WINS KANSAS DERBY WITH EASE

Special Effort taking up where he left off

Special Effort, the colt they're calling the greatest horse in quarter horse racing history, continued to live up to that billing with a devastating performance in Sunday's eighth running of the Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

Special Effort accelerated brutally at the midway point of the 400-yard dash and thundered by his foes with ridiculous ease. He hit the wire a booming two and three-fourths lengths on top; picked up the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds; enriched his overstuffed coffers by \$122,150; and lifted his career money line up to a soaring \$1,150,013.

It was also his 11th straight victory against no defeats. In addition, the Kansas win proved Special Effort is every bit as good as a three-year-old as he was as a two-year-old.

Last year, the colt swept the two-year-old Triple Crown — after being purchased by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas, for \$1 million. On the eve of the colt's victorious performance in last summer's All-American Futurity, he was syndicated by Urschel for \$15 million.

His current market value is anyone's smart guess, but it would surprise few observers if it were in the \$40 million range.

Special Effort added extra icing to his Kansas Derby cake by blasting over the 400 yards in a seasonal-record clocking of 20.25 seconds. His regular pilot, W. R. Hunt, was at the controls. Special Effort is trained by Johnnie Goodman.

The obvious darling of the betting public, Special Effort returned the rock-bottom \$2.20 across the board. He also stimulated a minus place pool of \$84.17 and a minus show pool of \$10.00.

Special Effort is by the thoroughbred, Raise Your Glass, out of the somewhat undistinguished quarter horse mare, Go Effortlessly.

The Kansas Derby provided a few surprises as Special Effort, coming out of the number 10 slot, immediately drew close to the lead. Yeller Fuel, a 45-1 longshot, had some early power, but faded quickly. Next, Real Jet Wind, a 13-1 outsider, mov-

ed into the lead. The colt was trucking at full speed, and it almost seemed an upset was in the making.

Special Effort lingered a bit, settling in a holding pattern. But at the halfway point, without any whipping from jockey Hunt, he suddenly fired up and soared into the lead with enormous authority.

Go For Bugs, carrying odds of 11½-1, rallied well out of fifth place to finish second. The colt, owned by Mary Watkins of Madison, Mississippi, earned \$55,840. Steve Harris was up. The payoffs: \$3, \$2.20.

Real Jet Wind, who hit the finish a nose behind Go For Bugs, banked \$28,618 for third and paid the minimum \$2.20 for show. Roy Brooks was up. Real Jet Wind is owned by the Elsie Kitchens of Fort Sumner.

Here's the way the also-rans checked in, with purse money earned: 4th — Broken pedal, \$15,007; 5th — Bugs Mito, \$13,611; 6th — Asertive, \$13,262; 7th — Lika Jenni, \$12,913; 8th — Easy Diamond Jim, \$12,564; 9th — Ima Ten Too, \$12,215; 10th — Yeller Fuel, \$11,866.

Special Effort's next target is the \$75,000 (estimated) Rainbow Derby on July 4. The third and final leg of the Triple Crown is the \$1 million All-American Derby by August 29.

Only one horse, My Easy Credit, has swept the three-year-old Triple Crown. Special Effort is the only one to do so as a two-year-old.

ON SATURDAY, PONTI BAR closed with a relentless drive on the outside and soared to a half-length win in the Kansas Derby Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.

The 400-yard dash offered a gross purse of \$50,954 and handed \$10,773 to the winner. Ponti Bar, a son of Ponti out of Taska Top, cleared the distance in a no-wind clocking of 20.35 seconds. The chestnut colt operated as an 8-5 favorite in a tough and well balanced field, and returned mutuel payoffs of \$5.40, \$4.20, \$3.20.

Luke Myles was in the saddle. The Kansas Consolation winner is trained by R. W. Werner for Anastasia Henning of Rufugio, Texas. The win was Ponti Bar's second of the year. It lifted his career earnings up to \$76,593.

Turn Bugs Loose, a 3-1 shot leased by Rex Brooks, finished second in a game effort and collected \$7,541. Steve Harris was at the controls. The payoffs: \$5, \$3.80. Splashing Bunny, ridden by Gary Sumpter out of the rail post, ended up third — a nose behind Turn Bugs Loose.

Splashing Bunny collected \$5,745 and handed out a show price of \$5. The filly is owned by E. L. and Velma Weber of Anadarko, Oklahoma.

Ponti Bar broke near the lead from the number eight post and stayed close or on the lead during the early going. He avoided any bumping or rough spots. But that was not the case with the three inside horses, particularly Chicks Passem All and Supreme Flame. The two collided several times in the early scramble for position.

With about 100 yards to go, Ponti Bar began picking up steam. As he neared the wire, he suddenly took command with authority. He was pulling away when he hit the finish.


Here's the way the rest of the field checked in, with purse money earned: 4th — Six Doubles, \$5,386; 5th — Mr. Easy Ed, \$5,027; 6th — The Creditor, \$4,309; 7th — Chicks Passem All, \$3,950; 8th — Supreme Flame, \$3,591; 9th — Jet Siree, \$3,232. Easy Trace, which qualified with the fourth-best time, died several days after the trials. His owner collected \$1,396.

FRIDAY'S RENEWAL of the 400-yard Mr. Jet Moore Stakes at Ruidoso Downs ended in a hectic scramble. The top four finishers were separated by noses.

Unfortunately for the betting public, the winning nose did not belong to Native Gambler, the five-year-old gelding, who went into the fray as the fifth-richest quarter horse of all time. His money line stood at \$636,532.

But Native Gambler, breaking form the number eight post, got away a bit sluggishly and was never able to shift into high gear. He made up ground during the final stages of the dash, but it was a case of too little too late.

All the glory went to A Smooth Bug, a 23-1 outsider ridden magnificently by Willie Lovell. The four-year-old finished out of fourth place, charging in the middle

of the track. He barely got up in time on the last jump.

Even as the horses swept across the finish, it was almost impossible to spot the winner. A Smooth Bug, owned by Kathy and Oliver Lee Jr. of Datil, picked up his second straight win and enriched himself by \$3,663. The gross purse was \$6,105. In his previous try, he had grabbed the John Phillips Handicap at Sunland Park.

Fans who supported A Smooth Bug in the Mr. Jet Moore Stakes collected whopping mutuel returns of \$47.80, \$10.60 and \$7.40. Dr. Depot, a 7-2 shot handled by Alex Baldillez Jr., finished second and earned \$1,340. The payoffs: \$5.40, \$6.60. Rocket Jet Bug, the veteran stakes star, finished third. The show price was \$8.60.

Fans who linked A Smooth Bug and Dr. Depot in the quinella got back \$67.60. A Smooth Bug, aided by a tailwind, clocked the 400 yards in 20.29 seconds.

Two weeks from tonight, Ruidoso Summer Festival, Incorporated (RSFI), will present the Silver Slipper Soiree as part of this year's summer music festival, announced Jeanie Whitwam, RSFI board director.

She said festival organizers are also very excited about Gordon Snidow making his annual contribution to RSFI. Snidow's painting "Sweet Talking Man" will be printed and then sold by RSFI to raise funds for the Ruidoso Summer Festival.

The Silver Slipper Soiree will be held at 8 p.m. Monday, June 7, in the Mesclero Room at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. In addition to dancing to the sounds of the Dixieland Jazz Band of the Fort Worth Symphony's Texas Little Symphony, craps and blackjack tables will be set up to raise funds for RSFI, said Whitwam.

"It's going to be a fun evening with dancing, gambling and good food. Formal attire will be worn. It's truly going to be an elegant affair that no one should miss," Whitwam commented.

She explained that admission to the Silver Slipper Soiree will cost \$10. Selected hors d'oeuvres prepared by chef John Frey and drinks will be available, noted Whitwam.

A minimum chip purchase of \$10 will be required to play the tables, Whitwam said. She added that people still holding chips at the end of the evening will be eligible for the many prizes that have been donated to RSFI.

The main prize, Whitwam pointed out, will be a weekend for two at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Another item to be treasured will be the framed Gordon Snidow print, "Eyein' the Catch Hand."

Rubble pile smoldered... and smoldered... and smoldered

The Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department (RDVFD) Friday excavated a pile of rubble that smoldered for two weeks and found the smoke was caused from a septic tank burning underground.

Smoke from the pile, which was the burned remains of a demolished house at Spring Road and Highway 70, wafted into nearby homes and businesses, causing people discomfort and anger.

Pete Wood, who owns Wood Welding Service across Highway 70 from the site of the smoking debris, said Thursday, "It stinks like hell."

Wood said he had complained to the village about the smoke more than a week previously. Police Chief Carl DuCep said he received several complaints and added he felt the situation was left for too long.

"That was a stinking rascal for a couple of days," Wood said. "It was about to knock us off the hill."

Wood mentioned he has breathing difficulties, and that the smoke entering his shop complicated those problems.

The pile was set on fire by the RDVFD on May 8. The department had been asked by the owners of the property, Ray and Lorna Parnell, to burn a structure they had demolished, said fire chief Chet Southard.

Lorna Parnell applied for an open burning permit with the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) on May 5 to allow the RDVFD to burn the town down structure. The application states that it was "too expensive to remove" the materials, which, Parnell said, would have cost \$50 to \$75 an hour to have hauled away.

EID approved the permit on the condi-

tions that wind direction be such that it carry the smoke away from residential areas; that the amount of dirt be minimized on material being burned; that no rubber or petroleum products be burned; and that all applicable codes be complied with.

The owners complied with Ruidoso Downs' ordinances, RDVFD director James R. Riley said.

The fire department burned the materials, which Southard said were piled into a large hole where the structure had stood, and covered the pile with dirt. This was done the afternoon of Sunday, May 9, Southard noted, and RDVFD extinguished the fire later in the day.

Southard said that at first, he saw the controlled burn as an opportunity for training.

But the fire turned out to be a headache for the department.

Motorcycle Festival plans firming up

The Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) met Thursday to review plans currently underway for the September 29 through October 2 Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival.

"This thing (festival) is firming up pretty well," commented RBA treasurer Lawrence Hill.

He reported that secretary Fran Smeal has confirmed that 25 to 35 booth spaces have been reserved by motorcycle manufacturers and motorcycle parts and accessories vendors in the convention tents.

Hill stated that two professional circus tents will be rented from a California tent leasing firm to house the motorcycle convention. The cost of the tents will be \$45,000, said Hill. The tents will include canvas doors and flaps to minimize the kicking up of dust, plus a lighting system and generator. Included in the cost is delivery and erection of the tents.

Hill said that RBA has submitted applications for non-profit corporate status and American Motorcycle Association

event certification. Although neither application has been accepted yet, Hill stated that acceptance will merely be a matter of formality.

Nancy Radziewicz reported that nothing yet has been settled concerning insurance of the motorcycle festival.

The cocktail party for convention vendors was also discussed by Radziewicz. The party will be the Tuesday evening prior to the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival and will be held at Cree Meadows Restaurant, she said. RBA members are presently looking into the possibility of having some village officials attend to officially greet the motorcycle festival vendors to Ruidoso.

Radziewicz informed the group that six local organizations have signed up to operate food booths at the festival. She stated that the Noon Lions Club will operate a hot dog and soft drink booth; Ruidoso Gymnastics Association will man a nachos and soft drink stand; and the Elks have opted to serve barbecue sandwiches and beans.

Sertoma will provide popcorn and soft drinks; Gamma Rho chapter of Beta Sigma Phi sorority will sell cookies,

brownies and hot apple cider; and Pilots Club will operate a soft drink and munchies booth, added Radziewicz.

"It's (operating food booths) a good way for non-profit organizations to make some money," said Hill.

Organizations allowed to operate food stands on festival grounds will assist in directing the various events planned for the four-day motorcycle get-together, Radziewicz stated.

RBA discussed with Marlan Maloy the possibility of photographing and documenting the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. Maloy said he is considering launching a photography enterprise in Ruidoso and is an experienced motorcycle and sports photographer.

Hill told RBA that pre-registrations for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival are coming in daily from all over the country. Registrations have already been received from motorcycle clubs and individual cyclists in Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Mississippi and Texas, said Hill.

Hill invited all local businessmen, motorcycle enthusiasts and any other interested people to attend RBA's next meeting, Thursday, June 3, at 7 p.m. at Hill's Pancake House.

Chamber asks revision of lodgers' tax request

A special meeting of the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) was called Thursday to revise the 1982-83 anticipated expenditures from lodgers' tax receipts to defray costs connected with tourist promotion.

The total amount budgeted to cover advertising and promotion expenses was raised from \$78,070 to \$34,370, stated LTC secretary Jo Ann Farris.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce directors Morgan Clough, Richard Sandoval, Dan Shaver, Ronnie Hemphill and Jim Paxton were on hand to present a new Chamber budget proposal to LTC.

At the May 12 regular meeting of LTC, committee members cut from the Chamber of Commerce request for funds a provision allowing for full-time help directly related to tourist promotion through the Chamber. The amount re-

quested at that time was \$9,300 for the 1982-83 fiscal year.

LTC chairman Ed Hyman said Chamber leaders felt a full-time tourist promotion person was essential. In order to have the requested \$9,300 accepted, Chamber leaders struck off their request of \$3,000 for costs related to the Chili-Cookoff during Aspen Festival '82.

Instead of the \$18,345 which LTC accepted previously, the Chamber will now receive \$24,645 to defray costs connected with tourist promotion handled through the Chamber of Commerce.

Farris stressed that this was again a stop-gap measure for the Chamber and would not be considered an automatic appropriation for next year's budget. She suggested that in the future the Chamber support its own personnel with its own funding.

Following the burning, the debris continued to smolder. Frequent winds blew thick smoke into residential areas and across the highway to the week after the fire, which led Wood to complain about the situation.

The smoke subsided after the first week, but it continued to drift into surrounding neighborhoods.

Wood said he called the fire department that first week. Ruidoso Downs Mayor J. C. Day said the village received other complaints, and he thought the fire department was going to cover the materials with dirt.

Southard said RDVFD made "six or seven calls (trips)" to the site, but that efforts to halt the smoldering were in vain until last Friday, when the department dug up the debris with a backhoe.

Riley said the department poured over 3,000 gallons of water onto the debris, trying to put the fire out. He indicated this was far more than the amount thought needed to extinguish it.

"We can't drain the entire water supply," Riley said.

Southard said the pile continued to smolder because it was burning underground.

"When they tore it down, they tried to bury it," he said. "They asked us to burn it off, so we control burned it. But I didn't think she (the owner) would just leave it there."

Lorna Parnell, who lives in Hobbs, said she had been in contact with RDVFD following the burn and was aware of the

smoke. She said she returned to Ruidoso Downs the week after the fire.

Riley said Parnell was in town this past weekend. He said she paid for the use of the backhoe.

Southard indicated last week that if Parnell had not stopped the debris from smoldering, the department would have had to cover the area with dirt to smother the burning material.

Hari Mukhoty of EID noted the amount of smoke did not violate air pollution regulations, but he called it "a borderline situation."

"I don't see how people can set a fire, then leave," Mukhoty said. "They have complied with all the ordinances—unfortunately, it's smoldering."

Mukhoty said he contacted Parnell in Hobbs and informed her the fire was "her entire responsibility." He added that EID had no authority to compel Parnell to correct the matter.

Bob Richardson, owner of Ruidoso Wholesale Foods, which is adjacent to the site, lives behind the demolished structure. He said the smoke "blew right into the house, especially at first."

He added he felt the smoke was "not enough to lodge a complaint, but it'd be nice if they could put it out."

"Somebody should be responsible," he suggested. "It's not impossible for the wind to pick up embers and blow them. With the dry conditions we're having, anything shouldn't be just let loose."

"You can't win," Richardson said. "We were glad when they started tearing it down."

Big Q pays \$20,488!

There was only one winning ticket in Friday's Big Q wagering pool at Ruidoso Downs, and that ticket was worth \$20,488.20.

The patron who walked off with the entire pool was Marvin Barnes, the well know horse owner from Ada, Oklahoma.

Barnes collected all his winnings in cash.

It was one of the bigger Big Q pools in Ruidoso Downs history, but not the biggest. The all-time high was at \$29,908 in 1980. Last seasons's record Big Q payoff was \$21,682.20.

Friday's Jumbo Big Q was set up in the 11th race when Kanu Disko, an 18-1 shot, and Sinquilla, a 7-1 pick, ran one-two. In the 12th, things went Barnes' way when Sea Ticket (21-1) finished first and Native Bandit (7-2) took second.

Two trainers suspended

Two Ruidoso Downs trainers, H. Don Farris and Michael Joiner, have been suspended by the board of stewards.

The two have also been ruled off the grounds of all racetracks in New Mexico, and their cases have been referred to the New Mexico State Racing Commission.

Joiner is the trainer of Rebelier, the filly which set the fastest qualifying time for the \$354,000 Kansas Derby. Farris trains Jays Mainspring, a colt which had established the eighth-fastest time.

Both horses were barred from the Kansas Derby after urine samples taken from each, following the trials, proved positive for the drug morphine.

The stewards also ruled that all horses owned or trained by Farris or Joiner could not race without first being transferred to trainer approved by the stewards.

The stewards' rulings also specified that Rebelier and Jays Mainspring could be reinstated only upon a written report from an official track veterinarian indicating that each is capable of racing without medication.

Farris and Joiner, according to the ruling, will be allowed in the Ruidoso Downs grandstand area on race days only during the periods of their suspensions.

Lincoln County Ranch Tour set for June 12 in Corona area

This year's Lincoln County Ranch Tour, set for June 12, promises to be an informative day for participants.

The tour group will be introduced to several working ranches in the Corona area. Guests will meet owners, cowboys, ranch managers, soil conservation specialists, range management experts, government trappers, brand inspectors and other people involved in agriculture. Registration will be from 8:30 to 9 a.m. at the Corona School. Participants will then board buses for the day-long tour.

Following lunch, the tour moves on to the George and Nancy Ranney Cattle Ranch, where the program will include cow-calf and feeder steer management. All phases of the cattle industry will be covered, including the use and purpose of brands.

At the end of the tour, there will be an area where guests can see and pet animals.

Prices for the tour are \$8 for adults and \$4 for children under 12. This includes transportation and the noon meal. The Corona FFA, Carrizozo FFA, and Corona 4-H will have refreshments at each stop for a nominal fee.

COMING IN FOR A LANDING. This twin-engine plane is about to land at Ruidoso Municipal Airport. The airport has just completed improvements to facilitate takeoffs and landings. At the north end of the runway, the airport constructed a "blast pad" which is a 200-foot extension to the mile-long runway. The pad

serves as an overrun for planes landing to the north and also protects the ground when jets test their engines for takeoff. Along the western edge of the runway, the airport installed a visual landing aid system—called VASI—to warn pilots when their approach is wrong.

The application deadline for state public antelope licenses is 5 p.m., July 2.

Proclamations and Form A for public licenses are available from Department of Game and Fish offices in Santa Fe, Roswell, Raton, Las Cruces and Albuquerque. They can also be obtained from about 350 vendors statewide.

Only those people who did not hold antelope licenses in 1980 or 1981 may apply to hunt antelope with firearms on public or private land. Anyone, including those who held licenses in 1980 or 1981, may apply to hunt antelope with bows in the Tres Piedras area or in the Marathon area south of Carlsbad.

Forms were previously available from Game and Fish Department offices and vendors. The lists of landowners for selection of areas to hunt may be obtained from the Department of Game and Fish but to date only the landowner list for elk is complete.

Applications for private land antelope, elk and Barbary sheep licenses are available this season from landowners, another change to be noted by sportsmen.



It appears that a strike by the players is almost inevitable, and if that happens, next fall is going to be awfully long, boring and possibly economically harmful for football fans.

Of course, there would still be college and high school football. Still, the idea of going the entire fall and part of the winter without the professional version of the sport is a tough pill to swallow for a lot of sports fans.

A lot of people who follow pro football closely are not inclined to be intense backers of collegiate football.

Many pro football fans, particularly in the East, are not college graduates and, thus, are not as likely to follow the collegiate game as much as many college graduates do.

A great many pro football fans view the NFL games as "war-like" contests between their respective cities.

On the other hand, college football fans treat the game as a chance to renew their friendships with old college friends. To them, it's more of a social event than a battle of two macho, physical football teams.

Many pro football fans would probably treat an NFL strike as a personal defeat. College football followers would just find something else to do if college football was discontinued or delayed for some reason.

Some pro football followers don't follow any other professional sport, so if a strike occurred next fall, they more than likely wouldn't follow the National Basketball Association (NBA) season or the World Series and baseball playoffs.

This is particularly true of fans in cities like Pittsburgh and Baltimore. The Steelers and Colts (have had) have built up a large following of die-hard fans.

Many people across the country regarded the 1970's Steelers as America's Team rather than the Dallas Cowboys. To a lot of working class people, the Steelers with their hard-nosed play reflected their feelings about the real world.

The Pittsburgh fans have lived and died with the Steelers and a strike could have

He will also be assistant boys' varsity basketball coach and assistant girls' track coach. Ron Geyer was recently selected as the new boys' varsity basketball coach and Sergio Castanon is the girls' head track coach. Castanon was head coach of the Warrior varsity volleyball team last fall.

Baltimore has almost the same situation as Pittsburgh does. It's largely a working class city with many of the same values that Pittsburgh has.

On the other hand, cities like Dallas, San Francisco, New York and Los Angeles would probably not be affected as much by an NFL strike.

Pro football is popular in all of the above cities. Still, there is a difference between the above cities and places like Pittsburgh and Baltimore.

Dallas, San Francisco, New York and Los Angeles (as I've said before in this column) have sophisticated images.

The typical season-ticket holder in a city like Dallas or Los Angeles is probably from a higher income bracket than his or her counterpart in Pittsburgh or Baltimore.

Upper middle class pro football fans in Dallas or Los Angeles generally have numerous other interests which could take up their time in place of pro football.

The typical fan in Pittsburgh or Baltimore, however, might be at a loss for interests if a strike came about. Because he is generally not as able economically as his counterpart in Dallas or Los Angeles, he is not able to afford more time to be interested in other things.

An NFL strike would definitely have a considerable effect on the country as a whole. Businesses (particularly motels and hotels) in NFL cities would suffer until the strike ended.

That would be bad even during a booming economy. It would be even worse with the current economic problems.

The more affluent NFL fans would find other things to do but the great mass of sports fans across the country would suffer if a strike came about.

That's because pro football has become the symbol of modern American life.

The daily struggles by the average American to keep economically afloat are reflected by the hard-nosed, rough play of the NFL.

Here's a strong wish that the strike won't come about.

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
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Republican headquarters open Tuesday

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Democrats who vote for Toney Anaya in the primary are guaranteeing that we will have a Republican governor for the next four years.

Does that sound too bald?
Is it unfair to Toney?
If so, it is the common wisdom up here in the Capitol City among that small body of observers who are wise enough to know what is going on and honest enough to say what they are thinking.

Toney, they believe, has done a superb job in building a broad base of support in the Democratic party. Most of them say they have never seen that effective a preparation for a primary in 20 or more years.

But a primary, they point out, is only a kind of foreplay.
What good does it do to win it if you can't win next November?

They think Anaya can't win.
It's not that they are opposed to Toney. These are pragmatists, who can accept anyone who manages to get himself elected.

What they are talking about is just the numbers.

There are lots of conservatives in the Democratic party, they remind us, who cannot accept Anaya.

(If you want some examples, look at the "Democrats" who now run our Legislature, hand-in-glove with their Republican think-alikes.)

Their numbers may not be large enough to deny Toney his party's nomination, but by deserting in droves in November, they can throw the election to the Republican nominee.

Can't support from other groups, like

organized labor, make up for those defections?

Nope.
Again it's a problem of numbers.

Even if organized labor could deliver every single vote in all its families — and it can't — there are simply not enough votes there, these people say, to make up for all those who will desert if Anaya is the nominee.

There is a further topic no one wants to come right out and talk about.

It is the fact of nationality.
New Mexico, the whisper goes, isn't going to have another governor with a Spanish surname in the next two decades.

Nobody says that's the way it ought to be. All these folks are saying is, that's the way it is.

That point is hard to assess. Americans, while they have not necessarily learned to rise above ethnic and racial prejudice, have learned not to talk too much about it.

Who knows what forces are at play when they are in the privacy of the polling place?

Some people scoff at the wisdom of these informants. They call them old-fashioned, out-of-date political hacks, who spend too much time on barstools.

They could be right about Toney.

If Anaya's the Democratic nominee, look for the AFL-CIO to lend his campaign the services of Ray Dennison, the man who replaced Al Barkan as their principal Washington lobbyist.

When two cars run into one another do we blame the Highway Department? No, usually there are tickets, insurance costs, attorney fees and court costs.

It is April 18, 1981, in Lajitas, Texas. A fun group of people were laying around the pool of the Badlands Motel. A few were playing guitars and everyone was drinking beer and getting cooked by the sun. A good time was being had by all. All rooms were booked by a group of small plane owners who had arranged an Easter weekend together. A dance took place that night and needless to say the good time had not stopped since pool time.

Easter morning several of the flyers were returning to their prominent positions. One in particular did not leave the air field. The plane hit a power line and burned on the ground with two other passengers aboard. I sat in silence for nearly an hour. I had spent the day before laughing in the sun with these new found and new lost friends.

The Lajitas airfield is located in open terrain, equipped to land a Lear. Power lines are safely located away from the strip.

But if planes are not flown in proper condition and properly and routes not followed then we are doomed for plane crashes and

deaths. No matter where airports are located.

That doesn't by any chance, sound familiar does it?

We don't solve the problem by moving the street or taking the car away from a drunk driver. We attempt to solve the problem by being realistic, by enforcing laws and fines and helping the drunk.

Unfortunately, many of us do not even keep our cars in proper running condition or even drive the car as we should. What is even more unfortunate is that cars are two dimensional (they go backwards and forwards), whereas planes are four dimensional (they go backwards and forwards and up and down). When a plane stalls you just can't park it next to the nearest cloud. The greatest misfortune of all is that far too many private flyers fly as if it were like driving a car.

Mountain airports, across the country, attempt to save lives and expenses by organizing specified flight paths in and out of the airport. I understand that airplanes, in order to fly, must do so under very strict Federal regulations. In some very progressive areas, they must also fly under local regulations. If pilots fail to do so they are reported, fined and even grounded.

It is easy to fly around flatland areas for pilots. Most of the U. S. land is sea level or near sea level. Even at that, pilot error is not uncommon. Then we come to mountain flying which involves more conditions. Once again, we come to another misfortune. Many pilots do not realize these conditions nor do they pay attention to them, and we know the results. Sadly enough, the unlucky ones don't even realize their lack of "knowledge and attention" until we hear the news on the radio.

Why should the Mesa airport site solve pilot error or guarantee fewer deaths? After all, the Mesa airport would still be a mountain airport.

In my opinion, a "Professional" study should be conducted to see how much time and money should be spent and where.

Dear editor:

I am concerned (or disappointed, puzzled, whatever) at the recent House vote for Uncle Sam to subsidize the high interest rates on home mortgages. (Our district's Joe Skeen voted against it. Good.) Unless

the Senate shows more sense than the House a Pandora's box of more problems will be opened.

Yes, high interest rates have become disastrous (including on the Reagan program). Something should be done about them. But it should be directed at the cause, not be subsidies, they'd be endless, of the victims of the results.

The Federal Reserve Board's actions are the primary cause.

Therefore the proper and direct approach is legislation to curb the Fed's powers and to let the laws of supply and demand set our interest rates! Better this than life or death control of our money, and interest, in these long term (14 years?) appointees, uncontrollable, answerable only to themselves.

Too "simplistic"? I think that label has become over-used and mis-used. To turn it around, is anything more "simplistic" than Congress for 50 years to throw more and more of our money away, as the answer to more and more "problems," attempting to "do everything for everybody?" (And taking extra good care of themselves, while at it.)

We have had periods of rapid inflation before (thank goodness-or Reagan—it's now down). And usually with high deficits also. One period was shortly before, and during, and after World War II. We didn't then get high interest rates, the prime rate was around, even under, five percent, until at least 1959. The concept that the Fed's job includes to "fine tune our economy" and to "set our monetary policies", and all with some perversion of or analogy to "bad money driving out good money" didn't come until in the 1960's.

The Fed does, of complete necessity, finance Uncle Sam's securities. At a fearful increase now in the cost, from the high interest rates it has itself created. But it balks, via setting high discount rates to its member banks, on commercial paper, at helping to finance business spending. What a contrast in priorities!

If we do get to subsidize mortgage interest then the auto industry, and uncountable other high interest rate victims (and somewhat rightfully) will ask for similar "relief". Whew! A Pandora's box indeed, of cost, controls, regulation, you name it.

We can hope the Senate will display more sense and courage than the House.

VIOLENCE STRESS DEATH?

Officials are investigating whether an 18-year-old boy suffered a heart attack because of the stress of playing a video game, Deputy Lake County Coroner Mark Allen says.

The youth died earlier this month while playing a video game in Calumet City, Ill. A University of Nebraska researcher, Dr. Robert Elliot, has released a study saying video games can be hazardous to people who may be susceptible to heart disease.

Allen said Peter Bukowski, 18, of South Holland, Ill., suffered a heart attack caused "by myocardial inflammation."

"We don't want to say yes or no whether the video game represents enough exertion to have brought on the attack," Allen said. —United Press International

KIDS NOT FIT?

Nearly half the kids in America are so out of shape that they flunked a standard fitness test, a study shows.

The analysis by the Amateur Athletic Union also showed that in some categories the average teen-ager's performance declined after age 14.

For example, the typical 15-year-old takes 13.3 seconds to sprint 100 yards while 14-year-old boys cover the distance in 12.6 seconds. The typical 17-year-old girl can do only 38 modified push-ups in two minutes, compared with 43 performed by an average 12-year-old girl.

Dr. Wynn F. Updyke, associate dean for graduate studies at Indiana University's School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, attributed the falling off — or leveling off — after age 14 to the fact that many schools drop compulsory gym and physical education after the eighth grade.

At a news conference, Updyke made public the analysis based on the performance of 7,600 youngsters who were chosen at random from four million children given the tests during the last two school years.

"Although the 'basic standards' are designed to be attainable by the average healthy youngster in each age and sex group, only 43 percent of participants were able to achieve them during the 1979-80 and 1980-81 academic years," a summary said. —Associated Press

We are very encouraged by early signals from the new Parks and Recreation Commission, and want to encourage them in turn.

Its members—Bill Morrison, Dub Holt, Dick Shaw and Ken Moore—have gotten right to work. They have indicated a willingness to be active in improving existing parks and recreation facilities and services of the village.

Also, they have acknowledged the need for new facilities and services in this vital area. Parks and recreation—though not vital in the sense of police or fire protection—is vital in that it improves the quality of life.

Regarding the influences to which Ruidoso's youth are exposed as they grow up, the village has been called "a small town with all the problems of a big city."

This may be an overstatement. But we doubt anyone would argue that increased recreational opportunities for youth could be anything but a good, healthy influence.

The suggestion that a full-time parks and recreation director be hired by the village certainly merits careful consideration.

Another thing for consideration by the commission is how to get the private sector in our community involved in funding for new parks and maintenance of existing facilities.

How many developers have followed the example of the original Skyland Subdivision in 1928, when 40 acres of land was donated for Two Rivers Park?—TP

The June 1 primary election is almost upon us (as if you couldn't tell from all the political advertisements appearing in this newspaper and on signs lining our streets). New Mexico politics, I have found, are very intriguing. I don't mean intriguing like full of intrigue and undercover type stuff (although I hear New Mexico politics has its fair share of scandal and corruption).

I mean intriguing like very interesting to observe and even fun to be involved in. This is in contrast to the part of the country I originally come from—the Great Lakes region. There, politics seems to be reserved for stodgy, cigar smoking, old men who over the years have contributed considerable amounts of money to ambitious friends seeking power and office.

In New Mexico, politics, like the landscape, is wide open. Anyone who is so inclined can step onto the scene and become involved. As Wilton Howell remarked recently, a poor boy can make it by taking a little and going a long way into public office.

Even more important, I believe, is that each individual New Mexican can influence the political system in which he or she lives and works.

The voice of a single New Mexican goes a lot farther with a stronger punch than, say, the vote of a Michigander. Obviously, New Mexico's small population allows the people of this state the opportunity to have a resounding say. On the other hand, the voice of someone from Michigan is diluted a few million more times over.

"I've had feelings that I've had a say," Vivian Ziyvoloski of Santa Fe told me the other day while I immersed myself for a few hours in the whirlwind world of political campaigning.

Vivian is a native Chicagoan who moved to New Mexico a few years ago. She agreed with me that politics in New Mexico, as opposed to where we came from, allows people the chance to become involved in the political process.

Vivian commented that in New Mexico, there is a more intimate exposure to political people and events. Not so in the stretch of land between Chicago and Detroit that I'm most familiar with.

There, it seems you have to know somebody who knows somebody just to see the mayor. The average Midwesterner is apolitical since he or she feels that nothing they can do will ever have any direct effect on their lives. They feel estranged from their political representatives.

However, here in New Mexico, politics and politicians do not seem to be as removed from the electorate as they do "back east." (Anything east of Roswell is "back east.")

A friend of mine who worked in the Santa Fe political scene once told me that anyone can see the governor without a lot of protocol or formality. Politics in New Mexico is open, which makes for a good democratic process.

That also seems to be the case with politicians during this election season. Sure, candidates are out getting votes, but they seem willing to listen for more than a few brief seconds to what is on the minds of the voters in an attempt to get to know them.

Maybe it's just campaign politicking, but these guys running for office seem very accessible and open to any Joe Blow off the street.

They're all over their respective territories at once, whether they be gubernatorial, congressional or county candidates. And this is a hard place to get around considering the size of the state and counties.

For example, according to congressional candidate Ben Altamirano, who was at the Capitol meet the candidate meeting Wednesday night, a typical campaign day usually starts before sunrise. Altamirano lives in Silver City, so to address a breakfast meeting often means traveling to the town where the breakfast will be held.

After breakfast, there are interviews to do with the local radio stations and newspaper. Throw in some door-to-door campaigning and it's time to address some group or another for lunch.

More interviews after lunch and some campaign planning, and you're back on the road to another town for a meet the candidates type situation. Try to talk with some factory workers as they leave the plant at 5 p.m. and then head over to the fund-raising cocktail party. Next, it's a pig roast or dinner where there will be a lot of people.

After that, maybe a dance or party where some extra votes might be picked up. The day starts to wind down around 12 midnight, but more than likely there's the drive back home, not to mention the next morning.

I believe New Mexico politicians, no matter how corny they can sometimes be, deserve a lot of credit for putting out the kind of effort they do to meet people and inform the voting public of the issues.

New Mexicans deserve a lot of credit, too, for their involvement in our political process and for making it work. However, the more involvement from state citizens in our political process, the more assured we can be of good representation, quality leadership, and open and free government for the people.

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

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Altamirano has sights on Congressional seat

New Mexico soon will have three seats in the United States House of Representatives instead of two. The new second district consists of New Mexico's southwestern, southern, southeastern and eastern counties.

There are 14 counties in that large expanse of land, and that's the territory Ben Altamirano wants to serve as a Democratic representative in the Congress.

"I think the objective of Reaganomics is good—move government back to the states is a good philosophy. However, the program is being forced on the public too fast. It should be stretched out over a 10-year period instead of in a three-year period," said the fiscally conservative Altamirano. Altamirano feels that there is a lot of waste in the federal government and plen-

ty of bad administration. He stated that government does need to be weeded out, but added that it will take time.

"We got into this situation (a centralized, bureaucratic federal government) over a 30-year period. It will be difficult to undo in a short amount of time. I don't think it (Reagan's programs) will be that successful in that short a time span, and it hasn't been successful because it's too big a chunk at one time," Altamirano commented.

Reaganomics is hurting people who have lost their jobs and who relied on many of the social programs that have been cut, said Altamirano. He feels that the Republicans are backtracking. Altamirano expressed his concern that Reagan's policies continue, New Mexico may lose some gains it made in the past.

"There are good programs being hurt,

especially in the field where lower income people depend on social programs," Altamirano pointed out.

Noting the low per capita income of New Mexico, Altamirano stated that a lot of people rightfully and correctly take advantage of social programs in the state. With the lack of industry in New Mexico—which is not a labor oriented state, Altamirano noted—the local population is forced to subscribe to these programs.

Altamirano is concerned about those people who want to work, but have no jobs since none are readily available. Altamirano is also worried about senior citizens and the handicapped, who also have no choice but to depend on social programs. He wants the Title 20 program, which aids lower income women and children and senior citizens, to be properly funded.

On the subject of jobs and the economy, Altamirano stated that he will work to bring new industries to New Mexico.

"I would like to work closely with the governor and legislators to bring in a consistent growth of industry to the state, taking in the fact that we have a water problem. With research and work, we could find industries that could be compatible with our situation," said Altamirano.

Water is essential to the state's economy, noted Altamirano. "We should take a tough position on no more exporting water," he said.

Water is also essential to bringing new industry to New Mexico since water is vital in the production process, said Altamirano. He believes water research and development should take a high priority.

"I think it's important that we work on programs to desalinate water. Steve Reynolds (director of the Water Resources Division) said we have enough water for New Mexico if we could get the salt out of it," stated Altamirano.

He suggested that with federal help to launch a water desalination program, New Mexico could have the water it needs to bring in new industry and to improve agriculture.

Altamirano said the country's farmers are going bankrupt at an incredible rate. He commented that the nation's farmers cannot obtain loans to purchase the high priced equipment which makes them productive. Altamirano proposed to make low interest loans available to farmers or give them direct aid to get them back on their feet and productive again.

"There's no solution as to what I would do, but I think if the federal government would propose some method, we could help the building industry to start building again. Then, people will start buying, credit would resume and it would put more money on the market," suggested Altamirano.

Although not opposed to using nuclear energy as an alternative for replacing the nation's depleting energy resources,

Altamirano stresses the importance of conservation.

"Push conservation and energy will last us a long time," he said.

Altamirano believes that since New Mexico has WIPP (Waste Isolation Pilot Project), New Mexicans should have a say on how it is monitored and administered. He suggested forming an authority composed of local, state and federal officials to monitor WIPP.

"The federal government should work to insure it (WIPP) is as safe as possible. Economically it's a good thing for the area, but the government should take all precautions to insure its safety," Altamirano emphasized.

Although in favor of a strong United States military defense, Altamirano said he is "totally for a nuclear arms freeze."

"The end result will be a war. We're building it for something. We could do better things with our money. That money should be used for educational programs," believes Altamirano.

He stated that he would support legislation that would increase educational assistance for students in New Mexico. Altamirano said he is opposed to the Reagan administration's cutting of the student and graduate student loan acts. He added that he would favor restoring the 30 percent cut in educational assistance and even making more money available to students.

On the subject of tax credits for parents whose children attend private schools, Altamirano commented, "I wouldn't support that issue. We have to offer students a chance to go to school. We do that through public education. If they want to go to private school, then that's their prerogative, but tax credits take away from the needs of public schools."

Altamirano added that he sees nothing wrong with prayer in school.

Altamirano said if he wins his party's nomination and beats Joe Skeen, the second district's incumbent congressman, then he would feel at home serving on the budget and financial committees as well as the house education committee.

As a New Mexico state senator for 12 years, Altamirano has served on the Senate public affairs, finance and judiciary committees. He currently chairs the Senate corporations committee and holds a seat on the Senate education committee. Prior to his stint as a state senator, Altamirano served as a Silver City councilman for 10 years and as a Grant County commissioner for four years.

Altamirano feels his chances of beating Skeen in November are good if he beats his Democratic opponent Caleb Chandler in the June 1 primary.

"I feel like I'm leading right now," said Altamirano.

He has driven through the large new second congressional district several times on the campaign trail. He stops in on every precinct in the district, but admitted that a high priority is given to highly populated precincts.

Altamirano said he's knocked on a lot of doors. He mentioned that door to door campaigning is the most tiring type of campaigning, but that it costs the least and is most rewarding.

Frenchman Francis Veber likes to write stories of friendships, usually male and occasionally gay. His best-known work in America is "La Cage Aux Folles," a farce about the misadventures of a pair of male lovers.

Veber's first English-language film, "Partners," follows the mold of "La Cage Aux Folles." "Partners" males, however, are a distinctly different pair than those portrayed in the French film.

Ryan O'Neal plays a macho homicide detective whom women find most arresting. Hurt is cast as a gay cop working in the poorly regarded file and records department.

O'Neal's captain asks him to team with Hurt to infiltrate the gay underground and solve the murder of a gay man.

Most of the film's humor stems from the embarrassment of super-stud O'Neal having to undergo the indignities of a

gay lifestyle -- the outfits, all-male parties, the look of disbelief on his girlfriend's face.

"Partners" features a genuine murder mystery, but it functions merely as the device to set up the predictable situations. The attitude the film expresses toward gays is more curious. Ninety percent of the film seems to emphasize anti-gay jokes and snide remarks. Only at the end does Hurt prove himself to be more than the butt of these jokes.

O'Neal captures the embarrassment of any straight man asked to pose as a gay. Hurt's sensitive, but rather cliched, portrayal of a homosexual is nonetheless effective.

But essentially the film is a one-note joke that some will love, some will hate, but most will find simply diverting. One's attitude about the film may stem from where one stands on gay rights.

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
