that we need this organization to help us continually upgrade the quality of art displayed here.

"This open house is a cooperative thing, to help us help each other, and, primarily,

to let people know that Ruidoso's art galleries will be participating in a program to gain acclaim for Ruidoso as one of the country's outstanding art centers.

"We have a well established and flourishing art colony here and every artist visiting Ruidoso for the first time that I've talked to, has told me they're extremely impressed with Ruidoso, with the quality of art obtainable here, and several have told me that they are seriously considering locating here."

Local man plane crash victim

The body of a Ruidoso man who died in the crash of a single engine plane Friday was recovered Sunday afternoon from a remote site on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Robert C. "Buzz" Hoeller, 42, an employee of Ruidoso Wholesale Lumber and Carpet, was evidently killed instantly when the Piper Cherokee Archer he was flying went down Friday morning, according to medical investigator Bronson Cummings. Hoeller had left El Paso, Texas, (alone) at about 9:30 a.m., Friday bound for Ruidoso.

The crash site was located at about 10:45 a.m., Sunday by ground and air teams tracking the signal of the plane's emergency locator transmitter. A helicopter from the Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Service at Holloman Air Force Base participated in the search.

Because the aircraft crashed in a canyon and its tail was deflecting the transmitter signal, searchers had a difficult time finding the site, according to Dave Travis of White Mountain Search and Rescue.

The Ruidoso group was one of several contributing to the search effort. Others were the Civil Air Patrol out of Alamogordo, the Kirtland Mountaineers and Albuquerque Mountain Rescue Council from Albuquerque and the National Emergency Locator Transmitter Team.

A communications base manned by Amateur Radio Emergency Services and White Mountain Search and Rescue members coordinated the search by radio from the parking lot of the Ruidoso Police building.

Search organizers expressed gratitude to the Mescalero Apache Tribe for cooperation and assistance in the search effort.

Ski Report

Search on for young hunter

A search effort was organized early this morning to find Danny Sanchez, 15, Ruidoso, missing since Sunday afternoon. Sanchez became separated from others in a hunting party Sunday in the Dry Eagle Area north of Ruidoso, and was still missing this morning.

The search was organized by members of the White Mountain Search and Rescue Team.



WRECKAGE WAS SCATTERED on the mountainside, and snow fell steadily as searchers sought to recover papers and personal effects from the plane. Despite the impact of the

collision, the aircraft's emergency locator transmitter sent out a continuous signal which enabled searchers to locate the crash about 48 hours after it occurred.

Stabbing victim listed as stable, suspect held

A Ruidoso man was listed in stable condition this morning at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital with a knife wound suffered in a fight Saturday night.

Craig S. Sullivan, 19, remains in the hospital intensive care unit with a severe wound to the throat area. "His condition is still guarded this morning but he's quite stable," said a hospital spokesman.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Sullivan of Ruidoso.

According to Ruidoso Police, Sullivan was injured and 20-year-old David T. Henry was stabbed during a "large affray" which occurred shortly before

midnight Saturday near The Place-Mountain Ski Shop at 2716 Sudderth Drive. Sullivan was taken to the hospital by friends. His condition was extremely critical for a time, according to police, due to loss of blood. Henry was treated for a stab wound to the left forearm and released, police said.

A 15-year-old male is being held in Ruidoso with felony charges of aggravated battery and aggravated assault. The suspect was arrested about 4 a.m., Sunday following the incident which involved approximately 20 youths, according to police. The case will be handled by district court.





Scouts making silk-screen T-shirts

Troop 59, Conquistador Council of Boy Scouts, after last Wednesday evening at 20/20 Gallery, is well on the way to concluding a series of activities which will earn each Scout a merit badge in art and printing.

The specific skill responsible for the intense exercise of creative talents at the graphics studio that particular evening, was a serigraph (silk-screen) workshop conducted by Dave Travis and Jo Cunningham of 20/20 Gallery. A stencil of the Boy Scout emblem, designed by Rudy Flack, Troop 59 Scoutmaster, with silk-screen art work by Travis, was printed onto T-shirts for each boy.

The stencil was painted by Travis onto a tightly stretched silk-screen, with the areas not to be printed blocked out by filling the mesh of the screen with a varnish-like substance. The T-shirts were placed under the screen and ink was forced or "squeezed" through the still open mesh onto the shirt.

Other phases of the project already completed by the troop include drypoint etching on aluminum plate, and pen and ink and pencil drawings. The remaining workshop, drypoint etching on copper plate, will be covered this week, Travis said.

The Scouts obviously were pleased with

the results of the serigraph instruction, crossing their fingers as each shirt went through the handscrewing and cheering each time one came through in fine shape.

Flack expressed the troop's appreciation to 20/20 for their help with the project.

Counseling Center seeks members

The Lincoln County Counseling Center got a boost Tuesday when Kathy Barnett, president of Altrusa Club of Ruidoso, purchased an associate membership for the club, as well as an individual membership for herself, in the Lincoln County Mental Health Association (LCMHA).

LCMHA is a support group whose seven-member advisory board serves as a liaison between the Counseling Center and the

community and county. Tom Harper, Center director, said, "They keep us abreast of community and county needs," Harper said.

LCMHA is currently conducting a membership drive, seeking support from individuals, organizations and corporations, in hopes of putting together a concerted lobbying effort aimed at the state's political leaders who may be involved in making the decisions of future funding of social service programs such as the Center's.

Under Reaganomics, said Harper, the fate of social service programs appears uncertain. He anticipates their funding

will be cut back 37 percent by July of 1982. Whether the Counseling Center can continue to exist under those circumstances is questionable, Harper said, unless new sources of revenue and support are forthcoming. "It all comes down to whether people think we provide a worthwhile and valuable service in the community and county," he said.

The cost of a LCMHA associate membership is \$2 and can be purchased from any board member or at the Counseling Center. Officers in the association are Carol Keys, president; Gwyneth Jones, secretary and Renee Rawhouser, treasurer.

State Forestry team making forest water quality study

The New Mexico State Forestry Division is currently developing a method for assessing water quality problems stemming from forestry management activities. This is part of an overall national plan which seeks to reduce man-caused water pollution to the point where all waters are clear enough for swimming and fishing.

Raymond Gallegos, State Forester, has put together an inter-disciplinary team composed of a forest hydrologist, a forest management specialist, a soil specialist and a statistician. This team of specialists is developing and implementing a statewide water quality plan for forestry non-point sources.

Water pollution from forestry activities are classed as "non-point" sources. This means the source of pollution causing the problem cannot be attributed to a specific discharge point such as a waste outlet from a chemical plant; rather the source originates over a large area. This could be a 10,000 acre municipal watershed or a 100 acre timber sale. In either case sediment movement cannot be pinned down to a single source. It is the combination of many practices, each contributing a little bit to the total sediment load in any given stream.

The team is developing a format which will survey all forested watersheds to determine where the major problem areas are and what type of forestry operations contribute the most to water pollution. Once this is known, appropriate measures can be implemented to reduce sediment loading to acceptable standards.

A major objective of the program is to mount an intensive education program to inform forest landowners of management practices which can significantly reduce sediment movement. Landowner ac-

ceptance and participation is essential to assure the success of the program.

A brochure will be available in the summer of 1982 which will explain the forestry practices which are the most effective in controlling soil erosion.

Owners of forested property who are contemplating a timber harvest, building a road, thinning or reforestation, should contact the Forestry Division.

"We can help you plan so you will have the least amount of soil erosion for the dollars invested," Gallegos said.





Regardless of how the state AAA football playoffs come out, it's been proven that district 3-AAA teams are as good as any in the state.

Although Silver City is ranked first in the state, not much respect has been given to other 3-AAA teams, notably Ruidoso.

Silver City's crushing 41-0 opening round victory over Raton made the Warriors' last minute 21-14 loss to the Colts look more impressive from the Ruidoso point of view. There's not much difference between Silver City and Ruidoso, if any, so the Warriors surely deserve a higher ranking than the seventh place they're rated at.

Another feather in the cap of 3-AAA followers was Tularosa's tight 6-0 defeat at the hands of powerful 4-AAA champion Portales. That close decision was especially significant since the 4-AAA district is considered by many people to be the toughest AAA district in the state.

The Tularosa-Portales score was significant for Ruidoso fans since the Warriors should never have lost to the Wildcats during the regular season. Ruidoso could probably defeat Tularosa eight times out of 10 and is definitely a better team than the Wildcats.

The proposed change in district alignment for AAA schools would put Ruidoso in the same loop as Portales and Artesia, the defending AAA state champion. Still, the overall balance of district 3-AAA is probably equal to the 4-AAA district. These two districts are far stronger than the northern districts in and around Albuquerque.

If realignment is approved it will not come about until the 1983-84 school year so we'll probably see more of the same results in next year's AAA grid playoffs.

Defense was the strong point of the University of New Mexico football team this season and it was reflected in the All-Western Athletic Conference All-Star teams recently released.

Although the Lobos failed to land a single player on the offensive squad they had two players make the first team defensive squad and two were named to the second team.

Greg Azar, who at 5-11, 188 pounds, may be the smallest major-college nose guard in the country, was named as one defensive lineman on the first team. Jimmie Carter, a sophomore, made the first team as a linebacker.


Second team selections were linebacker Jonny Jackson, only a freshman, and defensive back Ray Hornfeck, also a frosh player.

With three all conference players returning next season UNM appears solid on defense again. Now if the Lobos can only get their offense going they may have a crack at the winning season which has availed them the past several years.

Although basketball and wrestling will dominate the high school sports scene in the months ahead, skiing will also occupy a large amount of sporting interest among youths in the Ruidoso area.

Capple King and Mark Mobley of the Junior Ski Racers will compete in a race in Aspen, Colorado, December 12-13. After that the general junior ski racers program swings into high gear in January and lasts until spring.

Hopefully the local ski season at Sierra Blanca and Eagle Creek will get going, once we get some snow.

Improved outlook for ski resorts

Prospects for skiing in the Ruidoso area improved greatly over the Thanksgiving holidays.

Eagle Creek Ski and Recreation Area opened its beginner's slope Thanksgiving Day with some ski classes being taught. Owner Paul Southwick hopes to open the intermediate slopes very soon.

"As soon as it gets cold, or it snows, we'll

be able to do it," Southwick said. "In order to make more snow for the intermediate slopes we need a temperature of around 28 degrees. The last couple of days it's been around 32 degrees at night. No natural snow has fallen here yet."

About 250 people attended the Eagle Creek ski area Thursday through Saturday, according to Southwick.

"That's not quite as much as last year," Southwick said. "We had about the same amount of snow as we did this year on our beginner's slope but more people showed up last Thanksgiving for some reason."

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, located over 3,000 feet above Eagle Creek in elevation, drew a liberal dose of snow over the weekend but the resort still hasn't opened its slopes.

One inch of snow fell on the ski resort Friday, over three inches Saturday and at

least two inches yesterday.

More snow is needed to open the slopes but there is a possibility some slopes could be opened soon. Last year at Thanksgiving Sierra Blanca opened its beginner's slope but the advanced areas didn't open until later.

Many other ski resorts in New Mexico and Colorado should open within the next two weeks, including Aspen and Loveland Valley in Colorado.

Ruidoso High School's basketball team begins the long road to what it hopes will be a repeat of last year when it opens the 1981-82 season at New Mexico Military Institute tomorrow.

The Warriors, who went 17-9 and won the district championship last season, have two returning starters in 6-3 forward-center Bill Richardson and 5-9 guard Scott Neal. Several other lettermen return from last season including forward Michael Forte, guard Wade Wilson and guard-forward Kyle Schutet.

Steve Sluder, a 6-3 forward up from the junior varsity, should give Richardson help on the boards. Marc Delhotal, another junior varsity graduate, should help in the

The junior varsity game between the two schools will start at 6:30 p.m., with the varsity game following.

Coach Ron Geyer of the Ruidoso junior varsity has several fine players from which to put a starting five together.

Cyrus Simmons, a sophomore who had some playing time last season, is a 5-9 forward with quickness and good shooting ability. Brendon Cothrun, 6-3, should be the starting Warrior center and Chris Wynn is a 5-10 junior forward.

Guard prospects include junior Paul Jaramillo, 5-6; Gilbert Rivera, 5-3 and 5-9 Johnny Williams, a transfer from Alamogordo.

"We've looked pretty good in practice," said Geyer. "We're still making some mistakes but we're improving each day."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Does it hurt the Democratic party when some of its present and past biggies get in trouble with the law?

Well, let's put it this way: It can't help a bit. Immediate reference, of course, is made to the case of Eddie Barboa, former State Senator and once thought by many to be the kingpin of Albuquerque's South Valley. He just took a fall on six counts of food stamp fraud.

True to form, Eddie couldn't help making a smart remark even as adversely closed around him. He said he might have to go out and sell some more food stamps to finance his appeal.

That's the kind of crack a sentencing judge just might not find amusing.

By what is surely a great coincidence, David Santillanes, once thought by many to be the kingpin of Albuquerque's North Valley, is also in trouble.

A grand jury says he violated his trust as a County Commissioner, and it wants him removed from office.

From the shocked look on his face after he appeared before that grand jury, many concluded that he must have heard some things which violently disagreed with him.

If the evidence against him turns out to be strong, he too will not have done much to improve the image of the party.

And there are others.

There's one of Bruce King's appointments to the Highway Commission, who has been charged with arson of a building he owned in Las Vegas.

There's the immediate past state chairman of the party, whose dealings in

mortgages and real estate have raised an unusually large number of questions by at least two other grand juries.

And there's even a former Otero county chairman who couldn't make this year's party elections because he had been apprehended in a nearby county on a charge which involves what we now call "firearms enhancement."

Not — all in all — a pretty picture. Folks who were thinking of voting Democratic next year might well wonder whether it's worth the effort.

But, as you can understand, this column doesn't want to be hard solely on the Democrats.

So let's look at another action that is stupid, if not also illegal, but which is strictly bipartisan.

That's the use by the Goldust Twins of the State Corporation Commission of cars with improper licenses.

Those two, in case you haven't been following the news lately, are Eric Serna, Democrat and chairman of the Commission, and Jimmie Glenn, Republican and Serna's patsy.

Both have been intermittently driving back and forth between their homes in Albuquerque and their offices in Santa Fe in Commission cars bearing license plates which are supposed to be issued only for autos used in investigative work.

What's to investigate between home and office?

Nothing. And the two supremely innocent Commissioners, when caught in the act, say they were not aware of any restrictions on state cars with cover plates.

Reading that, even the simplest of us asks, "Shouldn't they have been aware?" These, after all, are men who perform a quasijudicial function in their own right as Commissioners. Wouldn't you think if they are judging others they would be acquainted with the law governing themselves?

The simplest answer to that question: They bloody well ought to be.

Sense & Nonsense



U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici

I had the opportunity to speak before the first National Conference on Fitness and Aging in Washington the other day. As a member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging, I am keenly aware that physical fitness for the elderly has been neglected in the past and is a critical problem both now and for the future.

The fact is, Americans are living longer now than ever before. Life expectancy for the average American has increased by 25 years during the 20th century. Not only will we have more Americans living longer, but a higher proportion of our population will be classified as "elderly." America has a responsibility to make sure that these added life expectancy years are good years, not wasteful years.

Figures from my Budget Committee

reveal why physical fitness is such an important topic for the elderly. National health expenditures for Americans aged 65 and older have reached about \$50 billion. To appreciate the magnitude of that number, consider that the total of Social Security checks sent to eligible Americans reached \$140 billion in the same year. To look at these in perspective, this means that on the average, every Social Security recipient took more than a third of their check each month and paid nothing more than medical bills and related expenses with it.

Older Americans spent 3.4 times as much on a per capita basis each year for medical care than other Americans. While it is true that growing older subjects us to more disease, I still contend that much of the \$21 billion that went to hospitals, the \$13 billion spent on nursing home care, and the \$9 billion given to doctors for physicians' care, could have been saved. Billions of dollars that come from the pockets of our senior citizens and from taxpayers could be saved each year if we concentrated as we should on the physical fitness and recreational needs of the elderly.

More than just the dollar figures, the failure to provide opportunities for elderly physical fitness and recreation, and education of the elderly in fitness, is costing America a tragic number of lives. I believe we could have saved many of those 537,000 Americans aged 65 and over who died of major cardio-vascular disease in 1978, if we had concentrated more on their physical fitness.

Fitness habits, as we all know, are learned early and continued throughout life. The best prevention for premature aging and death are the teaching of lifetime recreational and physical activities to young people. As a nation we have been late coming to that realization. For those millions of Americans who are now elderly and have never been given lifetime recreational activity opportunities, now is the time for reeducation.

Cold budget numbers don't tell the tale. Those Americans confined unnecessarily to bed, who die too early from stroke and heart attack, who still want to work and be active members of society, want to be told how they can improve their fitness and their lives. It is the responsibility and task of all Americans to get this message across. The federal government, working together in a cooperative manner with individuals, senior citizen organizations, private firms, national professional organizations, the medical and recreational professions, can do more than the limited dollars available to them with we have done in the past.

Better fitness for the elderly would reduce health and medical expenditures and improve the quality of life for so many millions of elderly Americans. The money spent today on health care for the elderly could be used instead for housing, food, and continuing education — if this message of fitness is passed on to our nation's elderly.

GOODBYE, GUILLOTINE

The gleaming, feral blade of the guillotine will no longer strike off heads in France. This instrument of death, adopted as a supposedly painless means of execution at the time of the revolution late in the 18th century, has just been retired from service. The French have abolished capital punishment.

France thus somewhat belatedly joins the ranks of nations which no longer exact the death penalty. The pity is that our country lacks the grace and compassion to do likewise.

We Americans pride ourselves on being at the forefront of civilization. We are gratified when other peoples look to us for leadership. But in this regard, the abolition of a custom that is plainly a remnant of barbarism, we are far behind the rest of the world. The guillotine is retired; the gas chamber and electric chair are still ready for use. That is nothing to be proud of. — Alamogordo Daily News

Mescalero Forestry Complex busy with reseedling program

Fire prevention, timber sales administration and forest development are three major areas in which foresters are involved at the Mescalero Forestry Complex.

Of the 172,056 forested acres of the reservation, all are under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), according to Larry Schmidt, agency forest manager.

Fire management and prevention is probably the most critical area in which the service concerns themselves. Ap-

proximately 16 employees handle the various duties associated with that task. "During high risk fire season, however, we fluctuate to as many as 50-60 personnel," said Schmidt. High risk fire season is usually from early April to mid-July.

Raymond Kirgan, fire management officer, follows guidelines in maintaining his staff from a comprehensive fire plan. According to Schmidt, the fire plan takes records from an accumulation of 10 years worth of records and figures out an average, which tells the BIA how many people the staff needs to maintain its programs at different times of the year.

Most of the training for the forestry complex positions is done on a local level. However, when more responsible and specific training is required, it takes place in Boise, Idaho, where the BIA fire activity main office is located as well as the Boise Interagency Fire Center.

At the main offices, training is coordinated and curriculum is directed, according to Schmidt.

Timber sale administration is another area in which the Mescalero Forestry Complex is involved. This division concentrates on the cutting of selected trees and selling them for commercial and non-commercial uses. Revenue generated by the sale of timber is funneled back to the Mescalero Apache Indian tribe, according to Schmidt.

Under the Forest Development Division, the greenhouse is the major focus area, Schmidt said. Two years after seedlings have been planted in the forest, a check is made to see how effective the planting procedure is. Another inspection is completed five years after the initial planting to determine the survival percentage of the trees planted.

The reservation maintains four greenhouses, under the management of Dave Larson, forest development officer. Two of the houses hold 95,000 seedlings each while the other two house 105,000 trees each. Ponderosa Pine and Douglas Fir are the two major seedlings grown in Mescalero.

"It takes about two and a half days to fill a greenhouse," Larson said. Baskets with individual compartments are loaded on a conveyor belt in a shed and sent into the greenhouse. Workers pack in dirt, then put the seed in.

"We do the welding and make the baskets ourselves," Larson said. The baskets are held together by welded steel bands to make them easier to carry.

"We usually grow the trees in the greenhouse about four months and then move them to the shade house until the summer rainy season (July or August)," Larson said. Moving them to the shade house acclimates the seedlings so they will be used to surviving in near normal conditions.

"We are working on reforestation of the 1971 Elk Springs burn area. We plant about 720,000 trees a year and all are planted on the reservation," Larson said.

The Elk Springs fire burned 20,000 acres of timber in 1971 and is the last serious fire the reservation has experienced.

When the seedlings are four to six inches tall, they are planted. "Forty-seven percent survival rate is the best we've had," Larson said. Wind, moisture conditions during the fall, mice and deer are some of the reasons attributed to loss of seedlings.

Contractors are hired to do the actual planting of the seedlings, since the forestry

service doesn't have the man power. Before a tree is planted, it is exposed to stress situations to get it used to natural conditions. Stress conditions include drying the plant out, over-watering and subjecting it to extreme heat and cold.

While they are first growing in the greenhouse, temperatures are maintained at a steady 65-70 degrees and the seedlings are fed a constant flow of nutrients, according to Larson.

"We're in a unique situation here when it

comes to management," Schmidt said in summary. "If we need tribal assistance, they are there to lend aid. "Of all of the reservations I've served, this one is the most sharp when it comes to management," Schmidt said.



EACH OF THESE seedlings took approximately three weeks to reach this size and will eventually be planted in the forest. Less than half of them will probably survive to adult height.

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF), on behalf of the National Clean Air Coalition, has proposed a four-point plan to reduce sulfur dioxide emissions in 31 states in order to begin solving the nation's growing acid rain problem.

The plan was outlined by Dr. Jay D. Hair, executive vice president of the NWF, at a House Energy and Commerce Committee hearing on acid rain. The NWF is a member of the National Clean Air Coalition, whose members include conservation, health, labor and consumer groups interested in educating the public about the dangers of air pollution.

The Coalition plan recommends that Congress mandate a ten million ton per year reduction in sulfur dioxide emissions in 31 eastern states by 1990. Hair noted that sulfur dioxide emissions should be dealt with first because they are responsible for "up to 80 percent of the acid precipitation in the northeast."

When sulfur dioxide emissions, mainly

generated by coal-burning power plants, combine with rain or snow they form an acid which is often blown hundreds of miles from its actual source before it falls to earth. Acid rain has killed the fish in more than 90 lakes in the Adirondack Mountains, and a recent ADFW report revealed that 15 eastern states are "extremely vulnerable" to the harmful effects of acid rain.

Under the plan Hair outlined, Congress would set a formula which would allow utilities in the 31 eastern states to appropriate fairly among themselves the Moffett (D-Conn.). In calling for effective acid rain control legislation, Hair said, the NWF, the nation's largest conservation organization, is "in the company of the bipartisan National Commission on Air Quality, the prestigious National Academy of Sciences, and the 86 percent of the American people — whom we all represent — who have indicated their support for a strong Clean Air Act."

burden of a ten million ton sulfur dioxide reduction. Each sulfur dioxide generator subject to the reduction requirements would be given up to two years to submit a reduction proposal to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Utilities, which account for about three-quarters of all sulfur dioxide emissions in the eastern United States, would be allowed to "trade" emission reduction obligations among themselves and non-utility plants. Although EPA would have final approval of the utilities' reduction plans, the states would have an active role in enforcing the plans.

Hair expressed strong support for an acid rain bill — S. 1706 — recently introduced by Senator George Mitchell (D-Maine), and for similar legislation to be introduced by Representative Toby

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

Tip From Reader — Chances are you expect your fishing gear to perform trouble free when you need it. But do you make any effort to insure that it performs as designed, or do you merely use it and stick it away for the winter. Much of the trouble experienced with tackle can be eliminated by proper storage and maintenance. You are cheating yourself if you don't attempt to get maximum life from it.

Let's consider what to do when fishing season ends. Honestly, most people just leave the tackle sit wherever it happens to be, or at the most move it into some out of the way corner. Before you do that, try to spruce it up some. It's a good time to thoroughly clean the gear. One of the best ways is to remove the reels then stand the rods up outside and thoroughly hose them down. This will remove all loose dirt and accumulated salt. Immerse the reels fully in a bucket of water, and let them set awhile. Most of the salt will be dissolved by this action. After they are removed, shake off excess water and set in the sun to dry. After this, it would be a good time to disassemble the reels and remove most of the old grease around the gears. Apply a new coating of grease and reassemble them. Spray on a coat of WD-40 or CRC and they will be ready to store. You could remove the old line and discard it but it would be best to wait until next season to put on new line.

After the rods are dry, check for broken guides and frayed wrappings. It would be a good time to repair anything that is not up to par. The reel seats and guides can be sprayed like the reels to afford some winter protection. By the way, if the rod breaks down, be sure to take it apart and clean the ferrules, else it may not come apart next spring.

If space allows the rods should be stored upright. Again, if you have a choice, store the rods and reels in a dry atmosphere. This will prevent rusting and corrosion. With these things done, your tackle will be ready at a moment's notice when the big ones start hitting in the spring. And you are a lot less apt to have tackle trouble. — Sandy M., North Carolina

UNM offering special degree in engineering

The University of New Mexico (UNM), a frontrunner in the field of microelectronics, has become the first university in the nation to offer a bachelor's of engineering degree with a microelectronics option.

"This is a special interdisciplinary degree program designed to train engineers to work in the fabrication end of microelectronic circuits," said Dr. Roy Colclaser, a professor of electrical and computer engineering at UNM who developed the four-year degree program.

"Students will earn what is essentially a combined chemistry and electrical engineering degree. The microelectronics option requires much more chemistry than other engineering programs, so certain chemistry courses have been substituted for some of the electrical engineering courses required in that degree program."

Colclaser said UNM's program was developed in response to specific requests from industry. "Although many semiconductor companies are located in Albuquerque, we were responding to requests from industry nationwide in developing this program. And we have incorporated industry's input and ideas into our program," he said.

The job prospects for microelectronics

graduates are promising. Companies contacted directly about employment needs project that an estimated 1,200 engineers trained in microelectronics circuit fabrication will be needed during the next five years, Colclaser said. An industry surveyor, however, was even more optimistic, predicting that up to 3,000 positions will open up in five years.

UNM is one of the few universities in the nation equipped with an undergraduate microelectronics laboratory that enables students to design and fabricate circuits. "The fact that we've had an integrated circuit fabrication laboratory for 10 years has made UNM very strong in this particular subject area," Colclaser said, "and really provided the basis for the new degree program."


Explaining the importance of chemistry in this new engineering program, he said, "Every aspect of fabrication involves chemical processes, including the photographic process, etching, and creating compounds and cleaning processes. An understanding of chemistry is essential in microelectronics engineering."

The combined chemistry and electrical engineering background will produce an engineer who not only knows what the devices do and how they're made, but also understands the chemical processes involved in making them.



New Mexico Game and Fish News

The winter trout season is again in full swing. Those waters in our area which are too warm for trout during the summer months are now being stocked with catchable-sized rainbow trout. Most of our trout come from the rearing station at Santa Rosa, under the supervision of foreman Leroy Gallegos. The moderate water temperature at the Rock Lake rearing station is ideal for maximum trout growth, and makes it easier for the trout to acclimate themselves to southeastern New Mexico waters. Those lakes designated as winter trout waters are normally stocked twice a month, the rivers usually once a month.

Those of you deer hunters who bag your game early in the hunt, might take along your fishing pole and try the Penasco River, Tularosa Creek, Bear Canyon Lake, Rio Ruidoso or Alto Lake. All of these waters are stocked through the winter with rainbow trout. If you really want to impress your hunting partners, try serving them a mess of fresh trout, fried in bacon grease with just a little butter.


Anglers are required to have a trout validation with their fishing license. The bag limit on rainbow trout is eight per day for licensed anglers, and four per day for unlicensed anglers under 12 years of age.

Dr. Carl Sagan explores ultimate fate of Cosmos

Where did the universe come from? What is the ultimate fate of the Cosmos? Dr. Carl Sagan (pictured) examines these questions in "The Edge of Forever," the tenth episode of "Cosmos," on Tuesday, December 1 on PBS. (Check listings for exact time.) "Cosmos" originally ran on PBS in the fall of 1980.

Fifteen billion years ago, the entire universe—all of space and everything in it—began to expand in the mightiest explosion of all time. Using computer animation, Dr. Sagan takes the audience through the early moments of the "big bang," when all types of particles and antiparticles collided with titanic fury.

As space expanded and the Cosmos cooled, matter began to clump together. A billion years after the big bang saw the formation of galaxies, whose elegant spiral, elliptical, and ringed forms testify to the variegated interplay of natural forces. Some galaxies have been racked by events of cosmic violence. Quasars, capable of emitting more energy per second than any other objects in the universe, may be young galaxies in formation, seen as they were billions of years ago because of the immense distances their light must travel to reach the Earth.

As quasars and galaxies formed, the universe continued to expand and expands even now. Dr. Sagan shows how human beings came to know about the expansion of the universe through knowledge of the Doppler effect, which changes the color of the light we see if an object is moving toward us or away from us.

If the universe is expanding now, must it expand forever? Dr. Sagan points out that it may not and that the Cosmos may eventually contract. Such contraction would point toward an oscillating universe—passing through alternate stages of expansion and contraction. With Dr. Sagan, viewers journey to the Pongal festival in southern India, where an ancient rite celebrates the cycles of nature. Like modern cosmology, Hindu mythology speaks of the possibility of endless cycles of death and rebirth in each cycle, with billions of years spent in each cycle.
