

# Chicks Etta Wind overpower Kansas Futurity field

Chicks Etta Wind, a filly who'd made only \$1,500 with five starts on the Texas bush track circuit, bulletted to an overpowering victory in Sunday's 32nd running of the Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly earned \$254,092 and quickly established herself among the year's top quarter horses.

The Kansas Futurity is the first leg of the famed Triple Crown for two-year-olds. The gross purse — which included two consolation races — topped out at \$768,040.

The amount dished out in Sunday's 350-yard finale was \$593,645.

Chicks Etta Wind, a chestnut filly by Chick's Etta Deck out of Tennessee Wind, is owned by Gordon G. Francis of Yukon, Oklahoma. The trainer is Johnny Bustamante. Rudy Bustamante is the pilot.

Chicks Etta Wind went off as a 9-2 shot and returned \$11.60 to win, \$5.40 to place, \$3.40 to show. The Kansas Futurity was clocked in 18.22 seconds against a strong headwind.

Call Me Favorite, a filly owned by Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland, Texas, finished second after setting a blistering early pace. Even at the midway point of the dash, Call Me Favorite was

still trucking at full steam and appeared to have matters in hand.

In fact, Call Me Favorite refused to ease her stinging pace in the final 100 yards. But it was a case of Chicks Etta Wind attacking with unusual power. The latter simply smashed her foes with a crushing surge in the last 50 yards.

Call Me Favorite, well ridden by Jerry Nicodemus out of the rail post, ended up second and collected \$106,062 to go with the \$8,721 money line she brought into the Kansas. The mutual payoffs: \$4.20, \$3.20.

Nativo Time, off at 11-1 under Steve Harris, ended up third — a neck behind Call Me Favorite. Third was worth \$49,597. The show payoff was \$3.80. Nativo Time is the property of Barbara A. Smith of Lewisville, Texas.

Here's the way the also-rans finished, with money earned: 4th — Amy Jo Mito, \$35,099; 5th — Vons Lucky Moon, \$28,232; 6th — Tres Pass, \$26,706; 7th — Yankee Win, \$25,180; 8th — Aggravated Cloud, \$24,417; 9th — Primetime Wrangler, \$22,891.

Poflano, a colt who died a few minutes after qualifying for the Kansas finale two weeks ago, was awarded last-place money of \$21,365.

Yankee Win and Tres Pass, coupled as

an entry in the wagering, never managed to get a foot in the door. Yankee Win was involved in some bumping at the start, and quickly fell back. She was unable to recover. Also taking part in that bumping was Amy Jo Mito, who was coupled with Primetime Wrangler at just under 4-1.

Tres Pass had a flurry of early speed, then appeared to weaken, finishing sixth. Amy Jo Mito came on at the end to nail down the fourth-place slot.

Rudy Bustamante, 17, who's been riding for two years, had these observations on his victorious journey aboard Chicks Etta Wind: "She's a real nervous filly, but she didn't leap out of the gate like she usually does. Still, I thought we were on the lead just about from the start. Then I just sat there — she was running so easily. After that, we just sailed in. I really didn't have to use her much in the last 200 yards. In the second half of the race, I knew we had it won. But she was pretty tired at the end."

Bustamante also observed that Chicks Etta Wind "ran more on her own this time — not like she did in the trials."

Rudy's pop, trainer Johnny Bustamante, called the victory his greatest in his 17-year career. He also noted: "Chicks Etta Wind broke a lot better than before. Not as sharp as I would have liked, but sharp

enough. I was worried about all of those horses in there, especially Yankee Win. But when you come into a race like this, you just don't know what's going to happen."

Chicks Etta Wind, trainer Bustamante said, will now be targeted at the Rainbow and All-American Futurities, the second and third legs of the Triple Crown.

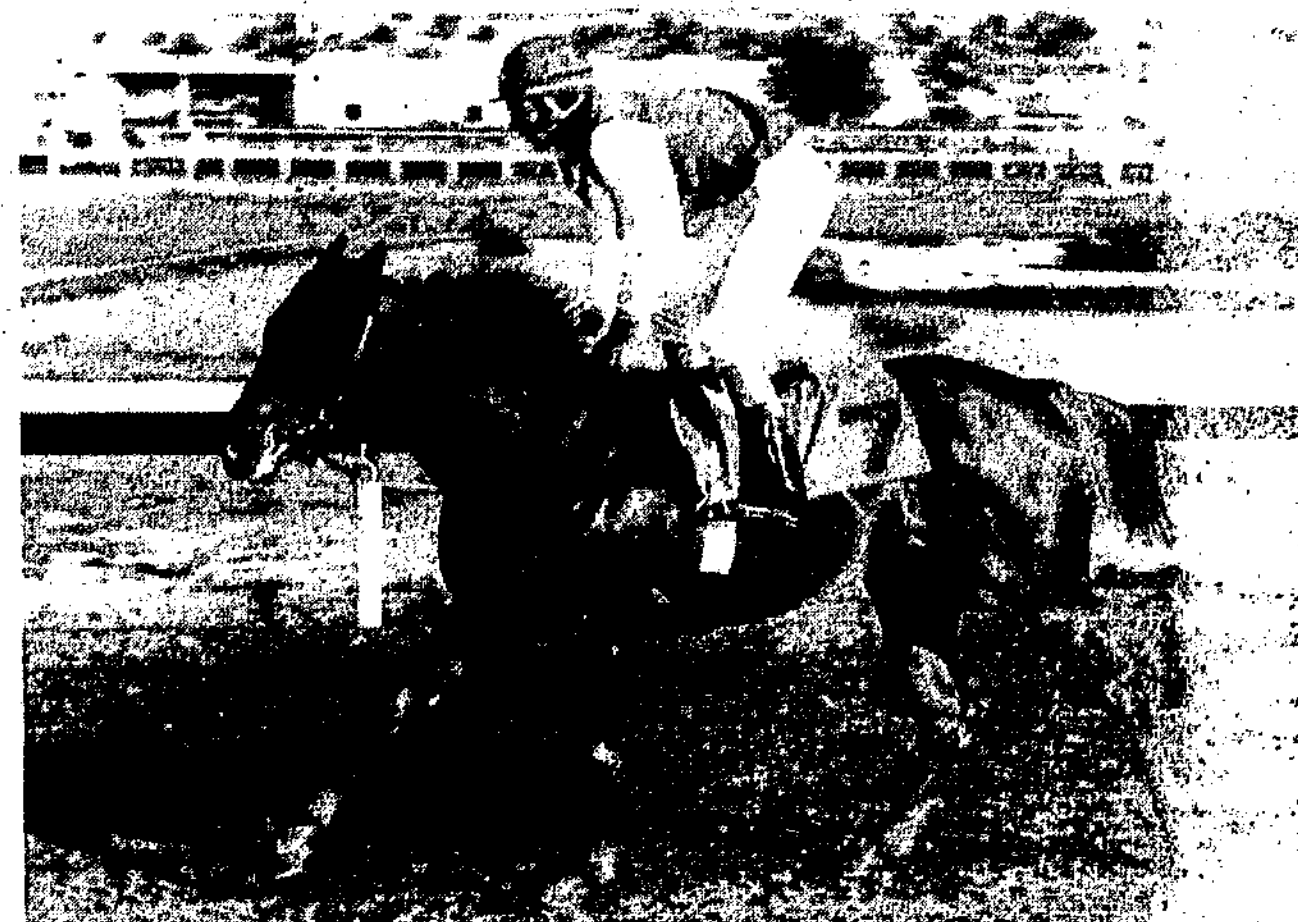
Gordon Francis, the winning owner, dedicated the victory to Chuck Stewart, the late well-known Lubbock, Texas, business executive and sportsman. Stewart bred Chicks Etta Wind.

The Kansas Futurity was viewed by a hefty holiday crowd of 8,707, who wagered a resounding \$984,851 — well over the \$722,479 wagered on this day a year ago.

MR. MASTER BUG stamped himself as a two-year-old to be reckoned with after blasting out a solid half-length win in Saturday's First Consolation of the Kansas Futurity.

The 350-yard dash packed a total purse of \$111,403, of which \$17,404 went to the winner.

Mr. Master Bug, who came out of the First Consolation with three straight wins

THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO preliminary budget calls for expenditures of just over \$8 million for fiscal year 1982-83, which begins July 1. This is down about \$1 million from the present fiscal year, when \$2 million went to the new Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. Parentheses in the right column indicate budget decreases.

## Village of Ruidoso an \$8 million business

Projected expenditures for water and sewer represents the single largest item in the Village of Ruidoso's proposed \$8 million budget for fiscal year 1982-83.

A total of \$1,319,438 is earmarked for the two utilities, an increase of 26 percent over the present fiscal year.

Village manager Jim Hine said replacement of water lines and hiring of additional employees accounts in part for the increase. There are now 5,305 water taps in service in the village, Hine noted, compared with 4,968 at this time last year.

Just over \$1.1 million is budgeted for construction, down from last year's \$3.36 million. Last year the village budgeted more than \$2 million to the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant at Biscuit Hill, said Hine, thus the decrease.

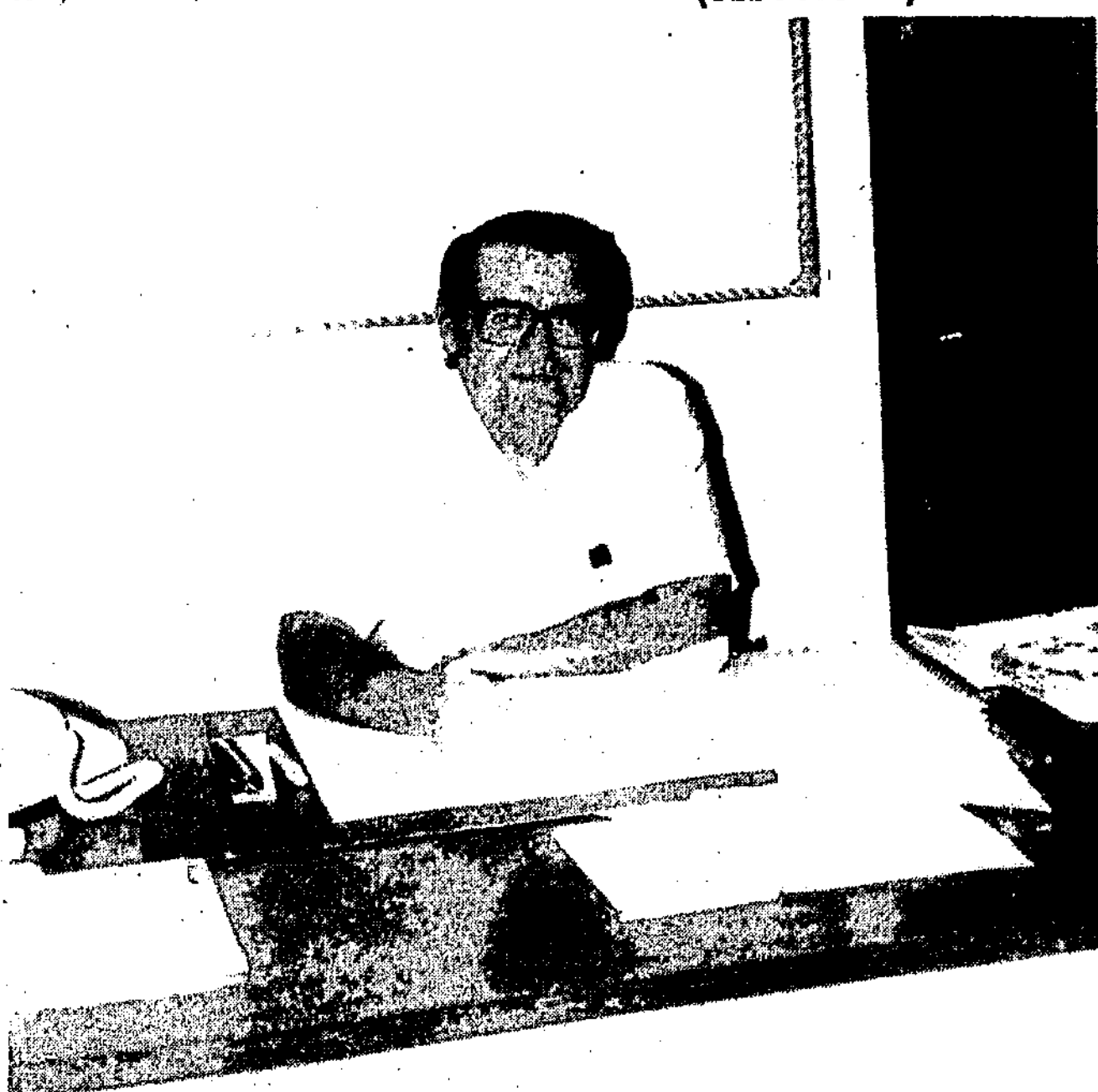
The major construction expenditure projected for the coming year is \$4.6 million for remodeling of the police building.

The Street Department budget tops \$1 million for fiscal 1982-83, up from about \$7 million this year. Included in the budget are two new dump trucks at \$94,000 each and a metal shop building at \$75,000, Hine said.

The village manager pointed out the projected cost of electricity for street lighting in the next year — \$70,000. Many people believe the village does not have to pay for street lighting, he noted, but it does.

"We are victims of the same things as private individuals," Hine said. "When utility rates go up, municipalities are affected just like individuals."

## Police into traffic, training

The Ruidoso Police Department (RPD), terming Ruidoso's traffic problems an "astronomical traffic situation" in a recent study, suggests significant changes for the village's main arteries.

In a report prepared for the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) ad hoc traffic committee, RPD recommends widespread improvements on Highways 37 and 70 within village limits to make driving on the congested routes safer.

RPD made similar recommendations to

a state Highway Department panel in November 1981.

The RPD was just one matter concerning Ruidoso that chief Richard Swenor discussed in a recent interview. Swenor also talked about department improvements for the coming fiscal year; a police discipline course he attended in Phoenix, Arizona; a seminar RPD conducted on hostage negotiations; and an anti-crime class for local merchants to be held June 9.

In a letter prefacing RPD's recommendations to the traffic committee, Swenor

describes village street problems as an "astronomical traffic situation."

"For an incorporated area of less than 5,000 population," Swenor wrote, "Ruidoso's traffic accidents and injuries figures for 1981 were the highest in the State of New Mexico when compared to like size communities."

Swenor added, "Ruidoso experienced 449 motor vehicle accidents involving 203 personal injuries (in 1981)." The chief said the figure represented one percent of accidents in the state.

The chief also noted that a traffic survey conducted this spring shows increases of

as much as 1,500 percent in some areas of the community.

To alleviate the problem, police have made suggestions for changes at several village trouble spots.

At Mile Post Six on Mechem, commonly referred to as "Dead Man's Curve," south of the White Mountain intersection, the department suggested dangerous curve signs and no zone signs. Also, Swenor noted, the curve should be straightened or banked, as the section is difficult to drive.

On down the buffet line, brunchgoers will find carved whole ham, link sausage, sugar cured bacon, fruit filled Swedish pancakes and omelets cooked to order with a choice of Spanish sauce, cheese and green chilies, or sautéed seafood Acadian.

On a more serious gastronomic note, Chef Frey recommends the stuffed boneless chicken Cumberland, brown rice and pommes Lyonnaise.

And, of course, it wouldn't be a champagne brunch without the champagne.

Those feeling weighted down after partaking of the excellent fare and freshly brewed coffee can give themselves a lift by climbing aboard Tim Bridwell's multi-colored hot air balloon.

Bridwell will pilot his balloon above the Inn of the Mountain Gods for the nominal cost of \$5 per person. All proceeds from the balloon ride go to RSFI, a non-profit organization, for the Ruidoso Summer Festival.

The Concert on the Green will begin at 12:30 p.m. The concert is free for those who want to spread a blanket on the grass and get a suntan while the Texas Little Symphony (TLS) performs.

Conductor John Giordano will lead TLS through its program of Mozart's overture to the opera, "Marriage of Figaro," and Mozart's Symphony Number 40 in G minor. TLS will also play Bela Bartok's "Romanian Dances," the Strauss Waltz, "Vienna Blood," Opus 354, and Gillis' arrangement of "Guadalajara."

Whitwam said the Silver Slipper Soiree will also take place at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, beginning at 8 p.m. on Monday, June 7. Tickets for the semi-formal affair are \$15. The TLS Dixieland Jazz Band will play as Soiree guests make the rounds to the blackjack and craps tables.

Various prizes donated by local mer-

chants will be awarded to those with the largest amount of chips at the conclusion of the evening's playing, stated Whitwam. Two \$100 gift certificates have been contributed for the Soiree, by Smith Limited Gallery and Mary's Fashions.

Chino's at the Inn has donated a three dimensional piece of art by the famous Indian artist White Buffalo. "Rock Point," valued at \$2,500, is done in turquoise and coral and depicts the Chaco Canyon cliff dwellings.

Whitwam added that a weekend for two at the Inn of the Mountain Gods; a \$100 gift certificate from Tim Wishard, goldsmith; and Gordon Snidow's print, "First Messenger from the Rain God," are also prizes up for grabs.

Whitwam commented that volunteers to run the blackjack and craps tables are still needed. Those interested in operating the tables will be allowed the pleasure of hearing the Dixieland Jazz Band and having cocktails, compliments of RSFI.

Whitwam noted that local businesswoman Helen Gable-Reeves of A Place in the Sun will donate a percentage of her gross receipts from the week of June 7 to June 11 to RSFI.

"It's a local person's way of helping the symphony," said Whitwam, emphasizing that contributions of any size and in any form from interested local businesspeople

are always gratefully accepted by RSFI.

## Money Ruidoso Downs' main worry

The village of Ruidoso Downs would be able to solve its myriad problems—which include a potential future water shortage, continual breakdown of village vehicles, lack of space for fire department vehicles, a condemned jail and a municipal building the mayor feels should be condemned—if it only had sufficient funds.

This was the observation of Mayor J. C. Day Jr. and village clerk Wilma Webb in an interview last week.

Day feels that sufficient funds would be available if the racetrack were required to pay gross receipts tax on all sales, including concessions, gate tickets, parking fees and racehorse sales. But according to Day, the state Legislature does not require the track to pay taxes on all sales.

The village is unable to find out from the state exactly how much the track does pay in gross receipts taxes and on what, because of state Confidentialities Statute 7-1-8. Webb estimates that the village received about \$12,000 in gross receipts taxes from the track this year; \$500 for a liquor license; \$11,400 for racing fees, which is half of the amount paid to the state; plus \$4,250 for special police services.

The estimated total cost to the village for police protection for the racetrack, however, is \$45,924.04.

In 1977, Fortuna Corporation, which

owned the track at the time, paid gross receipts taxes on \$650,500 and an occupation license fee of \$650. Day reported.

In 1978, Fortuna paid gross receipts taxes on \$684,927.83 and an occupation license fee of \$685. In 1979, Ruidoso-Sunland took over the track and paid \$600 for an occupation license based on an unknown amount of gross receipts taxes, Day pointed out.

In 1980, Ruidoso-Sunland paid gross receipts taxes on \$8,591,316 and \$600 for an occupation license. In 1981, gross receipts taxes were paid on over \$600,000 and \$600 was charged for an occupation license.

Due to a change in legislation, a maximum of \$25 can now be assessed for an occupation license, which is the amount received by the village this year.

Day questioned the amount paid for a license in 1980 when compared to the amount of revenue on which gross receipts taxes were figured. The village was supposed to receive about 1.35 percent of the \$8,591,316, he said. According to the 1980 auditor's report, however, Ruidoso Downs received a total of \$78,626 from the state for gross receipts taxes from the entire village that year.

"Something's not jiving," Day said. "As the track gets larger, our revenues get smaller."

Day also complained that the village is not able to determine how much gross receipts taxes it receives from any given

business, due to the recently passed confidentiality statute.

"Ruidoso Downs is accountable under our statute to make publicly known our revenue sources, but it looks like they've (the state) just closed their books to the general public," stated Day.

"I think it's a stupid law," he commented.

"The fat cats in Santa Fe want their money, but they don't want you to have yours."

Last year there were two multi-million dollar racehorse sales in the village limits, Day reported, which did not net the village any money.

"This is absolutely ridiculous," he said. "The track is just like any other business in the village limits, and should have to pay gross receipts taxes on its sales, Day added."

When asked why the racetrack is exempt from having to pay such taxes, Day said, "through politics, I guess."

He said he does not intend to ask the track to contribute more money to the village, but rather to get the laws changed.

"I hope the newly elected officials will have the common sense to see our problems," he stated.

"It's not right to be sitting here... unable to upkeep our village in the manner it should be with the world's richest horse race right here in our village limits."

A representative from the board of

directors of Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, contacted Day Thursday to request a meeting with him and the village trustees, "to discuss our mutual problems," the mayor said. A date for the meeting has not yet been set, he noted.

"Maybe we can get them to understand our situation," he commented.

Apart from financial problems, Day indicated that the village of Ruidoso Downs is doing well thus far in his administration.

"We've had a multitude of cooperation from every department," he said.

"The Ladies Auxiliary has been fantastic," he noted. "The police department is to be commended for its progress to such a short time."

Day also expressed gratitude to the trustees, who have been "real helpful and cooperative," and the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) members, who have been working on a master plan for the village—"something we have to do for future growth," Day stated.

Concerning recent discussions of possible ordinance violations by builders of the Peckham barn in Ruidoso Downs, Day reported that he has determined that no violations have been committed. The structure is not in the flood plain and therefore, builders are not required to appear before P&Z.

When asked whether he feels settled in his position as mayor yet, Day answered, "I'm still learning—the hard way."

negotiate at the designated 40 mph speed limit.

Another change Swenor would like to see on Mechem is at the Cree Meadows Drive intersection. RPD suggests adding three-way intersection signs on the north and south approaches. Also, the police would like the state Highway Department to consider adding turning lanes on Mechem at the site of the shopping mall going in just south of Cree Meadows Drive.

RPD proposes several more changes for Mechem Drive, most of which include installing traffic signs and reducing the speed limit.

"Mechem Drive is one of the worse areas because of growth in that part of town," Swenor said.

For Sudderth Drive, one of the major changes RPD proposes is to reduce the present 30 mph speed limit to 25 mph, from the intersection at Sudderth and Mechem to the Plaza Dee shopping center.

Swenor pointed out several areas along that stretch which give cause to reduce the speed limit.

At the winding curve near Ray Heid's Ski Shop, the chief said "you can feel the

pull", when traveling at the maximum 30 mph, which he indicated causes drivers to drift over the marked lanes. Swenor said the best solution for the curve is to straighten it, but he noted reducing speeds is another alternative.

He added that dropping the midtown speed limit would also make it safer for pedestrians. A limit of 25 mph would facilitate easier crossings downtown, the chief said.

"There is just too much volume on the streets," Swenor said.

The main benefit of the traffic study is to demonstrate to the state that Ruidoso is trying to correct its traffic problems, Swenor noted.

"The village is looking at it (traffic) realistically," he said. "We've got to show citizen concern."

Swenor plans to submit his report, along with a slide presentation that focuses on trouble spots, to the traffic committee at its next meeting.

The police chief also discussed forthcoming improvements in the department.

Included in the RPD budget for 1983 is funding for four additional police officers

and four more cruisers.

The new employees will bring to 22 the number of officers on the force. Swenor indicated he needs the additional personnel and equipment to continue updating the department. In another two or three years, the chief said, he would like to have every officer driving relatively new vehicles as part of RPD's take-home car program.

The police chief also said the new officers will enable the department to reduce overtime. Swenor had requested allotments for overtime pay in the new budget, but the village council cut all overtime expenditures for 1983. The chief commented that the cut means he will have to design work schedules so officers work a minimum of extra hours.

The department also budgeted for purchase of an ammunition reloading machine. The machine will enable RPD to recycle spent bullets that officers use during range practice. The chief noted that an officer fires up to 1,000 rounds during training.

"The budget this year is basically just for requirements," Swenor said. He added that he is "very, very pleased with the budget."

Regarding RPD's pending relocation to

a pre-fabricated metal building while the police-courts complex is being remodeled this summer, Swenor said the project is on schedule.

Contractors are currently preparing to pour a concrete slab for the metal structure, which will be located behind the village water shop, and police plan to move into the building starting June 15, Swenor said.

Swenor also discussed a recent week-long course he attended in Phoenix, Arizona.

The seminar, which was sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police, dealt with police discipline training.

Seminar topics included lectures on police stress, trauma, civil liability and counseling techniques.

"The lecturers are some of the finest in the country," Swenor said. "These seminars are so beneficial. We've all (police executives) got similar problems, regardless of our department size."

The RPD chief puts a high value on training and certification of his officers. Currently, two officers are attending a course on domestic disputes, one is going

to a hostage negotiation course, and another officer is taking a class on juvenile crime.

Recently, several officers attended a two-day lecture on hostage negotiations that was conducted by FBI personnel at the Ruidoso library.

Swenor preferred not to disclose details of the course, but he explained that among other things, policemen learned to advise people how to conduct themselves during an armed robbery or burglary, and to inform people of what to look out for.

Last month, RPD assembled a group of bank managers and employees to inform them of police policies regarding armed robberies. Police taught bank personnel new procedures for handling alarms and precautionary measures to take during holdups.

"We wanted to make them aware that their chances of survival decrease drastically if they're taken away from the building," the chief said.

When asked if officers will shoot to kill in such situations, as he told the Chamber of Commerce board of directors recently, the chief replied that he prefers the term, "stop to kill."

"We asked them to take certain steps.

We want to make them aware," Swenor repeated, "so hopefully they won't panic."

Swenor said he would like people always to be aware of their surroundings, and to inform police if they are suspicious of certain activities.

"We asked them to take time to look around," he commented. "We gave them insight to how people will case a business; invariably, a robber will case a place."

The chief said RPD will teach merchants similar precautionary techniques at an anti-crime seminar June 9.

"We want to let them know we're available," he said. "Let us check buildings for security hazards."

"We'll teach them how to operate alarm systems, and how to report a burglary."

"Our intention is to make everybody understand we do need their involvement," Swenor said.

The chief advises that all people take precautions to protect themselves and their property. For information on home security, the department has available a booklet entitled: "40 Ways To Protect Your Home."

"You've got to take precautions pertaining to everything," he suggests. "It's no laughing matter what victims go through."

## ComFIRE questions shingle ban

Rich Seeley, chairman of ComFIRE (Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment), indicated Thursday he thinks the ban on untreated wood shingles as roofing material for new construction has limited value in terms of fire prevention.

Seeley, speaking at ComFIRE's regular monthly meeting, said, "I'm not sure it's (the prohibition) good or bad from a fire standpoint."

The village council passed a resolution last Tuesday which prohibits the use of the shingles, commonly called "cedar shakes," in new construction, unless the shakes are treated with a fire retardant.

But Seeley questioned the ban. He indicated that he felt the resolution burdens homeowners with an unjustified additional cost to purchase treated shingles, which he said are at least twice as expensive as untreated shakes.

Mike McCarty of Ruidoso Wholesale Lumber said Friday treated shakes are three times as expensive as the untreated product.

McCarty quoted prices for both untreated and treated shakes. Three-quarter inch, hand-split untreated shingles, which McCarty said are the most popular shakes in Ruidoso, cost \$65 for one hundred square feet. The same size treated shingles cost \$180 for the same quantity.

Seeley thinks the added cost for treated shakes is too much, and he wonders if more attention should be directed to the cause of roof fires.

The ComFIRE chairman said he feels a greater fire danger than the cedar shakes is the absence of spark arrestors on chimneys, and fireplaces that are installed without adequate heat insulation.

Spark arrestors, devices that keep sparks from escaping at chimney openings, are required in new construction under the Ruidoso building code, building inspector Don Hendricks said.

"There is no new construction going up without them," Hendricks said.

But Seeley pointed out at the meeting there are many older structures with fireplaces that lack arrestors.

Also, Seeley indicated improperly installed fireplaces have caused fires in the area. He said he has seen evidence of units that were installed without proper heat insulation and have caused surrounding wood studs to scorch.

Hendricks said the building code allows installation of fireplaces that abut against combustible materials, known as zero clearance fireplaces, as long as the unit is properly insulated.

Ruidoso fire prevention officer Ollie Cuddy, who prepared the report on untreated shake shingles which led to their prohibition, asked Seeley if the ban would help improve Ruidoso's fire rating, which is determined by the insurance industry.

The present rating is a level six, on a scale of 10, which is considered good for this area.

Seeley replied that the new treated shake requirement would not affect the rating. He said the figure is based on the ability of fire departments to extinguish

fires.

Cuddy reported at the meeting that under the new Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD) structure, with Virgil Reynolds as full-time superintendent, the village will be carrying out more fire inspections.

He said the target will first be places that see a high concentration of people, such as bars, restaurants, motels and condominiums.

Cuddy, saying "there is so much work to be done," asked for cooperation with the fire department on the inspections, some of which he indicated may lead to conflicts.

"We're going to have to back the fire department everywhere we can with these inspections," he said.

Cuddy informed Seeley and police chief Richard Swenor, the only other participants at the meeting, that RVFD will soon inspect fire hydrant pressure on Camelot Mountain, to determine whether water pressure in that area is adequate for extinguishing a major fire.

Cuddy also said he sees a lot of interest in the village regarding fire prevention.

"I'm even getting calls at home on trash and fire dangers," he said. "It looks like people have been just waiting to call somebody."

"Now we've got to do something about it," Swenor suggested.

The fire prevention officer agreed.

"We ought to start kicking things around a bit; rather than kicking them under the table," he said.

## Village budget \$8 million

The proposed Police Department budget figure of \$305,905 shows an increase of 47 percent. Four patrolmen are to be added to the force, Hine said, and five vehicles are to be acquired.

The Fire Department budget shows an increase of 48 percent. Salary increases, plus two additional men to be hired during the fiscal year, account for most of the hike, according to Hine.

Included in the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) budget of \$180,011 is a new ambulance, but the village purchased a unit for \$24,000 last week. One additional staffer is also budgeted for, Hine said.

The village manager noted that nothing has been heard lately on the proposed takeover of EMS by Ruidoso-Hondo Valley

Hospital.

The Shop Department also receives a healthy budget hike—49 percent. Two 6,000-gallon storage tanks—one for diesel fuel and one for unleaded gasoline (for which there has been no storage capacity) are major capital expenditures.

In the area of Fire Prevention and Preparedness, Hine explained that the job of fire prevention officer and emergency planning and preparation supervisor (formerly Civil Defense coordinator) is to be combined.

Expenditures in Recreation, said Hine, are broken down to \$35,560 for parks and recreation and \$40,613 for swimming pool operation.

An \$18,000 increase in the public library budget, to \$91,696, includes about \$16,000 for books and periodicals, Hine said.

Under General Executive-Legislative, an increase of 32 percent includes \$40,000 to be spent on paving a parking area around the police building and shop, Hine reported. This category also includes salaries of administrative personnel and councilmen.

The area of Financial Administration shows a 72 percent drop for the new fiscal year. Hine attributed the decrease to the past year's purchase of a computer at \$68,000 and materials and programing at \$40,000.

Protective Inspection shows a 14 percent increase, with hiring of a second building inspector.

The preliminary budget has been sent to Santa Fe for approval of the state Board of Finance. A final budget hearing is scheduled for June 29 and the new budget will take effect the first week in July.

Here's a month by month description of the 1981-82 Ruidoso High School sports year.

**September:** Ruidoso's varsity football team started off with a bang, dumping

visiting Estancia 41-6 on September 4. Chris Lopez, who scored three touchdowns, got the Warriors off winging with an 85 yard kickoff return for a score. Ruidoso followed with victories over Socorro (21-12), Dexter (23-6) and Jal (20-0) to finish the month with a perfect 4-0 record.

The young Warrior volleyball team finished the month with a solid 4-2 record. Ruidoso's junior varsity football team ended the month with a 1-1-1 record.

**October:** The Warrior football team started the month with a 7-0 homecoming victory over New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) as Darin Smith scored the only touchdown on a pass from Billy Woodul.

Ruidoso opened the district 3-AAA season with a convincing 20-6 victory over Cobre. Scott Neal ran for 156 yards and two touchdowns and the entire defense played well.

The Warriors suffered their first defeat of the season, a 13-0 loss to Tularosa, the next week. The loss was especially damaging since the Warriors tied Tularosa for second place in the district, but the Wildcats got the state playoff bid because of their victory over Ruidoso.

However, Ruidoso bounced back with an impressive 42-20 victory over visiting Deming the next week and followed that up with a 36-16 trouncing of Truth or Consequences (T or C) the following week.

The Ruidoso volleyball team ended the month with a 1-6 record in district action. Several close defeats prevented the Warrior record from being better than it was.

The Ruidoso junior varsity football team ended its season with a 3-3-1 record. However, the Warriors' final victory of the season was an impressive 24-12 win over Goddard of Roswell, an AAAA school.

**November:** The first Friday of the month saw the Ruidoso varsity football team lose the season finale and the district championship to visiting Silver City, 21-14. The Warriors outgained the Colts, but Silver City scored with 2:30 left in the game for the victory and the championship.

Despite the Warriors' loss, they had an outstanding season. Their 8-2 overall record was as good as Silver City's season mark. Ruidoso scored 224 points while allowing just 100.

The Ruidoso volleyball squad finished the season with a 2-9 district mark and an overall record of 6-10. Karen Boone made the all-district team and Laurie Morel also did a fine job all season.

The Warriors finished fifth in the district when they fell to Silver City in three sets.

Ruidoso's wrestling team opened the season with a takedown tournament at the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped. The Warriors had 11 wrestlers score in the tournament.

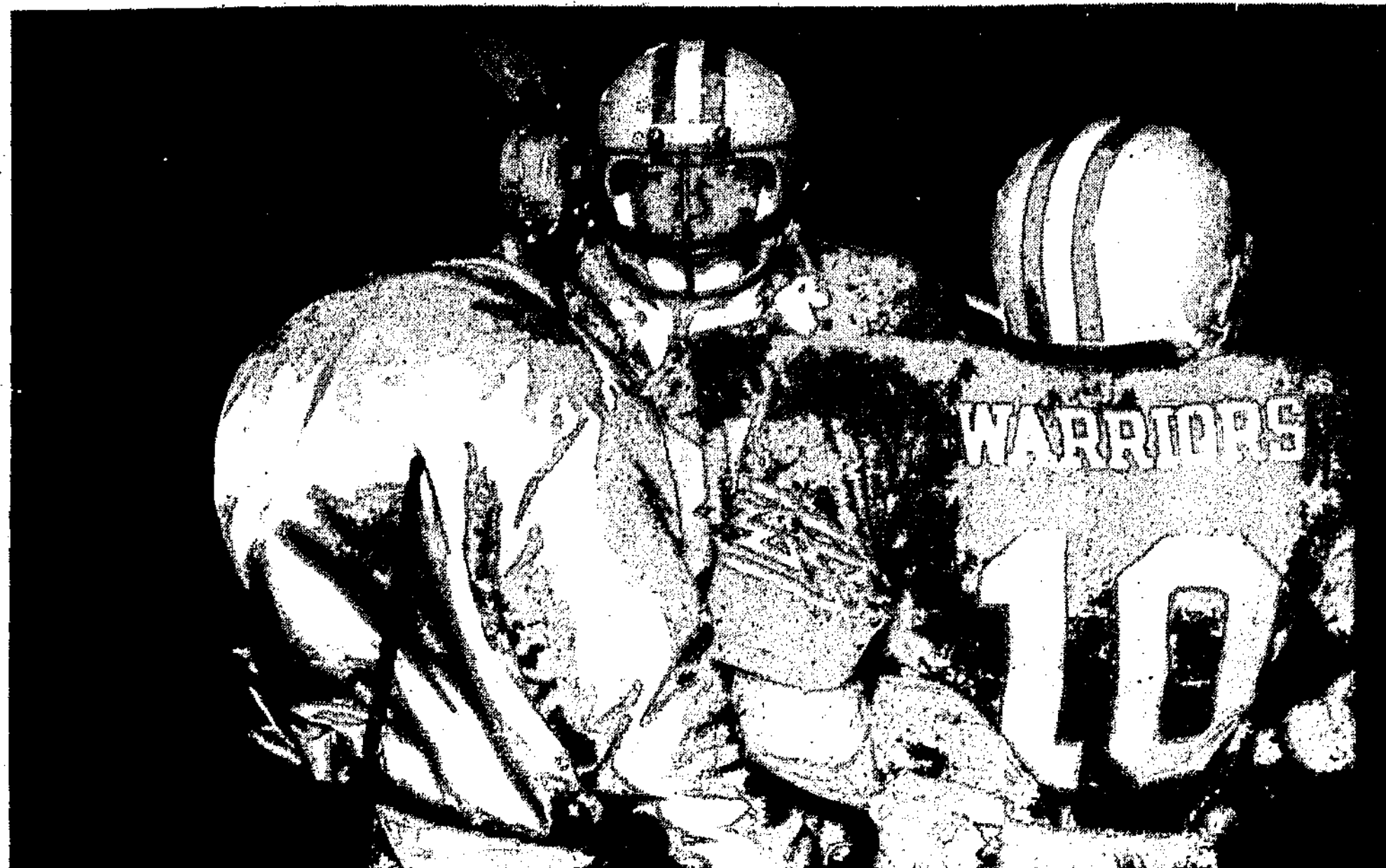
**December:** The Warrior boys' varsity basketball team opened the season with a 52-36 loss at the hands of a powerful NMMI

squad December 1. Bill Richardson led the Warriors with 15 points. Ruidoso lost more games before defeating Dexter the weekend before the holidays. Ruidoso lost to Artesia 81-53 to end the month with a 1-5 record.

The Warrior girls took the consolation trophy in the Weed Tournament. Chae Brannum was named to the all-tournament team and Tami Valdez took the top throw shooter award. The girls finished the month with a 3-3 mark.

Ruidoso's wrestlers took first place in the New Mexico Visually Handicapped Tournament as six athletes took home trophies. Ruidoso also placed three wrestlers in tough, AAAA-dominated Las Cruces invitational and defeated Goddard of Roswell in dual meet competition.

The biggest news of the month has come from the football team. Ruidoso athletes made the all-district team. They included Lon Nunley, Bud Smith, Chris Lopez, Ric Pearson, Montoya and Ronald Bell. Lon Nunley made the South All-Star team and picked to the first squad of the state division team as a linebacker. Scott made the AAA second team as a defensive back and received honorable mention as a quarterback.

**January:** Ruidoso's boys varsity basketball team opened district competition with an 83-69 loss to Silver City. The Warriors won their first game of the district season with a 78-63 victory over T or C.

The Warrior girls lost to Artesia 56-38 in a non-district game and lost all their district games. However, they played several of their opponents very close games.

Ruidoso's wrestlers continued to finish well at the various tournaments in the area. The Warriors' Doug Schmidt was named Most Outstanding Wrestler at the Deming Tournament. He also won the 126 pound title at the first Ruidoso Invitational. Ruidoso finished fourth in that tournament.

**February:** Ruidoso scored two victories over arch-rival Tularosa and finished fourth in the district round-robin basketball season. The Warriors also defeated T or C during the month.

The Warrior wrestling team took third place at the district tournament. Doug Schmidt won the 126 pound title for the only Ruidoso first place in the tournament. Nine Warrior wrestlers made it to state. Wade Torres (who finished fourth for the highest Ruidoso finish), Scott Ciraulo, Ray Montes, Don Gwyn, Henry Rue, Jim Aske, Ronald Bell and Gary Burgess. The Warriors finished 10th in the state meet.

**March:** Ruidoso's varsity basketball team finished fourth in the district playoffs. The Warriors defeated Tularosa 57-46 in the first round but fell to Silver City and 6-7 Lynn Cash 83-58 in the second round.

Ruidoso ended the season with an 8-17 record.

The Warrior girls played their best game of the season but fell just short as they lost to Tularosa 32-29 in the first round of the district playoffs.

The Ruidoso boys junior varsity and girls junior varsity teams had losing seasons but gained improvement throughout the season. Ruidoso's boys freshman team finished the season with a 5-4 record.

Getting several fine performances, the Warrior boys track team opened the

season with a meet at Artesia against the hosts and several other teams. Lon Nunley won the discus and finished second in the shot put. Freshman Cisco Bob won the 1,500 meters. The Warrior relay teams also did well.

Ruidoso's golf team, consisting of sophomore Virgil Reynolds and freshmen Dion Lopez, Tommy Crow and Billy Taylor, began its season. The Warriors didn't win any tournaments but got some good individual performances, especially from Reynolds, their best golfer. He had a best of 76 for 18 holes.

Ruidoso's girls track team opened the season at the Deming Invitational. Sheri Dennis and Jackie Jefferson were the top individual stardos as the Warriors finished third. The Ruidoso boys also finished third in the same tournament.

Warrior boys' head varsity basketball coach Barry Nelson announced his resignation in March. Nelson finished with an 8-17 record for the 1981-82 season, but his 1980-81 squad won the district title and finished fourth in the state AAA division tournament.

**April:** The Warrior track team was very active as it continued to have impressive marks in invitational meets. events at the district meet to make the state meet. Ruidoso finished second in the girls division at the district meet and the

boys finished fourth. Girls who qualified for the state meet included Dennis, Jackie Jefferson, Sonja Jefferson, Laura Trapp, Valerie Garcia, Gia Rose, Judy McCoy, Deanna Peso and Cappie King. Members of the boys team who made the state meet included Lon Nunley, Don Nunley, Scott Neal, Cisco Bob and Grady Williamson.

Lon Nunley was the Warriors' top performer at the state meet as he took third in both the discus and shot put. He also ran a leg on the 800 meter relay team which finished fifth. Other members of that relay team were Neal, Williamson and Don Nunley. Bob finished fourth in the 1,500 meters, an amazing performance for a freshman.

Dennis was the girls' top performer as she finished fourth in the 100 meters. She just barely missed the finals in the 200 meters. Deanna Peso finished sixth in the 3,000 meter run for Ruidoso.

Ron Geyer was named the new head varsity basketball coach for the boys team. He replaced Nelson, who is moving to Arizona.

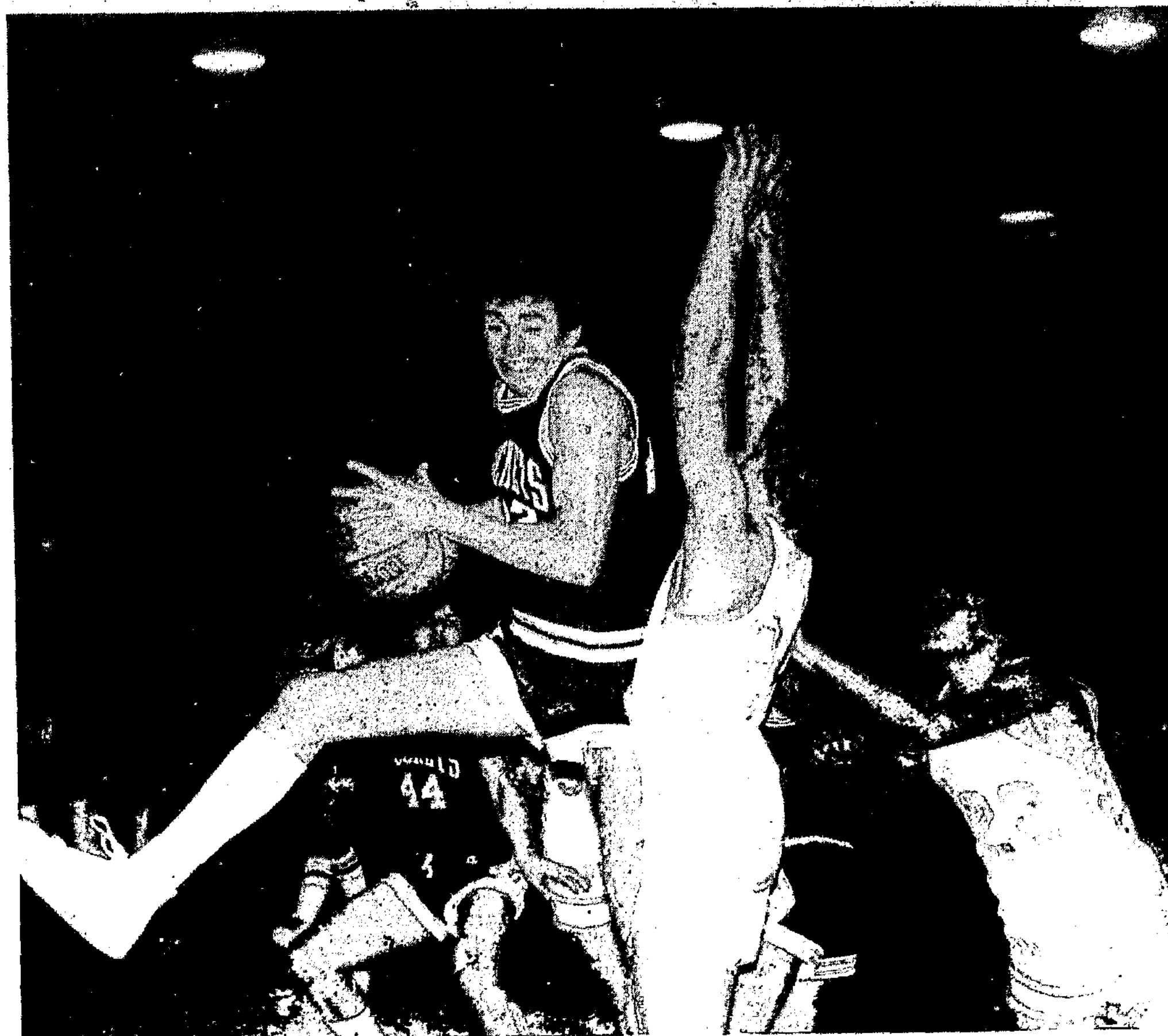
Elmer Chavez of Grants High School was selected as the new head coach of the girls volleyball team.

Youth soccer in Ruidoso is slowly but surely gaining ground on the soccer organizations in more populated areas.

Two Ruidoso-Sertoma Soccer Association (RSSA) under-12 teams recently competed in the district playoffs. Although the two teams (the Tornado and Strikers) lost out in the total point standings, they were competitive against teams from much bigger population areas like El Paso, Alamogordo and Las Cruces.

The under-16 and under-eight division teams have also done better against outside competition this season. The under-16 Celtic recently dropped a close 4-2 decision to Alamogordo.

latest English and German coaching films. The fee is \$55 per youth with a \$10 non-refundable deposit with the application.

# Pianist Leonard Pennario to make Ruidoso debut

What will the Ruidoso Summer Festival soon have in common with the New York Philharmonic, Boston Symphony Orchestra, Philadelphia Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Cleveland Orchestra?

They have all heard the legendary pianist Leonard Pennario perform as soloist.

In addition to appearing with "America's Big Five," Pennario has played in all 50 states and has played with Great Britain's eight leading orchestras plus other leading symphony orchestras throughout Europe.

Pennario will make his Ruidoso debut Saturday, June 5, at 8 p.m. in the Ruidoso Downs Sales Arena. The guest artist will be accompanied by the Texas Little Symphony (TLS) conducted by John Giordano.

Pennario will perform Beethoven's Concerto Number Four in G major, Opus 58.

TLS will then do Giordano's own "West Texas Suite" and the "Comedians" Suite by Dmitri Kabalevsky. To close the program, Pennario will rejoin the orchestra to perform George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue."

Described by the Cincinnati Post as "the people's choice," Pennario is also the choice of the world's greatest orchestra conductors. Just some of the notable conductors with whom Pennario has played include Otto Klemperer, Dmitri Mitropoulos, Andre Previn and George Solti.

Pennario's list of best-selling recordings is forever expanding. Under exclusive contract, the six-foot, silver-haired, brown-eyed Pennario has a long list of winning records, including his newest recording "Chopin Waltzes." In 1974 and 1975, Pennario became part of record industry history by recording two disks comprised of Louis Gottschalk's brilliant solo piano music.

Pennario's concert seasons are crowded with the kinds of prestigious engagements

which the public might expect of such a talented pianist. Glowing press notices are the rule rather than the exception for Pennario.

Most recently, Pennario toured with the New Orleans Philharmonic and appeared with the Honolulu Symphony. Each season he continues his orchestral engagements and recital performances throughout the United States and Canada, appearing on many major university and college campuses.

Among the most cherished moments in Leonard Pennario's career were his chamber music performances with Jascha Heifetz, Gregor Piatigorsky and William Primrose. 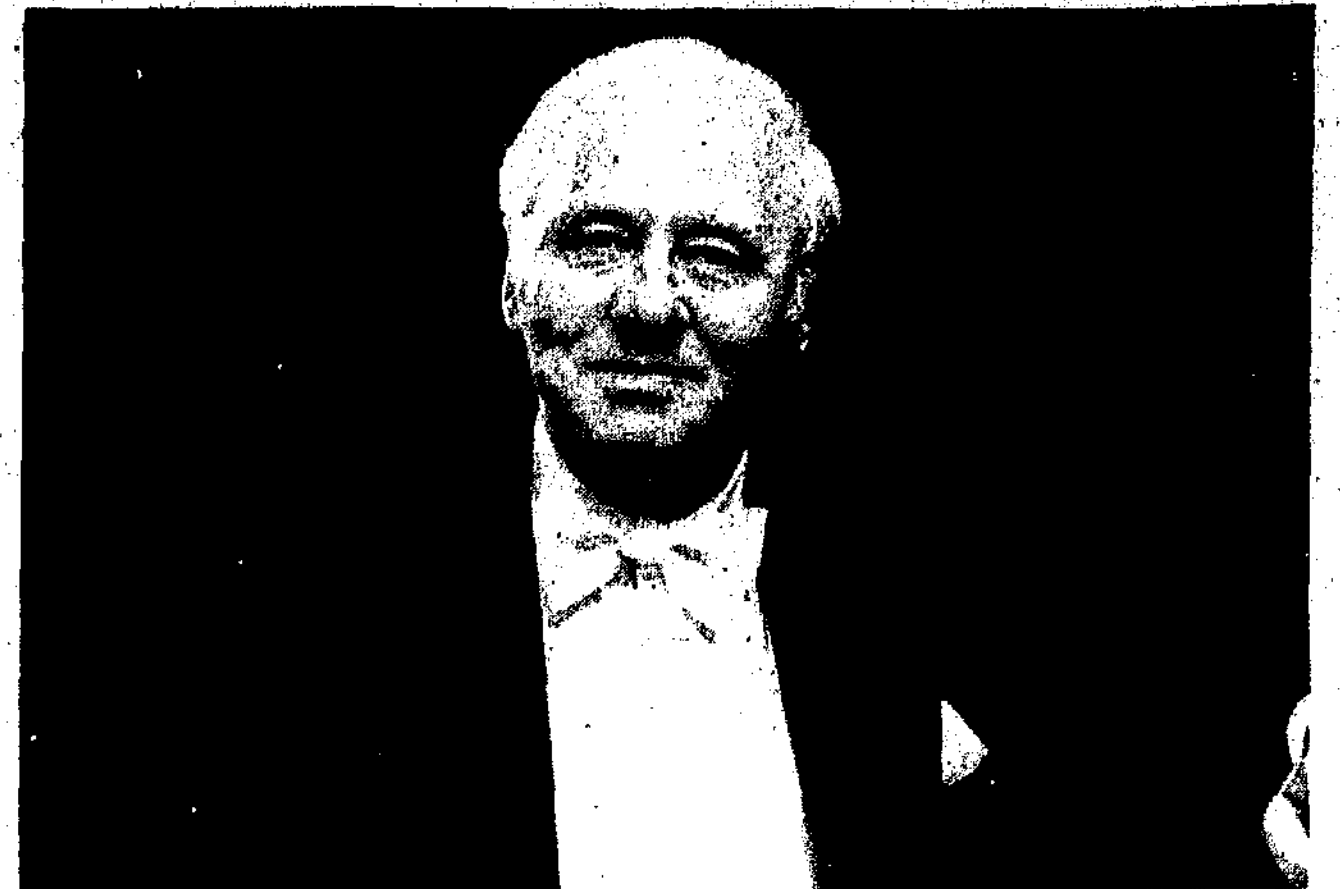
Pennario was once called the "Wunderkind," or boy wonder. However, he is now known as a veteran pianist of great stature.

He made his musical debut with the Dallas Symphony at the age of 12. While

still in the U.S. Army, the 19-year-old Pennario played with Arthur Rodzinski and the New York Philharmonic in 1943. Pennario has studied with Olga Steeb, Guy Maier and Isabella Vengerova.

In what is left of his spare time, Pennario enjoys theater, films, art collecting and lying on the beaches of Hawaii and California as hobbies. One of Pennario's favorite ways of relaxing between engagements has been to play in bridge tournaments. In 1980, he realized his ambition to become a Life Master at the Bridge Spring Nationals. Such an achievement is a unique title among world concert soloists.

Perhaps William Mann, music critic of the London Times, said it best in summing up the artistry of Leonard Pennario. "He is an extraordinarily refined artist with fingers as agile and a mind as subtle as those of the very greatest pianists memory can recall."

## Firefighters have busy weekend

Two forest fires, both apparently set intentionally, kept firefighters busy Saturday afternoon.

The first fire, which started on a hill across from The Springs Condominiums on University Drive, burned about five acres of forest.

There were many tense moments at the scene as wind carried embers aloft, causing the fire to jump into thick brush. A very steep incline also complicated efforts to extinguish the fire as firemen had to pull long lengths of hose to reach the flames.

It took the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD), a U.S. Forest Service crew and Smokey Bear Hot Shots about an hour to douse hot spots. The cleanup lasted much longer.

Ira Caster, Smokey Bear fire prevention officer, was certain the fire was intentionally set.

"I know it's man caused," he said. "This could have been one, couldn't it have? This bothers me—there have been too many of these."

While crews were occupied at the University Drive scene, a call came in on another fire in Ponderosa Heights.

The second fire, which burned a small section of woods behind a cabin at 214 Fir Street, was quickly controlled by a group of firefighters who were transferred from the other blaze.

The location was in a densely inhabited area, but no structures were burned.

The cause was unknown, but it was speculated that the fire was intentionally set.

"I wouldn't put it past this one being set," said Tom Guck, Captain Ranger District fire prevention officer.

The Saturday fires were just two of six that local firefighters responded to over the first holiday weekend of the summer.

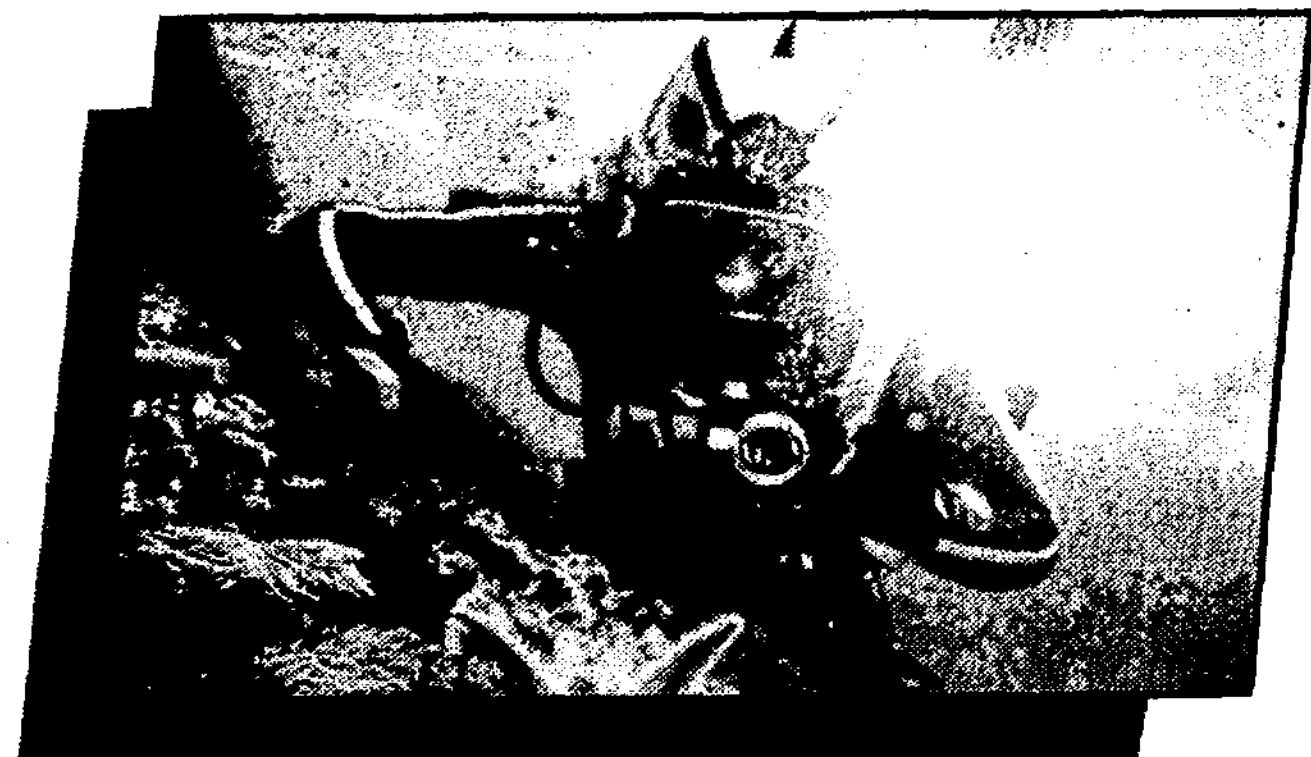

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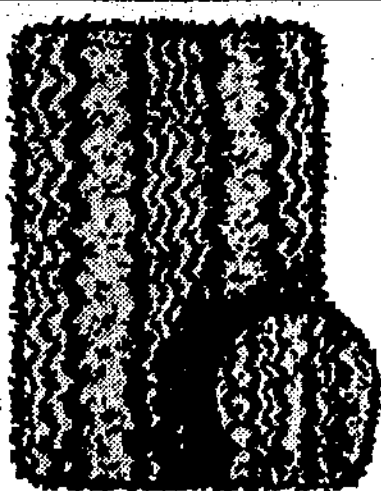


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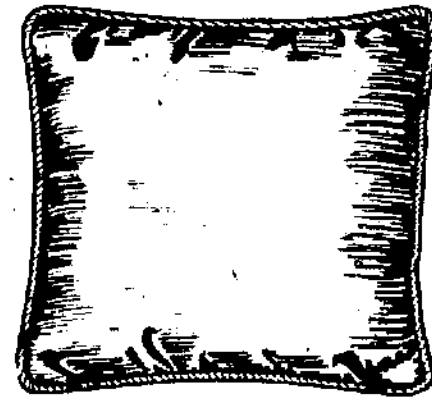
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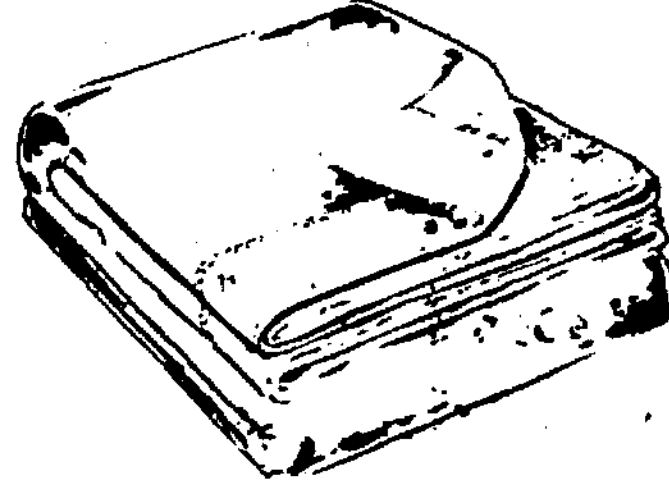
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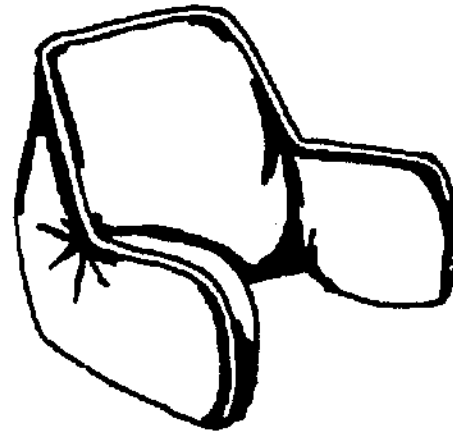
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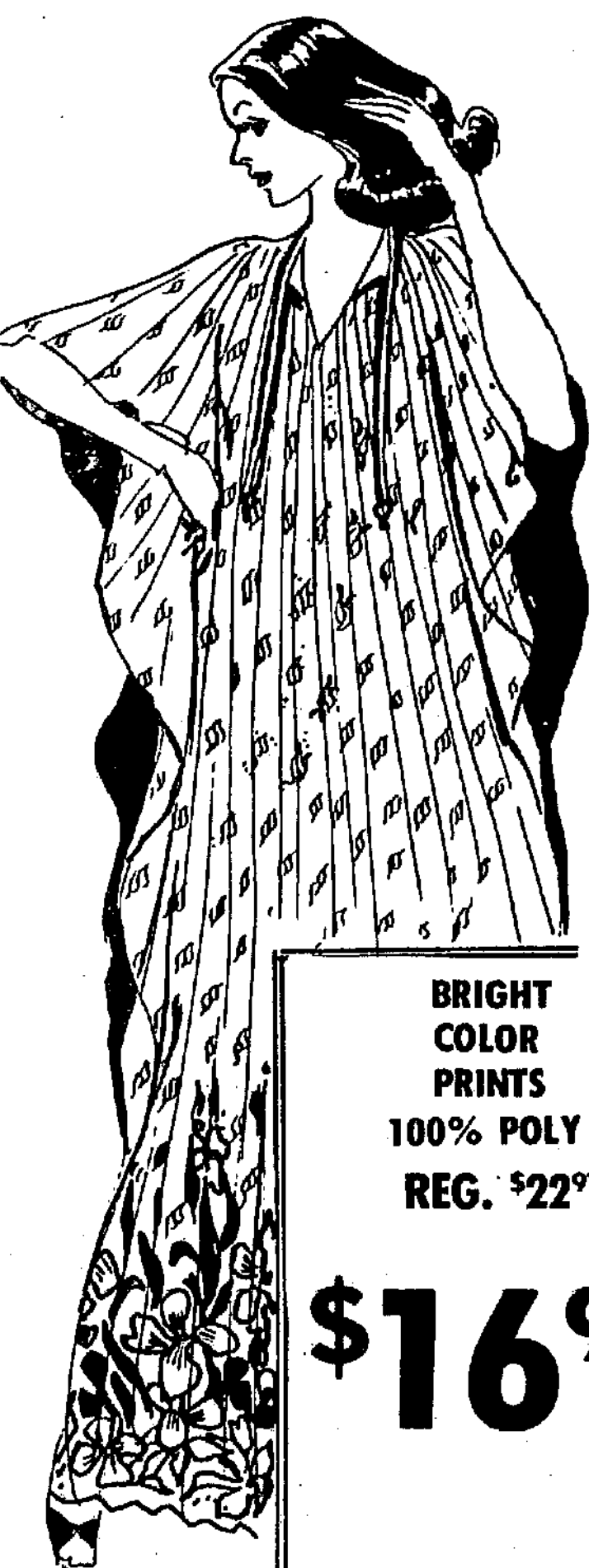


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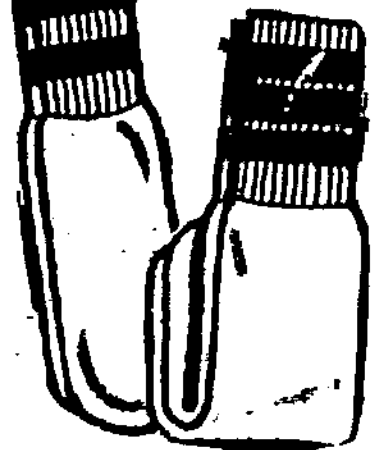
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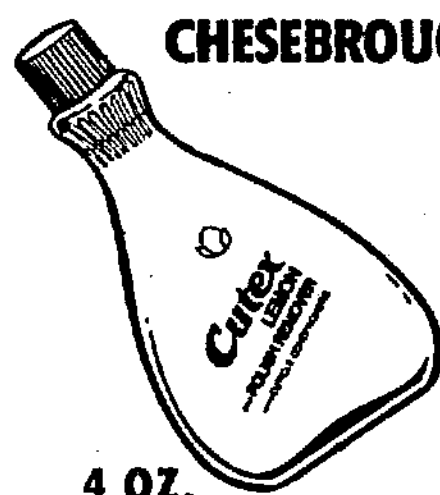
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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — What difference will Mormons make in the primary election?

Almost none. The question rises because Bill Sego, Republican candidate for governor, is a practicing member of that religious body. Some political observers expect that fact to skew the normal 1982 New Mexico political results.

There are something in the neighborhood of 31,000 members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in our state.

Members incline to have large families, so maybe as many as 20,000 of them are under age as far as voting goes. That leaves a maximum of 10,000 who may be adult registered voters.

But Mormons, like all political "blobs," come in all sorts of political persuasions. Of the 10,000 who may be eligible to vote, at least half are Democrats, and so not in a position to help Sego in the Republican primary.

"Besides," Sego adds, "the people I go to church with set the highest standards. They are tough on me."

Sego isn't counting on these people to elect him. His opponents should not fear their numbers.

A simple question:

If Fabian Chavez is expected to garner almost no votes in the Democratic primary, how come, whenever the candidates appear together, he gets more applause than anybody else?

Is Bruce King working hard for Aubrey Dunn?

If so, you'd never know it.

The Governor and his wife have gone on a tour of Israel, and they won't be back till the day before the primary election.

That shows a degree of coolness — or unconcern — which has seldom been seen in the office of the chief executive of New Mexico in recent years.

The impression it gives is something like

this: "I, the leader of the Democratic party in the state, could not care less who gets nominated. As for me, I'm resting up. Who cares what happens here at home . . . ?"

(It is not true, as rumored, that Governor King is in the Middle East to settle problems between the Jews and Arabs. Solutions there will have to get worked out without him.)

Want to know what it costs to run for office?

Think about these numbers.

Les Houston, who ran for the gubernatorial nomination on the Democratic side of the ticket, withdrew from the contest.

He did not do that in time to get his name removed from the ballot, so he will undoubtedly get some votes.

They will be wasted. He is not a true candidate.

And what did it cost him to arrive at that position?

Reports filed with the Secretary of State say he and his wife lent his abortive campaign \$105,334.18.

That's a lot of money.

In addition to that, Houston owes, according to the report he filed with the Secretary of State, \$6,350.73 in bills, to pay for what he over-expended during his brief campaign.

Total lost in this race which went nowhere: \$111,683.91.

That ain't hay.

It's probably more than most readers of this column made last month.

(Politics is an expensive game. Don't get into it unless you have the wherewithal to go all the way. Some present candidates have so far spent over \$400,000 in their quest for the governor's job — which isn't worth it. And the primary, in which they are running, is only the first act. There are many more expenditures to come before November 2.)

### CLOUDY THOUGHTS

Science fiction writers tend to portray visitors from beyond Earth arriving in highly sophisticated spacecraft. There are many variations on the theme. Alien creatures come in vehicles which range from so-called "flying saucers" to such psychedelic constructs as in the film "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," or the mile-long spaceship which is suddenly, awesomely present above our planet in one of Arthur C. Clarke's novels.

Yet ah, suppose, and don't think some science fictioneer hasn't already supposed it, that alien life were to arrive not via spaceship but in a wholly different manner. As a cloud, say, mysteriously enveloping Earth.

But... But...

Exactly. Just such a cloud is floating high above most of the Northern Hemisphere right now. The best that scientists have come up with by way of explanation is that maybe the cloud was caused by an undetected volcanic eruption, or possibly an exploding meteor. As one of the scientists at NASA's Langley Research Center remarked, "We're wondering a lot about it."

Non-scientists tend to wonder about such things, too. And one thing some of the more imaginative wonderers have been wondering is: What if the cloud were not just ordinary dust cloud but some vast, attenuated intelligence giving us the once-over before deciding what to do about the human race?

Data from instrumented aircraft poking around up there will provide an answer of

sorts. Probably, as surmised, it will be found that the cloud appears to be made up of nothing more mysterious than dust and debris.

### REAGAN PLAN MIGHT HURT STATE

The potential high cost of President Reagan's proposed New Federalism to New Mexicans is evident in an estimate prepared by the Congressional Budget Office.

The president's plan calls for the federal government to swap its food stamp and aid to families with dependent children programs for the states' Medicaid programs. Had New Federalism been in place in 1981, New Mexico would have incurred a net loss of \$99 million. That year the state spent \$32 million for Medicaid and received \$131 million in food stamp and AFDC federal support.

In 1984, the Medicaid bill in New Mexico is expected to grow to approximately \$40 million while food stamp and AFDC costs will reach an estimated \$150 million. With New Federalism, New Mexico would have a net loss of \$101 million if it continued to support the two programs at their present levels.

With 40 of the 50 states showing net losses under the 1984 CBO projections, it's little wonder that the president's New Federalism hasn't found a groundswell of support among Americans. — Albuquerque Journal

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## Sense & Nonsense

On March 30, I introduced a relatively minor amendment to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission Authorization bill, restricting imports of uranium to no more than 20 percent of our annual domestic use. It passed the Senate without objection. One would not think that this rather innocuous amendment has stirred up a major international controversy, but it has.

I thought America had learned something from the Arab oil boycott in 1973. I thought we had learned that short-sighted dependence on foreign sources of energy, in this case oil, led to economic turmoil and threatened our national security. Perhaps it wasn't a lesson that was taken to heart because it seems to be happening again, this time with uranium, and no one thinks it's a problem.

Just as in the 1960s when our thirst for cheap oil took us overseas and left our own exploration and development here at home to falter, our domestic uranium industry is on the brink of collapse. Certainly imports have not brought the industry to the brink — cancelled nuclear power reactors and delays in construction have done that. But the Department of Energy had projected that our import dependence could grow from 10% today to as high as 80% by the late 1980s. Obviously we haven't learned our lesson because the bureaucrats of Washington are still listening to the short-sighted interest groups and fighting efforts to keep our domestic uranium industry viable. These efforts include my provision to restrict imports, restricting the use of foreign uranium in domestic nuclear power plants to 20% of their annual use.

One would think that this would be a popular position to take in Congress, protecting our national security interests and preserving a vital domestic industry. But it is not and each special interest lined up against this amendment has their own reason for not wanting the measure passed.

Most utilities are opposing the provision, but there are a few who learned their lesson with oil imports. Long Island Lighting Company (LILCO) knows from first hand experience what happens to a utility company when they depend on a foreign nation to supply their energy needs. Signing long-term contracts with OPEC oil suppliers when oil was cheap, LILCO found themselves literally at the mercy of their OPEC suppliers when oil prices went out of sight and their con-

sumers paid the price for their shortsightedness.

The foreign nations who export their uranium are opposed to the measure, claiming that the measure violates free trade. The Australian, Canadian (two major exporters of uranium to the U.S.) and French embassies have vigorously protested and have lined up the support of several federal agencies to back up their claims. The State Department has sent protests, as have the Justice Department, and Energy Department to the House and Senate conferees on the import restriction. They all claim it restricts free trade. As for the issue of free trade, you have never seen this Senator come out against free trade, as long as it is fair trade. If we are violating free trade laws, then what is Australia doing with their innumerable import duties and restrictions? For example, there is an import quota of 20 percent of the local market on automobiles and a duty of 57.5 percent on any import. This is not free or fair trade.

Now with all this opposition you might ask why is Pete Domenici so much in favor of it? I'll simply say that while we may not have learned our lesson the Canadians, one of the opponents of my provision, have. Our neighbor to the north understands the legitimate national security issue here. Referring to the uranium mining and mining industry, Canada's Minister of Energy stated that protection of Canadian uranium consumers should be twofold: first, to ensure a long-term reserve of nuclear fuel for existing and future reactors for at least ten years into the future; and then to ensure that sufficient uranium production capacity is available for the Canadian domestic nuclear power program to reach its full potential.

Our own Department of Energy is not concerned, however. At hearings before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, DOE expressed their view that nothing needed to be done at this time except to continue to monitor the developments. However, in this year's budget, funding for this monitoring was eliminated. Someone other than the federal bureaucrats is going to have to handle this problem. Clearly nothing will be done by them. They see it as a small issue even though we will reach the point where nuclear power is providing 30% of our electricity in the not-too-distant future.

The House-passed version of the NRC Authorization Bill did not contain my amendment, and a House-Senate conference has been called to resolve differences in the bill. My amendment, which has passed the Senate, may not become law now because Congress seems to only deal with issues when a crisis has already occurred, rather than seeking preventive measures to avert the crisis. This is especially true when foreign countries object and the State Department is in opposition to the measure.

But how can we ignore the plight of the domestic uranium industry which has seen since 1980, 29 mining operation closures, seven uranium mines shut down, and 10 uranium projects under construction scrapped? Is it in our national security interest that in the event of an emergency, it could take upwards of 10 years to rebuild our domestic uranium producing capacity? Is it fair to the thousands of domestic uranium industry workers that we continue to buy foreign uranium in the interest of "free trade" when these same nations do not grant us that same right to export our products freely?

I believe we must send a strong signal to foreign producers stating that the United States is not willing to see its uranium market dominated by foreign imports. If we do not pass this amendment, and fail to send that strong signal, we will be doing ourselves and those foreign producers a disservice as well. America must stand on record that it promotes and fosters free trade, but that it must also be fair trade.

Now that our village fathers have taken steps to curtail a fire hazard (untreated wood roof shingles), we hope they turn their attention to an eye hazard—portable signs.

The aim of "preserving Ruidoso's mountain atmosphere" is often cited at meetings of the Ruidoso council and Planning and Zoning Commission.

It is hard to think of anything less in keeping with a "mountain atmosphere" than little signs on wheels with changeable plastic letters.

The council agreed that the metal building to temporarily house the Police Department will have wood siding, in accordance with guidelines of the Architectural Plans Review Committee.

And, the council avoided an outright ban on wood shingles—the most popular roofing material used locally. The shingles are allowed if treated with fire retardant chemicals.

But allowing the presence of the unsightly signs, which are a traffic hazard when placed at curbside, can have no justification whatsoever. All they do is make Ruidoso look like Albuquerque.

That city's sign ordinance was recently upheld by the state Supreme Court, which gave the go ahead to other New Mexico municipalities to enforce their ordinances.

We urge that owners of businesses using the signs voluntarily remove them, and that the village order any remaining signs to be removed.

If you have an opinion on these signs, let your councilmen know about it.—TP

## On the village beat

A University of New Mexico alumni magazine showed up on my desk the other day. I guess it came in the mail, like all kinds of other interesting and not so interesting stuff does every day.

The magazine presents a "year in pictures" review of 1982 at UNM. It is full of happy, harmonious scenes.

Glancing through the magazine brought to mind my own undergraduate days at that august institution of higher learning. The last semester I spent at UNM concluded in May of 1970—12 years ago. And an exciting conclusion it was, with the New Mexico National Guard marching on campus to retake the Student Union Building from the students who had seized it several days before.

My brief career as a student radical spanned the three of four days leading up to the Guard offensive.

In the first days of May, 1970, American forces launched a military offensive from Vietnam into Cambodia, a move that did not sit well with the anti-war movement in the United States.

On May 4, four students were killed at Kent State University in Ohio when National Guard troops fired on demonstrators protesting the Cambodian invasion.

The time was ripe for something to happen at UNM, and it did.

Jane Fonda was the catalyst. She spoke at the anthropology lecture hall a day or two after Kent State.

I went with one or two of my buddies to hear her. Although we were interested in her views (she was gaining a lot of notoriety by then for her anti-war stance), we were also motivated by having seen "Barbarella," in which she wore scanty costumes and looked out of this world.

There was a packed house at the anthro hall. I don't remember much of what Jane Fonda said, but she did impress me with her sincerity. She told us how her involvement in the anti-war movement came about—through living in Europe and trying to defend America's actions in Southeast Asia.

There came a time, she said, when she could no longer defend what her country was doing.

In a play on the title of one of her films, "They Shoot Horses, Don't They?" somebody from the audience yelled, "They shoot students, don't they?"

"They shoot everybody," she replied.

With the audience primed to a mood of idealistic anger, one of Albuquerque's resident radicals—Alan Cooper, I think his name was—did a smooth thing. He took the microphone and suggested that the gathering become a political meeting.

If I remember right, the idea was to draw up a list of demands to present to the university administration.

There was a group of militant-looking Indian students present, and the Anglo leaders of the meeting seemed eager to be sure this group's interests were represented in the list of demands.

The Indians were having none of it, however. They got up, told the meeting,

"You'll hear from us when we get our stuff together," and stalked angrily from the hall.

There was kind of a "Gee, what did we do to offend them?" pause, then the chaotic meeting went on.

It broke up abruptly with a mass decision to march over to the president's house. I'm not sure what this was supposed to accomplish, but everyone was righteously indignant when President Healy failed to come out or otherwise acknowledge the crowd milling around outside his walls.

One guy, I remember, climbed upon the wall and yelled at the top of his lungs, "You got time for (Governor) Cargo, you got time for the Legislature, you got time for everybody. But you ain't got time for us, you @&%% \*~!!!"

I met Ferrel Heady a couple of years later, and he turned out to be a small, soft spoken man, quite out of keeping with the villain he was made out to be that night.

During the hubbub, I got to talking to a girl I'd known in high school. Unlike me, she had been to a demonstration before. "Weren't you radical last year?" he asked with only partly pretended surprise.

The following days and nights were exciting, as the students went on strike and took over the Student Union Building. One night, hundreds of students lined Central Avenue, shouting at passing motorists to honk their horns for peace.

We were riding around in my brother's old handpainted Volkswagen bus, and someone got the idea to take beer to the demonstrators. So we bought a case of Pearl or something and drove slowly along the curb, tossing beers to the thirsty protesters.

It was so much fun we bought more beer and did it again. By the third or fourth trip, people would see our bus coming and a big roar would go up all along the line.

A day or two later the party came to an end. A friend and I were in the union when the order came to clear it. After weighing the prospect of getting arrested, we cleared out, but many stayed.

I'll never forget looking down the mall and seeing the gas-masked troops advance with fixed bayonets. One protester was stabbed, though not fatally, thank God.

I'm sure that particular memory of mine pales beside those of veterans of the real Vietnam War.

I guess I'll always feel kind of struck about not having gone to Vietnam. I flunked out in the first draft lottery.

I'm grateful I wasn't among those who died there—a couple of guys I knew did. But I want to say now that I'm grateful to the guys who went and fought. I appreciate your sacrifice, and would like to see you get more credit from the public.

And I'm sorry if some of the stuff we were doing at home made it harder for you over there, but I hope it helped bring it all to an end.

Early summer is when most of the major studios release the films that they hope will be box-office blockbusters. Such films are predominantly escapist entertainment, designed to give people thrills and chills as they beat the heat.

Some of the films on which high hopes for high box-office grosses are riding are "Blade Runner" starring Harrison Ford in a sci-fi shoot-em-up, "Star Trek II," "Rocky III" and two films based on comic strip characters, "Annie" and "Conan the Barbarian."

"Conan" is a blockbuster for all the usual reasons — budgets, costumes, sets and scenery are all of epic proportions, as is the film's star, Arnold Schwarzenegger.

"Conan" is little more than the comic book come to life. Conan is first shown as a boy who watches as his father is killed by a wandering tribe of marauders. They also behead

his mother as young Conan stands holding her hand.

He then grows up as a slave used much like a gladiator in an arena that makes the contests of ancient Rome seem like a friendly game of checkers.

"Conan," as co-scripted and directed by John Millius, is basically an excuse for some bloody battles and muscle-flexing by Schwarzenegger. His main opponent is James Earl Jones — the man who gave his mother a nasty headache — who is now the leader of a snake-worshipping cult.

Millius has written scripts for such films as "Apocalypse Now" and "Jeremiah Johnson." He freely admits he loves blood-and-guts movies. He certainly pulls no punches when he gets a chance to direct, so if you like this kind of movie you will not be disappointed.

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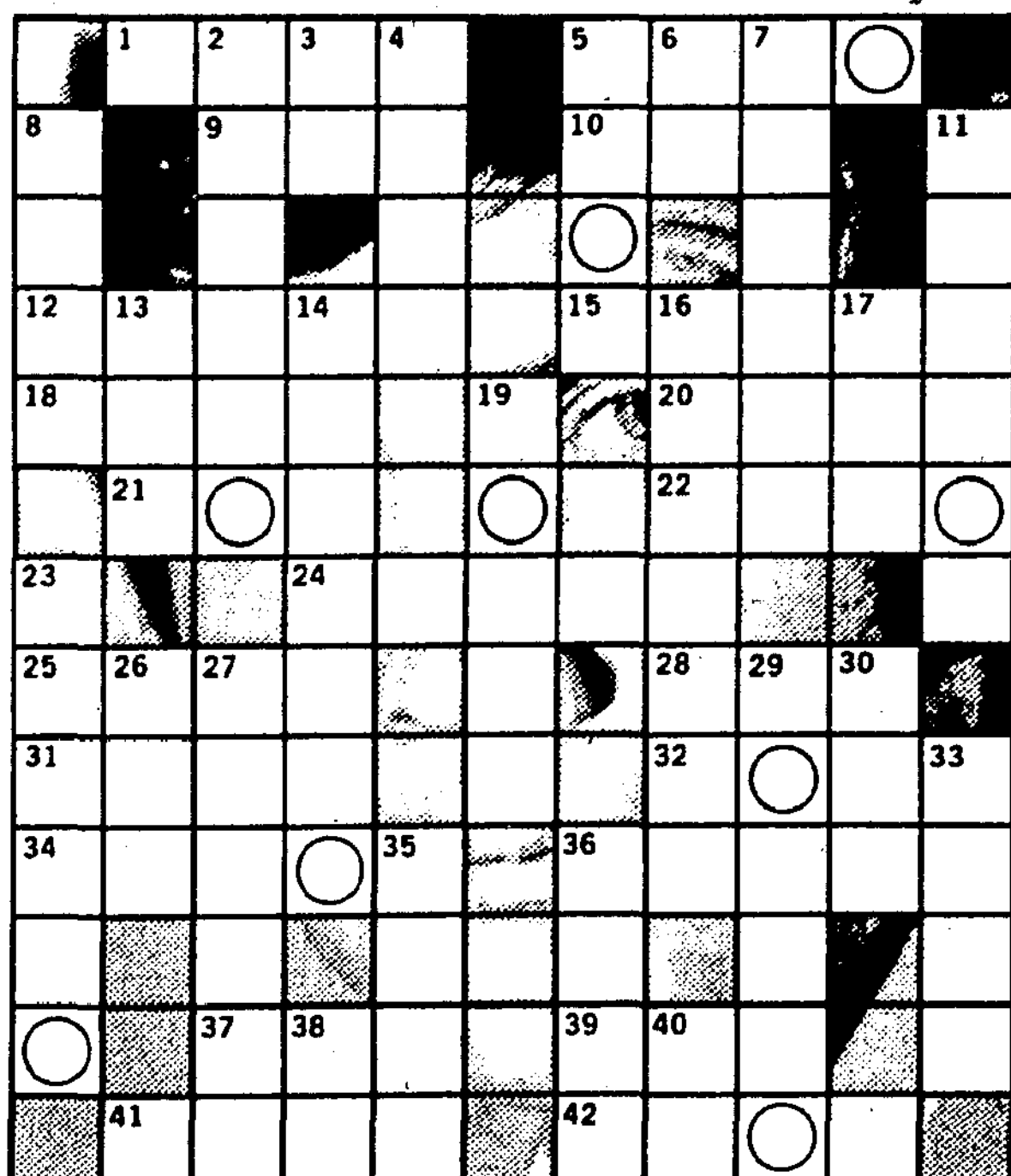

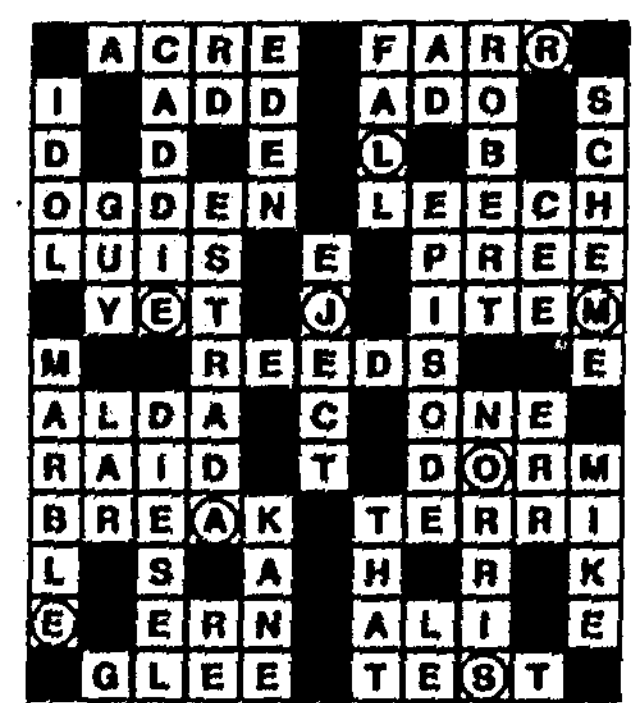

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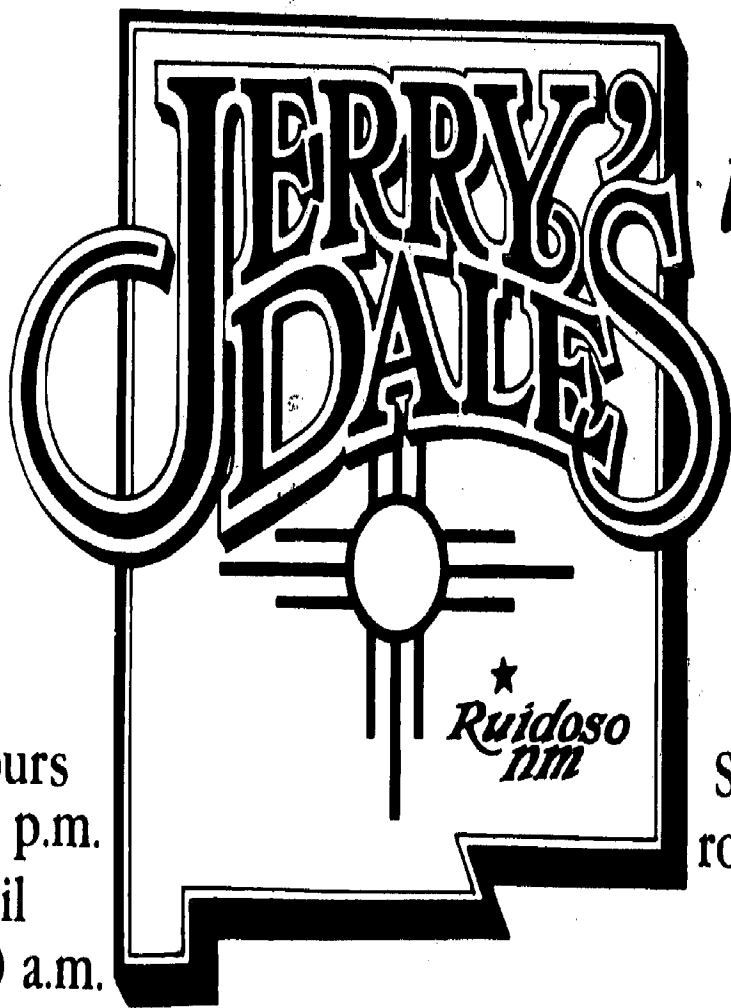
