## BUDGET OFFICE ALLOCATES \$50,000

# Airport site study funded

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) was informed Thursday that progress is being made toward a federally funded study to determine the compatibility of an airport and an experimental farm being operated on Fort Stanton Mesa.

A progress report on the National Academy of Sciences study was relayed by the office of Senator Harrison Schmitt to SBAC chairman Fred Heckman Thursday afternoon. The call came some time after a short regular meeting of SBAC attended by Heckman, County Commissioner Ben Hall and

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Norman Wheeler.

Heckman said he was told that the federal Office of Management and Budget has approved the expenditure of \$50,000 for the study. It is now up to the Department of the Interior to assign the funds from its budget and review the contracts for the study, he explained.

The proposed airport site is on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) land. BLM is a branch of the Department of Interior.

Relative merits of use of the land for agriculture and aviation will be weighed in the study, Heckman said. It will also recommend appropriate courses of action, he added.

"We haven't seen the (final) contract yet," said Heckman, noting that the contract will include a timetable for completion of the study. He stated that Senator Schmitt will personally monitor the study once it gets underway.

At the commission meeting, Heckman relayed a suggestion from Capitan SBAC representative Benny Coker. This was to "try to ascertain where the gubernatorial candidates stand on the airport issue."

Hall and Wheeler agreed that this was a good suggestion. "If we had the governor on our side, it could sure make a difference," said Hall.

"A lot of our homework is

done," Heckman said. He stated that there is one basic question which must be answered for the airport to proceed; "Is New Mexico State University (which operates the agricultural station) going to cooperate with us on our mutual use of Fort Stanton Mesa?"

The latest study, which Heckman said SBAC has agreed to abide by, "if it is impartial," might help answer the question.

Wheeler expressed concern that Schmitt will soon be very busy campaigning for reelection. Recalling the many studies that have already been done on the proposed site, he said, "It seems like there should be an easier way."

## Sewer plant construction on schedule

Construction of the Regional Wastewater System treatment plant at Biscuit Hill is, village manager Jim Hine said Friday, "right on schedule."

Hine said all of the sewer mains to serve Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs have been installed and "99 percent accepted." Hine added that the inspection resulting in the 99 percent acceptance was the best obtainable, "as they just don't accept those mains at 100 percent."

Construction at the treatment plant, Hine said, "is 75 percent complete, with the remaining work being installation of electronic equipment to operate the laboratory, sludge tanks and the clarifier, which is now being installed."

Hine said that all of the concrete work and construction of buildings has been completed and that the only outside work remaining at the plant includes sidewalks, paving parking areas and landscaping.

The plant is due to be completed in April, Hine said, "if there are no delays in delivery of the electrical equipment, a development we do not think will happen."

Once the plant reaches the operational stage, local operating personnel will receive two weeks of instruction under the supervision of factory representatives and the project engineer.

"There are a lot of things about operating this plant that require intensive training," Hine said, "and our personnel are prepared for this training, as they have all completed several schools in sewage plant operation and

maintenance." Barring any unforeseen delays in obtaining electrical equipment, Hine said the "plant could be operating in May or June, and we're shooting for May."

As soon as the plant is functioning, Ruidoso Downs will begin offering sewer service to the village and Ruidoso can begin connecting present lines to the system and start planning to connect areas of the village not presently served by sewer to the new system.

Hine said that the ideal fall and early winter weather, with minimum snowfall at the plant site, was the main reason the work is continuing on schedule.


## New tax law on residential property

The County Assessor's Office has issued a notice to taxpayers to be aware of an important section in the property valuation forms that will be mailed out in coming months.

This section, said County Assessor Julia Samora, is a Declaration of Residential Property. Property owners must sign this declaration in order for their property to be classified and taxed as residential.

"If people don't sign it, the property is considered nonresidential and taxed at a higher rate," said Samora.

She said that the notices of valuation will begin to go out next month, and noted that property owners must return the forms within 30 days of their mailing.

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"We haven't seen the (final) contract yet," said Heckman, noting that the contract will include a timetable for completion of the study. He stated that Senator Schmitt will personally monitor the study once it gets underway.

At the commission meeting, Heckman relayed a suggestion from Capitan SBAC representative Benny Coker. This was to "try to ascertain where the gubernatorial candidates stand on the airport issue."


Hall and Wheeler agreed that this was a good suggestion. "If we had the governor on our side, it could sure make a difference," said Hall.

"A lot of our homework is

done," Heckman said. He stated that there is one basic question which must be answered for the airport to proceed: "Is New Mexico State University (which operates the agricultural station) going to cooperate with us on our mutual use of Fort Stanton Mesa?"

The latest study, which Heckman said SBAC has agreed to abide by, "if it is impartial," might help answer the question.

Wheeler expressed concern that Schmitt will soon be very busy campaigning for reelection. Recalling the many studies that have already been done on the proposed site, he said, "It seems like there should be an easier way."

# Sewer plant construction on schedule

Construction of the Regional Wastewater System treatment plant at Biscuit Hill is, village manager Jim Hine said Friday, "right on schedule."

Hine said all of the sewer mains to serve Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs have been installed and "99 percent accepted." Hine added that the inspection resulting in the 99 percent acceptance was the best obtainable, "as they just don't accept those mains at 100 percent."

Construction at the treatment plant, Hine said, "is 75 percent complete, with the remaining work being installation of electronic equipment to operate the laboratory, sludge tanks and the clarifier, which is now being installed."

Hine said that all of the concrete work and construction of buildings has been completed and that the only outside work remaining at the plant includes sidewalks, paving parking areas and landscaping.

The plant is due to be completed in April, Hine said, "if there are no delays in delivery of the electrical equipment, a development we do not think will happen."

Once the plant reaches the operational stage, local operating personnel will receive two weeks of instruction under the supervision of factory representatives and the project engineer.

"There are a lot of things about operating this plant that require intensive training," Hine said, "and our personnel are prepared for this training, as they have all completed several schools in sewage plant operation and

maintenance." Barring any unforeseen delays in obtaining electrical equipment, Hine said the "plant could be operating in May or June, and we're shooting for May."

As soon as the plant is functioning, Ruidoso Downs will begin offering sewer service to the village and Ruidoso can begin connecting present lines to the system and start planning to connect areas of the village not presently served by sewer to the new system.

Hine said that the ideal fall and early winter weather, with minimum snowfall at the plant site, was the main reason the work is continuing on schedule.

She said that the notices of valuation will begin to go out next month, and noted that property owners must return the forms within 30 days of their mailing.



# 1981 was bustling year in Ruidoso

October 12—The mile racing and the Hunter/Jumper shows were proclaimed successes by the sponsors. The Hunter/Jumper Grand Prix, with a \$5,000 purse, was won by Tim Herrick of Phoenix, Arizona. Natalie Nabb, 17, Nogales, Arizona, won the Champion Junior Working Hunter Class and \$1,500 in prize money.

Fun Day in the Park, a semi-annual program sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m., October 25, in School House Park.

October 14—Ruidoso trustees October 13, authorized a feasibility study to help determine whether the village should purchase the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company, on Carrizo Creek Road.

The Board of Education October 13 adopted a plan, proposed by teachers, to provide for a reduction in the teaching force should there be a drop in enrollment that would justify this action.

The Ruidoso Downs trustees October 12 approved a rate increase for Cablevision of Lincoln County. Action on this request had been tabled previously.

The Ruidoso Jaycees have been ranked first in New Mexico, on a per capita basis, for raising more than \$5,000 this year for Muscular Dystrophy.

October 19—The Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, the Pink Ladies, issued a call for more than 100 donors in their blood drive scheduled October 23.

Chamber of Commerce president Richard Sandoval, October 18, announced one Chamber goal for the coming year will be to honor pioneers of Lincoln County, who have contributed to the growth of Ruidoso.

October 22—The Lincoln County Commissioners October 20 approved a feasibility study on using reserve county funds to construct an administrative building near the current courthouse in Carrizozo, to build a 2,000 square foot substation for county offices in Ruidoso and to install an emergency fire exit in the county jail.

Dawn Osbourn, a senior at Ruidoso High School, was named the Southwest District State Vice President for the Distributive Education Club of America, at a recent meeting in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso High School hand captured first place in Class C competition at the October 16 "Parade of Champions" competition at New Mexico State University, Las Cruces.

October 26—A Ruidoso landmark, the Chaparral Motor Hotel and Convention Center, has been purchased by former Texas governor John Connally, former Texas Lieutenant governor Ben Barnes and Texas rancher and developer Joe McDermott, in a deal finalized October 18. Plans for future development of the property will be announced.

Ruidoso's heavy traffic situation will be evaluated and discussed as the result of a special District II Highway meeting October 23 in Carrizozo. Discussion items included a proposed bypass route around Ruidoso, possibly utilizing Gavilan Canyon, and making a traffic count in Ruidoso, over the next year, to determine what safety measures should be incorporated on Highway 37 through Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Christian School, Ruidoso

Downs, in its first semester of existence, boasts an enrollment of 63, has its own school board and is developing plans for expansion.

October 23—Ruidoso trustees dealt with several matters pertaining to future development in the village—including street grades, replats and rezoning requests—at the regular meeting October 27. Passage of Resolution 61-16 changes the maximum allowable grade to ten percent on heavily traveled local streets and to 12 percent on streets leading into those with heavy traffic.

The Ruidoso Downs trustees October 26, okayed the purchase of a radio network for the Volunteer Fire Department, at a cost of nearly \$19,000, pending approval by the Ruidoso trustees of the use of a water tower on which to install an antenna to serve the system.

November 2—Ruidoso's traffic problems—and some possible solutions—will be the subject of a meeting November 5 between village officials and state Highway Department representatives. The discussion will center around a bypass route, an update of the 1976 village traffic study, the need for more traffic signals and a cooperative agreement between the state and village on striping Sudderth and Mechem Drives, on State Highway 37.

Two Ruidoso police officers recently attended a two-day "street survival seminar" in Albuquerque and are conducting classes here for the rest of the force.

Growing enrollments at the Ruidoso schools has resulted in the purchase of a school bus, equipped with an electric lift on the side to accommodate passengers in wheel chairs. The unit was purchased with the future in mind, at which time there may be continued use for a bus with equipment to serve the handicapped.

November 5—Village manager Jim Hine told the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission November 2 that the village should be ready to hire a full time permanent planner by the first of March, 1982. The need for a village planner has been discussed by Planning and Zoning often in past years.

It was announced today that a new bank, with action being taken by First City Financial Corporation, charter application has been made. The proposed bank has an option on property at the northwest corner of Mechem Drive and Rio Arriba Road, near Forest Lawn Cemetery.

The Joint Use Board November 2 approved purchase of a primary clarifier for the Regional Wastewater System, currently under construction at Biscuit Hill, east of Ruidoso Downs. The cost of the clarifier, to handle sewage when it first enters the treatment plant, is pegged at \$140,000.

November 9—A meeting between state highway officials and Ruidoso village officials November 5 opened lines of communication between the two concerning specific traffic and highway problems Ruidoso is experiencing. Highway Department officials pledged to cooperate with Ruidoso in working to solve these problems. Several changes in road construction were discussed, as was the possibility of Ruidoso purchasing a striping unit, under a cooperative agreement with the state, to stripe High-

way 37 as often as necessary.

A limited number of tickets—176 for each performance—of the Madrigal Feast, an annual fund raiser for the Ruidoso Public Library, were scheduled to go on sale November 12. A Wine and Waasal Night is scheduled December 8, at a cost of \$10 per ticket, with the feast night, December 9, priced at \$50 per person.

Three groups are taking Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation training at present, as part of the Altruista Club of Ruidoso's goal of certifying 10 percent of the county's population in these life saving skills.

November 12—Architects for the planned Ruidoso High School were on hand November 10 to discuss preliminary drawings of the new building with members of the Board of Education. The new building, to be built on 40 acres near White Mountain School, will utilize glass as much as possible, to improve lighting and provide an open atmosphere.

Ruidoso Downs trustees November 9 announced plans to change existing mobile home ordinances, to establish regulations for the size and appearance of the homes.

Ruidoso trustees November 10 were advised by village attorney Lee Huckstep that a petition calling for a referendum on the question of liquor license transfers into the village was invalid, because it lacked the proper number of signatures.

The Lincoln County Commission November 10 postponed action on the transfer of a liquor license from Corona to Oscura to Alto, as requested by Great Western Realty, Alto.

October building permits issued in Ruidoso during October totaled \$2,392,400.

November 16—The Ruidoso trustees have been advised by engineer Willis E. Umbholtz, following a feasibility study, that the acquisition of the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company by the Village of Ruidoso appears feasible and practical. Company stockholders will take action on offering the utility for sale to the village November 20.

Madrigal choir rehearsals, for the December 8-9 production of the Madrigal Feast, are underway at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Dates for the 1982 Summer Festival, featuring the Fort Worth Texas Little Symphony, have been set for June 8-15. Festival director Ann Denton has announced.

Ruidoso High School senior Jack Holland gained the honor of being the only Ruidoso student in recent years to qualify as a National Merit Scholarship semifinalist. He will now compete in testing to qualify for one of the 5,000 scholarships available.

November 19—Oil and gas leases in the Capitan Mountains Wilderness, which have received national attention this week, will be the subject of a 10 a.m., November 20, meeting at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Five Ruidoso High School music students, Dee Sherwood, Alto, Sherri Ridgeway, soprano, and baritone Dariusz Rad, Eric Berg and Willie Dean, have earned places in the New Mexico Music Education Association's choir. They will appear with the choir in a January 15 performance in Pope Joy Hall, at the University of New Mexico.

The Chamber of Commerce has an-

nounced plans to have local stores remain open until 9 p.m., December 8, 11 and 18, if the 112 retail merchants in the village will support the program.

Twelfth Judicial District Judge Robert Doughty November 16 granted a mistrial in the case of the State of New Mexico versus Donald Ray Bishop, 18, Ruidoso Downs, on charges stemming from an arrest made by police officers last March 13.

November 23—The Ruidoso trustees, in a special meeting November 19, voted unanimously to pursue the acquisition of the Ruidoso Natural Gas Company by the village of Ruidoso. The action means negotiations for the purchase can continue, with Ruidoso voters to decide in an election next March whether to approve the actual purchase.

Approximately 25 Ruidoso residents attended the public input meeting November 20 in the Ruidoso Public Library, concerning oil and gas leasing in the Capitan Mountains Wilderness. Comments made at the meeting will be incorporated in an Environmental Assessment Report to be prepared by the United States Forest Service.

A meeting to discuss potential fire problems in the Ruidoso area was held November 20 at Smokey Bear Ranger Station. The session included a field trip to examine fuels in the forest that could feed wildfires. Representatives of national and state forestry offices asked the cooperation of the public, and fire prevention and fighting people, to reduce fire danger in this area.

November 26—Plans for a new detention facility, to be built in Ruidoso next year, are nearing completion. The building will feature a jail complex that is self-contained, to separate it from the public area, and will include offices for the municipal and magistrate courts as well as a command center, in the event of a disaster such as a forest fire.

Ruidoso's trustees, November 24, ended a short business meeting to go into executive session to discuss the swimming pool lease and a personnel matter regarding animal control. The trustees approved the appointment of L. J. Cuddy as village Fire Prevention Officer effective December 1.

Laws concerning the proper licensing of vehicles in New Mexico will be enforced, effective immediately, by the Ruidoso Police Department.

November 30—The Ruidoso trustees have been advised by village administrative assistant Frank Potter that income and expenses from the new water system rates are about as expected since becoming effective four months ago.

Robert C. "Buzz" Hoeller, 42, an employee of Ruidoso Wholesale Lumber and Carpet, died in a November 27 airplane crash on the Neacalero Apache Reservation. Hoeller was alone in the Piper Cherokee Archer.

Craig Sullivan, 19, was listed in stable condition at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, after suffering a severe wound to the neck, late in the evening of November 28. A 15-year-old suspect in the incident was being held in the Ruidoso jail this morning. He is being held on felony charges of aggravated battery and

aggravated assault, following the incident in which Sullivan was stabbed with a knife.

December 3—The Lincoln County commissioners December 3, on a split vote, finally approved the transfer of a liquor license from Corona to Oscura, then to Alto. The action allowed Great Western Realty, owner of the license, to open a package liquor store at the Alta Alps Country Store, located at the junction of Highway 37 and Sun Valley Road.

Craig Sullivan, 19, Ruidoso, was reported to be in good condition in Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, following an incident in which he was stabbed in the neck here November 28.

Twenty-six Ruidoso businesses have announced they will remain open until 9 p.m., December 4, 11 and 18, for the convenience of shoppers that might not be able to make their Christmas purchases during normal business hours.

December 7—Monthly valuation of new construction in Ruidoso went over the \$3.5 million mark for the first time in November, with three large condominium projects accounting for most of the total. The actual total of \$3,506,720, based on a valuation of \$20 per square foot, broke the previous record, set in September of this year, by \$1 million.

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission chairman Fred Heckman said at a commission meeting December 3, that a study will be conducted by the National Academy of Sciences on whether the proposed regional airport can coexist with agricultural experiments, conducted by New Mexico State University, on Fort Stanton mesa, providing President Reagan signs the appropriations bill that will fund the study.

Two Lookout Estates Condominiums suffered an estimated \$120,000 in fire damage December 3. Ruidoso Fire Marshal Derald Waltrip said today, "As near as we could figure out, a lady cleaned out a fireplace and left the ashes out on the back deck."

December 10—Ruidoso trustees, December 8, took a big step in improving the village street department's construction and maintenance capabilities then they approved the purchase of a new hot mix plant, at \$335,539, and a street striping machine at \$20,493.

The Chamber of Commerce directors, meeting December 7, announced plans to have the Ruidoso trustees name a study group to deal with purchasing, in the immediate future, a parking lot in or adjacent to midtown Ruidoso.

The Handicap Program Clinic, for instructors of handicapped skiers, was scheduled December 14-18 at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

December 14—The history of the expansion of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort was the subject of the first of a series of articles on the development of the area to be published in The News.

Ruidoso High School seniors Eva Johnson and Cristi Mount launched a Civic Consciousness Project through the local chapter of the Distributive Education Clubs of America, DECA.

Donations for the New Mexico Special Olympics, January 26-29 at Eagle Creek Ski Area, are being accepted at any branch of Ruidoso State Bank.

December 17—Ruidoso Downs trustees, December 14, were presented with detailed plans for an 18 acre amusement park, planned to be built above the village,

overlooking the race track area. No cost estimate was presented.

Plans for development of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, operated by the Mescalero Apache Tribe, under a 30-year special use permit were announced. Improvements in ski lifts and new trails are now being planned.

The Ruidoso Multiple Listing Service registered nearly \$72.5 million in real estate sales this year. The figure is a 59 percent increase over sales of \$45.8 million during 1980.

December 21—Problems on the development of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, in complying with Forest Service standards, have delayed expansion of the area, due to the Mescalero Apache Tribe seeking title to 2,240 acres of Forest land for the expansion.

The Ruidoso Paint Center was first place winner in the Chamber of Commerce sponsored commercial Christmas lighting contest. Adobe Plaza won second and Sivage Electric, third place honors.

Juan Rodriguez, 15, was found not guilty of aggravated assault and aggravated battery in connection with the November 28 stabbing of Craig Sullivan, 19, Ruidoso.

December 24—Transfer of 2,240 acres of Lincoln National Forest land to the Mescalero Apache Tribe, for ski area expansion, have been delayed due to the tribe's seeking ownership of the land, and due, in part, to the wilderness inventory and classification process taking place.

The Lincoln County commissioners December 22 rejected bids for base course material for road construction and for corrugated steel pipe due to the rise in cost over previous bid prices.

Most Ruidoso retail merchants reported that Christmas sales were generally good.

December 28—The Mescalero Apache Tribe's efforts to obtain title to 2,240 acres of Forest Service land are generally being supported by the Forest Service.

A dance, benefitting the New Mexico Winter Special Olympics, at Eagle Creek Ski Area, was scheduled January 15 at Jerry Dale's.

Gross receipts taxes in Lincoln County municipalities will be 4 1/4 percent, effective January 1, with the rate to be 3 1/2 percent in the balance of the county.

December 31—The Ruidoso trustees voted, January 29, to add an \$8 million water system improvements bond issue on the March 2 village election. The decision followed a presentation by Fred Burns, of Boyle engineering, of a capital improvements program for the village water system. The plans call for a second water bond vote of \$5.9 million for improvements scheduled to begin in 1985.

Ruidoso Downs trustees January 28 referred to their village attorney the question of permitting resident Tony Parker to transfer 10 acre feet of water rights from his subdivision in Ruidoso Downs to the Gavilan Canyon area. Board members, generally, did not favor the transfer.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe claimed difficulties in obtaining financing for ski area expansion, because lending sources tended to "laugh them out of the office," because they do not have title to the land they are planning to expand the skiing facilities on.

## USFS extends comment period on management

The Forest Service, Southwestern Region, has extended to January 15, the review and public comment period on the region's land and resource management plan and accompanying draft environmental impact statement.

The documents examine alternatives for managing the national forests over the next several years as required by law.

CLUSTERED PECANS — Sammy Singh Jr., La Mesa, had a hard time believing what he found in his pecan orchard this summer. He counted, then recounted, to make sure it really was a 48-nut pecan cluster. There was a 38-nut cluster on the same tree in 1979, but this is the largest cluster ever found in the Singh orchard. The New Mexico State University (NMSU) horticulture department helped Singh and his father freeze dry the cluster and then preserve it with a silicone spray so it remains intact for several years. According to Esteban Herrera, NMSU Extension hor-

ticulturist, pecan clusters happen when several female flowers form on the tree at a single place. There are three to six nuts in some common clusters, and a dozen can cluster now and then. However, clusters of more than 12 are rare, Herrera said. On a worldwide basis, pecan clusters have been reported with anywhere from 35 to 58 nuts in the cluster; however, these exceptionally high numbers often occur where two or more shoots of the tree have grown together. The 48-nut cluster in the Singh orchard is on a single shoot. (NMSU photo)

# Hunting a way of life with Wayne Rupe

Hunting has been a big part of Wayne Rupe's life ever since he can remember.

"I've been hunting almost as long as I've been able to walk," Rupe said. "About since I was four or five years old in Texas. We'd go out and hunt squirrels and rabbits."

Now Rupe hunts much bigger game as head of his own guide and packing service in Ruidoso.

"We go after every kind of big game in the Ruidoso area," Rupe said. "Elk, black bear, mule deer, mountain lion, turkey and barbary sheep."

Rupe has been in Ruidoso since 1971, but has been in the guide service since 1956.

"I started as a guide in Colorado," said Rupe. "Then I worked in northern New Mexico before I came to Ruidoso."

Scott and Jeff Chapman are the head guides in Rupe's service and hunters are provided with practically the comforts of home.

Rupe provides walk-in tents, three meals a day, horses, and at least one guide per five or six hunters.

"We usually work with parties of up to 15 people," Rupe said. "The most we've ever had is 21 people within one party."

Prices vary according to the type of game hunted. Elk hunts cost \$225 a day with a three-day minimum (on the 1981 price scale.) while deer, bear and turkey hunts cost \$195 a day during the 1981 season.

Rupe said elk can be seen all over the area.

"The time to hunt them is early in the morning or in the late afternoon when it's fairly dark," he said. "You can be extremely lucky and come out in the middle of the day and shoot one, but that's an exception rather than the rule. They're smart and a challenge to hunt."

Although elk are probably the highest priced game animal in Lincoln County, mule deer are by far the most popular.

"Deer are probably a bit easier to hunt and they're just more popular," said Rupe. "Black bear are the most dangerous but even they will try to avoid people. Usually only a sow with her cubs can be considered dangerous."

Black bears in this area average around 350 pounds, according to Rupe. They are not nearly as dangerous as grizzly bears which will weigh over twice as much on the average.

"Grizzlies are generally a bit cantankerous and at times can be downright

mean," Rupe said. "However, they haven't been in this area for quite awhile."

Mountain lions and turkeys are also highly valued by the hunters who come to Ruidoso, said Rupe.

"Cougars are very crafty and try to avoid people," Rupe said. "Turkeys are also crafty and are one of the hardest big game animals around to hunt."

The only big game animal season currently on in the Ruidoso area is barbary

sheep. They are a valued big game animal

but not as much as their cousins, the bighorn, who don't inhabit this area.

Still, barbary sheep are a big prize to catch. The average male will weigh around 200 pounds with a mature one weighing 250 to 275 pounds.

In all his time as a guide Rupe has only been injured once and that wasn't by a wild animal but in a horse accident several years ago.

"I guess I've just been lucky," he said.


"That's a long time (since 1956) to have only one injury."

Twenty six years is a long time in the guide and packing business. What does Rupe enjoy the most about it?

"I just enjoy being in the outdoors," he said. "When I'm a guide I'm in the outdoors all the time. I wish I could spend all my time in the outdoors."





**The Deep of Winter**

We are almost on the threshold of what is called by the old timers "The deep of winter," that is the middle of January.

Up on the great plains the hard winter spell came a week or so early, but God help the folks up there, they would do well to prepare for "the other barrel" from Jack Frost and the staff of weather people up at the North Pole.

Most all the coldest spells and heavy snows have arrived here at the place around the middle of January.

The coldest day was seventeen below, on January sixteen, the day that the little coyote-collie arrived at the house. Shady Logan was my inseparable companion for fourteen years, and every January at the approach of the anniversary of that day, I remember Shady fondly and send up a prayer to God for his Spirit. For that is what he was, in the words of the Indians "A Manatau, or Spirit, Dog."

One thing about the January cold is its built dog grip upon the land.

Yesterday, on the sixth, it was sunny and cloudy off and on and the temperature got up to fifty; and yet in the west wind blowing off the mountain and the patches of snow on the way down you felt cold, and kept looking for a windbreak for shelter.

Today from somewhere away to the north, a cold wave moved in, sending the temperature down to twenty. It is high noon, overcast with clouds, and the temperature has not moved one bit, still twenty.

There is only the faintest north breeze in the air, so that it is not unpleasant outside at all, if you are dressed for January.

And yet, now, remember. This is the time of year to be very careful of the cold, not to get caught out after dark without warm clothing.

When it comes to hiking or wandering in the woods, have another person or two with you, and go prepared for a sudden change of cold weather out of the north, or off the mountain.

Up in the middle west and farther north, the folks begin preparing for winter in mid December; and with all their foresight, still a record cold wave comes that is hard for them to handle.

Here, as in many other ways, we are fortunate in having warning about the weather. When you hear that they are having blizzards and record cold in North Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado, you very well know that very soon some of this cold will reach down to us.

(Editor's note: The Pat Corner, to be written by Animal Control Officer Jack Sniadecki, will appear in The News regularly. The purpose of the column will be to acquaint pet owners, with emphasis being placed on children, with proper methods of pet care. Some of the articles will be devoted to explaining the origin of pets, as well as explaining their characteristics. Sniadecki will accept questions from pet owners and answer them in this column.)

It means different things to people, depending on how it affects them, or their pets. One problem facing the animal control officer is dealing with pet owners, primarily children, who are honestly not aware of their responsibilities to their pet. A very important part of a pet owner's responsibility is knowing what animal control is. I will try to explain these responsibilities in future columns, so that every pet owner will understand the duties of the animal control officer.

What is animal control? Animal control is catching your pet when it is not where it is supposed to be, and it is disposing of your pet when it dies.

**Social Security information**

Recent legislation has changed the age at which Social Security beneficiaries are no longer subject to the annual earnings test. The annual earnings test limits the amount a beneficiary can earn and still receive full Social Security benefits. Those people receiving retirement and survivors benefits who are under age 65 can earn up to \$4440 in 1982 without any effect on their Social Security benefits. Those 65 or over can earn up to \$6000 in 1982 and receive all their benefits. Beneficiaries age 72 or over can receive all their Social Security benefits regardless of how much they earn in a year. Under the old law, the age at which the annual earnings test no longer applies was

scheduled to be lowered to age 70 effective January, 1982. The new law delays this change for one year. Therefore, effective January, 1983, beneficiaries age 70 or over will be able to receive all their Social Security benefits regardless of their earnings. Until January, 1983, the annual earnings test will continue to apply to beneficiaries under age 72. Beginning January, 1983, the annual earnings test will apply to Social Security office. The phone number is 622-7780. The annual earnings test does not apply to people receiving disability benefits. People receiving disability benefits should report any work to their Social Security office.

**Forest Service information office very busy during 1981**

Lincoln National Forest Supervisor's Office gave information and assistance to approximately 4,000 visitors in 1981. Over half of those visitors also received publications covering a variety of subjects from chainsaws to hiking trails.

The Information Receptionist also handled more than 2,000 telephone calls requesting information about the forest and related activities, answered hundreds of written inquiries, and mailed out several hundred brochures, maps and booklets. In addition, the office supplied a wide variety of educational materials to local school teachers, Scout leaders, and civic organizations.



Fall is the busiest time of year when hunting information and firewood permits are in high demand. Winter brings requests from skiers and other snow lovers. During spring and summer, many outdoor enthusiasts call or stop by the office for current information and publications.

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**—For awhile it looked as if nobody was going to wish New Mexico a happy birthday.

The day itself, in case you missed it, is January 6, and the state is now 70 years old.

Back when we reached our fiftieth year, Ed Mechem named Joe Bursley to coordinate an extensive celebration. At 60, Fabian Chavez had the assignment.

But at 70, nobody planned any parties.

Governor King's proclamation of "New Mexico Day" on the anniversary itself didn't come out till the day before. That's a little late to be urging schools, libraries, patriotic, civic and social organizations to commemorate the day with appropriate observances.

King did say, "We are a blessed state, one with a great abundance of culture, beauty and natural wealth. We should all pause for a moment to reflect on what our state means to us, and how we can protect and nurture it, and help it grow."

Governor King, of course, has other things on his mind.

He's getting close to the final draft of his State of the State address, which he will give on January 19.

That document will call for about a 10 or 11 percent increase in state spending next year, which means we can look for a budget of somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1.15 billion, or maybe a little higher.

King will also be taking another stab at getting the Legislature to appropriate about \$80 million for building projects. When he made those proposals in 1981, they got turned down.

One of those projects, if they're accepted this year, would provide a new home for the Health and Environment Department, now mostly housed in a former discount store in Santa Fe which is so impractical it threatens the health of staff members by

the poor environment it provides.

Other money for building would go to about \$38 million worth of construction on college campuses in the state. The Public School Finance Division wants about \$32 million for capital improvements, but it's doubtful if the Governor will go much higher than \$20 million for that purpose.

You can also look for some heavy language in the speech about water, which becomes more and more of an issue with each passing month.

The King speech, of course, is the opening gun in the regular session of the Legislature. Since that regular meeting will follow a special session, the address will be a little anticlimactic. By the time it's made, many preparatory steps for the regular session will already have been taken.

Though the special session can't consider or enact anything except what comes under the headings of redistricting and reapportionment, committees can start getting organized for their major work of the year.

And how long will that major work take? Well, many of us here who find ourselves fascinated by the actions the lawmakers take are inclined to think it will not be completed in the 30 days assigned to it.

We expect to have legislators on the premises for a couple of months this year, starting January 6, with the special session, and running well into March.

That may come about because the Legislature itself calls a special session after the regular one. It can do that, especially if it wants to take up things the Governor might not want discussed, such as Jack Stahl's bill on giving severance tax money to banks and S&L's for low-interest construction loans.

We don't expect things to be boring for the next 60 days.

#### Voice of America

The great difference between the Voice of America (VOA) and various other governments' broadcast services beamed across national borders has been the VOA news division's tradition of objectivity. Over the years newsroom personnel generally have prided themselves on reporting the news straight.

It is a perceived erosion of this tradition that has impelled the news division's very competent director, Bernard H. Kamenske, to resign. His leaving and its apparent cause, combine to make this a sad occurrence.

Kamenske has been with the Voice of America for a long time. He was primarily responsible, five years ago, for putting together the charter intended to safeguard the agency's news personnel from management interference. That charter calls for broadcasting "accurate, objective and comprehensive news".

Agency newsmen are said to feel that this mandate is increasingly being weakened by the administration as more stress is placed on the VOA's propaganda role; that is, the dissemination of official views. This it seems, is Kamenske's primary reason for quitting after many years on the job.

Broadcasting official views is a legitimate function of a government service aimed at people abroad. But the news, fully and accurately told, should not take a back seat to that function.

We concur in Kamenske's remark a few days ago that "the current situation in Poland has shown how crucial we are as a news organization." And, because he was such a sturdy champion of news freedom, we deeply regret his departure from the Voice of America. — Alamogordo Daily News

#### SOCIAL SECURITY ERROR

No wonder Social Security is in trouble. Take the case of Gabriela Macias of Los Angeles whose Social Security checks came for more than four years after her death despite the frantic efforts of her relatives to stem the flow.

Her niece, Elisa Perez, said Social Security officials were called each month for six months on the arrival of a check and told of Mrs. Macias' death. The checks still continued to arrive.

Her brother went to the Social Security office and tried to return the checks. Acceptance was refused and he was told, "Go back to the mortuary and get some more forms." He made trip after trip to the office, took a number, waited for hours, talked to clerks and still the checks arrived until there was a total of 51—still uncashed.

Then two weeks ago a Social Security inspector showed up at the Perez' home and indicated there might be a grand jury investigation into the affair. There should be—an investigation of the Social Security System.

Now, Representative Robert L. Livingston, Republican-Los Angeles, has introduced legislation to set up an information to track down the dead and quickly halt payments. It's something that should become law quickly. We need no more cases like that of Gabriela Macias. —News-Bulletin, Belem

Judge Bruce Kaufman, Santa Fe, has ruled that the media may cover the murder trial of Richard Chapman, in connection with killings at the state penitentiary, but that no photographs of Chapman may be taken within the court building.

We have no argument with his decision.

The judge's action was within the state Supreme Court's guidelines: "The judge has discretionary power to forbid coverage whenever he is satisfied that coverage might have a deleterious effect on the paramount right of the defendant to a fair trial." The guidelines apparently refer to "broadcasting, televising, photographing and recording of court proceedings."

When a trial borders on sensationalism, the case more than likely received widespread media coverage prior to the trial. For instances include the Santa Fe prison slayings, the murder trial now underway in Atlanta and even reports in the news on Frank Carr of Alamogordo, in his fight against charges of sex offenses involving juveniles.

It is our position that the public is entitled to information on defendants, factual information only, that will not prejudice judges/juries in making their decisions in bringing in a verdict.

Once a person is charged with a crime, then those charges should be public record, as should any proceedings in court concerning charges filed against the defendant.

It's a case of the public's right to know, and we commend Judge Kaufman for deciding that this trial could be covered by the media, and that the coverage would not lessen Chapman's chances of receiving a fair trial. — CD

### CANADA'S PROGRESS

The steps yet to be taken, after half a century of effort to bring about constitutional reform, are not expected to en-

While the provinces do relinquish some powers, in other respects they will have considerable independence in the federal system. 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

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


Pulse

The track record for movie-to-TV spinoffs hasn't been very favorable, but in "Fame" NBC-TV has a diamond in the rough. Spawmed from the successful 1980 MGM movie which vividly depicted the hopes and aspirations of a group of talented youngsters who attended the New York High School for Performing Arts, the series picks up where the film left off.

In "Metamorphosis," the first episode of "Fame," Julie Miller (series star Lori Singer), a sheltered but talented teenager from the Midwest, is dealt several crushing ego blows as she adapts to the competitive environments of New York City and the Performing Arts classrooms. It's an uplifting tale which is laced with similar vignettes on the schools other aspiring actors, actresses, dancers and their relationships.


In this respect, "Fame" borrows from the "Hill Street Blues" formula for success. But what really gives "Fame" its competitive edge is the brilliant marriage of music and dialogue. Only "The Greatest American Hero" on ABC-TV attempts to increase the viewer's interest in the program by adding a related song. "Fame's" writers do this throughout the show, giving it a vibrant, bouncy quality. It also provides a showcase for each cast member's talents, and believe me, they are all very, very talented.

Standouts include Erica Gimpel, who replaced Irene Cara in the role of Coco. Erica is every bit as good as Irene was in the movie. Debbie Allen, who was featured in the film, picks up where she left off and the result is smashing. Allen is also "Fame's" choreographer and, right here and now, let me state that she deserves heavy Emmy consideration.

"Fame's" one main obstacle is its timeslot. It faces "Magnum, P.I." on CBS and "Mork and Mindy" on ABC. NBC is trying to shore up its Thursday defenses, but I'm pretty sure that "Fame" would probably do better on another night—say Saturday, for instance. Nevertheless, "Fame" deserves every chance to succeed.
