## ISSUE HAS MANY SIDES

# Tribe seeks SBSR expansion

The United States Forest Service is adamantly opposed to a transfer from Lincoln National Forest of the 3.5 square miles which contain Sierra Blanca Ski Resort (SBSR) and its proposed expansion area.

One of the agency's primary concerns is that other uses of the forest besides skiing will be affected if the land passes from Forest Service to Mescalero Apache Tribe (MAT) control.

"That's not just another piece of land," said District Ranger Paul Gordon. "This statement is backed up in the 1978 environmental analysis report, EAR, which the MAT had prepared."

"The Sacramento Mountains, and Sierra Blanca in particular, represent an island of subalpine forest and meadow habitat disjointed from the nearest similar habitat by some 120 miles," the report states. "It notes that the area is the southernmost extension of such habitat in North America."

This biological uniqueness prompted two scientists to propose in 1968 that a "Research Natural Area" be established near the ski area. This is a Forest Service designation for areas where natural ecosystems can be preserved in their original state for research.

The area contains two particular types of vegetation which the Forest Service would like to see protected. These are the Monarch Gorkbark Fir tree, one of the five largest known specimens in the world, and the Thuja tree, a native type of which there are few remaining areas in the West.

Approximately 900 acres were proposed for inclusion into the Research Natural Area, including about three-fourths of the area proposed for SBSR expansion. The EAR notes that expansion of ski area facilities, and the land transfer, would preclude use of this area for research.

The Forest Service has worked out a compromise, however, which allows expansion of the ski area and establishment of a 600-acre Research Natural Area. According to Gordon, just one low-profile trail and trail area would be affected, and the project could be accommodated in the future.

Recreation is another land use of the Forest Service which would be affected by a land transfer. The agency has noted that the area is popular for people taking backpacking and hunting.

A Bureau of Indian Affairs environmental impact statement on the expansion and transfer states that the open space and recreation resource of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area will continue to be available to the public. A Forest Service employee reviewing the document ex-

pressed his agency's concern by penciling in "for a fee" at the end of the sentence.

Another disadvantage to the SBSR lands becoming part of the Mescalero Reservation, from the point of view of the Forest Service, is loss of income to the United States and the State of New Mexico. The former receives 2.26 percent of SBSR's gross sales as an occupancy fee, \$4.50 for fiscal 1979-80, while the latter collects the state gross receipts tax, \$114,117 for 1979-80.

Though steadfastly opposed to a land transfer, Gordon stresses that his view on SBSR expansion is an entirely different matter. "As factors in favor of expansion, he cited the lack of other areas in the Southwest with skiing potential and the favorable location of SBSR to the southern New Mexico and Texas ski market."

Gordon and Snow Ranger Randy Herzberg concur on another factor, that skiing provides more people a forest recreational experience with minimal impact on the environment than any other form of recreation.

The socio-economic environment of the state of New Mexico would definitely be impacted by expansion of SBSR. This would begin in the construction phase, and continue through the operation phase, which would be the most significant. The construction force would be a major source of employment and consumption.

Some of the goals of the EAR calls for a "total" expansion of SBSR, which would include the construction of a new lift, a new lodge, and a new parking area, and an increase in the number of lifts and skiers.

The current population of the ski area is about 20,000 people, and the current lift capacity is about 100 skiers per hour. The current lift capacity is about 100 skiers per hour.

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"We would lead the parade to accolades of praise for expansion," said Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth. He added that "it couldn't happen too soon."

Jungbluth noted that anything which brings more tourist dollars into Ruidoso causes a "ripple effect," meaning that all local businesses benefit directly or indirectly. He also pointed out that SBSR expansion could influence major food and lodging chains to consider locating here.

"We are totally supportive of it," behind it 100 percent," Jungbluth said.

Ruidoso Lodgers Association president Clark Carpenter was equally enthusiastic. "I'm so excited about it, if somebody would tell me where I could grab a spade and go to work," he said. "I would."

Carpenter pointed out that motel operators are often the first contact for persons wishing to ski Sierra Blanca. Carpenters want to know first about the availability of lodging and second about the skiing, he said.

"We don't like to paint the picture that it's too crowded," said Carpenter, but such has been the case at times.

The thought of more visitors during the week is especially attractive to Carpenter. He noted that his lodge, the Dan Dee Cabins, is generally full on weekends but tends toward empty Sunday through Thursday.

Carpenter feels that a more aggressive approach to promotion on the part of SBSR and local businesses linked to skiing is necessary.

"I think we've got to come forth with a good mid-week ski package," he said. He noted that previous attempts to put together such packages, which can include lodging, food, lift tickets and equipment rental, have failed in Ruidoso.

But Carpenter added, local businesses should realize that their competition is not just other towns like Taos and Red River where skiing is promoted more actively.

He also stressed the importance of a regional airport to Ruidoso's development as a ski resort town. There is an imaginary line in Texas from Fort Worth to San Angelo to Del Rio, said Carpenter, from the other side of which is too much driving time to Ruidoso for a short skiing trip.

According to him, skiers from the farther markets, like San Antonio and Beaumont, Texas, and Shreveport, Louisiana, are skiing in Colorado because they can reach it there.

At a spot for Ruidoso, Carpenter said, "It's the key to the future."

Another aspect of SBSR expansion is crowd control. It is generally agreed that Highway 128 is a less than ideal route to the ski area, and that expansion would compound problems.

The MAT's 1978 environmental analysis report includes a study of alternate routes, and recommends one that splits from 532 and crosses Reservation land to the ski area.

Other ideas which have been discussed are the use of buses or a narrow gauge railroad to transport skiers from the base of the mountain to SBSR.

The question remains whether the MAT will expand the ski area if it is again unsuccessful in having the land transferred from the National Forest.

Despite the Tribe's long standing contention that operating the ski area under a special use permit from the Forest Service is an obstacle to financing, a lending institution which specializes in loans to ski resorts expressed interest in SBSR.

Bruce Alexander, former vice-chairman of the First National Bank of Denver, said lending money to ski areas is "the kind of business big banks like if it's a good ski area, they seek after it."

Asked whether a special use permit is necessarily a hindrance to financing, he said, "No, because most ski areas are involved on National Forest lands."

The most important thing is the cash flow, the ability of the area to generate cash," said Alexander.

With visitations totaling 200,000 and 130,000 the past two seasons, and a current one-day lift ticket rate of \$18, SBSR would seem to be generating a considerable cash flow. The occupancy fee paid by the MAT for fiscal 1979-80 indicates gross sales of over \$3 million.

"We would be very, very interested in sitting down and talking - very much so," said Mike Wadhams of First of Denver when given the hypothetical situation of 20 year old ski area with a good record of profitability seeking financing for improvements.

Of the Forest Service, the loan officer said, "They're generally pretty decent folks to work with - they're interested in seeing these areas developed."

The MAT has never asked the Forest Service to help promote a loan for SBSR, according to Gordon.

"I think they can expand it without owning it, the land," said Gordon. "The Forest Service would do everything it could to help them get that loan."

There is one thing all parties close to the issue have in common, an expressed desire for Sierra Blanca Ski Resort to expand.

No one will be happier to see that happen than Roy Parker, who has been planning expansion of SBSR into the north face of the Bonito watershed for 13 years.

"It's lost to skiing," said Parker, "the southern part of the United States will lose some fantastic skiing."

## Ruidoso voter registration date set for March election

The Village of Ruidoso has issued a reminder that voters must be registered by 4 p.m., Tuesday, January 19 to be eligible to vote in the March 2 municipal election.

An issue in the March 2 election will be acquisition of the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company by the village, an \$8 million water system improvements bond issue, and election of two trustees and a mayor.

# 1981 was bustling year in Ruidoso

**January 1**—The village trustees, December 30, authorized issuing a call for bids to drill three test/exploratory wells, with the provision that the drilling begin within three weeks after awarding of the drilling contract.

Don Swalander and Richard C. Hall filed for the February 2 school board election, in which a two mill levy was also on the ballot.

**January 5**—Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital will continue to expand and improve services in 1981, according to administrator Ken Moore. Major equipment purchases include adding new radiology equipment, improving the physical therapy department and updating the critical care system.

The New Mexico Supreme Court allowed certification of Steve Sanders as 12th Judicial District Attorney, upsetting the bid of James J. Weldon to be declared the winner of the post in the general election. Weldon had challenged the official vote.

**January 8**—James J. Weldon filed suit January 5, contesting the general election results in which District Attorney Steve Sanders was declared the winner.

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort and the United States Forest Service are considering a proposal to drill a well on Lincoln National Forest land, to provide water for snowmaking purposes, according to Smokey Bear District ranger Paul Gordon.

**January 12**—Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., stated that he believed Ruidoso's water situation and Planning and Zoning Commission functions could be handled without any serious problems arising.

Building permits issued in Ruidoso during 1980 totaled \$16,966,702, based on an estimated cost of \$20 per square foot. The 1980 total compares to \$10,065,439 in 1979 and \$9,570,223 in 1978.

**January 15**—The village trustees proposed a million dollar general obligation bond issue to provide improvements in fire protection, sanitation, streets and law enforcement facilities.

In view of the February 3 two mill levy election for the school district, school board members were asking teachers and

administrators to determine areas of greatest need in the building proposal for new classrooms and a new high school.

**January 19**—A proposal to increase snowmaking capacity at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort (SBSR) unveiled January 14 by Forest Service and area officials, met with unanimous support around the village. Paul Gordon, district ranger for the Smokey Bear Ranger District, said the Mescalero Apache Tribe, lease holders for SBSR, wish to drill a well above the main lodge at the area to provide water to make snow.

The cultural committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is progressing with plans to obtain historical building status for Carrizo Lodge.

**January 22**—The Ruidoso Independent School District will hold an election February 3 to elect two board members and vote on a proposed two mill levy for the district. Bones Wright, incumbent board member, is opposed, in Position One, by Ron Harris and Richard C. Hall. Don Swalander is unopposed for Position Two.

The Chamber of Commerce announced that the annual election for Chamber directors would be held during February, with ballots to be mailed to all members.

**January 26**—Public hearings, designed to allow local citizens to view environmental impact studies and comment on the impact of proposed improvements to United States Highway 70 will be held in Ruidoso Tuesday and in Hondo on Wednesday.

Ruidoso Summer Festival officers announced that Phyllis Diller, Sheri Lewis and Pepe Romero, as well as the winner of the Van Cliburn International piano competition, will highlight the second annual Ruidoso Summer Festival, June 2-9.

**January 29**—The village trustees proposed a million dollar general obligation bond election March 24, coupled with a separate vote to authorize the village to offer Municipal Swimming Pool for lease to private enterprise.

No serious objections to widening Highway 70 through Ruidoso and Ruidoso

Downs and in the Hondo Valley were registered at public hearings held in Ruidoso Tuesday and in Hondo Wednesday.

**February 2**—Skiing was reported as excellent on beginner and novice slopes at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

Renovation of the White Mountain school complex is slated, if voters approve the two mill levy on the Ruidoso School District ballot in the February 3 election.

**February 5**—Ruidoso School District patrons Tuesday, by a five to one margin, 555 to 103, approved a two mill levy for school improvements. The levy will be assessed for three years and will provide \$315,000 for this purpose. Bones Wright and Don Swalander were reelected as members of the school board.

Nominees for the second annual "Hn-zhu'ne Award," presented by the Chamber of Commerce to owners of buildings most improved during 1980 included, The Wild Snail, Sierra Professional Center, Hugh Hanagan's Office and Holiday Liquors.

**February 9**—The drilling of a new well, near the site of the present Hollywood Well, was scheduled to begin today.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission agreed February 5 to forestall action to acquire land on Fort Stanton Mesa, pending filing of politically appointed officials which would affect the group's effort.

**February 12**—Roy Parker, manager of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, was pretty happy when it started snowing at the resort over the weekend, but he was downright ecstatic Tuesday after the accumulated snowfall reached 19 inches.

The Ruidoso trustees February 10 set a public hearing on the proposed increase in water rates for 7 p.m., March 9 in the Ruidoso Public Library.

The Ruidoso Downs trustees February 9 authorized amending the existing ordinance governing taps into the village sewer system, now under construction, to permit early hookups by village residents.

**February 16**—Nineteen inches of new snow falling on Sierra Blanca the first weekend in February attracted, over the weekend, the droves of skiers that had been awaiting word that the skiing on the

mountain was excellent. By 9:30 a.m., Saturday the main parking lot was full and the overflow parking area was rapidly filling.

**February 19**—Drilling is continuing on an exploratory well near the site of the present Hollywood Well, in an attempt to ease water shortage problems in the eastern portion of Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Rotary Club, February 17, presented a check for \$1,500 to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital to purchase a device used in cardiopulmonary resuscitation training.

**February 23**—A powder keg situation, ready to ignite, exists on the Lincoln National Forest and in Ruidoso and Hondo Downs, Smokey Bear District Fire Management Officer Steve Makowski to The News February 20. A group of officials from Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Alamogordo are considering joining with other nearby communities in a collective effort to solve their individual and mutual water problems.

**February 26**—The Ruidoso trustees February 24 took no action on a request from the Town of Carrizozo to become a member of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

Faced with the threat of water shortages within the next decade, Ruidoso Downs trustees are taking a continuous approach to a request for water service for a planned residence and Christian fine arts camp to be located adjacent to the village limits.

**March 2**—Student council members at Ruidoso High School are joining with the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary, to sponsor a blood drive March 18 at the high school library.

The village trustees February 27, in a special meeting, cancelled the Joint Powers Agreement with Lincoln County on animal control, on request of Ruidoso's animal control officer Jack Shlabecki.

**March 5**—The Ruidoso trustees will hold a public hearing on proposed increases in current water and sewer rates March 9 at 7:30 p.m., in the Ruidoso Public Library.

Five Ruidoso High School band students, Jeanette Weems, Michael Hansen, Ted Hynes, Sharon Kirgan and Lara Ratliff,


have been accepted to participate in the 1981 New Mexico Lions (Club Band), to perform during the national Lions International convention in Phoenix, Arizona, June 15-19.

**March 12**—The Ruidoso trustees, March 10, by rejecting three final plats in the camelot development, served notice that developers will henceforth have to conform to all zoning and subdivision regulations prior to acceptance of final plats by the village.

Members of the Ruidoso Board of Education, March 10, voted to call for a \$2,250,000 bond election in the district May 12, to build a new high school.

**March 16**—More than a million dollars worth of allegedly illegal drugs was confiscated by Ruidoso Downs police early in the morning of March 13, in the largest drug confiscation in the village's history.

Fire prevention measures should be taken now to insure property against incurring major fire damage later this spring, according to Steve Makowski and Tom Guck, Fire Prevention Officers on Smokey Bear Ranger District.

**March 19**—White Oaks rancher Bud Crenshaw was found guilty of battery against Mr. LaHue Wetzel. Mrs. Wetzel was found guilty of assault against Crenshaw and Paul Wetzel was found guilty of injury to animals, in connection with incidents occurring in White Oaks in December.

The treasury at Ruidoso Honda Valley Hospital was bolstered by a check of \$10,000 from an anonymous heart patient, who made a "small donation" because Dr. Michael Stone saved his life, according to Ken Moore, hospital administrator.

**March 23**—Four bond propositions, and a proposal to grant the village authority to lease the Municipal Swimming Pool, appear on the March 24 special election ballot.

The new Hollywood Well produced a steady 701 gallons per minute during test pumping March 19 and 20.

**March 26**—Despite the vociferous objections of two citizens, Lincoln County commissioners March 24 increased a county subdivision road frontage tax from one to ten cents per foot of frontage, in an effort to provide more funds for subdivision road maintenance.

Ruidoso voters March 24 approved a \$1.67 million bond issue for improvement in the village, and also authorized the village trustees to lease the Municipal Swimming Pool to private enterprise.

**April 2**—The Ruidoso trustees, March 31, voted to hold a special meeting next week to consider action on the final plats of Lakeview Estates and Vista del Lago in the Camelot development and to approve the

appointment of Lee Backstep as village attorney.

An increase in the number of subdivisions plats reads the list of proposed changes in county subdivision regulations to be acted at the April 14 meeting of the Lincoln County Commissioners.

Fifty-six Ruidoso High School Distributive Education Clubs of America students left today to participate in the two-day New Mexico Career Development Conference in Carlsbad.

**April 6**—Donald Ray Bishop, 28, Ruidoso, was bound over to District Court April 7 on all charges brought against him in connection with the March 18, 1981, shooting of a Ruidoso Downs police officer.

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**April 13**—The Ruidoso trustees, April 11, approved a \$2,250,000 bond issue for a new high school, to be built on the site of the old high school, located on State Road 532, known locally as Ski Run Road, with construction to begin in August.

**April 23**—The Ruidoso trustees, April 22, in a special meeting, including an executive session, approved leasing the Municipal Swimming Pool to Ralph Bush, relative to the May 12 \$2,250,000 bond issue to build a new high school.

Ruidoso School Superintendent Pat Yamamoto said the future of the school is in "critical limbo" because of the bond issue.


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
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
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# Around Sports

with Gary Brown



Well, it's the start of a new year but the past year has been a very eventful one for sports in Ruidoso.

A lot of exciting things happened on the sports scene, many of them before I came here in late June.

Perhaps the top news on the high school sports front came in March when the Ruidoso High School boys' basketball team took fourth in the state AAA tournament in Albuquerque. The Warriors had won the district title fairly easily before meeting some tough competition in the state tournament.

The skiing season was somewhat of a disappointment with Washington's Birthday being the top weekend of the year for that sport. If we don't get more snow soon we may face a repeat or worse of last year's mediocre ski season.

Spring brought the horse racing fans and other warm weather tourists.

While thousands of people flocked to the race track, Kevin Savage brought honor to Ruidoso High School with a second place finish in the state AAA golf tournament. The Warriors also did well in track, with the boys' 400 meter relay team taking fourth in the state meet and Ruta Bob taking fifth in the girls' 880 yard run.

Spring also saw the advent of the Las Piedras Boxing Team, coached by Lucky Mulqueen and Steve Ziolknick. Two LPBT athletes, Kevin Jefferson and David Ordorica, placed in Junior Olympics competition.

Action was also hot on the golf links, especially during the summer.

The Cree Meadows Invitational, the biggest golf tournament in these parts, was won by Mark Jarrett, a 22-year-old from Texas. Jarrett defeated Angus Baker, another Texan, in sudden death on the 19th hole.

The tournament was marred a bit by several thunderstorms which interrupted play a couple of times. Otherwise the tournament proved to be one of the finest in the southwest during 1981.

There were several other top golf tournaments in the area last year, including the sixth annual Kachina Doll Tournament at Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club, the

first sports event I covered here.

There was also some fine tennis played at the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club which hosted several tournaments during the year. Hopefully, Mike Crocker, who is tennis director of the club and active in a lot of other sports, can get a tennis program going at Ruidoso High School in the spring.

Fall brought high school football, of course. Ruidoso High School had its finest team in at least nine seasons and the Warriors just missed out on the district 3-AAA championship when they lost to Silver City 21-14 in the last two minutes of the contest.

What made Ruidoso's loss even more heartbreaking was Silver City's narrow defeat in the state AAA championship game against Portales. With a little bit of luck Ruidoso could have been state champion in football.

The Warriors ended up seventh in the state AAA poll but shouldn't have been ranked any lower than fourth or fifth and a good case could have been made for them being rated as high as third.

Ruidoso High School's girls' volleyball team had a losing but hard luck season. The Warriors could easily have had a winning campaign if a few of the breaks that went against them had bounced their way.

Capitan High School's football team again had a successful campaign, garnering an 8-2 record and making the semi-finals of the division playoffs. The Tigers lost a heartbreaking 7-6 decision to Texico in the semi-finals.

But probably the area's biggest sporting event was something I've saved for last. Special Effort's triple crown victory at Ruidoso Downs.

This horse's brilliant performance added even more luster to Ruidoso Downs' reputation. With the All-American Futurity the world's richest quarter horse race with a total purse of \$1,520,000 and certain to get higher, Ruidoso Downs' stock in the horse racing world is bound to accelerate upwards.

As is Ruidoso's stock in the sporting world of New Mexico. Happy New Year!

# Warriors play Goddard, Silver City

Ruidoso High School's basketball team will warm up for the district 3-AAA race and its title defense with a tough road game at Goddard of Roswell Tuesday night.

Goddard was tough on the Warriors the first time the teams met almost a month ago in Ruidoso. The Rockets stopped the Warriors 79-56.

Ruidoso, 1-5 on the season so far, returns two starters from last year's district championship team, center Bill Richardson and guard Scott Neal.

Richardson has been the Warriors' leading scorer for this season, tallying 103 points for a 17.2 points a game average. The 6-3 pivot has also been the Warriors' leading rebounder.

Neal has been a steady scorer, hitting double figures four times. He and Wade Wilson have been consistent at guard for Ruidoso, both being quick, agile playmakers and good scorers. Wilson

came on strong towards Christmas vacation, scoring in double figures twice. Mark Delhotal, Steve Sluder and Bobby Knox have all improved steadily for the Warriors during the first month of play.

However, Ruidoso may be at a size disadvantage when it begins district play Saturday against visiting Silver City. The Colts have a 6-8 transfer from Albuquerque and several returning lettermen. However, Silver City has been inconsistent during the pre-district season and has not yet showed the talent most observers think it has.

Most of the other teams in the district should be improved this season.

Tularosa, which the Warriors defeated for the district championship last season, has several lettermen back including 6-4 Bob Cerney, who quarterbacked the Wildcats football team to the state playoffs.


Deming and Cobre also have experienced teams returning this year. Truth or Consequences is a mystery but should be competitive in district play.

There's a busy month ahead for the Ruidoso Junior Ski Racers.



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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—They're like snowbirds, those tourists who fly to a snowless Santa Fe to see the old year out and the new year in.

For the capital city's economy, they're a welcome shot in the arm. And they're followed shortly by another group of birds, older, tougher and more cynical. These are the members of the State Legislature, who will be in town about six weeks this year.

On January 9, they convene a special session, for the purposes of reapportioning the way in which we choose our Congressional delegation and the members of their own body.

Governor King has fond hopes that they will get that job done by January 19, the day they go into the regular annual session for 1982.

Not everyone understands that they don't have to do that.

They could take up to 30 days for the job. The governor, who calls the special session, has the right to say when it starts and what it can consider, but it's the Legislature which gets to say when it ends. The law says lawmakers can stay around for a full 30 days if they don't feel the job has been completed before that time.

But could they be in special session and regular session at the same time?

Lawyers tell us they certainly could—though it's a relief to report they could only get one day's per diem for each day that condition prevailed.

Even during regular sessions, we do things in a slightly fictional manner. The majority leader in either house, for example, rises to his feet and intones a ritual sentence which says something like "It now being 12:01 of the fifteenth legislative day, I ask unanimous consent that the record show . . . etc., etc."

All that has nothing to do with what time it really is or what day of the legislative session it is. It is just a way of doing what legislators call "rolling the clock."

So what's to prevent, not only rolling the clock, but rolling the session—from the special one to the regular one, and vice versa?

Apparently it's perfectly legal.

Part of the charm of the scheme, as some legislators will immediately note, is that it would allow lawmakers to hold hostage some of Bruce King's favorite bills, being considered in the regular session, till he agrees to sign their special-session bills reapportioning their own seats and terms.

That's the way the game is played: "You scratch my back and I'll scratch yours," and "Go along to get along."

It's axiomatic: There is no successful politician who is not in some part a successful schemer.

Does New Mexico have a Department of Commerce and Industry?

One couldn't help noticing that the press conference in the Governor's office to announce establishment of a new wood processing plant in Las Vegas included no members of that agency of government at all. It was as though they might not even have been aware that the new industry was coming to town.

Later, at a high level meeting to talk about construction of railroad lines to the coalfields in the northwest quadrant of the state, nobody from C & I was present either.

If anybody thought of inviting them, somebody else must have said, "Why bother?"

Knowing of your interest in matters affecting our troubled Social Security system, I wanted to take this opportunity to inform you of recent actions taken by the House of Representatives in this regard.

On December 16, 1981, the House approved the conference report on H.R. 4331, legislation to reinstate the minimum Social Security benefit. Under the provisions of this bill, the minimum benefit is restored for all those who were receiving payments before it was eliminated and for those who would have become ineligible under "pre-reconciliation" law before January 1, 1982. For those retiring after December 31, 1981, benefits will be paid according to the formula established under reconciliation, which provided that benefits will be based on the actual earnings of beneficiaries.

The legislation also contained provisions to allow borrowing between the three Social Security trust funds, but only through December 31, 1982. In addition, the conference report provides for stiffer penalties for misuse of Social Security cards, including making such activities felonies and establishing a \$3000 fine for knowingly altering or counterfeiting a Social Security card, or for buying, selling,

or possessing a counterfeit card.

The conference report also requires the Department of Health and Human Services to set up currently authorized demonstration projects in at least seven states to provide better health services for poor families through the Medicaid and Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) programs. The legislation requires HHS to report to Congress within 90 days on actions taken to prevent Social Security payments to deceased persons. Finally, the legislation agrees to waive certain provisions of the Privacy Act to allow states to provide the Social Security Administration with information necessary to prevent persons from receiving Social Security disability and student benefits while in prison.

I believe passage of this legislation represents a necessary first step in correcting some of the inequities in our Social Security system. In addition, the enactment of this legislation fulfills President Reagan's campaign promise that no current Social Security recipients will have their benefits reduced.

### editorial

Those persons who have been critical of the village trustees for not tackling and attempting to solve our water problem can relax now that the trustees have authorized two bond elections totaling \$12.7 million dollars to insure an adequate water supply for Ruidoso.

Bear in mind that the trustees spent the \$5 million in water bonds approved by the voters in October of 1974, for water improvements as it was known when the question was put to voters.

The initial phase of the proposed program to give Ruidoso adequate water is the \$5 million water bond election scheduled March 2, in connection with the election of a mayor and two trustees, and to authorize the village to purchase Ruidoso Natural Gas Company.

The trustees' plan, for solving our water problems will provide a 1,000 acre feet storage reservoir in Grindstone Canyon, a second water treatment plant similar to the one at Alto Crest, diversion, pipelines and pumping stations.

The \$5.9 million bond issue election, scheduled for 1985, will provide further improvements.

The trustees will possibly have a fight on their hands in acquiring additional water rights, but they have been advised they are available for a price. With the price possibly including the bond election that may be an obstacle, but still the only route to take.

The trustees have outlined a plan to provide Ruidoso with water for future growth -- now it will be up to the voters. — CD

#### Repeal Registration?

President Reagan is determined to give the all-volunteer military one last chance to prove itself. The pay and benefit increases the administration helped push through Congress, plus the President's personal efforts to boost the prestige and morale of those in uniform, may yet provide the armed forces enough quality volunteers to avoid imposition of a draft.

We respect the President's commitment to the all-volunteer concept, even if we entertain doubts about whether it can be sustained. What we don't understand is why the administration is now considering the repeal of Selective Service registration as well.

None of the facts that persuaded Congress and the Carter administration to impose registration in 1980 have changed. Registration continues to provide an essential base of information for Selective Service in the event of an emergency requiring rapid implementation of a draft.

Repealing registration now would only make it that much more difficult to respond in timely fashion to whatever military or political crises that might materialize in the future.

The administration's obvious reluctance to prosecute even a few of those who have defied the registration law is even more inexplicable than the thought of dropping registration altogether.

Selective Service figures suggest that fully 25 percent of the 18-year-old males who should have registered this year did not do so. Unless the Justice Department demonstrates a willingness to enforce the registration law, the percentage of those who simply ignore their obligation will no doubt rise.

What sort of signal does that send to those young men who obey the law and fulfill their responsibility? —News Bulletin, Belen

An American expedition to the Congo in search of Mokelembembe has returned without proof of the fabled creature's existence. True fanciers of mysterious monsters, whether in Loch Ness or Lake Champlain or a Congo swamp, will not be greatly disheartened.

# Local building permits top \$23 million in 1981

December's new construction valuation of nearly \$12 million brought the 1981 total for building permits issued in Ruidoso to a record \$23,117,785.

Valuation is based on a rate of \$20 per square foot. According to figures from planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp, 541 building permits were issued in 1981. This broke down to 352 single family dwellings, 68 residential additions or alterations, 27

commercial buildings, 16 commercial additions or alterations and 78 condominiums.

The 1981 total represents an increase of more than \$6 million over the 1980 total of \$16,966,702 reported by then enforcement officer Emory Hatcher. For 1979, (the total) was \$10,861,450.

Local builders are projecting another banner year in 1982, according to Tracey Burton of the Lincoln County Homebuilders Association. Burton said that Ruidoso has been leading the state in new construction for the past six months.

"We have a very bright outlook for the next year," said Burton. He also predicted that the construction business will become more competitive here, owing to the large number of subcontractors and general contractors who have moved into the Ruidoso area.

Of the 34 permits issued in December, 27 were for single family dwellings (SFDs), five were for residential alterations or additions, one was for a commercial building and one was for a condominium.

Valuation of new construction for December was \$1,116,520, showing a

seasonal drop from November's record total of \$3,505,726.

## P&Z tables rezoning for \$12 million Hilton Inn

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) tabled a rezoning request Monday on land for a proposed \$12 million Hilton Inn.

The 7.93 acre portion of the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club tracts is currently zoned R-2 (multi-family residential). Developer Jim O'Leary's request for a change in zoning to C-1 (commercial) was discussed at length before the commission decided to take it under advisement until next month's meeting.

O'Leary and attorney Charles Hawthorne described the proposed development, which would consist of 140 to 150 lodging units plus a convention center seating 350 to 400 persons. They stated that the motel rooms would be located in two-story buildings on the hill behind the Racquet Club.

Hawthorne pointed out that a rezoning would not change the existing land use pattern because the Racquet Club has been operating as a commercial enterprise for the past six years.

Plans call for the club to continue to operate as a private membership facility, according to Rick Bowers, a realtor associated with the project. Motel guests would also be able to use the club, he said.

"We have a commercial operation there—we're going to have to zone it commercial or tear it down," said commission chairman John Schuller. The minutes of the 1976 P&Z meeting at which the Racquet Club was approved make no reference to zoning, planning and zoning enforcement officer John Cupp said.

Hawthorne stated that a commercial zoning would not be in conflict with intended land use. "It is an asset to the community—it will raise property values in the area," he said.

Schuller expressed concern about traffic in the area, noting that White Mountain Middle School is nearby.

Hawthorne stated that traffic will be the same if condominiums are developed on the property. Commission member Alden Deyo pointed out, however, that the village density ordinance would allow fewer condos than the proposed number of motel rooms.

Member Tom Kelham said that the village has "tacitly approved" commercial use of the property by allowing the Racquet Club to operate. Deyo suggested that issuance of a conditional use permit might be the appropriate action of P&Z.

Barney Rue, owner of three lots adjoining the tract in question, spoke in opposition to the rezoning.

Rue said that he fought the original development of the property and the issuance of a liquor license to the club. He expressed concern over increased traffic near the school and predicted that property values in the area will drop if the Hilton

is built there. Ray Nunley, whose home adjoins the property, said that he did not want motel parking 50 feet from his house. "It looks like downtown Vail up there behind me now," he said.

"I'm all for a Hilton coming to town—I'm not sure whether this is the place for it," said Denny Loverin. His concerns, he noted, are "spot zoning" and convention traffic.

Cupp noted that of 18 letters sent to nearby property owners, receipt of 18 was acknowledged with no written negative comments on the development.

Nunley stated that he is "not 100 percent opposed" to the development. He suggested to O'Leary, Hawthorne and Bowers that they prepare a plan to "show how you can protect our interests."

In other action, the commission: —Approved a zoning of C-1 for a tract in Palmer Gateway for Charles Locke.

—Denied a request for a rezoning from R-2 to C-1 of Lot 24, Block 5, in Carter's Park. Ted Roberts said that he wanted to build a duplex with offices on the property. The commission felt that a commercial zoning was not in the best interest of the surrounding area, said Deyo.

—Approved an annexation petition for the Nelson Tract, located off Hull Road toward Gavilan Canyon.

—Approved a lot line variance request for Lots 4 and 5, Block 9, in Midway Townsite for Orrantia.

—Approved a replat of Lots 9 and 10, Block 7, in Cree Meadows for Beall and Biggerstaff.

—Approved a lot line variance on Lot 6, Block 5, in Town and Country North for James Temple.


### Ski Report

## School building date set

Construction of a new Ruidoso High School building is scheduled to begin in May.

"We hope to call for bids in February, open them in March and, hopefully, start construction in May," said Tom Hansen, Ruidoso High School principal and one of the committee members involved in the planning of the new school.

Planning of the project began more than a year ago when proponents of the idea began to search for funding sources. In August of 1981, the Ruidoso School District asked for somewhere around \$2 million from the state Capital Outlay Program,

however, they only received \$1,259,851 to be used in Phase I of the building project.

"We've asked for \$6.7 million over the next three years," Hansen said. He feels optimistic that the Ruidoso High School project will continue to be funded because "the Capital Outlay Committee always sees a project through to the end."

Monies received from the state through the Capital Outlay Program will not have to be paid back. This year, for the first time, schools were able to receive the requisitioned monies and invest it, which Ruidoso School District did, according to Hansen. The interest from the investments is for the school district to use in purchasing items the new school will need.

A bond issue passed in the school district in May of 1981, gives the district the oppor-

tunity of using two mills of the local property tax for school related projects.

The Capital Outlay Program monies will provide a little more than 75 percent of the money needed in construction of the school, while the residents of the school district will absorb a little less than 25 percent of the cost, according to Hansen.

"We're getting a neat school. It's a good deal for the village," Hansen said.

Without monies from the state, the building of the new high school would be impossible, according to Hansen. "We feel fortunate to have gotten so much money," Hansen said. He attributes part of the reason for the good response from the state to the fact that Ruidoso's presentation was well prepared.

Construction of the school is planned in a

three phase set-up. Phase I includes the building of the central core and science classroom facility. The central core is a two-story building to house administrative offices, a media center, a commons area and a cafeteria.

The double entry-way of the central core is all glass. The double door effect is an effort to avoid heat loss. The first floor is designed to accommodate the principal, two assistant principals, a nurse's office, two counselor's offices, two conference rooms, a public meeting room and a media center.

The public meeting room will be arranged so that individual groups may use it

## Chino seeks area 'cooperation' to promote tourism attractions

Tribal President Wendell Chino called for an attitude of cooperation between the village of Ruidoso and the Mescalero Apache Tribe in a Tuesday address to the Rotary Club.

Chino prefaced his remarks to the luncheon meeting by stating that it is time to think of mutual community interest between the village and the Tribe in broader terms.

He recalled earlier times, when Ruidoso used to "dry up like the creek" after the summer tourist season, and noted that horse racing and skiing now have a year-round economic impact.

"Chino stated that only 40 percent of summer visitors come for the races, however, and that he and the Tribe are interested in entertaining and accommodating the other 60 percent.

"You are, likewise, I'm sure," he said to his listeners. Chino said he has long felt that Highway 380 from San Antonio to Carlsbad should be improved to make the Ruidoso area more accessible from Albuquerque.

He noted that California has been very successful with in-state tourism, owing to its highway system. Chino also suggested the creation of an

"Apache Trail" interest route and the placing of signs on Highway 24 to designate it as part of the route. He explained that by working together, area communities such as Alamogordo, Mescalero, Ruidoso, Clouderoff and Lincoln could thus extend the length of tourist visits by a day or two.

"To do this requires a cooperative attitude and a cooperative spirit," said Chino. "It cannot be if people become negative."

Chino alleged several instances of unpleasant treatment that he and other members of the Tribe have received in this area, and indicated that this could be a hindrance to cooperation.

As an example, Chino stated that ski packages could be limited to guests at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, which would exclude local lodgers from participating in such a program.

He noted, however, that he does not wish to resort to sanctions, "like President Reagan."

"You maintain your cooperative attitude and I'll maintain my cooperative attitude," Chino said.

He also referred to a recent series of articles in The Ruidoso News which dealt with proposed expansion of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort. Headlines on some of the articles carried the implication that the

Tribe is not able to cope with management of the ski area, he said.

Chino pointed out that over 100 non-Indians are employed by the ski area and another 35 work at the Inn. Much of this very large payroll is probably spent in Ruidoso, he added.

Despite "opposition or grudging support" of the Forest Service, the Tribe has tried to make Sierra Blanca as fine a resort as possible, Chino said. He stated that financing difficulties for the ski area are real, and that any banker in the room would have difficulty lending money for expansion of the area under terms of the Forest Service special use permit.

He then read some of the permit, emphasizing the clause which gives the Forest Service authority to revoke the permit for noncompliance with its conditions.

"Until a bankable permit or lease can be obtained, future expansion and growth will be limited," Chino said.

"The more skiers at the resort, the more guests at the Inn, the more business will accrue to you in this room," he told the audience.

Chino pointed out that the ski area proper was at one time part of the Mescalero Reservation, and that its severance by executive order (in 1876) made the Tribe a "victim of political manipulation."

to face up to this particular point," he said. "At this time, the Tribe is expansion oriented," Chino said, in noting the construction of new rooms, convention facilities and an indoor tennis bubble at the Inn.

He listed other projects under study by the Tribe. These include a sawmill, an expanded Silver Lake Trailer Park and a freezing plant at the trout hatchery. Agricultural and mineral development is also being considered.


"I want my people to reach a point of self-sufficiency," said Chino. He noted that members of the Tribe are subject to all state and federal taxes except the ad valorem (sales) tax. "So let's not think the Tribe is getting all the goodies," he said.

Chino pointed out that at one time, Apache lands stretched from the Gulf of Mexico to the Tucson, Arizona, area. He said that although fair market value was not paid to the Indians for the land, what was paid was invested.

He noted that the Tribe's present investment portfolio would help place it in the top 20 percent of American corporations.

"So this is the kind of neighbor you have," he said. "Together, I think we can all move ahead to realize greater potential from our resources."

Thus, Chino concluded, the Mescalero Apache Tribe will continue to expect the good will of its neighbors in Ruidoso.
