# County acts on roads, personnel

Two county ordinances were adopted following public hearings and the bid on a data processing system for the courthouse was awarded during Friday's special county commissioners meeting.

Road policy Ordinance 82-2, which establishes regulations for private parties, companies and corporations wishing to perform work on any county road, was adopted without discussion. The regulations were adopted in the form of a resolution during the November 23 commissioners meeting, but it was decided the road policy should be adopted as an or-


superintendent shall inspect work being performed on a county road as it is ongoing to ensure that such work is satisfactory.

The ordinance was established because of reports from Henley that he often has to repair roads after utility companies cut them up to install lines. Henley also had reported that a number of private property owners have installed culverts improperly, resulting in flooding of others' propertv.

Also adopted Friday was personnel policy Ordinance 82-1, an update of the personnel policy written during the early 1970s. County manager Suzanne Cox said there was a need to update the ordinance "to present-day needs." A similar or-

A paragraph requiring most county employees to have a high school diploma or GED equivalent was deleted after commissioners decided that a high school education does not necessarily ensure that an applicant will make a better employee. Also discussed, but left in the policy, was the establishment of performance evaluations to be conducted each year by department heads two weeks prior to an employee's anniversary date. Cox explained that these evaluations are to be used as a tool for department heads to decide upon recommendations for promotions, pay

raises or firing of employees. The new ordinance also sets up specific procedures to be followed in firing an



# Ordinance changes due

The Ruidoso council Friday authorized village attorney Lee Huckstep to draw up proposals to make the water and sewer ordinance more equitable.

The much-maligned ordinance, which went into effect October 1 and was amended last week, is causing the water department embarrassment because customers have questioned provisions that give mobile home parks a lower rate on meter charges than that of other residential developments, said Judy Franzer of the water billing department.

Mobile home parks are now charged under the commercial rate structure, which provides a flat monthly water charge according to the meter size serving the park, plus a commodity charge when use exceeds 4,000 gallons a month.

The commercial classification allows several housing units to be placed on a single meter with no additional monthly charge per unit.

As an example of the problem, Huckstep pointed out that 120 trailers in Cherokee Mobile Village are being served by a single meter, with a single monthly bill charged to the entire park.

Mobile homes on private lots, however, as well as condominiums, apartment houses and other multi-family housing developments, are charged the residential rates.

Several units also can be served by a single meter under the residential rate structure. But unlike commercial fees, each residential unit is billed the flat monthly charge for the meter, plus a commodity charge when the amount of water used

per month exceeds an average of 4,000 gallons for each unit serviced by the meter.

Huckstep indicated it is not fair to other residential customers to have trailer parks occupied by permanent residents charged the commercial rates.

Councilman Benny Coulston noted some parks rent trailers out on a temporary basis, and he asked how the law could be written to exclude the temporary rentals from residential billing.

Huckstep suggested the test between commercial housing and residential housing could be the collection of lodger's tax. He noted the tax is collected on units that are rented out for periods under 30 days, and he said the same time limit could determine whether housing complexes are billed the commercial or residential water charges.

It was also pointed out at the workshop that the current exception from residential billing for hotels, motels and tourist cabin operations has caused a problem.

Councilman Don Dale complained that some owners of apartment buildings have identified their businesses as rental cabin operations to avoid the per unit charge under the residential classification.

Huckstep said the lodger's tax requirement could also apply to hotels, motels and cabins. He said if establishments begin long-term rentals and no longer collect the tax, then they could be designated as residential.

But Dale said he wants cabins-regardless if they are rented out for long periods-to remain classified as commercial. He indicated cabin owners would be loudly opposed to paying the residential rates. Huckstep said the purpose for re-

questing the changes is to put all residential units on residential billing in order to make the ordinance more equitable.

The council also authorized Huckstep to examine the water tap fees and utility expansion charges to multi-family housing developments.

Water Board member Bill Karn said the charges "are not fair to the people of Ruidoso" because, he said, owners of single family homes are carrying the burden of utility expansion.

Karn pointed out that the tap fee for a three-quarter-inch meter-which can serve up to two units-is \$750, while the fee for a 2-inch meter-which can serve up to eight units—is only \$1,500.

Karn said part of the tap fees are earmarked for the utility reserve fund. The utility expansion charge-which is levied on all new buildings-goes into the same fund.

The utility expansion charge is \$200 for a single-family home, \$500 for a multifamily lot and \$300 for a commercial lot.

Coulston, charging that Karn was criticizing condominiums, said he was "tired of hearing us badmouth condos." He said multi-family housing is a boom

to the Ruidoso tax base, because many owners of condominiums do not live here permanently and create little demand on village services, but are taxed the same as permanent residents.

Coulston noted that he has the same tendency to criticize condos, but he said it is time to realize their benefit to the village.

Huckstep said the tap fee differences may be offset by the fact condo owners. who do not live in Ruidoso permanently are still charged a minimum of \$12.50 per month for water. But Karn reiterated the multi-family charges are not equitable, claiming that connecting eight units to a single 2-inch meter requires more cost in expanding utility lines, but that each unit is not charged accordingly. Coulston acknowledged Karn's argument, and suggested Huckstep look into drafting a meter tap fee that creates a higher charge for meters that are connected to several units.

dinance so it can be enforced.

The ordinance requires a permit from county road superintendent Guy Henley before any private party, company or corporation may begin work involving a county road. Title to all improvements made on the road must be transferred to the county upon completion of the work, and any cuts in or damage to the road must be repaired according to the road superintendent's specifications.

The ordinance also states that the road changes in the policy.

dinance in Chaves County was used as a model, Cox noted.

In drafting the ordinance, Cox said, she discussed the policy with and received input from elected county officials, department heads and employees, and also with county commissioners-elect.

Commissioners made several changes in the ordinance before approving it for adoption Friday. Commissioner-elect Bill Elliott also offered suggestions for

employee, except in cases of illegal activity or direct insubordination, which require immediate termination. Establishment of a grievance board is also addressed in the policy and was changed upon the suggestion of Elliott to be comprised of one elected official, one employee and three people not employed by the county. As the ordinance was originally written; the grievance board was comprised of elected officials only.

# Task groups to work on flood and evacuation plan

The first step foward developing a Flood Warning and Evacuation Plan for Lincoln County was taken Thursday in a workshop among state, federal and county representatives who will help formulate the plan.

The workshop was the first of four sessions during which the plan will be designed.

### gram, Closson said.

Closson said FEMA will match up to \$25,000 per year with the state to develop county emergency plans.

Closson said the state does not require counties to participate in civil preparedness, but CEPD does encourage participation. He said the state will help develop plans only after political subdivisions appoint emergency coordinators.

Ollie Cuddy, Ruidoso fire prevention officer, is the village emérgency preparedness coordinator.

Closson advised local representatives to evaluate the prototype plan for guidance, but he stressed it is crucial that the Lincoln County format be made with local resources in mind.

"The resources available exist locally," he said. "There is no magical group/that is going to rise out of the ground and help Ruidoso out of a flood."

Closson warned against "turf protection" in drawing up the plan, which he noted is sometimes a problem with government agencies. In emergencies, he said, all segments of the communi-

The procedure, according to the Colfax County plan, establishes a pre-emergency period during which mutual agreements are developed, inspection schedules are set, and reviews of the plan and training exercises are conducted to ensure the plan's effectiveness.

The prototype plan also calls for organizing an operations staff that will coordinate emergency procedures from an emergency operations center.

The staff would be headed by an executive group consisting of

The main purpose of Thursday's meeting was to review the prototype flood warning plan for the state-which was written in 1981 for the Eagle Nest Dam in Colfax County-and assign task groups to work on specific areas of the plan.

The intent of the plan is to provide warning and evacuation contingencies for the threat to the flood plain below Lake Mescalero-located up Carrizo Canyon at the Inn of the Mountain Gods resort.

But designers of the plan also will be able to include emergency procedures for other water retention facilities in the county, said Tom Closson, an official with the state Civil Emergency Preparedness Division (CEPD).

The other facilities to be part of the plan will be the proposed Grindstone Canyon reservoir, Bonito Lake, and Alto Lake.

The plan for Lake Mescalero is required by federal regulations on dam safety programs, Closson said after the meeting. He said the impetus for the plan came from Ernest Snyder, director of the dam safety program with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Albuquerque.

The state office of civil preparedness is directing the planning process under a matching grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The grant, provided through the Disaster Preparedness Improvement Program, is available from the federal agency to any state that participates in the pro-

The warning and evacuation plan will be the second in the state designed in cooperation with CEPD.

Asked if the Lincoln County Disaster Plan, developed in the 1960s, could be implemented as the flood plan, Closson said the former plan "goes hand in hand" with the flood emergency concept, but is outdated.

Closson also was asked if other disaster threats in the county, specifically from major forest fires, could be included in the Lake Mescalero plan. He said fires and other threats will not be considered in formulating the plan, but that communities participating in the project could later expand the plan procedures to include any threat.

At the start of the workshop, Closson referred to the plan as a "direction and control vehicle."

He said drafters of the document must decide who will be in control during an emergency. That person, he added, will have to locate emergency resources, personnel and equipment.

Evacuation routes will have to be designated, with strategic locations pinpointed where roadblocks will be positioned. Other elements of the planning process are evaluating the terrain and the inundation area below dams; devising a public information process; securing evacuated areas and selecting shelter sites; and establishing a monitoring and warning system for the facilities.

ty must cooperate.

Steve Makowski, fire management officer with the Smokey Bear District of Lincoln National Forest, said cooperation in the county is no problem. Makowski (who helped draft a fire evacuation plan for the county) and State Police representatives will work on warning procedures for the Lake Mescalero plan.

The threat analysis portion of the plan will be drafted by Bureau of Indian Affairs representatives from the Mescalero Agency; and the communications work group will be headed by Ruidoso police lieutenant Jim Alston. Local news media representatives will work on the public information setup.

The subgroups are to submit rough drafts of the preliminary work on the Lincoln County plan at the next workshop, scheduled for December 16 at the village main fire station.

Closson suggested that Lincoln County and communities in the county pass laws giving local governments liability protection and assuring insurance coverage for emergencies.

He also noted that federal assistance for disaster relief will be limited to disasters that cause extensive damage to public properties. The state would provide up to \$500,000 for disaster relief. he added.

Closson said the most important part of the plan will be a joint statement by the participating bodies on the conduct of operations during a flood.

governing body representatives, a civil preparedness coordinator, a public information officer, and an attorney to give legal opinions.

The command center would also be manned by an operations group, and by sections for law and order, fire and rescue, search and rescue, public works, health and medical, communications and other support groups.

During an actual warning period, the emergency operations staff would rely on information from different sources concerning a developing threat. Closson said the National Weather Service transmits weather information continuously throughout the country, and the reports can be heard on a special weather radio.

Noting that the main flood threat in the county is from weather-related flash floods rather than dam failures, Closson advised that the weather service warning system would be one of the best sources for early warnings.

He also said emergency personnel should pool mobile radio units in the event of a disaster to ensure a communications network in case commercial telephones are cut off.

Locating the sources of the mobile units, and the availability of local resources and emergency equipment, are top items in the pre-planning stage.

# Ron Annala named Olympic Ski Team physician

Dr. Ron Annala of Ruidoso has been chosen the physician for the United States Olympic Ski Team for three weeks of Europa Cup competition in Europe.

Annala will leave for Europe with the team soon after the first of the year and be with them for slalom races in Berchtesgaden, Germany, and Valois, France, and downhill races in Santa Katarina, Italy.

Top racers from many nations compete in the races throughout the winter. The Europa Cup is a small step below the World Cup Races and considered a sort of building block tour, said Ray Heid, a former racer. The competition is still extremely intense and the top racers compete in the Europa Cup when there is not a World Cup Race conflicting, he noted.

Annala will be in Europe three weeks to a month. He said doctors Roger Beechie and Bill Harrison will take over his obstetric duties and "all the rest of the guys will pitch in" to handle his other patients during his absence.

In Europe, he will travel with the team and "just take care of the athletes," Annala said. He anticipates that care of the athletes will mean anything from upper respiratory ailments to strains and sprains incurred while skiing.

The skiers will present unique problems,

he believes, because of the high-strung emotional nature caused by intense competition.

"Their emotion swings are much more extreme, higher and lower," he said. "They're like thoroughbred horses,"

If an athlete is seriously injured, however. Annala will not be able to treat the skier. He is not licensed in Europe and cannot practice medicine in a hospital. He said that he would act as a sort of guardian and make sure the athletes receive proper treatment if they are injured seriously.

Annala was informed of his selection as physician for the Olympic team Wednesday by Dr. Morton Leonard, an orthopedist in El Paso, Texas, Leonard is a longtime skiing friend of Annala's and was the physician for the Olympic team during part of last year's Europa Cup.

The local physician is excited about the job.

"I still haven't come down," Annala said Thursday,

Although this is Annala's first experience as a ski team physician, he hopes to continue to be involved in sports in the future.

"Sports medicine is a big field that is coming on more and more and I want to be a part of it," Annala said. In addition to the big future the field holds, he believes that working with the athletes is good for him.

"It keeps me young," said the 49-yearold doctor.

Last year, when Annala expressed an interest in being the physician for the Olympic team, Leonard wrote a letter of recommendation to the selection committee.

Annala applied for the highly sought after position in June and communicated with Jim Moralt, father of local racer Ted Moralt, Jim Moralt is the chief procurer of services and supplies for the Olympic team.

Annala feels that he is very qualified for the team doctor position.

"I would probably be the most logical doctor (for the position)," said Annala. He believes that his experience in general medicine and skilng injuries, and an avid interest in skiing and physical fitness in general qualify him to be the physician for the ski team.

Annala has practiced family medicine and surgery in Ruidoso for more than 20 years. In addition to treating the common cold and delivering babies, he has treated innumerable ski injuries over the years.

He enjoys a wide variety of sports himself, among which skiing is almost a passion. He is a serious jogger, and lifts weights for muscle tone and stretching.

He enjoys freefall sky diving, which he did almost every Sunday this fall in Albuquerque. Hackey sack (juggling a small beanbag in the air with the feet) is a sport he does to improve his reflexes.

his three children: Gretchen, 24, Eric, 22, smile and added, "Yeaaaa!"

Annala will not be paid for his services while in Europe and has to purchase his own airline ticket to Europe. His expenses will be taken care of once he is with the team, he said. His wife Catherine will be traveling with him.

The doctor is very excited about the trip. He looks forward to skiing at European resorts in the Alps and getting an opportunity to ski with some of the best skiers in the world.

Annala said he is already trying to get maps of some of the European ski resorts so he can pore over them in anticipation of skiing the areas.

He also believes skiing with some of the best skiers in the world may improve his own skiing tremendously.

"When you follow the best skiers, good things will happen," he said.

Annala hopes the position as doctor for the Olympic Ski Team during the Europa Cup will lead to more appointments-possibly even the 1984 Winter Olympics in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia,

"That's what I'm ultimately shooting for," he said.

Whether or not this trip leads to others, he plans to make this one enjoyable.

# Andy Trujillo points to medical career

Andy Trujillo wants to grow up to be a doctor. Andy is different than most kids who want to be doctors, however. Andy, at age 14, has already taken courses and passed all the tests required for an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT).

"I just really like to help people," said Andy. A slender boy, quick to laugh, he wears a hat with Lincoln County EMT printed on it and an orange T-shirt that reads "Emergency Medical Tike."

This past summer, Andy, along with 20 others, took an intensive 81-hour course that taught him the skills he needs to man an ambulance and be a first responder at a medical emergency. If necessary, he can stop bleeding, splint broken bones, or even give car diopulmonary resuscitation. Andy passed all the tests in the course, but because of state insurance regulations, he will not be certified as an EMT until he is 18. He helps Nancy Guck, a certified physician's assistant (and an EMT herself), at the Capitan Clinic and at athletic contests at Capitan High School. But he is not allowed to ride in an ambulance with other EMTs on emergency calls. In spite of the state's reluctance to give him the full responsibility for saving people's lives, people with whom he has worked and whom he has treated are very confident in his abilities and composure. "I am perfectly comfortable with Andy," said Guck, Although he plays saxophone in the school band, whenever there is an injury on the field; Andy puts down his musical instrument and rushes to help Guck and other EMTs with the injured athlete. In fact, his music teacher, Churchill Cooke, came to Andy one day when he cut himself with a chainsaw. Andy bandaged the finger and diagnosed a need for stltches which Cooke later received at the Capitan Clinic.

When asked if he would trust 14-year-old Andy to attend to more serious wounds, Cooke said "Believe me, I would."

Andy said he got interested in medicine when his father, Salomon Trujillo, was suffering from chest pains and Andy was worried about his health.

Andy began asking Guck medical questions when she was attending athletic contests as an EMT. Guck said she was pleased by his interest but that many kids ask questions and then drift off. Andy, however, remained interested.

When the Capitan Clinic opened at the first of the year, Andy began hanging around there, asking more questions and helping Guck where he could.

Although he cannot ride in the ambulance this year, he plans to try again for certification next year when he is a ripe old 15.

He did ride in an ambulance once this summer. During the New Mexico Junior Rodeo there were 14 injuries in two days. Andy was out there helping with the rest of the EMTs, and when a friend, Patrick Means, was injured. Means asked that Andy be allowed to ride with him.

Andy also participates in activities more common for kids his age. Besides playing saxophone in the band, he plays on the junior varsity basketball team. He also reads a lot, he said. However, it is not Hardy Boys and Tom Swift, but medical journals and EMT manuals. His most recent reading, he said, has been on

different types of athletic injuries. During the fall Andy spent most of his afternoons after school at the clinic. His basketball practices have recently cut into the time he spends there, but he still goes to the clinic evenings if Guck is working late, and often goes in on weekends. He acts as a medical aide to Guck and helps sometimes with the lab work.

He took a course in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) this summer, then started the EMT course two weeks after that.

At first he was allowed to attend the class just as an observer. But he showed so much interest that the teacher allowed him to participate in training exercises.

Mary Woodard, a fellow student, said that Andy was accepted just like any of the older students. In fact, many of them asked Andy's advice when they were studying CPR because he was so good at it.

He did receive some special treatment because he was the smallest in the class, said Woodard. The rest of the students often ganged up on Andy and made him be the dummy for their bandaging and treatment exer-cises because he was too little to object.

. Andy said the terminology in the course gave him some trouble but he still passed all the tests. Guck wrote a letter to the Lincoln County commissioners trying to convince them to overlook the age requirements and allow Andy to be certified, but it could not be done.

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"A lot of the time he just askes me questions. He really keeps me on my toes," said Guck.

Anyone who knows medicine is subject to his questions. Andy gives credit to many people for helping him learn as much as he has. He mentioned EMTs Woodard and Mike Points; Guck; doctors Roger Beechie, Paul Whitwam and Lance Kirkegaard; and his aunt and uncle, Tommy and Martha Guevara.

Andy said his parents are happy with his interest in medicine.

"They like it. They're glad i'm interested," Andy said.

But Andy said in truth he really doesn't like medicine.

"I don't like it. I love it!" he exclaimed.

The sick leave policy for county employees drew the most discussion from commissioners, who finally agreed upon permitting an accrual of 100 days of sick leave per employee. A recently adopted policy to permit employees to take sick leave to care for ill family members was rescinded, however.

Also covered in the personnel policy ordinance is the issuance of pay raises, with commissioners deciding to permit cost-ofliving but no merit raises. Commission chairman Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight argued that all department heads would request merit raises for their employees if one department head did, so no merit pay raises will be considered.

The largest part of Friday's meeting was taken up with presentations from computer firm representatives after bids on data processing equipment were opened. The bid was awarded to two companies-IBM of Roswell for a System 34 computer at a total bid of \$74,159, and Triadic Enterprises of Deming for com-

puter software for a bid of \$44,000. Cox and other elected officials who studied the bids recommended the two firms on the basis of their offers of training; good references; experience with county governments; successful records of conversion from one computer system

The year 1982 in men's professional tennis has been a year for heroes. And the year wound toward a close with a heroic performance from the guy who had to take a back seat for most of '82-John McEnroe.

Mac led the United States to a 4-1 triumph in the Davis Cup final against France at Grenoble the weekend before last. His come-from-two-sets-to-onebehind win over Yannick Noah in the opening singles match actually determined the outcome of the entire tie.

I personally sensed an upset in the making when the American team went to France. The host country constructed a special indoor clay court at Grenoble so her players would be on their favorite surface.

Noah, one of tennis's emergent heroes, proved this year he can play with the best. The 22-year-old from Cameroon beat Ivan Lendl for the deciding point in France's 3-2 win over Czechoslovakia in the Davis Cup quarter-finals.

When the Frenchman stormed back against McEnroe to win sets two and three decisively after dropping a close first set, things looked grim for the Yanks. But Davis Cup rules allow a 15-minute break after three sets in singles, and this was Noah's downfall as he lost his momentum and the match.

If Noah had been able to beat McEnroe and give the French a 1-0 lead, anything might have happened in the number two singles. Davis Cup history is replete with unheralded players rising to the occasion when playing for their country.

As it was, young Henri Leconte was on the losing end of two 6-2 sets to Gene Mayer before he knew it, and the American eventually won in four sets.

by then. McEnroe and Peter Fleming are Grenoble.

one of the world's top two or three doubles teams and are undefeated in Davis Cup doubles play. Their Cup-clinching straight set win over Noah and Leconte was routine.

Now I'm not a big fan of John McEnroe. I have long marveled at his racquet control while lamenting his lack of behavior control.

But his willingness to play for his country in Davis Cup-and his knack for winning the big matches when he does-are admirable. This is especially true in light of the refusal of other top players (notably Jimmy Connors for the U.S.) to play Davis Cup.

Led by McEnroe, the United States has won the Cup four of the past five years, after breaking a five-year drought in '78. The Davis Cup carries a great deal of prestige in the tennis world-more so in other countries, unfortunately, than here at home.

The year 1983 should be very interesting in men's tennis. There is the question of whether McEnroe can reassert himself after losing the number one ranking to Connors and being dominated all year long by Lendl.

There is the question of whether Bjorn Borg, who is playing tournaments again, can again ascend to the top of the sport.

Tennis fans will also be wondering: •Will Lendl finally win a major title? Will Noah?

•Will Sweden's Mats Wilander follow up on his French Open triumph of this year by moving into the world's top five?

•Will Connors successfully defend his Wimbledon and U.S. Open titles?

But the answers to those questions won't be known for many months.

# Dam design work ahead of schedule

Design work on the Grindstone Canyon dam is four weeks ahead of schedule, while preliminary work on the water line to the

preliminary work on the water line to the dam and on the treatment plant is running behind schedule, according to a report from Boyle Engineering for November. The full report from R. Leroy Givens, principal engineer on the project, follows. The progress for the first month of the project has been delayed due to the resolu-tion of the Bond sales. However, we have proceeded with the soils investigation and the aerial mapping. Aerial mapping is 95, percent complete. An alignment change in, the raw water line has required us to develop new aerial photography for that section of the water line going into the pro-posed Dorman Development and on into the dam. This is expected to be ac-complished within the next week. The drilling has been completed for the Grindstone Canyon Dam. Preliminary results have indicated that there may not be sufficient material to construct a totally

be sufficient material to construct a totally earth-filled dam without importing substantial borrow material to complete the dam. The drill logs also indicate the area beneath the proposed lake may be quite pervious and the rate of seepage could be excessive. This will be confirmed later in more detailed testing. The in-vestigation has also indicated that there are several pits that have sufficient material for roller compacted concrete. Samples have been obtained from these pits and subjected to several tests in-cluding cement reactivity which showed negative.

Currently we are in the process of locating all existing utilities within the route of the proposed raw water line and developing profiles for that water line. The developing promes for that water line. The design reports are in progress with con-siderable detail being developed as to the flows in the Rio Ruidoso and percentage flows available to divert into Grindstone Canyon. We feel that this detail is required to make a presentation to the State Engineer for the possibility of additional diversion into the Grindstone Canyon to

At this point in time it is estimated that we are approximately four weeks behind schedule on the Raw Water Transmission line design and treatment plant. The design for the Grindstone Canyon Dam is proceeding and we are approximately four weeks ahead of schedule on this project. It is anticipated that by mid-January we



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

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

SANTA FE-Here's one reason New Mexico Republicans lose: money.

Those who picture the GOP as a lot of mink-coated figures writing an endless series of checks to support their party must be thinking of Republicans in some other state.

All you have to do is consult the figures the parties file with the office of the Secretary of State to see that isn't so here.

As a matter of fact, during this election year, while the Democrats were raising \$121,687.78 for their party, the Republicans did a measly \$37,157.95 for the same purpose.

Everyone understands, of course, that there are more Democrats than Republicans in New Mexico, but there aren't three times as many.

The biggest contribution to be found on those Republican reports so far filed came from Tom Bolack. He gave \$3,500. Robert O. Anderson, hardly a pauper,

gave \$,1000.

Yet on the Democratic side, one single family, that of Fred Hansen, now president of Southern, Union, gave \$10,000 (One entry, for \$4,000 apiece from Hansen and his wife, shows them as residents of Hobbs; a second entry for an additional \$1,000 apiece, shows them as residents of Dallas—but wherever they now live, they do send in their money.)

Now admittedly, people like Bolack and Anderson were probably also kicking in for specific candidates as well as for the party itself; but so were lots of Democrats who

Frank Papen and Walter Gerrells, each of whom gave the Demos \$1,000.

When the state chairman of the Republican party is down for a measly \$50 contribution, and then a few days later gets reimbursement of \$463.73 in expenses, you've got to think his party's fund-raising activities are not operating at a fever pitch.

Maybe Republicans just don't ask anybody for money.

What they describe in their report as a "mass collection" at their state convention only yielded \$380.73-which is not very massive.

Even Harvey Yates, an oilman you might think would want to get in good with Secretary Watt, is down for a mere \$500 contribution.

(The Republicans do spell better than the Democrats, who, all the way through their series of reports, seem to believe the man they had running for State Treasurer was named Earl Heartley.)

We could go on to embarrass the Republicans further by citing the miserly sums some of the party's more outstan-ding members actually kicked in, but it would serve little good to do so.

It is a temptation, however, to spread on the public record how little they pay their executive director—if only in the hope they would then give her a raise to something like what she really deserves.

And there's one final note which galls those who know something of New Mexico politics. The Republican Legislative Campaign Committee gave \$500 apiece to each of a series of legislative candidates, like Tandy Hunt in Roswell. The town of Los Alamos will vote January 11 on a strict smoking ordinance.

We hope the ordinance passes, and that it sets a trend which other municipalities in the state will follow.

The law would ban smoking in a number of public places, including retail food and drug stores, libraries, schools, hospitals and other health-care centers. It would also require restaurants to provide non-smoking areas.

The tobacco industry has argued that smoke from another person's cigarette, cigar or pipe has not been proven harmful. Of course, that industry does not even acknowledge that smoking harms the person doing it.

Questions of health aside, non-smokers have a moral right to eat a meal at a restaurant without someone ruining it by lighting up at the next table. This right should be recognized by law everywhere.

And, in Ruidoso, citizens should be able to attend a meeting of their governing body and sit close enough to see and hear what is going on without coming out of the meeting with their clothes reeking of smoke.

Progressive-minded business owners and village officials could accommodate non-smokers without being required to by law. If they fail to do so, there is no reason that a citizens group cannot bring about a smoking ordinance here, as has happened in Los Alamos.--TP

### **TEXAS NEEDS WATER LAWS**

Participants in the recent 1982 Water for Texas Conference agreed to one major item — an item that should be obvious: Texas has no water laws and needs them desperately.


Because there are no laws, farmers, ranchers and other landowners draw as much ground water as they wish. Whoever has the biggest pump gets the most water. Thoughtless individuals may take more than they need, depriving their neighbor. And because the few surface water

regulations are rarely enforced, Texans often pump from lakes and rivers at will.

But our recklessness is catching up with us. El Paso, particularly, anticipates water shortages in the not-so-distant future, unless something is done.

Lexas legislators could learn about water law from New Mexico, which has some of the best water regulations in the country. Yet, despite the obvious need, many Texas legislators avoid the issue for fear of offending the farmers and ranchers such laws would affect. Politics, as usual. El Paso's state Sen. Tati Santiesteban is a man in a position to do something worthwhile on water laws. Since he has seniority - he has been in the Senate since 1972 — he now has a top job as chairman of 1972 — ne now has a top job as chairman of the state's Natural Resources Committee, which is concerned with water and energy. We hope in the forthcoming 68th Legislature that Santiesteban will speak out for his El Paso constituency and help write some viable water law — before our state's most valuable resource dribbles away. - El Paso Times

several times within the past week when I' got into my car and drove to work.

The day after Thanksgiving, I left for the News office around 7:30 a.m. and suddenly skidded on Mechem Drive. I skidded at about a 50-degree angle and came fairly close to being hit by another car driving on Mechem toward Sudderth.

After I had regained control of my car, I skidded again going down Sudderth. It was then that I decided to get snow tires, something I probably should have done about a week before.

I bought the snow tires and it cost me \$132.1

But that wasn't the end of my troubles! Last Thursday morning I tried to drive up the hill near my apartment. I thought I had warmed the car up enough but I guess it takes a little bit longer than a minute or so to get the engine sufficiently warm in a cold climate.

I couldn't make it up the hill, so I put the car in reverse and backed down. However, my rear view mirror was covered with ice and I couldn't see where I was going. I backed off the road and got stuck in a ditch that was covered with snow.

I couldn't back up and I couldn't go for-ward. Since it was Thursday, we were put-ting a paper out and I had to get to work soon. I let out a loud roar of frustration and wondered how I would be able to escape this trap I had gotten myself into.

Fortunately a man stopped and used a chain on his car to pull me out. It wasn't before I almost ran over a

and saw the ground covered with snow. "Outa sight!" I thought to myself. I'd c ly been in the snow four times in my l

before this and 1 thought the sight w beautiful.

I soon found out that the white stuff awfully tough to drive in, especially if yo car is not properly equipped.

It's particularly hard when you're dr ing down Sudderth in the morning after snow-filled night. The sun is directly your eyes and the front windows are st covered with ice and some snow. I expe some morning I'll be the first customer a store on Sudderth when I blindly dri my car off the road and through the sto entrance.

I've only used chains once in my li that being about nine years ago when went with my cousin and a couple friends to the Lake Tahoe area in Califo nia.

I didn't drive the car up there. If I have probably wouldn't have made it the alive. My cousin drove and he had pler of experience in the snow. He had lived Michigan when he was a boy and h always driven in the stuff.

I remember trying to put the chains one tire and constantly fumbling arou because my hands were too cold to hand anything.

We finally got the chains on and made to our destination, where I spent a go deal of time freezing, trying to ski, a taking warm showers.

I hope I won't have to use chains he soon. I'd probably put them on wrong a drive off Ski Run Road into the emp freezing air.

I'm looking forward to Christmas he because we'll probably have snow and I never had a White Christmas before.

When I lived in the San Francisco E Area, we usually celebrated Christn under sunny or cloudy skies and temperature of about 50 degrees. But there's little chance we'll have temperature of 50 degrees in Ruidoso ( Christmas. We'll probably have plenty beautiful white stuff on the ground, I'm just hoping I can drive my car y Christmas.
